In Aruba, they had told us to stop hanging on and let her go, but we just couldn't. It was a long and difficult time, but she is still with us today."

"We are here to celebrate the lives of those that have survived, "expressed Dave Martinus, "to give hope to all those in the battle, and also to give faith to those that have given up." He then asked for a minute of silence for those that have lost their lives to breast cancer, but then introduced Doris as an example to all of how faith and an indomitable spirit of "never giving up" in this twelve-year breast cancer survivor is an inspiration to us all. Both Dora and Lily Prince, Director of the Wilhelmina Cancer Foundation were honored that evening with lifelong memberships in the JCI.
