"Custer's Revenge' Game Selling Out

"Custer's Revenge" is enjoying a lucrative last stand in Oklahoma City.

Manufacture of the controversial video game was recently stopped after Indian and feminist groups nationally decried its portrayal of a scantily clad General George Custer coupling with a naked Indian woman tied to a stake.

"We haven't had any complaints," said Larry McClung, of Madame X Books at 1305 W Britton, who added that sales were brisk.

The store has 10 to 15 of the cartridge games remaining on the shelves at \$64.95 each, he said.

The Adult Toy Box, 1184 N MacArthur, is sold out of Custer's Revenge but is expecting a shipment of 24 games in two weeks, said assistant manager Rick Chandler. The games sell for \$59.95, he said.

"The customers are mostly collectors," Chandler said, adding, "We haven't had any Indians in raising any cain yet."

"Custer's Revenge" was denounced last October by the Oklahoma City Council as "distasteful" and "not in the best interests of the community," but its sale was not banned.
