TRUSTEE'S REPORT

Citizens of Peabody:

The Trustees of the Peabody Institute present herewith the sixty-eighth annual report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1919.

The Trustees have been faithful in attendance at all meetings. The Treasurer and Secretary, also all committees, have performed their duties to the best of their ability. The Treasurer, Mr. John J. Gallagher, has just been elected for the third term of service, which demonstrates the confidence of the citizens in his ability to handle the finances of the institution.

The Librarian, Mr. John E. Keefe, has endeared himself to all patrons of the library, both children and adults, by his kind and helpful attentiveness.

The Custodian, Mr. J. Murray Wilson, has maintained the high standard which he established in his first year of service. The splendid decorum which exists at all times in the reading room and the excellent condition of the property testify to his efficient work.

Last year a committee was appointed to consider several necessary changes which are needed to make the library more up to date. They secured the services of Mr. John M. Gray, a very capable architect, who prepared plans and estimated cost of same. The Trustees, after careful deliberation, found it necessary to appeal to the city for help.

They appointed a committee to appear before the Mayor and Council. A yearly appropriation of \$3000 was asked. This was the first time any help had ever been solicited from the city. The Institute has paid hundreds of dollars into the city treasury for water and lights. The City Council voted to indefinitely postpone action. It is to be hoped that next year the city government can see its way clear to help an institution which can do so much towards Americanizing the large foreign population which lives among us.

Last fall a new Chickering grand piano was purchased for the lecture and concert hall. We felt that it was only right we should have an instrument which the greatest artist could not disapprove.

The building committee are having the front vestibule, the entrance to the Eben Dale Sutton Library, reading room and small corridor renovated; also a new lighting system installed in the reading rooms.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Peabody, Mass., Dec. 30, 1919.

Trustees Peabody Institute, Peabody, Mass.

Gentlemen:

You will find my report for the year 1919 appended in detail. Perusal of the report will reflect the extent of our holdings of "long term" Railroad Securities which were purchased extensively some years ago, when rails were considered by many as secure as government bonds, and in line with all large investors these bonds show a marked depreciation on today's market value. Disposition of these securities under the present conditions would entail a large loss on principal. The difficulty with all the Railroads is that under present operating conditions, high wages, low rates, there is little operating profit.

President Wilson's proclamation establishing the first day of March, 1920, as the date for the roads' return to private ownership and the general opinion is that they will be returned with an increase in freight rates, which clarifies and strengthens the situation. Aside from general economic depression reflected in all high grade securities, rails should be as strong as any public service or industrials with a proper adjustment of rates.

All our investments are paying interest and dividends excepting the following:

Peabody General Fund

Indiana Columbus & Eastern R. R. defaulted interest Nov. 1, 1919. A bondholders' protective committee is being organized to protect the holders of these securities.

Eben T. Osborn Fund

One share New York, New Haven & Hartford R. R. acquired this year when this estate was settled.

With the reorganization of the Boston & Maine R. R. the interest on \$1000—B. & M. R. R. 4's—1944, defaulted since Jan. 1, 1917, was paid up to date.

The Bondholders' Protective Committee who have been digging through the ruins of the 28th and 29th Crosstown New York R. R. have made a report, as a result of which \$5000 invested in these securities by the Trustees in 1903 and 1906 results in a loss to the Institute of \$3892. This overdraft on the General Fund reflects conclusively that this fund fails to anywhere near accomplish what it has done in the past, owing to the prevailing high cost of all commodities, while the overdraft in the Reserve Fund is caused by the purchase of a new piano, \$1500, and numerous repairs made on the plant.

Gentlemen:—In accordance with our instructions we have audited the books and accounts of the Treasurer of the Trustees for the year ended Decembr 31, 1918, and report thereon as follows:

The income from interest on bonds, dividends on stocks, and bank interest has been verified and all found to be accounted for properly. Receipts from hall rent and sundry receipts by the Library were not verified, but accepted as shown in the cash books.

Cancelled checks and vouchers were on hand covering all disbursements, the vouchers being properly approved, where such approval was necessary.

The cash balances as shown by the cash books were found to agree with the bank statements as of December 31, 1918, due allowance being made for outstanding checks.

The securities and savings bank books representing the investments of the various funds were examined and found to be on hand as called for by the records. The savings bank accounts were not verified by communication with the banks, but the several balances shown in the savings bank books were initialled by members of the Board of Trustees.

We have also examined the insurance policies covering the buildings, personal property and liability insurance.

Attached hereto, and forming a part of this report, are three schedules showing the transactions of the Trustees for the year and the condition of the funds at the end of the year.

LIBRARY COMMITTEES

To the Lyceum and Library Committee:—

Report of the Peabody Library Committee for the year ending December 31, 1919.

The principle duties of the Library Committee consist in the selection of books for the Library. This important work was accomplished by the co-operation of the Librarian and the Committee, and we are indebted to Mr. Keefe for valuable assistance in determining the best and most suitable books. We had 1023 books for inspection during the year, and from that number, 469 were purchased for the Library.

The work of the Library for the year shows a notable increase over the circulation of the previous year.

Publishers and booksellers are making a special effort to furnish a better class of books for children, and in this work, they should receive the support and assistance of public Libraries. Their object is to provide clean, wholesome reading, selected, not only from new books, but from some of the older publications. A number of interesting volumes of war books were purchased during the year, but a large percentage of the war books now published, were written by men whose observation of the war was taken at a safe distance from the fighting lines.

A public Library, particularly in an industrial community like Peabody, has an important and useful mission. Many of the people who are here to enjoy the privilege and opportunities that this country offers them, do not realize,

that they have obligations and responsibilities, that are due to the government that protects and keeps them. Many of them came here too late in life to get the advantages of the free education that this country offers to all well-meaning people who come to her shores, and therefore, their opportunity of acquiring a knowledge of the duties and responsibilities they owe to the country that gives them a home, can only be acquired in the evening school, or in the public Library.

The Peabody Library Committee, and the Librarian, are desirous of helping such people, and will provide for their use, books that will help them in acquiring a true knowledge of American institutions.

Among a number of anarchists recently arrested in New York for deportation, was a young man of 17 years, who stated, "That he did not believe in the constitution of the United States, did not believe in any form of government, nor in any religion, and that he came to these conclusions by reading books that he obtained from a branch of the New York public Library." Public officials who put books teaching such poisonous doctrines in the hands of such people, should be shown that they cannot do so with impunity.

The classes that are being conducted in Americanization in Peabody have been invited to visit the library reading room, where suitable books will be provided for them.

The Librarian should have additional stacks for the proper exhibition of books, and we hope that the Trustees will make provision for them during the coming year.

It has been stated, that the Trustees contemplate extensive alterations in the Library building. It is hoped, that the needed income for the management and care of the Library will not be impaired by such work. The amount of money furnished annually by the Trustees for the maintenance of the Library, does not provide but very inadequate

ly for its needs. The appropriation for the Lyceum and Library Committee last year was \$4200.00. The city of Salem for the same period appropriated \$20,000.00 for her Library. The circulation of the Salem Library is not much larger than that of the Peabody Library, and yet Salem paid \$13,000.00 in salaries, and Peabody \$2350.00.

Since the date of its establishment, 66 years ago, the Peabody Library has had six Librarians, including the present incumbent, all men of high literary attainments, and eminently fitted for the duties of the office, and yet all very much underpaid for the service they rendered. To those whose services are but a pleasing memory of courteous attention to the patrons of the Library, it is now too late to do them justice, but adequate renumeration must be provided for the officials of the future.

That the patrons of the Library are receiving capable and efficient service is shown by the following article copied from a recent issue of a local paper.

"The shelves of the Peabody Library are filled with the best fiction, both modern and classical. Educational works on every art and science are there in abundance. Librarian Keefe is on hand to give you the best kind of service, the kind of Library service seldom found in cities of our size."

It is evident therefore, that patrons of the library appreciate the service that Mr. Keefe is giving them. The Library Committee realize fully the value of that service, and are pleased to note its indorsement from other sources.

All the attendants of the Library are performing their duties faithfully and the Janitor, Mr. Wilson, is to be commended for his good work.

REPORT OF THE LYCEUM COMMITTEE

The Lyceum Committee submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1919:—

May 14—Miss Ruth Stickney, violinist and pianist, assisted by Wendall Mason in readings, gave a fine program to a large and appreciative audience.

May 19—Mr. Pitt. Parker, crayon artist, clay modeller and lecturer, gave two of his instructive entertainments. The afternoon for school pupils, and evening for adults. Large and well pleased audiences greeted him with enthusiastic approval. The coloring of some of his scenes being especially fine and very instructive.

June 10—Miss Millicent Stanger, dramatic reader, gave a fine presentation of the Scotch play "Kitty McKay" before a good sized audience. The beautiful Scotch dialect being finely rendered. Between the acts of the play Mr. Clarence Alexander, baritone soloist, accompanied by Mrs. Ida A. Bushby, pianist, rendered choice selections to the well pleased audience.

October 7—The Vissochi Florentine Trio presented one of their popular concerts finely rendered and enthusiastically received by a large audience.

October 14—Miss Margaret Peinick presented the great play of "Experience," which was without doubt, one of the best readings ever given in Institute hall. Between the acts of the play Miss Marie Kelliher, the very gifted soprano soloist, rendered choice selections of song, seldom, if ever, equalled in our hall. She was accompanied on the new grand piano by Miss Mary P. Clifford. A fine audience for

a stormy evening, greeted them with much applause, encores being the rule.

November 5—Another good sized audience for a stormy evening welcomed the Pierces in their dramatic readings and play acting. Their work was of the highest order, and unstinted applause greeted the efforts of the talented artists.

November 10—The Marshal Musical Duo gave a superior entertainment by talented musicians. Vocal and instrumental, including bell ringing, xylophone, organ chimes, etc. The main hall was entirely filled, with many standing, who greeted the performers with profuse applause and demanded many encores. The splendid work of this gifted company was a fitting close for a most successful year, both as to size of audiences and quality of entertainments.

Owing to the high cost of talent and traveling expenses and in order to give the people of our city what they have a right to expect to see and hear in Institute hall, your committee have a right to expect a larger allowance of money, at least enough to cover what they are compelled to pay for police, advertising and incidental expenses, and trust the increase will be made in order that the success of the Lyceum may be continued.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Lyceum and Library Committees:—

Gentlemen:—I respectfully submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1919:

The circulation shows an increase of almost 6000 volumes over the preceding year, which is most gratifying to all interested in the library and its work. Pupils of the schools, and especially of the High school, have shown a marked interest in the Library and have consulted its files frequently in connection with their studies.

Throughout the school year the pupils have found the library of assistance in finding references in history and material for themes, and also in finding the answer to numerous questions on a wide range of subjects. The increasing use of the library and its facilities by the school children is an indication that the institution is fulfilling in some degree the hopes and sentiments of the founder.

A number of volumes have been forwarded to the Community House regularly for the use of the children, and excellent results have come from this work.

I renew my recommendation for the installation of an open stack or shelf in the main Library for the display of the latest accessions to the Library. I believe this addition would be greatly appreciated by the reading public, as it would enable the readers to keep in touch with the latest publications. It also would probably tend to increase the circulation.

During the coming year I hope the library will be able to purchase new books in foreign languages, including fact

books, so that it may continue the work of Americanization that was retarded by the world war. The results of this work prior to the world war justifies its renewal as soon as possible.

The increasing price of books and binding has forced the Library to curtail in the purchase of new volumes, as the book allowance is limited. Seven hundred and forty-seven volumes were added to the library during the year and 54 gifts of books were made.

The war work in co-operation with the American Library Association was concluded last spring. All the books and magazines received at the Library were forwarded for distribution at the camps and hospitals. This was only one of the ways in which the citizens of this city demonstrated their interest in the welfare of the men at arms, and the Library and its staff were pleased to be of assistance in this work.

The renovation of the entrance to the Library and also of the reading room, together with the installation of up-to-date lighting appliances, promises to be a decided improvement. I feel very strongly that the main Library room should be renovated and a modern lighting system installed therein, as the present system is very inadequate.

Membership in the Library Art Club has been continued and the following exhibitions were given during the year:

I wish to record my appreciation of the many courtesies and cordial support extended to me by your committee, and also of the zeal and loyalty of the Library staff.
