WATCH YOUR SPEEDOMETERS

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT.

According to a public announcement, also appearing in the "Arubaanse" and signed by Postmaster P. H. J. Breusers, it occurs frequently that private individuals send letters and the like without any postage to government agencies.

This is not permissible. Only the above government agencies may use postage-free envelopes with the indication "Government" and the name of the department. For private individuals there are only two cases in which no postage should be paid, i.e., for inquiries instituted on behalf of government agencies and for tax assessment bills, provided the government envelopes supplied by the departments concerned are used.

In all other cases, documents without postage stamps or with insufficient postage sent by privatet individuals to government agencies will be returned.



Woodling singled and went to 2nd when Loes balked. A' hot grounder by Rashi bounced off Loes legs scoring Woodling and giving the Yanks a 2--1 lead.

The top of the 8th brought in another Yankee run when Micky Mantle banged a homer into the lower left-center stands, score 3—1. In the bottom of the 8th another homer was smashed into right field by Duke Snider, Score 3—2. The 9th. brought no change in the score.

The four home runs Duke Snider has hit during 6 games in world series put him in the same bracket with baseball's all time greats Babe-Ruth and Lou Gehrig. Babe Ruth hit 4 in the 1926 and Lou Gehrig in the 1928 series.

Vic Raschi was the winning pitcher but was relieved after 7-2/3 innings by big Oklahoma Chief Allie Reynolds when things went dark on Raschi. With this win Raschi's total wins hit the figure for world series games.

The losing pitcher was Billy Loes who did a fine pitching job. He was relieved by Preacher Roe after 8-1|3 inning of pitching. The seventh and last game of the world series of 1952 came to an end on Tuesday last with the Yanks as victors by a score of 4-2.

It was one of the most exciting games in baseball history. The crowd was estimated at 33.195.

The losing pitcher was Rookie right hander Jo Black.

The Dodgers used 3 pitchers. Jackie Robinson said the Yanks didn't miss Jo DiMaggio but it was Mantle that killed us.

Each player of the winning team will receive about \$6.000, and \$4.000 will go to each of the losers. A spectacular catch was made in the ninth by Woodling when Reese hit a long drive, which for a moment

raised the hope of the Brooklyn fans. The Dodgers failed for the 6th time to become World Champs while the Yanks are holders of the Championship 15 times in 19 tries.

World News

MOSCOW.

Over 2.000 delegates were present last Monday for the opening of the first All Soviet Communists Party Congress since 1939. The opening speech was delivered by Georgi M. Malenkov, the leading member of the present Politburo. In his speech, he charged that United States is driving the capitalistic world toward economic breakdown and war while his country seeks only peace and is growing ever stronger and more prosperous.

He declared later that with respect to peace, the bosses of the United States, not the people, had decided to wreck the peace and prepare a new war, a war on the Soviet Union, the chief opponent of a new awr, and the chief pillar of peace.

The Soviet Union is unwaveringly carrying out a policy of peaceful cooperation with all countries, but because of the threats of new aggression from the side of the Western warmongers, it is strengthening and will strengthen its defence capabilities.

PERSIA

This week, Britain replied to

Persia's latest note on the oil dispute, at least eight days before the deadline set by the Persian Government for a reply. Dr. Mosadeq conferred with Mr. Kashani, Speaker of the Majlis on steps to be taken on the British move to solve the Anglo

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
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Persian oil dispute, but no decision was announced.

The note pointed out that the fears which the Premier had expressed about future British action in Persia if an oil settlement was reached on the basis of the August 30, Truman-Churchill proposals were without foundation, and expressed disappointment that the proposals should have been misunderstood in so many ways. Dr. Dean Acheson, U.S. Secretary of State, forwarded a message to the Premier

The shah of Persia backed Mos-

sadeq in his handling of the nationalization of the country's oil, and expressed his admiration and appreciation of the Premier's efforts.

EGYPT.

After defying, the Government order to pure or dissolve order without Mr. Nahas as its leader, the Wafd Party bowed to the Government and register with a new leader.

The reorganized party executive, in submitting the new organization, pointed out that Nahas, who is

now 77 years, has been made an honorary president of the party for life, while the active leadership will be held by Abdel Gomaa.

Crowds of young wafd supporters staged a pro-Nahas demonstration after it was announced that Nahas would be removed and that the party would register without him.

The decision to submit to government decision was made three days before the deadline.

GREAT BRITAIN.

In a nation wide broadcast, Mr. Winston Churchill appealed to the British people to subscribe their pounds and pennies to a fund in memory of King George VI. In his appeal, he said that a statute of the Monarch who died last February, to carry to the living generation and to those who came after us a physical presence of the King, must be the first task of the momorial fund. We are sure, however, that the King would have wished that a greater part of the money which we hope to collect will be spent in support of causes which he cherished and for which he strove.

It is proposed to errect a Statute, lifesize and to create a permanent foundation called after King George VI for the spiritual, mental and physical needs both of the young and old.

EAST GERMANY.

In an order of the day for the third anniversary of the Soviet sponsored East Zone Republic, the People's Police Chief disclosed that many comrades have been transferred from police duty to alert units in order to help organize the defense of our homeland.

The disclosure confirms the fear that the People's Police constitute the nucleus of a future army. The police units number more than 100.000 men who are being trained under supervision of Soviet officers, and are equipped with soviet weapons, including artillery pieces.

WEST GERMANY.

Last week, the western powers

freed three German war criminals who were imprisoned. The British released from their prison at Werl, Otto Amelung, originally sentenced to death in May, 1948, for being implicated in the killing of inmates fleeing from a concentration camp, and Former Colonel General Eberhard von Mackensen who was also sentenced to death by a British Military Court in 1947.

The Americans freed Franz Alfred Six, former Berlin University Dean, who had been sentenced to 20 years in 1948 for acts committed while a member of the Nazi Elite Guard.

This speed up in Allied Clemency for war crimes cases was regarded as being of assistance to the West German Government in its campaign for parliamentary ratification of the European Army treaty.
