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EXPORT TRADE BY COUNTRY

The Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, announced today that the increase in United States exports of domestic and foreign merchandise, including Special Category commodities, and unadjusted for seasonal variation, from \$1,844.9 million in March ${ }^{1}$ to $\$ 1,881.2$ million in April, ${ }^{2}$ reflected increases in exports to all areas except Latin American Republics. Changes in the dollar values of exports to these areas during the period were as follows: Canada, from $\$ 337.3^{3}$ to $\$ 365.2$ million; Western Europe, from $\$ 655.3^{3}$ to $\$ 656.6$ million; Latin American Republics, from $\$ 289.0$ to $\$ 279.2$ million; and "all other countries", from $\$ 563.2^{3}$ to $\$ 580.2$ million. Exports of Special Category commodities rose from $\$ 174.9$ million in March ${ }^{3}$ to $\$ 198.5$ million in April.

With Special Category commodities excluded, exports of domestic and foreign merchandise climbed from $\$ 1,670.0$ million in March to $\$ 1,682.6$ million in April. Exports to sterling area countries rose from $\$ 267.3$ to $\$ 272.8$ million but those to O.E.C.D. countries in Europe and to the Latin American Republies fell from $\$ 543.6$ to $\$ 530.4$ million and from $\$ 279.6$ to $\$ 273.1$ million, respectively. Increases were reported in exports to the continents of North America, Africa, and Australia and Oceania.

The rise in exports to North America, from $\$ 437.3$ million in March to $\$ 469.9$ million in April, was largely accounted for by an increase in exports to Canada, from $\$ 310.8$ to $\$ 352.2$ million which was partly offset by decreases in exports to Mexico, from $\$ 59.3$ to $\$ 53.6$ million and Bermuda, from $\$ 9.2$ to $\$ 3.7$ million. Exports to Africa rose from $\$ 86.7$ to $\$ 94.9$ million owing chiefly to higher levels of exports to the United Arab Republic (Egypt), from $\$ 22.2$ to $\$ 28.8$ million and Morocco, from $\$ 5.2$ to $\$ 8.7$ million. An increase in exports to Australia, from $\$ 27.5$ to $\$ 34.7$ million accounted for the gain in exports to Australia and Oceania, from $\$ 32.9$ to $\$ 40.2$ million.

During the period, exports to Europe fell from $\$ 584.5$ to $\$ 557.6$ million as decreases in exports to some of the countries of this continent were partly offset by increases in exports to others. The more notable of these counterbalancing changes are as follows: Italy, from $\$ 76.7$ to $\$ 57.3$ million; West Germany, from \$102.3 to \$91.9 million; Poland and Danzig, from $\$ 16.3$ to $\$ 7.1$ million; United Kingdom, from $\$ 91.3$ to $\$ 85.3$ million; Spain from $\$ 17.3$ to $\$ 32.3$ million; Belgium and Luxembourg, from $\$ 39.1$ to $\$ 45.7$ million; Netherlands, from $\$ 53.0$ to $\$ 59.0$ million; and France, from $\$ 50.6$ to $\$ 55.6$ million. Although the decline in exports to Asia from March to April was small, $\$ 341.1$ to $\$ 337.4 \mathrm{million}$, sizable counterbalancing changes were reported in exports to some of the individual countries of this continent. The more noticeable of these were: Japan, from $\$ 132.0$ to $\$ 115.5$ million; Iran (Persia), from $\$ 12.9$ to $\$ 7.8$ million; Israel, from $\$ 20.4$ to $\$ 16.5$ million; Pakistan, from $\$ 9.5$ to $\$ 17.8$ million; Viet-Nam, from $\$ 8.5$ to $\$ 13.1$ million; India, from $\$ 43.1$ to $\$ 47.6$ million; and Republic of Indonesia, from $\$ 11.1$ to $\$ 15.3$ million. Exports to South America decreased slightly from $\$ 187.5$ to $\$ 182.7$ million.

EXPLANATION OF STATISTICS

COVERAGE: Export atatiatice include government as well on nongovermment shipmonte to foreign conntries. The export statistics, therefore, include Department of Defense Military Asnintance Program-Grant-Aid nhipmentn (for which neparate figares are shown in the footnotes of thin report), Mutual Security Program economic assistance shipments, and shipments of agricultural commoditien nader P.L. 480 (The Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954, na amended) and related lows. (The separate information which is avsilshle on exporta under P.L. 480 and related lawn may be obtained from the Economic Research Service and the Foreign Agricultural Service of the Department of Agriculture.) Shipments to United Staten armed forces and diplomatic minion abroad for their own use are excluded from export statistics. United Staten trade with Pnerto Rico and United Staten possession is not included in thin report, hat the export trade of Puerto Rico with foreign countries in included as part of the United Staten export trade. Merchnodine shipped is transit through the United Staten between foreign countrien, not entered as imports, is not included in export ntatinticn.
COUNTRY DEFINITION: Although the country of destination in defined an the country of ultimate dentination or the country where the goods are to be consumed, or further processed or manufactured, the ntatintics do not always reflect this definition, as the nipper may not know the ultimate dentination of the shipment. In inch canes, the shipments are credited to the last country, ns known to the exporter nt the time of shipment from the United Staten, to which the goods are to he shipped in their present form. It follows, therefore, that the ntatiatice will tend to be overcounted for shipments to transshipment or merchanting countries and underconnted for other countrien. An explained in the footnotes to the table, exports of Special Category commoditien are not included in any of the pablinhed country totals, for reasons of security.

VALUATION: The valuation definition used in the export atatintics in the value nt the seaport, border point, or airport of exportation. It in based on the aneling price (or cont if not sold) and includen inland freight, inearence, and other charges to the port of exportation. Transportation and other conte beyond the United Staten port of exportation are excluded. None of the vnlnen have been adjusted for changes in price level.
RELIABILITY: The statistics presented in this report are band partly on sample data nad therefore are subject to nnmpling variation that may cnune them to differ somewhat from the renalte which woald have been obtained from processing all export documents. For the figuren shows in this report, the sampling varishility cnn be ignored since the probable varinhility due to nampling in either lens than $\$ 50,000$ (the largest variation from rounding of figures) or leas than atrivisl percentage of the individual totals shown.
In addition to the effects of nampling variation and the difficaltien dencribed above nader COUNTRY DEFINITION, the date in this report are anbject to errors from natch sources as the carry-over of data from month to month, errors in reporting or procenning, the estimation of ahipmenta valued under $\$ 100$, and the omission of parcel post shipments valued under $\$ 50$. Although the effect of inch errors on the rounded totals in thin report in probably small, the ponnihility of inaccuracy should be taken into account, particularly in uning figures of relatively mall magnitude.
