## I.O.W.U.A. Demonstrates Against Lago Layoffs

The independent Oil Workers' Union of Aruba, last Sunday afternoon held a parade in San Nicolas, followed by an open-air meeting opposite the Lago Sport Park, to publicly protest against the continuing force reduction program pursued by the Lago Oil & Transport Company, Ltd., Aruba's biggest single employer.

An estimated 200 persons took part in the parade which started from the Old Boxing Stadium in San Nicolas and wended its way through the principal streets to end up at the site near the Sport Park. The participants in the parade carried posters bearing slogans such as "We Protest Against Lago Layoffs", "This is Our First Step", "We gave you 40 years Labor Peace, Give us 4 years security", "Don't look for Trouble Because You Can Get It Anytime", "No More Jokes, Stop The Lay-off", and many others.

Although actual participation in the parade was far below the Union's expectation, there apparently was considerable interest in it, judging from the many people who lined the streets and eventually attended the meeting, making for an audience of about 2000 persons.

M.C.'d by Juan Diaz the meeting (as also the parade) was conducted in a very orderly manner.

Speakers were Juan Yarzagaray, E. Pellegrim, F. Bareno, R. Colina, Henk Reeberg, President, Frans L. Maduro, all of the IOWUA, Eddie Maduro (OCTA representative), Mr. Ong-A-Kwic of Curaçao's PWFC and finally Eulogio Wever of La Esperanza Super Markets.

The theme of the various speakers' addresses was centered on the continuing force reduction at Lago which causes great concern in Aruba.

It was pointed out that the layoffs at Lago are causing considerable hardship among breadwinners and their families and are having an ever increasing adverse effect on the island's economy.

### Bad Ambassador

Said Union President F. Maduro: "Lago is a very bad ambassador of the United States. While the United States is helping Latin American countries with an aid program called "Alliance for Progress" to strengthen the economy of these countries, the American oil company called Lago does just the opposite: its unabated layoff program is helping to ruin the Aruban economy", Mr. Maduro said.

"That the Company is getting competition is certainly not to be overlooked, but it should also be noted that the Company's profits have nevertheless been increasing, most likely at the expense of laid off breadwinners who are now going through considerable, well-nigh unbearable hardship....."

Not only Lago came in for criticism, but also local and federal government and trade.

### Threat

The opinion was expressed that too little cooperation is being received from the government in the field of labor and social legislation to help protect the interests of the working class. A law should also be enacted restricting layoffs at the oil companies to 2 or 3 percent of the work force per year, it

was opined. And if the present Government is not willing to cooperate with the Unions, one speaker said, it will be high time for the workers to soon make sure the next government will.....

The absence from the meeting of government representatives, political leaders (except AVP's C. Eman) and local merchants — who were all invited — was also noted with considerable chagreen by IOWUA President Maduro. "Our fight is also in their interest", Mr. Maduro noted.

In his closing remarks Mr. Maduro made the appeal to his audience to support the cause of the workers. If it should become necessary for the IOWUA to go on strike, he hoped the entire community will give its support.....

## DUTCH VICE-PREMIER BIESHEUVEL IN CAR-CRASH, UNHURT

Vice-Prime-Minister Mr. B. W. Biesheuvel of Holland escaped virtually unhurt from a car crash in Hillegom last Friday, in which two people were killed and three slightly injured.

According to a police statement the accident happened when a pedestrian suddenly crossed the road, causing an oncoming car to swerve towards the wrong side. The two occupants of this car, a married couple, were killed when it crashed then into the Minister's car.

Mr. Biesheuvel only had a bruised knee, while his private chauffeur escaped unhurt. Three occupants of two cars which crashed into the back of the Minister's car sustained slight injuries.

## INVESTIGATION IN VENEZUELA ABOUT ARMS SHIPMENT

The government in Maracaibo, Venezuela has ordered an investigation into the circumstances surrounding a supply of armaments found hidden aboard two vehicles brought there aboard the ship Merida, it was reported Jan. 16.

The Merida belongs to the Venezuelan Navigation Co., and came to Maracaibo from New Orleans. The company also operates out of Miami.

The armaments consisted of M-1 carbines, machineguns and some 5,000 rounds of ammunition.

### HOSTAGES RELEASED IN ARGENTINA

Twenty-four bedraggled hostages whom striking shipyard workers threatened to throw out of second-story windows were released last Thursday night when agreement was reached on a dispute over back pay.

About 300 strikers at Astarsa, Argentina's largest private shipyard, had gone on strike Jan. 12, claiming the company was three weeks behind in wages and had not paid the annual year-end bonus provided by law.

The strikers grabbed 24 management engineers Jan. 13 and threatened to hurl them from a two-story building if police interfered. The hostages said they had been given a sandwich a day. A police source said the strike leaders may be charged with kidnapping.

### IMPOSTER CAUGHT

At Maastricht, Holland, police have arrested a 35-year-old man on charges of deceiving the management of a big department store into believing that he was a professional psychologist. In fact all he had was primary school training with two classes secondary school. The man persuaded the management that its relations with the rest of the staff were unsatisfactory and he organized special training courses which were attended by the managing directors of the store. The management was so impressed that he was promoted to staff manager after a year.

### PEDIATRICIAN OUTLINES SCHOOL SEX EDUCATION PLAN

"There is a far greater need for sex education of children today than ever before and it must be done through our public elementary and high schools if we are to reach the great mass of the youth," a noted U.S. pediatrician, Milton I. Levine, told the American Public Health Association in New York recently.

Adequate sex education is needed to combat "The distorted view of life our children are receiving from television and the movies, where broken marriages, prostitution, illicit love affairs and adultery are blatantly portrayed," emphasized the Cornell University Medical College specialist.

While, ideally, sex education should come from the home, most parents for one reason or another are not providing it, he pointed out. He recommended a year-by-year school sex education plan to be conducted by specially trained teachers and supplemented by talks given by physicians.

In kindergarten, Dr. Levine suggested, boys and girls would use the same toilets and "have opportunities for observation" to take some of the mystery out of sex. First and second graders would "learn that life comes from life" by planting flower and vegetable seeds and watching them grow. The presence of pregnant hamsters, mice, guinea pigs, etc. as class pets would teach that every plant and animal reproduces its own kind. Third and fourth graders would learn that in all but the lowest forms of animal life, a father as well as a mother is needed for reproduction and that, in humans, the baby develops within the mother's body. Structural differences between the sexes would be explained.

Fifth graders would be taught that all animals develop from eggs, that the eggs are in the mother and the sperm in the father, and how the sperm must meet and join the egg before it can start to develop into a baby.

"In 6th grade and thereafter there need to be skilled teachers, not only academically but psychologically prepared to handle the subject," stressed Dr. Levine. "Also, with boys and girls in early adolescence, there should be certain hours of separate instruction."

Sixth grade instruction would focus on human beings instead of animals, with more detailed explanation of sex differences, the function of ovaries and testes, sperm and eggs. The changes brought by puberty would be dis-

cussed. Seventh and eighth graders would be assured of the normalcy of heterosexuality. There should be instruction on the anatomy of sex and reproductive organs, the nature of the sex act, conception, pregnancy and fetal development. In high school, a review of facts learned earlier would be given, but emphasis should be placed on proper sexual conduct, venereal disease and contraception, as well as homosexuality, "so that adolescents can have a clear understanding of its abnormality."

So far, pointed out Dr. Levine, Oregon appears to be the only state that provides for compulsory sex education in the public school curriculum.

"victory" of the Cuban revolution had dealt the United States a very strong blow on the continent, and Latin America had now entered into an "irreconcilable struggle against foreign enslavers."

Pravda said that all the Latin American countries were united in "one historical goal — liberation from the oppression of the imperialists, above all the imperialists of the United States...."

It said, "Soviet people consider, as they always did, that their sacred duty is to render support to the peoples defending their independence."

"Loyal to their international duty, Soviet people will be, as they have always been, on the side of Latin American patriots."

Pravda called on the working classes in Latin America to work with the peasants to end the "stranglehold" of foreign capital.

It said, "facts have shown that the wider and the more consolidated is the front of these forces, the more substantial are the blows it deals to the forces of imperialism and reaction."

It claimed that "the upsurge of the national liberation in Latin American countries, the strengthening of the unity of the anti-imperialist and anti-feudal forces, are to a considerable degree the result of the activities of Communist parties.

### OIL PRODUCING NATIONS WIN CONCESSIONS

From Beirut, Lebanon, it was reported last week that the Middle East oil-producing countries, standing together as a solid bargaining bloc, have won their first major concession from the international oil companies. It amounts to a \$385 million increase in royalties to be paid by the companies on marketed oil.

The report further said it will mean decreased earnings for the industry at a time of falling oil prices. For their part, however, the Middle East governments concerned have had to assume a more realistic approach to the worsening dilemma of falling prices in a surplus market.

The settlement was achieved through the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), which consist of Iraq, Iran, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Qatar, Libya, Venezuela and Indonesia.

sis of "posted" (listed) prices of crude oil per barrel rather than on price actually charged.

In recent years the companies, because of the glut of oil, have had to sell below posted prices by offering discounts. These have run as high as 30 cents a barrel from a posting of \$1.80.

The companies, however, still used the posted prices to compute their profit for the 50-50 split.

After two years of bargaining the companies finally agreed to pay a royalty of 12½ per cent on posted prices. But they insisted on lowering the posted prices by a sliding scale of 8½ to 6½ per cent over a three-year period, ending in 1966, for computing profit splits with governments.

After some argument among themselves the Middle East members of OPEC — Iran, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Qatar — accepted the offer. Iraq refused but is expected to accept eventually.

The result is that the Mideast oil countries will receive an additional \$100 million for 1964, \$125 million in 1965 and \$160 million in 1966, assuming that Iraq, eventually accepts and production continues to increase by 10 per cent a year.

OPEC in accepting the package deal which added the royalties but reduced the profit split will still gain four cents a barrel for 1964, five cents for 1965 and six cents for 1966.

Having agreed to scale down the unrealistic posted prices in return for the royalties, the Mideast oil countries must now take a direct interest in the actual market prices.

With a greater vested interest in actual prices OPEC is now preparing to go after its primary objective — price maintenance.

This could eventually reflect on the taxing policies of the oil-consumer nations in Europe and North America.

The oil companies involved in the settlement include the Arabian American Oil Company (Aramco) in Saudi Arabia and Iranian Oil Participants Limited as representatives of the Middle Eastfield.

Aramco is composed of Standard oil of California, Texaco, Standard Oil of New Jersey, and Mobil Oil.

The Iranian consortium consists of British Petroleum, Royal Dutch Shell, Jersey Standard, California Standard, Texaco, Gulf Oil Corp., Mobil, French Petroleum and Iricon Agency.

Together these countries contribute nearly 90 per cent of the world crude oil exports and have 68 per cent of the world's crude oil reserves.

They share with the oil companies a 50-50 profit split. But falling prices and the need to achieve parity between oil revenues and the rising cost of manufactured imports prompted the governments to seek increased revenues.

The first move, in 1962, was to get the companies to pay royalties in addition to the existing 50-50 split.

OPEC argued that in the United States and other countries oil companies paid a royalty to owners of oil-producing property. This royalty said OPEC, was a "rent — a payment for using up a wasting asset, a payment for the intrinsic value of the raw material."

It was separate from taxes based on profit. The big difference in the Middle East is that the governments which levy the 50-50 "income tax" are also the owners of the oil properties leased to the companies under concession agreements.

OPEC argued that this should make no difference.

The situation is complicated, however, because the companies pay their income taxes on the ba-

### CHURCHILL SUFFERS A STROKE

Last Friday night, Sir Winston Churchill suffered a stroke at the age of 90. His family hurried to his bedside.

His personal physician Lord Moran, called in Lord Brain, one of the world's leading neurologists, and they reported in a bulletin:

"After a cold Sir Winston has developed a circulatory weakness and there has been a cerebral thrombosis," or a blood clot in the brain. Laymen know this as a stroke.

Lord Moran, who has saved Sir Winston's life in many other serious illnesses, read the bulletin from a slip of paper at the doors of the Churchill town house at 28 Hyde Park Gate.

Medical experts took a grave view of the bulletin and said they feared for Churchill's life.

They pointed out that Sir Winston had had several strokes in the past 15 years but this one complicated by his great age and the consequent decline in his recuperative powers.

They particularly noted the phrase "circulatory weakening" which implies that the astonishing resilience which had helped Churchill through many serious illnesses was ebbing away.

Queen Elizabeth was informed at Sandringham of Sir Winston's illness. He had served her father, grandfather, great-grandfather and great-great grandmother, Queen Victoria.

Sir Winston survived the other great leaders of World War II — Josef Stalin and Franklin D. Roosevelt. And as the years passed, London's newspapers hailed him as "The World's Greatest Man."

Churchill won distinction as a statesman, historian, soldier, war correspondent, artist, even a bricklayer. But it was as an orator when he mobilized the English language for victory that he won his greatest fame.

In the days before World War II he warned of the rise of Nazi Germany but was ignored. It was only after the outbreak of war he came into greatness. And it was such phrases as "we shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds" that inspired Britain to save itself.

### CUBAN STUDENTS CALLED BACK FROM ROMANIA

The Cuban government has ordered all Cuban students to quit their studies in Communist Romania and return home, Western sources in Vienna said last Friday.

About 130 Cuban students were affected by the order. The exodus started last week and will be concluded shortly, the sources said.

The decision was made after the Romanians refused to allow Cuban students to hold a rally in Bucharest in honor of the Cuban national holiday Jan. 1, the report said.

Romanian authorities, according to the sources, told the students they were in the country only to study and not for political activities.

It was speculated in some quarters that the Cuban decision to withdraw the students was based on indications of the Romanian government's desire to improve its relations with the West.

Jeanette MacDonald, the soprano songbird who co-starred with Nelson Eddy in a team that became a byword for Hollywood musicals in the 1930's, died at the age of 57 of a heart attack last Thursday in Methodist Hospital in Texas. Her husband Gene Raymond, was at her side.

Miss MacDonald had flown to Houston Jan. 12 from her home in Beverly Hills, Calif., suffering from a "cardiac condition." She had been examined by famed heart surgeon Dr. Michael DeBakey, who last month performed surgery on the Duke of Windsor in Methodist Hospital.

A hospital spokesman said only that the red-haired star of a dozen movies was suffering from an ailment "of a cardiac nature." She received oxygen intermittently after she entered the hospital. She was allowed no visitors except her husband.

Thursday, as she was being fed intravenously, she suddenly looked at her husband of 27 years and said, "I love you."

"I love you," replied Raymond.

They were the last words they said to each other. Miss MacDonald died a few minutes later.

It was believed Miss MacDonald may have planned to undergo open heart surgery.

In Hollywood, Nelson Eddy was "shocked, deeply distressed" to learn of her death. "It doesn't seem possible that this beautiful, vibrant woman is gone," he said.

Some of the successful films she made with Eddy were "The Vagabond King," "Love Me Tonight" and "One Hour With You."

### MINERS FOUND DEAD

Diggers pushed through burning coal and poison gas and found the bodies of 14 men killed in a mine explosion, it was reported from Belgrade Jan. 15.

Mothers, wives and sisters clustered at the mine head burst into tears when told the men were found dead.

Mining officials had said there was no hope for the men caught in the explosion of an air compressor Sunday night, Jan. 10, 4,500 feet deep in the mine near the Serbian village of Kraljevo.

### ANOTHER TREASURE FOUND IN THE BAHAMAS?

A 41-year-old diver said he has found a sunken Spanish galleon, laden with 17th Century treasure, in the Bahamas.

A report of Jan. 17 said the diver, John Klinner, said, "I don't want to say too much because of some tax problems, but I will say this: it could be worth 3 or 4 million dollars. Who knows?"

An Atlanta diving expert, Charles Vezzani, has confirmed Klinner's discovery. But he estimated its worth at about \$100,000.

Where is the treasure ship? Klinner's not saying.

"I don't want anybody trying to move in," he explained.

Klinner said he had left his partner, C. B. Bryson, aboard their

38-foot vessel, the Black Witch, to guard the treasure.

Klinner said he already has recovered several thousand dollars worth of gold and silver coins and bullion. He added that he had brought about 1,700 17th Century Spanish coins to the surface.

Klinner's reported find follows by several weeks the discovery of another treasure trove in the Bahamas estimated to be worth about nine million dollars.

### A.S.U. ANNULS SPORT BOYCOTT AGAINST CURACAO

As expected the A.S.U. members voted unanimously last Friday night to end the Sport Boycott against Curaçao. Attending the meeting were 9 of the 11 Sports organizations associated with the A.S.U. Present were the representatives of the Baseball, Basketball, Volleyball, Weightlifting, Softball, Billiards, Tennis, Boxing, Table Tennis Association. Absent were the representatives of the Judo and Athletic & Cycling Association.

According to the A.S.U. the resolution (sport boycott) against Curaçao is once again rescinded to show their goodwill and desire to bring about a solution to the sport conflict. Now it is once again up to Curaçao to demonstrate their willingness to solve the problem. In the event the sport associations do not resolve their problems with their Curaçao counterparts by April 1, 1965, then it will be possible to call in a third party to mediate. Up to now Curaçao has held on to all of the International Sports Affiliations in the Netherlands Antilles except for baseball. So far only Football, Judo and the Athletic & Cycling Association have arrived at a satisfactory form of representation with Cu

had formed a special committee to discuss the matter with Public Relations Manager E. Byington of Lago.

### Cricket

#### L.S.P. COMPETITION TO START JANUARY 25TH UNDER NEW PLAYING RULES

The L.S.P. Cricket Committee comprising Messrs. R. E. Martin, H. Murray, J. Halley, L. Krind, and R. Nichols, will get the 1965 L.S.P. Cricket Competition underway on January 24th., under the new rules for one-day matches used in England. The system is also being used in Curaçao. According to the One-Day Match Rules:

1. If a batting side (11) is dismissed before receiving a total of 30 overs, the side will continue to bat until 30 overs have been received.
3. A Batsman with 25 runs or more must retire. He may resume batting first if the side is dismissed before 30 overs have been received.
4. No bowler will be allowed to bowl more than six overs (alternately or consecutively).

What irritated Aruba most was the lack of representation on the Olympic Committee. The Olympic Committee is made up of Sport Associations with International Affiliation. That meant that all the seats in the Olympic Committee (except baseball) now held by Curaçao. Curaçao took care of that by suspending the A.B.B.A. who represented Baseball in the Antilles.

It is hoped by all that a satisfactory solution to the problem can be found without any further "boycotts".

At the lot, the repossessors, Hank Harrison, 40, and Ron Moore, 23, told Mrs. Genit she was on private property and had better leave.

Mrs. Genit then gave up the fight — temporarily — and walked the six miles to her home.

Mrs. Genit, who declined to give her age, admitted she was three payments behind to the Bank of America for the 1964 car.

She explained she was behind five monthly payments of \$79.84 each in December but made two payments during that month and "thought everything was all right."

## U.S. Writer:

ARUBA'S SOMEPLACE  
LIKE HOME

Under the heading "Aruba's Someplace Like Home" an article has appeared in the San Francisco Examiner of Sunday January 3, 1965. A clipping of the article was sent us by a former Aruba resident.

The article, written by Horace Sutton (a traveling correspondent) reads as follows.

ORANJESTAD (Aruba) — While most resorts like to brag about their foreign flavors, Aruba is busy selling its similarity to the U.S.A. What makes this tiny Dutch isle different is the odd fact that it is some place like home.

Although Aruba is only 19 miles long and 18 miles north of Venezuela, and although it was reared under Dutch influence, it has, in places, a clear similarity to the golden shores of Miami Beach.

The Aruba Caribbean, an eight-story hotel and the largest in the Dutch Antilles, has been fashioned in vintage Morris Lapidus design. Lapidus, the Corbusier of Collins Avenue — who was responsible for the famed Fountainbleau and the Eden Roc next door, among a score of Miami Beach hotels — was indeed the architect of the Aruba Caribbean, too.

His local effort is possessed of all the Florida touches — balconies that hang from each of the 120 rooms, upholstered cabanas strung around the fringe of the pool, and a lobby large enough to dock the Queen Mary.

## Just a Start

The Miami Beach motif, which indeed brought success to Aruba, is just in its early phases of development. Coming soon is a new Sheraton, a \$4.5 million hotel that will add another 200 rooms to the makings of a seaside strip. Another \$2 million will go clinking into the 120-room Palm Beach Hotel.

The Strip, even in its beginning phases, exudes some essences of the quaint perfume of Las Vegas. An important adjunct of the pioneer Aruba Caribbean Hotel is a casino that offers roulette, card tables and dice games until the small hours of every morning.

Frequent Vegas visitors will find the faces of the dealers familiar. Many of the croupiers have been imported from Las Vegas, where the games have the reputation of being honest and moving fast.

To lure the customers within sniffing distance of the gaming parlors, the local entrepreneurs have even imported names to perform outside the casino's portals. Jack Benny, Liberace, Billy Daniels, Xavier Cugat and Tony Martin all played this obscure isle last year.

## Acres of Cactus

Outside the hotel grounds, Aruba looks like Arizona. It has the dry heat of the desert and landscape to match. While most Caribbean islands are lush and overgrown, Aruba grows miles of sandy hills and acres of cactus.

The cunucu, or countryside, is a land of giant boulders, abandoned gold mines and prickly plants. The 66,000 citizens plant cactus around their homes, use it like a barbed wire fence, prune it

with a handsaw the way an Englishman trims his privet hedge.

Goats munch on cactus, housewives hang clothes on its spines to dry, and the pricklers induce youngsters to stay inside their own back yard and prowlers to stay out.

Unlike Arizona, where the thermometer can bubble in summer, the temperature here rarely varies more than four degrees the year around. The local language, a lingual stew called papiamento, contains no words for the four seasons. They just don't exist in Aruba.

The local radio station and newspaper don't run weather reports because it is always the same: fair and warmer. Like much of the Southwest, the air is bugless and pollen free. The trade

winds carry much of nature's debris out to sea.

## All This and

Although it may not be the island's most attractive feature, there is a lot of Bayonne, N.J., in Aruba too. A sizable piece of the island is dominated by a huge oil refinery operated by Standard Oil. It processes nearly half a million barrels of oil a day.

Set up in the '20s to process the crude oil coming from the nearby Maracaibo oil fields, just a short tanker's trip to the south, it has been blowing smog into the skies for 40 years.

Fortunately for the tourist who come looking for displaced remnants of Miami Beach, Las Vegas and Phoenix, the sweet smell of Bayonne is also blown out to sea,

to be inhaled only by a passing porpoise or an approaching passenger aboard a cruise boat.

The presence of the oil people for so many years insured a constant prosperity for Aruba, so much so that it resisted tourism long after neighboring Curaçao had adopted it as its livelihood.

But now that it is being turned into a playland of hotels, casinos, dry weather and gorgeous beaches, it has discovered that the years of oil refining were not wasted either. It was, after all, the oil people who were responsible for the changes in the papiamento language that now includes such choice words as okay, pay day and watch out!

With all its American similarities, Aruba does have some foreign flavors, too. Its years under Dutch dominance have left it with such legacies as rijsttafel, a 20-course dinner which the Dutch themselves first learned from their years in the East Indies. Among the courses is Indonesia's popular sate — snips of skewered lamb dipped into a peppery peanut sauce.

Ever try to get lamb on a stick in hot peanut sauce in Bayonne?

PARAGUAYANS TRAINING  
IN CUBA

A group of 62 Paraguayans had traveled to Cuba, via Czechoslovakia, to study methods of subversion, terrorism and sabotage, the Interior Ministry revealed in Asuncion, Paraguay Jan. 14.

The ministry added that when the group had finished its studies, it planned to return home. It pointed out some of them were Paraguayans living in other countries, like Uruguay.

The ministry said it wished to alert the citizenry to these "undesirable elements" in order to prevent them from carrying out their "obscure Castro-Marxist designs."

"We announce at the same time to American public opinion the unusual fact that these Marxist agents are recruiting minors that are sent against the will of their parents to Communist Cuba," the ministry said.
