Yet, in the end, one must stand alone, to seek his own way, and to realize his own goals.

















Distributive Education

Students participating in Distributive Education acquire marketable job skills through regular or part-time work experience. Under the direction of the D. E. coordinators, two basic programs are offered. Students may choose to attend school four periods a day and then leave early to work on a part-time job. Others elect the "alternate-week" program in which they have the unique opportunity to hold a regular forty-hour a week job and attend school at the same time. After being placed in a job, students work and attend school on alternating weeks. Each fulfills his required courses for graduation by taking two periods of English, social studies, and distributive education, including merchandising math, on the week he is in school. Each student is also closely supervised by one of the coordinators and his employer while on the job. Most of the jobs students hold are in the retail and service fields. Upon graduation, many D. E. participants go on to major in business in college while others obtain management positions in private enterprise.







To interest and challenge every student, the English department continued and expanded the elective program this year. Because experience has shown that all students can benefit from reviewing composition and skills, first quarter courses involved students in these basics. Then students moved into elective courses, ranging from such literary topics as Utopia or Shakespeare to contemporary literature, to research courses, to fundamentals in reading, Business English, or composition, to folklore or communication. Each student was able to choose his courses for the year, striving to meet his interests and fulfill his needs. Reading courses involved many students throughout the year, with special use of new equipment and the reading lab. The drama department also expanded with more classes offered in techniques and skills.

As usual, basic full-year courses, advanced placement classes, American civilization, and art-English-music seminar were still popular in the department, with more students meeting more teachers and vice versa, and a greater diversity among courses. The benefits and results of the elective program are still to be seen, but students and teachers alike are already learning more about themselves and others.

Because of the important use of mathematics in science, economics, business, and daily life, the mathematics department is designed to meet both common and specialized needs of all. The academic student is offered a sequence of courses which enables him to develop skills and abilities in algebra; plane, solid, and coordinate geometry; trigonometry; and elementary analysis. For the non-college bound, provisions are made for the development, accuracy and facility in the use of fundamental processes necessary to his vocational needs and general education. For the mathematically gifted, the advanced placement program culminates in calculus at the twelfth grade.

The use of the computer has brought a new aspect to the math department. All levels are introduced to the use of a computer and programming. This department does its best to prepare each student for his future, be it college, a vocational job, or daily living.





Home economics is not just cooking and sewing - it is a field that draws its content from science, art, psychology and economics, relating these disciplines to the individual and his relationship with other people. One of the great pleasures of the foods courses is eating! Emphasis is based on food preparation in the lab. This course covers nutrition, menu planning, marketing, food management, care and use of equipment, and entertaining. The advanced course includes cultural aspects of food: regional, foreign, and gourmet, as well as careers in this field. Although no hammer is ever raised in construction of a dwelling, balloon structure, wiring, and servicing are a part of housing courses, as well as interior design and decoration. There are also children in the department. A nursery laboratory with three and four-year olds, along with child development courses, help prepare students for a profession, parenthood, or an immediate job after school.

In clothing, each girl's construction project is based on its cost in time, energy, and money. Besides garments, panda bears, smocked pillows, ribbon belts, and crocheted bed spreads appear in class as gifts are made in December.

Culminating activity of the year is the annual fashion show and tea, at which students model the best of their handmade garments. One specialty of the department is Senior Home Economics, a short, but intense course, in which seniors prepare for a successful future.

Courses in the industrial arts department offer an alternative to traditional classroom learning. After completion of power mechnaics, students may pursue intricate jobs in auto mechanics. The excellent facilities make it a popular course with both the students who take it, and with the faculty and administration who benefit by the work done on their cars. Using the tools of a professional, students in woodworking create and finish wooden furniture.

Graphics arts involve students in printing, type-setting, photo off-set, silk screen, platin presses, and rubber stamp-making. Radio and television servicing fundamentals are some of the skills taught in electronics.

Mechanical drawing and pre-engineering drafting prepare aspiring engineers and architects, with students learning techniques of designing homes, cabins and other buildings, as well as sign-making. Plans for offering short courses in different areas of industrial arts would make these techniques available to students interested in learning about car care, basic TV repair, or skillful printing. The practical application of these skills is what makes this department a very practical area of learning.

Of all departments, perhaps it is most difficult to realize the utility of foreign language, notably German, French, Latin, Russian and Spanish. For most students, the need for college credit is the largest factor; very few take language for enjoyment, and even fewer foresee the use of their knowledge for the future. Therefore, the newest emphasis is the study of the cultures of people whose languages students learn. Developing skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in a foreign language receives most attention as in recent years, but there is new stress on geography, history, and culture.

English as a second language has become more important, with more students of foreign background attending W-L. These students have no difficulty seeing the usefulness of their new language, as they put it to immediate use. Faculty are able to teach more levels of their language than before since more students are working independently. In this way, a longer sequence of study is possible in each language.





For the second year, the social studies department is continuing the elective program. This way, most juniors and seniors are able to plan half their school year based on electives of special interest to them. Courses range from independent study to in-depth studies of particular problems or eras.

Science classrooms focus on laboratory activities, with a wealth of supplies and equipment. The biology classes are famous for their frog and chick labs which enable students to observe functions as well as structures and observe first hand the intricacies of birth and life. Chemistry labs reveal the predicability and precision of chemical reactions, but best of all, the challenge of determining unknowns at the end of the year. One of the memorable moments of Physics is the ripple tank through whose use students discover the interference of light and its wave-like properties. Occasional team teaching in science classes means that all classes have the advantage of hearing from teachers with unique specialties and all benefit from the experience.

The Science Department also urges students to be a part of the very active club program including the research oriented Science Honor Society, the enthusiastic Science Club and the activist Ecology Club.



































The Steps










