

FIRST DAY-WEDNESDAY, DEC. 9, 1914.

Convening.—The Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its Sixty-ninth annual session at 9 a.m., Wednesday, December 9, 1914, in the First Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Shreveport, La., Bishop Warren A. Candler in the chair.

EVENING SESSION.

Convening.—The Conference met in special session according to adjournment at 8 p. m., Dr. J. M. Henry in the chair.

Devotional Service.—Devotional services were conducted by Dr. Henry consisting of singing hymn 180,

"All hail the power of Jesus' name."

Scripture reading and prayer.

Address and Discussion.—The Secretary of the Board of Education, M. C. Holt, presented the report of the Board of Education.

P. M. Brown, President of the board, then stated that Dr. F. S. Parker had been requested to address the Conference.

Dr. Parker, then addressed the Conference and at the close of his address, moved the adoption of the report of the Board of Education.

P. M. Brown, Geo. S. Sexton, W. W. Drake, J. M. Henry, C. C. Miller, F. R. Hill spoke to the report, and Hon. A. J. Murff briefly addressed the Conference.

The vote being put, the report was unanimously adopted as follows:

Report No. 1 of the Board of Education.

We have carefully considered the condition at Centenary College and realizing the urgent need, we recommend:

First. A Special Assessment of \$6,000 be made for Centenary College and the preachers are instructed to make the collection in February and March. The Presiding Elders are urged to take active charge.

Second. That a campaign for \$200,000 be launched, \$40,000 of which is for buildings and \$160,000 for endowment.

Each preacher is requested to pledge himself to see each adult member of his church and request a five year Credit Subscription. The first payment to be due, November 1st, 1915. And the other payments will be payable on November 1st of each succeeding year. Said notes to bear 5 per cent interest from date. This canvass is to be completed and returns made to the president of Centenary College by June 1st.

The preachers are further requested to send in a list of all adult members to the President of Centenary College by March 1st so that he may send out literature explaining the situation and needs.

Five per cent of the amount subscribed shall be allowed for expenses. The President of Centenary College shall be in charge of the campaign.

Traveling Elders Elected.—Question 14 was called: "What Traveling Preachers are elected elders?"

The name of H. W. Jamieson was called and the committee of examination reporting favorably, his character was passed and he was elected to elders orders.

Ministerial Character.—Question 22 was called: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

The name of C. M. Thompson was called and his character passed, and, at his own request, his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The name of W. F. Roberts was called and his character passed and the Committee of Examination reporting favorably, he was advanced to the class of the third year, being already in deacon's orders.

The names of H. J. Boltz, T. J. Holladay, J. C. Price, C. F. Staples, B. T. Crews, R. W. Tucker, F. R. Power, T. H. Morris, W. F. Henderson, S. J. Davies, C. M. Morris, S. S. Holladay, G. S. Sexton, E. K. Means, F. J. McCoy, J. A. Alford, G. D. Anders, J. C. Rousseaux, R. H. Wynn, H. T. Carley, P. M. Brown, and A. W. Turner were called and their characters passed.

The Committee on Admissions recommended each for membership in the Traveling Connection; they were addressed by the Bishop and, after giving satisfactory answers to the Disciplinary questions, they were, by vote of the Conference, admitted into full connection.

Report of Orphanage Board Adopted.—John Sholars presented the report of the Orphanage Board which was adopted.

Approval of Minutes.—'The minutes of the sessions of Saturday Morning and Sunday Evening were read and approved.

Traveling Preachers Ordained Elders.—Question 15 was called: What traveling preachers are ordained elders? Answer: Robert M. Brown, George Fox, Thomas J. Embree, Ollie L. Tucker, James H. Hoffpauir and Hugh W. Jamieson.

Local Elders.—Question 17 was called: What local preachers are ordained elders? Answer: None.

Place for Holding Next Session.—Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? Mansfield and Ruston were put in nomination and Mansfield was chosen by a rising vote.

Name of J. W. Harper Referred.—On motion of H. W. Bowman, the name of J. W. Harper was referred to the committee on Conference Relations.

H. W. May moved the location of W. H. Long on the ground of unacceptibility. The motion prevailed.

W. L. Hunter was recognized and asked for a location. The Conference granted his request.

Local Preachers Received from Other Churches.—Question 7 was called: "Who are received from other Churches as local preachers?"

E. J. Vallery, an elder in the Methodist Protestant Church, having been duly recommended by the District Conference of the Alexandria District, and having certified to his agreement with us in doctrine and discipline, his orders as local elder were recognized.

Sabbath Observance.—The report of the Sabbath Observance Committee was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

To us it is a matter of serious concern that within the bounds of our Conference there is widespread and general desecration of the Christian Sabbath. Observation and experience show conclusively that wherever the proper observance of this day is disregarded, individual piety is always at a low ebb and the successful prosecution of church work is greatly hindered.

We note with real regret that with many of our own people, Sunday is no longer a day of worship; instead, on this day, the sanctuary is neglected and church going is supplanted by various forms of amusement and entertainment. And because this is true, we feel it imperative that we as pastors, in our private and pulpit ministrations, exert ourselves to create healthful sentiment and to quicken deep conviction on this important subject.

We endorse the Sunday League of America and commend its purpose, plan and

representatives to our people as worthy of their cordial co-operation.

We also recommend that it be the order of this Conference that during the ensuing Conference year, at least one Sunday be devoted to the consideration of the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath and its proper observance.

Conference Lay Leader.—The report of the Conference Lay Leader, Mr. W. S. Holmes was received and ordered to record as follows:

REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER.

In submitting this my report as Conference Lay Leader I regret to advise that only one District Lay Leader's report was received and therefore it is impossible to give a statistical report covering such items as called for by the Executive Committee of the Laymen's Missionary Movement of our Church. Reports were forwarded to every District Lay Leader with requests that reports be made, but unfortunately six of them failed to respond.

On yesterday, Friday morning, there was a conference of the Board of Lay Activities at which were present four District Leaders and the Conference Leader. A definite policy was outlined for presentation to the Laymen's meeting to be held this afternoon. The policy was adopted almost unanimously by the men and women attending the afternoon meeting and we beg you to adopt this policy as a standard of

efficiency for our Conference.

The proceedings of the afternoon meeting will be presented as a separate report. We believe that it would be impossible to formulate a worse financial system than that used by our Conference for years, and we offer you one which we believe to be a great improvement if not the best ever devised. Some preachers have said they did not believe that it would work and have condemned it without a trial, but those who have tried it have proven that it will work not only in town or city, but on a country circuit, and not on a circuit far away, but on a Louisiana circuit.

Now, we believe that the financial question is a vital one and we beseech you, therefore, brethren, that you at least give "A Financial Method for Methodists" a fair therefore, brethren, that you at least give A Phantola Street of All Street of Street

Laymen's Missionary Movement.—The report of the Laymen's Missionary Movement was submitted by Van Carter.

S. H. Werlein moved to amend by striking out the first resolution, the amendment prevailed and the report was adopted as amended as following:

Question 51: Who is elected Conference Lay Leader and what is the report from the Committee on Lay Activities?

W. S. Holmes was elected Conference Lay Leader.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAY ACTIVITIES.

At a meeting of the Laymen's Missionary Movement held this day in the auditorium of First Church, Shreveport, the following business was given attention:

Van Carter was elected Secretary of the Laymen's Movement and of the Committee of Lay Activities of our Conference.

The following Standard of Efficiency was adopted:

- A Lay Leader for every church.
- 2. A Charge Leader for every charge.
- 3. Monthly distribution of literature to every family.
- A Missionary Committee for every church. A service every Sunday in every church.
- The adoption of the duplex envelope system and a simultaneous every-member canvass in every charge every year between January and March.

The following resolutions were adopted:

A. Resolved that the Conference be requested to appoint Brother R. O. Randle,

Railroad Secretary to confer with the railroads of the State to secure special rates to and from the sessions of the Annual Conference.

B. Whereas in our Discipline it is urged that, as far as possible, the missionary offering in the Sunday school go as a free will offering and is not to be used to meet

the missionary assessment upon the congregation therefore.

Be it resolved by this Laymen's meeting of the Louisiana Conference that every effort be put forth by the presiding elders, pastors and laymen in each charge to encourage the movement of the Sunday School Missionary offering in the channel directed by the Discipline.

On motion duly seconded Brother W. S. Holmes was nominated for Conference

Lay Leader, and there being no further nominations he was declared elected.

Church Publications.—The report of the committee on Church Publications was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PUBLICATIONS.

We note with satisfaction that our publishing house under the direction of Messrs. Smith & Lamar is conducting a successful business. The sales of the Publishing House made at its three branches, Richmond, Dallas and Nashville for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1914, amounted to \$855,644.99, which is an increase in net sales over the preceding year of \$70,901.27.

We wish to commend the editorial policy of the New Orleans Christian Advocate and we earnestly request our pastors to represent this periodical to the Methodist people of Louisiana. The work of our Church cannot progress in a satisfactory manner unless the constituents of the Church continually inform themselves along the lines of church movements. The only consistent course to pursue is to endeavor to see that every Methodist family is supplied with the church paper.

Our connectional publications, the "Christian Advocate," the "Epworth Era," the "Methodist Review," and the "Missionary Voice" deserve the support of all our people.

The Sunday school literature is of the highest standard and we note with satisfac-

tion that there is a steady increase in its circulation.

We recommend that the Conference appoint the following as members of the Committee of Publication of the New Orleans Christian Advocate: J. M. Henry, W. W. Drake, and Briscoe Carter.

We further recommend, according to the action of the last General Conference, that J. M. Henry, W. W. Drake, and Briscoe Carter be elected an auxiliary advisory

commission to co-operate with the General Book Committee to regulate the paper publishing interests of the Connection.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the New Orleans Depository is herewith

submitted:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES, NEW ORLEANS DEPOSITORY, 1914.

We have at last succeeded in renting the lower floor of property 512 Camp Street to a good tenant at the price of \$50.00 per month, beginning July 1, 1914, for a period ending September 30, 1916, which enables us to make a brighter report than we had last year, at which time, the tenant whom we had for many years having moved out as the result of the vibration of the machinery of the printing press used by the Publisher of the Christian Advocate, on the second floor, and the property remained vacant for many months.

Then too, we were forced to do rat-proofing at a cost of \$225.16, as shown in the

Treasurer's report embodied herein.

From the report (see below) it will be seen that a balance existed of \$139.49, but it also shows a note due the Canal-Louisiana Bank & Trust Co. of \$250.00; therefore, a liability exists of the difference of \$110.51. It can, therefore, be seen that there is no way of making an appropriation to the Conference for Widows and Orphans from this property this year, which we regret very much.

At the last Annual Conference, it was ordered, as shown in the report of the committee on Church Publication, page 30 of the Minutes, that the Publishing Committee of the Christian Advocate reimburse the Board of Trustees of the Depository for taxes and insurance during the period that the lower floor is not rented, and, therefore, the

above liability will be reduced by that amount when paid.

The other recommendation, as shown on the same page, was not carried out for the reason that we did not succeed in renting the whole building, but just the lower floor of it; therefore there is no necessity for the removal of the printing press from the building until other arrangements are made.

Board of Church Extension.—The report of the Board of Church Extension was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

Your Board of Church Extension has met at different times during the session of the Conference and worked faithfully over the business assigned to them. Our work has been done in a spirit of prayer with a view to accomplishing the best results with the means at hand. It has been evident to us that the needs were far greater than our ability. There were before us appeals for aid a little in excess of four times the amount that was in our hands for distribution, and we have felt our responsibility keenly and have invoked the aid of our Heavenly Father in our decisions. It has been our aim to make our loans and donations to those charges where, in our opinion, the needs were greatest.

The Board of Church Extension was organized for the purpose of furnishing aid in building churches and parsonages in places where such aid was necessary, and in our opinion the needy places should be given preference to places where it is possible

to build without the aid of the Church Extension Board.

We commend this Church Extension work to our pastors, to be pushed forward and made more prominent in their charges. It is within the possibility of a good many pastors to furnish their Sunday schools with birthday jars, which are furnished free by the General Board, to be placed in the Sunday school to assist in the collection of this fund, and we hope that this manner of collecting this fund will become more general in our Sunday schools. We also request our pastors that they become fully conversant with the great plans of our General Secretary concerning annuities and bequests, so that they may be in a position to present this great question to the people in their congregations who are able to assist in this work.

We recommend, wherever practical, that we have City and District Boards of Church Extension, as per paragraphs 443 and 444, pages 177 and 178 of our Discipline.

We recommend that wherever deeds to church property are to be made blanks be secured from this Board.

Sunday School Board.—The report of the Sunday School Board was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

As we come to the close of the quadrennium and submit to you our report as your Sunday School Board, we do so with much regret in that we cannot report greater progress. A year ago at the Conference held in Crowley it was not thought possible to continue our Field Secretary, and because of that decision no one has been giving his time to that work during the past twelve months, and as a consequence we fear the work has suffered. This Board wishes to emphasize that they believe that the Sunday school department of our Church work offers a most fertile field and that in our belief the Church cannot give too much thought and prayerful effort toward its advancement.

While we very greatly regret that more activities cannot be reported in our denominational Sunday school work, we are happy to report the stimulus reported from the interdenominational organization—the Louisiana State Sunday School Association—and believe that the Sunday schools of our State are better organized, better equipped and conducted and on a higher plane than ever before.

This Board sincerely trusts that the incoming Board may soon find itself in position to renew the work along such lines as seem likely to produce the best results.

The Board wishes again to urge our schools to receive birthday offerings from their scholars and to use the same for the enlargement of our Sunday School Loan Fund. We desire to commend the work of Rev. H. S. Johns in his prison work and recommend the continuance of furnishing him with one hundred Senior Quarterlies.

We also desire to recommend to the Sunday School Board that they delegate to some one to furnish regularly notes of interest on Sunday school matters to the Advocate, so that in this way this work may be kept prominently before our people.

American Bible Society Board.—The report of the American Bible Society was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY BOARD.

The American Bible Society during the year 1913 has rendered great service to the Church. According to the last report issued by the Society, we are informed that the demand for the Scriptures at home and abroad has been unprecedented. More than five million copies have been distributed in China, Korea, Japan, Siam, Latin America, Mexico, Europe and the United States. The demand is greater than the supply, and the supply is only limited by the revenues of the Society.

The policy of the American Bible Society is to provide Bibles at a minimum charge to the most needy fields. The Agency Secretary of the Southwestern Agency declared in his address at this session of our Conference that wherever Bibles were needed in the State of Louisiana, they could be secured by application to him and that the Society would furnish the same without cost to those who were unable to pay for

them.

'The attention of the Conference is called to the action of the last General Conference which reads, "We therefore recommend an annual assessment for this cause during the next quadrennium of a sum equal to two cents per capita for our entire membership." Your committee recommends that in pursuance of the recommendation adopted by the General Conference, the assessent for the Bible Cause be fixed at \$660.00 to be apportioned as follows:

Board of Education.—Report No. 2 of the Board of Education was adopted as follows:

REPORT No. 2 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Board of Education begs leave to present this our fourth and last annual report:

Work of the General Church.—The past year has been one of unprecedented activity and interest in our educational world. The General Conference held in May adopted by resolution the two-fold object of Evangelization and Christian Education as the aim of the Church during the coming quadrennium. It appointed a Commission with plenary power to repair the loss inflicted upon the Church by the Court's decision in the Vanderbilt case. Before six months had passed, this commission was able to open a splendidly equipped school of theology at Atlanta, Ga., which together with Emory College constitutes the auspicious beginning of Emory University. The great plant in process of building at Dallas, Texas, was connectionalized and becomes the University of the Church west of the Mississippi. We have carefully considered the report of the commission as well as the detailed statement of the affairs of the Southern Methodist University which have been referred to us. And offer the following resolution:

Resolved: That the Louisiana Conference hails with especial delight the auspicious beginning of Emory University and congratulates the commission upon the successful accomplishment of so much of the great task assigned it by the General Con-

ference.

Resolved further, That we have heard with pleasure of the prospective opening

of the Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas, in September next.

Resolved, That while we regret that in view of the exigencies of our own educational situation, we are not in a position to make an assessment for the theological department of that University, yet we pledge our earnest endeavor to turn our young men who are preparing for the ministry toward Dallas, and hope the day is not far distant when we can lend material assistance to this institution.

The Department of Ministerial Supply and Training.

We rejoice in the continued success of the Department of Ministerial Supply

and Training and note with gladness the fruit of its work and the rapidly increasing supply of candidates for the ministry, as well as the increasing efficiency of our undergraduates through the Correspondence School. We would urge that all of our

undergraduates avail themselves of the advantage of this school.

Seashore Divinity School.—Tidings reach us that the Seashore Divinity School continues its helpful ministry to our preachers in Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana. We urge our presiding elders that they continue to assist our pastors in availing themselves of the advantages of this institution by influencing the different charges to supply their pastors with means to attend. We recommend that the clerical members of the Board of Education see that a collection is taken at each district conference to raise the \$150,000 apportioned to our Conference for the expense of the next session of the school.

Centenary and Mansfield.—When we come to the institutions of our own Conference, the outlook while not all that we could wish, is not by any means hopeless. Your board has during the quadrennium labored earnestly in the face of many perplex-

ing situations in connection with these institutions.

Mansfield Female College.—During the quadrennium Mansfield Female College, by means of the bonding of her indebtedness, has been lifted from the slough of despond and placed upon the highway of Prosperity and Success as far as its work and income for current expenses are concerned. Many needed improvements have been added to The unearned increment in the value of its grounds and buildings, due the plant. to economic developments at Mansfield, proves that the measures taken at the Conference in New Orleans in 1911 to save this institution from the block was a master Up to date, we have managed to meet the semi-annual instroke of church finance. terest on the bonds as it fell due and retire two of the bonds. The appended report of the past and current sessions will indicate the increased success of the present administration. We congratulate the members of our Conference upon the fact that they can now without the least hesitation or mental reservation urge their people to patronize Mansfield Female College. Since the last Conference changes have been made in the curriculum of the college which will entitle it to be placed in the new classification as a Junior College.

Resolved: That we respectfully request the Board of Education to classify Mansfield Female College as a Junior College.

Centenary College.—In spite of the almost disheartening financial depression that prevailed over the State at the opening of the present session of Centenary College,

the attendance shows no decrease as compared with the last session.

We are pleased to note that while the struggle for existence which has lasted for three-quarters of a century still continues, there are brightening tokens of a better day and as a result of the campaign launched a year ago and enlarged in its scope and perfected in its plans by the action already taken at this session of the Conference, we expect to be able to sing "The morning light is breaking, the darkness disappears."

Assessments.—We would call especial attention to the fact that by order of the last General Conference, the assessment for Conference Education and that hitherto known as "Educational Extension" are combined and instead of two assessments as formerly, we shall now have only one, the proceeds of which will be pro-rated between

the General Board and our Conference Institutions.

We would urge the importance of getting this assessment in full during the coming year, as we believe that no other one thing would do so much toward the solution

of our educational problem.

Appreciation.—The Board desires to express its high appreciation of the helpful presence of Dr. Stonewall Anderson, the General Secretary of Education at several of its sessions, as well as the inspirational addresses of Bishop Candler upon the general subject of Christian Education from the chair. We would urge these able representatives of this great work to lend their assistance to the campaign now on for our own Centenary College.

District Conference Records.—The report of the Committee on District Conference Records was adopted as follows:

All the Record Books of the District Conferences were before us and were carefully examined. We find that the Secretaries have all been faithful in keeping the proceedings of the several District Conferences.

The Monroe District Record is in the main well kept. In the proceedings of the morning of the first day, the Secretary notes that certain members of the district conference were present on the second day, which is a trifle premature.

We would suggest the use of a margin and more clearness in the record of the Lafayette District.

We have no criticism to make of the records of the New Orleans, Shreveport, Baton Rouge, Ruston and Alexandria Districts.

Temperance.—The report of the committee on temperance was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Church of God, which has been pressing the fight against strong drink in this country for a century and more has reason to be profoundly grateful for the advance made by the Prohibition cause during the last twelve months. We do not know

of any other period of like duration within the past one hundred years in which so much progress in this reform has been made. Among the notable events of the past year we would mention the following:

The successful launching of the campaign for nation-wide Prohibition accompanied by an unprecedented unification of the Prohibition forces and the concentration of their efforts upon the attainment of this end.

(2) The banishment of alcoholic liquors from the United States navy by order

of Secretary Daniels.

(3) Out of seven States voting on State-wide Prohibition during this period, five voted dry, while the other two, namely Ohio and California, voted dry if the vote of the chief city in each State, namely Cincinnati and San Francisco, be eliminated. We have now fourteen dry States, with the prospect of there being added to this number two or three within the near future.

(4) The first conference of Roman Catholics to consider the question of Prohibition met at Niagara Falls last August, resulting in the organization of the Catholic

Prohibition League of America.

The introduction of the Shepherd-Hobson bill in Congress providing for an amendment to the National Constitution, which would prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation, exportation and importation of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes.

(6) The curtailment and, in some cases, the absolute prohibition of alcoholic liquors by the leading countries of Europe.

Coming to the consideration of conditions in Louisiana, we are pleased to report that prohibition sentiment in the Louisiana Legislature is stronger than it has been in previous years. We are very much in need of a law to prohibit the sale of all malt liquors, whether intoxicating or not, in "dry" territory, and also of measures to prohibit the shipment of liquor into dry territory.

It is with pleasure that we record the fact that during Brother Turner's Super-intendency of the Anti-Saloon League, not one foot of "dry" territory has been lost, while a considerable amount of "wet" territory has been gained. We have not lost a single local fight in which the Anti-Saloon League has been engaged. There are now

thirty-four dry parishes in Louisiana.

We are advised by Superintendent Turner that the pastors of our Conference have co-operated with him in his important work, and we would repeat the recommendation of your Committee last year that "as far as possible practical co-operation be given to the Anti-Saloon League by opening our pulpits as often as once a year to the Superintendent, and that each pastor and Sunday school superintendent on the Temperance or some other Sunday in April, be requested to direct the offering of the day to the Anti-Saloon League.'

We recommend the observance of Temperance Sunday in our Sunday schools and would urge hearty co-operation on the part of our people with the Anti-Saloon

League and the W. C. T. U. in their efforts to secure total abstinence pledges.

We are pleased to see that the announced program of the Louisiana Anti-Saloon League for January includes a tour of the State by a number of strong Prohibition speakers, notably Dr. Louis Albert Banks, Ex-Gov. Malcom R. Patterson and others, and we urge our pastors to co-operate with Superintendent Turner in dating these men in the State.

We are glad to be able to indorse the policy and methods of Superintendent A. W. Turner and recommend his reappointment as State Superintendent of the

Louisiana Anti-Saloon League.

Time Extended.—Briscoe Carter moved that the time be extended for the completion of the business of the Conference. The motion prevailed.

The report of the Board of Missions was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

In the submission of this report your Board of Missions finishes the work of the quadrennium. We rejoice in the progress that has been made. To the new board we turn over the work well organized and with greater promise.

We note with interest that, notwithstanding world disturbances, during the last year our foreign work has prospered and that our missionaries are full of faith and more hopeful than ever of the final conquest of the Word of God in all lands. Good tidings come from our mission in Africa.

Our mission work in our own Conference has had a year of great prosperity. More than two hundred from our distinctly missionary territory have been converted to God and have come into the Church. French missions present one of the most fruitful fields for effective service in our whole Church. Brother Hebert and Brother Breithaupt we heartily commend for the splendid work they have done this year.

For the enlargement of our work at home and abroad—even for the continuance of it will require a larger effort on our part. Owing to the stringency of the times it will probably be harder to raise money during the coming year and we shall need it more. In view of this fact we urge upon the part of our Louisiana preachers the importance of the every-member canvass, early collection, prompt remittances, an adequate missionary policy for our Sunday schools. To the Epworth League is given the support of our new mission in Africa.

The first week in January is set apart by our Board of Missions as a week of prayer and self denial, the offering to be used in sending out additional missionaries.

We have received from the Auditing Board for Foreign Missions, \$4,273, special, \$574; for Home and Conference Missions, \$5,442. Of the latter amount \$1,255 belongs to the Home Department of the General Board, leaving \$4,187 for work in the Conference. We have also received about \$690 on the French Missionary Special which has been used on the work this year.

ACT OF INCORPORATION.

An Act to Incorporate the Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in General Assembly convened, That John C. Keener, H. N. McTyeire, R. Randle, J. Sanders, J. B. Walker, S. J. Davies, L. Parker, Philo M. Goodwin, and L. A. Reed, and their associates and successors, such as the Louisiana Conference may from time to time see proper to appoint, be and they are hereby created a body politic and corporate under the name and style of the "Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South," and by which name the said corporation shall have successors, and be capable of using and being used, entering into contracts, receiving and holding property for educational purposes and such charitable purposes as may, from time to time, be specified by the said Conference at its session, either by donation or purchase.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the domicile of said corporation shall be located in the city of New Orleans, and the affairs thereof shall be managed by nine trustees, to be appointed by the Louisiana Annual Conference, one of whom shall be elected President. The President and four trustees shall form a quorum, and shall have power to appoint all other officers necessary for conducting its affairs, and make and adopt such rules, by-laws, and regulations as they may deem proper for the management of said corporation; provided, that the same be in conformity with the laws and regulations of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and not repugnant to the laws of the State.

REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE LOUISIANA METHODIST ORPHANAGE.

To the Louisiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

The Board of Directors of the Louisiana Methodist Orphanage beg leave to sub-

mit the following report for the year 1914:

At a recent meeting of this Board held on the 24th of November last a report of the year's work, up to that date, was read and submitted by our Superintendent, Rev. Robert W. Vaughan. This report is such a full and complete expose of the affairs of the institution, and so gratifying, interesting and instructive in detail, that the Board directed that it be annexed to and made an exhibit of the present report, to the end that it might be read in open session and to this entire Conference. Indeed, so comprehensive is the Superintendent's report that it leaves nothing for this Board to say except to give its hearty endorsement and approval to everything embraced in the said report.

From the Superintendent's report it will be seen that we now have ninety children in the institution, and we have had during the year 102 children under our care. All of these who are old enough are in school and making gratifying progress; the best of health prevails among them, and they are indeed and in truth a happy, con-There has been a substantial increase in the number we were caring for one year ago, and we are now taking care of about all that we can comfortably house.

Considering the unparalleled financial stringency and depression that has prevailed during the latter half of the present year, our financial report is the best by far, in the history of the institution. The Superintendent's report shows that we have received during the year \$13,456.89, but this does not embrace the munificent donation of \$1500 by a generous citizen of Shreveport, Mr. C. W. Blair, recently given for the purpose of aiding in the payment of a two thousand dollar note we owe and which will be due January 1st next, and two car loads of farm products donated and delivered to us by the liberal hearted people of Morehouse and Ouachita Parishes. We owe \$4,000.00 with interest for one year, \$2,00 of this will be due the first of next January, and the remainder one year from that date. We have the money in sight to pay the note falling due next January, and will start in with the new year out of debt, except the \$2,000 to become due January, 1916, and with a nice balance to our credit at the bank.

At the last meeting of this Board the terms of three of our Directors, viz. Rev. W. H. Coleman, O. E. Hodge and P. K. Abel, expired by limitation. O. E. Hodge and P. K. Abel were re-elected, and in place of Rev. W. H. Coleman, Mr. C. W. Blair was elected; and this Conference is requested to confirm their election.

The Board also made the following recommendations:

The sum of \$12,000.00 will be needed for the maintenance of the Orphanage the year 1915, and the Annual Conference is requested to adopt ways and means of rais-That Easter and Work Day be observed as Orphanage Days for the ing this sum. purpose of raising funds for the institution.

Superintendent R. W. Vaughan was most heartily recommended for re-appoint-

ment.

Our institution is taking strong hold upon the hearts of the Methodist people of the State, and is growing in popularity every day. In some places in the State there appears to be a most commendable and praiseworthy spirit of rivalry in the matter of making contributions to the support of the institution, and helping along in all ways needful to its general welfare. This Board is far from being unmindful of the kindly consideration shown to our institution and the great cause it stands for. hearted generosity of the Methodist people of the City of Shreveport, for an instance, demonstrates, beyond all doubt, the fact that they are conscious of their duty to this benevolence of their denomination, and liberally responsive to its needs; and, more than this, they have taken our little children into their hearts and their homes and given them exhibitions of royal Christian hospitality and goodwill the effect of which is to instill into their little minds exalted ideas of the virtues of Christian benevolence and the love that recognizes the brotherhood of man.

To the Hon. S. D. Pearce, President, and Members of the Board of Directors of the Louisiana Methodist Orphanage:

Dear Brethren:

I take pleasure in presenting my report for the year beginning Nov. 15th, 1913, and ending Nov. 15th, 1914, concerning the work of the Louisiana Methodist Orphanage.

In many respects this has been the best year in the history of our operations. The undisturbed peace among the children and workers; the steady progress and development of the children in their school work; the ability to meet our financial obligations and the fact that we have passed another twelve months without the loss of one of our children by death, affords us sufficient reasons for praise and thanksgiving to the God of us all.

We have had under our care 102 children during the year. Of these we now have ninety children in the home; placed six with relatives that can provide for them; found good Christian homes for three; two we have found positions for who are now making their own living; placed one in school at Mansfield Female College, who is being provided for by her sister, and graduated one from the North Louisiana Industrial Institute, who is now teaching, making a happy, independent living. We have had quite a bit of sickness during the year, suffering epidemics of measles, mumps, whooping cough and scarlet fever. But I am happy to report to you that with all our sickness we have not lost one patient, or has one been left with any ill effects. Our children, in the main, are healthy, happy, industrious. They hold out the promise of making most worthy and useful citizens when they have reached years of maturity, and we have every reason to congratulate our great Church and people and the work already accomplished for many of our most hopeless, dependent and helpless of human kind.

We are most happy in at last finding a Matron who has the energy, the intelligence and adaptability for this work that has long been a felt need in our work. We feel most fortunate in having Miss Luia Keller as our House Matron. We are equally fortunate in having Miss Bula Gustafason in the Sewing Department and Miss Mattie Easterling in the Dining Room and Kitchen work. All these workers are giving perfect satisfaction and we trust we will be able to hold them in their present positions. Since the 17th of September we have had Rev. I. T. Reams with us as Assistant Superintendent. He has rendered faithful and efficient service, and we had hoped that we might be able to retain his services. But for reasons best known to Brother Reams, he has decided that he would rather return to the pastorate, and we will be compelled to secure the services of some other to assist in our work.

While this year has not been marked with any large gifts to our work, we have been able to secure ample funds to meet our obligations from the general collections over the State and Conference. Mr. C. W. Blair, of Shreveport, has generously effered \$1,000 toward the liquidation of our indebtedness, and he hopes that others may be induced to contribute enough to pay off the entire debt at the earliest possible Aside from this generous gift, Mr. Blair has always been a liberal supporter moment.

of our work, and we feel that his interest in our cause is a most valuable asset. We only hope that we may be able to find others like him, who will make it possible for us to secure the needful funds, not only to meet our indebtedness, but to make the improvements necessary for the satisfactory operation of a growing institution such as ours is.

and Edith Higginbotham Memorial Home.

Our agricultural interests this year suffered severely from the drought, yet we raised a fairly good crop of corn, had plenty of late vegetables, and raised an abundance of sweet potatoes for our use. We also succeeded in making over 100 gallons of syrup, and have seed enough for our next crop. We also raised over 100 bushels of peanuts and made nearly 100 bales of peanut hay. Because of the druoght we were not able to do very much canning, although we canned over 500 cans of tomatoes.

But for the present unpromising financial condition that confronts us, and because we are seriously hampered in our work for greatly needed improvements, we could look to the future with the greatest of confidence and hope. We do believe there has never been a time when the people over the State were more deeply interested in our work. Our appeals meet with a ready and hearty response fro the small contributors. Many of our children are well clothed by the various societies of the State. This interest is further manifested by the desire of some who are unable to pay money to help in the way of produce. Two communities are now planning to get up a car load of produce respectively. The railroads are giving free transportation to these cars. So in spite of the depressed conditions we feel confident that our people will do the best possible for ourgreatand worthy cause.

Still we cannot operate our Institution without ready money. The salaries of the

Still we cannot operate our Institution without ready money. The salaries of the helpers necessary to our work must be paid in cash. Groceries and other necessary expenses can be paid for only in money. We cannot afford to make such recommendations to Conference as will hinder our great work, and yet you would be just and fair to all other claims of our great Church. I trust the Spirit of our Heavenly Father

will guide you in planning for the future of our work.

Grateful to God for His blessings, with sincere thanks to all our people for their liberality and help, and confident of your wisdom and co-operation in planning for our future welfare, and pledging your honorable Board my most devoted services.

MEMOIRS

ROBERT JAMES HARP.

Robert James Harp, son of Luke and Ann Elizabeth Harp, was born in Law-renceburg, Tenn., April 29, 1829, and died in Shreveport, La., July 24, 1914, at the ripe age of eighty-five years. He was deprived of both parents at a very early age but not

too early to have received a splenaid endowment in character foundations.

We are in possession of some very interesting circumstances of his childhood and youth, contained in a biographical sketch prepared by his daughter, the material of which was furnished by her father from memory. I quote as follows: "He grew and thrived, loved and petted by the two older brothers, for he was next to the youngest of four boys, three of whom became preachers as they grew to young manhood. His father lived only a few years after the birth of Robert, and his mother died when he was but seven years old. Knowing she could not live much longer she gathered her four boys about her and gave them to God in prayer with the absolute confidence that He would be both Father and Mother to them. This prayer her boys never forgot. The little seven-year-old Robert won the hearts of his mother's friends and an old friend, Col. Morrow, when he knew the mother could not get well, begged that he be allowed to take the boy to his home where he would treat him as one of his own children as long as he wished to stay." "After his mother's death, Robert went to live with his foster-father."

"That the child is father to the man" is illustrated by the incidents of his young boyhood that anticipate the character of his mature years. We see a foregleam of his gentleness in the incident which he remembered of playing in the woods, coming upon a little fawn which is not frightened at his approach, going up to it and putting his arms around its neck, the fawn following him home and growing up in his father's pasture. We see the prophecy of his quenchless industry and independence of spirit in his early farm work and his ambition "to plow like a man" when only eight years of age. His refusal to be dependent on others when eleven years old and going out to work for himself; his studying at night by a pine torch and studying even while he plowed during the day, his speller in the plow-handle. When he was twelve years old he and one of his brothers went to Mississippi to try raising cotton. They bought a piece of land in the Yazoo Valley, worked in the early morning and after school hours in the evening and that year they sold their cotton in the field for \$400.

His life was a conspicuous refutation of the "wild-oats theory" of manhood. Be-

His life was a conspicuous refutation of the "wild-oats theory" of manhood. Before leaving the home of Col. Morrow he had professed saving faith in Jesus and had become a member of the Church. In 1843 when he was only fourteen years of age he felt that he must preach the gospel. He was licensed and preached his first sermon in Yalobusha County, Mississippi, at this early age. He also applied for admission on trial to the Memphis Conference which then included North Mississippi but was considered too young. In the following year, 1844, however, he was admitted and stationed at Pontotoc Circuit, Mississippi, and in 1845 he was appointed to Sunflower Circuit,

Mississippi.

His record as a minister of the gospel, in point of years, has scarcely been duplicated in the history of our Church. Beginning from the time when the child-prophet preached his first sermon he was a minister for seventy-one years, a regular member of the itinerant ranks for seventy years, with only an intermission of a few years of local relation which should not by any means be substracted. Where is there such a record and the whole of it filled with painstaking, self-sacrificing, efficient service for the Master? The history of his itinerant ministry from 1844 is exactly contemporary with the history of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as a separate denomination,

and practically also, with the history of the Louisiana Annual Conference.

In 1846 he was transferred to the Louisiana Conference which at the General Conference of the same year had been separated from the Mississippi Conference. From the beginning this had been a difficult field and men of heroic mold were needed. Robert Harp, now seventeen years of age, responded to the call and was present for duty at the organization of the Conference in Opelousas. The young preacher was appointed to Caddo Circuit, including the town of Shreveport. A small church building had been erected before his coming, the only one in the place but there had been no regular services. The Church was soon organized as a station and he was therefore the first station paster of Shreveport where he remained during 1847 and 1848. At this time there was practically no observance of the Sabbath as a day of rest and general moral conditions were bad. He took great interest in the cause of temperance and

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organized Shreveport's first temperance society. In 1849, Brother Harp by appointment served the Alexandria charge; 1850 and 1851, Baton Rouge; 1852 and 1853, Thibodeaux; 1854 and 1855, Lake Providence; 1856, Waterproof and St. Joseph. During the years 1857-1859 he was engaged in raising money for a church in New Orleans and was successful in raising a large amount. Thus he was an early Church Extension

Secretary and New Orleans Methodism became his debtor.

During the Civil War period, 1860-1864, he was financial secretary and executive officer for the Louisiana Soldiers' Relief and Hospital Association and also presiding elder of the Opelousas District. Quoting again from Mrs. Frater's sketch, "during this period Mr. Harp traveled on foot or by horseback or buggy, through Louisiana and Mississippi, gathering supplies, clothing, sugar, cotton and molasses, to be exchanged for clothing for the Louisiana boys in gray. He had the measure of caps, shoes, clothing, etc., for every member of the Louisiana regiments. He personally organized hospitals and cared for thousands of wounded soldiers, getting supplies and medicines for them from the country. After the fall of New Orleans and the loss of the base of supplies in that city, Mr. Harp was ordered to Georgia to see what could be done for relief and betterment of the conditions in the army. He organized the Tract Publication Society for the Confederate Army and supplied the soldiers with intelligent reading matter and vest-pocket Testaments. He and his agents raised over \$140,000, and he published the Army and Navy Herald, which had reached a circulation of 20,000 copies a week and was distributed free to the soldiers. The Publishing House was located in Macon, Ga., and was in a high state of prosperity when it was burned by a Federal raid."

From 1865 to 1868 he was pastor of Moreau Street Church, New Orleans, and agent for the Nashville Publishing House. It was during this pastorate that he met Miss Agnes Pennington, of Evansville, Indiana, who was an art student in New Orleans, to whom he was afterward married, Sept. 23, 1869. The marriage union proved a most happy and blessed one. During all the subsequent years of his itinerant ministry she was his most faithful and efficient helpmeet and inspiration, in times of adversity as well as times of earthly joy. She preceded him to the heavenly shores by a little more than one year. Three daughters were born to them, Helen, now Mrs. (Dr.) F. J. Frater of Shreveport, Agnes, deceased and Bertha, now Mrs. J. E. Whitworth, also of this city, in whose home Brother Harp passed away. In 1869 he was appointed by the General Conference against his protest, agent for the Nashville House and Publisher of the New Orleans Christian Advocate, in which work he continued until 1878. During this time, if the writer understands the facts, Brother Harp again showed his ability in raising funds by securing money for the establishment of the Methodist Depository of New Orleans. In 1878 the New Orleans branch of the Publishing House, which was in a prosperous condition, was heavily drawn upon by the Nashville House, to prevent failure and the consequence was that both failed. Brother Harp was in the local relation from 1879 to 1883 spending his time in endeavoring to get a settlement from the Nashville House for the New Orleans creditors, supporting himself and family during this time as best he could. He voluntary absence from the itinerant ranks at this time is a tribute to his scrupulous and unselfish regard for business righteousness.

In January, 1884, he was re-admitted and was stationed in Mansfield until 1887; 1887 to 1890, Caddo Circuit; 1891-1894, Presiding Elder of the Shreveport District, again residing in this city. Our Father in Heaven alone knows how, through all the intervening years, his early influence had extended, like a silver thread, from one genera-

tion to another.

In 1895-1898 he was pastor of Lake Charles station; 1899, Jeanerette; 1900, Logansport charge; 1901, Texas Avenue, Shreveport; 1902, Red River Circuit; 1903-1904, Mooringsport; 1905-1906, Ida Circuit; 1907, Bossier Circuit; 1908, Noel Memorial. Since this time he has been on our honor roll of retired veterans. His itinerant ministry touched at some time almost every section of the State and has had a unique and profoundly interesting relation to the city of Shreveport. There is scarcely a spot in this section that has not felt his holy influence. His heart rejoiced to witness the material and moral progress of Shreveport and was overjoyed to see the crowning achievement of the new edifice, successor of the little Church on Market and Fannin.

Brother Harp had a cyclopedic memory for the details of our history during the heroic period in this most difficult field of our southern connection and by patient research, he had accumulated a great store of data, from which he was constructing a history of Methodism in Louisiana, which would have been invlauable, ble, but which,

alas! was destroyed by fire and cannot be replaced.

It is not in accord with the writer's temperament to indulge in extreme praise of the living or the dead but under the circumstances, I feel that scarcely anything I might write that bcars upon the life, labor and character of Brother Harp, would be in the nature of an over-statement or exaggeration. Even though I give full rein to my

heart, it would be impossible for me to do even partial justice to the simple grandeur and dignity of our beloved father in Israel, who has now at last closed his earthly labors.

In all his wonderful career he was never a seeker for place or position and in this particular, conserved the highest ideals of a Methodist itinerant preacher. He entered cheerfully every sphere or mode of service into which he was called and with

the most exacting and scrupulous fidelity, discharged every task at whatever cost.

He was a truly great man, after Christ's standard of greatness. He consecrated all of his powers, which were of no ordinary kind, to unselfish ends; so much like Christ in spirit has he seemed to me that I have felt unworthy to loose the latchet of his shoe. Those who knew him best are the readiest witnesses to these rare qualities. His heart was full of brotherly love; one of his own home testifying that "he did not even 'think evil.'" He lived the thirteenth chapter of first Corinthians as few others of us do.

He exhibited a rare serenity of life which was not disturbed by the most crucial tests, not when the iron of adversity for which others were responsible, entered his soul, not when cruel flames licked up the historic treasures of a life-time, nor when

death more than once entered his home.

He belongs in the category of real sainthood, not of the medieval type, for he rejoiced in friendships, social intercourse and home companionship; not of the fanatic type, for he was chaste and temperate in speech, perfectly balanced in his emotions and unusually wise and sane in all his conduct; not of the Pharisee type, for he was utterly unconscious of the rare beauty and fragrance of his life; not of the effeminate type, for he bore every mark of genuine manhood.

It was really in his old age that we younger ministers knew him and we bear witness that his life of physical and mental industry of sacrificing devotion to the blessed gospel of Jesus, even during these years of increasing infirmity, puts us to

shame. 'God help us to keep the faith of our fathers!

He never did rest on his oars, very reluctantly giving up the active work, expecting to the very last, to resume his preaching again, his wandering mind during his final illness still being burdened with the necessity of filling appointments to preach

the everlasting gospel.

Brother Harp's life is an assurance of immortality. Such a soul as his must inevitably continue to live and serve in a higher order. We may see him in the company of the redeemed, who sing "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain!" He has gone by spiritual gravitation to his place among the immortals, close up to the apostles and prophets and the Son of Man Himself.


I will conclude this memoir by quoting the final paragraph of a beautiful tribute
