#### PREFACE

TO THE CLASS:

This Fifth Report has been produced under the Secretary's supervision but without the direct handling and checking of all matters of detail as was the case in the volume preceding. The high pressure of current events has made it impossible to do everything personally in this instance and to treat this work as a labor of love, as should be the case in compiling these personal records. Mr. Sidney Curtis, '05, formerly business manager of the *Harvard Alumni Bulletin*, has assisted the Secretary, and the Plimpton Press of Norwood has co-operated helpfully on its end of the work.

Since the date of our Quindecennial the Secretary has been notified of the death of eighteen men, eleven of whom were holders of degrees. This makes a total of eighty-two men in our necrology list to date. Of these, thirty-six held the degree of A.B.; two, that of S.B.; the remaining forty-four having been affiliated members.

Several men have wandered beyond the Secretary's ken and have become mere names on our roster. These prodigals are ever welcome, none the less, and may always expect an outstretched hand upon their return.

The omission or postponement of our Vicennial celebration will come as a disappointment to many, but, like other disappointments in this year 1917, it is to be accepted philosophically and in the hope that when we again come together we shall meet with a more profound sense of sympathy and comradeship, as a result of the trials through which all of our generation now seem destined to pass.

T HAVE managed to keep pretty busy at an increasingly large ■ variety of things since the last report. I was kept away from the last reunion because my work as political correspondent of the New York Evening Post necessitated my being at Baltimore to write the story of the Democratic National Convention that nominated Woodrow Wilson for the first time. That fall I left active newspaper work to become political secretary to Oscar S. Straus, Progressive candidate for governor of New York. After election I became secretary of the Citizens Committee for Non-Partisan Public Service Regulation and directed a publicity and organization campaign which lasted several months. In February, 1913, I became secretary of the Municipal Government Association, an organization with a constructive programme of home rule for cities. I am still secretary of that organization and have seen a considerable part of its programme enacted into law.

Most of my time since 1912 has been devoted to work of a civic, political, or legislative character. In the fall of 1914 I was secretary of the New York City Constitutional Convention Committee which sought to bring about the nomination and election of fit delegates to the Constitutional Convention. During the midwinter and spring of 1915 I was a member of several special com-

mittees which were working on problems of constitutional reform, including those of the State Conference of Mayors, the New York Young Republican Club, and the Citizens Union. In May I became secretary of the Committee on Governor and State Officers in the Constitutional Convention, which drafted the short ballot and state reorganization amendments to the constitution. After the convention adjourned I served as publicity secretary of the Committee for the Adoption of the Constitution until after the proposed constitution was defeated. Since the beginning of 1916 I have been legislative secretary of the City Club of New York. I have been a director and a member of the executive committee of the Honest Ballot Association for several years. I am a member of the executive and legislative committees of the Citizens Union, the Legislative Committee of the City Club, a director of the Voters

Legislative Association, one of the founders and chairman of the legislative committee of the County Government Association. and a member of the executive board of the National Short Ballot

Organization.

I have continued active in politics, have been a member of the executive committee of the Young Republican Club a greater part of the time since its organization in 1911, was for several years chairman of its committee on state affairs, and was chairman of a special committee on state leadership which started the successful campaign which resulted in the retirement of William Barnes from the Republican state chairmanship. I have been a member of the Republican County Committee of New York for several years and was a delegate to the Republican State Conferences of 1913 and 1914. Among other things I was actively interested in the reform of legislative procedure, and a resolution introduced by me in the State Conference of 1913, and unanimously adopted. formed the basis of radical reforms put into operation in the legislature in the following year. I was one of the organizers of the Hughes Alliance in June, 1916, serving on the executive committees of both the New York State and the National Hughes Alliance, and was director of publicity of the National Hughes Alliance during the entire presidential campaign. I have written articles on municipal government, have lectured and delivered addresses on municipal home rule before the Academy of Political Science, the State Conference of Mayors, and chambers of commerce and high schools, and have acted as adviser to local charter drafting commissions.

I have written one book, "The Emancipation of the American City," just published by Duffield and Company. I am a member of the National Municipal League, the American Historical Association and of the City and Harvard Clubs of New York and the University Club of Albany.

THE activities which have occupied the last five years of my life have forced the conviction that life now rapidly grows more complex. THE last Report made to men of '97, as I remember, was when I was wondering where I would find the price for dinner. It is fitting, therefore, that the present report should begin with the statement that I have found the price but don't know where to dine. Two facts loom large in my life since the spring of 1912; my return to the effete east — notice effete — and my wedding. The first came about as the result of the illness and ultimate death of my mother; the second because — well, because. The most important thing in my life now is arranging — in retrospect — for the education of Henry Haviland Bowles, 2nd, born July 18, 1914. He was one of the most famous children ever born, of course, a twilight sleep child, and consequently far advanced in learning over all others.

In this connection, it may interest some of my classmates to know that there are several flourishing troops of Boy Scouts at the school. I am a great believer in the scout movement and am connected with the organization of Boy Scouts in Greater Boston.

But of all my concerns during the past few years, my family has seemed to me the most worth while, and I point with a father's hope and pride to my contribution to the genealogical data of the class since our last report.

IN April, 1912, I was appointed manager for completing the Cordoba Light and Power contract, and in August turned over the job to our clients. SINCE graduation I have remained at Harvard. I am still doing work in botany, my title being Fisher Professor of Natural History. I have visited a number of the Old World museums and universities, and have spent practically every summer exploring somewhere in northern Maine, eastern Canada, Newfoundland, or Labrador.

Since its foundation, in 1899, I have been an editor of *Rhodora*, the monthly journal of the New England Botanical Club.

In 1910 I was called upon to look into such botanical evidence as is given in the Norse Sagas relating to the discovery of America about the year 1000. The result was a complete surprise, for a close study of the folk-names and uses of the plants

mentioned in the Sagas showed that the southern limit of Leif Ericsson's voyage must have been in southern Labrador or northern Newfoundland; and I found my paper, "Notes on the Plants of Wineland the Good," being praised or condemned in many different tongues. However, except by some Norwegians who wish to have discovered nothing less important than Boston or Halifax, the localization of "Wineland" in Newfoundland or Labrador is now generally accepted by historians.

In 1911, I published an account of "A Botanical Expedition to Newfoundland and Southern Labrador," in which it was shown that a large proportion of the plants of Newfoundland are identical with those of Cape Cod, Long Island, and southeastern New Jersey; and upon this and similar zoölogical evidence it was demonstrated that at some time since the last glacial periods, the continental shelf, now represented by Nantucket Shoals, George's Banks, Sable Island Banks, etc., must have formed dry land connection from New Jersey and Cape Cod all the way to Newfoundland, an important geological discovery, which, owing to the drowning in the sea of the geological evidence, geologists had had no means of getting at.

PROFESSOR HUGHELL E. W. FOSBROKE of the Episcopal Theological Seminary of Cambridge, Mass., was recently elected Dean of the General Theological Seminary, one of the most influential offices in the Protestant Episcopal Church in America.

According to the New York *Times*, of Sept. 20, 1916, from which this story is taken, "Professor Fosbroke is a 'high churchman.' Although the Dean of the General Theological Seminary has been said to wield more influence over the teaching of the Protestant Episcopal Church than any other man, no sharp issue was made in this election, it was said yesterday, between the high and low church factions.

"Professor Fosbroke was asked, in the formal announcement of his election, to come to this city and take active charge of the position before the first of next year. He has been, for the last seven years, Professor of the History and Religion of Israel at

the Episcopal Theological School at Cambridge.

"He was born in England and came to this country as a child; was educated in the public schools and for a time attended Harvard. Later he engaged in business. He lived for some time in Alaska, but returned and prepared to become a clergyman by studying in the seminary at Nashotah, Neb., where he became one of the instructors and later head of the preparatory depart-

ment. After serving for eight years as a Professor of Old Testament History, he was called to his present position at Cambridge.

"Professor Fosbroke succeeds the Rev. Dr. Wilfred L. Robbins and insures a continuation of the teaching which prevailed in the seminary under Dean Robbins, who was a high church leader until illness compelled him to retire early this year."

ERNEST LEWIS GAY, the son of George Henry and Elizabeth Greenough (Lewis) Gay, was born at Boston, Dec. 14, 1874. He prepared for College at the Boston Latin School, entered Harvard in the fall of 1893, and received the degree of A.B. in June, 1897. In his College work he specialized in English, French, and history, showing early his definite tendency toward literature and the languages. Both at school and in College he played football actively, being an exceptionally effective end rush for a man of his weight and stature.

After graduation he devoted some tentative months to the study of the law, and subsequently entered business for a short time, but in 1900 he found the kind of work which was to absorb him thenceforward when he entered the New York State Library School. He was busy in the Harvard College Library from 1902 to 1904, and then received a temporary appointment as assistant librarian of the library of the Weather Bureau in Washington, D. C., where he remained until 1908. His mother's death in 1907 resulted in his return to Boston in due course, and in 1910 he became one of the incorporators, and naturally the librarian, of the Society for the

Preservation of New England Antiquities.

His vacations afforded opportunities for four visits to England, where he devoted part of his time to bibliographical work at the British Museum. John Gay, who wrote "The Beggar's Opera" in 1742, was his specialty. He had practically all the editions of this work, including a number not in the British Museum. The more valuable he kept in safe deposit vaults, but he had more than 100 copies in his rooms at 317 Marlboro Street, Boston, where he could use them in compiling his long projected bibliography of "The Beggar's Opera." Though he was better equipped for the task probably than any one else, he allowed it to remain his dream for many years, always deferring publication until he should have completed his researches. In connection with this work, he collected hundreds of ballad operas, the dramatic form which it introduced into England, and had standing orders with London and continental dealers to ship any copies he lacked.

Like his brother, the late Frederick Lewis Gay, '78, he made many gifts to the Harvard Library, enriching its department of

ballad operas beyond any other collection in America.

He was a member of the American Historical Association, the Bibliographical Society of America, New England Historic Genealogical Society, Essex Book and Print Club, Club of Odd Volumes, Society of Colonial Wars, University Club of Boston of which he was librarian, and Harvard Club of New York. Despite his intense love of books and research his attitude never suggested the self-absorbed recluse. On the contrary, his genial spontaneity and capacity for happy companionship were his instinctive characteristics. Gay never married, and in his later years had premonitions of organic weakness which caused him to live very quietly and carefully. In the fall of 1916 his passion for football took him to New Haven, and the unwonted excitement and exertion of the day resulted in his death from heart trouble, as he was returning to Boston on the special train.

In educational classes last year 2200 were enrolled. The budget for current expenses this year runs over \$10,000 and we have a strong staff of twelve Japanese secretaries and assistants, besides more than thirty foreign and Japanese teachers giving part time.

Consistently with this spirit my son served on the border the past summer as a National Guardsman.

Socially I am a member of the local Get Together Club, and of the Connecticut Valley Theological and Congregational Clubs.

In the last I happen now to be Vice-President.

Thus far I have been able to escape the tempestuous political arena but was surprised a few days ago that one of the municipal fathers out of revenge had presented my name to the Republican Town Committee for the office of Selectman. However, it is my hope that a re-affirmation of the wisdom of our national constitution in the separation of church and state may save me from such a disaster.

ROBERT DARRAH JENKS was born at Enterprise, Florida, on March 1, 1875, the son of William Furness and Helen Carnan (Towne) Jenks. He died of pneumonia, after a brief illness, on January 22, 1917, at his home in Philadelphia. He prepared for College at the Penn Charter School, Philadelphia,

entered Harvard in the fall of 1893, and graduated in due course with the class of '97. His interest in railroad transportation led him to serve for a year in the freight department of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway. Then taking up the study of law, he graduated from the Law School of the University of Pennsylvania in 1901. He married, June 20, 1914, Maud Lowrey of Philadelphia.

Throughout the years we knew him, his mind was constantly occupied with thought of the public welfare. Wise to recognize the essential values and defects of partisanship, and willing to be allied to a party, and at the same time judicial enough to see virtue in the opposed partisanship of another, he combined the enthusiasm, moderation and ability for work necessary for a successful reformer. He was as zealous in the practical work of winning a case in Philadelphia to establish the status of letter carriers, as he was in the more far-reaching task of drafting a model civil service law which might become the standard for uniformity in the several States.

His legal career naturally tended to transportation problems. The child's interest in railroads grew to knowledge, both practical and theoretical, of many intricate aspects of transportation. At his death he was at work on one of many cases he had supported before the Inter-State Commerce Commission. The attitude in which he approached the cases entrusted to him was one of scrupulous fairness to both the railroads and the shippers; for to him the fundamental points at issue were far more important than the commercial interests immediately involved. He made himself an expert in railroad rates and became one of the foremost authorities in his chosen field. He had already won professional standing of a high order, with promise of wide public recognition of his abilities.

He gave his services to the public by holding such positions as: Trustee of the Penn School in South Carolina, 1901–1911; member of the Philadelphia Committee of Seventy; Secretary of the Pennsylvania Civil Service Reform Association; and from 1912–1915, Chairman of the Council of the National Civil Service Reform League.

But to his friends he was more than the public-spirited citizen, more than the lawyer whose professional ideals were untainted by commercialism. To us he was also the true and loyal comrade whom we loved. His unpretentious modesty did not prevent an increasing appreciation of his sturdy qualities. He bound his friends to him with unforgettable ties by his cheerful courage and his loyalty to obligation. The ideals which moved

him to public service commanded no less his private life, making

him a devoted husband, son and brother.

I HAVE very little to add to my biography except that the years that have intervened since the Fourth Report have been filled with hard and interesting work, and the progress in all things

in life I firmly believe has been upward.

My daily work is the production of automatic music rolls for the pipe-organ. For over a year I have been associated with the Ernest M. Skinner Co., of Boston, builders of church and house organs. Our company produces two distinct types of house organs, for which I have to arrange and produce two kinds of music. For the sake of this record I will state that one type of music roll is for the organ of two manuals and pedals, which work is not of excessive difficulty, while the other is for the Orchestrator, a problem of infinite detail and difficulty, as the solo capacity is equal to an organ of five manuals and pedals. The Orchestrator contains practically all the voices of the orchestra with each voice in a separate swell-box, so that each is under perfect control from the paper roll. These swell-boxes are from eight to ten in number according to the size of the organ. This type of organ, and of automatic mechanism, and roll, are the only ones of their kind in the world, and for the playing of great orchestral compositions the Orchestrator has no equal as it can play six solo voices, if necessary, each voice controlled individually in its power, and the piano also, so that a piano concerto with orchestral accompaniment can be performed with all effects of phrasing, light, shade and color.

Such exacting work as this gives but little time for other things, but in spare moments I still collect antiques and books and write music. Two collaborations with Mr. Gustave Strube have been given and repeated by the Boston Symphony Orchestra during the last five years, and songs, pieces for the organ, string quartets and other compositions for various instruments have been performed in Boston, New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and in Europe.

THE First, Second, and Third Reports bring my chronology up to 1907. From that year I take up my story, as the items in the Fourth Report were not compiled by me.

Some of my time has been spent in travel; two months of 1908, the Newfoundland Labrador; ten months of 1909, Spain, France, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, and thence via Vladivostock to Yokohama and San Francisco, five months of 1910, British Isles and Panama Canal Zone; twenty-three months of 1911–13, including three months in the South Seas (Society, Leeward, Austral, and Paumotu Groups) of which 47 days was by auxiliary schooner some 1800 miles, five months in New Zealand, several weeks being spent in camping and canoeing, two months in Australian East Coast between Hobart and Townsville, thence via Port Moresby to Java, Siam, Federated Malay States, Ceylon, and Mauritius, two months in the Union of South Africa and one month each in Switzerland and London; two and one half months of 1914, July, August, and September, in England and Ireland.

REDERICK ADAMS LAWS, the son of Hiram and Mary Elizabeth (Dutton) Laws, was born at Bedford, Mass., April 4, 1876. He entered College from the Concord High School. receiving his A.B. in regular course in the spring of '97. After graduation he entered the employ of James C. Freeman, real estate and insurance broker, 55 Kilby Street, Boston. He later became connected with the foreign exchange department of the American Express Company at 43 Franklin Street, Boston. From this position he went to Cambridge, where he served for eight years as Superintendent of the Harvard Co-operative Society, resigning in July, 1911, to go to work for the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company in Boston. Previously he had declined an invitation to reorganize and manage the Filene Department Store in Boston. In his new position with the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company he became assistant to the treasurer. Subsequently he was placed in charge of the company's credit department of its New York selling agency. Laws approached his college work with the quiet seriousness which usually marks the man who is reducing his college expenses to a minimum, and working during vacation periods. The courses he selected indicated a determination to obtain a liberal academic education. English was his favorite study, as exemplified by his contributions to the *Advocate*. His fondness for drawing found expression in the *Lampoon* and in his designs for some of the Class Day tickets.

During his business years in Cambridge he not only proved himself a capable business man, but took a civic interest in local affairs. He served on several committees of the Colonial Club; was one of the organizers, and served as Secretary of the Harvard Square Business Men's Association; was Secretary of the Economy Club for a year, and was a member of the governing board of the Under Forty division of the Boston Chamber of Commerce. He served in the Massachusetts Militia for several years, as a member of Battery A, Field Artillery of Boston, being Quartermaster Sergeant during the last two years of his service. He was actively interested in the work of the Graduate School of Business Administration which he attended, expressing his admiration for Dean Gay's leadership in that new field.

Laws was essentially a man of character, modest and unassuming in disposition, but simple, direct, keenly intelligent, and

HENRY LAMPART LE DAUM was one of the most picturesque and interesting figures whom the Class of '97 can claim in its membership. His early death took from our ranks an extraordinary personality, and a creative mind of peculiar charm and beauty.

The University of North Dakota signally honored his memory by suspending its activities, and by devoting a day for memorial observances. From the memorial pamphlet published by the University let me quote briefly from the personal sketch by his

associate, John M. Gillette.

"Professor Henry L. Le Daum was born at La Chaux-de-Fonds, Neuchâtel Canton, Switzerland, February 26, 1872. He died at Grand Forks, North Dakota, March 10, 1913, at 11 o'clock at night, having lived twelve days more than four decades. He was the victim of pneumonia, complicated and intensified by uremic poisoning. A few days ago he was among us as a friend and fellow craftsman. Today his mortal remains await the last resting place and his life is with us as a memory. He asked to see me a few hours before his death to entrust to me the future of the most cherished child of his brain, the unpublished phonetic system of teaching French to English-speaking peoples. I remained with him nearly to the end and saw his almost superhuman and indomitable struggle against the combined forces of the poison and the fever. In spite of all he was serene, full of courage, valiant and persistent in the struggle to live. It was an heroic struggle. consciousness refused to the last to give up its sovereignty over the body. In the midst of the agony and the struggle to breathe. for every breath was a gasp, and this for many hours before relief came, he kept his mind and his plan, recognized his friends. directed his nurses, and demanded of them their program for the night. He was solicitous that I should not wear myself out by his bedside. He even ordered me away under cover of the pretext that I was doing him an injury. His mind was in the midst of his work, his world of ideas, the products of his days and years of thought, and he could not afford to lay down the labor. Professor Brannon tells me that almost his last words were: 'Work, for the night is coming.' There was no white feather there, no faltering, no suing for quarter. I was proud of him in his heroism in that last great struggle, it gave me a greater respect for mankind."

And then the beautiful tribute of President Frank L. McVey: "On a soft autumnal day in the far away land of Scotland, a great man lay dying. Through the open windows came the sounds of birds in the trees outside. To his son-in-law, Lochart, he said as he passed away: 'Be a good man, my dear, be a good man.' In that phrase the whole life of Scott was garnered.

"On a winter's day a man passed away, racked with pain, while on his lips was the phrase, 'There is work to do, for the night is coming.'

"One of these men had completed his life, and his words of last response presented both a philosophy and an admonition. His life had been one of ease; from every quarter adulation and praise came unsolicited. His ambition was gratified.

"The man that we are gathered to do honor unto this day was just come to the blossoming period. The hard work of student days was telling in the conquering of scholastic difficulties and in the enjoyment of judgment and a more accurate presentation of results. In his study of the European problem play and the work of Cervantes as shown in the study of *Don Quixote*,

he reached high ground and attained a brilliant phrasing of felicitous interpretation. Nor was this all. He had unraveled the mystery of human sound, analyzed and classified it and worked out a system of phonetics that will, in the judgment of his peers, stand as a real piece of work in the development of language study. This certainly was no small accomplishment. Nor in these comments have I referred to the kindly and humorous interpretation of Cyrano de Bergerac, which he gave us in his edition of that story.

"I use this story of Scott in opening the way to the real purpose of these remarks. I am not sure I shall be really understood, but if in way of contrast I can bring out how far Henry LeDaum has come in his way to the Beyond, I shall be justified. In the year 1888 he landed in Philadelphia, a boy of seventeen. Going at once to Ohio, he began to support himself by work wherever he could find it. As clerk, porter, laborer, he made his way, full of pride and ambition, through the high school and into college to finish well up in his classes and later on to attend Harvard University as a graduate student. Through it all he followed his chosen field of linguistic study. Then came the period of trial, the testing of the Americanization process upon the boy from foreign shores. No one can know what this means, unless he has passed through it. The apprenticeship at Iowa University, a harrowing experience in a new and untried college, an instructorship at Northwestern University brought him, when the opening came in 1908, to the University of North Dakota, as assistant professor of Romance Languages. Three years later he was advanced to the title of full professor. That is the story. It tells but little, and that by implication, of the cheerfulness, bravery and courage, the boyish enthusiasm for learning, coupled with the carefully accurate work of the trained scholar that characterized his days among us. The great purpose of life is to do your work, try to do what you can do best.

"There is work to do.' If measured by this standard, Henry LeDaum is a successful man, for he did his work. 'Every man has a history worth knowing,' says Emerson, 'if he could tell it.' How high can you carry life? These are the views of men relative to the world. It is true that they are based on the common opinion of success, but whether viewed through the position of wealth, fame, or monopoly, or of possession, the real permanence, after all, is the

doing of the work.

<sup>&</sup>quot;'Should chiseled plinth and rounded arch Dispute with Time's unswerving march, How vain the effort; these must pass Like blown sea-vapor from a glass.

"'The spheres that sing and swing in space, One day their orbits who shall trace? And yet the soul, that aura bright, Shall outlast chaos and the night."

"This man whom we are gathered here to honor today, had interests in many things. The long memoranda handed to me at different times in their peculiar handwriting, were always filled with good suggestions, though often in advance of our practise. His questionnaire regarding students, their work, their life, their habits, what they were thinking about, and what they were doing, evidenced a shrewd interest in human nature. I shall miss him much because of his high ideals, his scholarship, and brave optimism. We could ill afford to lose him.

"To the woman who called him husband, to the boy and girl who called him father, and to the many men and women who called him friend, there is a memory that will always remain as green as the hills and mountains of his fatherland."

SAMUEL SCOVILLE PASCHAL, the son of George W. and Mary Lois (Scoville) Paschal, was born at Washington, D. C., March 16, 1875. He entered College from Phillips Exeter Academy in the fall of '93, remaining for three years, but not completing his course for a degree. To quote his own words: "On May 12, 1897, I married Mary Lois Sherman, of Washington. We devoted five months to our wedding trip, covering most of Europe. Returning, I began a study of law at Columbian University, Washington, D. C. I received my LL.B. in June, 1899. The same

year my wife and I went to the Hawaiian Islands, and after looking things well over, settled in Honolulu, where I was admitted to practise at the Hawaiian Bar. Two delightful and intensely interesting years followed, with the future looking promising. Then I lost my health. We came east and the doctors informed me I was developing ataxia. Since then I have not been up to any really serious occupation. I bought a comfortable house in Chevy Chase and for a time was kept busy doing House Committee work in the Chevy Chase club. The automobile was a boon to me. I have been a modest owner, struggling to meet the endless demands of Washington repair shops for eleven years. Naturally, the main part of my time has been spent in reading. A most congenial wife and two aggressively healthy children have compensated me for my bad health. The boy is ten and the girl seven. Last May we came abroad for a year, primarily for me to get medical treatment in Germany. My son, Guy, the most typically American production imaginable, was left at Cotlemore School in Brighton, England. In December Guy was handed a prize for "best general improvement" by no less a personage than the Duke of Norfolk, who had been induced to undertake this arduous task.

"So far, moving slowly about the continent has proved far more interesting than waiting for something to happen in Chevy Chase, and as I seem to have been benefited in some ways by the treatment I had in Germany, this one year's stay abroad may easily pass into a two years' stay.

"While the brilliance of my own course has not been dazzling, it has been a genuine delight to me to see how very large a per-

centage of our class has really made good."

Paschal was enrolled in the Lawrence Scientific School, and was perhaps, less widely known among his classmates than if his work had been related to the academic side. His personality, however, was one of charm and geniality. His manner was cordial and gracious, and his smile and speech winning and kindly. To Puritan Harvard he brought something of the warmth and spontaneity of the Southland.

Despite his persistent search for health in his later years, his disposition held its sweetness, and his attitude towards his fellows continued to be one of large-minded tolerance and generous appreciation. His presence is one that will be sincerely missed at coming reunions.

He died on Jan. 17, 1917, at his home in Chevy Chase, Maryland, where he had been settled on his return from Europe, since Septem-

ber, 1913.

TILLARD NORMAN POLAND was born at Boston, Mass., June 5, 1873. His parents, John Carroll and Hulda Henrietta (Holmes) Poland, moved from Maine soon after their marriage and settled first at Lawrence, Mass., and shortly after at Boston, which latter place their son was to call "home" throughout his life. In his boyhood Poland suffered from a severe bronchial attack which handicapped him until his eighteenth year when he came to enjoy vigorous health, having no serious illness again until the winter of 1896-1897 when he was successfully operated upon for appendicitis by the famous Dr. M. H. Richardson.

His preparatory schooling was at the Boston Latin School, which he entered from the Gibson Grammar School of Dorchester. SINCE the publication of the Fourth Report the fight against tuberculosis has become my entire work. Realizing the futility of most efforts in private practise in this direction I have entered Sanatorium work. In April, 1915, I left St. Paul, Minnesota, to take the position of assistant superintendent of the Minnesota Sanatorium for Consumptives. Leaving there January 1, 1916, I took up the duties of superintendent of the State Tuberculosis Hospital of Nebraska the fourteenth of the same month (January, 1916). Here I find not alone the fascination of the care of the patients and the study of this disease, but the unlimited opportunities in the campaign of education in a comparatively new field and the building up of a new institution.

The city of Kearney has about six thousand population; it is built near the site of Fort Kearney, an historic landmark of the early days on the Oregon Trail. The famous Lincoln Highway from coast to coast passes through the town and along the Hospital grounds, which are said to be exactly midway between Boston and San Francisco. This is an educational center, the site of the largest State Normal School in Nebraska, with its five to six hundred winter and eight to nine hundred summer students and faculty, so that I am not isolated as so many of my confrères in tuberculosis work, whose institutions are in

remote country districts.

THE past five years have brought no great change in my work **1** as noted in the last Class Report. I still hold the chair of history in the Baptist College, Rangoon, Burma, to which I was appointed ten years ago. This institution now numbers, all told, about 1700, largely in the lower grades, but the college proper increased 33 % last year and is winning for itself a position of large influence in the educational and religious affairs of the Near East. Another Harvard man has joined our staff, making three in this province of India.

In 1914-15 I took furlough in America and another will be due, if the Lord tarry, in 1923. We enjoyed a week in Ceylon on our way home and another in Italy, besides stopping at Sicily and the Azores, but for inland scenery we found nothing surpassing Burma which is often overlooked by globe trotters. Garrison's hearty greeting soon after landing in Boston stands out vividly in retrospect. Most of our time at home was devoted to rest and recuperation after the years spent so much near the Equator, and then to addresses in Massachusetts and Vermont on behalf of our mission field.

Returning by a circuitous route through the South, thence to the Panama Exposition, Japan, China, and the Malay Straits Settlements, a journey of 13,940 miles in 89 days, war conditions causing such a dearth of shipping that we were hung up at Singapore more than three weeks and were fortunate to get away then. There is no unrest manifest in Burma and remarkably little in any part of India on account of the war, so that high cost of living, departure of students for the Mesopotamian front, and Red Cross giving by the men and sewing by the women are the war aspects which chiefly confront us. In case the United States joins in, as now seems likely, the Americans here under leadership of our Consul are talking of cabling an offer of services to Washington with request if not needed there that permission be given to offer the same to the British Government here. However, I do not expect such service will be required, save possibly for light guard duty locally to release for the front the few regiments usually kept in the province. But we are proud of our Harvard men and ambulances in France and to you at the home base send happy greetings in this war worn time from our remote corner of the planet.

IN May, 1912, I assumed the directorate of the Psychopathic Hospital in Boston, a state institution having the functions of (1) a clearing-house for all doubtful mental cases of the metropolitan district (100 beds, about 2000 patients annually) and (2) a research institute for the Massachusetts Commission on Mental Diseases (teaching facilities, extensive laboratories). Numerous investigations have been undertaken, perhaps the most practical being in connection with syphilis of the nervous system (book now in press). The benefits of the psychopathic hospital type of service are now to be extended under legislative authority (1917) to the whole of the commonwealth upon a district system.

THE past five years have passed very quickly, quietly, and for me, very uneventfully. I live in the same place in Brookline with my mother who has become quite feeble, and I have but little time for anything outside my home and business.

SINCE leaving College I have been in the Harvard Graduate School, and, during 1900–1901, professor of biology and Hoagland professor of physiology in Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio. From 1901 to the present time I have been assistant in embryology and comparative anatomy in the University of Chicago. I am a member of the Chicago Academy of Science, the Naturalists of Central United States, the Boston Society of Natural History, and of the A. A. A. S. He was prepared for college at the West Point (Miss.) Academy. In the little town of West Point his boyhood was spent. In 1889 he entered Mississippi College, from which he received his A.B. in 1893. He taught one year at the Douglasville (Ga.) High School and two years in the Georgetown (Ky.) Academy. In the fall of 1896 he entered Harvard University, taking his A.B. there in 1897 and his A.M. the following year. The same year he was appointed Master of English and Classics in the well-known Thacher School of California, and here he remained until 1904, when he became Acting Professor of English in Georgetown College, Ky. Y., May 15, 1914, and was buried at West Point. Miss.

Mr. Van Landingham was an uncommonly successful teacher, a keen literary critic, and a delightful interpreter of literature.

The gentleness of his nature, his sympathy, his wide culture, and his thorough training enabled him to bring out the subtler qualities of the great classics. He had, moreover, a fine sense for form. He was particularly gifted as a teacher of English composition. Himself a writer of charm, he had a sure feeling for the right word. He spent most of his energy in teaching others how to write, though he found time to contribute now and then some sketch or bit of criticism to periodicals, and he delivered a few literary addresses. There was something knightly about Van Landingham which made those who knew him feel that he had lived in thought with the rare spirits of his favorite poets. To those who knew him well he was a delightful companion, albeit to strangers he seemed perhaps somewhat shy and cold. As his colleague for six years, I came to regard him as a lovable and diligent soul, whose untimely taking off has left society and academic hall the poorer.

PHILIP KEYES WALCOTT was accidentally killed by a fall from his office window in New York on the morning of October 6, 1914. Walcott was born at Concord, Massachusetts, on December 11, 1877. His father was Honorable Charles Hosmer Walcott, of the class of 1870. His grandfather was Judge John Shepard Keyes, of the class of 1841, in whose home he was brought up, his mother having died soon after his birth. He was prepared at the Concord High School for Harvard College, which he entered in the fall of 1893. He was the youngest man in the class of 1897. He graduated cum laude, then studied two years at the Harvard Law School, after which he went to New York, where he entered the office of Peckham, Warner and Strong. Having taken further studies at the New York University Law School, he passed the New York bar examinations in June, 1900. In May, 1904, he associated himself with the firm of Delafield and Longfellow, - now Hawkins, Delafield and Longfellow, — becoming a member of the firm in 1912. He was a recognized expert in the law of municipal corporations, and his opinions with reference to the legality of public loans were accepted with respect by the authorities of many eastern cities who appealed to him for advice and guidance. On August 7, 1911, he married Anne Elizabeth Goedkoop, who survives him. Walcott's professional life was centered in New York, but his family associations with Concord and New England were strong. In 1904 he delivered the memorial address on the occasion of the 269th anniversary of Concord. He now lies at rest beside his parents in Sleepy Hollow.

The New York Sun, two days after the event, printed an editorial notice of his death, in the course of which the writer speaks of him as follows:—"Never was there a man whose joy

in living, whose vigorous, sustained and intelligent appreciation of men and affairs was more unmistakable, more thoroughly impressed on all about him... Not yet in middle life, Mr. Walcott had already earned an honorable position at the bar of this town. His interest in political and municipal affairs was constant, if deliberately inconspicuous. He was already a useful citizen, a young man of real promise."

Walcott was a man of strong individuality and of unusual gifts. He had great intellectual capacity, a retentive memory, a quick wit, and high spirits which made him an enlivening and stimulating companion. But the outward man did not quickly reveal the deeper and truer self which lay beneath. The gaiety and exuberance were often a mask for the sensitive spirit, or served to cover from too curious eyes the high ideals of honor by which he ever guided his life. The loss of his keen mind, striking personality, joyous spirit and affectionate loyalty makes life poorer for those to whom he gave his friendship.

THE summer of 1912 I attended the convention of the Deutsch-Amerikanischer Leherbund at Berlin. We were officially entertained by twenty of the largest cities in Germany and had a wonderful time. I am enclosing herewith my biography for the Class Report, although I suppose it will arrive too late to find a place. It is not my fault, however, as I received the form only two days ago. It had been sent to Russia, forwarded to me here, and apparently, from the looks of the envelope, been opened and censored by nearly every Government in Europe. As being especially suspicious, they had torn off my biography, pasted on the third page, as it had appeared in the previous Report.

It is a disappointment to me not to be with you for our reunion and I had counted on being able to come, until the United States actually entered the war. Then of course there was no question of leaving posts at such a time, and I expect there will be many

of the Class who will be kept away for similar reasons.

With kindest regards to you and to all classmates, and with best wishes for a successful Reunion,

As stated in the fourth Class Report, I was appointed Secretary of Embassy in Petrograd, December, 1911, where I arrived in March, 1912, remaining four years until March, 1916. During those four years, I was, in the absence of an Ambassador, Chargé d'Affaires ad interim, during half of this period. During my Chargé-ship the war broke out, and the Embassy took over the charge of German and Austro-Hungarian interests in Russia, amounting to about 400,000 civilians, and later about 1,000,000 prisoners of war. The office hours during that time averaged about eighteen hours per day.

The American Colony, being strongly pro-Ally, founded a hospital for wounded Russian soldiers, and of this hospital I was Chairman until my departure from Russia. The Hospital was of 50 beds, all nursing and work connected with it being performed by American volunteers of the colony, and it was

shown as the model small military hospital in Russia.

In January, 1915, I visited the eastern war front, staying in Warsaw, which was daily bombarded by aeroplanes. This was after the second repulse of the Germans, but they were only 30 miles away. I went out to the German lines as far as was safe for a non-combatant, and visited many of the Polish towns—or rather heaps of ruins—which the Germans had totally destroyed in their retreat. I also visited the great military hospitals, one of 2000 beds, with a steady stream of wounded arriving from the front.

In January, 1916, I was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Madrid, and reached that post in March, 1916, traveling via southern Russia, Roumania, Austria, Germany, Switzerland, and France, — 16 days from Petrograd to Madrid, traveling as fast as war conditions allowed.

In the summer of 1916, I spent two months in the United States, my first visit in six years. In October, 1916, I was promoted to the grade of Counselor of Embassy.
