








HALLOWEEN!!

THE DEBATING SOCIETY



This year has been the most successful and eventful year for Balmoral Hall debaters. B.H. girls have proven their talents and expertise at the local, provincial, national and world levels. The year started off with a great bang at the International Independent Schools Tournament held in Boston in October. The Balmoral Hall team, consisting of Adrian Hersak, Shaista Mohammadi and Isha Khan placed second in the tournament amongst 35 private schools from all over Canada and the United States. Adrian Hersak also captured the trophy for the top junior speaker at the tournament.

In January the World's High School Debating Championships were held in Winnipeg with graduating student, Maya Prabhu on the Canadian team. Maya and her partner from New Zealand placed 2nd in the World division while in the Manitoba division, Isha Khan placed second individual and Seema Joshi placed third individual. Maya, who has greatly contributed in making B.H. the feared debating force that it is, and her partner Seema Joshi were, also the winners of

the CKY-TV debates, rendering them the best debating team in the province.

Junior debaters Kim Lear and Heulwen Jones finished in first place at the Windsor School Junior High Tournament, and the Novice team of Maggie Trott and Sangeetha Appavoo placed second. The years to come look very promising for B.H. debating and will most likely be as successful as years in the past. At the National Junior High Debating Championships held in May at B.H., Louise Coyle placed second overall and Kim Lear placed fourth overall in Canada. The outstanding accomplishments of our junior debaters are numerous. At the provincial Debating Championships held in April at St. Paul's High School, Balmoral Hall swept up most of the awards. 

They are not just our teachers, they have become our friends. We are told that "in youth, we learn, and in age we understand." We want to acknowledge their part in starting us along this path.

To our parents I would like to say thank you. Without your love and encouragement we would not have made it here. I only hope that we can continue to make you as proud in the future as you must be today -- seeing your little girls graduating from high school. Simone De Beauvoir wrote that "one is not born a woman, one becomes one." Thank you for nurturing us to become the young women we are today.

When we leave, we leave the security of Balmoral Hall, heading off into a world full of opportunity. We have made a number of decisions regarding the future, and there are many more to go. To my graduating class I say don't spend too much time trying to find yourself, go out and create your self-identity, your purpose and your meaning in life. Thoreau wrote that "if we advance confidently in the direction of our dreams and endeavors to live the life which we have imagined, we will meet with a success unexpected in common hours." So you must not be afraid to dream, for only then will you reach your goals. A poet once asked "what happens to a dream deferred - does it dry up like a raisin in the sun or explode?" Don't defer your dreams, remember instead of Dead Poet's Society -- "Seize the Day." No one but you can give you self-esteem and self-worth for it is only through your own successes and achievements that you give your life meaning.

It is now I say farewell to my fellow graduates. We have touched one another's lives in a special way, and whether we know it or not a part of us all goes along with each of us. I wish you all the best of luck, may all your dreams come true and may we all remain friends forever.
