All publications were accordingly notified in good time, except THE LOCAL. Our notice came half an hour before the deadline for submitting the pictures. Consequently, the pictures — even though they were ready — could not reach Oranjestad in time.


Over the phone and at the stadium (the day of the opening), this was explained to Mr. Cloo and a pass requested for our photographer.

It was not given then, because Mr. Frans Wever (in charge) was too busy just then, but our photographer was permitted to pass without the pass on that day. We were also promised that "during the week" his pass would be taken care of. It never came. The baseball series did.

So, we refreshed Mr. Cloo's memory on this score. By the time he stated that he had no pictures of our cameraman available and the same day we re-submitted two. He promised to leave the pass at the printery for us.

On Friday evening — when the pass would be ready — it was not there.

Attempts to get in touch with Mr. Cloo on Saturday failed because he attended a meeting. We paid for our cameraman to enter on Saturday and wasted several films, bulbs and our time, as we had the week before when Lt. Governor Kwartzs officially opened the tournament.

Following the match, we again traveled to the residence of Mr. Cloo who was absent. On Sunday, prior to the starting hour of the matches this was repeated.

To our surprise we were informed that Mr. Wever (man in charge) whom, incidentally, we have never seen at the stadium except for the opening day, had refused to issue the pass. The matter was to be discussed first with the board of the "Stichting" to see if it would be in order, since "another photographer" already had been given a pass and THE LOCAL could get pictures from him! Don't laugh, dear reader.

Mr. Cloo, however, referred us to Mr. Arends with whom, he said, he had discussed the matter and who had told him (Cloo) that he would give us a pass for the baseball tournament. So we went back to the stadium to find Mr. Arends. When we actually did, he told us that he was not the man. We should see Albertico Arends. So we did and were told by Mr. Albertico that what Cloo had said was not true and impossible, since he (Albertico) had to secure his own pass from the "Stichting". He therefore could not hand out any. It should be noted here that Mr. "Zep" Oduber had also confirmed the fact that this was a "Stichting's" problem, when we contacted him the previous day.

At this stage it became glaringly clear to us — as it must to you — that this pantomime was simply a method of giving THE LOCAL the brush off, so we gave up. It is interesting, however, to note the following:

1. THE LOCAL has the largest circulation of all commercial publications published here in Aruba. (Esso News is non-commercial).

2. THE LOCAL has given the organization its fullest cooperation and support at all times for the sake of our sportsmen.
3. THE LOCAL has been the only commercial publication on the island which has actually and continuously carried pictures of stadium activities.
4. On the program, issued on the opening day, THE LOCAL's engraving was used FREE OF CHARGE on the cover. It was the same cameraman who took that very same picture! We stood the expenses.
5. Whenever advertisements are given for stadium activities the "Arubaanse Courant", "Beurs" and "Amigoe" get them... not THE LOCAL. Reason? The respective editor and correspondents are either members of the "Stichting" or are in the bunch of "friends" of the "Stichting's" board.
6. When Mr. Albertico Arends wanted a report on the opening match between Aruba and Curacao to send to Sto. Domingo, he did not ask the gentlemen mentioned under (5) for same (they were not even there), but got it from... THE LOCAL.
7. The photographer mentioned by Mr. Wever (per Cloo) is NOT a member of the Press As-

sociation and is NOT attached to any publication. He is also not a professional photographer. But, he may be... a friend.

8. When the ABBA was formed, the only publication sufficiently interested to attend the meeting was... THE LOCAL.
9. When a boost for the tournament was needed, Mr. J. "Zep" Oduber called on... THE LOCAL.
10. When a stinking, rotten, nasty deal was handed out, it was not given to the "friends" and their publications, but is was given to... THE LOCAL.

It is also interesting to note that a newspaper man who flew from Curacao to cover the games and who was properly identified with a press card, had to pay his way inside the stadium. Reason? He is colored and is not "a friend"

The very same reason which was responsible for not sending an opening ceremony invitation to Mr. J. de Freitas, who for years and years had been a referee at the Wilhelmina Sport Park and to Jeweler Raghunath who donated a trophy. The refereeing "friends" were all there.

From the foregoing, we believe, our readers will fully understand why we are not covering the tournament. THE LOCAL was not permitted to enter!

Glimpses from the New World

HEART-LUNG MACHINE.

New York (Vaz Dias) After careful experiments on dogs, a heart-lung machine has recently been successfully used to save the life of a human being. The "dispersion oxygenator", an all-glass contraption, was applied in a 75 minute non-surgical operation to cure a badly hurt fireman whose lungs were scarred and whose heart was affected. His blood was sent from a vein in the long through theoxygene spending machine. Cleaned of carbon dioxide, it then was pumped back through a vein in the arm. Released of his breathing difficulties, the patient's color changed from a ghastly blue to a healthy almost normal pink. It was explained that formation of fatal bubbles in the use of heart-lung machines is prevented by a process that breaks up oxygenated blood the way Scotch and soda is stirred up to make it fizz".

ARUBA ESSO ROAD MAP AVAILABLE TO PUBLIC

Aruba's first complete road map will be offered to the public today, June 7, at all of the Aruba Esso Service Stations.

This map, which is being made available to the motoring public through the courtesy of all Esso Dealers and the Lago Oil & Trans-

port Co., Ltd. represents the first time in history that a motorist can secure a complete, up-to-date, and authoritative map of Aruba's highways and byways.

The 16X16 3/4 inch folder, printed on both sides in red and blue, shows main and secondary highways, paved and hard surface roads, and country roads, as well as some important links in the San Nicolas area that are planned for the future.

Insets of a conveniently large size show details in Oranjestad, San Nicolas, and the entire eastern residential area including such districts as the Home Building Foundation groups, Lago Heights, Lago Colony, and others.

The handy index for locating points of interest on the main map is also used on these insets, clearly indicating the location of Government buildings, schools, churches, clubs, consulates, theatres, and other noteworthy features. Elevations are shown for various parts of the island. Almost all items of information are shown in both Dutch and English.

Other features include a brief history of Aruba, a display of the international traffic signs in official colors, with their meanings, and many decorative drawings showing scenic spots or aspects of Aruba life.

LAGO DEFEAT C.P.I.M IN COLTS GAME.

Full cooperation by each member of the Aruba team assisted skipper Sealey to win the first cricket match against the visiting C.P.I.M. team.

Reid & Clarke opened for C.P. I.M. and at 6, Reid was returned when he sneaked one into Straughn's gloves for 4. Farara joined Clarke and took the score to 51 when Clarke was bowled by Roosberg making a very lazy and tiresome stroke.

Farara top scored with 38 after three chances. Parris and Niles were very aggressive but did not

Niles impressed the spectators and received quite a bit of comment on his steady length and took 3 wickets for 31 in 10 overs, Reid 2 for 35 in 12, Callendar 2 for 17 in 4, White, Hayling and Brooks 1 each for 33, 9 and 11 runs respectively.

The fielding on both sides was up to standard and provided the crowd with a lively game.

C. P.I.M. DRAW TEST MATCH AGAINST LAGO.

Faulty fielding marred Sealey's Opportunity for Victory.

A packed stadium witnessed Lago's Public Relations Manager, Mr. B. Teagle open the cricket test match between C.P.I.M. and Lago Sunday last.

C.P.I.M., having won the toss, sent Lago to bat, and within a relatively short time, Bryan 5; McLean 4; Linton 4 were returned by Brooks for 33 runs and Reid of Aruba beautifully caught and bowled by Reid of Curacao for 19, brought the crowd to their feet, with the score 37 for 4.

At this stage, Ifill & Martindale partnered and batted their team into a good position, and at 106, Niles made a confident appeal against Ifill who had scored a most attractive and careful innings for 44. Niles later dismissed Perrotte for 6 and minutes afterwards Martindale was given lbw to Gunthorpe for 25. With the score 116 for 7, Sealey made another brilliant display, assisted by Johnson and took the score to 170 when

Green left Sealey scrambling to a delivery from Cox for 38. Hayling quickly disposed of the remaining batsman and Johnson carried his bat for a well played 25 not out, Lago scored 188 in 206 minutes.

Bowling for C.P.I.M., Niles took 2 for 55, Brooks 3 for 34, Hayling 2 for 0, Gunthorpe, Reid, Cox 1 each for 14, 29, 20 runs respectively.

C.P.I.M. opened with Reid & Clarke to the bowling of Green & Martindale and at lunch time scored 5 without loss. On resumption of play, Clarke attempted to turn Perrotte to the leg side and was caught by Reid for 10. Reid made a beautiful late cut off Shockness to the boundary, his partner Farara returning by McLean for 9. Vere Green followed and received a great ovation from the crowd. Hustling a quick boundary followed by a double, Green was bowled by Green in attempting to drive an overpitched delivery for 6. Reid and Niles took the score to 59 in 105 minutes when Reid was left walking to a delivery from Linton for a grand 28.

Niles was caught off Linton for 12 and Parris unfortunately run out. Hayling filled the position and batted his way through to 49 at close of play. With the score 147 for 9. Hayling who made nice strokes survived three chances while Cox held the end for 8 not out. C.P.I.M.'s inning came to a close early the following morning for 147.



World News

SOUTH KOREA.

Last week-end, the South Korean President, Simon Rhee, declared martial law, and placed under arrest twelve members of the South Korean Opposition Party.

This unexpected move forced the other members of the Opposition, and also members of the Government to go into hiding to avoid arrest. On Tuesday only eighty-three members of the 184 members of the Parliament turned up for a session. Since this number was not enough to form a quorum, the Session was adjourned.

President Truman sent a personal note to Simon Rhee, in which he declared that he was shocked and amazed at the political situation in South Korea. — The U.S.A. ambassador to South Korea, who was in the U.S.A. on leave, returned to South Korea on Tuesday to put forward his government views on the situation.

FRANCE.

Early this week, the Government took steps to control the sit down strike called by the Communists on Wednesday in protest against the arrest of French Communist leaders.

All leaves for Paris policemen were cancelled and additional forces were brought in.

On Tuesday, in a 295 vote to 242 the Government agreed to tie the wages of the workers to the cost of living. Under this plan, if the cost of living rises five percent, the wages will be raised five percent;

however, no raises will be allowed in wages within a four month period from the last raise.

Workers on non-communist unions were asked to stay on their jobs on Wednesday. The Government issued a statement warning that all civil servants and government employees participating in the strike will be subject to disciplinary action.

KOREA.

The peace negotiations still remain deadlocked over the prisoner exchange issue. This week the United Nations negotiators challenged the Communists to take part in a rescreening of Prisoners. The Communists refused to take part in any screening, claiming that events on Koje Island would indicate that communists prisoners wished to return to their own lines.

Meanwhile on Koje Island, the communists prisoners continued their open defiance of the prison

authorities. On Tuesday, a group of prisoners attempted to raise another Flag in place of the one taken down by prison authorities. This resulted in an outbreak of fighting in which the guards were forced to fire, killing one and wounding nine prisoners.

STEEL INDUSTRY.

On Monday, June 2, 1952, the United States Supreme Court in a 6 — 3 decision, ruled that President Truman acted illegally on April 8, 1952, when he seized the steel industry.

Bowing to this decision, the President turned over the steel industry back to its owner.

Coming swiftly behind this move was the closing down of the several plants as more than 630,000 steel workers came out on strike and started setting up picket lines.

Phil Murray, leader of the CIO Union called upon the steel operators to continue the negotiations with the Union. He indicated that he would hold out for the total 26 cents raise and the closed union shop as approved by the Wage Stabilization Board.

The Government placed a ban on the delivery of steel to private

industry, thus diverting all available stock for the arms program. Steel production has virtually halted except for a few small plants not involved in the dispute. The combined production of these plants totals about 5% of the steel industry output.




