1952 OLYMPICS OPENED

Last Saturday, at Helsinki, the 15th Olympics was officially opened by President Paashikivi of Finland.

A huge (more or less babylonic) crowd was on hand to witness the grandiose and solemn opening-ceremonies in which over 5000 participants of 69 countries took part.

The first of the participants to enter the new, large stadium were the Greeks (in honor of the fact that the Olympic Games originated at Athens); they were followed immediately by the Antilleans and other Countries in alphabetical order (according to Finish spelling); Finland being the host, the Finnish athletes came in last.

The climax which had a deeply moving effect on the spectators and participants alike, came when Paavo Nurmi, famous Finnish Olympic hero, ran into the stadium, Olympic Torch held high in hand, and proceeded up to a 73 m. high tower where he lighted the Olympic flame which will burn continuously for the duration of the 1952 Olympic from July 19 to August 3.

Following the Olympic Oath, a large select choir solemly sang the Olympic Hymn.

"Miss Universe", beautiful Armi Kuusela of Finland was also on hand for all to see.

Judging from reports received so far, the Olympic Committee in charge of organization are to be commended highly for the very excellent manner in which they took care not only of the opening-ceremonies, but also for the fine accomodation and care of all participants, which indeed is no small matter.

The Antilleans, for one, are highly satisfied about accommodation, food and other care.

WELTER WEIGHT CHAMPION KID GAVILAN WILL DEFEND TITLE AGAINST BILLY GRA-HAM IN CUBA.

Kid Gavilan who is presently vacationing in his homeland Cuba, paid a visit to President Batista of Cuba.

Nodarse, Sport Director of Cuba. said that the title bout between Gavilan and Graham which will take place around next October will be held under auspices of the Cuban Government.

Gavilan will also tour Argentine, Chili and Peru, where he will engage several fighters over there.

World News

PERSIA.

Last Friday, Chaven Sultaneh, was appointed Premier by the Shah after Dr. Mossadeq has relinquish his position. The appointment of Sultaneh resulted in an outbreak of rioting and demonstration against the new government, and a recall for Dr. Mossadeq.

The demonstration caused Sultaneh to resign after only three days in office. After his resignation was announced crowds mar. ched through the streets carrying full size pictures of Mossadeq.

It is believed by observers that Mossadeq will take up the reign of government again, or his right hand man, Hussein Makki would be called upon to head the government.

EGYPT.

Last week end, Hussien Sirry Pasha, after 18 days in office resigned from the position of Premier, thus ending Egypt fifth cabinet since January this year. Hilary Pasha who resigned the Premiership only four weeks ago. was called upon to take up the office again.

Hilary was Premier for four months during which time he brought to Egypt a measure of stability to the country. His new cabinet will include many of his former Cabinet members including the Former Finance Minister Zaky abdel Pasha, and the former Minister of the Interior, War and Marine, Mora Maraghy Pasha,

ARGENTINA.

Last week end, all Argentina radio stations interrupted their programmes to report that the President's wife, Eva Peron, was sinking fast.

Masses for her recovery were held all over the country, with the greatest being held in the vast Inlaga de la República in the centre of Buenos Aires which was attended by over twenty rhousands.

Saturday and Sunday Children's shows were cancelled, and the Argentine delegation to the Olympic meeting in Helsinki did not participate in the inauguration parade on Saturday, but attend mass. Congress passed a law granting Eva one of Argentina's highest decorations, "The Collar of Liberator San Martin".

BERLIN

Last Saturday East German Communist regime ordered all former officers of the Wehrmacht to register for possible service in the "People's Army". The interior Ministry ordered them to report to the provincial police headquarters for political examination by the Russian-pattern security service to judge their suitability to become officers of the new East German Army.

The Russians have always kept close watch on former Gerr man officers in their zone who have been required to keep in touch with the police throughout the occupation.

Western observes saw the new registration as part of the present survey of East Germany's manpower to see how a "volunteer" army can be raised without hurting the zone's precarious economy.

U.S.A.

Last Saturday the veteran mercy ship, Gripsholm, rescued 45 of the 49 persons aboard a chemical-laden Norwegian freighten which burst into flames 200 miles east of New York. The 5.000-ton freighter, "The Black Gull" carried nine passengers and a crew of 40.

The four missing crewmen leaped 35 feet off the stern of the vessel. Coast Guard cutters and planes scoured the area for them.

The Black Gull carried a cargo valued at \$1.500.000 by her charterers.

Glimpses from the New World

The economic impact of the family car

Detroit (Vaz Dias) — There are more than 600.000 American business firms engaged in the automotive and affiliated industries, according to the 1952 edition of the Automotive News Alamanac. The figure includes over 167.000 gasoline stations many of which by non-Americans standards do a "big business" dollar volume; more than 200.000 garages, some 48.000 new-car dealers and over 36.000 exclusively used-car dealers.

Health problems of executives.

New York (Vaz Dias) — High pressured advertising men live shorter lives than the average American. The life expectancy of the advertising executive, engaged in what medical authorities call a "stress occupation", is only 57 years as against the 69 years' life span his fellow breadwinner may look forward to. Heart

trouble and high blood pressure are foremost among the fatal diseases striking the advertising profession. Believing that something can and should be done about it in the early stages of these occupational diseases, the Madison Foundation for Biochemical Research and the Fanny Markel Medical Group, both non-profit organizations, are offering advertising executives and similarly burdened businessmen complete medical tests against a prefixed nominal fee of \$75. This fee covers all diagnostic services required, regardless of the number of specialists to be consulted or how many laboratory tests may be necessary. Ab though the plan does not provide for medical treatment, it has met with favorable response from the advertising profession which seems to be fully aware that something is wrong with it healthwise.



Underground gas storage.

Jackson (Vaz Dias) — Gas supplies for the defense industry are now being stored in a giant "lung" which sucks in billions of cubic feet of natural gas. The vast underground fields, 1.300 feet in depth are situated in the Craneherry Lake area of Michigan and fed by nipelines from the south and the southwest. During high winter-months requirements the stocked-up supple will go to such important customers as General Motors, Ford Motor Connany, Chrysler Corporation and Reichold Chemical Co.. all working on defense contracts.

The present 25 million cubid feet capacity of the "lung" is being enlarged and will, upon completion of current deilling operations, he increased by 25°. The increased capacity will take care of the heavy winter peak load.

Expansion of Dutch oil refinery.

Rotterdam (Vaz Dias) — The Roval/Dutch Shell Group's oil Refinery at Pernis (near Rotterdam — the largest on the European Continent — which processed nearly 6 million tons of crude oil in 1951, will be expanded to a capacity of 9 million tons a year.



International Stamp Exhibition.

Utrecht (Vaz Dias) - To commemorate the centenary of the Notherlands postage stamp a large international stamp exhibition was held in Utrecht under the patronage of Prince Bernhard. The approximately 250 exhibitors included 45 from the Netherlands. 36 from Belgium. 33 from Great Britain. 30 from the United States, 14 from France, 15 from Switzerland, 10 from Australia, 7 from Norway 3 5 from South Africa; 5 from Egypt ;4 from Sweden; 4 from Finland; 3 each from Luxemburg, Italy and Spain; 2 each from Ireland and Israel and 1 each from Portugal, Canada and Brazil. The Oueen of England and Cardinal Spellman lent part of their famous collections.

There were beautiful collections and rare stamps on show for instance a stamp from Mauritius which had been insured for no less than £50.000.

Changing buying habits.

New York (Vaz Dias) - New trends in merchandising and retailing which may revolutionize the present retail pattern are becoming apparent in the United States according to merchandising experts. More and more dev partment stores and super mart kets remain open during the evening and it is believed that as much as 60% of the total sales volume may eventually be done at night. With millions of women working in daytime jobs, evening hours see more and more couples making the family purchases. Shopping all by himself. the father of the family is already now making 25% of all food nurchases in supermarkets.

Within the next 20 years or so a three-day weekend and a 32 hour work week may have become a reality. With two-day summer weekends becoming the rule even now, Saturday is rapidly losing ground as the biggest retail day of the week and may THE LOCAL

eventually be replaced as much by Monday in a five-day retail week. The trend toward selfservice and self-selection by the customer, which is responsible for the immense growth in supermarkets, is still only in its initial stages and will cause fundamental changes in department stores and other forms of retail as well.


Two coloured lace.



There is no shortage of stenographers within the organization, and no position which could not have been filled by upgrading; therefore, there must be other reasons for this action.

It is true that some stenographers turn out work much below standard, but in many cases, this is not the fault of the individual stenographers. but rather the conditions under which stenographers are required to work. The standard of work turned out is set by the Service Supervisor and the quality of the letter by" the dictator, however, the chief qualifications of many supervi-sors and dictators are "Seniority" and "Inherent Right". Such men, powerful but unqualified, resist all attempts to set up a high standard. Dictators, unable to dictate, spend considerable time in writing out hand drafts, reducing the stenographer to a mere typist.

If a good stenographer is assigned to such a person, sooner



or later the stenographer loses his enthusiasm for the job and either leaves or turns out mediocre work. In all departments there are stenographers who are dissappointed with their jobs because while they were employed as stenographers, are carried on the payroll as such, they have been assigned straight typing work or even filing. These stenographers would have appreciated the opportunity to be upgraded into a stenographer job, or to be called upon to do stenographic work so that they could make more use of their ability and at the same time be in line for higher salary. Before run. ning the advertisment, these stenographers should have been informed of the positions available and an opportunity afforded them to be upgraded.

The non-stenographer may ask "What the heck" after all, you, receive the pay. A mediocre stey nographer probably would agree with this, but there are several stenographers, including some recently employed, who are not satisfied with existing conditions

Lago Management may have felt that the work turned out could be better and the answer would be to employ experienced




