A fleeting image of our lives

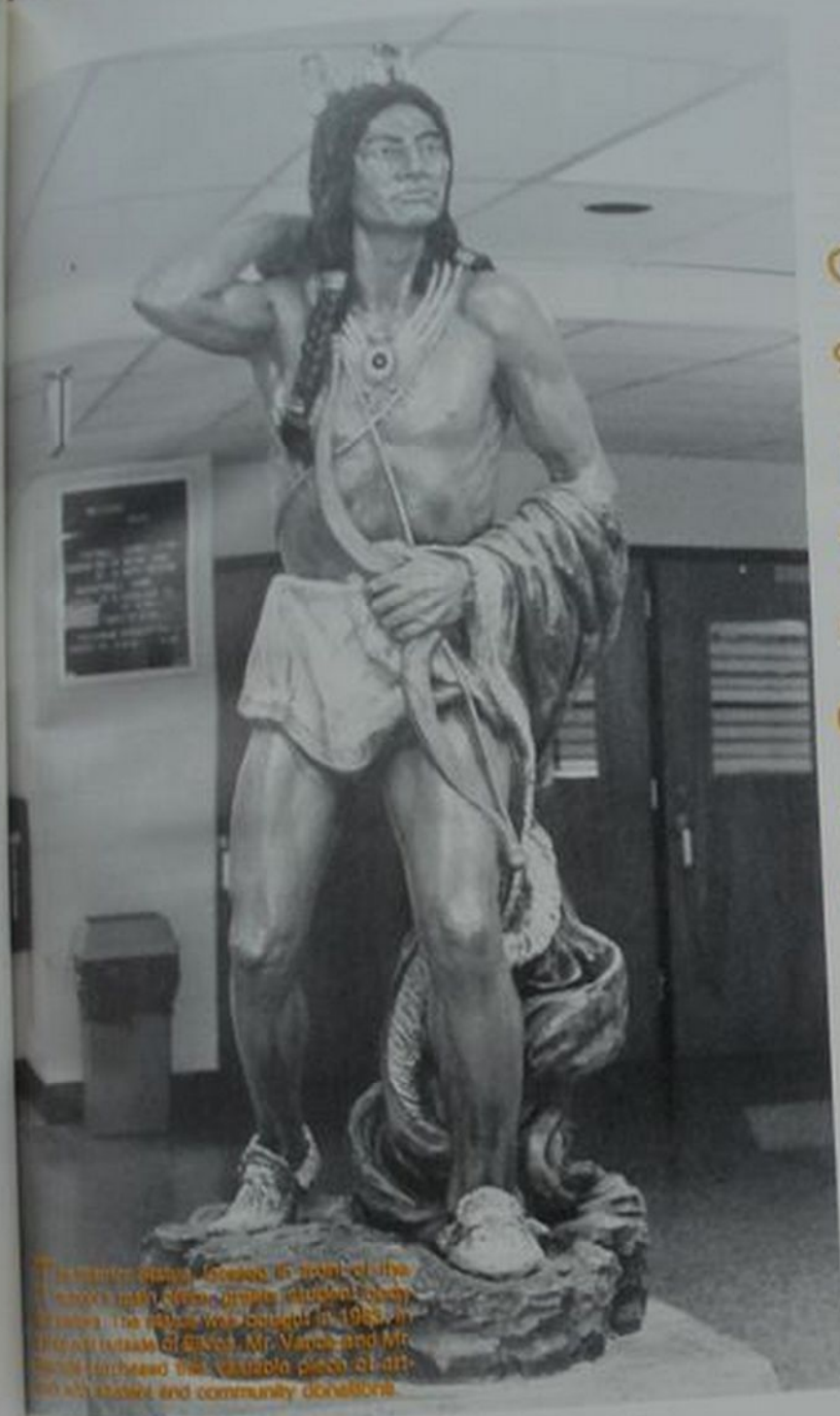
Still we push on

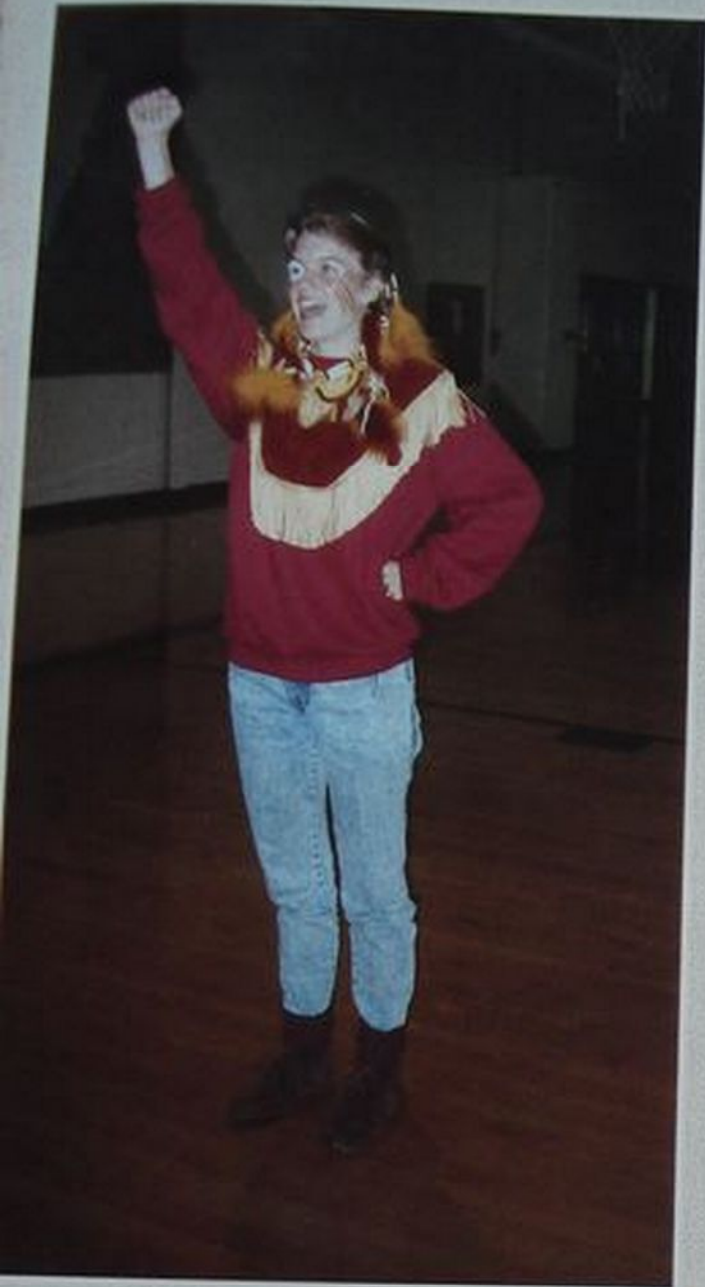

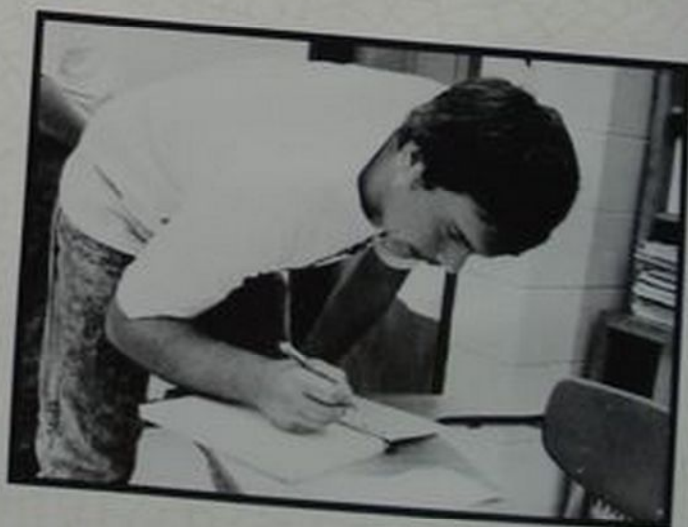

again, came out on top.

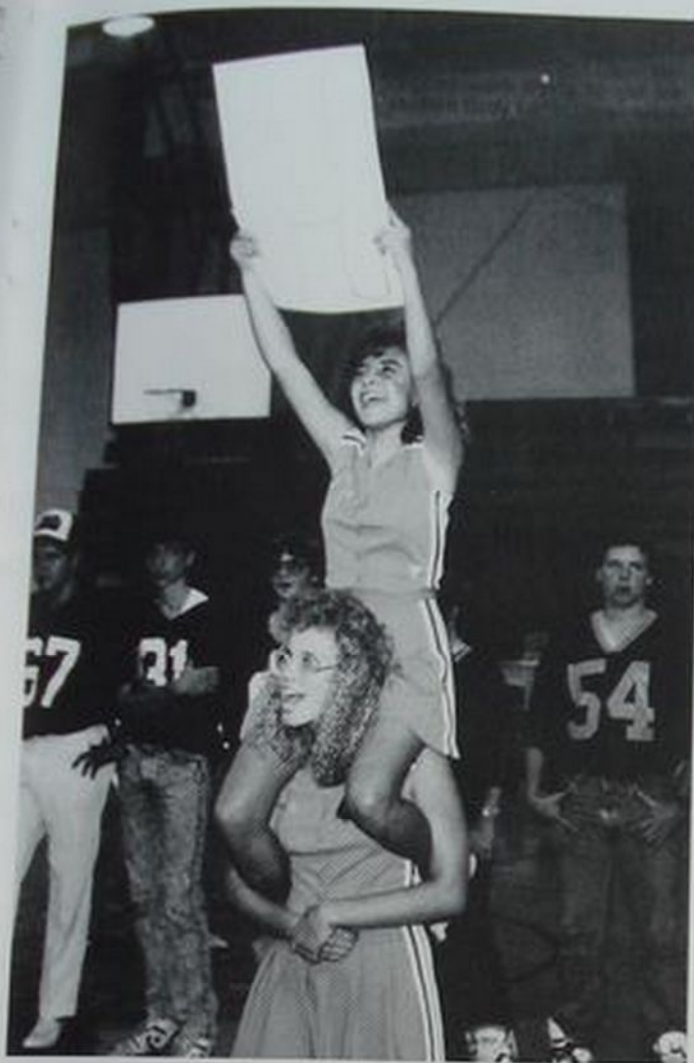
Friday was the big day!

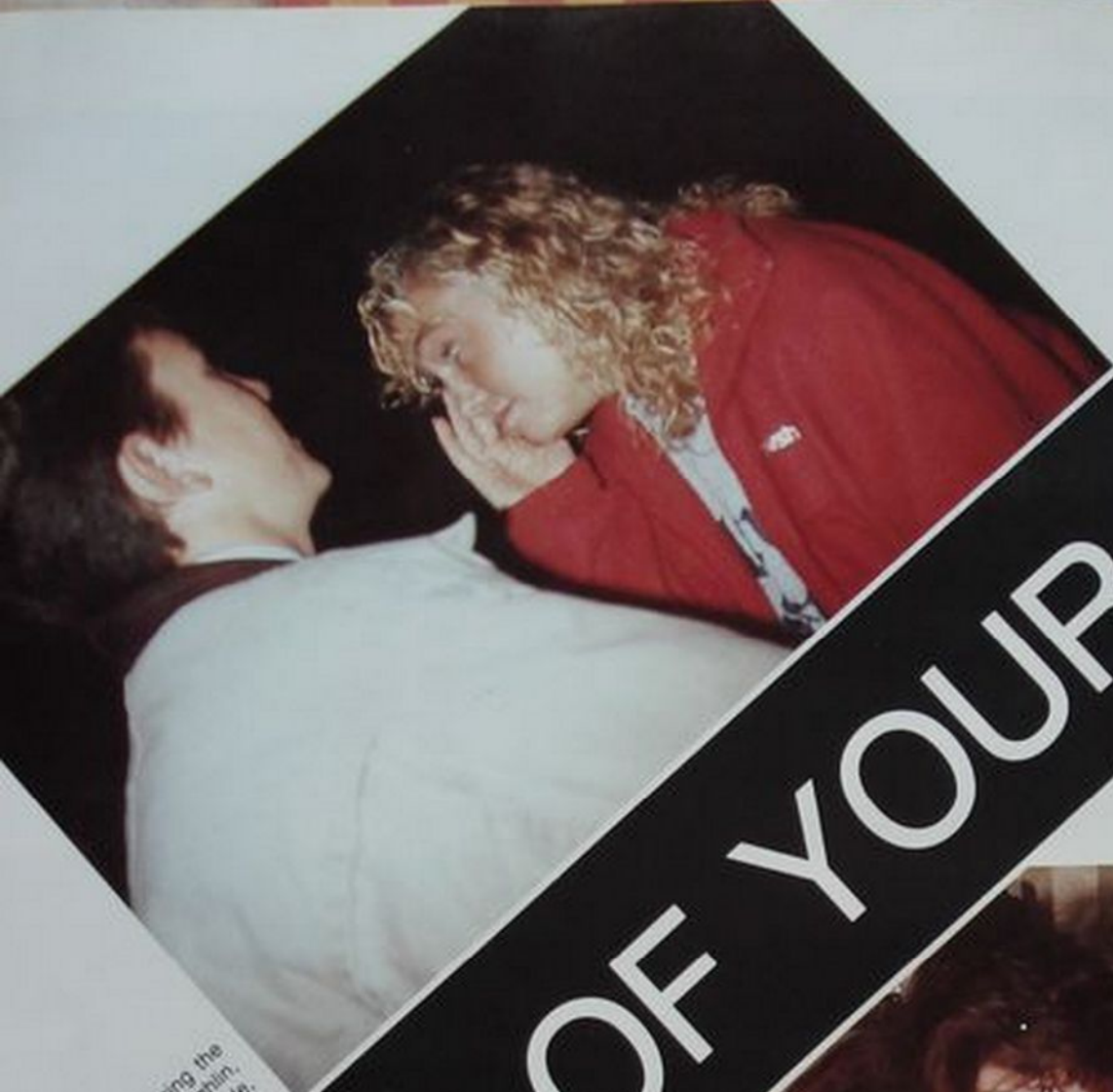

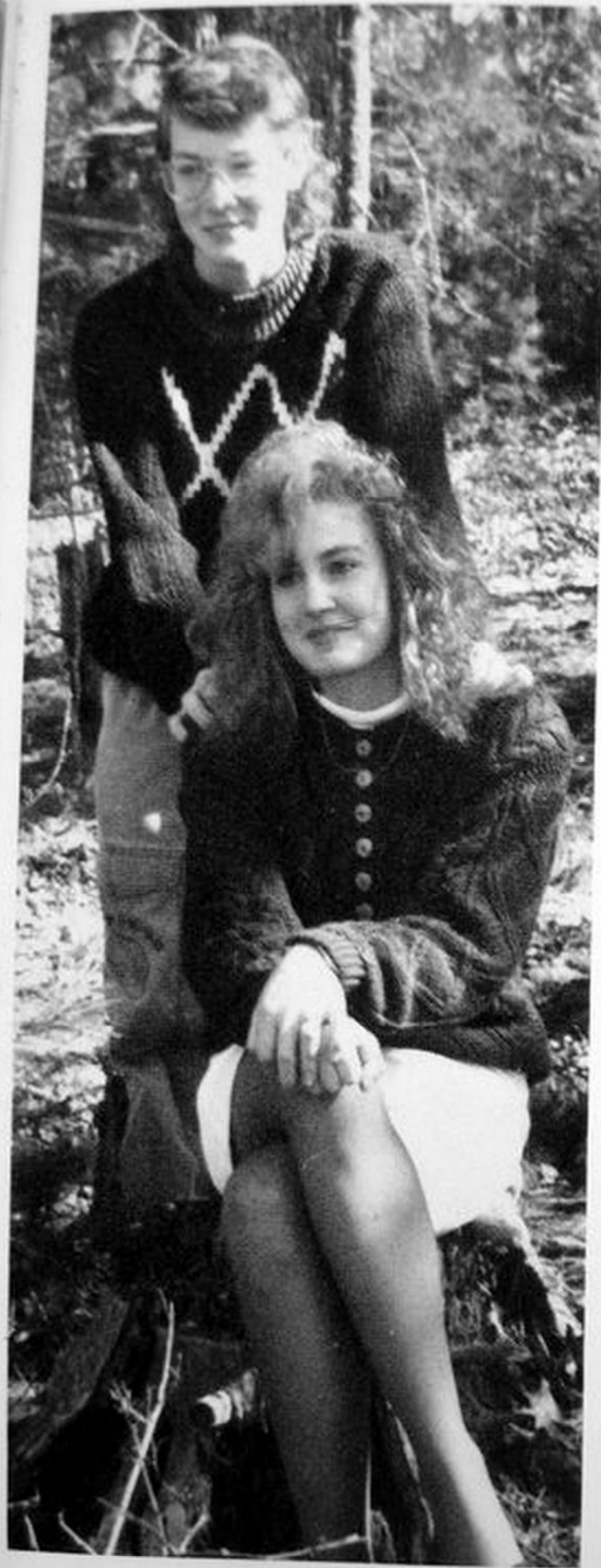

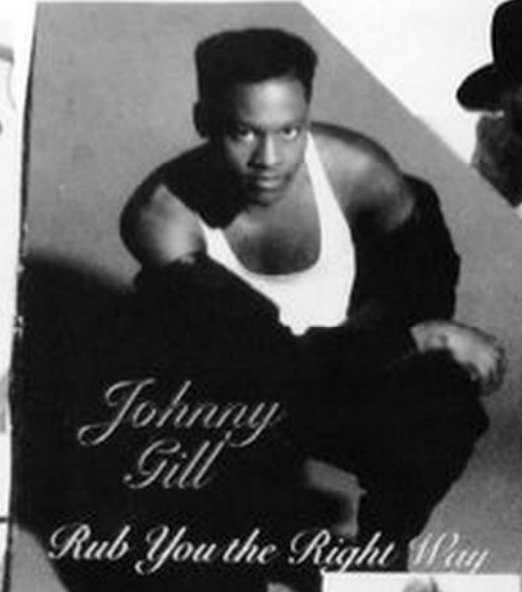

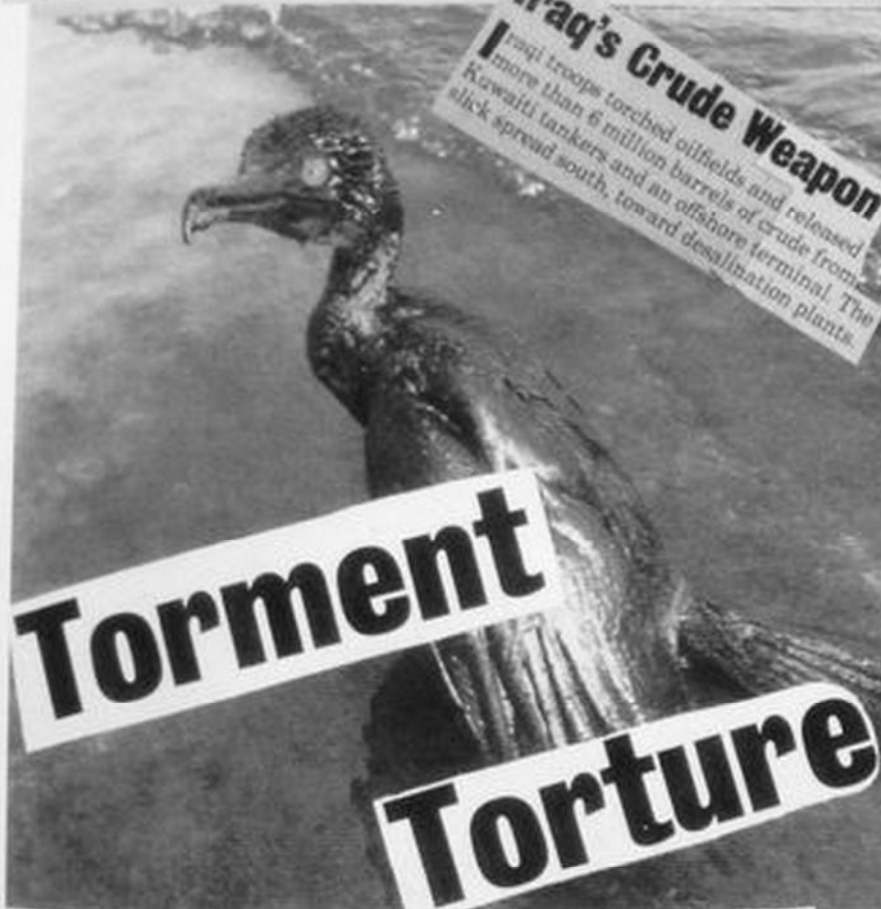

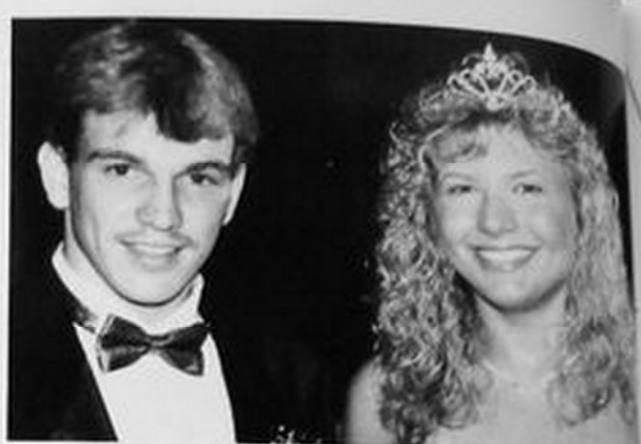
The evening began with a romantic dinner prepared by the chefs at the Resort. Junior class president Dana Cutlip and senior class president Matthew McKean welcomed

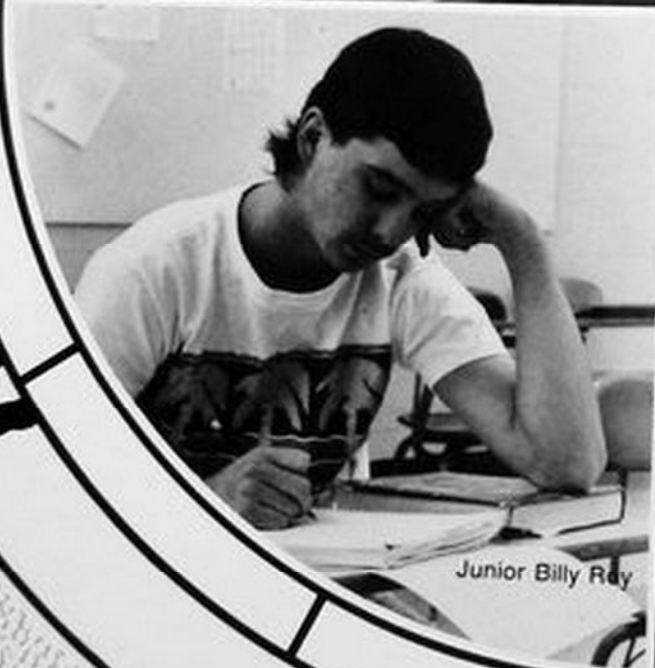

Help Me! The Instructional Resource Center offers supportive services to students who require extra help in vocational and academically related work. Mrs. Linda Beverage, Instructional Resource Center Coordinator, has been teaching at PCHS for 14 years. She also teaches adult courses.

Services offered through the learning center include diagnoses of reading and math levels, which could lead to planning and administering a remedial program to suit the individual's need. The learning center also assists vocational and classroom instructors when modification of instructional materials or tests is needed. It offers tutoring for individuals and small groups when needed upon advisement from the classroom teacher.

The Instructional Center also provides pre- and post-testing, materials, and instruction for those students who wish to work on a GED.

The center and its materials are available to the students and teachers throughout the school day. Mrs. Sue Shupe teaches Alternative Learning. This was developed to help students who have dropped out of school and returned and for those who aren't doing well in regular classes. Mrs. Shupe teaches employee ability skills and required classes for graduation.

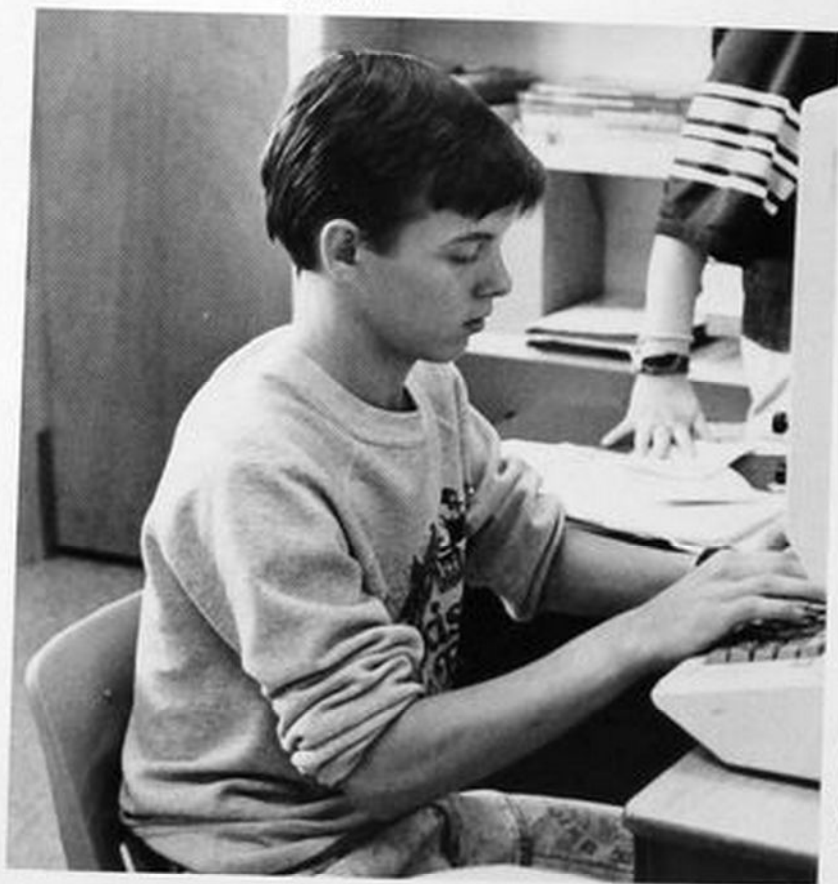

Special Education classes offer students with learning disabilities the opportunity to learn the basic skills needed in everyday life. The program is designed to teach students math, English, Home Economics, Social Studies, and Science and allow them to work at a pace suitable for themselves.

Students involved in the Special Education Program are rewarded for their work through trips to various places, made possible by their teachers Mrs. Taylor and Mr. Herold.

The Enrichment classes at P.C.H.S. are designed for students to pursue many independent projects or courses of

study at an accelerated pace. Projects this year included research papers on topics such as the Civil War and the Berlin Wall.

Mrs. Vance encourages her students to get involved in advanced courses and prepare for college.

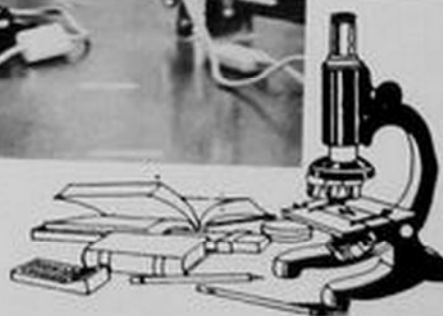
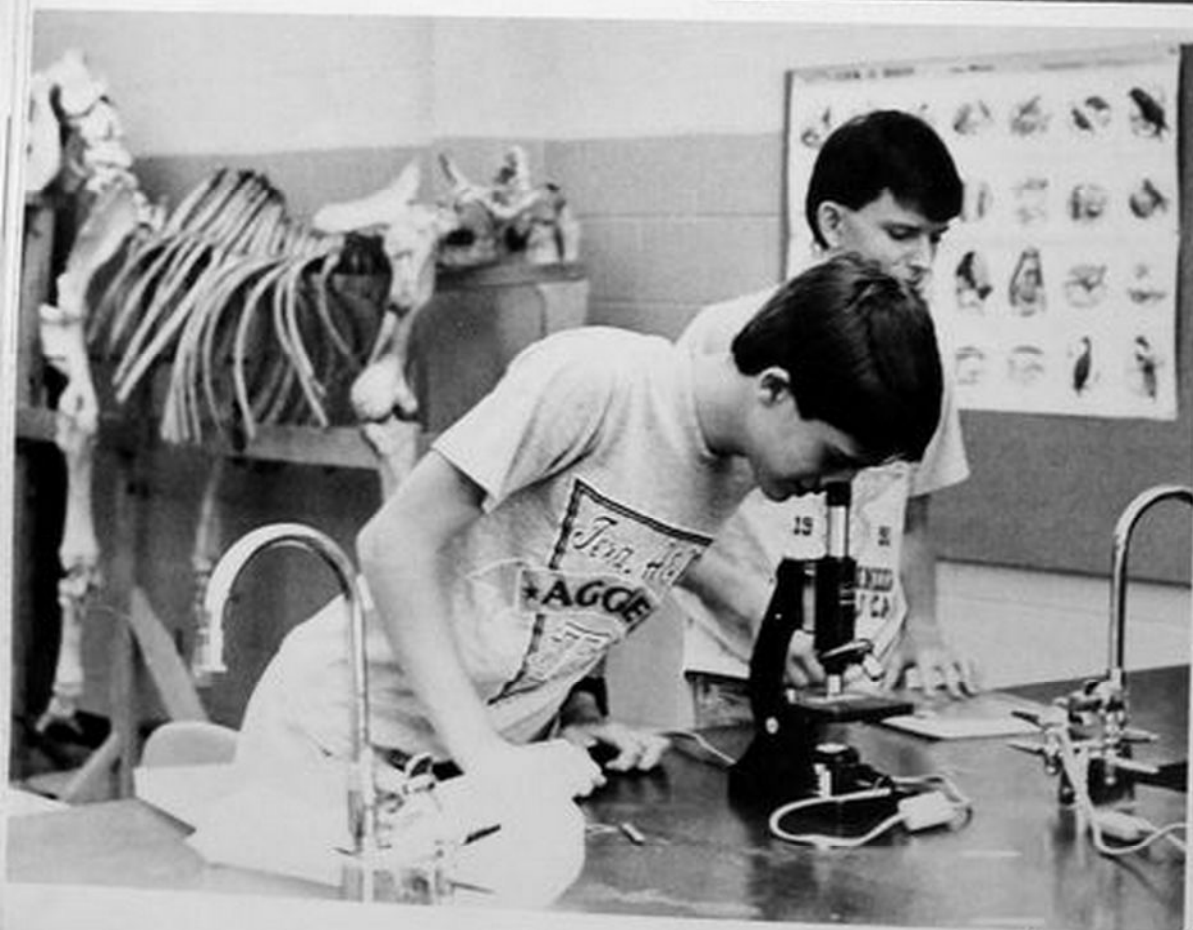

Mrs. Sharpes kept everything in order for Mrs. Burns and newcomer Ms. Westfall. Ms. Westfall taught five

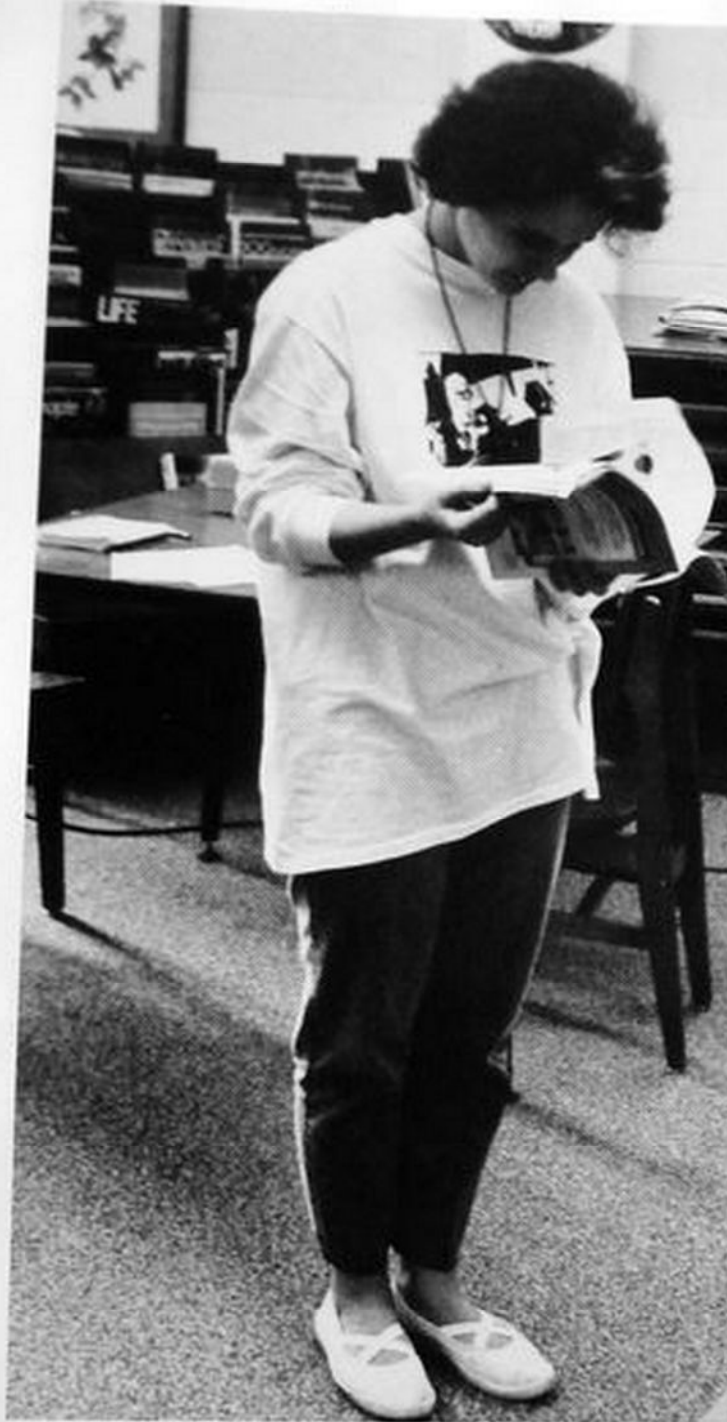

Learning! When you're in a course of Social Studies, you learn! You learn about what's happened in the past and what's happening now in the economy.

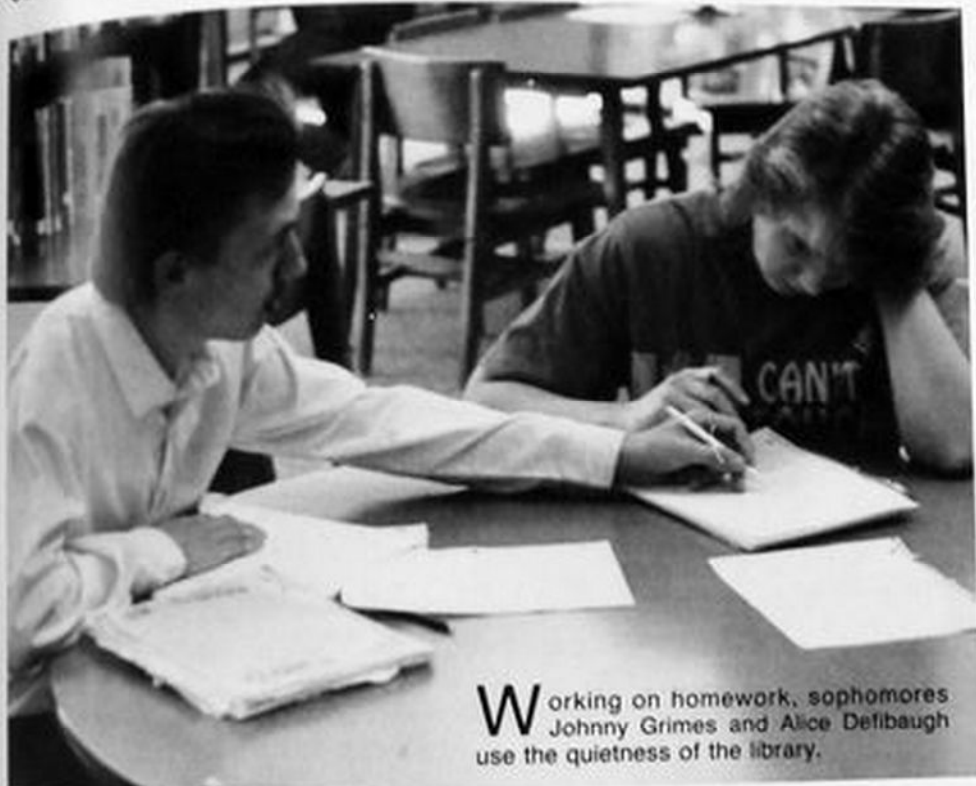
The Social Studies staff is headed by Mr. Stewart, who teaches World Cultures, Economics, and Psycholo-

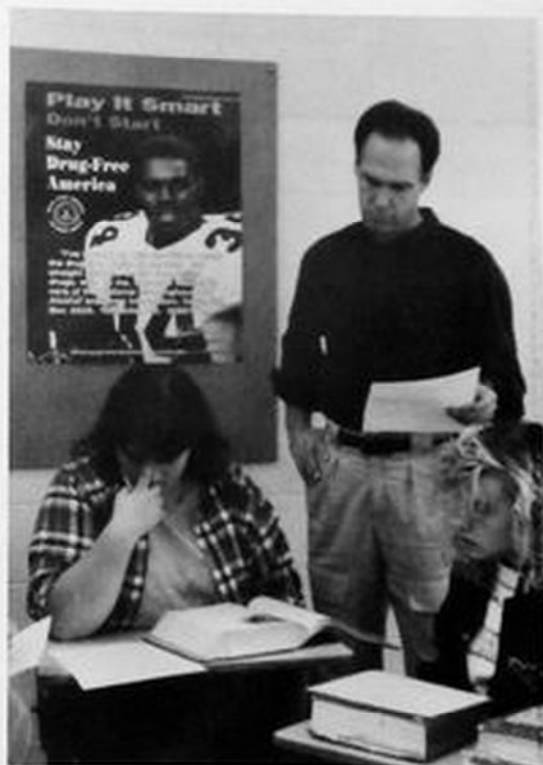
The advanced art students work at their own pace. Once every nine weeks they have to do a project set up by Mrs. Leary.

The Spanish students who will be visiting Mexico in the summer participated in many fundraising activities.

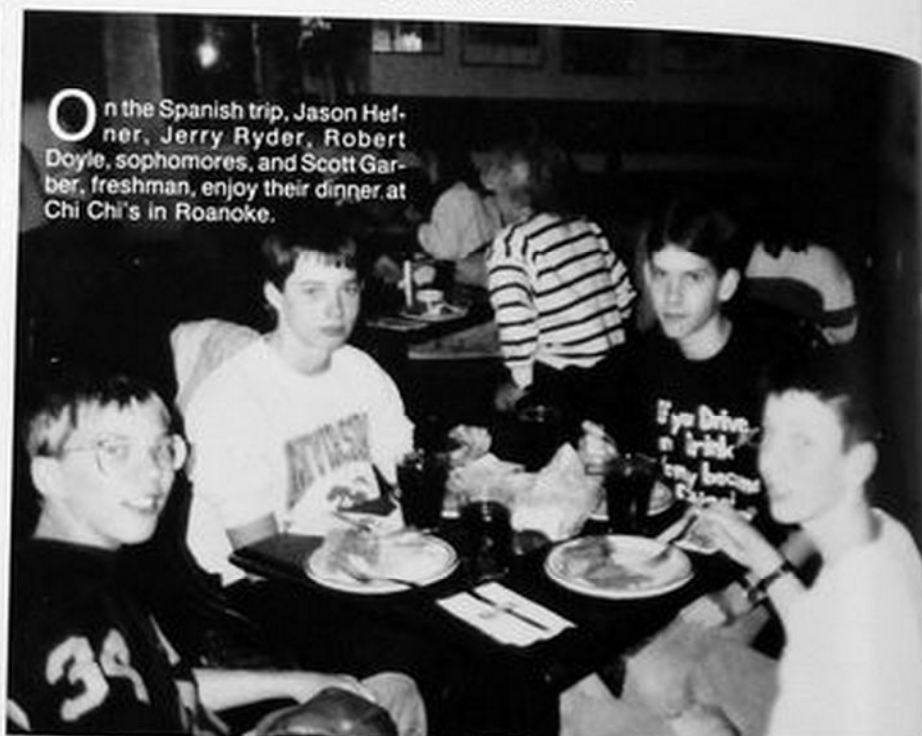
The French classes traveled to Roanoke to see a French play. They also did fundraising for a trip to Que-

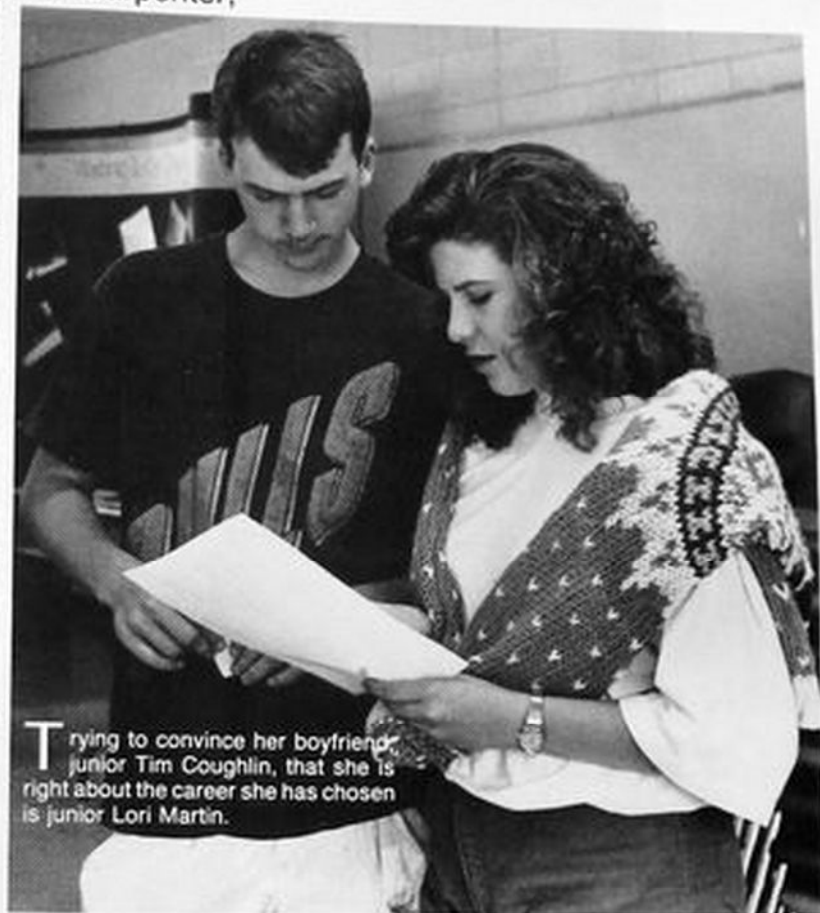

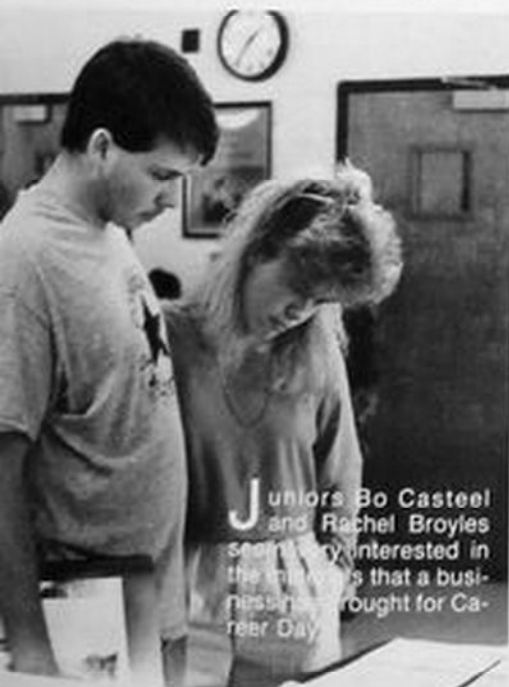

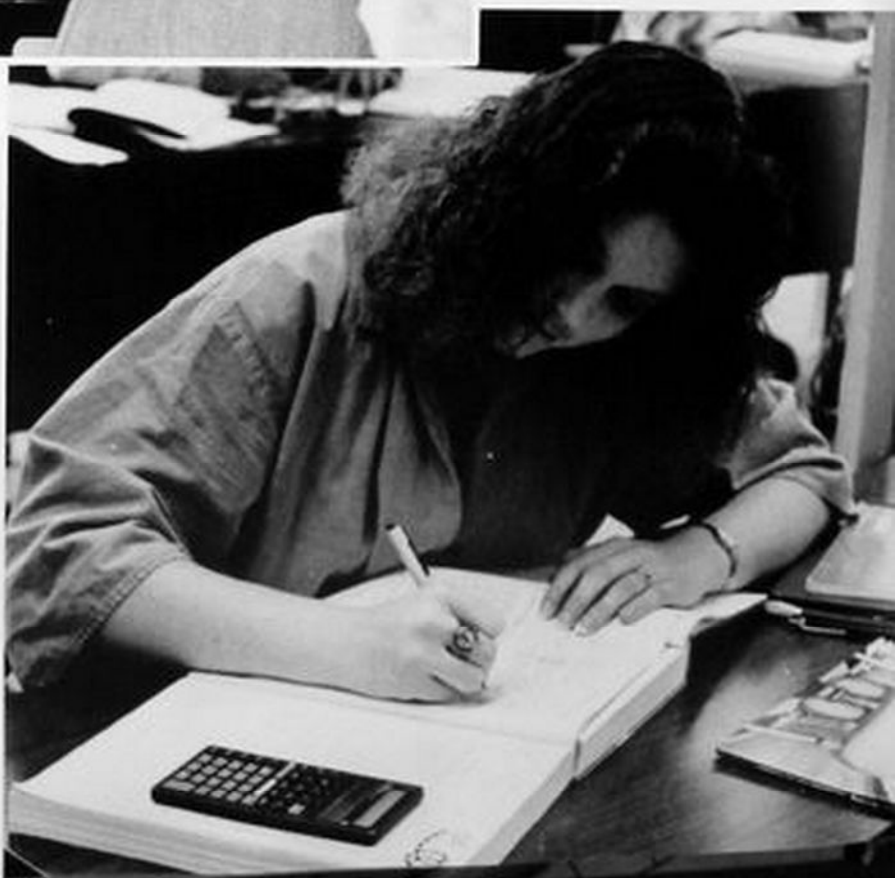

pts. per game. In the New River Valley Conference-Double A, the Warriors had a 9-3 record, with an overall seasonal record of 14-8.

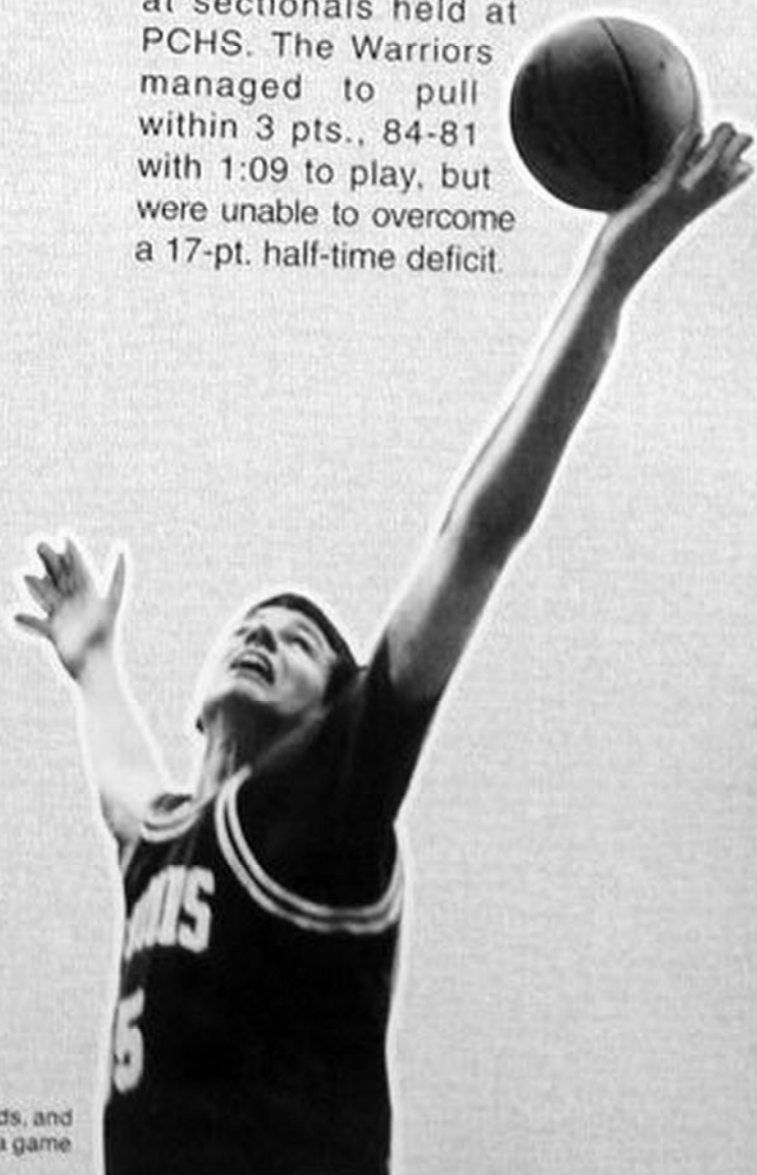

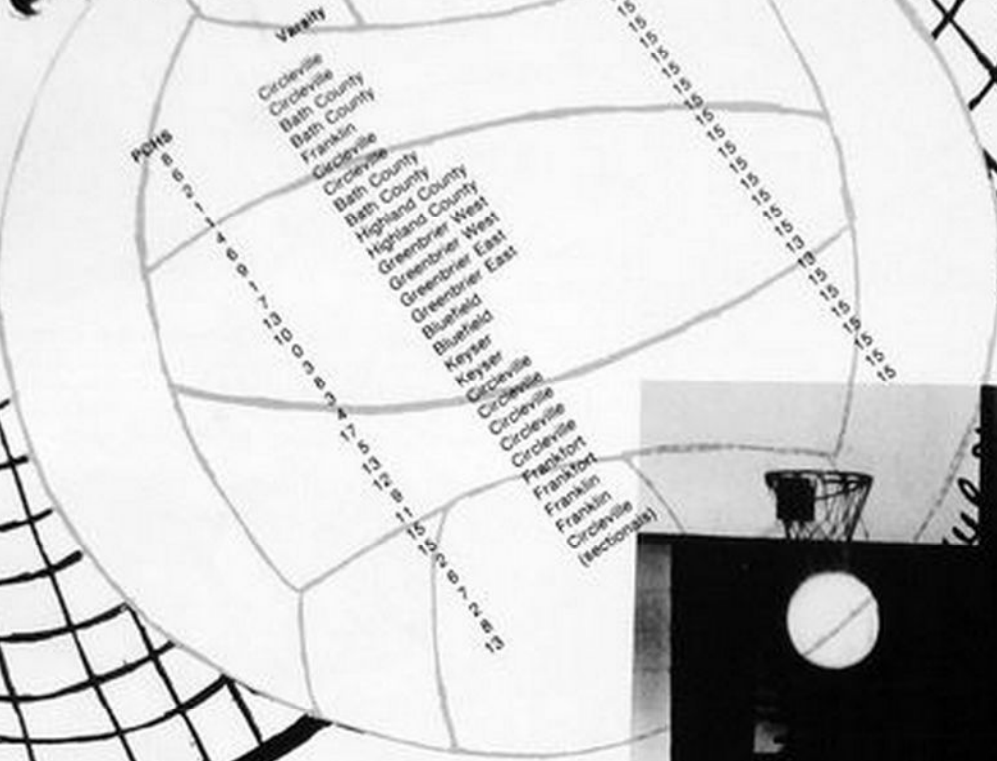

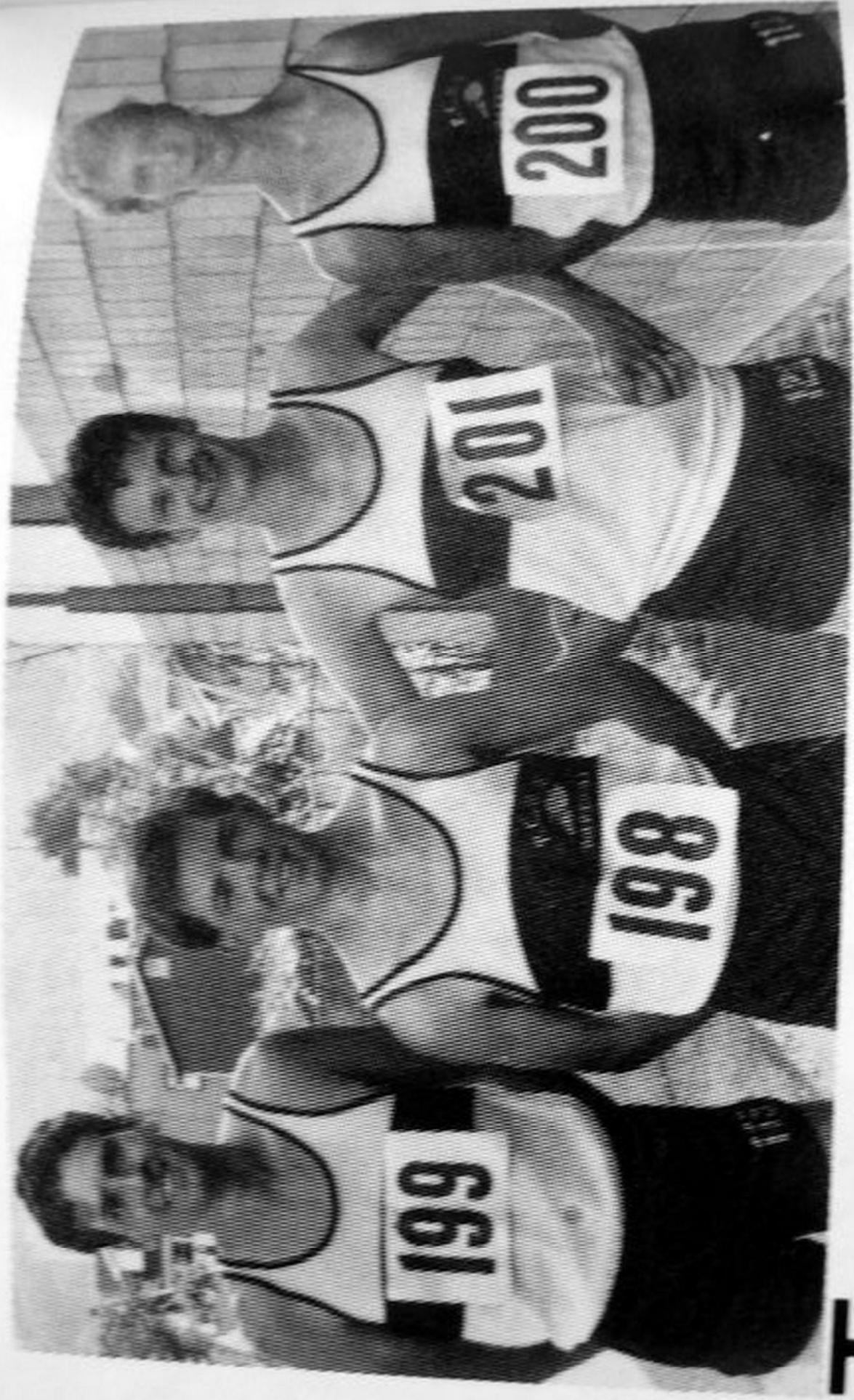
