Open Campus means that students who want to leave sehool grounds during luneh or unseheduled time are allowed to do so with parental permission.

## GENERALS BITE BURCERS



Vandalism was the prelude to Washington-Lee's homecoming game with the Yorktown Patriots. Although animosity between the schools extended to only a small portion of the student bodies, considerable damage was done. W-L was clearly the worst offender, having committed the first and the worst offenses.
The exchange started when a few $W$ $L$ students toilet-papered a tree at Yorktown. Yorktown students, in return, spray-painted a back door to $W$ L. The W-L vandals then decorated the Yorktown sidewalks.
Next, a group of Yorktown girls

painted W-L's front doors, the surrounding walls and sidewalks, and several windows. They toilet-papered the large evergreen trees facing Quincy Street, and they dug a large hole in the football field. Written in weed killer on the football field was an unfinished, "York -_".
The next day, when school officials learned of the damage, a campaign was begun to ease tension and discourage vandalism. The W-L senior class president visited Yorktown as the Yorktown football team captains visited $W$-L. But the night after the exchange, Yorktown was heavily damaged. The front doors were painted blue and gray, top to bottom; a long wall was riddled with graffiti over its entire length. A few windows were broken, and many more were spray-painted, and paint had gotten onto inside walls through the broken windows. "W-L" was written in weed killer on the football field, and the goal posts were torn to the ground. The planned exchange of students had taken place uselessly - too late to prevent cancellation of the pre-game bonfire. During lunch, a procession of Yorktown students in cars passed with an effigy of a General dangling above a garbage truck. Rocks were then thrown at the cars.
The homecoming game itself ended favorably for the Generals, who won,

14-6. After winning the toss, the Generals chose to receive first. Yorktown kicked off, but a W-L drive failed, and the Generals were forced to punt. Immediately, Yorktown fumbled the ball, and W-L recovered. But another W-L drive failed, and astonishingly, Yorktown fumbled the ball after the punt! Mike Bradford then ran twenty-five yards to the goal line and fumbled. The ball rolled into the end zone and Brett Payne dove on it, scoring the game's first touch-down. The extra point was good, and W-L kicked off. Each team drove unsuccessfully until the end of the quarter.
The second quarter consisted of unsuccessful drives by both teams. Yorktown came close to scoring twice, and W-L once. The half ended with the score 7-0.
W-L kicked off to start the second half. Each team drove to no avail, until a deep pass allowed Yorktown to score. The extra point was blocked.
The score was 7-6. Then Bradford scored a touchdown to put the Generals out of reach. The extra point was good.
A semi-formal Homecoming Dance (Who said teens wear only jeans?) was underway the next night in the cafeteria when the Homecoming Royalty were announced: Nancy Weyforth and Jeff Smith. Cape Horn, the band, was "really good."

Each and every year that $W-L$ is in session, students are faced with the problem of getting to and from school. Each mode of transportation has its advantages. Riding the bus is the most common method, but driving is the most convenient. Walking is the healthiest, but bicycling is the most efficient. For a student who lives inside the $11 / 2$ mile minimum busing radius, walking at a moderate 3 miles per hour, it takes less than 30 minutes to get to school. Riding the bus often takes more time than this. And if a student wishes to jog at, say, 6 miles per hour, he will beat the bus almost every time. Snow is sometimes a handicap, to cars, although everyone is glad when it shortens school. Snowball throwers and slush are the main obstacles to walkers, while ice patches, next to the taxicab and the Metrobus, are a bicyclist's worst enemies.

## WHAT GOES UP MUST

In February, fifty years and three months after its completion, the greater part of the 1924 wing of Washington-Lee was scheduled to be demolished to make way for a brand new, four million dollar addition to $W$ L. The new building, to be completed in 1976, will make it possible to use both traditional and modern teaching techniques.

The new facility will be perpendicular to the existing building that is, parallel and somewhat recessed from Stafford Street. Although the buses will still arrive at the Quincy Street entrance, there will be large doors facing Stafford Street.
The new $W$-L will be organized by departments. Every department but Math will have a large study area and several classrooms. The Math Department asked specifically that the large study area be deleted. The classrooms will make it possible to continue to use the present "conselvative" teaching methods; the large area will make it possible to use "liberal" independent study and largegroup assembly techniques.
Although there will be fewer classrooms, there will be more academic spaces because more seminar, conference rooms, study areas, and the like are to be included in the addition. The classrooms will be substantially bigger than the present ones, but there is less total floor area considerable corridor space has been removed.

Furthermore, the new part of the building will be fully air-conditioned and each room will have its own temperature control.

The library, central to the new building, will be close to all of the departments which use it regularly.


## COME DOWN



Lockers in the new building will all be located in one area, so that students will not have to walk a half mile between periods. Next to the locker concourse will be the new, carpeted cafeteria, one-third the size of the present cafeteria, but still ample. Both hot and cold foods will be served. The new commons will be in the space originally planned for the new little theatre, which has been deleted. The old Little Theatre, however, has not been touched.

During the construction, classes formerly held in the part of the building that was demolished, were moved to other classrooms. Dramatic productions were held in the Little Theatre at the end of the year, since the auditorium was no longer being used. Students dined during the end of the year in the old band and chorus rooms. W-L in 1975 was not what it was in 1974!

The $\$ 4.6$ million Technical Education Career Center, although not completed, opened this past September. Labor problems, such as the concrete workers strike, delayed its completion so only seven of the twenty-one courses offered were taught in the new building. The remaining classes were taught in the old Patrick Henry Elementary School.
The purpose of the career center is to offer students an opportunity to prepare for a career without a college education. Courses offered in construction, auto mechanics, air conditioning, cosmetology, ornamental horticulture, practical nursing, food service, dictation, and more, hopefully reached this goal.
Students who attended the career center this year felt that the program has been very successful and really enjoyed going. They felt more independent and felt as though they were doing something truly worthwhile.

Back in 1924, Arlington County opened its first public high school - Washington-Lee. The new building had 18 classrooms, two laboratories, a gym, a cafeteria, an auditorium, and a library with an additional building for shop work. Since then, W-L has undergone many changes, and with reconstruction plans under way, will incur many more.

The school population of 1925 was 600 students and 22 teachers. The first graduate of W-L, Bailey Byars, had to receive his diploma from George Mason High School as W-L did not receive its accreditation until 1926. It has maintained high academic standards ever since.

As Arlington grew throughout the thirties and forties the school population grew and there was a need for a larger school. Some renovations were made then with even greater additions made in the 1950's

The late fifties and early sixties brought great numbers of students to Washington-Lee. The largest number of students at W-L ever, was close to 3,000 . (This year there are 1,600 .) To accomodate this great number of students, some classes had to be conducted in the hallways and store rooms. Finally, new Arlington high schools - Wakefield and Yorktown - helped to relieve this overpopulation.

Throughout all the changes and additions, however, the spirit of $W$-L has remained strong. Some have said that W-L is "uptight" and overtraditional, but it is the traditions of W-L that have kept it strong. The traditional atmosphere has maintained students and faculty through the greatest and most trying changes. There must always be somebody or something to maintain W-L's traditions through these changes. Structural change should never adversely affect the spirit and leadership of Washington-Lee.

## Unique Happenings of 1974-75

The school board wanted to move him to an administrative position supervising federally funded programs in the county. As if the destruction and construction wasn't enough around school, people also had to put up with Metro construction throughout Washington and Arlington. The business district of Clarendon was totally changed as buildings came down, among them J.C. Penneys and Clarendon Bank and Trust, so that the subway could come through.

The biggest fad this year was the "Toe Sock." Bright and multi-colored socks with individual toes had to be worn with open shoes to best show off the tiny, twinkling toes.

Administrators and Supervisors has filed a suit against the board on the basis of age discrimination. As a reason for the transfer the school board gave two reasons - that Mr. Johansen was a few years away from retirement and that the school was undergoing reconstruction.

The doors of the old cafeteria's student center are opened to destruction and seconds later are reduced to part of the rubble themselves. The oldest part of the building - that with three stories _ was torn down this spring. In its place a new building will be constructed - a project that will probably last for three years.
