teach Minnehaha the fine art of spontaneous laughing in C flat.

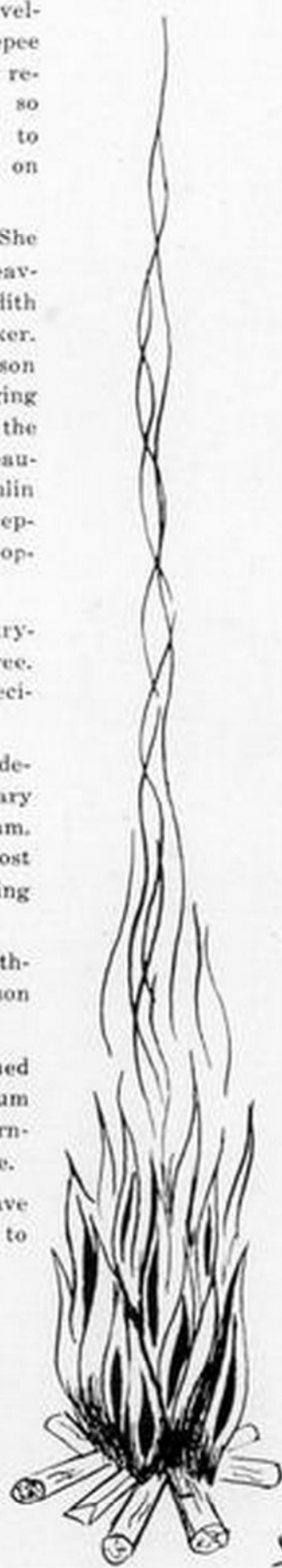

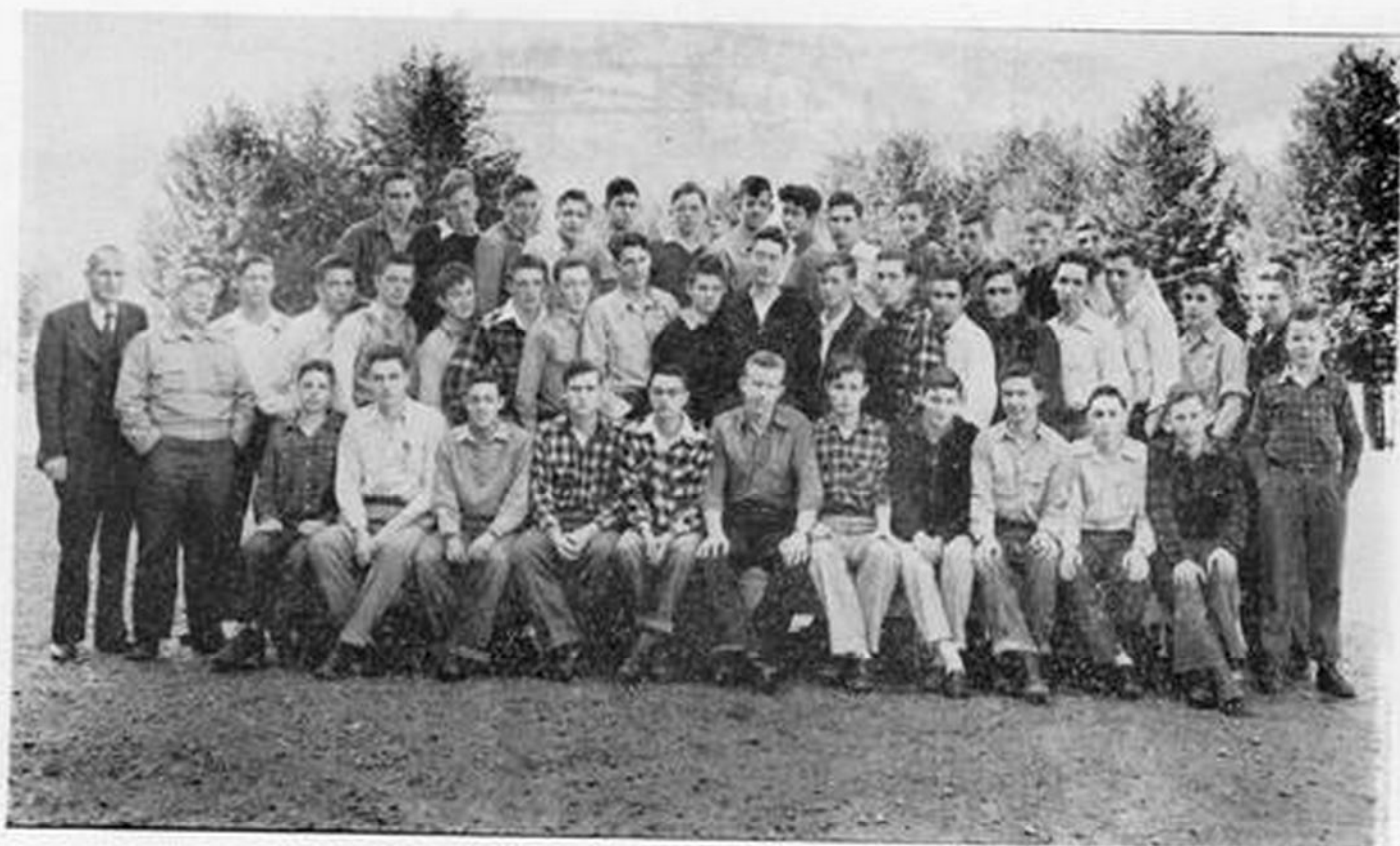

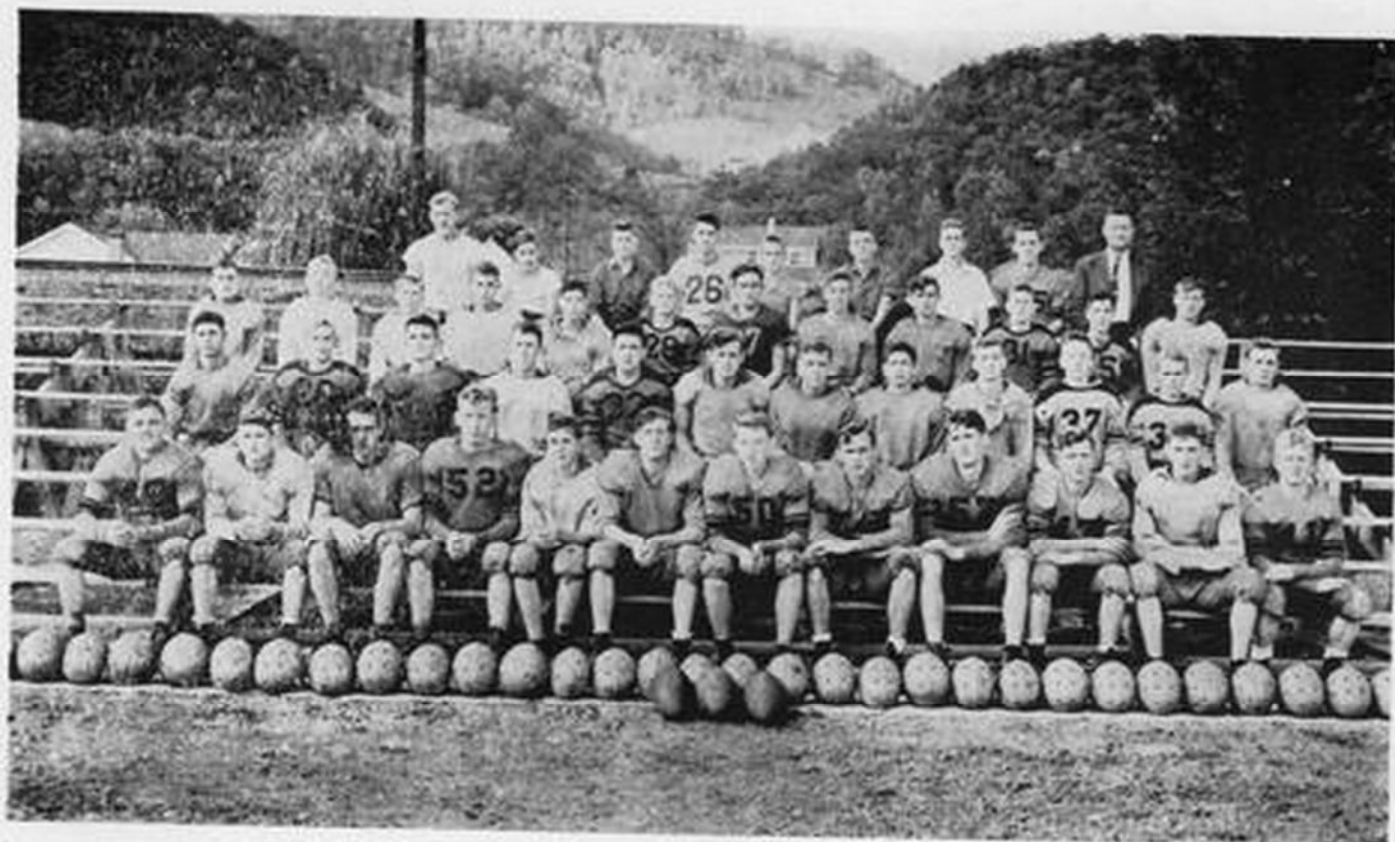
