





JUNIORS: WHAT A CLASS







Other officers were: Katrina Clark, President; Dawn Van Patten, Vice President; and Barbra Utter, 2nd Vice President.
















Three Absences & Bye-Bye








Freshman Melodies














WRESTLEMANIA!









Stepping Into the World The Year in Review

Each day while we, the students at W-L, were discussing upcoming assignments and afternoon practices, historic events were shaping the world around us. Although most of these things didn't affect us directly, some changed our moods or formed our conversation. We all felt shock when we heard of the news of the tragic space shuttle flight, or of the death of Samantha Smith, the young girl who promoted peace by writing and visiting Russian leader Mikhail Gorbachev. And this was, for the U.S., a year for efforts in peace and world improvement. President Ronald Reagan and Gorbachev traveled to Switzerland to hold a world peace summit, the first time Reagan has negotiated directly with a Soviet Union leader. These are just a few of the events that occurred in the world this year as we at W-L looked on. Whether or not we were aware of or concerned about them often depended only upon whether we had time to glance at the paper on any given morning. But they were events that were shaping a country which many of us will be helping to run as we step out of W-L.




