Along with changes within the school, there was a major change in the surrounding community. I-66 slashed through Arlington, leaving W-L with no back yard.

The year we had all waited for, our senior year, finally arrived. Along with football games, homework, and parties, we had to start thinking about the future. We took SAT's, visited colleges, and filled out applications.

All too soon, the time came to be fitted for caps and gowns, signalling that the end of our high school experience was near.

Although we are looking forward to graduation, we all know that it will mean saying goodbye to W -L and many special friends we have made here .
