My dear friends in soccer,

This letter intends to be my Sayonara to you, when I know through our wonderful sport of soccer.

June 29th will mark the end of my long decade in Japan. During the last ten years, I did what I liked the most. I am afraid that from now on other duties will keep me away from soccer. However, in the field or out of the field, soccer will continue being a must in my life. I am sure that soccer more than anything else will bring me back to Japan in my dreams.

When I left Spain, I did not expect to give so much time to soccer, as soccer was not in my future plans. When I left Spain, I thought that I was leaving the country forever. My departure was intended to be a one-way trip. Now, at the time of my farewell, it is hard to believe that out of my ten years in Japan I gave one entire year to soccer. It is harder yet to believe that I am really going back to the place of my childhood. Certainly, God hides wonderful surprises for us in this life.

In my days at SJC, I have come into contact with many students. About a hundred have been associated with me in the struggle to bring honor to the school through soccer.

In 1959, I had the entire school for Physical Education.

During my stay at SJC, the school campus has been my only homeroom. I enjoyed my morning supervision best. I found those early "Peanuts vs Dodompas" games most inspiring. It was the most rewarding experience to watch some hundred grade school students playing "a clean soccer game." The intramural activities were another interesting feature in my annual calendar.

During my ten years at SJC as soccer coach, the Varsity played 360 games, winning 273, losing 48, and drawing in 39. The team scored 1,500 goals against 540. We went undefeated throughout 30 games. We tied Nippon Kokkan and the 1959 All-Japan Juniors.

In 1955, we won both the Yokohama and Kanagawa S. Championships. We took the Yokohama City Crown on five occasions: 1957, '58, '59, '60, and '62. We became Kanagawa Champions in 1961. In the two previous years, we were knocked out of the Kanagawa Championship by the classical "STONE, PAPER, SCISSORS" after over-times with Bodai (Japan Naval Academy) and the powerful Nippon Kokkan. Also in 1961, we won the SJC 60th Anniversary Trophy. In other minor tournaments, SJC upset YCAC in the 1961, '62, and '63 Hillel Series. In 1962, the SJC ALL AMERICAN JUNIOR TEAM defeated the All Yokohama Junior Team, 4-0, to win the City Junior Trophy. This year we won the Marist Trophy in our annual match with the Kobe outfit

Before closing this letter, I want to thank all of you who helped me to establish a record that will challenge the future SJC generations to strive for higher achievements in the broad field of sports.

If in the future you are lucky enough to visit Spain, please come to see me. We shall take a nice walk along Madrid's beautiful avenues to reach Europe's greatest football stadium. This cathedral of soccer will tell you why I like soccer so much

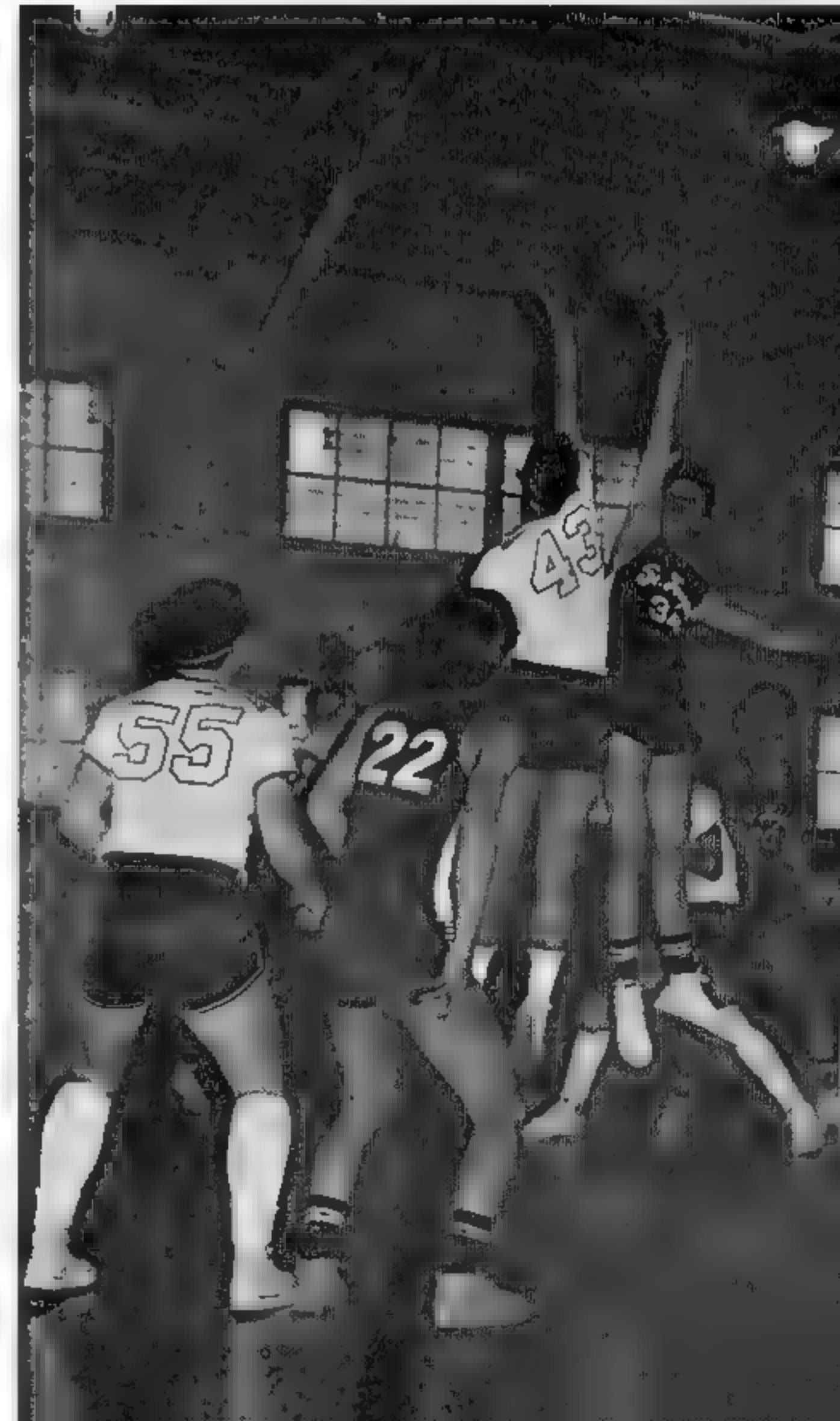

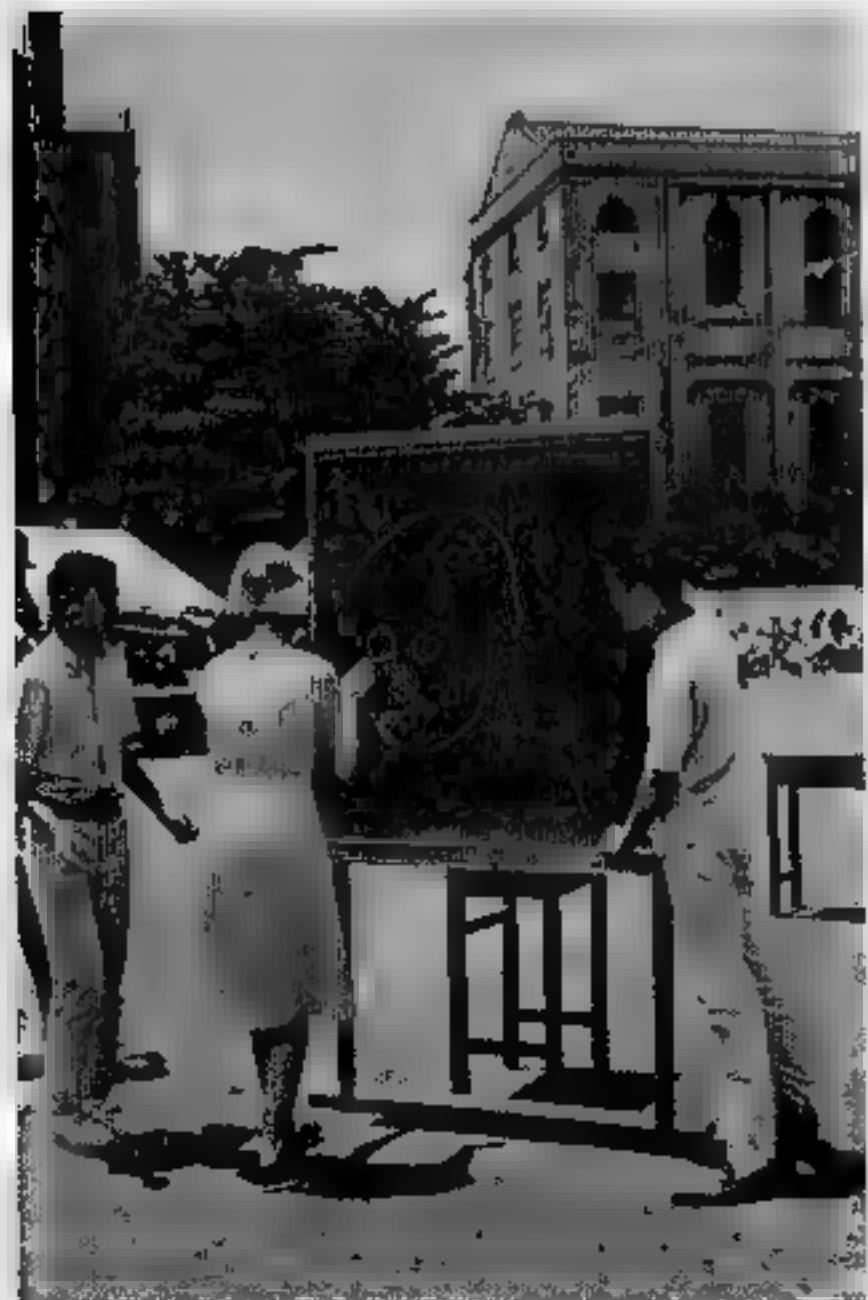
