

[•] LOUIS IV., KING OF FRANCE, descended from Charlemagne Emperor of the West, had by Gerberge, his wife, daughter of Henry the Fowler, Emperor of Germany, a son, Charles, Duke of Lorraine, who m. secondly Lady Agnes, daughter of Henry, third Count de Vermandois, by his wife, Edgins, widow of Charles III., King of France, daughter of EDWARD, THE ELDER, KING OF ENGLAND, and had Charles, second Duke of Lorraine, who had Edward, the ELDER, KING OF ENGLAND, and had Charles, second Duke of Lorraine, who had FlizGilbert, first Earl of Clare, and had Robert Baron de Courcie, in Normandy, whose son Richard, d. in 1998, first Baron of Stoke-Courcy, in England. - 27.—LADY CATHERINE AYLMER, (sister of Admiral Matthew, first Lord Alymer, ancestor to the present Lord Aylmer,) who d. 1726, m. secondly Captain Michael Warren, of Warrenstown, County Meath, Ireland. (Lady Catherine first m. Sir Nicholas Plunket, of Dublin, Knight). Michael Warren was an officer in the regiment of his father, Thomas Warren, of Warrenstown, in the Irish army of King James II., and took an active part in the seiges of Derry and Limerick, the Battle of the Boyne, and the struggles of the fields of Aughrim and Cavan, and was attained in The descent of the Warrens from King William the Conqueror, through his fifth daughter Gundred's marriage with William de Warrenne, first Earl of Surrey, is fully deduced in Watson's "History of the Ancient Earls of Warren and Surrey." That this branch of the Warrens was among the early settlers of the "English Pale"—that part of Ireland, about the City of Dublin,—is known from official records and monumental evidences therein. Captain Warren, d. 1712, leaving issue by Lady Catherine, as follows:

Sir Amory Tristram, called "St. Lawrence," created Baron Howth, of County Dublin, Ireland, (d. 1189,) and had Sir Nicholas Fitzamory St. Lawrence, Knight, second Baron Howth, of Ireland. From him descended Robert, Knight of St. George, fifteenth Baron Howth, Lord Justice of Ireland, who m. Lady Joanna de Beaufort, daughter of Edmund, K. G., Duke of Somerset, Regent of France, Lord High Constable of England, grandson of Prince John, of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, son of King Enward III., of England, grandson of Prince John, of Gaunt, Duke of Lawrence, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, (d. 1526), father of the above Lady Eleanor St. Lawrence.

1.—LADY ANNE WARREN m. Christopher Johnson, of Smithstown Co., Meath, and had:

MAJ. GEN. SIR WILLIAM JOHNSON, b. 1715, created a Baronet of Great Britain. (For a extensive notice of him, see Stone's Life of Sir William Johnson Bart). He came to New York as manager of the estates of his Uncle, Admiral Warren, in the northern part of that State, where he built and resided at Johnson's Hall, at the present Johnstown. Was appointed Superintendent of Indian Affairs in America, founded the town of Johnstown, and dying 4th July, 1774, left issue by his wife, Catherine Wisenberg, of New York, as follows:

- 2.—Mary Johnson, who m. Col. Guy Johnson, of New York.

When the war with England began he was forced to abandon his New York property, and settle at Mt. Johnson, Montreal, Canada. He m. Mary, daughter of John Watts, President of the Council of New York, by his wife Anne, daughter of General Etienne de Lancey, of New York, and Anne, his wife, daughter of Rt. Hon. Stephen Van Cortlandt, of New York. Sir John d. in 1830, leaving issue by Mary, his wife:
 - 1.—WILLIAM JOHNSON, Lieut. Col. English Army, b. 1775, m. 1802, Susan, daughter Stephen de Lancey, Governor of Tobago, and sister of General Sir William Howe de Lancey, and dying in 1812, left issue by Susan (who m. secondly in 1815, General Sir Howard Lowe, K. C. B). II.—WARREN JOHNSON, Major 6th Foot. d. 1801.
 - III.—Sir Adam Gordon Johnson, 3d Baronet, b. 1781, d. s. p., 1843.
 - IV.—John Johnson, of Point Oliver, Montreal, Canada, d. 1782, Col. of 6th Bat., of Malitia, m. 1835, Mary, daughter Richard Dillon, of Montreal, and dying in 1843, left issue:

SIR WILLIAM GEORGE JOHNSON, 4th Baronet, ancestor of the present Baronet.

2-OLIVER. WARREN, of Warrenstown, Co., Meath, served with

distinction as a Captain in the Royal Navy of Queen Anne, had, among other issue:

RIGHT HON. NATHANIEL WARREN, of Dublin Ireland, b. 1737, He was elected Sheriff in 1773, Alderman in 1775, and Lord Mayor of the City of Dublin in 1782, and High Sheriff of the County of Dublin in 1786. He was appointed Chief Commissioner of Police, and Superintendent Magistrate of the Establishment for Protecting the Peace of the City of Dublin. He was returned 19th January, 1783, to Parliament, for the City of Dublin, in room of Sir Samuel C. Bradstreet, Baronet, then made one of the Justices of the King's Bench. He kept his seat in the Commons till 1790, when he was defeated by Henry Grattan as representative of this borough. Alderman Warren was then returned to Parliament from the borough of Callan, Co., Kilkenny, in 1790, and so served until his death, January 15th, 1796. See detailed account of this gentleman in the Obituaries of Remarkable Persons in the Gentleman's Magazine of that date. He had:

In 1578 he was one of the Commissioners to treat with England, and in 1581, conspired with the Lords to remove the Duke of Lennox (a Catholic) from Court. They put the King under duress and compelled him to remove the Duke; for which Lord Boyd, to save his life, fled to France. He returned in 1585, and was pardoned, and with the Earl of Bothwell, was sent, the same year, as Ambassador to England. Lord Boyd died in 1589, aged 72, and was buried in the Church in Kilmarnock, with this inscription on his tombstone:
 - "Here lies yat godly, noble, wise Lord Boyd;
 - "Who King and Kirk and Commons all ecord;
 - "Which were, while they this Jewell all enjoyed,

Lieutenant in June, 1855; was transferred to the 1st Chasseurs d'Afrique in May, 1859, as Captain; was transferred to the 1st Carabiniers in February, 1860; was made Chief d'Escadron, or Major, of the 3d Cuirassiers in August, 1865; and was transferred to the Dragons de l'Imperatrice in March, 1857, in which he became Lieutenant-Colonel in August, 1870. During this period he was nearly all the time on active duty, taking part in several memorable campaigns, and fully and fairly earning his promotions. He served in the Crimean war as an engineer, being at the battles of Balaklava, Inkerman, and Tchernaia, and the siege of Sebastopol, as well as in numerous skirmishes, and was rewarded for his gallantry by the Sultan of Turkey with the Medjidie Order; by the Emperor with the Legion of Honor, and by the Queen of England with the Crimean Medal. He went through the Algerian campaign against the Kybeles in 1856-57. He next took part in the Italian campaign of 1859, and was engaged in the battles of Montebello and Solferino, and in numerous outpost skirmishes. During a part of this period he was on the Emperor's staff, and was decorated by him with the Medaille d'Italie, and by the King of Sardinia with the decoration of Military He was transferred to the 1st Carabiniers, and at the close of the war accompanied his regiment to Tours and Luneville. From that time he was on garrison duty up to 1867, when he was transferred to the Guard of the Empress Eugenie. When the Emperor went to the front, at the opening of the war with Prussia in 1870, leaving the Empress as Regent in Paris, Colonel Bonaparte became practically the commandant at the Tuileries, hurrying to France from this country, when news of the outbreak of the struggle reached him. He remained in Paris throughout the seige which followed the fall of the Empire, and barely escaped with his life on the Communist uprising in the spring of 1871. In April of that year he returned to the United States, and has resided in this country most of the time since then. NIALL MOR, from whom the "Hy Niall," of Ulster, Meath and Connaught, derive their name, the son of Eochaidh Muigh-Meadhoin, the one hundred and twenty-fourth Monarch of Ireland, who in the eighth year of his reign died at Tara, A. D. 365, and his second wife, Queen Carinna, daughter of the then King of Britain, succeeded his uncle Cinnthan, the one hundred and twenty-sixth Monarch of Ireland. He was a renowned warrior, and was called "Niall Naoi-Ghiallach," or "Niall of the Nine Hostages," from the hostages taken from nine countries, or nations he subdued and made tributary to himself. He was treacherously slain by Eocha, King of Leinster, in the twenty-seventh year of his reign, A. D. 405, on the bank of the river Loire, France, while making a conquest of that country. He had:

- 14.—TURLOGH BOG O'BRIEN, PRINCE OF THOMOND, d. 1459, who had by his wife, Slany, daughter of Loghlen Ladir Macnamara:
- 15.—TEIGE AN-CHOMHAID O'BRIEN, PRINCE OF THOMOND, d. 1466, who had by his wife, Annabella, daughter of Urtigan Fina MacWilliam:
- 16.—TURLOGH DONN O'BRIEN, PRINCE OF THOMOND, d. 1528, who had by his wife, Lady Joan, daughter of Thomas, eighth Lord of Kerry:
- 17.—MURROGH O'BRIEN, PRINCE OF THOMOND, d. 7th November, 1515. In 1543, he went to England, made submission to King Henry VIII., resigned his principality and was created 1st July, Earl of Thomond. for life, and Baron of Inchiquin, to his heirs male, and a Member of Privy Council to the King. - 19.—MURROGH O'BRIEN, THIRD BARON OF INCHIQUIN, b. 1550, d. 1573, who had by his wife, Lady Mabel, daughter of Christopher, ninth Lord Delvin:
- 20.—MURROGH O'BRIEN, FOURTH BARON OF INCHIQUIN, b. 1562, d. 1597, who had by his wife, Lady Margaret, daughter of Sir Thomas Cusack, Lord Chancellor and Lord Justice of Ireland:
- 21.—DERMOD O'BRIEN, FIFTH BARON OF INCHIQUIN, b. 1576, d. 1624, who had by his wife, Lady Ellen, daughter of Sir Edmund Fitzgerald, of Clyone, by his wife, Lady Honora, daughter of James, son of Sir Maurice Fitzgerald, third son of John, fourteenth Earl of Desmond:
- 22.—MURROGH O'BRIEN, SIXTH BARON OF INCHIQUIN, a celebrated General, created in 1660, Earl of Inchiquin, d. 9th September, 1674, who had by his wife, Lady Elizabeth, daughter of Sir William St. Ledger, President of Munster:
- 23.—WILLIAM O'BRIEN, SECOND EARL OF INCHIQUIN, d. January, 1691. He was sometime Captain-General of H. M. Forces in Africa, and Governor of Tangier, and also of Jamaica, and Vice-Admiral of the Seas thereof. He m. first, Lady Margaret Boyle, daughter of Roger, first Earl of Orrey, and had by her:
- 24.—WILLIAM O'BRIEN, THIRD EARL OF INCHIQUIN. He was attainted with his father by King James' Parliament, and was a Member of Privy Council to Queen Anne, and to King George I; Governor of County Clare, till his death, 24th December, 1719. He m. Lady Mary, daughter of Sir Edward Villiers, and sister of Edward, Earl of Jersey, and had by her:
- 25.—Donald O'Brien, youngest brother to William, fourth Earl of Inchiquin, d. 1777, and to James, d. 1771, who was the father of Murrogh O'Brien, fifth Earl, and tenth Baron of Inchiquin, and first Marquis of Thomond, who d. s. p. m., 1808, in default of which the remainder was to the issue of his brother Edward, who d. 1801, on the death in 1855, of whose son James, the titles of Earl and Marquis became extinct in this family, and the Barony devolved on the Dromoland branch of the O'Brien family. This Donald O'Brien, resided in County Waterford, and dying in 1768, had issue:
 - 26.—James O'Brien, d. 1800, who had:

- 27.—JOHN O'BRIEN, b. 1765, d. 10th March, 1840; m. Catherine, who d. 25th December, 1860, aged 100 years, daughter of Matthew Carroll, of Lahardawn, near Portlaw, County Waterford, a descendant of the Carrolls of Littalouna, Kings County, the parent stock and home of the Carrolls, of Carrollton, Maryland, and had seven sons and four daughters:
- 28.—MARTIN O'BRIEN, his son, b. 1802, d. 9th November, 1858; m. Honora Mullen, b. September, 1800, living in February, 1883, a descendant of Connor, brother of Dathi, of the Concannon family, and had four sons and two daughters, who emigrated to the United States of America, viz:
- 1.—JOHN O'BRIEN, d. in Camden, N. J., 1st October, 1865. In February, 1861, he m. Margaret Cusack, who d. 1st September, 1864, and had:

THOMAS O'BRIEN, of Philadelphia, living February, 1883.

- 2.—Thomas O'Brien, who m. Annie Deane, a native of County Mayo, Ireland, and had four daughters and one son, living in Camden, New Jersey, in February, 1883, viz:
 - I.—Mary Ann; II.—Cecilia; III.—Clara Amelia; IV.—Martin; V.—Annie.
 - 3.-MICHAEL A. O'BRIEN, of Philadelphia, living Feb., 1883, unm.
- 4.—Rev. Matthew P. O'Brien, ordained priest in St. Charles' Seminary, Philadelphia, 5th April, 1869; Rector of St. Vincent De Paul's Roman Catholic Church, Minersville, Schuylkill County, Pennasylvania, in February, 1883.
- 5.—MARY O'BRIEN, who m. 1868, Michael Cahill, who d. 24th July, 1881, and had one son and two daughters living in Philadelphia, Pa., in February, 1883, viz:
 - I.-John; II.-Mary; III.-Honora.
- 6.—BRIDGET O'BRIEN, living in Minersville, Schuylkill County, Pa., in February, 1883, unmarried.
