## Principal's Message

When I think back over our first two years as Langley High, we have indeed had a good start. Individually, each of us whether teacher or student has contributed in some way. Then too, collectively we have contributed.

Our beginning was accomplished through a team effort in which the participating individuals played a unique role. Successful as our efforts have been, the future of Langley will be determined by appropriate change.

Change is here and we will all be constantly challenged by it both as individuals and as a part of some team effort be it school, family, employment or whatever. He who would succeed must be willing and able to meet change head on and to cope with it effectively.


The Administration of Langley High School is headed by four experienced and dedicated men. The principal, Mr. Elam K. Hertzler, received his $A B$ at Eastern Mennonite College and his MA at Eastern Michigan University. He previously taught mathematics at McLean High School, was Assistant Principal for Administration at Madison High School and was Principal of Marshall High School. As Principal, he is responsible for supervising the entire operation of the school program, handling public relations, and long range planning.

The Assistant Principal for Administration, Colonel Wayne Bart, received his BS at West Point and his MS at the University of Virginia. He previously taught physics at Madison High School, a private school in Michigan, and Marshall High School, before he became the Assistant Principal for Administration at Langley. The Assistant Principal for Administration holds the responsibilities of acting as Principal in the Principal's absence and is specifically responsible for day-to-day adminstration and operation of the total school program.

The Assistant Principal for Instruction, Mr. Clinton DeBusk, received his BA at Bridgewater College and his MA at the University of Virginia. He was previously a teacher, a counselor and the Assistant Principal for Instruction at Marshall High School. His special responsibilty lies in matters concerning the curriculum and instruction.

The Director of Guidance, Mr. Rudolph Bush, received his BA at Bridgewater College and his MEd at the University of Virginia. He previously taught at Burke Elementary and Longfellow Intermediate Schools and was a counselor at Marshall High School. The Director of Guidance is responsible, with the help of his staff, for the organization and supervision of guidance services for students, teachers, and parents.

## English Department

Four years of English are a requirement for graduation from Langley High School. The English Department offers a comprehensive program in literature and composition. In addition to the traditional courses, the English Department, in conjunction with the Social Studies Department, offers three team teaching programs: World Civilization I, World Civilization II, and American Civilization in grades nine, ten, and eleven respectively. Furthermore, the Department offers courses in journalism, and public speaking. The faculty seeks to give the student a keen awareness of words and a facility for their use; to help him use language effectively in thinking, speaking, writing, listening, and reading; to help him enrich his whole cultural point of view, so that he may develop a greater insight into humanity and a heightened awareness of his own identity.

## Science Department

The Science Department offers an extensive program at all levels. In the ninth grade, the student may take Science 9, a basic course in chemistry and physics or Earth Science, an academic laboratory course of investigating relationships in the physical world. In the tenth grade, the department offers SM Biology and Green Biology, an academic course presenting ecological and behavorial aspects of the biological community. In the eleventh grade, students may take Chemistry, a laboratory course designed to develop unifying principles, and in the twelfth grade, P.S.S.C. Physics, in which they can deal directly with theories and laws through experimentation.

## Fine Arts

Instrumental organizations include Symphonic Band, Reserve Band, Stage Band, Woodwind Quintet, Brass Sextet, and Clarinet Quartet. The Madrigal Singers, Concert Choir, Girls Chorus, and Boys Chorus comprise vocal study groups. The Fine Arts course compares the culture of Western Man from the Greco-Roman times to the present. Students having previous musical training may enroll in the Literature and Theory course.
The Art Department offers five levels of art. Art I provides a beginning in drawing, painting, sculpture and ceramics. Deeper exploration of all media is taught in Art II. Students receive advanced instruction in their areas of specialization in Art III and concentrate on developing individual projects in Art IV. Senior Art is offered to seniors interested in obtaining basic instruction in studio art and art history and appreciation.

Mr. Ward is head of the Drama Department. The drama students presert several excellent productions each year.

## Practical Arts Department

In the Industrial Arts Department, General Shop 1 through III, Electronics I through III, Drafting, Engineering Drawing, and Architectural Drawing are offered as electives. Teaching facilities include two general shops and two unit shops or electronics and drafting. Students of the Industrial Art course study the organization, materials, occupations, processes and products of industry.

Typing I and II, Bookkeeping I, Shorthand I and II, and General Business comprise the Business Department. Electronic Labs facilitate the learning of shorthand and modern electric typewriters make typing easier.

The Home Economics Department includes Home Economics I through IV and Senior Home Economics. Beginning with a general study of homemaking in Home Economics I, students may continue to a more advanced and involved study in Home Economics IV. Senior Home Economics is especially designed as a survey course for seniors.
