The First Trauma Care Congress will run for two full days; 8:30 in the morning until 5:00 in the afternoon, ending with a congenial social gathering to allow attendees to discuss what they had learned that day and talk to the lecturers. The cost of the congress is 375 Aruban florins (\$215,) which is an all-inclusive price for workshops, and meals. The second day will end with a demonstration of a rescue by SARFA, the Search and Rescue Foundation of Aruba, with the participation of the Coast Guard of the Netherlands Antilles and Aruba. Afterwards, a closing party with the popular local band "Tsunami" will take place at the Radisson Resort.
