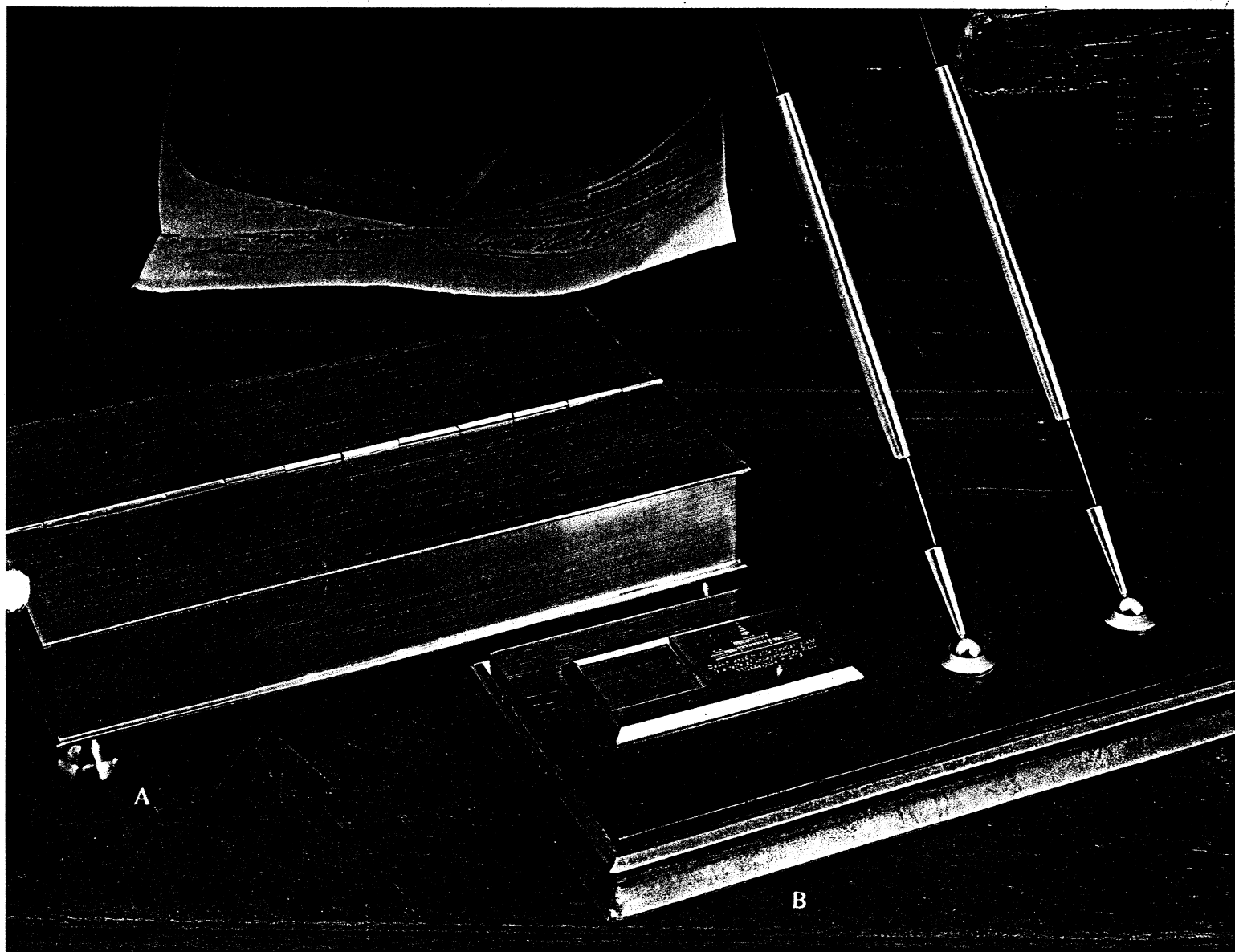

Each Parker Bicentennial Desk Set is furnished with a solid pewter plate embedded with a wood relic from the timbers of Independence Hall.

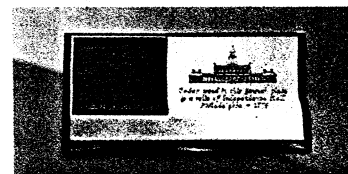
### (A) Colonial Writing Stand

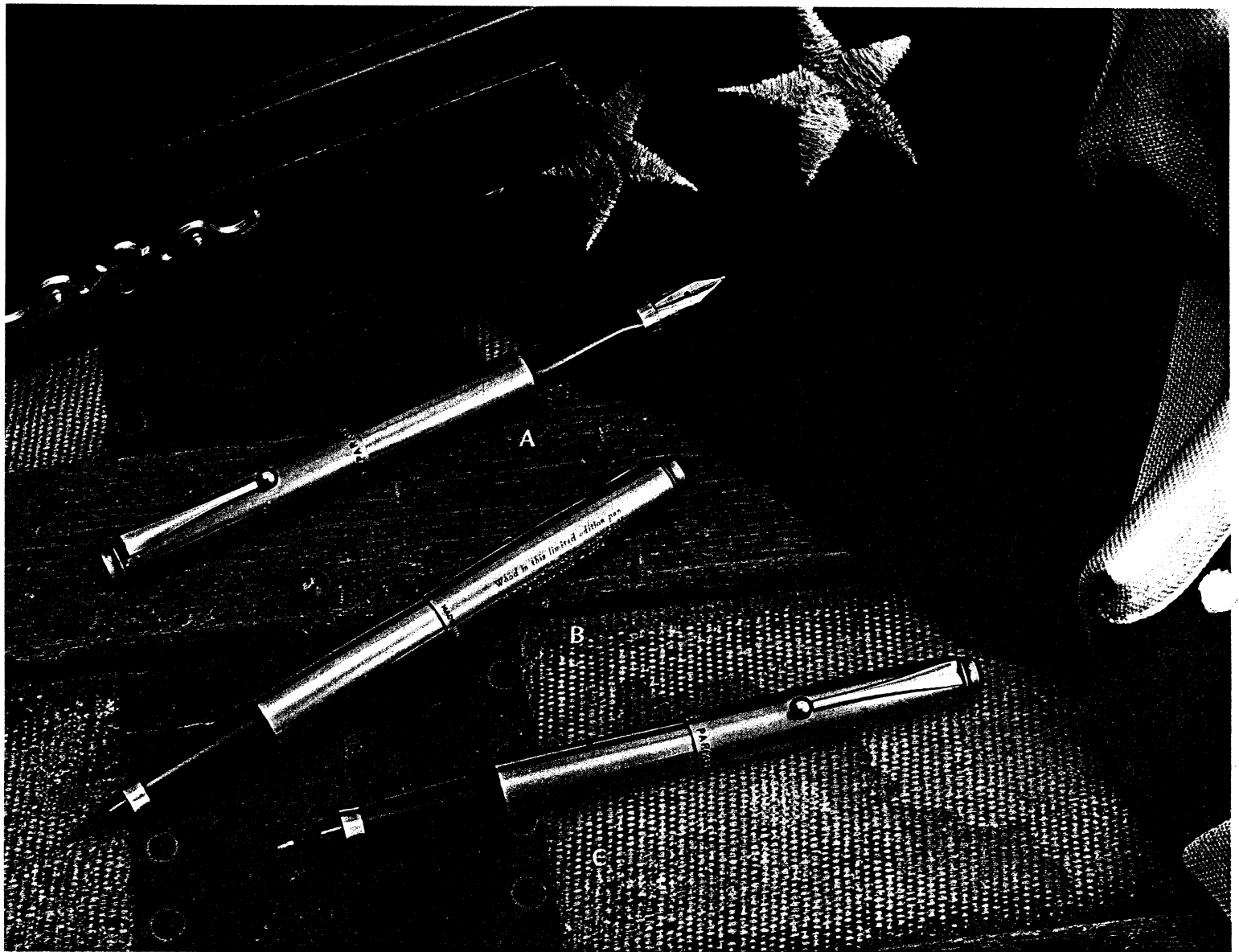

The wood embedded in the crown of each pen was part of the timbers of Independence Hall, Philadelphia, where - on July 4, 1776 - John Hancock, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and 53 other patriots penned their signatures to the Declaration of Independence, the document that created a new nation, the United States of America.

Parker 75 Americana pens will be produced in a limited edition, each pen sold individually numbered to enhance its value.

Though it is cracked and voiceless, the Liberty Bell remains a symbol of America's faith. It bears the inscription "Proclaim Liberty throughout all the Land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

### Independence

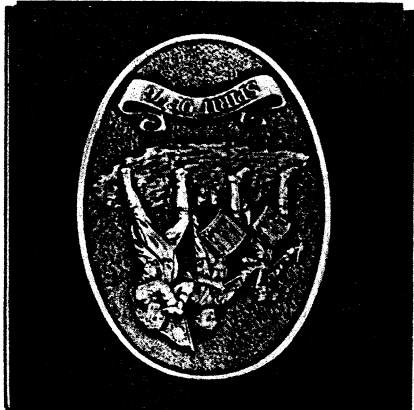
The Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. In the painting by John Trumbull, Thomas Jefferson is shown presenting the document to John Hancock.

### Minute Man

Minute men shed the first blood in the war for American freedom on April 19, 1775. This statue recalls the "embattled farmers" who had agreed to defend their lands against the British troops of a minute's notice.

### Spirit of '76

From Archibald Willard's famous painting *The Spirit of '76*, the Centennial Celebration in Philadelphia in 1876 and now hangs in Abbot Hall, Marblehead, Massachusetts.
