

The library purchased many new publications this year and is quickly becoming a very up-to-date facility in which to work.





Does It All Add Up?

The math department offers eleven classes: Algebra I, II, and III, Trig., Geometry, General Math I and II, Tech. Math I and II, Shepherd College Trig., and Precalculus. The department's teachers are Mrs. McGee (department head), Mr. Tupper, and Mr. Lambert. Dr. Leary teaches the college credit classes.

Satellite Education offers three classes: Anatomy and Physiology, which is offered through the University of Alabama, Probability and Statistics, from the University of Kentucky, and Russian I, from the University of South Carolina.

Satellite Education is just like regular classes except students are in one place, learning via satellite, and the teacher is in another. The work that the students complete is sent to the supervisor to check and then sent back. Any student can pick up these courses on an individual basis; they are not yet offered in the regular curriculum. A student has to have an overall B average in order to take Russian.





French divided into four closses. The French students tested the skills against other schools in two separate competitions, the Bethany Foreign Language Festival and the county French Festival for students in French I and II.



"SPECIAL STUDIES"


Special Education is a class for students who have learning disabilities in specific subjects of school-work. This class furthers the students' skills in these areas so they will be better prepared for the future. Development of these skills helps the students to find jobs they are interested in and that they will enjoy do-ing.

The students were usually rewarded for their cooperation and hard work by having a field trip of some sort. Due to the lack of money, that was impossible to do this year. The Annual Special Education Picnic was held at the Seneca State Forest in return for their dedication.

The Enrichment Program is a form of special education also known as the Gifted Program. To be a part of this program, the students were tested in first grade, and their position is based upon their scoring.


The Enrichment Program allows students to progress faster and be exposed to more than regular classrooms. It also encourages independent study and opens more options to them. For example, a student may test out of a class by scoring high enough on a prepared test. If the student scores at a preset level, he does not have to take that required course.

Overall, the program consists of more individualized classes. All activities that are included are planned so that there is some valuable educational experience.





he business classes keyed in the beginning of a new and productive year. Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Rhea teamed up to teach about half of the student body in the school.



Office Technology was shortened from one block class, which consisted of two periods, to one period but is still highly recommended to those students wanting to enter into


a business career.










HILLBILLY **OLYMPICS**

The overall winners of Spirit Week 1989 were the seniors. But the real winner of Spirit Week was the entire school. Congratulations to all






"New Guy on the Block"
