<b>INTRODUCTION</b>	1. The Basic Community Profile provides 33 tables containing key census characteristics of persons, families and dwellings for the following geographic levels: CD, SLA, LGA, CED, SED, UC/L, SSD, SD, S. Dist., Postal Area, Suburb, Section of State, State, Australia. It is based on place of enumeration.	Employed full-time part-time	11. 'Employed full-time' means that the person worked 35 hours or more in all jobs during the week prior to Census night. 'Employed part-time' means that the person worked less than 35 hours in all jobs during the week prior to Census night.
	2. Information was collected from the 2001 Census of Population and Housing.		12. For Census purposes, people who stated they were employed, but worked zero hours in the week prior to Census night have been coded to 'Employed part-time'.
	3. Each table title in the Basic Community Profile consists of two parts. The first part lists the variables included in the table. The second part describes the table population.	Fact Sheets	13. Fact Sheets have been prepared to provide further information on Census data concepts. These are available on the ABS website or from the Information Consulta Unit in your State or Territory.

Family income is not applicable to non-family households, such as group households or lone person households; or to people in non-private dwellings.

Respondents had the option of nominating several ancestries but only the first two answers are processed for output purposes. Birthplace	7. There are 3 birthplace variables. Birthplace of Individual (BPLP), which records a person's country of birth, Birthplace of Female Parent (BFPF) and Birthplace of Male Parent (BPMP), which indicate whether a person's parents were born in Australia or overseas. Prior to 2001, parental birthplace was coded to a country.	First and Second Release Processing	16. The 2001 Basic Community Profile will be released in two phases. First Release tables (tables B01 - B21) are those tables containing variables which are easily processed. Second Release tables (tables B22 - B33) contain variables which require further processing or derivation.
Commonwealth Electoral Divisions (CEDs)	8. Some CEDs cross State and Territory boundaries. The implication of this is that State totals derived from CEDs will not equal the official State total counts. Therefore, State totals will not be provided for the Basic Community Profile at CED level.		17. A household is defined as a group of two or more related or unrelated people usually reside in the same dwelling, who regard themselves as a household and wh make common provision for food or other essentials for living; or a person living in dwelling who makes provision for his/her own food and other essentials for living, without combining with any other person.
Computer Use at Home	9. Respondents were asked whether or not they had used a personal computer at home in the week prior to Census night.		18. For Census purposes, the total number of households is equal to the total num occupied private dwellings.
Dependent Child	10. A dependent child is an individual who is either a child under 15 or a depende student, which is any child in a family under 15 years of age or aged 15-24 years and who is a full-time student. To be regarded as a dependent child the individual can have no partner or child of his/her own usually resident in the same household.	Household income	19. Household income is the sum of the individual incomes of each resident house member aged 15 years and over who is present in the household on Census night. If any household member did not state their income, or was temporarily absent, h income is not calculated. These households fall into the 'Partial income stated' cate

Industry	20. The industry classification is an indication of the main job only.	Selected Averages	28. Median monthly housing loan repayment is applicable to occupied private dwellings being purchased and includes dwellings being purchased under a rent/bu scheme.
Internet Use	21. Respondents were asked whether or not they had used the Internet in the week prior to Census night and if so where they had used it. The question on Internet Use allows for multiple responses. For example, a person who had used the Internet at home, at work and elsewhere, would be recorded as such for each category.		29. Median weekly rent is applicable to occupied private dwellings being rented. It excludes dwellings being occupied rent free, Visitor only households and Non-classifiable households.
Nfd	22. Nfd means 'not further defined'.		30. Median weekly individual income is applicable to persons aged 15 years and over.
Occupation	23. The occupation classification is an indication of the main job only.		31. Median weekly family income is applicable to families in occupied private dwellings. It excludes families where at least one family member aged 15 years and over did not state an income and families where at least one family member aged 15 years and over was temporarily absent.
Overseas visitors	24. Overseas visitors are defined differently to the 1996 Census. In 1996, an overseas visitor was any person who stated they would be in Australia for less than 6 months. For the 2001 Census, this has been extended to any person who states they will be in Australia for less than 12 months.		32. Median weekly household income is applicable to occupied private dwellings. It excludes households where at least one member aged 15 years and over did not state an income and households where at least one member aged 15 years and over was temporarily absent.
Place of enumeration	25. The Census count, based on place of enumeration, is a count of every person who spent Census night in Australia where they were located. People are counted where they are on Census night, which may not be where they usually live. Census data are also available on place of usual residence.		33. Mean household size is applicable to number of persons usually resident in occupied private dwellings. It includes partners, children, and co-tenants (in group households) who were temporarily absent on Census night. A maximum of 3 temporary absentees can be counted in each household. It excludes Non-classifiable households.
Postal Area	26. A Postal Area of CD of Enumeration is formed by aggregating whole collection districts (CD's) that fall within physical boundaries of a postcode on a best fit basis. As the name implies, the data are supplied on a place of enumeration basis. This series excludes non-mappable Australia Post postcodes e.g. post office box postcodes, some postcodes which are delivery routes which are also covered by other postcodes (a situation which often occurs in rural areas) and some postcodes which, because of the application of the 'best fit' principle, do not get a CD allocated to them.	Table population	34. Table population is a description of what the table is counting. For example, tables containing marital status have a table population of persons aged 15 years and over. The population appears under the table title.
	27. Some Postal Areas cover CDs in more than one State or Territory boundary. The implication of this is that State totals derived from Postal Areas will not equal the official State total counts. Therefore, State totals are not provided for the BCP at Postal Area level.

<b>DATA QUALITY</b>	<p>35. For further information on the data quality of Indigenous census data, see Population Distribution, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians (Cat. No. 4705.0). This publication presents counts for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians from the 2001 Census for Indigenous geographic areas, accompanied by information on data quality to help interpret the data. Population estimates of the Indigenous population based on the 2001 Census are also included. For comprehensive information on the quality of Indigenous census data, see Population Issues, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians (Cat. No. 4708.0).</p>	<p>42. Due to operational limitations, the family/household income imputation method (HIND) and Family Income (FINF) may result in an undercount of the number of families/households in the \$1,500 - \$1 range and a balancing over count in the \$2,000 range. No other income ranges are affected. This may also affect the median income estimate if the median falls in either these ranges.</p>
	<p>36. Each stage of the Census is subject to stringent quality assurance measures. However, in a census there are recognised sources of error which may survive in the data produced. These include undercounting, processing and respondent error. Some of these are overcome or 'repaired' during processing. The effect of those that remain is generally slight, although they may be more important for small groups in the population such as the Indigenous population. The primary forms of error to keep in mind are:</p>	<p>43. The calculation of median income is based on imputations made from the Survey of Income and Housing Costs, and as such is subject to sampling error. This is particularly evident if the median falls into the highest income range, where the quoted median is a proxy only and should be regarded with caution.</p>
Partial non-response	<p>37. In some cases where an answer was not provided to a question an answer was imputed or derived (often from other information on the form). In other cases a 'not stated' code was allocated.</p>	<p>44. Further information on data quality will be provided progressively in Census Update and in the 2001 Census fact sheets and working papers.</p>
Processing error	<p>38. While such errors can occur in any processing system, quality management is used to continuously improve the quality of processed data, and to identify and correct data of unacceptable quality.</p>	
Random Adjustment	<p>39. Cells containing small values are randomly adjusted to avoid releasing information about particular individuals, families or households. The effect of random adjustment is statistically insignificant.</p>	
Respondent error	<p>40. Processing procedures cannot detect or repair all errors made by persons in completing the form, therefore some may remain in final data.</p>	
Undercount	<p>41. Although the Census aims to count each person once, there are some people who are missed and others who are counted more than once. A post enumeration survey is conducted soon after the Census to measure the undercount.</p>
