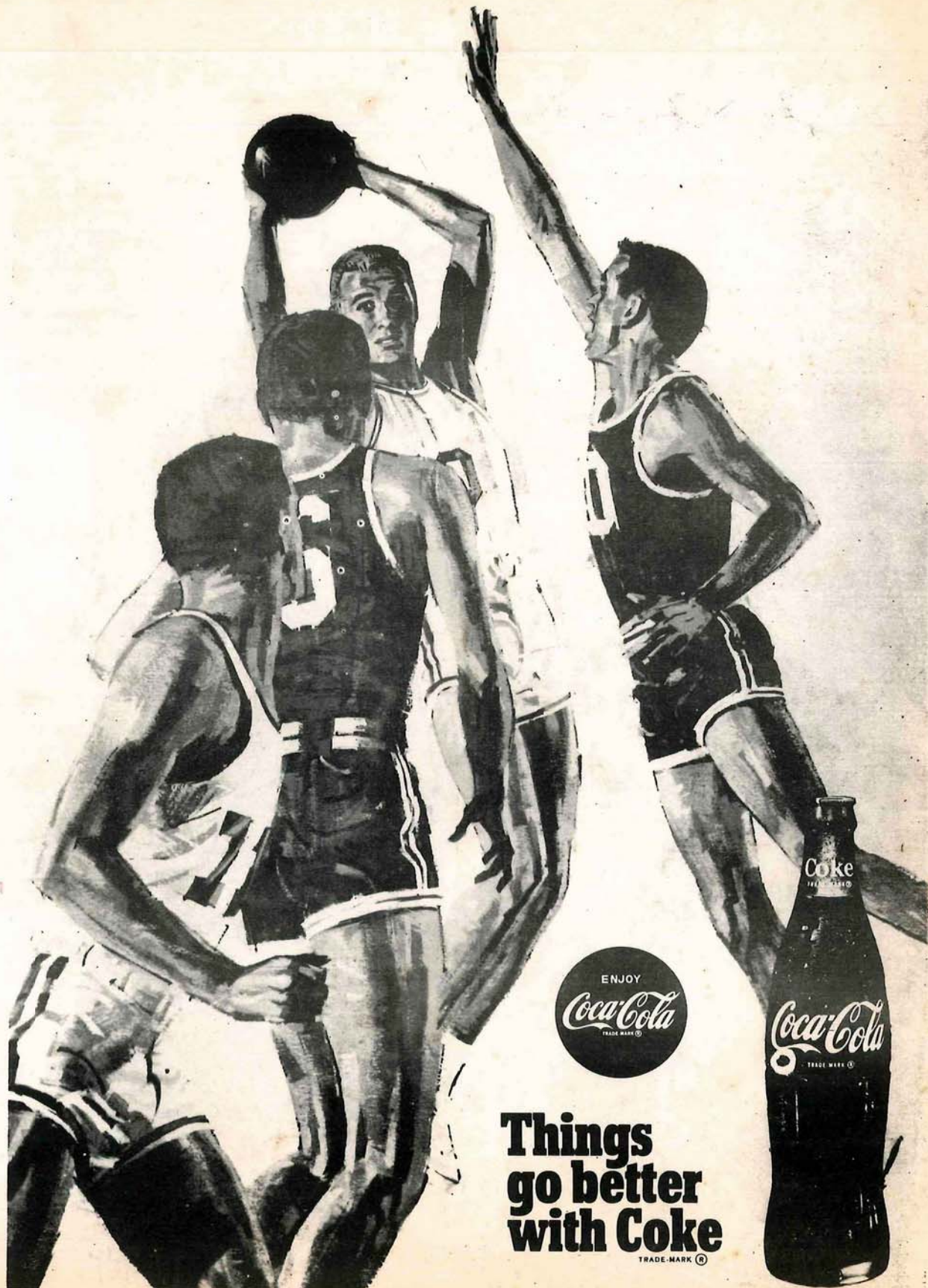

JOHN E. RENFRO

JOHN E. RENFRO

Coach John E. Renfro, a native of Williamsburg, Kentucky, is in his eighth year as athletic director and head basketball coach at Cumberland.

The Indian mentor attended Cumberland, and as a member of the Cumberland College quintet of 1947-49, he set a scoring record for junior colleges. Being a member of the starting five at William & Mary in 1949-50, he was named to the All Southern Conference team. He also started for Georgia Southern in 1950 whose team was elected the National Offensive team of the year.

After the receipt of his B. S. from Georgia Southern in 1950, he went to Macon County, Ga., where he served until 1954 as director of athletics and basketball and football coaches. He then moved to Pikeville College where he was head of the health and physical education department and director of athletics.

Coach Renfro came to Cumberland from Pikeville in 1959 as head of the health and physical education department, serving as such until 1962. He is now athletic director and head basketball coach and going into the '68-'69 campaign he has compiled a record of 133 wins against 124 losses.

He received his M.S. and Ed. S. from the University of Tennessee; the latter coming in 1965. He has since been working on his doctor's degree also at U. of T.

Being very active in community and social affairs, Coach Renfro is a member of Kappa Delta Phi, Optimist Club, A.A.H.P.E.R. and the N.A.I.A. Association of Coaches. He was last years' president of the K.I.A.C. and K.A.H.P.E.R. Men's Athletics and is presently Vice-President of Renfro Supply Company. He has also served as president of the Williamsburg Chamber of Commerce.

FALIN

Paul Falin, a native of Richmond, Ky., is beginning his third season at Cumberland. His first two years were spent coaching the Baby Indians and he led them to best records in the school's history.

Coach Falin attended Lees Junior College, Cumberland College, and the University of Tennessee and received his B.S. and M.S. Degrees respectively.

While attending Lees, Coach Falin set numerous rebounding records as he cleared the boards for 555 rebounds in his final season. He was named to the All-Kentucky Junior College Conference Tournament team and to the All Regional team upon finishing his junior college career.

Coach Falin is married to the former Carolyn Sue Murray of Beattyville, Kentucky.



BELL

Darrell Bell is no new comer to Cumberland and fans will surely remember his outstanding performances while wearing the Indian's uniform, but this year they will recognize him in a new position; that of Freshman basketball coach.

Coach Bell is from Monticello, Ky. and a graduate of Wayne County High School. He played his high school ball under the

coaching of University of Kentucky star, Ray Mills, and was the main factor in helping Wayne High have the best ball club in the school's history.

After high school, Bell came to Cumberland and played one year for the Indians when the college was a jr. college and also played three years after Cumberland became a four year school. Until last year, he held the school's record field goal shooting with 51.5%. He is also one of the school's leading scorers.

FRED ANNES — 5'-11", 170 lb. guard; Jr. from Cleves, Ohio. (No. 12). Last season's average, 2.9 as a sub. Should see lots of action this season as a starter.

LEE BISHOP — 6'-6", 196 lb. center; Jr. from Pineville, Ky. (No. 42). Last season's average, 10.1 points per game and 9.7 rebounds. Should provide needed strength under the basket.

MARCUS BURGHER — 6'-0", 178 lb. guard; Jr. from Palmyra, Indiana, (No. 54). Last season's average, 5.0 points per game as a sub. Good shot and shows plenty of hustle.

HOWARD COFFEY — 6'-3", 195 lb. forward; Jr. from Mt. Vernon, Ky. (No. 50). Last season's average, 4.2 in five games as a sub, one game hitting seven of seven from the field. Should see a great deal more action this year.

RAYMOND COX — 6'-4", 194 lb. forward; Jr. from London, Ky. (No. 44). Last season's average, 19.8 points per game and 9.6 rebounds. Led the state in scoring and earned All K. I. A. C. honors. Has great ability to "power" his way under the basket for easy shots. Also great outside shot and rebounder.

GARY CUPP — 6'-4", 190 lb. forward; Soph. from Kings Mills, Ohio, (No. 40). Freshman average, 10 points per game and 10 rebounds. Saw limited action on the varsity, but should give strength this year to the front line.

JACK CUPP — 6'-4", 190 lb. forward; Soph. from London, Ky. (No. 24). Freshman average, 9.1 points per game and 8.1 rebounds. Came on strong as a varsity member the latter part of the season. Rough under the boards and should see quite a bit of action this season.

BOB LONG — 6'-5", 170 lb. forward; Jr. from Troy, Ohio, (No. 52). Last season's average, 25.8 in 10 games. Played only 10 games in the second semester due to K. I. A. C. eligibility ruling, but came to the call of duty his second game when he broke the school scoring record hitting 19 of 22 from the field and 16 of 18 free throws. In the same game he pulled down 20 rebounds. In the 10 games, Bob hit 61 percent from the field and 86 percent from the line.

BOB MUSE — 5'-11", 170 lb. guard; Fr. from Harlan, Ky. (No. 10). Bob will be playing as a member of the varsity without any freshman experience. He was one of the sought after cagers in Southeastern Ky., and Coach Renfro feels he can carry the load as a varsity member. His senior average in high school was 21.3 points per game.

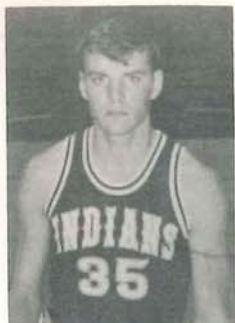

While at Cumberland High School, he was All-State basketball as well as football. He has great speed and passing ability and should give tremendous strength in the guard position.

BILLY FAULKNER — 5'-10", 160 lb. guard; Soph. from Rowlette, Ky. (No. 22). Moved up to varsity after first game of the season and played 25 games, starting in most of them, and averaged 12.1 points per game. He had a total of 105 assists. Has good speed and ball handling ability. Should make a great playmaker for the Indians.

JERRY HODGES — 5'-9", 185 lb. guard; Soph. from Mt. Vernon, Ky. (No. 32). Moved to varsity about mid-way of season and played in 18 games, averaging 10 points per game. Good shot from the outside and has lots of hustle. Started most of the games last year and should share starting role this year.

PAUL KING — 6'-3½", 190 lb. forward; Soph. from Pineknott, Ky. (No. 30). Saw quite a bit of action on last year's freshman team, averaging five points per game. Has good potential. Great hustle and a goot shooting eye.

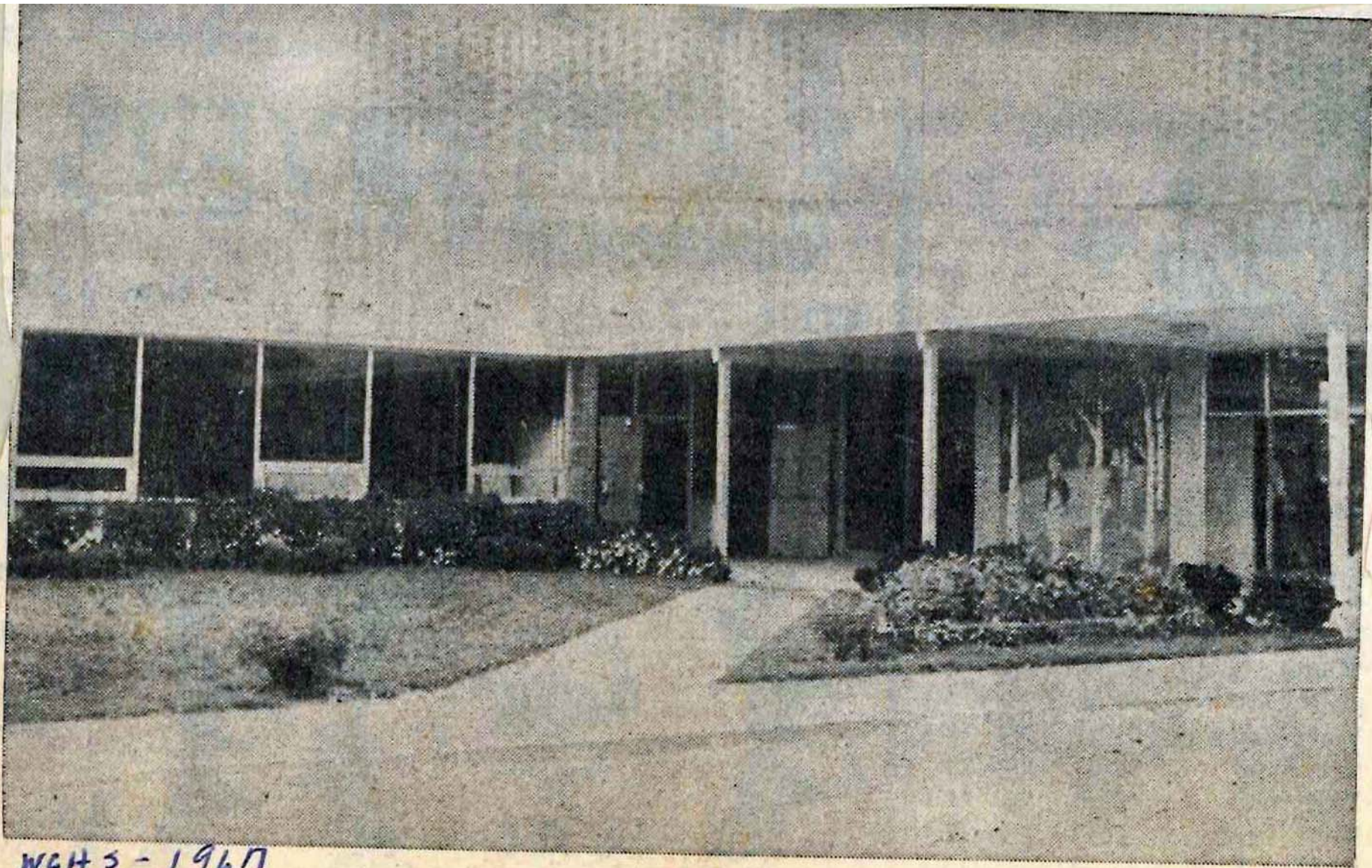

WHAT A TIME TO WITNESS!

It appears that we are entering upon a time of apostasy. Whether temporary or permanent I know not, I think temporary and I pray so.

I foresee tough days for the church and for organized Christianity. An increasing percentage of the growing population of the world appears determined to ignore religious faith; to live and die without considering any relationship to the divine or any destiny beyond the grave.

Among those who still attend worship (and we are glad this is still a great number) there is an increasing percentage that looks coldly back at the minister without the slightest sign of realization that the invitation to repent of sin and seek forgiveness in Christ applies to them. Though they have an appetite for worship and fortunately are still disposed to expose themselves to the proclamation of God's message, they show no inclination whatever to become involved in it or committed to its Lord.

I foresee a real shake-out of the superficial followers of Jesus and a revelation of the truly dedicated. In the military we had an expression, "This will separate the men from the boys." This expression was shouted from the ranks on numerous tough occasions, when the going was at its worst. This is something of what I foresee in Christendom.

I do not know how deep the recession could go; but the deeper it goes, the more the truth will stand out. The darker it gets, the clearer the lights will shine. The more unchristian the world gets, the plainer the Christian's life will show. What a time in which to be a witness!

Our present total membership is 2,607, of which 1,919 have local addresses. Educational program statistics showed the same pattern. There is no question in my mind that we are hurting badly for more up-to-date and properly situated Sunday School facilities. While our Sanctuary building facilities are excellent, our temporary provisions in scattered housing are very, very unsatisfactory and far, far behind what is being offered by other Baptists in our city and vicinity. I am glad that our Building Committee is working on plans. Financially, we had a marvelous year. An all-time high and a somewhat larger than usual gain over the previous twelve months. Our total receipts were \$323,459.50. I might

observe that this slight net loss in members and in educational statistics is a very common pattern about which Baptist leadership generally is seriously concerned. Especially does this tend to be true in downtown churches where it grows increasingly difficult to persuade Christians to put their lives and testimony. The downtown churches have been the primary source of mission giving and denominational strength through the years. At a recent meeting of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, a report was given reflecting a significant drop in literature publication and distribution. Apparently, as of now, we have passed through a period in which the church rode the crest of a wave of popularity and are definitely in a general period of declining popularity and rejection by many people.
