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TAXATION OF COFFEE AND TO-BACCO LANDS IN MEXICO.

During the last session of the legislature of the state of Veracruz, a tax of 6 cents per area (100 square meters) was placed on all lands planted in coffee and 5 cents per area on all lands planted in tobacco. This law goes into effect December 15, 1896. Numbers of Americans are now in this state engaged in the cultivation of coffee. The tax will be detrimental to their interests. As more will probably purchase land with the intention of planting coffee, I thought it well that the department should be informed of the action of the lawmaking body of this state, and also give some information as to the cost of opening a plantation. During the last session of the legislature

Land ranges in price from, say \$6 to \$100 per acre;* the first price is for land in the back country, where transportation facilities are poor, the latter price (\$100) for land in the districts where railroads give good markets and where coffee is abundantly grown. To give an idea what a beginner has to contend with in the way of taxation, it would perhaps be well to state cost of land, clearing and planting of same, and the expense of marketing after coffee is grown. I will assume that one buys the land at \$10 per acre, which is about the right figure for land that can be reached without too much trouble, which gives the cost of an acre put in coffee the first year as follows:

Cost of land ...
Cost of clearing ...
Cost of trees and planting ...
State tax, 6 cents per area \$10.00 4.65

Total cost of 1 acre...... 30.85
As it takes about four years before the trees bear, there is a continual drain on the owner of the land for that length of time, without any cash returns, of \$4.65 for state tax and from \$3 to \$6 per acre for weeding or keeping the land free of the rank vegetation that grows between the trees. I believe it will reach fully \$10 per acre. This would add \$40 to the \$30.85 above mentioned. At the end of the fourth year, coffee trees in the Orizaba, Fortin, and Cordoba districts produce half a pound to the tree, or 310 pounds of coffee to the acre. As the trees are planted about 7 feet apart, I figure 620 trees to the acre; on this number, I base my calculations. After the trees bear, there is the following expense: For all the coffee sold, a federal tax (stamp) Total cost of I acre..... trees bear, there is the following expense: For all the coffee sold, a federal tax (stamp) of 2 cents for each \$20 or fraction, a municipal tax in the Cordoba district of about 1 cent per pound (this would be increased or decreased according to the indebtedness of the municipality), then, besides, there is an export duty amounting to nearly 1 ½ cents per pound. All these things must be taken into consideration by the buyer intending to engage in coffee culture. Under favorable circumstances, at the end of

the fourth year, should prices remain as they now are (30 cents per pound), one would realize \$93, as against an outlay of about \$94.43, including price of land, but not interest on the outlay. The difference in outlay between the \$30.85 first cost of land, etc., and the \$40 to keep the land in order for four years (total \$70.85) of \$24.08 is expended as follows: At present price of labor for gathering the coffee, \$4 per 100 pounds (\$12.04 per acre) and about \$1 per hundred more for drying, bulling, washing, etc. (12.04 per acre). This brings the coffee to the marketing stage and really represents the actual cost of coffee ready for sale, and, I believe, puts the best light possible on the coffee-growing industry.

I attach hereto a clipping from the Mexican Heralit, which gives a good interpretation of the law as passed, with some other pertinent information which I can indorse with but few exceptions, and they relate to localities, as, for instance, I understand that in some places trees produce an average of 3 pounds of coffee each, while in the districts I am familiar with, trees are planted 7 feet apart and half a pound of coffee per tree is the average.

TAX ON COFFEE LANDS—THE STATE OF VERACRUZ DECREES A LAW TO WHICH COFFEE PLANTERS

ouject. The following decree of the legislature of the state of Veracuiz has a tracted much attention among persons interested in the culture of coffee in that state:

Article 1. A tax on coffee and tobacco shall be oldered in future at the rate of 6 cents per area of coffeenal 5 cents per area of tobacco, excepting enuiseres or seed grounds.

Att. 7. From the proceds of this tax the honorarium for collection shall first he deducted and the balance shall be applied as follows: Eghty in which the plantation is situated and 20 per cent to the public schools of the municipality in which the plantation is situated and 20 per cent to the general treasing of the stat.

Art. 8. Collectors of this tax shall receive 5 per cent collected on behalf of the federation. The treasurers of the public-school fund shall credit themselves with a commission of 25 per cent on the So per cent aptit. 9. Failure to declare a plantation or missistential as to its area subjects the owner to triple duties, but the 30 per cent tederal shall not be increased. In case the number of areas be understated, the fine shall only apply to the area not declared.

Art. 10. Total or partial destruction of the plantation shall entitle the owner to reduction or ex-

tation shall entitle the owner to reduction or exemption from tax.

The area is in 10 by 10 meters, or 100 square meters, containing usually 11 coffee trees, as 3 by 3 meters is the space ordinarily allowed for each tree. The tax of 6 cents, plus the 30 per cent federal, equals 7,8 cents per area, or, say, three-fourth of a cent per tree per annum, computed from the day of planning, not from the day of planning, not from the day of planning.

A coffee plant, according to locality, begins to produce the third or fourth year after planting, so that the planter will have to pay this tax three or four years before the receives any return, if he ever does receive any, for his enterprise may fail through excess of wand, excess of ram, drought low prices, a fall in the exchange premium, etc.

It will easily be seen how problematical are the profits of a venture of this kind. In any case, there can be no profit under five or six years, when, with lock, the heavy expenses of planting may be written off. Yet, during all these years the planter has to pay this coffee tax.

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THE ACONCAGUA VENTURE.

THE ACONCAGUA VENTURE.

The attempt which Mr. E. A. Fitzgerald is about to make to climb Aconcagua, will naturally excite widespread attention. Chimborazo was conquered by Mr. Whymper, but no man has ever yet stood on the summit of Aconcagua. Mr. Fizgerald and his party recently passed through here on the Thames, on their way to Buenos Aires and Chili. What they propose to do will be seen from the following extract from an interview published in the Daily Chronicle of May 30th last:

We are all interested in the splendid craft of mountaineering, and probably no climber promises a more interesting career than Mr. E. A. Fitzgerald. He is only twenty-four, but already he has accomplished some notable work, and has been through two expeditions on a large scale. He accompanied Sir Martin Conway in his series of climbs from end to end of the Alps. More recently he has overcome the New Zealand Alps, and now he contemplates the accent of that giant peak, Aconcagua, on the borders of Chili and the Argentine.

Here were points [savs a Chronicle interviewer] which, when I read them in my Chronicle a week ago, I thought might well warrant me in seeking a gossip with Mr. Fitzgerald. I found him surrounded by evidences of the book on his New Zealand journey, which Mr. Fisher Unwin will shortly publish. He stands over six feet in height, but is so lithe, carries so lithe flesh, that his weight is only a little more than eight stone. Truly he struck me as the born climber in physique, and I judged of his spirit by the quiet unpretending way in which he talked of his past experiences and those that lie before him. "How," I asked him, "did you come to be among the Alpine climbers?"

"Well," he said, "it is difficult to explain these things, but perhaps I got my first fancy for the mountains by crossing with my family a pass near Zermatt. That was when I was a little boy, and since I was seventeen I have climbed regularly."

"It is a commonplace that the passion grows, but can you tell me where its inspiration lies—what are the s

grows, but can you tell me where its inspira-tion lies—what are the secrets of its attrac-

tion"
"Perhaps the great charm is in the looking backward, in anticipation and retrospect. Certainly climbing, while you are engaged in it, is thoroughly uncomfortable, and the hardest of work. Again, it is always a pleasa at thing to try to go where nobody has been before, and then there are the allurements of difficulty and danger. It seems part of British human patters to

has been before, and then there are the arburements of difficulty and danger. It seems a part of British human nature to attack obstacles—to 'go' for anything that has the properties of an obstacle. But really it is almost impossible to say wherein the whole attraction of climbing lies—to define it in set words."

"Does the man who takes to mountaineering have to learn much?"

"Undoubtedly there is a good deal to learn; I mean there is much in the art itself. The chief explanation of accidents in the Alps, is that people go climbing who have had no previous experience. They think they can do what experienced climbers do, and the result, unfortunately, is that they sometimes come to grief."

"Like most climbers who have achieved something, you have, no doubt, had your

something, you have, no doubt, had your own close shaves?"

"I had one experience in New Zealand which I am afraid came very near putting an end altogether to my mountaineering. You know that I had Nathias Zurbriggen, that foremost of Swiss guides, with me as an end allogetier to my mountaineering. You know that I had Nathias Zurbriggen, that foremost of Swiss guides, with me, as similarly he will accompany me to South America. Well, we were scaling Mount Sefton, the Matterhorn of the New Zealand Alps. which rises to considerably over 10,000 ft. In order to leave Zurbriggen free to test each rock as he slowly mounted upward, II carried both the ice axes. Suddenly as I was on a steepish bit, a large boulder which I had touched with my right hand fell away with a crash. It struck me on the chest, huring me down head foremost, and I fell about eight feet, turning a complete somersault in the air. Then I felt the rope, which bound me to Zurbriggen, jerk, and I came heavily against the side of the mountain."

"A dreadful position, surely! What was your feeling?"

"I dreaded I should be stupped and

I could see the boulder I had dislodged going down in great bounds, and I thought to myself how often I might strike the same rocks if Zurbriggen should be wrenched away from his foothold—as the slow slipping of the rope had just suggested—and we were to fall. But now the slipping motion stopped—it all happened in a few seconds—and I called out to Zurbriggen to know if he had a good footing. His first fear was that I had been half killed by the falling boulder, and so he shouted

buggen to know if he had a good footing, His first fear was that I had been half killed by the falling boulder, and so he shouted back asking whether I was much hutt."
"Meanwhile, of course, you were swinging in the air, quite unable to do anything for yourself?"
"I hung I ke a pendulum with my back to the wall, but scarcely touching it. A great effort was needed to turn round and grasp the rock, and I was afraid the additional strain on the rope which this would cause, might dislodge Zurbriggen. Accordingly when I had assured him that I was not seriously hurt, I again asked whether he was firmly placed. His reply was in the negative, that he was very badly situated, and to turn round as soon as I could, since it would not be possible for him to hold me much longer. I kicked out at the rocks with one foot, and, exerting myself as much as I could, managed to swing round my body."

Next I struggled a litle way up, and finally contrived to hand Zurbriggen the ice-axes, which I had succeeded in preserving—indeed, all through, my thoughts had been centred on them. We were in too bad a corner to stop to speak to one another. Zurbriggen climbed up a bit further and found a firm position, and I scrambled after him. In ten minutes we were on easier ground, and we sat down to rest a little after an adventure which, I need hardly add, tried our nerves somewhat."

"I believe you were the first traveller to cross the Southern Alps of New Zealand, and that the feat has implied an important addition to geographical knowledge?"

"The principal object of my visit to the Southern Alps of New Zealand was to discover if possible some feasible tourist route across them—a route over which horses could be taken from the arid plains of the Mackenzie country to the beautiful West Coast. No route whatever was known before, but the advantage of one had long been recognised, and we discovered what is, perhaps, the only pass that crosses the range. My method of observation was to climb all the high peaks, and thus get a thorough grasp of the country, and our Mount Sefton experience was one of the incidents of the quest."

"Passing from the virgin peaks which you ascended in New Zealand, what are your plans generally in reference to the Aconca-

ascended in New Zealand, what are your plans generally in reference to the Aconcagua expedition?"

"I shall leave England at the end of September, and from Valparaiso I shall get by rail to the base of Aconcagua. There will be my friend Mr. C. L. Barrow, who accompanied me to New Zealand; Zurbriggen, and half-a-dozen Swiss porters accustomed to climbing—such will be the party. We shall erect a permanent camp at the bottom of the mountain, and Mr. Barrow will take charge of that end of the line, which, as my plan is, will be extended, camp by camp, up to the top."

"It's a long climb, is it not?"
"Aconcagua is 23,200 ft. high. The highest climb so far is Sir Martin Conway's Pioneer Peak in the Himalayas, which is 22,700 fet. Next to that stands the ascent of Chimborazo by Mr. Whymper. THE principal political incident of the past week was the resignations of the ministers of finance, industry and marine on the 17th instant, occasioned by divergent views in regard to the programme advanced by Vice-President Manoel Victorino for yies in regard to the programme avances by Vice-President Manoel Victorino for the improvement of the precarious financial situation in which Brazil is now placed. We do not understand that Ministers Rodrigues Alves, Antonio Olyntho and Elisiario Barbosa were opposed to the economies urged by the Vice-President, but as he is understood to be opposed to two of the important provisions of the revue bill understood to be opposed to two of the important provisions of the revenue bill—the issue of more currency and the collection of 40 per cent of the import duties in gold—it is highly probable that their continuance in office had become embarrassing. And it is also probable that they were not in accord with the proposition to lease the Central railway. It must be said of these ministers that they were looked upon by the public as the conservative element in the cabinet, and they therefore enjoyed a very large measure of public confidence. They have been criticised, sometimes severely, particularly the minister of times severely, particularly the minister of finance, for inactivity and inattention to the demands of those who expect the govern-ment to exercise control over all the affairs ment to exercise control over all the aftairs of the people, but we must confess that this abstention was wholly in their favor. It is generally better to let public affairs drift than to be trying wild experiments. It may be that the minister of finance has failed to initiate measures to improve the critical sit-uation in which we have been placed, but it is to his credit that he has avoided experiments which would have brought disasters upon us. As for the new appoint-ments, which were announced on the evenments, which were announced on the even-ing of the zoth, the portfolio of finance is given to Dr. Bernardino de Campos, sen-ator and ex-governor of São Paulo, that of industry to Dr. Joaquim Duarte Murtinho, senator, and that of marine to Rear Admiral Manuel José Alves Barbosa, naval construc-tor. The appointments have been gener-ally well received, and are looked upon with favor by men of all parties, which im-plies that the new ministers are not extreme partizans. The new minister of finance is a man of ability and considerable experi-ence in public affairs, though he has never shown any special fitness for finance. The new minister of marine is not a politician, but enjoys the reputation of being a good officer and a man devoted to his profession.

The choice of Dr. Murtinho, however,

has not escaped some criticism. He is a successful homoeopathic physician and is a man of ability and resource, but his limited experience in public affairs and his personal standing are considered by many to be serious obstacles to his exercising an office of such importance and multifarious detail. All these fears may however prove unfounded, and the successful physician may prove to be a successful administrator. He is known to be a pronounced advocate of the sale or lease of the government railways, and this may have determined the ways, and this may have determined choice. Yesterday the resignation of minister of war was also accepted, but his successor is not yet indicated.

One of the first acts of the Vice-President on assuming charge of the government, was to consult various influential men in regard to the adoption of measures for improving the financial condition of the country. The result of this has been the announcement result of this has been the announcement of a general programme covering a reduction in expenditures, the lease of the government railways, taking over the outstanding bank emissions, the collection of import duties in gold after the lease of the railways is effected, and the redemption of paper money with the surpluses in the annual budgets, the proceeds from the debts of the banks, the third part of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds in deposit to secure bank emissions, and from the proceeds secure bank emissions, and from the proceeds realized by the lease of the state railways. realized by the lease of the state railways. The programme is a good one, but it will be of very difficult realization. Its first proposition alone will require great tact and firmness on the part of the government, and if successful will certainly go far toward correcting the evils which afflict the country. No reform can be complete and effective unless it comprises large and increase. unless it comprises large and rigorous reductions in public expenditures. Every unnecessary expense must be abolished, and every useless official must be dismissed. There must be a suspension in the purchase of war material and a reduction in the army. And until the public treasury is again sound and solvent, no more subsidies again sound and solvent, no more subsidies should be granted, nor public improvements not urgently necessary should be executed. In lact, no expenditure should be made which is not absolutely necessary. The lease of the railways will of course be vigorously opposed, and it will be made difficult by onerous conditions. The currency reform is perhaps necessary, and if it is immediately followed up by redemptions it may lead to good results. It is a complicated problem, however, and must be treated with caution. The other measures are of course conditional on the success of the of course conditional on the success of the others and need not be discussed just here. It is possible that the scheme is too ambitious and that nothing will be realized for lack of concentrated effort, but it is at least satisfactory to see that the government has at last realized the necessity of doing something to remedy the perilous situation in which the country is placed.

THE dispute with Italy was brought to a conclusion on the 19th instant by the sign-ing of a protocol which fixes the terms of settlement. The minister of foreign affairs, Gen. Dionysio Cerqueira, and Minister de Martino are to be heartily congratulated on this result, for it has been accomplished without any demonstration and apparently without the slightest friction. For Gen. Cerqueira it is a signal triumph for he has quiet guand unobtrusively reduced certain Italian claims from 24,000,000\$000 to 4,000,000\$ and has obtained a reference to arbitration and has obtained a reference to arbitration for those claims which are not included in this settlement. The dispute, should congress approve the protocol, may now be considered settled, and that without any concession on either side which can be said to involve a question of national honor. This shows what sensible men can accomplish when they are left to themselves.

It may not have occurred to our collea gues of the native press, particularly to the director of the Jornal do Commercio, but it is undeniably true that the credit for the retrenchment and reform movement which is now occupying so much public attention really belongs to the Times correspondent. In our opinion, the nation owes him a debt of lasting gratitude. Before he sent his now famous telegram in regard to the crisis in this city, the Brazilian world was moving along in the old channels, apparently un-conscious of the dangers threatening it. The banks were compromising with de-

faulters, merchants were accepting componises, the government was recklessly squandering its diminishing income and creating new taxes, and the people were growing uneasy under increasing burdens and the difficulties of meeting the exaggerated costs of living. It had been announced that 200 annihilations in harbstaters. ated costs of living. It had been announced that 300 applications in bankruptcy had been made, but no one paid the slight-est attention to it. Then Medeiros e Al-buquerque asked for a six months moratoorquerque assed for a six months morator-rium, but got nothing more than a sleepy expression of disapproval. At this juncture the *Times* correspondent epitomized the situation and cabled it to London. For a day or two this also aroused little attention, but when Brazilian stocks began to fall and Brazilian schemes came to naught, the Brazilian interests woke up and began to protest. At first their fury was directed against the correspondent, but the more they denounced and denied the lower fell their stocks. Then they began to feel that something more than a newspaper cor-respondent was wrong, and a little in-trospection resulted. And from all this have come these proposals to cut down expenditures, to reform and reduce the circulating medium, to sell the state railways, and all that. The initiative in all this was certainly taken by the *Times* correspondent, and it would perhaps not be an ungraceful act to make a public acknowledgment of that fact. After all the abuse lavished upon him and upon *The Rio News*, surely some little acknowledgment of the service rendered some slight accreasing tures, to reform and reduce the circulathe service rendered, some slight expression of regret for the temper at first displayed, some little token of amity and good will, would not be at all out of place. And there are not a few people who think that such an acknowledgment would confer even more credit upon the givers, than upon the recipient.

PROVINCIAL NOTES


