

The Pecans are today a great revenue to our citizens of Louisiana. The Figs, a great market for the preserves, and a great demand for Satsuma Oranges. Everyone of these fruits grow very luxuriantly in any part of the south. There are many other fruits that we could advise planting in the south that would help the man on the farm. In addition to this of course all the different varieties of vegetables as listed in this catalogue. At a small expense you can get a canning machine to can your surplus vegetables for home use. ORDER EARLY. It will be greatly to your advantage to send us your orders as soon as you have had the time to make your selection. This assures you prompt shipments from our complete stocks and avoids any possible delays incident to the "Rush Season."

IN ORDERING follow catalog prices. They include prepayment of postage on all seeds ordered by packet, ounce, quarter-pound, pound and five-pound lots, unless otherwise specifically stated. If the order is to be sent by express or freight, deduct five cents per pound from prices given. Larger quantities than five pounds will be sent by express or freight, the customer paying such charges. To figure the cost of postage on flowering plants and trees, add 15 per cent to the list price.

THE POSTAGE TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES must be added to the cost of the goods selected in this catalogue, or the order will be reduced to allow for the postage. These rules will also apply to orders from the United States where no postage allowance is made for mailing, or we will send by express.

CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA. Postage Rate, 14c per lb.

PANAMA. Limit Weight, 50 lbs. Postage Rate, 12c per pound.

CUBA. Limit Weight, 4 lbs. 6 oz. Postage Rate, 2c per ounce. First class mail only.

CANAL ZONE. Limit Weight, 50 lbs. Postage Rate, 12c per pound.

MEXICO. Limit Weight, 20 lbs. Postage Rate, 13c per pound, plus sur charges, 5c.

Where it is not possible to secure these, Currency or U. S. Postage Stamps in good order will be accepted. If you send a check on a Country Bank, add 10c EXTRA FOR EXCHANGE. All letters containing currency or stamps should be registered to insure safe delivery. WHEN GOODS ARE ORDERED C. O. D. HALF THE AMOUNT MUST ACCOMPANY THE ORDER. LIVE STOCK, PLANTS AND TREES WILL NOT BE SENT C. O. D.

WHEN ORDERING, write your name plainly, give correct P. O. address if by mail; if by express, give your express office or nearest express office, to avoid any delay, if by rail or boat, give station or landing, and if possible the name of the railroad or name of boat. Where no instructions are given as to how shipments should be made, we will use our own discretion; but we urge all customers to state plainly whether they want goods mailed, expressed or shipped by boat or by rail. As all shipments by boat must be prepaid, customers not known to us must remit enough to cover freight.

## Steckler's Artichokes

- 1. LARGE GREEN GLOBE. French grown. Culture—Planting time Southern States. Sow seed in seed bed in December to June, about 1½ oz. of seed to 150 feet of row 3 inches apart in the row and rows about 1 foot apart (will produce about 150 plants.) Cover about ½ inch with earth. Transplant in October to open ground about 1½ feet apart in rows and rows about 3 feet apart.
- 2. JERUSALEM OR GROUND ARTICHOKES (a tuber.) Plant whole tubers 10 to 12 bushels to the acre, and cultivate like potatoes; production 200 to 500 bushels per acre. Used both for table and stock feed. Planted after danger of frost is over, usually after April 15th.



Culture—Planting time, Southern States. Sow seed January to April in seed bed about 4 ounces of seed to 150 feet of row. 2 inches deep in rows 18 inches apart (will produce about 800 plants.) Transplant to specially prepared Asparagus beds December to February about 12 inches deep, 24 inches apart in rows about 4 feet apart. Send for book on Asparagus Culture, \$1.31, postpaid.

3. MARY WASHINGTON. Result of development by U. S. Department of Agriculture to produce a rust-resisting, vigorous strain of Giant Asparagus.

Mary Washington Asparagus


## Steckler's Garden Beans

Culture—Planting time. Southern States—Spring January to May; Fall, August to November. Plant 1 pound to 150 feet of row, 1¼ bushels to one acre; drop two beans every two or three inches in rows 1½ feet apart, cover about one inch with earth. Average production green beans about 100 bushels per acre.

#### SNAP BEANS, DWARF OR BUSH-GREEN PODDED BEANS

Height of bush 15 to 25 inches. All varieties marketed as green beans except Red Kidney and White Navy or Boston which are left to mature.



- 22. FORDHOOK BUSH LIMA. 77 days to edible condition. An improved dwarf lima, sometimes called Potato Bush Lima, plants are vigorous and erect, pods produced in large clusters, medium green, a popular variety for home and marketing purposes.


- 5. BLACK VALENTINE or BLACK CREASEBACK. 75 days to edible condition. Thrifty and extremely prolific, yields better than other varieties of pole beans, thick, stringless pods, meaty, tende and excellent flavor, perfectly round. Excellent for shipping and for home use.
- 6. IMPROVED KENTUCKY WONDER or OLD HOMESTEAD. 68 days to edible condition. Early very prolific sort of excellent quality. Vines are vigorous, very productive, comparatively straight. Best quality for home use and for shipping purposes.

  7. McCASLAN. 80 days to edible condition. Pods very long, flat and brittle, an excellent pole bean for all purposes.
- S. STRIPED CREASEBACK. 73 days to edible condition. A very hardy and productive green podded bean. Pods are long, very cylindrical or completely rounded, distinctly crease-backed, very fleshy and of excellent quality. Very good for shipping and home consumption.

- 0. WHITE CREASEBACK. 75 days to edible condition. Green podded variety, valuable for its earliness, vigorous grower, pods are medium length, comparatively straight. They are of the best quality for shipping and home consumption.



Culture—Planting time, Southern States. Spring, January to July; Fall, September to December. Edible condition about 62 days from time of planting seed. Plant 2 ounces to 150 feet of row, 12 pounds to one acre. Sow in thick rows about 12 inches apart or sow broadcast and thin to about 10 inches apart.

CHICAGO EARLY BLOOD TURNIP. Oval shape, dark red flesh, smooth skin, a favorite among private and market gardeners. Extensively used for canning and shipping.

- 39. CROSBY'S EARLY EGYPTIAN. Beets globe shaped, center of best light blood red, tender, excellent eating. Grown extensively by market gardeners in South for shipping and home use.
- 40. DETROIT DARK RED. Beets oval shaped, flesh of beet very dark red, an excellent variety for shipping and eating. A favorite of many large Southern market gardeners. Excellent for canning and shipping.
- 1. EARLY BLOOD TURNIP. Beet top shaped, dark red flesh, perhaps the most popular in the South for the small and the large gardener.
  - 2. WONDER BEET. One of the earliest of table beets for out side culture. Bright red skin, vermilion red flesh with distinct zones of lighter red. Of excellent quality being sweet, tender and free from fibrous roots, good shipping and canning variety.
  - 43. ECLIPSE. Beets globe shaped, small top, dark red, sweet and fine grained flesh, very popular. Especially used for home and shipping.
  - 4. EDMOND'S EARLY BLOOD TURNIP.....Oval shaped, deep blood Crosby's Extra Early skin, dark flesh, small tap roots and small top. Its popularity increases as gardeners plant it. Excellent for shipping purposes and very desirable.

## Steckler's Sugar and Stock Beets

Culture—Planting time, Southern States. Spring, January to July; Fall, September to December. Sow 4 or 5 pounds to one acre in rows 2 to 3 feet apart. When 4 or 5 inches high thin to 12 to 15 inches apart in rows. Ready for harvest about 75 days after planting of seed.

GOLDEN TANKARD. Yellow golden flesh, very nutritious, excellent for stock food. Very broad shouldered and short rooted.

2. LONG RED MANGEL. Flesh white with reddish tinge. Heavy yields, 18 to 24 inches long, about 6 inches in diameter. We recommend this as the best variety of stock beet.

As the best variety of sectors been safe where the sectors have united in recommending this as possessing the highest sugar producing qualities, as much as 18 tons of sugar having been made from 100 tons of root of this variety. We highly recommend it also feeding.

4. WHITE FRENCH HALF SUGAR MANGEL. Grown extensively in the South both for stock feeding and for sugar, an excellent variety. Roots are oval shape with smooth, clean skin and grow with the tops of the bulbs two or three inches above ground and consequently are easily pulled. We recommend a general planting of both this and the Klein Wanzleben for they are both worth while on any farm where cows are kept.
