## EXPORT TRADE BY COUNTRY

The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, announced today that the decrease in United States exports of domestic and foreign merchandise from $\$ 1,791.6$ million in May to $\$ 1,77.2$ million ${ }^{1}$ in June reflected decreases in exports to the following areas: Western Europe, from $\$ 615.9$ to $\$ 579.4$ million; Canada, from $\$ 352.4$ to $\$ 334.8$ million; Latin American Republics, from $\$ 313.2$ to $\$ 310.3$ million; and "all other countries," from $\$ 452.4$ to $\$ 433.0$ million. Exports to dependencies of Western Europe increased slightly from $\$ 57.7$ to $\$ 59.7$ million, Data on exports of Special Category cormodities, which fell from $\$ 170.4$ to \$164.4 million, are included in these totals.

It was pointed out by the Bureau that the June export total, excluding Special Category cormodities, amounted to $\$ 1,552.9$ million, as compared to $\$ 1,621.2$ million in May. This decrease was accompanied by lower levels of exports to O.E.E.C. countries, from $\$ 530.1$ to $\$ 494.3$ million, and sterling area countries, from $\$ 320.0$ to $\$ 291.2$ million. Exports to Latin American Republics, valued at $\$ 301.1$ million in June, were about the same as the $\$ 301.2$ million reported in May. Decreases were reported in exports to all of the continents during the period.

The drop in exports to Europe from $\$ 557.8$ million in May to $\$ 518.7$ million in June was due largely to declines in exports

to individual countries of this continent as follows: United Kingdom, from $\$ 134.4$ to $\$ 113.9$ million; Sweden, from $\$ 32.0$ to $\$ 19.6$ million; Netherlands, from $\$ 58.7$ to $\$ 47.8$ million; West Germany, from $\$ 95.1$ to $\$ 84.7$ million; and Poland and Danzig, from $\$ 14.1$ to $\$ 8.4$ million. However, noticeable increases were reported in exports to Belgium and Luxembourg, from $\$ 29.0$ to $\$ 40.4$ million, and Switzerland, from $\$ 19.5$ to $\$ 24.6$ million. Exports to North America decreased from $\$ 485.5$ to $\$ 470.3$ million as a drop in exports to Canada, from $\$ 344.5$ to $\$ 324.7$ million, was partly offset by a rise in exports to Mexico, from $\$ 66.8$ to $\$ 74.4$ million. The decline in exports to Asia from $\$ 292.0$ to $\$ 285.3$ million reflected counterbalancing changes in exports to some of the countries of this continent as follows: India, from $\$ 58.1$ to $\$ 50.1$ million; Japan, from $\$ 106.0$ to $\$ 101.3$ million; Taiwan (Formosa), from $\$ 7.9$ to $\$ 13.9$ million; and Israel, from $\$ 8.6$ to $\$ 12.0$ million.

The change in exports to South America from $\$ 183.2$ million in May to $\$ 179.8$ million in June reflected, in part, decreases in exports to Uruguay, from $\$ 13.0$ to $\$ 4.2$ million; and Venezuela, from $\$ 41.4$ to $\$ 36.2$ million, which were offset by increases in exports to Brazil, from $\$ 40.0$ to $\$ 47.0$ million and Argentina, from $\$ 25.9$ to $\$ 31.8$ million. Exports to Africa and Australia and Oceania decreased slightly during the period, from $\$ 63.1$ to $\$ 60.1$ million, and from $\$ 39.7$ to $\$ 38.6$ million, respectively.

## EXPLANATION OF STATISTICS

COVERAGE: Export statistics include government as well as non-government shipments to foreign countries. The export statistics, therefore, include Mutual Security Program military aid, Mutual Security Program economic aid, and Department of the Army Civilian Supply shipments. Separate figures for Mutual Security Program military aid are shown in the footnotes of this report. Shipments to United States armed forces and diplomatic missions abroad for their own use are excluded from export statistics. United States trade with Puerto Rico and United States possessions is not included in this report, but the export trade of Puerto Rico with foreign countries is included as part of the United States export trade. Merchandise shipped in transit through the United States between foreign countries is not included in export statistics.

COUNTRY DEFINITION: Although the country of destination is defined as the country of ultimate destination or the country where the goods are to be consumed, or further processed or manufactured, the statistics do not always reflect this definition, as the shipper may not know the ultimate destination of the shipment. In such cases, the shipments are credited to the last country, as known to the exporter at the time of shipment from the United States, to which the goods are to be shipped in their present form. It follows, therefore, that the statistics will tend to be overcounted for shipments to transshipments or merchanting countries and undercounted for other countries. As explained in the footnotes to the table, exports of Special Category commodities are not included in any of the published country totals, for reasons of security.

VALUATION: The valuation definition used in the export statistics is the value at the seaport, border point, or airport of exportation. It is based on the selling price for cost
if not sold) and includes inland freight, insurance, and other charges to the port of exportation. Transportation and other costs beyond the United States port of exportation are excluded. However, in some instances the valuation may not be reported in accordance with this definition, particularly where the export value is difficult to determine or must be estimated. None of the values have been adjusted for changes in price level.

EFFECT OF SAMPLING: The value of export shipments individually valued at $\$ 100-\$ 499$ (about five percent of total export value) is estimated by sampling. Effective with the statistics for January 1960, the previous sample ratio of 10 percent has been increased to a 50 percent sample for countries other than Canada with the 10 percent sample being retained for Canada. The estimated values are distributed among the area, continent and country totals. For the 1960 export figures in this report, the probable variability due to sampling is less than $\$ 50,000$ or less than one percent. For the 1959 figures the probable variability due to sampling is less than $\$ 50,000$ or less then two percent or the individual totals shown. The largest variation from rounding of figures is $\$ 50,000$. For further information regarding sampling procedures, see the September 1953, February 1954, January and June 1956, and the October-December 1959 issues of Foreign Trade Statistics Notes.
