# LAGO'S NEW "EMPLOYEES MEDICAL CENTER" OPENED TO VISITORS

Center", replacing the old Plant Dispensary, opened its doors to its first visitors last Thursday when a group of doctors and press men were invited to tour and inspect the new facilities. On hand to welcome and guide the two groups - at different hours of the afternoon - were Dr. R. C. Carrell, Head of Lago's Medical Department, and Dr. R. F. Brace, long time Head of the Plant Dispensary and designated Chief of the new Center. Also present for the occasion was Dr. Thomas Kienzle of the staff of the parent company's Medical Department in New York.

Both Dr. Carrell and Dr. Brace in their introductory remarks stated that the completion of the Medical Center was the fulfilment of a dream that began many years ago. For long they had realized the inadequacy of the old Plant Dispensary, and the beautiful, new Center would be a unit more capable of taking maximum care of the employees for whom it was built. It was erected by the firm of Petrona & Croes at a cost of approximately Fls. 700,000.

Dr. Brace explained to the visitors that the Center would not only take care of actual physical illnessess and injuries, but would pay great attention to "constructive medicine," which dealt more with the preventive aspect of illness. Attention would also be paid to the "psychosomatic" or mental

On hand medical will be open to visits by employees and their families from Nov. 14-18, and during the period of November 19-21 records, equipment and furniture needed from the old dispensary will be moved into place. "Business" begins on the 22nd.

The Management of the Lago deserve the deepest thanks of the employee body for making such an up-to-date and valuable Medical Unit available to their workers. And a special word of compliment must go to Dr. Carrell and Dr. Brace who have worked on the idea for years and have at last seen their dream fulfilled.

He refused to do so, even though the Germans offered to set him free and send him back to Aruba. He was shot by the Germans for being a member of the Dutch Resistance. He gave his young life so that others might live.

On Saturday morning last, the tenth anniversary of his execution, the highest offcial in the Netherlands Antilles, His Excellency Governor A. A. M. Struycken, and Lieutenant Governor Dr. L. C. Kwartsz, in the presence of "Boy's" father and mother, relatives and government • officials, laid wreaths at the foot of the statue of Aruba's war hero.





2,500 SEE CURACAO'S CHAM-PION, LUCKY STRIKE, WHIP L.S.P. "A" SELECTION, 12-5,

E. Huckleman, Baseball Commissioner of the Nat. Non-Prof. Assoc. of the N.A., pitches first ball

Lucky Strike crushed the inexperienced LSP "A" Selection with a 12-hit barrage behind the 4-hit pitching of a combination of three Curacao hurlers, in the first of two games played at the Lago Sport Park during last week-end.

Until the bottom of the fourth, the match was scoreless; and it was a race between Curacao's Gravenhorst and Aruba's Donald Panthophlet (chosen by manager Legrand as starter instead of the LSP "A" champion pitcher, S. Lejuez) to see who would register the most strike-outs and give the least hits. Up to the fifth, Curacao had only one hit, an infield that skidded off the glove of pitcher Panthophlet and was too late for second-baseman Blijden, to make a play at first. Even up to the seventh, Donald was not tagged hard. He had three hits against him so far.

Gravenhorst of Lucky Strike -although a run was scored against him off two walks, an error and a squeeze play -- had a better advantage over his adversary, Panthophlet. Despite his giving up six bases on balls in those six inmings for one run, Aruba got only one safely from him, and this came in the sixth off the bat of V. Benjamin who substituted on second for T. Blijden in the fifth. A total of seven pitchers were used in the game, with Aruba taking the margin. Curacao used three and Aruba four. The four Aruba pitchers were blasted for a total of 12 hits, while the Curacao moundsmen were cracked for singles three times.

Aruba did not keep the fourth round 1-run lead for long, for, in the following inning, Curacao came across with three runs off three costly errors and a hit. Another run was produced in the seventh, when Panthophlet was connected hardest. He allowed two singles and his third baseman helped the cause with an overthrow error, (his second of the night), to first.

Curacao's biggest inning was the eighth; Lucky Strikers came to bat ten times and Canister got THE LOCAL



mound in the ninth -- something to remember also, the Curacao, champs scored a single on a passball by S. Richardson. The run followed a hit and another error.

Aruba did not score again until the eighth and ninth rounds. Two runs came across in each of these two innings. It was in the eighth that Lucky Strike's hurler. 





#### THE COMING ELECTION FOR MEMBERS OF THE **LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL** (STATEN) OF THE N.A.

The coming election for members of the N.A. Legislative Council (Staten) will take place on Monday, November 15th.

This Council is comprised of 20 members: 12 representing Curacao, 8 for Aruba, 1 for Bonaire and 1 for the Windward islands.

In 1949 with the inauguration of the Interim Regulation, allowing The Netherlands Antilles and Surinam part independence, the first election took place, qualifying every body to vote who had reached the age of 23.

In the last election in 1950, 5 parties sought election.

- The AVP (Eman party) gained 4 seats.
- The PPA (Irausquin) gained 2 seats.
- The UNA (Tromp) gained 1 seat. The UNA (Dussenbroek) gained 0 seats.
- The Eenheidspartij (Vlaun) gained 1 seat.

The AVP is the oldest party and up to now has the most seats in the Council.

The UNA which for some time had been split is said to be the party of the more religious people of the island while the Eenheidsparty has disappeared from the scene. The campaign which is presently going on is very hot and the fight is mainly between the two rivals, the AVP and the PPA.

On the roof of houses, in trees, on cars, one can see the flags of the parties.

Members and sympathizers, wearing AVP and PPA shirts displaying the colors also waging a "cold war".

General meetings oftentimes with music are held almost every night in all parts of the island.

The police are keeping a watchful eye on the meetings to prevent disturbances.

On the 14th of this month the PPA will hold its annual big parade when hundreds of cars flying the colors of the party and the candidates sitting in the front cars will pass through the streets of Aruba.

### Altar Boy Reportedly Admits Slaying Girl

A lanky, 15-year-old altar boy and former Boy Scout was charged with murder last Saturday after he allegedly confessed to strangling Geraldine Annese, 15, an ex-schoolmate, whose nude body was found last week Friday in a garage beside her home in Norwood, Mass.

District Attorney Myron Lane said Peter Makarewicz, Jr., confessed strangling the girl with his bare hands.

Peter allegedly confessed after eight hours' questioning. Handcuffed to police later, he walked through a horrified crowd of his neighbors as investigators sought a re-enaction of the crime.

Lane said: "There was sex connected with the attack. He planned to do it that (Thursday) evening. We have evidence that shows he had reason (to kill the girl) although he didn't say".

Geraldine, a vivacious so homore in a vocation school, had been out with other teen-agers Thursday night and left them about 9:45 p.m. When she failed to return home by 11:30 p.m. her father reported her missing.

Next morinng, her body, clad only in socks, was found on the garage floor. A necklace was drawn tightly around her neck, but authorities did not believe the ornament was the instrument of death.

Peter and Geraldine went to grammar school together. Until recently they had taken the same cooking course in school. They lived around the corner from each

Seventeen people are feared drowned following the sinking last Sunday of the 30-ton inter-island schooner Eugenia A, on a voyage from St. Vincent to Trinidad. Three survivors of the vessel were picked up by a French ship and taken to Martinique. Capt. Conrad Frederick, the schooner's master, is among those missing.

Survivors include two women & a man.

One is Mrs. Cecelia Tannis, wife of the owner of the Eugenia A. Albert Tannis, another survivor and one of the crew, rescued Mrs.

Tannis. The third person, a passenger, is unidentified. The ship had ten passengers and a crew of ten.

Shipping circles in Port-of-Spain, described the disaster as the worst in Caribbean shipping history, since the schooner, Island Queen disappeared on Saturday, August 5, 1944, with 66 on board. The Island Queen was then bound for St. Vincent from Greneda with an excursion party.

Reports state that Eugenia A., sailed out of Kingstown on Saturday with cargo for Trinidad.

A few hours out of port, while sailing through the Bequia Channel, she capsized and went down in a strong current.
