## DEAD MAN WAS VICTIM OF CAR ACCIDENT.

Further police investigation and a post-mortem have revealed that the man who was found dead at Savana Basora last week and was identified by Police as Aniceto Dubero, became the victim of a car accident.

It was also established that the victim was under the influence of alcohol at the time of the accident



and police officials think that the driver of the vehicle might not have been at fault.

In this connection the driver is wanted by the Police for questioning. Any information from other sources will be appreciated.

# COURT SITS ON POS CHIQUITO SLAYING.

Yesterday, Friday April 24, the court in Oranjestad held a second hearing in the case against Mr. Richard Evariste Hunt, charged with the slaying of his concubine, Alicia Errindel, and her mother, Zulma May Haddocks, at the latter's residence in Pos Chiquito, Aruba on December 5, 1951.

The women became the victims. of several stabs which, Police said, Hunt had confessed to have inflicted when he personally reported the slaving to the Police. Later, Hunt said he did not recall making this statement and said he did not remember the incident of the slaying at all.

Mr. St. Clair Morris, the driver who had driven the accused to the Police Station was heard as a witness yesterday.

Early last year, a first hearing was held by the Court, but sentence was deferred pending a report from the psychiatrist in Curacao. The report was received in Aruba last month and revealed that the accused, who had been under observation in Curacao all along, is a man of lesser educational background, and was under severe mental strain at the time. Dr. Waszink, the psychiatrist concludes that the slayer can only be held partially responsible for his actions.

In view of this report, Mr. Paul Sjiem Fat. Hunt's lawyer, pleaded-

his client not guilty, claiming that it is apparent that the accused had no control over his actions, as he was mentally unballanced.

Public prosecutor F. O. Leusink considered the charges too serious for aquittal, but in view of Dr. Waszinck's report, agreed that some leniency should be observed. On this consideration, he demanded 11 years imprisonment with deduction of the time spent under remand.

# ELMAR LEADS THE WAY.

Late last week, the "Elmar" took pride in announcing that effective May 15, 1953, new rates will go into effect which will mean a considerable saving to the consumers of electric current.

The "double-rate" system will be abolished and a new single rate established. However, in the few isolated cases where the consumer will benefit by using the old system of calculation, (day and night rate) this will be maintained.

The standing "fixed" charge of f 2.50 per month for which the consumer received no current and which was popularly known as "meter-rental" will become an evil of the past.

An example as to savings effected may be found in the following comparison of the old and revised systems :

Old rate system :

Assuming that the customer used 40 kilowatt hours, at an average rate of f 0.14 his bill would show:

Fixed rate (without service f 2.50 4 kw. hrs @ 14 c. " 5.60 Total f 3.10

New rate system :

Fixed rate (for 20 k.w.hrs) f 4.80 20 extra k.w. hrs. @ 6 c. " 1.20 Total f 6.00

Net savings f 2.10 for 40 kilowatt hours.

Yankees' Mickey Mantle, who took Jo Di Maggio's place at centre field, again proved to be a worthy successor when he slammed one of the longest homers in baseball history (approx. 565 ft) at the Griffith Stadium to give the Yankees a 7-3 victory over the Washington Senators.

The ball as well as the bat will be placed in Baseball's Hall of Fame. Mickey had borrowed the bat from Loren Babe. Some experts were of the opinion that Babe Ruth had once hit a 600 ft. homer at Detroit in 1926, but a newsman said that it was not possible to determine where the ball. landed, since a boy had picked it up and

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made off with it on his bicycle.

Manager Casey sees in Mantle the greatest switch hitter in history and possible batting champ this this year.

The Cleveland Indians' slugging first baseman Luke Easter will be out of action for an estimated 6 weeks with a broken foot suffered last Saturday in the game against the White Sox.

Easter was hit by a Lou Kretlons pitch.

#### ABBA NEWS.

On Monday of this week, the ABBA Board met with members Leon Prins Jr. and Luis Gonzalez of the Curacao Baseball Association (CBB). At this time it was officially announced that the CBB is accepting the invitation extended by the ABBA for the forthcoming May tournament.

To the baseball players from the sister-island, playing under the lights will be a new experience, and the boys are looking forward to the fournament with much enthusiasm.

Arrangements were also made to delegate ABBA 1952 champs, "Camels", to Curacao for a weekend series against the CBB champs. This meet will take place early in May.

Other general discussions again brought up the matter of a possible amalgamation of the ABBA and CBB to form an Antillean Association (NABB). Parties agreed to study the matter and come forward with suggestions.

Other news released by the AB BA was that trainer Ninin Rodriguez will arrive next week and training of the ABBA selection for the world series will commence during the first week in May. At the same time the 1953 ABBA Championship series gets under way.

Baseball players and fans have expressed disappointment, if not dissatisfaction, over the fact that no





A well pleased crowd left the field, looking forward to the girls competition which is scheduled to start around May 1. Nine clubs are invited to participate in this knock-out series.


# DOMINOES

#### FEDERATION CONFERENCE

News coming through from England this week on the Federation Conference now in progress suggests some headway being made on this knotty problem.

Grantley Adams, leader of the Barbados Government, this week stated that he felt Federation "must come". This was somewhat different from the cautious and uncertain line he adopted at the opening of the conference, which led the fiery Jamaican Bustamante to call his remarks "rubbish".

The Jamaican Premier is wholeheartedly backing Federation, provided Britain gives financial assistance in setting up the Federal Government.

# PROFESSOR ACCUSED.

Students of the West Indian University in Jamaica last week presented a petition to the Principal expressing dissatisfaction with the attitude of one of the medical professors. It is alleged that the professor's attitude has been responsible for two students quitting the university.

It is stated that certain elements of the faculty tried to suppress the letter on the grounds of "impertinence", but the President of the Students' Guild refused to withdraw it.

# MARAVAL MURDER TRIAL BEGINS.

Trial on the charge of murdering Mrs. Evelyn Blanc, 83-year old widow of Maraval Road, on December 10th. last, began this week against Victor Munroe (26) and Allan Mitchell (23) of Laventile.

Giving evidence for the Crown, Kenneth Turner (24), next door neighbor of the late Mrs. Blanc, said that on the day in question he heard a man call at Mrs. Blanc's home and announce himself as the "meter man." He later heard the second sound of blows and groans, and went with his brother to investigate. He saw a man in a blood stained shirt. He kept watch on the place while his brother telephoned the police. The man was found shortly after crouching behind a banana tree in a nearby yard.

# B'DOS TEACHERS MAY VISIT U. S. A.

Plans are under consideration for sending 30 elementary school teachers to the U.S.A. for observation and study of the U.S.A. system of education. At the same time it is hoped to send a number of U.S. teachers to the West Indies.

This possible exchange of teachers was first suggested by Mr. Deighton Griffith, a Barbadian headmaster who paid a recent visit to the U.S.A. The move was discussed last week with the arrival in Barbados of Dr. Gerald Spencer, Vice-President of the Association of Caribbean Teachers Education.

Dr. Spencer was born in St. Lucia,, and studied in U.S.A. and Europe. He is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians.

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# MRS. MARCUS GARVEY VISITS ARUBA

The San Nicolas community last Sunday evening had its first opportonity of meeting Mrs. Marcus Garvey, widow of the famous negro leader, when she gave a public address at the UNIA Hall in San Nicolas. The **UNIA** (Universal Negro Improvement Association) is a movement founded by the late Marcus Garvey. It now has branches in several countries. Mrs. Garvey who now resides in England and is engaged in social work among negroes there, is at present on a tour of the Caribbean.

Taking as her subject on Sunday "The Survival of the Negro," Mrs. Garvey held her audience spellbound for more than an hour as in fluent and vivid style she traced the development of the Negro in the New World after he had been torn by force from his native roots in Africa

A wide traveller, who has herself spent many years in Africa, she gave her audience an idea of African life and the new awakening of the Africans towards shaping their own destiny

Mrs. Garvey was quite emphatic, however, that the Negro having been transplanted and settled in the New World without much of the tradition or culture of his native Africa, and having made a substantial contribution to the development of the area, especially the West. Indies, now has every right to remain rather than relinquish the place so dearly won.

Her address was interspersed with interesting personal anecdotes, among them her first awakening of African consciousnesss at the age of twelve, her finding of her original family in Africa years later, her eight year stay in that country, and her audience here with the Lt. Governor, with whom she is much impressed.

At the end of her address she was asked a number of interesting questions by the audience, to which she gave very enlightening answers.

#### ENGLAND.

This week, Andrei Gromyko, Soviet Ambassador to Great Britain left London for Russia to take up new duties as First Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs. It was only last week that his wife came to London to be with him and his appointment was rather a surprise. There was no ofcial comment on the switch, the second major diplomatic changeover since the death of Stalin.

The new ambassador to Britain will be Jacob Malik, presently a deputy Foreign Minister under Molotov, however, no information was given as to when Mr. Malik would arrive in London.

# JAPAN.

This week the Liberal Party won 199 seats in the resent general elections, but are unable to form an effective government alone since this represents less than 40% of the total seats.

More than 73 per cent of the electorate voted and a few changes were made in the number of seats held by the various parties. The Progressives received 76; Left Socialists 74, gaining 18 new seats; Right Socialists 66, and the Communist party gained one seat.

This declaration was made in an address to more than one thousand editors and publishers at the annual luncheon of members of the Associated Press.

the Texas Co.; Standard Oil Co. of California and Gulf Oil Corp.

The suit charged the five companies with conspiring among themselves and with other companies to monopolize foreign trade, restrain interstate commerce, control foreign production, maintain agreed-upon domestic and world prices, regulate oil imports and "divide world foreign producing and marketing territories."

The complaint charged that the alleged conspiracy has existed 25 years — since 1928.

The government asked for an order compelling the companies to cancel all illegal agreements and refrain from engaging in the alleged practices.

The body of a Guianese killed in action in Korea was flown to B.G. last week for burial. The deceased was John Williams, 21year old, son of Mr. Joseph Williams, Postmaster of Buxton.

John had left B.G. in 1950 to study engineering in the U.S.A. After a year he joined the Marines and was later sent to Korea.
