NEW YORK - The manufacturer of an adult-home video game that features rape as part of the on-screen shenanigans has filed an \$11 million federal lawsuit against Suffolk County, N.Y., and one of its legislators for attempting to ban the sale of the game.

The suit was filed Tuesday in Brooklyn federal court by American Multiple

Industries, of Northridge, Calif., maker of a video game entitled "Custer's Revenge." In the game, a man clad only in cowboy hat and boots must overcome a series of obstacles in the desert in order to win the right to ravish an Indian maiden.

The company charges that two resolutions passed last month by the Suffolk County Legislature seeking to ban such games violates the company's First Amendment rights.

Stuart Keston, president of American Multiple, said Suffolk County passed the resolution "before we starting shipping the product . . . without the benefit of seeing the game. The games are used in the privacy of your own home. They are not arcade games."

Keston said "Custer's Revenge" is already being sold in a few New York stores.
