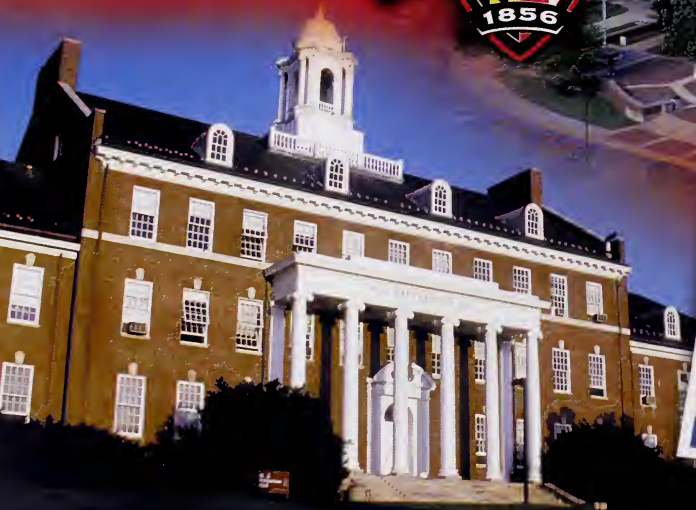

Maryland's varsity complex consists of 14 lighted hard courts as well as an indoor tennis bubble which consists of three courts. The outdoor complex is located adjacent to Cole Field House and has an excellent view of the recently renovated Byrd Stadium.

During the summers, the outdoor complex hosts the World International Junior Hardcourt Championships, the USTA Circuit of College Park, and numerous USTA Mid-Atlantic junior and adult events.

These tournaments bring top talent not only from the United States, but from all around the world.

The Terps also use the state-of-the-art weight-training facility and have a professional staff that monitors the in-season and out-of-season regiment.

Tenth Season • Eastern Kentucky '88



Now in his 10th season, Jim Laitta has taken what began as an underfunded program onto the national scene. Arriving at Maryland in 1991, Laitta began his first season with a team that did not have any scholar-

ship players. The 1998-99 season marked the first year that the program had eight scholarships. Prior to becoming a fully funded team, Laitta demonstrated his recruiting prowess and on-court coaching abilities by taking his partially-funded teams to the NCAA Tournament three times in four years.

In 1996, he led the Terps to the school's first-ever NCAA appearance, as well as a tie for fourth place in the grueling Atlantic Coast Conference. As a result, he was named both ACC and NCAA Region I coach of the year by his peers. Furthermore, in the last three years, Maryland has finished in the top half of the conference each season. The 1999 season saw the team achieve the "triple crown" at the NCAA Tournament by competing as a team and in singles and doubles; this was the first time in the team's history that this was accomplished. Laitta also coached two of his players through two other prestigious tournaments, the National Invitational Tournament

and the National Clay Court Championships. Laitta plans to continue his success with the 2000 team in this benchmark year

Prior to coming to Maryland, Laitta was the head women's coach at Mississippi State University from 1989-1990. The program finished in the national Top 20 and captured an NCAA doubles championship. In addition to coaching several college All-Americans and junior national champions, he has coached pro-

fessionals who have competed in major tournaments such as the U.S. Open and Wimbledon.

Laitta played collegiately at Eastern Kentucky University where he was team captain and played the No. 1 singles and doubles positions. Upon earning his degree in psychology in 1988, he competed on the satellite tour, but always knew that coaching would be in his future.



Recruiting Information

The Maryland women's tennis program has eight full scholarships. Coach Laitta recruits at the National Clay Courts (Memphis, Tenn.), Hard Court (San Jose, Calif.), the Intersectional Team Championships (San Rafael, Calif.), National Indoors (Detroit, Mich.) and Orange Bowl International Championships (Miami, Fla.). Prospective players should be ranked in the top 10 of their sections and in the top 100 nationally.

"The type of student-athletes that we look for here are highly motivated individuals who want to excel both on the court and in the classroom. Our program is one of the more intense programs in the country. The players on the team each have the option of 1-2 individual workouts a week and then strength and conditioning three days a week. We prepare our players physically and mentally for their matches. We are starting to attract players here who have ambitions of playing on the pro tour. We try to accommodate all of the players' dreams and goals when they arrive here. When the players leave here upon graduating, they should all be able to say that they had the time of their lives here at the University of Maryland."

Meg Griffin is in her first year as the student assistant for the tennis team after completing a stellar career with the Terps. Griffin will be involved in all facets of the program.

Griffin started her freshman year in 1996 and made an immediate impact on the team and helped lead the Terps to post-season play. Griffin finished the 1998-99 season as the East Regional Senior Player of the Year and was voted all-conference in the ACC. She also

made a trip with her teammates to the NCAA Tournament. Griffin secured her place in Maryland history as the only tennis player to ever compete in all four grand slam tournaments (NCAA Tournament, National Indoor Tournament, National Clay Court Championships and the All-American Championships).

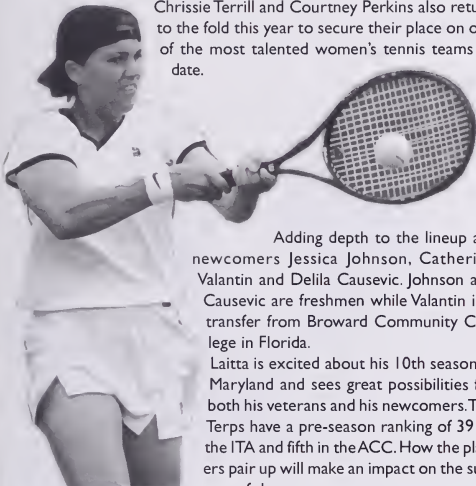
Griffin will graduate from Maryland this May with a degree in international business and marketing.

2000 Women's Season Preview

The 2000 Terrapin women's tennis team enters this benchmark year with hopes of becoming one of the top teams in the ACC and returning to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth consecutive time. Coach Jim Laitta is confident that this will happen with four strong players returning and three newcomers rounding out an already successful program.

"This will be our strongest team from top to bottom," said Laitta. "Our goal is to finish in the top half of the conference and qualify for the NCAA team championships."

Lorraine Bittles looks to make her third consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament while teammates Stacy Walkowitz, Chrissie Terrill and Courtney Perkins also return to the fold this year to secure their place on one of the most talented women's tennis teams to date.

Adding depth to the lineup are newcomers Jessica Johnson, Catherine Valantin and Delila Causevic. Johnson and Causevic are freshmen while Valantin is a transfer from Broward Community College in Florida.

Laitta is excited about his 10th season at Maryland and sees great possibilities for both his veterans and his newcomers. The Terps have a pre-season ranking of 39 by the ITA and fifth in the ACC. How the players pair up will make an impact on the success of the team.

"Our priority is to develop our doubles

and the key will be how well we play there," said Laitta.

The Terps will be looking to find a powerhouse doubles pair who can continue the success that Bittles and Meg Griffin enjoyed together for three years. Terrill and Walkowitz may be the pair to step into the No. 1 spot this season; they are ranked No. 10 in the Eastern Region in pre-season rankings.

Two other players Laitta feels are strong in both singles and doubles are Johnson and Bittles.

"Lorraine has been a steady performer all three years at Maryland. I expect her to finish on a strong beat. We'll be counting on her for singles and doubles."

Bittles and Johnson have already competed as a pair in some fall tournaments and turned in strong performances all around. Terrill emerged this fall as a competitive singles player, sweeping the Maryland Invitational Tournament and finishing in first place. Laitta looks at her to take on the role of team leader and add depth to the bottom portion of the singles lineup.

Perkins will be challenging for a spot in both singles and doubles. Left-handed newcomer Valantin will also compete for a place in the lineup.

Johnson turned in strong performances in fall competition, defeating the No. 2 seed at the ITA Eastern Region Championships in September.

Laitta is excited about a January addition to his team. Causevic, from Silver Spring, Md., will compete with the Terrapins for the first time this spring.

"We are really looking forward to [Causevic] joining the team in January. We are lucky to land her and she could have played anywhere. She could be one of the nation's best players," said Laitta.

Laitta is enthusiastic about the upcoming season. "We have high goals and aspirations and want to build upon the success we have achieved in the last four seasons. We want to qualify for the NCAA Tournament and finish in the top 25 in the country. We want to take this program to another level."

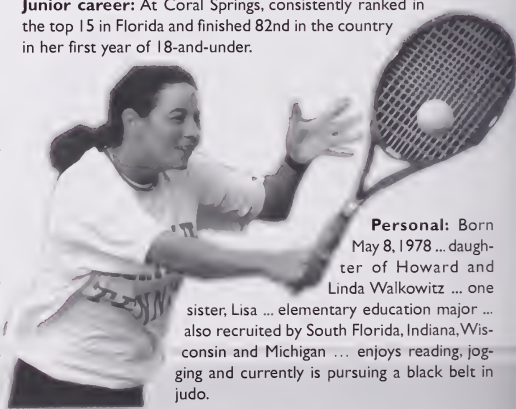

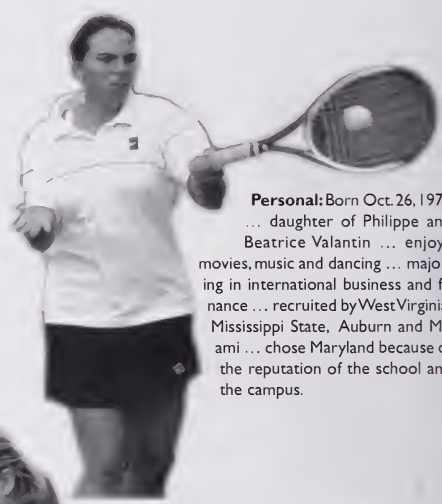

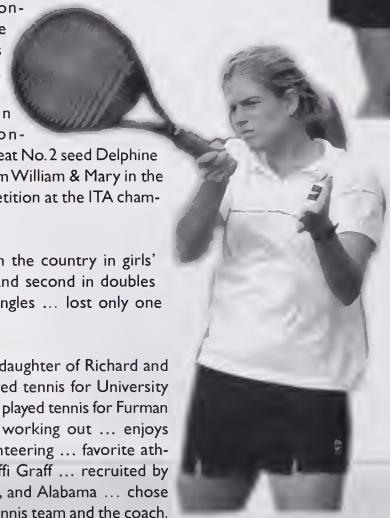

1999 Women's Season Review

The 1999 women's tennis team had a benchmark year and continued its rise as one of the top women's tennis teams in Maryland's history. For the third consecutive year, the Terps qualified for the NCAA Tournament. Last season they achieved the "triple crown" — competing at nationals as a team as well as having qualifiers in singles and doubles. This accomplishment was the first of its kind in Maryland tennis history.

The team started the season strong with three consecutive wins on the road and notched homes wins against West Virginia and George Washington at the end of February to boost their record to 6-1. Con-

tinuing through the season with strong performances all around, the Terps finished fifth in the conference with a 4-4 record. They beat Clemson, Georgia Tech and NC State at home and lost to the ACC's top two teams, Duke and Wake Forest, on the road.

Meg Griffin finished her career at Maryland by receiving accolades from both the ACC and the Eastern Region. For the second time in her career, Griffin was named All-ACC after competing at the No. 1 singles position throughout the year. She was also chosen as the East Region Senior Player of the Year.

Griffin and doubles partner Lorraine Bittles compiled a 19-11 overall record and were ranked nationally for three consecutive years. The duo are also the first to qualify for all four grand slam events (National Indoor Championships, National Clay Court Championships, Riviera All-American Tournament and the NCAA Tournament). Bittles finished her junior year with an 18-18 overall singles record at the No. 2 position.

Stacy Walkowitz and Chrissie Terrill were both strong in singles competition and also as the Terps' No. 2 doubles pair. Walkowitz finished the year with a 21-13 overall singles record, dropping only four matches in the ACC and securing her place as the No. 3 player. Courtney Perkins compiled an impressive 17-12 overall record as a freshman, making an impact on the already competitive Terps to round out the team in the No. 6 position.

Maryland finished the year with an unexpected turn of events. After being initially overlooked by the NCAA despite a No. 41 ITA ranking, the Terps were selected to the NCAA tournament field after Alabama State dropped out. The team lost to No. 4 Mississippi, 5-0, in the first round.

2000 Men's Season Preview

The Terps have set their sights on improvement in the new millennium as they head into the 2000 season. The combination of experienced returners and a strong recruiting class will give the Terps a young lineup with depth. The Terps look to continue their success in non-conference play and hope to improve on ACC play as well.

Terps' coach Jeremy Loomis approaches the season with an optimistic attitude. He says, "I had a very strong recruiting class. They'll make an immediate impact on the lineup. I can honestly say this will be our deepest team since I've been here."

The Terps will rely on the experience of the returning players. A trio of juniors, Larry Chou, Dan Kenshalo and Luan Nguyen, in addition to sophomore Jonathan Murchison will provide leadership and experience for a non-scholarship program playing in one of the nation's toughest conferences.

"This is the first year I have not had any seniors. The guys who are juniors have been under my coaching the past two years, so they should know what to expect. I think it will give them some insight on what to do as far as next year when they are seniors, since they will have more leadership experience. I think that this is just a win-win situation," says Loomis.

After compiling a 4-1 non-conference record in singles play, Chou returns with high expectations. He looks to play in the No. 1 or 2 spot after playing all 14 matches last season in the No. 2 spot. Additionally, Nguyen's play in the South Pacific Games over the summer will prepare him for the upcoming season. Nguyen looks to improve his ACC mark after defeating Virginia at the No. 3 doubles position with Kenshalo last year.

In addition to the three juniors, sophomore Jonathan Murchison is expected to be a major contributor who will strengthen the singles lineup. Murchison was 7-10 in singles play during the 1998-99 fall and spring seasons, seeing most of his playing time at the No. 4 spot. Kenshalo stepped up in the fall season, and is expected to be a one of the Terps' top players as the season progresses. "Dan Kenshalo has stepped up as a leader. I think Luan and Larry have demonstrated certain attributes that the other guys on the team should follow as well," comments Loomis.

The team's freshman class consists of Chris Chiu and Peter Harjes, both of whom are expected to contribute immediately. Chiu, who was ranked as high as 79th in the USA rankings, won the Flight A doubles backdraw at the D.C. Metro Invitational with Harjes this past fall. Harjes finished his high school career with a stunning 60-4 record. This, combined with his successful fall season, should be a sign of things to come.

"Peter and Chris were two highly ranked junior players, and both are solid players. They will make an immediate impact on the lineup," predicts Loomis.

The season opens with a five-match non-conference homestand. The Terps' schedule is made up of 13 home matches, including six ACC matches. "The ACC is strong as always. Every team is fully funded, which gives us the opportunity to go up against some of the best teams in the country. Additionally, I think almost every team is nationally ranked, so this is just a great opportunity for our team to have some unbelievable wins," says Loomis.

Head Coach Jeremy Loomis Fourth Season • Maryland '93



This season marks the fourth year that Jeremy Loomis will handle the role of head coach for the men's team. Since 1997, he has acted as the assistant coach of the women's team and as associate head coach of the men's team under Jim Laita. He has been responsible for various duties with each program.

Loomis was a four-year letterwinner at Maryland, playing both the No. 1 singles and doubles positions. He was named the team MVP in his senior season of 1993. After graduation that year, Loomis competed on the pro tour. He continues to be ranked by the Association of Tennis Professionals in doubles competition.

Loomis graduated from the University of Maryland in 1993 with a degree in English and went on to complete his master's degree in exercise physiology from Miami University in Ohio in 1995.

He returned to his alma mater in 1996. Loomis volunteered as an assistant coach while playing in various professional tournaments.

1999 Men's Season Review

The Maryland men's team struggled throughout the 1999 season as it sought to find its niche on the court. The team's early success at home gave the Terps a solid foundation to begin the season.

However, the Terps struggled with inconsistent play and strong ACC competition. But the Terps did accomplish many of their goals both on and off the court, even without scholarships. The Terps were unable to repeat the previous year's accomplishment of winning an ACC match, but did win the President's Cup award for having the highest team GPA at Maryland, which was a 3.6.

The men began the season with an impressive 3-0 record at home. The Terps defeated area rival Georgetown by a score of 4-3 to begin the season with a win. The following weekend the Terps defeated George Mason, 4-3, to avenge the previous year's home-opening loss. The Terps made it 3-0 with a win over Villanova by a score of 4-2 the following day. The team did not have another match until they faced Massachusetts at home almost two weeks later. The team's three-game winning streak was snapped by the Minutemen who won the match, 4-3.

The Terps faced their first ACC opponent two days later, wrapping up a six-game home streak. The team hosted Georgia Tech, and fell to the Yellow Jackets, 7-0. Two days later, the team was on the road to face Florida State.

The Terps lost the match, 7-0, and returned home for a two-week break before facing its most trying test of the season.

The Terps' road trip consisted of four ACC matches in five days. The Terps' first match was against NC State, followed by matches against then-No. 4 Duke, Wake Forest and North Carolina. The Terps struggled on the road, dropping all four matches before returning home to face Clemson. The team's homecoming ended in defeat, as the Tigers won the match by a score of 7-0.

The Terps took a break from ACC action

to close out the season at home and looked to rebound from the week's losses. The team bounced back, defeating Mt. St. Mary's by a score of 5-2, to end the home season with a win. One week later the Terps traveled to Virginia, but lost to the Cavaliers to close out the regular season.

Two weeks later the Terps were on the road again, this time traveling to Georgia for the ACC Championships. The Terps faced No. 41 NC State and looked to avenge their regular-season loss. However, the Wolfpack emerged victorious with a 6-1 win over the Terps, ending the Terps' 1999 season.

Overall, the Terps faced numerous bumps along the season's road. The Terps dominated their non-conference matches but struggled with ACC opponents. Reflecting on the season, Coach Jeremy Loomis said, "It was an effective year. We had good leadership from the seniors; it was also a young team, with a lot of young people on the squad. That will give us confidence for the upcoming year."

As well as pursuing a serious research mission and continuing its high level of service to the state, the university re-dedicated itself to providing the highest quality graduate and undergraduate education. Increased undergraduate opportunities for research and individual study; the development of the College Park Scholars Program and the expansion of the University Honors Program; the genesis of Honors Humanities and Gemstone; the creation of CORE, the general education program; and the establishment of the Center for Teaching Excellence all affirmed the legislature's designation of flagship.

Libraries

Seven libraries make up the University of Maryland library system: McKeldin (main) Library, Architecture Library, Art Library, Engineering and Physical Sciences Library, Hornbake Library, Performing Arts Library, White Memorial (Chemistry) Library.

These libraries constitute the largest university research library institution in the Washington metropolitan area, providing vital resources to researchers, visiting scholars, and businesses throughout the region. The libraries' holdings include more than 2.5 million volumes, 24,000 subscriptions to periodicals and nearly 5 million items available in microfilm format.



Research

Opportunities for conducting research abound at the University of Maryland, and in the surrounding area, both for faculty to advance their own expertise and bring their insights into the classroom, and for students to begin their exploration of their special interests with practical experience. On campus, special facilities and a number of organized research centers, bureaus, and institutes promote the acquisition and analysis of new knowledge in the arts, sciences and applied fields.

The university's enviable location — just nine miles from downtown Washington, D.C., and approximately 30 miles from both Baltimore and Annapolis — enhances the research of its faculty and students by providing access to some of the finest libraries and research centers in the country.

Service

Programs of public service are central to the overall mission of the university. The philosophy is reflected in the wide array of programs and initiatives that benefit the state's business, agriculture and education communities.

With more than 90 high technology firms in the three-county area of Montgomery, Prince George's and Frederick counties, the university has found abundant opportunity to extend its business and technology outreach programs to the region. Many of these programs are part of the Engineering Research Center, which operates the Technology Advancement Program and the Maryland Industrial Partnerships, programs designed to provide Maryland entrepreneurs and small businesses with research facilities, technical assistance, administrative support, and access to technology that will advance their economic base.

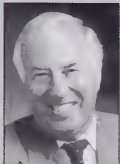
The Institute for Systems Research has formed partnerships with major corporations, including Lockheed Martin, Westinghouse, BF Goodrich, Hughes Aircraft and Dupont to apply advanced systems research to solving industry problems in the fields of communications, manufacturing, controls and robotics.

A Wired World

Students at the University of Maryland are part of an academic community that enjoys free access to networked computer resources and facilities that are among the best in the country. Free computer accounts enable users to store class work on a networked server, download classroom support materials and other electronic information from campus networked resources.

President C.D. Mote

C.D. (Dan) Mote Jr. took office as president in September 1998 with a clear vision for taking the University of Maryland down the home stretch to its destiny as one of America's great research universities.



Mote came to the University of California at Berkeley, where he had earned all of his degrees, and where he had served in faculty and administration more than 30 years. He had most recently been vice chancellor for university relations.

In Maryland, he found a university already well on its way to achieving the greatness envisioned when the General Assembly declared it the flagship institution of the University System of Maryland. Mote immediately took a leadership role on the Governor's Task Force on Governance, Coordination and Funding of the University System of Maryland to gain greater autonomy and flexibility for the university to pursue its goals. He followed that by working closely with state leaders to boost university funding for new programs, scholarships and faculty, gaining a 10 percent appropriations increase in his first year.

When the legislature had finished its work for the year, Mote spelled out in his inauguration address his vision of Maryland as a great research university, where teaching and research are "inseparable." In this plan, the faculty creates a culture of excellence that permeates the university, student success is the center of all activity, and the extended Maryland family of alumni and friends grows rich in pride and tradition.

High achievement has been Dan Mote's life, from his student days at the University of California through his years as an outstanding teacher and world-renowned researcher and his leadership of a highly successful capital campaign at Berkeley. He arrived in College Park determined to continue the same level of achievement in his new post.

After earning his doctorate in engineering mechanics from Berkeley in 1963, Mote spent a year as a research fellow at the University of Birmingham in England, then three years as assistant professor of mechanical engineering at the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh before returning to Berkeley in 1967.

There he stayed for more than 30 years before coming to Maryland. He was promoted to professor in 1973.

Mote and his wife Patsy live in the President's Residence on the College Park campus. They have two grown children and four grandchildren.



Athletic Director Deborah A. Yow

Yow to assume presidency of NACDA in July 2000

Dr. Deborah A. Yow has led Terrapin athletics to balanced budgets, high levels of productivity and achievement and a vigorous commitment to excellence throughout its operations. She is in her sixth year as Maryland's director of athletics.

Since taking over at Maryland in 1994, she and her staff have:

- Transformed Terrapin athletics into a responsive, goal-oriented organization.

- Balanced all five of the more than \$25 million annual budgets (the first balanced budgets for the Terrapins in 10 years).

- Improved graduation rates for student-athletes, above that of the general student population, in three of those five years.

- Led the Terrapins to a national all-sports ranking in the upper 10 percent of all NCAA Division I schools.

- Reorganized and upgraded marketing and fund-raising efforts on behalf of Terrapin athletics. As a result, private gifts to athletics have increased 85% and corporate sponsorship revenues have increased by 270% during her tenure at Maryland.

- Implemented a strategic management model.

- Paid off \$7 million in operating debt accrued before her arrival in 1994.

- Developed a comprehensive Internet strategy with management, marketing and fundraising applications.

- Significantly improved customer service in every area.

Regarding the many achievements of Terrapin athletics over the past five years, Debbie Yow says, "We are pleased, but we are not satisfied ... our vision is to be one of the top 10 programs in the nation consistently ... we see no reason to settle for less."

Yow is known for her goal-oriented and proactive management style. She consistently inspires and challenges those around her to "raise our sights and sharpen our tools ... to work hard and work smart ... to recognize that our only limitations are those that we place upon ourselves." As a manager and leader, she clearly models these principles.

Dr. Yow is a member of the NCAA Management Council and the NCAA Division I Budget Committee. In addition, she will become president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics in July 2000, and was recently singled out by *Street & Smith Sports Business Jour-*

nal as one of the leading athletic administrators in the U.S.

A former basketball coach, she began her coaching career at the high school level in North Carolina before taking over as head women's coach at the University of Kentucky in 1976. She also achieved an outstanding coaching record as head coach at the University of Florida. She later moved into athletic administration at the University of Florida and the University of North Carolina-Greensboro, followed by a highly successful tenure as A.D. at Saint Louis University.

She has authored numerous articles and books on athletics, management, and human behavior, and is a respected leader in intercollegiate athletics in the United States.

Summing up the entire Terrapin athletic program, Yow recently observed, "We have the finest student-athletes, coaches, support staff and administrative team in America. It is because of their courage, hard work and cooperative spirit that we now have a strong, viable athletic program. I am immensely proud of each of them. I am equally proud of our Terrapin fans who buy tickets and our Terrapin Club members who faithfully support the Maryland athletic program with their donations for scholarships, and the Maryland Educational Foundation and M Club members who serve and give liberally. We have a great Terrapin family. That's the foundation for all of our successes ... and the basis for our bright future."

She was named to a similar position at the University of Maryland in July 1996. She began her career in athletic compliance as an intern at Miami in 1994.



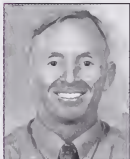

This directory, the Maryland Athletes Placement Source, is produced annually by the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. It is intended to assist graduating Terrapin student-athletes as they begin their professional careers.

Distributed to more than 1,000 corporations and businesses around the region, prospective employers are

introduced to our graduating student-athletes with resumé information relative to academic, career and personal achievements.

Career Information Fairs

Career Awareness in Academic Support is expanding to include a variety of programs for student-athletes throughout the semester. Career awareness is an ongoing process and includes assistance with resumé writing and interview skills. The end of the semester brings a career awareness fair which hosts a number of professionals with whom student-athletes can learn about career interests and planning. Unlike typical "job fairs," the purpose of this program is to allow student-athletes to explore multiple career opportunities by speaking directly to individuals in their chosen area of interest.

Team Maryland

Team Maryland is a class taught in conjunction with the campus' James McGregor Burns Academy of Leadership in which student-athletes are exposed to leadership and public speaking skills and techniques. The program consists of a group of volunteer student-athletes who learn about the challenges for children in the community by speaking to different elementary schools about drug abuse and the importance of education. In addition to school visits, Team Maryland has hosted visits from local schools to our campus.

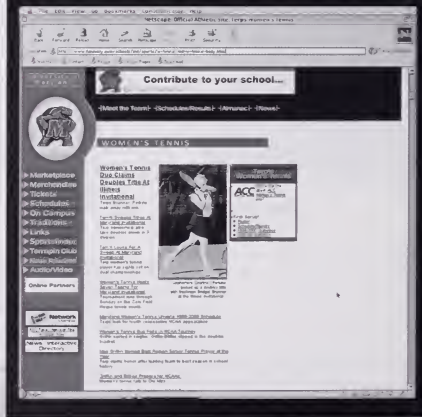

Among the Nation's Best

This is Maryland Athletics

At the University of Maryland, winning is not taken lightly. Like the rich history of all its sports programs, championships are a tradition.

This type of success is no accident; it has been built year-by-year on the achievements of outstanding young men and women who were given the opportunity to excel both on and off the field of play. The victories, the championships and the national acclaim are all ingredients of the Maryland athletic program. Student-athletes who attend

Maryland are part of a program and a university which thrives on tradition and excellence.

Academic Excellence

The University of Maryland considers intercollegiate athletics an integral part of the collegiate experience. Its existence provides an opportunity for students, faculty, alumni and students to share in the life of intercollegiate athletics.

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics strives to achieve the same standards of excellence in its athletic program as exist within the university's teaching, research and public service programs. The department embraces the concept that the student-athlete is first and foremost a student, possessing academic abilities, personal interests and ambitions comparable to those of the other members of the stu-

dent body. Since 1983, 88 percent of freshmen scholarship athletes who completed their eligibility at the University of Maryland earned their degrees.

Goals

The great thing about being a Terrapin is the commitment to hard work and dedication. At the University of Maryland, the athletic department is dedicated to supporting a well-balanced Division I program. Athletic Director Deborah A. Yaw and her dedicated coaches, administrators and staff have re-engineered the department into a responsive and financially sound model – with a clear vision and a determined drive toward national prominence.

Athletic Success

National championships, conference championships, national rankings and postseason play are all a part of the University of Maryland experience. The University of Maryland has established itself as one of the nation's elite athletic programs. The Terrapins have won 13 national championships, including a record four consecutive by the women's lacrosse team. The Terrapins had plenty of reason to celebrate when it came to intercollegiate athletics in 1997-98, as they posted their highest finish ever (No. 19) in the national Sears Directors' Cup all-sports ranking. Its 38-position jump from the No. 57 spot in 1994-95 is the greatest in that time by a school not previously ranked in the top 25.

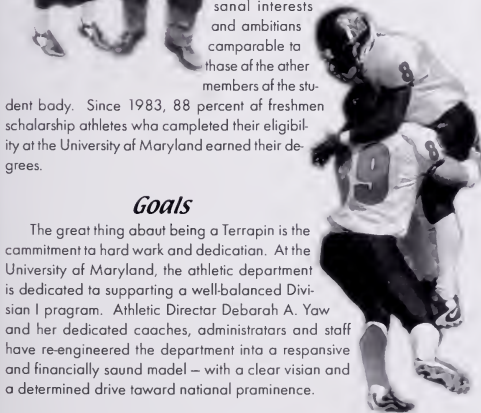


Competition
