To the Class:

This book marks the seventh year since graduation. Although we had a successful Triennial in New Haven in 1940, the war made it necessary for us to cancel our Sexennial originally scheduled for June of 1943.

The purpose of this publication is to bring the Class history up-todate and to replace as far as possible the Sixth Reunion, which could not be held. As members of Yale College and the Sheffield Scientific and Engineering Schools would all have attended such a reunion together, it was accordingly decided to make this book a joint record.

We started compiling the information for this edition some months ago. It took a long time to collect the answers to our original questionnaires, and by the time we were ready to go to press, it was considered advisable to send out a follow-up card to make sure that any late information was included. Many men or their families answered all our questions, while some replied to none. In the latter cases information was taken whenever possible from records available at the Class Secretaries Bureau.

DEATHS IN SERVICE

McINTOSH BROWN

For a time after leaving Yale Mac worked for the Chrysler Corporation in Detroit, and from 1940 until September, 1942, he was president and treasurer of the Insto-Gas Corporation of that city. He then went on duty as a Private in the Infantry and after basic training at Fort McClellan, Ala., was transferred to Fort Myles Standish, Mass., where he was stationed until going overseas. The ship in which he was sailing was torpedoed and sunk in the North Atlantic on February 3, 1943. He was first reported missing, but official word of his death was announced in April. Mac was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart.

Surviving him are two sisters, one of whom is the wife of Alexander L. Wiener, '31.

MARVIN COOKE

Marvin graduated from the Yale Medical School in 1941 and during the following year interned at the Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, N.Y. He entered the Army Medical Corps as a First Lieutenant on July 28, 1942, and after a short period of training at Camp Grant, Ill., was assigned to an Armored Division. In March, 1943, he received a promotion to Captain. His death occurred in France on July 18, 1944, as the result of wounds received in action. At the time he was wounded he was with the Medical Detachment of an Armored Reconnaissance Battalion.

Warren Cooke, '30 S., is his brother.

WILLIAM STAMPS FARISH, JR.

From the time he left Yale until going on active duty as a Second Lieutenant in the Army Air Forces in August, 1942, Bill was connected with the land department of the Navarro Oil Company of Houston, Texas. He served as a Service Pilot at Miami for eight months and upon his promotion to First Lieutenant in April, 1943, was appointed an instructor at Ellington Field. Later he served in the same capacity at Kelly and Randolph fields, after which he was assigned to duty at the Waco (Texas) Army Air School. He lost his life in the crash of a training plane at an air show at Waxahachie, Texas, on May 16, 1943.

Bill's marriage to Mary Stovall Wood took place June 18, 1938, in Chicago. She survives him with a son, William Stamps, 3d, born March 17, 1939, and he also leaves his mother and a sister.

CHARLES DAVID HORN

Charles entered the Harvard Medical School in the fall of 1937 and after receiving his M.D. degree in 1941 began a year's interneship at the Sinai Hospital in Baltimore. He continued there as an assistant resident until November, 1942, when he received a commission as a First Lieutenant in the Medical Corps, assigned to the Army Air Forces. Prior to going overseas in May, 1943, he was stationed at Miami Beach, MacDill Field, Tampa, Fla., Daniel Field, Augusta, Ga., and Hunter Field, Savannah, Ga. His death occurred in the South Pacific area on August 11, 1943.

Charles' marriage to Ann McAvoy took place January 31, 1942. She survives him, and he also leaves his parents and a sister.

FREDERICK MEARS, 3D

During 1937-38 Freddy attended the University of Washington Law School, and he then spent nine months as a special reporter at Coulee Dam for the Spokane Spokesman-Review. From October, 1939, to December, 1940, he was with the news service departments of the National and Mutual Broadcasting companies. On January 15, 1941, he entered the Naval Reserve as an Aviation Cadet, and after primary training at Floyd Bennett Field, N.Y., he had advanced training in carrier-based aircraft at Jacksonville and Miami. He received his wings and commission as Ensign on November 1, 1941, and during the next five months was stationed at San Diego, then being transferred to Honolulu. Freddy subsequently served with a Torpedo Squadron in the South Pacific, receiving a group citation for action at Midway and the Distinguished Flying Cross for "heroism and extraordinary achievement in aerial combat against enemy Japanese forces" in the Solomons. He was promoted to Lieutenant (j.g.) in October, 1942. In January, 1943, he was sent to the Puget Sound Naval Air Station at Whitby Island, being transferred from there to the San Diego Naval Air Station. He lost his life on June 26, 1943, when his plane crashed and burned near the Mexican border. His ashes were flown to sea with an aerial escort from the Sand Point Naval Air Station.

Freddy's book, *Carrier Combat*, which was published by Doubleday, Doran in January, 1944, has been very favorably received. He is survived by his mother and two sisters.

NORMAN STANLEY WOODS

Stan received his LL.B. at Yale in 1940 and then practiced law with his father in Lincoln until April, 1941, when he entered the Army as a Private at Camp Grant. He was subsequently stationed with an Infantry Regiment at Camp Forrest, Tenn., until March, 1942, and in January was promoted to Sergeant. In March he was transferred to the Army Air Forces and in June sent to Craig Field, Selma, Ala. That September he was appointed an Aviation Cadet and transferred to Maxwell Field. In November he was sent from there to the Southern Aviation School at Camden, S.C., and in April transferred again to Shaw Field, S.C. From there he was sent to Freeman Field, Seymour, Ind., where he received his wings and a commission as Second Lieutenant in July, 1943. Following this he had six weeks' training in flying B-24's at Smyrna Air Field near Nashville, Tenn. Stan was then assigned to a Troop Carrier Command and sent to Bergstrom Field, Texas, for operational training, later being stationed at Sedalia, Mo., Alliance, Nebr., Pope Field, N.C., and Baer Field, Fort Wayne, Ind. Early in March, 1944, he flew to England as Chief Pilot in a Troop Carrier plane. He was killed in an airplane crash in England on April 23.

Stan is survived by his parents and two brothers, Dick H. Woods, '38 L., and Robert J. Woods, '42.

MISSING IN ACTION

ALONZO PELTON ADAMS, 3D

Alonzo, who entered the Army in July, 1941, became an Aviation Cadet in December, 1941. After undergoing training at various fields, he received his commission as Second Lieutenant in the Army Air Forces in August, 1942. He was promoted to First Lieutenant the following January and about the middle of May piloted his plane with full crew to England. He was reported missing over Germany on June 12, 1943, while acting as Pilot of a B-17.

Alonzo's wife, whose maiden name was Margaret Patricia Keating, is making her home in Loudonville, N.Y.

WILLIAM McFERREN

Mac was associated with the American Can Company in Chicago from graduation until May, 1941. He then went on active duty in the Quartermaster Corps at Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyo., where he became a Sergeant after two months and subsequently acted as an instructor. In December, 1941, he transferred to the Air Corps and began Pilot training at Visalia, Calif. He remained there until April, 1942, and then took Navigation training at Mather Field, Calif. Mac received his commission as Second Lieutenant on January 2, 1943, and in April, 1943, went overseas as Squadron Navigator of nine Liberators. He had had over two hundred hours of combat in the Southwest Pacific area prior to the time he was reported missing in action on October 26, 1943. He had been promoted to First Lieutenant on September 1. On July 4, 1944, it was announced that Mac had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the citation reading as follows: "For meritorious achievement while participating in sustained operational flight missions in the South Pacific area, during which hostile contact was probable and expected. These operations consisted of bombing missions against enemy airdromes and installations and attacks on naval vessels and shipping. The courage and devotion to duty displayed during these flights are worthy of commendation."

Bill's marriage to Elizabeth Garvey took place on January 2, 1943. She and their son, William, 3d, are living in Hoopeston, Ill., with Bill's parents.

DEATHS (CIVILIAN)

RETURN JONATHAN MEIGS ALTIZER

Jon's death occurred on January 28, 1938, in Charleston, W.Va. He had been ill since leaving college in 1936. He was buried in Clarksburg, W.Va. His mother and three brothers survived him.

SHACKELFORD BAUER

Shack spent the summer of 1937 in Geneva as a member of the American Committee of the League of Nations Association. From April to September, 1938, he held a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship in radio education with the National Broadcasting Company in New York City. He had contributed several articles to magazines.

His death occurred on December 25, 1938, in New York City, following a three months' illness due to an intestinal ailment. The burial was in Ferncliff Cemetery, Scarsdale, N.Y. His parents and a sister survived him.

FREDERICK WILDER BELLAMY, JR.

Upon graduating from Yale, Babe became a statistician in the brokerage firm of Dominick & Dominick in New York, in which his father was senior partner. His marriage to Eleanore Hayden Darling took place on November 6, 1937.

He died in New York City on October 30, 1938, of cancer of the lung, and was buried in St. Matthew's Churchyard, Bedford, N.Y. In 1940 a group of his classmates established the F. Wilder Bellamy, Jr., Memorial Prize Fund at Yale in his memory. In addition to his wife, Babe was survived by his parents and two brothers. His widow was married on July 2, 1940, to William Everdell, 3d (LL.B. Yale 1940).

JOHN WHITE BISSELL

Jack, who received his B.A. at Yale in 1938, taught European history and mathematics at The Loomis School the following year and during 1939-40 was an instructor in history and political science at Marot Junior College in Thompson, Conn. He was drowned in a boating accident on the Smoke River in Idaho on August 15, 1940. Cremation took place in Spokane, Wash. Surviving him are his parents and two brothers, Leslie D. Bissell, Jr., *ex-*'32, and James C. Bissell, '35.

RONALD MUIRHEAD BYRNES, JR.

During 1930–37 Ronny worked for Arthur Kudner & Company in New York, after which he was at the Northwood School for a year. He was then employed by the United Insurance Agency at West Memphis, Ark., until April, 1941, when he opened the Bob Byrnes Insurance Agency in Marion, Ark. In September, 1942, he entered the C.P.T. war training service and the next March began instructing at Helena, Ark. He was killed in a plane crash near Marion on May 4, 1943. At the time of his death he was awaiting a transfer to civilian instructorship at an Air Corps Primary Training School.

Ronnie's marriage to Baylus A. Bond took place on May 17, 1940. She survives him with two sons, Ronald Muirhead, 3d, born March 25, 1941, and William Harwood, born October 26, 1942. He also leaves his father and a brother.

ERNEST PRITCHARD CHRISTNER

From 1938 to October, 1941, Ernie worked for the Great Northern Railway, at first at Klamath Falls, Ore., later at Fargo, N.Dak., and subsequently at St. Paul, Minn. He then entered the Army, until December 5 being stationed at Fort Snelling, Minn. From there he was transferred to Fort Monmouth, N.J., and in March, 1942, entered the Officer Candidate School at that post. He was hospitalized three weeks before he was to be commissioned and on September 15, 1942, received a medical discharge, after which he returned to his former position with the Great Northern Railway.

He died in Montclair, N.J., September 8, 1943, of Hodgkins disease, and was buried in Mount Hebron Cemetery in that place. His parents and a brother survive him.

NORRIS RATHBUN HIGGINS

Hig graduated from the Yale Medical School in 1941 and was subsequently on the staff of the Orange (N.J.) Memorial Hospital, at first as an interne and then as a resident physician. He had served on the Emergency Medical Service of the Orange Defense Council. Hig's death, which was due to pneumonia, occurred in Orange on October 20, 1943. He was buried in Maplewood Cemetery, Norwich, Conn.

On July 8, 1939, he was married at Grand Haven, Mich., to Jane Peter. She survives him with a daughter, Nancy Claire, born November 3, 1941. He also leaves a brother, a sister, three half brothers, and an adopted sister.

JAMES McCREATH, 2D

Jim became associated with the Procter & Gamble Manufacturing Company at Staten Island, N.Y., shortly after graduation. His death, which occurred on November 14, 1937, was due to uremia, following second and third degree burns received in an industrial accident at their plant. The interment was in the Harrisburg (Pa.) Cemetery.

Jim was unmarried. Surviving him are his parents and a brother, Lesley McCreath, Jr., '35 S.

CHARLES HENRY MELLON, JR.

From 1935 to 1940 Heinie was connected with the Fulton Trust Company of New York City. He had developed tuberculosis and in 1940 went to Colorado Springs, where his death occurred on September 14, 1943. The interment was in Morristown, N.J.

On September 22, 1936, his marriage to Katharine Hazard Moss took place in New York City; they were divorced in March, 1943. They had a son, Charles Henry, 3d, who was born April 14, 1938. Heinie is also survived by his parents and a sister.

JOHN MORSE

John became connected with Fairbanks, Morse & Company soon after graduating from Yale. He spent some time in Montreal and was subsequently located in Australia, Africa, and Samoa, where he did engineering work in connection with island air bases. From 1938 to April, 1939, he was assistant manager of the marine Diesel engine division of his company in New York City, and he then became assistant to the vice-president in charge of sales in Chicago. He remained there until April 1, 1941, when he was transferred to San Francisco as assistant branch manager. John held a commission as Ensign in the Supply Corps of the Naval Reserve.

His death on August 22, 1941, at Sausalito, Calif., was due to injuries received in an automobile accident. He was buried in Oak Woods Cemetery, Chicago. In addition to his parents, he was survived by a sister and two brothers.

EDWIN EDMONDS REDFERN

After leaving Yale, Eddie went to work for the American Lace Paper Company of Milwaukee, becoming assistant manager of the sales department. He died in Rochester, N.Y., on January 13, 1938, of lymph sarcoma, and was buried in Mount Hope Cemetery in that city. His mother survived him.

JAMES LANE SHALER

During 1937-38 Shay did graduate work in government at Harvard. He subsequently took a position as assistant to the sales manager of the African Metals Corporation in New York City and continued in this connection until his death.

He died in Washington, D.C., on March 2, 1940, as the result of coronary occlusion, and was buried in Fort Lincoln Cemetery in that city. He was survived by his parents, a brother, and a sister.

EDWIN MAXWELL WIGLEY

Ed entered the employ of the Prudential Insurance Company of America in Newark, N.J., upon graduating from Yale and continued with them until his death, which occurred suddenly in East Orange, N.J., on May 9, 1940. He was buried in the Elmwood Cemetery in Norwich, Conn.

Ed, who was unmarried, was survived by his parents.

BIOGRAPHIES

ARTHUR AARON; Box 858, Connellsville, Pa.

On October 15, 1940, Art reported as an Apprentice Seaman for a thirty-day cruise on a battleship. He entered Annapolis on February 15, 1941, as a Midshipman (V-7 Class A) and on May 15 of that year was commissioned an Ensign. In June he reported to the Navy Base at San Diego and about a year later was assigned to sea duty. In June, 1942, he was promoted to Lieutenant (j.g.) and on March 1, 1943, to Lieutenant, then being sent back to the States for further training at Moffett Field, Calif. At present he is serving as a Blimp Pilot with the Navy Air Force. Art attended the Harvard Business School after graduating from Yale and received an M.B.A. degree there in 1939.

GARDNER ABBOTT, JR.; 2531 North Park Boulevard, Cleveland, Ohio. Married February 14, 1942, to Nancy Lee Masten; one son, Gardner, 3d.

Gardy's report follows: "In 1940 I went to work for the Bruce McBeth Engine Company in Cleveland, and after about six months in the factory I was sent to Texas as a salesman. I stayed in Texas until June, 1941, when I volunteered for active duty and was assigned to the Headquarters and Headquarters Squadron of the Air Force Combat Command as an Administrative Officer. I stayed with the Squadron until September, 1942, when I transferred to the Air Transport Command and was sent by them to the Air Force Intelligence School at Harrisburg, Pa. After graduating from there, I was sent to the North Atlantic Wing of the A.T.C. and was Assistant Wing Intelligence Officer until the end of February, 1943, when I was transferred to my present base. I was promoted to the rank of Captain in May, 1942, and hold that rank at the present time."

LOUIS C. ACQUARULO; 496 Chapel Street, New Haven, Conn.

After graduating from the Yale Medical School in 1941, Ac interned at St. Francis Hospital in Hartford. He received a commission as First Lieutenant in the Medical Corps in July, 1942, and after being stationed at Camp Grant, Ill., for five months, was assigned to the Halloran General Hospital on Staten Island.

MORGAN ADAMS, JR.; 1390 Ridge Way, Pasadena, Calif.

Morg has been on active duty in the Naval Reserve since October, 1940, and in recent months has been in the South Pacific area. His original rank was that of Ensign, but he now ranks as Lieutenant and is serving as Executive Officer of his ship. RICHARD F. ALEXANDER; 164 North 15th Street, East Orange, N.J. Married November 8, 1942, to Ethel Baldwin.

Alex, who is doing chemical engineering work for the Government, was formerly a construction engineer with duPont and in this connection was associated with the construction of the Indiana, Alabama, and Longhorn Ordnance Works and also spent a short time on the production of synthetic rubber chemicals. In May, 1942, on account of his civilian duties, he resigned his commission as a Second Lieutenant in the Engineer Reserve.

WILLIAM J. ALFORD, 3D; 283 West Ridgewood Avenue, Ridgewood, N.J. Married June 24, 1939, to Susan Rebecca Stewart; two sons, William John, 4th, born September 25, 1941, and Walter Stewart.

For the past few years Bill has been connected with the Continental Paper Company of Ridgefield Park, N.J., as assistant treasurer. Previously he was with the Southern Kraft Corporation in South Carolina.

R. CRATEN ALLEN, JR.; 349 Aurora Street, Hudson, Ohio. Married September 28, 1940, to Janet Holden; one daughter, Nancy Holden.

From January, 1941, to April, 1942, Cake was in Philadelphia with E. J. Lavino & Company (mining, shipping, importing, metallurgy). He then entered the U.S.N.R. as a Lieutenant (j.g.) and, except for two months at the Quonset Naval Air Station, has since been stationed in New York. He now ranks as Lieutenant.

WILBUR M. ALLING, JR.; 115 East 92d Street, New York City. Married June 1, 1940, to June Wood Meder; son, Wilbur M., 3d, born November 9, 1942.

Bill has been with his father's firm since September, 1937, and since a severe illness of his father's in February, 1941, he says, he has been trying to run the business—a hosiery mill agency. Bill is a recruit in the New York State Guard.

FREDERICK B. ALOFSIN; 118 Walnut Avenue, Ardmore, Pa. Married June 18, 1939, to Eleanor Deborah Brodsky; daughter, Iris Ruth.

Fred received a commission as Ensign in the Naval Reserve on September 25, 1942, and has since been promoted to Lieutenant (j.g.). After receiving his commission in Boston, he was sent to the Princeton Naval School and then to Yorktown, Va., later being stationed in Boston and Maine. At present he is stationed out of New York. Before the war he had studied law at Harvard for three years and also held a fellowship at the Harvard Graduate School, and for a time he worked in the legal claims department of the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company. JOHN DEK. ALSOP; Wood Ford Farm, Avon, Conn.

In a report received in March, 1943, John said, "I was employed in the underwriting department of the investment banking firm of Smith, Barney & Company, 14 Wall Street, until February, 1942, when I resigned in expectation of joining the Royal Air Force. The course which the latter were planning was cancelled, however, for some reason or other, and I entered the Army *via* the draft on September 26, 1942. Received basic training at Fort Ontario and in due time was sent to Fort Custer to make an attempt at getting a commission."

He graduated there about April 10 as a Second Lieutenant in the Corps of Military Police and at present is on overseas duty.

MATTHIAS C. AMMANN; 213 East Main Street, Riverhead, N.Y.

No word has come from Mat since graduation, and we have no information about his current activities.

E. HORTON AMORY, JR.; 30 East 71st Street, New York City.

Hort entered the Army at Fort McClellan, Ala., in February, 1942. He was promoted to Corporal in April and on July 22 was sent to the Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Ga. Upon receiving his commission as Second Lieutenant on October 17, he was assigned to the 80th Division at Camp Forrest, Tenn.

JOHN AMOS; 51 Regent Road, Malden, Mass. Married May 22, 1943, to Jean Brown.

For several years after graduation Red was connected with the C. L. Amos Coal Company of Syracuse, N.Y., of which he became vice-president. He is now a pilot with American Air Lines.

JOSEPH C. ANDERSON; 32 Garfield Place, Ridgewood, N.J. Married September 10, 1938, to Martha Cushier Ferenbach; two children, Elspeth Barron, born April 26, 1941, and Lawrence DeForest.

Joe received a commission as Ensign, U.S. Naval Reserve, in January, 1942, and within a short time was promoted to Lieutenant (j.g.) and later to Lieutenant. He was assigned to the Bureau of Aeronautics in Washington until August, 1943, when he left for duty in the South Pacific. Prior to entering active duty in the Navy, he was with the Wright Aeronautical Corporation.

VIVIAN HAYES ANDERSON; 20 Belsaw Place, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Butch, who has been in the Navy for two years, is stationed in Washington, where he is assigned to the Bureau of Naval Personnel. He was promoted from Ensign to Lieutenant (j.g.) a while ago. After leaving New Haven, he studied law at Harvard.

JORGE R. ANDRÉ, JR.; 277 Park Avenue, New York City.

In October, 1940, Jorge joined Squadron A of the New York National Guard, which was called into Federal service as the 101st Cavalry in January, 1941. He was at Fort Devens for a time and was then at the Field Artillery Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill from June to September, 1942, after which he was assigned to a Field Artillery Regiment at Fort Bragg, N.C. In March, 1943, he was reassigned to Camp Phillips, Kansas. Jorge ranks as a First Lieutenant.

ARTHUR R. ANDREWS; 127 College Street, Buffalo, N.Y.; care L. H. Andrews, 162 East 80th Street, New York City. Married October 12, 1940, to Sally Childress.

When he wrote in April, 1943, Andy explained that he was ordering supervisor for the "Admiral" Marine Engine at the Sterling Engine Company of Buffalo and that he was working from fifty to seventy hours a week. He said that he expected to land in the Army before many more months had passed.

JOHN J. ANNES; A.A.F.N.S., San Marcos, Texas. Married June 28, 1939, to Ann Nemeth; two children, James John, born May 19, 1940, and Caroline Ann, born May 14, 1941.

Prior to going on active duty as a Private in the Army Air Forces in January, 1943, John was employed as an experimental machinist by the International Harvester Company. He had his pre-flight training at Marshall College, Huntington, W.Va., and started his training as an Aviation Cadet about May 1, 1943. This January he wrote that he was taking the advanced navigation course at San Marcos.

ROBERT S. ARBIB, JR.; 115 Lafayette Place, Woodmere, N.Y.

Bob is overseas as a Staff Sergeant with an Engineer Battalion. Before entering the Army two years ago, he was an advertising copy writer and ran a weekly column on birds for a newspaper. He also wrote "Bird Lore" for the Linnaean Society and served as secretary of the Long Island Bird Club.

CHARLES S. ARMS; 15712 Chadbourne Road, Shaker Heights, Ohio. Married July 3, 1939, to Elizabeth Lockwood Parcells; two sons, Myron Anthony, born March 16, 1941, and David, born July 2, 1943.

Chuck, who says that he is just one jump ahead of the draft, has been with Pickands, Mather & Company right along since graduation. In his report covering the past three years, Al said: "Contributing editor of *Time Magazine* until January, 1941, when I made my big mistake. Went to Jacksonville, where I took flight training, and was sent to San Diego in December, 1941, for advanced carrier training. Joined a Scouting Squadron in April, 1942, and was soon aboard one of the big carriers headed west. We saw our first action on August 7, giving air coverage to the Marine landing on Guadalcanal. Later that month saw more action in a carrier engagement in which our air group attacked and reportedly mortally wounded the Jap carrier *Ryuzo*. We flew ashore to one of our island bases around the end of August and then had a rather unpleasant five weeks of flying off Henderson Field on Guadalcanal. If we'd known what was coming, I don't think we'd have done our bombing quite so enthusiastically on August 7. They sent us home in November and now we're getting ready for an encore.

"Pete Peterkin was attached to another squadron in our Air Group and was on all those little journeys. So was Ben Grosscup, '35. Don McNeely was on our carrier, and Whitey Carhart was on the *Hornet*, which was in our Task Force for a while. Came back to the States on the same transport with Carhart, who was burned when a Jap plane crashed into his ship. He took me for \$1.37 on gin rummy—a game McNeely taught me, damn it. John Hersey, '36, lived in a tent with a couple of us on Guadalcanal, and I recommend all his writings on the subject of the definitive works—especially his book, *Into the Valley*, which for my dough rates with the best war stories of all time. And I don't own any Knopf stock."

In the fall of 1943 Al was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the citation reading as follows: "For heroism and extraordinary achievement as Pilot attached to Scouting Squadron 3 during action against enemy Japanese forces in the Solomon Islands Area, September 24 to October 14, 1942. Although attacked by two hostile float aircraft while engaging a destroyer off Choiseul Island, Ensign Wright, as wing man in a two-plane aerial search, courageously fought his Scout Bomber through heavy anti-aircraft fire to destructively bomb and strafe the enemy warship, damaging it seriously by a near miss. In addition to conducting numerous other searches over hazardous territory, Ensign Wright participated in aggressive attacks on a total of twenty-five vessels. By his outstanding airmanship and loyal devotion to duty, he contributed immeasurably to the damage which was inflicted on valuable hostile shipping."

When Al went on active duty he ranked as a Seaman (2d class). He received his appointment as Aviation Cadet in May, 1941, and the following December was appointed Ensign and received a Naval Aviator's rating. He is now a Lieutenant. He has just returned from another tour of active duty.

HENRY J. WRIGHT, JR.; 1424 Richmond Road, South Euclid, Ohio. Married March 22, 1941, to Almira Ford.

During 1940–41 Jack worked in the New York office of the Chevrolet Company, and the following year he was with the Kincaid Company. Hobbs, who is a Private (1st class) in the Army, is at present assigned to the Inter-American Defense Board in Washington. He is on leave from his position with Ph. Wunderle, Inc., of Philadelphia.
