P R E F A C E

THE Summary Catalogue, of which a first instalment is now published, is directly due to a series of Resolutions passed by the Curators of the Bodleian Library on June 7, 1890. The idea was first started in the autumn of 1889, and the two chief preliminary steps were an address to the Curators, pointing out the desirability of such a Catalogue, signed by thirty-eight readers in the Bodleian and dated Feb. 20, 1890; and the publication by the Rev. Andrew Clark (at that time a Curator) of a pamphlet entitled 'The Cataloguing of MSS. in the Bodleian Library. A letter . . . by the outgoing Junior Proctor, 9 April 1890,' in which a detailed scheme, very similar to the one actually adopted, was proposed, with a full statement of the arguments in its favour.

The design has been to catalogue, in a style similar to the *Inventaires sommaires* of the Bibliothèque Nationale at Paris, such Bodleian MSS. as are (1) not included in the Quarto Series of Catalogues instituted by Mr. Coxe*, and are (2) not Oriental. It was decided that the collections should be first dealt with, in chronological order of their acquisition by the Library, and subsequently the remaining MSS., which had been acquired singly or in small groups, in the same order. The current accessions from July 1, 1890, are also dealt with and separately printed, a full manuscript index of the whole catalogue, as it progresses, being accessible to readers in the Library.

The Old Catalogue of Bodleian MSS., by Dr. Edward Bernard and others, published at Oxford in 1697 ('*Catalogi librorum manuscritorum Angliæ et Hiberniæ in unum collecti cum indice alphabetico*, tom. 1, pars 1) contained all the manuscript volumes in the Library which had been acquired before 1697, and assigned them a single

series of numbers extending, with some serious errors of numeration, from 1 to 8716. It was seen to be an advantage to continue this series, and accordingly *all* the manuscripts of the collections dealt with in the present volume, have a number assigned to them (from 8717 to 16669), and also an entry which, in the case of a volume excluded from the scope of this catalogue, consists only of a reference to the best catalogue (or, if there is none, to the present press-mark) and a word or two indicating the subject: these latter entries are not indexed. Non-oriental papyri are exceptionally placed in the same category, but are in most cases shortly indexed: and unbound charters and papers are regarded as outside the range of the Catalogue.

The entire scheme, which is liable to modification, includes the following volumes:—

Some notes to which the initials 'E. W. B. N.' are appended are by Bodley's Librarian, through whose hands the sheets of this volume passed, by his desire, when finally revised by the writer. Quotations between inverted commas are intended to be exact, except that contracted words are printed at full length, and the use of capitals and punctuation is within the discretion of the cataloguer.

It has not been found possible to issue an index with each volume, but in order to lessen the inconvenience which results, the following short and rough account of the contents of the book, grouped under subject headings, is offered as a substitute: it must however be understood that it is far from being an adequate or even uniform treatment of the collections described, and is designed for a temporary purpose only.

I. BIBLES AND LITURGIES.

Collations of MSS. of the LXX. will be found in the Grabe (nos. 9755 sqq.) and Holmes (16455 sqq.) collections: and Latin Bibles in Rawlinson G (Classics) between 14741 and 14901, and in 15361, 15564, 15569, 16019.

The chief Liturgical collection is Rawl. L (15755-858), but see also 8951, 8955 (a missal, not a breviary), 8967, 14752-3, 14902, 15591, 16057. No. 8916 is a martyrologium of Feversham: 8975 relates

to the Greek church in Russia, cf. 9347: 9995 is connected with Chester, 14715 with Vendome, 14887 with Tegernsee, and 15849 with St. Alban's.

2. THEOLOGY.

Minor theology occurs in every part of the book: see especially Sancroft (10302-446) and Rawl. E (Sermons: 14235-493): and section 6, below. 8968 contains the autograph (?) of part of bp. Bull's *Defensio Fidei Nicænæ*: 15567 is an early MS. of poems by Joh. de Garlandia: in 15650-1, 15705, are bp. Pearson's autograph notes on Ignatius: and in 16224 Clarendon's Meditations on the New Testament. Patristic literature, which occupies so large a part of the collections acquired in the 17th century, is here almost entirely wanting.

3. GREEK LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

The Greek MSS. of the Library were catalogued by Mr. Coxe in his 'Catalogi codicum manuscriptorum Bibliothecæ Bodleianæ pars prima,' 1853, and therefore few occur in this volume. Parts of Hody's *Collectanea* are full of interest for the study of Greek learning in Europe, especially 8901-03. See also some in the Cherry Collection (9775 sqq.), and 9692, 10784, 15566, 15640 sqq. A Latin work on Greek prepositions, written in England in the 13th cent., is in 8840.

4. LATIN LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

This is largely represented, as might be expected, especially in Bernard Latin (8833-86) which includes many of Nicholas Heinsius's MSS., and in Rawl. G (Classics: 14760-841, 14854-879, 14895 sqq.) and K (Hearne, 15343, &c., 15479). Among particular MSS. 8849 (Maximianus), 8856 (Virgil) and 14836 (Æsopus) may be mentioned, and the grammatical treatises in 15462. Correspondence between classical scholars will be found in Bernard, Rawl. H (Letters, especially 14962-73, J. G. Vossius) and Rawl. K (Hearne and Smith).

5. ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

Old or Middle English will be found in 9995, 10844-5, 10853, 14503, 14526, 14528-30, 14611, 14631-5, 14637-8, 14641, 14643, 14655 (Chaucer), 14660, 14667, 14714 (Chaucer), 14716, 15432, 15563, 15606 and elsewhere. There is much English poetry in Rawl.

F, cf. 15416-7. Some Elizabethan ballads are in 14677, and queen Elizabeth's autograph *Mirror of the Sinful Soul*, translated from the French, in 9810.

6. HISTORY OF GREAT BRITAIN.

The volume includes the important papers of Thomas Carte for Irish and English history in the 17th century (10447 sqq.) and of Clarendon for the Civil War and Commonwealth period (16088 sqq.). Copies of some old Chronicles will be found in the Jones collection (8908 sqq.). Elizabethan papers are in Perrott (9766 sqq.) and in 16351-2: 17th century history in the last-mentioned and in Rawl. K (Smith, 15624 sqq.), and the John Walker papers (10859-83). The first half of the 18th century is covered by the voluminous Ballard, Rawlinson and Hearne correspondence, and royal letters occur in 15003, 15626, 16177-83, &c., cf. 16066. The order of the Garter is the subject of 15883-8, 15893-7. In no. 10507 is the earliest extant Journal of an Irish Parliament, 1585-6, and in 10510 the original Letter Book of the Council of Confederate Catholics at Kilkenny, 1642-5: while nos. 16186-7 contain the invaluable Council Notes of Charles II and Clarendon, 1660-2. For parliamentary history there are the papers on which Browne Willis based his *Notitia Parliamentaria* (16302 sqq.), see also 10564; and for ecclesiastical history many copies of the Statutes of religious houses, cathedrals and colleges (Rawl. M, Statutes, 15859 sqq.: see 8923-30, 10622, 15482, 15592). Both Rawlinson and Hearne were Nonjurors, and brought together collections respecting that body, see also 8929, 8938, 9797, 14924.

7. FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURE.

Nos. 9778, 10686, 14642, 14653-4, 14715, 14721, 14723, 14725, 14732, 14734-5, among others, relate to French literature: and the following to Italian, 14717-9, 14724, 14726-8, 14730-1, 14733. Nos. 8830-1, 8975 relate to Russia.

8. COLONIAL AND FOREIGN HISTORY AND TOPOGRAPHY.

The Zamboni papers (15004-26) relate to Germany and Italy, cf. 9779, 10702-3, and two Kerckhoven volumes (14958-9) to Holland, cf. 16190-4, 16196. The Carte papers contain some French (and Italian) records, and collections relating to De Thou's History. 8837 is a Vendome chronicle, 10537 concerns Angers, and 15891 is the statutes of the College of Bayeux at Paris, cf. 9768, 14729. No. 14976

contains royal and other French autographs, 1571-8. The Smith papers in Rawl. K partly relate to the Greek Church (e.g. 15643, 15703). Nos. 10486, 16188-9 are of interest to Americans. Travels in the East Indies occupy 16428, and to Persia 10716: see also 15709 (Turkish).

9. BRITISH TOPOGRAPHY.

The chief county collections are those of Holman for Essex (15988 sqq.), Browne Willis for Buckinghamshire (16294 sqq.), and Bridges for Northamptonshire (16618 sqq.): see also 10638 (Durham); 10714 (Cornwall); 10851 (Gloucester); 10862, 10868, 10875 (Devonshire); 10871 (Wales), cf. 15754. Monasteries and Cathedrals occupied much of Willis's attention (16328, &c.), see in no. 6 above. The chief Cambridge volumes (including literary pieces) are in Sancroft (e.g. 10322, 10326, 10375), and 14736, 15455, 15864 sqq.

Oxford literature occurs especially in Ballard and Rawl. F, H, J, K, M (e.g. 10835, 10854-5, 10858, 14520, 14584, 14697, 14703, 14984, 15124 sqq., 15394, 15485, 15629, 15696, 15889 sqq., 15915), and 10866, 16027, 16058. 15411 is a University Bedel's book. Some volumes concern particular colleges, as 14927, 15645 (Balliol); 10506 (Exeter); 15167 (Jesus); 15890 (Lincoln); 15636, 15638, 15675, 16046 (Magdalen); 10832 (Merton); 15845 (Oriell); 10506 (Pembroke); 15724 (St. Edmund hall); 14559, 15053-4, 15095 (St. John's), with others. References to the Bodleian are too scattered to be enumerated, but see 15467, 15607, 16026.

10. SCIENCES AND ARTS.

Geometry is represented in Bernard 'sua manu' 8717-77, and in 15610-23, 15652, 15678: Astronomy in 15697, 16037, &c., and the Bradley papers 16404 sqq.: 14940 contains papers of sir Thomas Browne: 8751 is on architecture, by Christopher Wasse: 8847 contains Latin medical tracts, and 8836 musical treatises.

11. MISCELLANEOUS.

The oldest MSS. in the present volume are 14890 (8th century); 8838, 8851, 8856, 16032 (10th); 8837, 8849, 14774, 14836, 14887 (11th).

Catalogues or papers relating to Libraries will be found in 9816-8, 15631, 15641, 15714, 15720, 16022, 16031.

2. Date and mode of acquisition.

It has been pointed out that the expression 'Burial Service,' used in this volume in the description of liturgical MSS. to represent the Vespers and Matins for the dead, would more naturally represent the *Inhumatio corporis*; and this use of the term will be discontinued. 'Office for the dead' will be used in the future for the choir-service (*Officium mortuorum*), as distinguished from the Mass for the dead and the burial-service.

BERNARD COLLECTION, A. D. 1698.

(Nos. 8717—8886.)

DR. EDWARD BERNARD was born 2 May, 1638 : educated at Merchant Taylors' School and St. John's College, Oxford (matr. 25 July, 1655), of which College he became a Fellow in 1658 : Savilian Professor of Astronomy 1673-91 : died 12 Jan. 1698. In March 1683 he attended the Nicolas Heinsius sale at Leyden, and bought many of his MSS. : and in 1696 at the Golius sale he purchased largely for archbp. Narcissus Marsh.

Dr. Bernard by a will made 17 Sept. 1696 left all his books, printed and manuscript, to his wife, but he expressed a hope that the Bodleian would buy them. Accordingly in Sept. 1697 many of his printed books were bought by the Bodleian from Mrs. Bernard for £140 : and in 1698 the University purchased the collection of MSS. (both Bernard's own notes and writings, and other) and printed books with MS. collations for £200. Dr. Bernard was the chief editor of the well-known Old Catalogue of Manuscripts (*Catalogus librorum manuscriptorum Angliæ et Hiberniæ*, Oxoniæ, 1697, fol.), published in 1698, and in tom. ii. p. 226, is a list of his own MSS. exclusive of those written with his own hand, occupying nos. 7347-7564 ; but the MSS. purchased for the Bodleian are only 170 in number, and the two lists differ considerably in detail.

The MSS. were numbered, referenced, and shortly catalogued in MS. soon after they arrived in the Library, and in part also shortly indexed. The Greek were fully catalogued and indexed in print in Mr. Coxe's Catalogue in 1853, and most of the Oriental in Uri and Nicoll's Catalogues (1788-1835).

A systematic series of private devotions, with illustrative quotations. Part of this was printed in 1704 and in an undated edition.

A few notes by dr. Edward Bernard towards a commentary on Gen.—Esther. At the end of the volume (fol. 287^v *rev.*) are a few chronological notes. Most of the volume is blank.

The Fasti of Ovid, with some glosses and scribbling, in parts much rubbed. Fol. 1 is a fly-leaf from an early 10th cent. Antiphoner, with musical notes.

Between foll. 58 and 59, 'Aemo iam Beriacci legit huc librum' (14th cent.):

'ex Bibliotheca MSS. Jo. Jacobi Mentelij:' in the Heinsius sale catalogue, tom. ii. p. 87, this MS. is no. 325.

8869. In Latin, on parchment: written in the second half of the 13th cent.: $7 \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 42 leaves.

The *Tristia* of Ovid, with glosses and scholia, with some leaves torn.

'Ex MSS. Bibliothecæ . . . Jacobi Mentelij:' in the Heinsius sale catalogue, tom. ii. p. 119, this MS. is no. 634.

Now MS. Auct. F. 4. 23.

8870. In Latin, on parchment: written about A. D. 1200: $7\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 24 leaves.

A Commentary on the *Fasti* of Ovid, imperfect at beginning and end, extending from i. 446 to vi. 479 of the text: the first scholium is '*pellibus exsectis*, id est, ualde sectis scilicet in minutissimas corrugilas.' The MS. is much crumpled at the edges, and in parts rubbed.

HODY'S COLLECTANEA, A.D. 1707.

(Nos. 8887-8907.)

DR. HUMPHREY HODY was born 1 Jan. 16 $\frac{5}{8}$, and matr. at Wadham College, Oxford, 10 Mar. 167 $\frac{5}{8}$ (B.A. 1679, M.A. 1682), becoming a Fellow of the College on 4 July, 1685. He was away from Oxford from about 1693 until elected Regius Professor of Greek in 1698: Archdeacon of Oxford from 1704 till his death on 20 Jan. 1707.

By his will he bequeathed to the Bodleian all his printed books not already in the Library, and his MS. Collectanea, here catalogued. They seem to have been received at the Bodleian early in June, 1707.

Besides the following MSS., MSS. Add. A. 68-69, C. 44, and Auct. T. inf. II. 14, have in this century been regarded as in the Hody Collection, but without sufficient reason.

The MSS. were partly numbered soon after they came into the Library: numbered and referenced in 1747 by dr. Owen, with an inadequate hand-list: a descriptive hand-list was made by mr. Coxe in about 1860.

See Chalmers' *Biographical Dictionary*, Gardiner's *Wadham College Register*, *Dict. of National Biography*, &c.

8887-90. In Greek and Latin, on paper: written about 1690-1700 by H. Hody: 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 and 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 in., pp. iv + 1-1700, and iv + '1701'-'3000' + clxxxvi, and iv + '3001'-'3680' + ii, and '3681'-'4292.'

8892. In Greek and Latin, on paper: written about 1680-90 by H. Hody: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 1834 pages.

Notes on, and extracts from, Greek MSS., chiefly in the Bodleian, by dr. H. Hody; with many references to Langbaine's *Adversaria*.

8893. In Latin, on paper: written about 1687-90 by H. Hody: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., xvi + 631 pages.

8897. In Latin, on paper: written about 1680-90 by H. Hody: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., ix + 347 ('352') leaves.

'De Ptolemæis, opus imperfectum,' notes by dr. Hody.

8898. In Latin, on paper: written about 1680-90 by H. Hody: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., 234 pages + '234'-'282' leaves.

Extracts from catalogues of British and foreign libraries of MSS., made by dr. Hody: at fol. 247 are similar extracts from British library catalogues on the subject of English history.

Notes on Rhetoric, by dr. Hody, including remarks on Horace's *Ars Poetica* (fol. 212^v *rev.*).

8900. In Latin, on paper: written A. D. 1677 by H. Hody: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., 283 leaves. 'Systema Logicæ. Humpridus Hody e Coll. Wadh.: anno M. DC. LXX. VII.'

Now MS. Add. A. 65.

8901-3. In Latin, on paper: written about 1698-1700 by H. Hody: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 7$ and $8\frac{1}{2} \times 7$ and $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 491 and 289 and 319 leaves.

(No. 8901, fol. 36.) 'Humphredi Hodii Historia Linguæ Græcæ et Instaurationis Literarum humaniorum cum primorum eorum Instaurationum vitis et elogiis: this is an inaugural lecture of the Professor of Greek at Oxford (1698), and is an introduction to (fol. 96) 'H. H. De Italis illustribus Linguæ Græcæ et Literarum humaniorum ante Constantinopolis excidium cultoribus ac instauratoribus, eorum vitis scriptis et elogiis libri vi, in quibus permulta e codd. MSS.' Bk. 1 begins at fol. 97, bk. 2 at fol. 195, bk. 3 at fol. 269, bk. 4 at no. 8902, fol. 1 (but the title is in 8901, fol. 368), bk. 5 at no. 8903, fol. 2, bk. 6 at fol. 230. Foll. 384^v, 387-447, 461-470, 473-481 contain 'a History of the Transactions in the Convocation of 1701' [6 Feb. 1701^o-24 June, 1701], taken from the mouths of Dr. Trimnel and Mr. Floyd; and several other letters and papers about this Convocation are in the volume, from John Strype, Edm. 8906-7. In Latin, on paper: written about 1700 by H. Hody: both $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + '1' to '861' and ii + '862' to '1472' pages.

Dr. Hody's 'Index ad Collectanea nostra de Scriptoribus et Historia Literarum,' an alphabetical index to nos. 8887-8890.

Now MSS. Add. C. 45-46.

III.

JONES MSS., A.D. 1708.

(Nos. 8908—8968.)

THE REV. HENRY JONES matriculated at Christ Church, Oxford, in 1668, and was Rector of Sunningwell in Berkshire until 1700, when he resigned his position, being a Nonjuror, but he qualified again for the position of Rector in 1706. He died in about Oct. 1707. He was a nephew of bp. John Fell (*d.* 1686), and to him as co-heir came many of the bishop's MSS.

The Collection seems to have arrived at the Bodleian in about January, 1708, but of the 101 pieces catalogued in the *Catalogus MSS^{rum} Angliæ et Hiberniæ* (Oxon. 1697), tom. ii. part. i. nos. 7004—7103 (7097 being two MSS.), only 68 came into the Library, together with 23 volumes or pieces not in the *Catalogus*. The whole 91 are now represented by 59 volumes as at present bound, one volume and two pieces of volumes being lost. What is now MS. Add. A. 125 (Broughton against the Church of England) was once in Jones's possession and was in the Library before 1747, but there is no evidence that it came to the Library with Jones's MSS.

A list of the MSS., almost amounting to a catalogue, was written in the *Registrum Benefactorum*, and printed thence in the *Commercii Epistolaris Vffenbachiani Selecta* (Ulm, 1753), p. 202. One Greek MS. (8962) is catalogued in Coxe's catalogue of the Greek MSS. in the Bodleian, but no others till now elsewhere.

8908. In Latin, on paper: written in A.D. 1600—01 by S. Forman: $13\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{8}$ in., 100 leaves, with coloured figures.

A cabalistic work professing to have been revealed to Solomon and explained by 'Appolonius artium magister:' on fol. 85^v, 'Explicit Ars notoria cum figuris septem artium liberalium et 7^m mechanicarum et excepti[u]arum et cum figuris generalium et Theologiæ et tocius philosophiæ . . . Finis per Simonem Forman 1601 the 14 of Julij anno etatis sue 49' (see MS. Ashm. 208, fol. 62^v). Another title of the work is 'Flores aurei' and Manicheus and Eudochius are mentioned as helping to compose the work. Foll. 86—95 are occupied by 'Orationes.' A few English phrases occur in the volume.

Now MS. Jones 1.

8909. In Latin, on paper: written in about A.D. 1650 by R. Jennings: $13\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 176 leaves.

'Joannis Rossi alias Rous Warwicensis historia lectu dignissima' (also known as 'Quatuor mundi aetates'); with various readings recorded from the text and margin of the MS. of the same work at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge (MS. cx), by William Mason and Samuel Fleet. Hearne printed his edition of Ross's *Historia regum Angliae* (Oxon. 1716) from this MS., the text of which he says was copied by Ralph Jennings from (Brit. Mus.) MS. Cotton (Vesp. A. xii). Hearne testifies also that Jones received the volume from his uncle, bp. John Fell.

Now MS. Jones 2.

8910. In English, on paper: written about 1540, perhaps by J. Philpott: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., 72 leaves.

'Of the trew difference of the powre of a Kynge and the powre of the Churche, and what is the uery trewthe and uertu of them bothe. An excellent worke:' a translation from the Latin, made by 'Jhon Phylpot' and dedicated to King Henry VIII. The whole may be in Philpot's own hand, to judge by the corrections, but is written in a formal hand.

This copy is signed by 'Math. Cant.' i.e. archbp. Parker, 1559-75 (Philpot was burnt in 1557), and endorsed by the archbp. 'To Gregory Seton in Paules church yeard at the signe of the Hedgehogge gyue thes.'

Now MS. Jones 3.

8911. In Latin, on paper: written in the first half of the 17th cent.: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., 60 leaves.

Chronicles and documents connected with the Monastery of St. Swithin at Winchester, 'Chronica Cenobij Sⁱ Swithini Winton.,' in Latin, the chief being:—

1 (fol. 4). A short history of the monastery: *beg.* 'Britannia semper in Fide Christi remansit.'

2 (fol. 5). 'Liber Historialis et Antiquitatum domus sancti Swithuni Wintoniæ, Johannis Exceter, ejusdem loci Commonachi, proprijs manibus descriptus anno . . . 1531.'

3 (fol. 12). A short chronicle of the kings of England from Egbert to Hen. VI, with their donations to the monastery: 'hæc Wilhelmus Woddeson propria ejus manu scripsit.'

Then follow copies of deeds and short pieces.

4 (fol. 28^v). A short chronicle of England and of the monastery from Lucius to Hen. VI: *beg.* 'Futuræ resurrectionis sælicem.'

This whole MS. appears to be a copy of Cambridge MS. Corpus Christi cx, foll. 258-358: and where the writer has improved the text

the reading of the MS. is also recorded. A fuller account will be found in Nasmyth's printed catalogue of the C. C. C. MSS.

Now MS. Jones 4.

8912. In Latin, on paper: written in A. D. 1652 by R. Jennings: 15½ x 10 in., viii + 334 leaves.

The Chronicle of Walter Hemingburgh (or Hemingford) of Guisborough (Gisburne), containing the history of England from the Norman Conquest to A. D. 1346, in Latin. The MS. was transcribed for Cornelius Bee in 1652 by 'Raph Jennynges' (fol. 332^v), (1) to A. D. 1297 from Brit. Mus. MS. Cotton Tib. B. 4, (2) (fol. 213^v) from 1297 from MS. Trin. Coll. Cambr. R. 5. 10.

A fol. 328 are transcribed 'Provisiones Oxonie' of A. D. 1258.

A modern hand has inserted some additions to the text, and at fol. 253 are some papers of dr. Rich. Rawlinson's relating to an omission in Hearne's edition of Hemingburgh, vol. i. p. 211 in A. D. 1304, and including original letters from J. Sanford (Oxford, 2 Mar. 1752) and J (?). Richardson (17 Feb. 1752) to R. Rawlinson.

Now MS. Jones 5.

8913. In English and Latin, on paper: written (A) early in the 17th cent., and (B) about A. D. 1640-50 (?): 12½ x 8½ in., 173 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 3). Edmund Campion's History of Ireland, in English, made in A. D. 1571, the particular transcript from which sir James Ware printed the work in 1633 in his *Two Histories of Ireland*. More than one scribe seem to have been employed.

B. 2 (fol. 103). 'Chronica Regum Anglie per Thomam Otterbourne.' Though Hearne in his edition of Otterbourne (Oxon. 1732) nowhere alludes to this MS., yet he seems to quote its readings as those of 'F,' and does mention that bp. Fell had a transcript made for himself, which seems to be this very volume.

The first part seems to have belonged to 'Richard Burbadge' and perhaps 'Jasper Maurice.'

Now MS. Jones 6.

8914. In Latin, on paper: written in A. D. 1651 by E. Earbery: 13½ x 9 in., iv + 174 leaves.

A transcript, made in 1651 by 'Edward Earbery' for Cornelius Bee (fol. 171^v), and corrected by 'Ralph Jennynges' (fol. 171^r), of MS. Queen's Coll. Oxford no. ccciv (once at Glastonbury), foll. 67-178, containing—

1 (fol. 1). Nicholai Triveti Annales, A. D. 1136-1307.

2 (fol. 116^v). '... Incipit continuatio eiusdem . . .,' A. D. 1307-1318, by an unknown author: *beg.* 'Iste Edwardus superius nominatus.'

3 (fol. 129). 'Incipit continuatio Cronicarum Regum Angliæ . . .,' 'explicit opus Adæ Murymouth Canonici Londoniensis,' A. D. 1302-1336.

4 (fol. 148). '... Incipit continuatio aliqualis . . .,' A. D. 1337-1380: *beg.* 'Anno Domini . . . (1337) orta est grandis discordia.'

Now MS. Jones 7.

8915. In Latin and Scotch, on paper: written about 1670-80: 13 × 8½ in., 584 leaves.

A corrected transcript of the whole of Bodl. MS. Fairfax 8, containing the Liber Pluscardensis, a history of Scotland to A. D. 1436, in Latin, formerly attributed to William Elphinstone, bp. of Aberdeen (*d.* 1514) but probably by Maurice de Buchanan. A few pages are in Scotch. A few documents occur at the end (from the Fairfax MS.), which are described in F. J. H. Skene's Preface to his edition of the work (Edinb. 1877), p. xiii.

Now MS. Jones 8.

8916. In Latin, on parchment: written about A. D. 1400 in Kent: 11¼ × 8½ in., 136 leaves. The volume retains its original binding (leather on boards) and its sheepskin cover with clasp.

A Martyrologium written for the Cluniac abbey of Faversham or Feversham in Kent: in two parts.

1 (fol. 3). A general Martyrology, giving the place of martyrdom, in the order of the calendar, now beginning with 30 Dec., a leaf containing 25-30 Dec. being lost.

2 (fol. 84^v). A special list of obits of monks and others connected with the abbey, beginning with 1 Jan.

Foll. 1-2, 136 are fly-leaves from two 14th cent. Latin breviaries(?).

From a note on fol. 135 the book seems to have remained in the possession of a monk of the abbey till 1557.

Now MS. Jones 9.

8917. In English, on paper: written about 1630-40: 11¼ × 7½ in., vii + 98 leaves.

'The Parsons Lawe, or a Breefe Discourse of Corporations, Ecclesiastical Persons, and things . . . collected out of the Bodye of the Lawe,' in 27 chapters: *beg.* 'An Archbishop is a spiritual person:' a manual of church law. At fol. 81 follows a discourse on Impropriations.

Now MS. Jones 10.

8918. In Latin, on paper: written about 1660-70: 12¼ × 8 in., vi + 220 pages.

A transcript of MS. Fell 1, foll. 34-56^v, containing the Latin life of St. Wilfrid, archbp. of York (*d.* A. D. 709), by Heddius or Eddius sur-named Stephanus, a priest. Some various readings are noted from a MS. or edition marked 'f.'

Now MS. Jones 11.

8919. In English, on paper: written in the middle of the 17th cent.: 11½ × 7½ in., 196 leaves.

The Life of cardinal Wolsey by George Cavendish, a transcript.

Now MS. Jones 12.

8920. In Latin, on paper: written about 1670 by W. S.: 15 × 5 $\frac{7}{8}$ in., iv + 50 leaves.

'Conciliorum . . . Tomus secundus sub Hen. Spelmani . . . nomine nuper [A. D. 1664] editus, Recensitus, castigatus et à mendis pene innumeris repurgatus, per W. S.,' i. e. William Somner: a list of errors. The same hand appears in a list of clerical errors noted in the first part of the same volume (on foll. i-iv), preceded by a note by Sir William Dugdale, excusing Spelman.

Now MS. Jones 13.

8921. In English, on paper: five MSS. (A-E) written in about the middle of the 17th cent., see below: 14 × 9 in., iii + 356 ('351') leaves.

A. 1 (fol. iii). The Life of Cardinal Wolsey by George Cavendish, with a coloured design giving Wolsey's arms as bishop of various sees, and as archbishop and cardinal: a transcript 'Per me Thomam Woodcock.'

B. 2 (fol. 100). 'Contemplations upon the History of Ruth,' paraphrases and meditations: *beg.* 'As an entrance to this divine history,' a transcript, but foll. 301-303^a seem to contain a fragment of the original MS. (Ruth iv. 15-end).

C. 3 (fol. 305). 'The Wedding Robe, or a treatise touching the unlawfullnes of Protestants marriages with Papists . . . By George Hakewill, D^r in Divinity . . . and Rector of Exceter Colledge in Oxford.' This appears to be the original MS.

D. 4 (fol. 315^v). 'The confutation of the Popes supremacie wrytten by Gregory of Hemburgh [Heimburg] a hundreth and xxxj yeares agoo [A. D. 1530] and now fyrst put in print,' the original MS. of the translation from the Latin (Bâle, 1555 &c.), seemingly written in 1661.

E. 5 (fol. 328). 'Some things to be considered of any one who liuing in the Communion of the Church of England . . . is strongly mooued to . . . betake himself to . . . (the Romane Church),' *beg.* 'Long before Luther.'

These five divisions were separate MSS. when in Mr. Jones's possession.
Now MS. Jones 14.

8922. In Latin and Greek, on paper: three MSS. (A-C), written about the middle of the 17th cent.: 13 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 8 $\frac{3}{8}$ in., ii + 134 pages.

A. 1 (p. 1). 'Libellus Domini Roberti Gross[t]este Lincolniensis Episcopi de Libero Arbitrio,' in Latin.

B. 2 (p. 89). 'Vita et Martyrium SS. Cypriani [Antiocheni] et Justinæ, authore Simeone Metaphrasta . . .,' in Latin: *beg.* 'Multa quidem eaque magna.'

C. 3 (p. 109). 'Πρᾶξις τῶν ἁγίων Μαρτύρων Κυπριανοῦ καὶ Ἰουστίνης,' *beg.* 'Τῆς ἐπιφανείας τοῦ Κυρίου ἡμῶν Ἰησοῦ Χριστοῦ.'

Artt. 1 and 2 + 3 formed two separate MSS. in Mr. Jones's library.
Now MS. Jones 15.

8923. In English and Latin, on paper: two MSS. (A, B), written about the middle of the 17th cent.: $13\frac{3}{4} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ in., 87 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 2). 'A Rentall of all the Rents and Revenues due and belonging to the collegiate church of St. Peter in Westminster . . .,' including Provision Rents due to the Dean.

B. 2 (fol. 45). The Statutes of the Dean and Chapter of St. Peter's, Westminster, given by queen Elizabeth (1560?), a later transcript, in Latin.

At fol. 80 is a copy of a deed whereby William Ashburnham in a certain case owes £50 to the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, 3 Dec. 1662.

Now MS. Jones 16.

8924. In English and Latin, on paper: 16th and 17th centt., 15 MSS. (A-O), see below: 13×9 in., 330 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 6). A detailed scheme devised by Thomas Lupton for a general collection towards repairing sea-banks and damages by floods in Lincolnshire, helping the poor in Lincoln, York, Canterbury, and London, and poor scholars at Oxford and Cambridge, erecting free schools in Hertford, Tewkesbury, Ross, Horncastle, Bourne and Market Deeping, &c., preceded by a poem (fol. 5) presenting the petition and scheme to queen Elizabeth. Apparently an original MS., partly at least in Lupton's own handwriting.

B. 2 (fol. 35). The Statutes of Gloucester Cathedral, given by Henry VIII, A. D. 1544, in Latin: a transcript made early in the 17th cent.

C. 3 (fol. 49). The greater part of a Rental of lands belonging to the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's in London, in about A. D. 1510, in Latin, imperfect at beginning and perhaps at end.

D. 4 (fol. 97). 'Statuta Collegij sanctæ & individuae Trinitatis Cantab:.' as confirmed by queen Elizabeth, 4 Apr. 1560: a 17th cent. transcript.

E. 5 (fol. 141). 'Statuta . . . regis Jacobi pro singulis Ecclesijs Cathedralibus novæ (quæ vocantur) et modernæ Foundationis,' A. D. 1610, an original with signatures.

F. 6 (fol. 201). Orders and rules for the government of the poor Knights of Windsor, A. D. 1559, with queen Elizabeth's orders: a transcript about A. D. 1600.

G. 7 (fol. 212). An answer to 'A just and modest vindication of the two last parliaments' (Lond. 1681), *beg.* 'Since all true English Men,' in the author's hand: written on the King's side.

H. 8 (fol. 234). 'The arraignment of Henry Garnett, Superior of the Jesuites in England, . . . (28 Mar. 1606) at the Guild Hall within the city of London . . .'

I. 9 (fol. 247). 'Quæries propounded by sundry of the Clergy of the diocese of London touching the Oath enjoyned by the late Synod,

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Canon 6 . . .,' A. D. 1640: (fol. 249) 'An answer vnto the Quæres . . .,' apparently by John Davenant bp. of Salisbury, written in several hands.

J. 10 (fol. 259). 'The Ordinauncies statutes and Ruells for . . . the Hospitall of the blessed Trinitye of the foundation of sir William Cordell knight in [Long] Melford, in the county of Suffolk . . .,' A. D. 1581 (?).

K. 11 (fol. 264). Commentary by John Grenehalgh on a Latin inscription on an altar found at Chester in 1653, in Latin: a transcript by the writer made about 1670 (?). The inscription is now at Oxford (C. I. L. vii (Britannia), no. 168).

L. 12 (fol. 270). Letter from dr. Robert Plott to dr. John Fell, explaining a design for a journey through England and Wales, to promote the study of the antiquities and natural curiosities of the country, about A. D. 1670.

M. 13 (fol. 281). 'Of the Oath of Supremacy . . . [a word or two in short hand]': *beg.* 'In answer to a speech' by archbp. Nicholas Heath in 1559 (?), apparently written about 1630-40 (?).

N. 14 (fol. 300). An account of the proceedings at Woodstock on 22 Aug. 1631, when the King decided a question of contumacy in the University of Oxford in resisting the King's instructions (Thomas Ford's sermon): *beg.* 'The Kinge haueinge spent some time.'

O. 15 (fol. 310). A treatise on Church government, with especial reference to the King's power, in eight chapters, in Latin: the first leaf is lost: *ends* 'rebus omnibus ordinis gratiâ.' Written in James I's reign, and transcribed about the same time.

These 15 parts were probably separate MSS., when in Mr. Jones's possession. Now MS. Jones 17.

8925. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 12th cent.: 11½ × 8 in., 110 leaves: imperfect at beginning and end.

1 (fol. 2). *Vitae et miracula Sanctorum* (Historia Lausiaca), auctore Palladio Helenopoleos episcopo: imperfect at beginning, and bound in wrong order. This translation into Latin is *not* the one by Gentianus Hervetus.

2 (fol. 80v). *Vita Sancti Johannis Eleemosynarii*, auctore Leontio Neapoleos Cyprorum episcopo, interprete ex Graeco sermone Anastasio: imperfect, *ends* 'omnibus exemplum' in cap. 34, with one leaf (fol. 107) from a later part.

3 (fol. 108). 'Glosa magistralis cum sufficiencijs,' some theological notes: *beg.* 'Quid est Deus? In se ipso alpha & ω.'

Now MS. Jones 18.

8926. In Latin, on parchment: written about A. D. 1300, in England: 12½ × 9½ in., 126 leaves.

1 (fol. 5). Commentary on Ecclesiastes: *beg.* 'Beatus uir cuius est nomen domini spes eius.'

2 (fol. 38). Commentary on the Apocalypse: *beg.* (prol.) 'Uidi in dextera . . . In hijs uerbis cause Libri.'

On fol. 4^v 'liber T. de o. ex dono R. de b.' (14th cent.?)

Now MS. Jones 19.

8927. In English, on paper: written about 1620-30: 12½ × 9½ in., 89 folded sheets.

A transcript of the 'Statutes constitucions orders and ordinances . . . for the . . . Hospitall of the . . . Trinitie in East Grenewich . . . of the foundation of . . . Henry Howard Earle of Northampton: ' the letters patent were dated 5 June 1615. On the 88th sheet is 'A note of all the landes and possessions of the Hospitall . . . ' 27 June 1622.

Now MS. Jones 20.

8928. In Latin, on parchment: written in A.D. 1344: 14½ × 9½ in., 13 leaves.

A transcript of 17 deeds and inquisitions relating to Hereford Cathedral and its property, in Latin. The originals and this copy seem to be of the date A. D. 1344.

Now MS. Jones 21.

8929. In English, on paper: written about 1672: 12½ × 8½, 101 leaves.

A list of licences to preach and indulgences to Nonconformists throughout England, A. D. 1672.

Now MS. Jones 22.

8930. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 13th cent.; 10½ × 8½ in., 80 pages.

Copies of deeds of donation to Hereford Cathedral, in Latin. All the 71 deeds are printed in Rich. Rawlinson's *History of Hereford* (Lond. 1717), in appendix pp. 32-85.

Now MS. Jones 23.

8931. In Latin and English, on paper: two MSS. (A, B), written about 1628 and about 1679: 8½ × 7 in., 54 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 2). 'Catalogus Custodum siue Decanorum liberæ Capellæ regiæ sancti Georgij infra castrum suum de Windsor. Nec non Canoniorum siue Præbendariorum ibidem . . . collectus . . . anno 1628 . . . opera et industria Thomæ Frith . . . Capellæ Canonici,' a transcript.

2 (fol. 34). Fees payable at burials and weddings in St. George's Chapel at Windsor and in Westminster Abbey.

B. 3 (fol. 38). A letter from 'Theophilus Philanax' about 'the busines of excluding the Duke of York from inheriting the crowne,' dated 7 Nov. 1679, a transcript.

Now MS. Jones 24.

8932. In Latin, on paper: written about A.D. 1630: 8½ × 6½ in., 208 leaves.

'A Latin tract concerning the interpreting Scripture by taking notice of the Jewish rites & Hellenistical dialect. B.,' with many cor-

rections and additions: *beg.* 'Primò licet deposità ex professo:' composed about A. D. 1630.

Now MS. Jones 25.

8933. In Latin, on paper: written in the 15th cent. in France: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{3}{4}$ in., ii + 302 leaves: with illuminated capitals and (on fol. 1) border: badly injured in parts by damp.

Johannis Cassiani Collationes sanctorum patrum xxiv, in two parts.

'Thomas Cantuariensis,' (i.e. archbp. Cranmer), is on a piece of paper pasted on fol. 1, probably indicating ownership.

Now MS. Jones 26.

8934. In English, on paper: written at the close of the 16th cent.: $9\frac{3}{8} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 24 leaves.

'An advertisemente toching the controuersies of the Church of Englande,' in seven chapters: *beg.* 'That it is no newe or strange thinge.' This is only part of MS. Jones 27 as it came into the Library: originally no. 8935, art. 2, art. 1 (perhaps art. 3 and 4), and 'Literae Belgici Residentis Constantinopoli datae An. 1662, 63, 64,' were appended to it.

Now MS. Jones 27.

8935. In English, on paper: written in the 17th cent.: three pieces (A-C) $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., 18 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 1). 'Q. Whether may a Man marrie the Sister of his deceased wife?': *beg.* 'That a Christian is not onely to consider:' endorsed 'Mr. Ironside,' and the 1697 Catalogue attributes the piece to 'Mr. Ir.,' i.e. perhaps Gilbert Ironside, Warden of Wadham.

B. 2 (fol. 6). 'A declaracion of the true groundes of the prohibicion to the High Commissioners, and the authority and reason approving the same . . .,' on the jurisdiction of the High Commission, apparently composed and transcribed early in the 17th cent.

C. 3 (fol. 17). 'Contingent Profits a[ccruing to the g?]ouerment of Scilly not valu . . . lar,' imperfect.

4 (fol. 17^v). Six humorous poems in English, Greek, Latin and French: *beg.* 'A taboure & a shepherds reed,' (preceded by the name 'Iohn Medow,') "'Απ' Ὀβέρωνος δαυμόνων,' [a translation of 'From Oberon in fairy-land,' E. W. B. N.], 'Hortus deliciæ domus politæ [about Merton college garden, E. W. B. N.], 'Pour qui gardez tu les yeux,' or 'Phillis tandis que tu vis,' 'No sooner old Bel,' (about an expected contest for a bedell's place [?] at Oxford), 'A silly John surprizd with ioy.'

See note in no. 8934.

Now MS. Jones 27*.

8936. In English, on paper: written about A. D. 1615-20: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 58 leaves.

'The point handled is, whether it be better to suppress Popish practises by the strict execution of Lawes touchinge Jesuites and Semi-

nary Priests, or to restraints them to close prison during life, &c. :’ at end ‘... 1613. Aug. 11. Robertus Cotton Bruceus :’ a transcript.

Now MS. Jones 28.

8937. In English, on paper: written about A. D. 1600: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 106 leaves.

A treatise on English Law, in three books: *beg.* ‘Lawe is an arte of well ordering.’ At fol. 98 is a fragment also on the subject of law.

Now MS. Jones 29.

8938. In English, on paper: written about 1610-20: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., 86 leaves.

An answer to John Robinson the Brownist, on separation from the Church of England: *beg.* ‘... Sir, as I had noe oportunitie.’ This may be a copy corrected by the author and sent by him to a friend at Reading (see fol. 3^v, and inside last cover).

Now MS. Jones 30.

8939. In Latin, on paper: written in 1603: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 15 leaves: binding, limp white parchment with gilt ornament.

‘In obitum serenissimæ ac potentiss^{imæ}: principis Elizabethæ, Angliæ . . . nuper reginæ, Fidei defensatricis, Oratio funebris.’ The dedication to archbp. Whitgift (6 June 1603) is signed ‘Iohannes Sonibanck.’ In the *Registrum Benefactorum* the date is given as 1503, which occasioned an error in Macray’s *Annals of the Bodleian* (1st ed. p. 120, 2nd ed. p. 178).

This volume has been missing from the Jones collection for more than a century, but was in reality safe among the Rawlinson MSS., a collection to which it had no right to belong, until Aug. 1891.

Now MS. Jones 31.

8940. In English, on paper: two MSS. (A, B) of the latter part of the 16th cent.: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 90 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 3). A conference between a scholar, a gentleman and a Lawyer, on public affairs, chiefly an attack on the earl of Leicester, dedicated to G. M. ‘in Gracious Streete in London,’ dated 1584: *beg.* ‘Not longe before Christmas last.’

B. 2 (fol. 72^v). ‘A treatise of the succession of the Crowne of Englande:’ *beg.* ‘The Contro-versie betweene the houses:’ at end, ‘Taken out of a booke of D. R. and written the 4th day of November, 1599.’

3 (fol. 82). ‘A declaration of the succession of the Crowne Imperiall of Englande, made by J[ohn] Halles, briefed by A. G., sometimes attributed to sir Nicholas Bacon, and answered by sir Antony Browne (d. 1567): *beg.* ‘In soe waightie a matter I neede vse:’ at end ‘Taken out of a booke of D. R. and written the 6th of November 1599.’

‘Gualterus Johnes verus possessor huius libri,’ 17th cent.

Now MS. Jones 32.

8941. In English, on paper: written about A. D. 1600: $9 \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., 77 leaves.

A ‘Discourse on the Waye to Blisse,’ an alchemical treatise on the

Philosopher's Stone, in 3 books : *beg.* 'If in all orderly speeches : ' a transcript.

Belonged to 'Walterus Johnes' and 'Jervase Jones,' 17th cent., but both names are erased.
Now MS. Jones 33.

8942. In Latin, on paper: written about 1670-80, in two hands: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., 80 leaves.

A collation of the text of the Memorabilia of Valerius Maximus in MS. Magd. Coll. (Oxf.) 201 with the printed edition, Lugd. Bat. 1665 : in two different handwritings.

Now MS. Jones 34.

'Maimo[ni]dis tractatus de Primitijs,' translated from the Hebrew by George Smalridge, Edward Hannes and Robert Morgan, of Ch. Ch. Oxford, who dedicated the book to their patron dr. Fell, and wrote in their own hands respectively foll. 1-26, 27-51 (?) and 53-80.

Belonged no doubt to dr. Fell.

8945. In Latin, on paper: written in the second half of the 17th cent. : $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., 29 leaves.

1 (fol. 2). 'De peccatis Infirmittatis et Voluntarijs,' *beg.* 'Quandoquidem secundo foedere.'

'Breuis Expositio R. Shelomonis Jarchi in Canticum Canticorum,' translated into Latin by David Stokes, and dedicated to the bp. of London (John King?).

8947. In Latin, English and Greek, on paper: eight MSS. (A-H), written in the 17th cent. : $9\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 202 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 2). 'An humble essay toward the settlement of Peace and Truth in the Church,' Lond. 1681: by sir Edw. Harley: apparently a copy from the printed work.

B. 2 (fol. 18). 'The Civile Caualiere, or a Discourse concerning the present Parliament : ' a dialogue between a R[oundhead] and C[avalier], *beg.* 'R. There is a Parliament in being,' imperfect at end : perhaps written in 1642 : the first leaf is detached and bound as fol. 103.

C. 3 (fol. 34). 'Regis Responsio libello cuidam inscripto Declaratio et remonstrantia Procerum et Communium : ' written in 1642, but apparently the original draft of a fictitious message : *beg.* 'Si unquam fatiganda esset.'

D. 4 (fol. 51). 'De Conscientia,' *beg.* 'Errorum practicum,' with note 'Auctor est D. Doctor Hammondus, ni fallor : ' apparently an abbreviated form of the printed treatise.

E. 5 (fol. 73). 'A Discourse collected out of the Common Lawes of England proving that the oath Ex Officio is, hath been, and ought to be practised in the Ecclesiastical Courts. Written by a Common Lawyer,' in English : *beg.* 'Of oaths in ecclesiastical courts. Mandamus vicecomiti.'

F. 6 (fol. 83). Petitions to Charles I, with his answers, 1625.

G. 7 (fol. 95). Copy of Luke i. 1-77 in the (British Museum) Codex Alexandrinus, in Greek uncials and minuscules.

H. 8 (fol. 105). 'De resistendo Legitimo Magistratui sub prætextu religionis, et, per modum Appendicis, de voce κρίμα redditâ Damnatio Rom. 13. Reimpressum [this word erased]. Item De Zelotis inter Judæos, De Cruce tollenda, Vindicatio reprehensionis istius quâ Christus Petrum corripuit, ab exceptionibus Mag. [Steph.] Marshalli,' with note 'Quære annon scripserit D. Hen. Hammondus, & alius quispiam in sermonem Latinum verterit ? ' : at end 'Verteb[am] : A. Br. 4^o Cal. Jun.' erased. The English original was printed at Oxford in 1647.

The original order of this volume was artt. 1, 3, 4, 8, 2, 5, 6, then one now lost 'The election of the Count Palatine to be King of Bohemia,' then art. 7.

8948. In Latin, on paper : written in the first quarter of the 17th cent. : 8 x 6½ in., vi + 350 + 534 pages.

'Locorum Theologicorum Pars i Theologiam didacticam κατασκευαστικῶς exhibens . . .' 'Pars ii Theologiam Elencticam Ἀνασκευαστικῶς exhibens : ' *beg.* 'Theologia est doctrina.'

'Κτῆμα Marcj Ziglerj Palatinj. 10 Septembris M.DC.XXVII' (p. ii).

Now MS. Jones 40.

8949. In Latin, on parchment : written early in the 15th cent. : 8½ x 5½ in., i + 146 leaves : imperfect : in contemporary binding of sheep-skin on boards, with clasps.

'De statu Reipublicæ Foederatorum Belgarum commentariolus:' beg. 'Foederati Belgij provinciae:' composed and written about A.D. 1630-40.

8951. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in England: 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., 111 leaves: with a few illuminated borders, &c., but mutilated. In the original binding, sheepskin on boards.

A book of Hours, with psalms, prayers &c., in Latin, several leaves with miniatures missing.

- 1 (fol. 4). Hymns and prayers.
- 2 (fol. 11). The so-called Psalterium sancti Hieronymi.
- 3 (fol. 23^v). 'Psalmi de passione Domini nostri Ihesu Christi.'
- 4 (fol. 31). A calendar, with entries of the movements of the Constable family (of Yorkshire?) in the middle of the 16th cent. The rebus of the family seems to occur on fol. 11^v.

Perhaps written for one of the Constable family, see above. 'Mecholyscraynwelle,' on fol. 108^v, may be a 16th cent. owner.

8953. In English, on paper: written about the middle of the 17th cent. by H. Hammond: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 612 leaves.

A translation of, and notes on, the New Testament: by dr. Henry Hammond, whose name does not occur: in English. This appears to be a first draft of a part of the printed *Paraphrase and Annotations*.

8954. In Latin, on parchment: written early in the 15th cent. in England: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., 120 leaves: with illuminated borders, &c.

Horae beatae Mariae Virginis: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 2), and followed by the Seven Penitential Psalms (fol. 50), a Litany (fol. 60^v), and the *Placebo* and *Dirige* (fol. 69). Foll. 108-117 are occupied by prayers of the latter part of the 15th cent., invoking especially king Henry VI.

(Fol. 107.) 'Hec cum dicetis Iohannem Wycham memoretis. Vt penetret celum brevis est oratio telum,' in the original scribe's hand. John Wycham was no doubt a Benedictine monk of St. Leonard's Priory (cf. fol. 25, before which a leaf has been cut out), at Norwich (cf. the Calendar), which was famous for its miraculous image of Henry VI. 'Gulielmus Bisshopp' and 'Barnabas Bisshop' seem to have been 17th cent. owners.

De origine et gestis Regum Britanniae, by Geoffrey of Monmouth, in

Latin: ending abruptly, the last leaves being lost, at lib. x, § 10 'quibus meliores pre.'

(Fol. 7^v). 'Istum librum emit frater Willelmus de Dalton abbas huius monasterii.' William de Dalton was abbot of Furness, 1412-23.
Now MS. Jones 48.

8957. In Greek, on paper: written in the 17th cent.: $6\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., 69 leaves.

'Supplementa Juris Orientalis Enimundi Bonefidij e codice Amerbachiano Academiae Basiliensis eruta et cuius seriem sequuntur . . .,' fitted by references to the Paris edition of 1573.

Now MS. Jones 49.

8958. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 1st quarter of the 13th cent. in England: $7\frac{1}{4} \times 5$ in., 73 leaves, with coloured initials.

Jean de Hauteville's Architrenius, with painted initial letters: the first page of the text is supplied by a modern transcript.

'Iste liber constat . . . B . . . hylle' c. 1400 (?), (fol. 72): 'Liber doctoris Nich. Gray,' c. 1700 (fol. 1), i. e. it belonged to dr. Nich. Grey (d. 1660).
Now MS. Jones 50.

8959. In Latin, on paper: written in perhaps the second quarter of the 17th cent. in England: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{4}$ in., 278 leaves: bound in Oxford (17th cent.).

Jean de Hauteville's Architrenius, apparently a copy of no. 8958, perhaps by dr. Nicholas Gray or Grey. Most of the volume is blank. The fly-leaves (foll. 1-2, 277-8) are from a 14th cent. Horae B. Mariae.

'Dr. Grays Booke.'
Now MS. Jones 51.

8960. In English, on paper: written about 1630-40: $6 \times 3\frac{3}{4}$ in., 75 leaves.

'A breife discourse of Fortification both offensive & defensiuē . . .,' with diagrams: text *beg.* 'In those first times when Anger.'

Now MS. Jones 52.

8961. In Latin and English, on paper: written late in the 16th cent. in England: $4\frac{1}{4} \times 4$ in., 391 leaves.

1 (fol. 6). 14 'Controversiæ' on theological subjects, from the Roman Catholic point of view, in Latin: *beg.* 'Controuersia de summo Pontifice. Dubium primum. An Petrus.'

2 (fol. 193). 'Resolutio quorundam dubiorum circa communicationem cum hæreticis in Anglia . . .,' in Latin: *beg.* 'Dubium primum. An cum iam legibus.'

3 (fol. 213). 'Breife aduises how to confer with ordinarie heretykes:' *beg.* 'First he which doth confer.'

4 (fol. 235). 'How to proceede with hereticks in their conuersion:' *beg.* 'Aboue all things to maikē impression.'

5 (fol. 239). As art. 2, without title: *beg.* 'An liceat administrare . . . Stola et supellicium.' Foll. 254-389 are blank.

Now MS. Jones 58.

8962. = Qu. Catal. i. (Greek), cod. misc. 15 (Ignatius). This MS. was bequeathed to the Library, but had been lent by Mr. Jones to dr. John Mill, and passed into Edmund Thwaites' hands, who still had it in July 1708. See *Hearn's Collections*, 2 July 1708 (vol. iii. p. 117 of the printed edition). No doubt Thwaites restored it to the Library, since it occurs in its place in the earliest list of the collection in the *Registrum Benefactorum*.

8963. In Latin, on paper: written in the 17th cent. in England: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., 47 leaves.

'Mathesis,' a course of Mathematics, in Latin: consisting of a Pars generalis, Arithmetica and Geometria, with diagrams: *beg.* '1. Mathesis est scientia Metiendi.'

Now MS. Jones 55.

8964. In English and Latin, on paper: written in the 17th cent. in England: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 180 leaves.

Copies of papers and treatises on public affairs in England from 1603 to 1660, with some Oxford papers: the chief items are:—

8 (fol. 125). Proceedings of the Grand Committee upon the Bill of Sales, 6-29 Aug. 1660.

9 (fol. 131). 'To the reader of Sir James Sempill's appendix [to 'Sacri lege sacred handled,' 1619] for soe much as concernes Scaliger and Selden,' by John Selden.

10 (fol. 142). Letters from the king to the bishop and dean and chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, about leases of property, 1634 (?), in Latin.

The *Registrum Benefactorum* contains more details of this volume.

'This is Robert Vaughan of Hengwrte . . . 's booke:' it appears in the list of 'MSS. missing from the Hengwrt Collection,' printed in the *Archæologia Cambrensis* (4th Ser. no. vi, April 1871, p. 133), as bearing the mark 116 in the Collection: the list states that the translation into Latin from Welsh is by 'Thelwallus,' and that the handwriting is R. Vaughan's.

Now MS. Jones 57.

8966. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in Italy: 5½ × 4½ in., 67 leaves.

'Viri clarissimi Francisci Petrarche poete laureati in obiurgantem medicum Inuectiuarum . . .' libri quatuor: in parts soiled and mutilated. A love poem in English (late 16th cent.) is written on the margins of foll. 58^v-66, *beg.* 'The rose is sweet.'

'Sampson Walker' (fol. 2^v) and Roger and Richard Martin seem to have owned the book in the 17th cent.

Now MS. Jones 58.

8967. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in England: 4½ × 3½ in., 94 leaves, imperfect at end.

Directions for the conduct of divine service secundum usum Sarum, in Latin: *beg.* 'De ordinacione chori Sarum. In superiore gradu quatuor principalium personarum.' This book is nearer to a Consuetudinarium than to an Ordinale or Directorium.

Owned by Thomas Hatton in the 15th cent.: and by 'Lud. Stephens Æd. Christi alumnus, 1553:' later by 'Raphe Jeferson,' and John and Thomas Harison who scribble notes of their family.

Now MS. Jones 59.

8968. In Latin, on paper: written about 1685 by bp. Bull (?): 12½ × 9½ in., 36 pages.

'Defensio fidei Nicænae &c.,' by bp. George Bull: from the beginning to sect. 1, cap. 2, § 7 *in hoc literarum.* This would seem to be the autograph of the author.

IV.

MARSH COLLECTION, A.D. 1714.

(Nos. 8969—9710.)

NARCISSUS MARSH was born at Hannington, 20 Dec. 1638: matr. at Magdalen Hall, Oxford, 25 July 1655: B.A. 12 Feb. 165 $\frac{1}{2}$: Fellow of Exeter College, 1658: Principal of St. Alban's Hall, 1673: Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, 1678: Bp. of Leighlin and Fernes, 1683: Archbp. of Cashel 1690, of Dublin 1694, of Armagh 170 $\frac{3}{8}$: died 2 Nov. 1713 in Dublin.

In 1696 he purchased a large proportion of the Oriental MSS. of Jacobus Golius, which were announced for sale at Leyden 16 Oct. in that year, securing through dr. Edward Bernard 274 out of the 407 which Golius possessed. In Oct. 1699 he purchased, also through dr. Bernard, 14 Oriental MSS. from the brothers Cunæus (marked *Cunæi* in the following catalogue) and at about the same time 10 MSS. through dr. Hallifax (marked *Hallifax*). A few (marked *Loftus*) came by purchase from the collection left by Dudley Loftus. All his Oriental MSS., with which came a few Greek and other volumes, were bequeathed to the Bodleian, and arrived on 12 Aug. 1714.

The MSS. possessed by Marsh are catalogued in the Old Catalogue of 1697, vol. 2, part 2, nos. 978-1339 and (Golius) 1676-1987, but not all were received by the Library. The few Loftus MSS. are in the same Catalogue, nos. 851-2, 857, 866, 868, 871, 874? Nearly all are also in the printed Oriental or other Bodleian catalogues, from Uri's onward.

V.

ADVERSARIA GRABII, A.D. 1720.

(Nos. 9711—9765.)

JOHANN ERNST GRABE was born in 1666, at Königsberg in Prussia, and was brought up a Lutheran. In 1695 he decided to enter the Church of Rome, but was persuaded instead to turn to England and join the Church of England. From about 1696 till his death on 3 Nov. 1711 he applied himself ardently to theological study, chiefly in Oxford: he received a D.D. degree on 27 April, 1706, and was soon after offered the Margaret Professorship of Divinity.

His MSS. passed by his will first to Dr. Hickea, next after the death of the latter on 15 Dec. 1715 to George Smalridge, bp. of Bristol, and finally on his death on 27 Sept. 1719 to the Bodleian Library, which soon after received them, although the Benefaction Register enters them under 1724. They were certainly in the Library before Aug. 1720. While in Hickea's possession MSS. 9750-54 were lent to dr. David Humphreys, and were not recalled till Nov. 1726, soon after which date they were joined to the rest. The MSS. numbered probably 199 notebooks and parcels when received into the Library, but were reduced by binding to 39, dr. Humphreys contributing 5 more, and Francis Lee, M.D. (*d.* 1719), perhaps as many as 14 additional, which he had received as editor of Grabe's Septuagint from bp. Smalridge, but which till 1891 remained unbound.

In 1853 a full catalogue and index of all but the Lee volumes was printed in 'Catalogi codd. MSS. Bibl. Bodl. pars prima, recensionem codicum Græcorum continens. Confecit H. O. Coxe,' coll. 851-876, &c.

CHERRY MSS., A.D. 1729.

(Nos. 9775—9820.)

FRANCIS CHERRY, of Shottesbrooke, Berkshire, the Nonjuror and patron of Thomas Hearne, was born in 1665, matriculated at St. Edmund Hall 6 Apr. 1682, but took no degree. He died on 23 Sept. 1713.

There is some doubt as to the exact manner in which his MSS. passed to the University. The *Registrum benefactorum* records that 'moriens legavit,' but none came at his death. On the contrary Hearne affirms (Diary, 27 Dec. 1729) that Cherry 'gave me what MSS. he designed to dispose of, before his death,' but Hearne did not retain them. The MSS. passed to Mrs. Cherry, but they are not mentioned in her will which was made in 1725 and proved 3 Sept. 1729. Her son-in-law believed that Samuel Parker, son of the Bishop, first suggested to Mrs. Cherry that she should give them to the Library. At any rate they were received through Mrs. Cherry's daughter Anne in the latter part of 1729, the latter adding the gift of a portrait of her father.

A MS. list of the contents of the MSS. was made soon after they came to the Bodleian, containing full details.

9816-20 (MSS. Cherry 43-47) were until recently kept apart as a Collection under the title 'Incerti.'

Cherry's arms are on 9777, 9778, 9811, and his mottos 'Non civium ardor prava jubentium' and 'Conscientia mille testes' in 9778, 9784, 9804.

9775. In Latin, Greek, and English, on paper: written in the 17th cent. by different hands: 12½ × 8¾ in., 277 leaves.

A translation into English out of French of 'The Miroir or glasse of the synnefull soule,' a new year's gift from queen Elizabeth when 11 years old to her step-mother queen Katherine, written with her own hand and perhaps also bound by herself. The dedication states 'therefore have i . . . translated this lytell boke out of frenche ryme in to englishe prose: ioyning the sentences together as well as the capacitie of my symple witte, and small lerning coulede extende themselves. The wich booke is intytled, or named the miroir or glasse, of the synnefull soul . . .' The dedication is headed 'To our moste noble and vertuous quene KATHERIN, Elizabeth her humble daughter wisheth perpetuall felicitie and everlasting ioye,' and ends, 'Frome

asherige [Ashridge], the laste daye of the yeare of our lord god, 1544.' There is a preface 'To the reader,' after which the text begins, 'The glasse of the synneful soule. psal. 51 Make me a cleane harte: O god. Where is the hell full of trauayle.' On fol. 63^v is 'A praier made by her ma^{tie}' (*beg.* 'O god the Almaker: keeper: and guider'), perhaps of the time of the Spanish Armada, copied in by some other hand.

The binding is traditionally said to be queen Elizabeth's own handiwork (see Hearne's Diary, 19 Sept. 1708, &c.). It consists of ornamental filigree work of gold and silver wire on a ground of blue corded silk, with the initials K.P. (Katherine Parr) in the middle of each cover. It was stiffened with mill-board and fly-leaves probably soon after it was placed in the Bodleian.

The catalogue of some library of about 2000 volumes, quite possibly Francis Cherry's. A list of about 100 books follows on fol. 203.

9817. In English, &c., on paper: written about 1700-10: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{3}{4}$ in., 190 leaves.

The catalogue of some library of about 2000 books arranged in cases A—H, the type of pressmark being B. viii. 11: the owner was a friend of dr. Dodwell, and probably a member of the Cherry family, see no. 9818.

Now MS. Cherry 44.

9818. In English, &c., on paper: written about 1700-5: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 92 leaves.

A catalogue of the pamphlets in bound volumes in a library, probably that with which no. 9817 is connected. A few pages of accounts in 1702 (fol. 91 *rev.*) make it probable that the library was in the possession of a member of the Cherry family.

* * The volumes marked with a star belonged (or, in the case of collections of papers, at least partly belonged) to archbp. Sancroft. Other volumes may have belonged to him, and the Sancroft MSS. 10302-10446 are not specially marked.

THOMAS TANNER was born in 1674, and matriculated at Queen's College, Oxford, 17 Dec. 1689. In 1697 he became Fellow of All Souls: was prebendary of Ely 1713-23, archdeacon of Norfolk in 1721, and canon of Christ Church 3 Feb. 172 $\frac{3}{4}$. On 23 Jan. 173 $\frac{1}{2}$ he was made bishop of St. Asaph, and died in Oxford 14 Dec. 1735. By his will all his MSS. (other than his private papers, his transcript of John Boston of Bury's list of English authors, and his Norwich collections) passed to the Bodleian, and were received there about three months after his death, coming in seven carts from Norwich.

Perhaps the most important part of the collection is the MSS. purchased, as Tanner records, from archbp. Sancroft's executors, consisting of important Civil War papers (not now distinguishable from those of dr. Nalson and Tanner's own) and large collections relating to various dioceses, together with the archbishop's own notebooks, those of his uncle dr. William Sancroft, master of Emmanuel College, Cambridge, and several of dr. Richard Holdsworth's. In some cases it is impossible now to decide whether a Sancroft MS. came into the Library through Tanner or Rawlinson: see nos. 10317, 10330, 13243, &c., and Introduction to Rawlinson MSS.

The collection of 'Tanner MSS.' was arranged and catalogued by Thomas Toynbee of Balliol in about 1740-41, and fully catalogued in 1860 by the rev. A. Hackman. Some Tanner deeds are in the *Catalogue of Charters and Rolls*, but probably cannot now be distinguished. The 'Sancroft MSS.' were described in MS. in 1877 by the rev. W. D. Macray.

3 (p. 138, col. b). Masses, in the midst of which are Prefaces and (p. 149) the Canon of the Mass. There appears to be a gap before p. 157 where excerpts from a Benedictine breviary begin, and p. 169 where more private prayers are found, which end abruptly on p. 174, the rest being lost.

Pages 1-2, 177-8 are two late 13th cent. leaves of Latin metrical hymns, with musical notes, one 'In exaltatione sancte Crucis' (*beg*. 'Laudes crucis attollamus'), the other in honour of Oswald king and martyr. Pages 175-176 are a leaf written in the 13th cent. headed in a later hand 'Translacio sancte Elene,' containing the latter part of an English alliterative poem with musical notes (*beg*. 'stod ho pere neh').

This volume clearly belonged to a monk of the Benedictine abbey of St. Werburg at Chester. On p. 2 is 'Henry Maynwaring by the' (16th cent.).

IX.

CARTE PAPERS, A.D. 1753.

(Nos. 10447-10724.)

JOHN CARTE, son of the rev. Samuel Carte, M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford, and brother of Samuel and Sarah Carte, was born at Clifton in Warwickshire in 1686: matriculated at University College 8 July 1698 and took his degree from Brasenose in 1702, but in 1706 incorporated at King's College, Cambridge, taking his M.A. degree from that college in the same year. He took Holy Orders in about 1714, but in that year refused to take the oath of allegiance and, when in 1722 he was accused of high treason, fled into France, and adopted the name of Philips, not returning till about 1728. In the interval he collected materials for an English edition of De Thou's *History*, which were used for the seven-volume Latin edition, Lond. 1733.

When he returned to England he commenced his *Life of James Duke of Ormonde* (published in 1735-36), his attention having been directed to Irish affairs from an early age. His *History of England*, to provide funds for which a Society of subscribers had been formed (see no. 10620), was published in 1747-55. He died on April 2, 1754.

His wife was Sarah (née Brett), who subsequently married Nicholas Jernegan.

The sources of the original papers of the Carte collection (which chiefly relates to Irish and English history from the outbreak of the Civil War to the end of the century) may be thus stated:—

1. *Ormonde papers* (Irish history). In about 1728 or 1729 the Earl of Arran delivered to Carte 153 bundles of papers of his grandfather the 1st duke of Ormonde (now 10447-10475) and Carte derived many more from Kilkenny Castle. Some were also received from sir Robert Southwell's descendants. The original Ormonde papers may be said to occupy, wholly or in part, nos. 10447-10500, 10505-10506, 10509-10512, 10514-10518, 10563, 10573, 10575, 10587-10592, 10599-10616, 10618, 10621, 10624, 10639, 10648, 10658-10667, 10677, 10688, 10718, 10720.

* *

2. *Fitzwilliam papers* (Irish history) through Ormonde. These papers of sir William Fitzwilliam were lent by lord Fitzwilliam in about 1684 to the duke of Ormonde: and now occupy 10501-10504, 10576.

3. *Chichester papers* (Irish history, &c.) probably through Huntingdon (see below). They relate to sir Arthur Chichester's government of Ireland, and occupy 10507-10508.

4. *Sandwich papers* (English history, especially of the navy). These are the papers of Edward Montagu, 1st earl of Sandwich, and occupy, wholly or in part, 10519-10521, 10548, 10668, 10719.

5. *Wharton papers* (English history). Chiefly the collections of Philip 4th lord Wharton, occupying, wholly or in part, 10523, 10525-10527, 10548, 10554, 10558, 10562, 10570, 10650-10651, 10673, 10678, 10684.

6. *Huntingdon papers* (Irish history), derived from the earl of Huntingdon, whose great grandfather married the daughter of sir John Davys, attorney general of Ireland, 1603-1616. They occupy, wholly or in part, 10522-10524, 10548, 10562, 10673, 10679.

7. *Nairne papers*, chiefly relating to the exiled Stuarts, and comprising the correspondence of sir David Nairne and the earl of Middleton. These are to be found in 10625-10626, 10653-10657, 10701-10703.

The remaining volumes are originals, transcripts or notes of a miscellaneous kind.

A. In 1753 Carte presented 30 volumes of his MSS. to the Bodleian, described as 'De historia Anglicana . . . omnes sui codices MSS.' and as 'several volumes of MSS. Collections relating to the Life of the D. of Ormond published by himself, and to the English affairs in Ireland from the reign of Q. Eliz. down to the Dukes time.' Unfortunately a 'blew catalogue' which was in existence in 1770 and contained a list of the 1753 and 1754 donations, cannot now be found. The 30 volumes included certainly nos. 10501-04, 10517, 10545, 10557, 10559, 10576 (nine) and probably twenty one out of the following twenty three:— 10528-36, 10538-42, 10550, 10552, 10566-72. Possibly 10547, 10561, 10564, 10574 were part of this first gift. By what right Carte could present the original Ormonde papers to the Bodleian is not clear, but as the earl of Arran, grandson and heir of the 1st duke of Ormonde, was Chancellor of the University at the time, the transference can hardly have taken place without his knowledge and consent.

B. In 1754 Carte presented 26 more volumes lettered A, B, C, &c. These are certainly 10447-10472, but it would seem probable that 10473-10475 accompanied them.

C. In 1757 (April 2) four boxes came from Carte's executors 'containing his Collections of Records and Papers relating to the Hist. of England,' arriving from Caldecot near Abingdon. Carte's Will (20 July 1752) had left his general effects, not specially mentioning his MSS., to his wife. This third donation seems to have consisted of 53 volumes, namely 10476-10500, 10505-10516, 10518, 10544, 10563, 10658-10667, 10674, 10677, 10688.

D. In 1778 the University purchased for £50 mr. Jernegan's life interest in Carte's remaining MSS., and they were transferred to the Bodleian. Carte's widow after her second marriage made a will dated 22 Sept. 1764, by which all the MSS. were bequeathed to the University after her husband's death. She died in 1770, and as early as 30 Apr. 1771 Delegates were appointed by Convocation 'qui de libris manuscriptis egregii viri Thomæ Carte in usum Academiæ deliberent ac determinant,' but no report seems to have been presented to Convocation. The mass of volumes received in this year amounted probably to 169.

Carte himself arranged his papers with care but not completeness, numbering each separate paper but allowing more than one chronological arrangement in a volume. The greater part he bound, affixing signs or letters, see the tables of comparative pressmarks: and the whole collection was uniformly re-bound in about 1860-70. The present numeration (MSS. Carte 1-276) does not indicate any natural order, either of subject or of date of presentation, and had the records of gift been sufficiently precise, an attempt would have been made to establish a historical and natural sequence.

Carte's own list, with the additions, contained in nos. 10722-24 are the primary authority for the contents of the original collection. In 1864 was printed a Report on the greater part of the collection by sir T. D. Hardy and the rev. J. S. Brewer, and in 1871 a still fuller and very valuable one by the rev. Charles William Russell D.D. and John P. Prendergast. A complete Calendar of the papers made by Edw. Edwards in 1877-83 and arranged in a long chronological series, remains in manuscript in the library, with a shorter summary list, of which frequent use has been made in the following catalogue.

ST. AMAND'S ADVERSARIA, A.D. 1755:

(Nos. 10725-10786.)

JAMES ST. AMAND (Jacobus Sanctamandus or Sanctus Amandus) was born in London, 7 April, 1687. He matriculated at Oxford as from Hart hall, 17 March, 1703, but on 5 Sept. 1704 entered, as a Gentleman Commoner, at Lincoln College. He left Oxford without taking a degree, and travelled in Italy both at this time, before he was twenty years old, and on subsequent occasions. He died in London on 5 Sept., 1754.

By his will, dated 9 Aug. 1749, confirmed 6 June 1753, and proved 17 Sept. 1754, he left such of his MSS. and printed books as were not by his directions burnt, to the Bodleian Library, with a reversion of the duplicates to Lincoln College library. The volumes were received in 1755; and the Theocritean collections were used by Thomas Warton for his edition of Theocritus, Oxford, 1770. The greater part of the collection is notes on classical authors, letters from foreign scholars and papers connected with the Netherlands.

A MS. list of the MSS. and their contents (no. 10785) came with the collection, and the whole set (except nos. 10784-86ⁿ) was catalogued by Mr. Coxe in the *Catalogi codd. MSS. Bibl. Bodl. pars prima* (Oxford, 1853), coll. 889-908.

XI.

BALLARD COLLECTION, A. D. 1756.

(Nos. 10787-10858.)

GEORGE BALLARD was born of humble parents at Chipping Campden, in Gloucestershire, in 170 $\frac{1}{2}$. In spite of constitutionally weak health and apprenticeship to a woman's-habit maker at Campden, he developed a great desire for learning, and picked up at an early age a knowledge both of Old English and numismatics. In this way he attracted attention, and lord Chedworth with some friends gave him £60 a year with which to live at Oxford. Accordingly we find that he matriculated at Magdalen college on 15 Dec. 1750, being then 44 years of age and holding a clerkship at the college: he also became a bedell of the University. On 24 June, 1755, he died from the effects of a too sedentary life. The original MS. of his chief printed work, *Memoirs of (learned) Ladies* (Lond. 1752 and 1775), is now no. 31010, having been recently purchased.

From 1726 he was a friend and correspondent of Hearne, but it is not at present known in what way Ballard became possessed of the valuable letters and papers of dr. Arthur Charlett, master of University college (*d.* 1722) and of Thomas Rawlins of Pophill: which together embrace literary correspondence from the Restoration to 1750, with some miscellaneous volumes on subjects of English history.

By his will, dated April 1754, he left to the Bodleian, besides some coins, 72 or 73 MSS., with directions that 49 of them (nos. 10787-10829, 10831-10836) should not be consulted till six years after his death. The MSS. appear to have come to the Library in 1756.

[MS. Ballard 68, though bequeathed by Ballard, was originally MS. Wood 96=no. 8558, and is described under that no.—E. W. B. N.]

There is an old descriptive list of nos. 10787-10830, and a manuscript index to the correspondence was made in about 1870.

JOHN WALKER COLLECTION, A.D. 1756.

(Nos. 10859-10883.)

JOHN WALKER was born in Exeter in Jan. 167 $\frac{1}{4}$, and matriculated at Exeter college, Oxford, 19 Nov. 1691: Fellow of the college 1695-1700: B.A. 1698, M.A. 1699, D.D. 1714. Rector of several Devonshire livings, and (1714-47) Prebendary of Exeter. He died in June, 1747.

The papers in his Collection are the materials on which he based the well-known *Attempt towards . . . an Account of the numbers and sufferings of the Clergy of the Church of England . . . who were sequester'd, harass'd, &c., in the late times of the Grand Rebellion, occasion'd by the ninth chapter . . . of Dr Calamy's Abridgment of the Life of M^r Baxter . . .* (Lond. 1714). They include a large number of original communications from all parts of England, but especially Devonshire, as well as Walker's own notes and extracts: and are of considerable historical importance, but stand in great need of an index, the more so on account of the execrable character of Walker's handwriting.

The papers are stated by Mr. Macray (*Annals of the Bodleian Library*, 2nd ed., p. 230) to have been received from Walker's son William, a druggist in Exeter, in 1754, but the paper on which this statement is based cannot now be found, and the Library records mention the gift under 1756. They were bound in about 1865. No. 13719 is *probably* a Walker MS., but not certainly.

RAWLINSON MSS., A.D. 1756.

(Nos. 10884—16087.)

[For a fuller account of dr. Rawlinson and of his manuscript collections, see Macray's *Annals of the Bodleian*, 2nd ed., pp. 231-51, where there is also a portrait of him.]

RICHARD RAWLINSON, the donor of the large collection of manuscripts dealt with in the following pages (183-556), was born on 3 Jan. 1688 and died on 6 Apr. 1755. His father was sir Thomas Rawlinson, a wine merchant, lord mayor of London in 1706: the son after being educated at St. Paul's school and Eton was matriculated at St. John's college, Oxford, as a gentleman commoner on 9 March 1707, and proceeded B.A. in 1711, M.A. in 1713, receiving the honorary degree of D.C.L. in 1719. The seal attached to the diploma conferring this doctorate was engraved by Rawlinson and formed his favourite book-plate: an older one (in two forms) bearing his arms is also found. Dr. Rawlinson was F.R.S. and F.S.A., and a Bishop among the Nonjurors (1728). In 1719-26 he travelled in Holland, France, Germany and Italy, gradually amassing a foreign, classical and English library, as well as coins; and few book sales between 1715 and 1755 took place in London without contributing both manuscripts and printed books. When his elder brother Thomas, who was also a great book collector, died in 1726, Rawlinson catalogued his MSS., and at the sale in 1734 secured a large proportion even of the Oriental volumes. Many printed books were given to the Bodleian Library during his lifetime, and a few MSS.¹, and in 1750 he founded an Anglo-Saxon Professorship at Oxford. Finally by his will, besides bequests to Hertford and St. John's colleges and to the Ashmolean Museum, he bequeathed to the University all his MSS., medals, coins (except duplicates of coins already in the University collection), matrixes

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and impressions of seals, prints, paintings and copperplates: and all such printed books as were on vellum or silk, or were not duplicates of books already in the Library. His musical MSS. were left to the Music School, and only came into the Librarian's custody in 1885.

This comprehensive bequest overwhelmed the small staff of the Library, and when the bulk came, in 1756, no attempt was made to set them in order or catalogue them. Successive finds have been recovered from various parts of the Library, and the latest referencing, handlisting and cataloguing are of the date 1893.

The separate divisions of the Rawlinson MSS. will now be described in order, but it must be premised that the classification by these divisions is generally of a rough character, so that, for instance, liturgical MSS. will be found outside Rawl. L, and 'Academica' elsewhere than in Rawl. J. There is no old catalogue of the Rawlinson collection, nor any considerable list older than this century: but see the account of Rawl. G.

The oldest catalogues (other than of Rawl. G.) are contained in five folio and one quarto volume, all written in about A. D. 1810. Two of the folio volumes (the 'Old List') describe 1156 volumes (on the shelves at least 1300), which were then in the picture gallery and at first called Rawl. A, but which bear no relation to the present division called Rawl. A. Another folio volume describes MSS. Rawl. B. 1-511, which were then kept in the Gough Room. Two more are a descriptive list of the Smith MSS. (now Rawl. K [Hearne-Smith]), and the five probably form the earliest work of dr. Bulkeley Bandinel, afterwards Bodley's Librarian. The quarto volume was written by dr. Philip Bliss and describes Rawl. Letters 1-88, Rawl. D. 1-407, and Rawl. Poetry 1-147; being finished, including the index, on 5 March 1810.

RAWL. A.

(10884-11373.)

This title which was at one time applied to the MSS. described in the Old List, see above, was finally assigned by dr. Bandinel to a collection of '499' MSS., chiefly connected with English history, among which are many Thurloe and Pepys papers. At some later period the numbers from 74 on were renumbered. These, with Rawl. B and C, have been fully catalogued and indexed by the rev. W. D. Macray in the Quarto Series of Catalogues, part v, fasc. 1-2 (1862-78).

RAWL. B.

(11374-11867.)

This division probably assumed its present form in about 1810, when dr. Bandinel entered the Library. It comprises '520' volumes, largely on the subjects of English history, genealogy and heraldry, and Irish history, and including Rawlinson's parochial collections for Oxfordshire. The whole was fully catalogued and indexed as Rawl. A. above.

RAWL. C.

(11868-12819.)

A miscellaneous collection of '989' volumes, chiefly on the subjects of law, history and theology: arranged by Stephen Reay (sublibrarian, 1828-61), and fully catalogued and indexed as Rawl. A. above.

RAWL. D.

(12820-14234.)

This collection, at first known as 'Rawl. Misc.,' cannot be shortly described, but contains many foreign and many Nonjurors' papers, as well as the greater part of the Rawlinson MSS. found in 1861 in cupboards and under a staircase. They were arranged first by dr. Philip Bliss (who formally left the Library in 1828 but continued to reside in Oxford) to about no. 407, and added to till they reached over 1000. In about 1865 they were rearranged after no. 412 and extended to 1305 in number. In about 1875 they were again arranged, and in 1882 comprised 1369 numbered volumes. There is a doubt about the provenance of certain Sancroft MSS. in Rawl. D (and C). The greater part of the Sancroft MSS. in the Library is in the Tanner collection (see nos. 10302-10446), and some which used to be in Rawl. D are now placed among them, others being still left in Rawlinson. The fact appears to be that while Tanner certainly did not obtain *all* Sancroft's volumes, Rawlinson certainly obtained some, as MS. Rawl. C. 944: but that the two sets cannot now be clearly separated. The full catalogue of nos. 1-860, by mr. Macray, was published in 1893, as fasc. 3 of the 5th Part of the Quarto series of Catalogues, and a catalogue of the remainder of D with an index to the whole division is in preparation.

RAWL. E (SERMONS).

(14235-14493.)

Volumes of sermons, chiefly English, arranged in about 1865, and in 1882 extending to no. 220. The letters assigned to this and following divisions are of course not earlier than A.D. 1865.

RAWL. (F) POETRY.

(14494-14736.)

Arranged at first by dr. Bliss, see above: it then contained 148 volumes, and was added to till in 1882 there were 222.

RAWL. G (CLASSICS).

(14737-14916.)

This was the earliest part of Rawlinson to be catalogued. In 1789 when the Auctarium was ready to receive books, a selection of classical and Biblical MSS. was made from the general mass and at least 187 were placed in position in the new room in case G, and probably known as 'B. N. Rawl.' and later as 'Auct. G.' A descriptive list of these MSS. was made as soon as they were placed in the new room.

RAWL. (H) LETTERS.

(14917-15026.)

Arranged by dr. Philip Bliss before 1817 as 88 volumes: added to until in 1882 there were 99.

RAWL. I.

(15027-15035.)

Formed in 1892.

RAWL. J (ACADEMICA).

(15036-15123.)

These are Rawlinson's collections about Oxford history, and largely biographical facts with a view to his projected continuation of Wood's

Athenæ Oxonienses. There are also volumes connected with Cambridge, Eton and other Schools. The formation of this division is due to Mr. Coxe, but he did not proceed far in arranging it.

RAWL. (K) HEARNE, AND (HEARNE-)SMITH.

(15124-15754.)

Thomas Hearne (*b.* 1678), an indefatigable Oxford antiquary and publisher, the son of the parish clerk of White Waltham in Berkshire, was adopted by Francis Cherry and sent by him in 1695 to St. Edmund hall at Oxford (B.A. 1699, M.A. 1703). In 1701 he became Janitor or Assistant in the Bodleian, and in 1712 under-keeper: but in Jan. 1718, after disputes with the Librarian, he resigned his office, refusing as a Nonjuror to take the Oath then exacted from all who bore public office. His publications of English historical works extended from 1703 till the year of his death (10 June 1735), and are not yet superseded. His diary (1705-35) and correspondence with literary men are of considerable importance.

Dr. Thomas Smith, of Magdalen, well known for his works on the Eastern Church, left his MSS. at his death (11 May 1710) to Hearne, on condition that sixteen (nos. 15608-15623) should go to the Bodleian at Hearne's death.

Hearne left all his MSS. (including the remaining Smith volumes, nos. 15624-15750) to William Bedford, and from Bedford's widow Rawlinson purchased them, probably in 1748, for £105. The Smith MSS. were apparently from the first kept separate, and were catalogued fully in two folio volumes in about 1810, see p. 178.

RAWL. (L) LITURGICAL.

(15755-15858.)

The fate of the library of N. J. Foucault, the French administrator and antiquary (*d.* 1721), is not generally known. It was sold by auction, and while much of it is now at Shirburne Castle, some, both of the MSS. and printed books, fell to Rawlinson, and the liturgical part of the former class is the basis of the present division. They were incorporated, with other liturgical MSS., in about 1860 [?] in a general Miscellaneous Liturgical series, and as such were described in a manuscript catalogue of about that date: but are now kept separate.

RAWL. (M) STATUTES.

(15859-15917.)

This division was probably formed under dr. Bandinel, and largely consists of University and College statutes of Oxford and Cambridge.

RAWL. N (NUMISMATIC).

(15918-15929.)

Formed in 1893.

RAWL. (O) ORIENTAL.

(15930-15987.)

Most of the MSS. are catalogued in the general Oriental Catalogue of Uri and Nicoll, and in Uri's time were kept apart, but in Nicoll's time and until recently they were merged in the Bodley Oriental series of MSS.

RAWL. P.

(15988-16087.)

This division includes the remaining Rawlinson MSS. The first part is a portion of Holman's Essex MSS. The rev. William Holman (*d.* 1730) was an assiduous collector and copier of the records of Essex family and local history: but his large collections were dispersed and a considerable part found their way to the British Museum. Such as reached the Bodleian were catalogued in manuscript and kept separate as MSS. Holman, but were recently placed among the Topographical MSS., subdivision Essex: and more recently still have been referenced as Rawlinson Essex.

Rawl. Q is a shelf-division only, and all its contents are catalogued in Rawl. A-P.

The entire Rawlinson collection, as at present on the shelves, consists of 5205 volumes, and as the MSS. in the Library when the bequest arrived were about 10,000, it was proportionately an immense accession: it is still the largest donation the Library has ever received. In this number are counted neither the Music School MSS. bequeathed by Rawlinson¹, nor the charters and rolls (more than five hundred) which are now mixed with the general series of those documents.

'Samuell Cutting' owned the book in about A. D. 1700: Rawlinson notes 'This MS. . . . was purchased by me out of the library of the Rev^d. M^r. Grindal Wilson . . .'

14402. In English, on paper: made up of several MSS., written in about 1612-13, &c., by T. Lydiat: 8¾ x 6½ in., 207 leaves.

Sermons by Thomas Lydiat of New college, Oxford; a few dated 1612-13, one with a note of the institution, &c., of 'Th. L.' at Alkerton in 1612: the author's name is not otherwise indicated.

14403. In English, on paper: made up of two MSS., written in 1677 and 1688 (?) by A. Clogie: 8¾ x 6½ in., ii + 58 leaves.

Two funeral sermons by Alexander Clogie, one on dr. Timothy Woodroffe, 5 Aug. 1678, dedicated to sir Edw. Harley, the other on the preacher's son John, who died 19 May, 1677, perhaps copied in July 1688.

A note by Rawlinson in 1746 suggests that this MS. was once in the Harleian Library because of the dedication: but that is no sufficient proof.

The original of this was afterwards given me by the R. R. M^r Henry Doughty,' note by Rawlinson, who adds some interesting details about the Count. The sermon is on John xviii. 36.

'The Contemplation on the death of the Duke of Rutland' in 1711, a sermon on Ps. xc. 10 (not Henry Felton's, as a letter from M. Maittaire, 7 May 1743, notes). Foll. 2-14, 24-end are blank.

Now MS. Bawl. E. 171.

14406. In English, on paper: written in about 1703: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 35 leaves.

'A sermon preached at the Bath, Sept. the 26. 1703,' on Rom. xii. 20. At fol. 39 *rev.* is a later Charity sermon in the same hand, on Heb. xiii. 16, preached at St. Paul's, Shadwell, London. The author had a son residing at Lisbon.

Now MS. Bawl. E. 172.

14407-8. In English, on paper: made up of many MSS., written in the first half of the 18th cent. by J. Rice: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 7$ and 9×7 , 235 and 251 leaves.

Sermons by the rev. Jacob Rice, from 1705 chaplain in Newfoundland, and from 1725 Rector of North Cray, Kent: a few are dated 1704-6; St. John's, Newfoundland, 1706; &c. At the beginning of no. 14407 are five documents connected with the license to preach in Newfoundland and the institution to North Cray, one on parchment (foll. 10-11) mutilated.

14409. In English, on paper: written in about 1716-20 by L. Holmes: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 145 leaves.

Sermons by the rev. Lionel Holmes, rector of Somerby co. Linc., whose name occurs on fol. 123^v *rev.*: some are dated as preached at Ashby in 1716-20.

14410-19. In English, on paper: made up of many MSS., written in about 1685-1706 by D. Price: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ and $7\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{7}{8}$ and $8 \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ and $7\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ and $9 \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ and $8 \times 6\frac{3}{4}$ and do. and $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ and do. and $7\frac{1}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in.: vi + 64 and v + 117 and ii + 158 and ii + 186 and ii + 216 and ii + 200 and ii + 218 and ii + 256 and ii + 296 and ii + 261 leaves.

Sermons by Daniel Price, dean of St. Asaph 1696-1706, preached chiefly at Westmill and Aspeden, both in Herts., 1685-1706, and St. Asaph, 1697-1704. In no. 14419 fol. 238^v are two Latin theological Dissertations by him, 21 May, 1685.

14420-24. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of many MSS., written in the 17th and early 18th cent., partly by T. Copies of sermons or notes of sermons by — Porter, chiefly preached in 1694, with a few between 1674 and 1692. 'N. P. 1695' (p. 374) may supply the initial of the author, but Mr. Macray suggests that he may be George Porter, canon of Christ Church, Oxford (*d.* 1697).

" 14444 " " 1706-07.

These were Nos. 8, 13, 27, 32 of a long series of Gray's Inn Chapel sermon notes made by J. Keble.

Now MSS. *Bawl. E. 208-211.*

14445. In English, on paper: made up of several MSS., written in 1702-13, &c., by W. Bramston: $10\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 81 leaves.

Four sermons by dr. William Bramston, prebendary of Worcester, preached 1702-25 in London, Worcester, &c. The places and dates supplied Mr. Macray with a clue to the author, whose name does not occur.

14446. In English and Latin, on paper: written at the close of the 16th cent. by T. Maxfeild: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., 112 leaves.

Sermons, theological pieces and extracts, by 'Thomas Maxfeild' (*d.*

1605) whose name only occurs on the outer cover. At fol. 86^v are some Latin analyses of Joel, St. Paul's Epistles to the Romans and to Titus, and St. John's Epistles.

Owned by 'William Parker' (early 17th cent?).

14447-48. In English, on paper: made up of many MSS., written in about 1697-1727, &c., chiefly by sir R. Cocks: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ and $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 286 and 465 leaves.

Sermons by sir Robert Cocks of Brasenose college, Oxford, vicar of Bladon in Oxfordshire, preached in 1697-1734. Copies of five sermons, dated 1686-91, &c. The only clue to the author is 'Cowley' 1686, and 'Fol' or 'Foll.' 1691.

A chance volume of miscellaneous sermons, of which one (fol. 12) on Hos. xiv. 2, is noted by Mr. Macray as 'in Dr. Pococke's hand,' preached at Christ Church, Oxford, 26 Feb. 167 $\frac{2}{3}$ (?), and elsewhere in 1673-77: another (fol. 55), on 1 Cor. iii. 19, is a Latin University sermon of Charles ii's time, and two (fol. 81), having been preached at Leysdown, 171 $\frac{0}{1}$ -21, and Warden, 1714, are attributed by Mr. Macray to John Cumberland: one (fol. 154) on 1 Pet. ii. 11 is of the date Aug. 1733.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 248.*

14481. In English, on paper: two MSS. (A, B) written at the close of the 17th and beginning of the 18th cent., &c.: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 44 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 1). Three sermons on Ex. xxxiii. 15, Hos. vi. 1, Phil. iv. 6, preached in 1693-1703.

B. 2 (fol. 25). A sermon, imperfect, on 1 Cor. xi. 28 (late 17th cent.?).

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 249.*

14482. In English, on paper: made up of 19 MSS., written in the last quarter of the 17th cent.: $7\frac{3}{8} \times 5\frac{5}{8}$ in., ii + 476 leaves.

Nineteen sermons: one (fol. 392) on Ps. xviii. 50, was preached on 26 July, 1685, but is not by dr. Henry Hesketh, to whom a note on fol. 391^v once ascribed it.

Now MS. Rawl. E. 250.

14483. In English, on paper: written at the close of the 17th cent. by C. Norwood (?): $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., 147 leaves.

Copies of sermons, apparently by Cornelius Norwood, of New college, Oxford, who owned the book in 1693-1698. The first sermon is on Matth. xxii. 37, and on fol. 1 is a clause of a bidding prayer specially mentioning sir John Trenchard, Secretary of State (1692-5). Many of the sermons are corrected, and a few at the end appear to be in a different hand.

Now MS. Rawl. E. 251.

14484. In English, on paper: written in 1670-73: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{3}{8}$ in., 96 leaves.

Five sermons preached at St. Mary's or St. Peter's, Oxford, 1670-73, by a member of Corpus, who was originally at Brasenose, as is shown by the bidding prayer. At fol. 3 is a letter from John Mather to dr. Rawlinson, 10 May, 1744, about the authorship of these sermons. Foll. 75-92 are blank.

Now MS. Rawl. E. 252.

14485. In English, on paper: written in about 1640: $7 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., 163 leaves.

Eight sermons, written in about 1640: the first is on Eph. v. 2 (*beg.* 'These wordes have 2 partes'). Foll. 1-27, 126-162, &c., are blank.

Now MS. Rawl. E. 253.

14486. In English, on paper: made up of several MSS., written in about 1695-1738: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{3}{8}$ in., 281 leaves.

Sixteen sermons, preached in 1695-1738, partly at Highgate (1707-16) and Shepperton (1708-20), in the same hand as part of no. 14466.

Now MS. Rawl. E. 254.

14487. In English, on paper: written in the first quarter of the 17th cent.: $6\frac{3}{8} \times 3\frac{7}{8}$ in., 120 leaves.

Four sermons, written in the early part of the 17th cent., on Phil. ii. 11, Gen. iii. 6, John xx. 19, Heb. x. 27: at the end of the volume are some theological notes. On fol. 118^v *rev.* is 'To Sr Phillip Parcar at Arwarton [Erwarton, co. Suffolk] Hall': on fol. 72^v 'Oct. 21. 1651.'

Now MS. Rawl. E. 255.

14488. In English, on paper : made up of seven MSS., written in about 1675-1725 : $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ in., ii + 100 leaves.

A chance group of seven sermons, or parts of sermons and discourses, the fourth and last written late in the 17th cent., the rest in the first half of the 18th : all in different hands : the first (on Ezech. xviii) perhaps by bp. Tanner.

Part at least belonged to bp. Tanner, see above.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 256.*

14489. In English, on paper : made up of several MSS., written in about 1684-85 : $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 229 leaves.

Twenty-six sermons, in one hand : some are dated 'Lewisham 1684,' others '1685' : Mr. Macray notes that Alexander Davidson was rector of Lewisham 1677-88.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 257.*

14490. In English, on paper : written in the 17th cent., &c. : $5\frac{1}{2} \times 4$ in., 176 leaves.

1 (fol. 6, 98). Notes by a friend and retainer of lord James Ley (3rd earl of Marlborough) about buying and selling horses, paying the servants, &c., 1636-43.

2 (fol. 1, &c.). Theological notes written about 1650.

3 (fol. 26^v, 100). Four sermons, one preached at 'Minal' (Mildenhall), 1697, another dated 1701. Some theological notes in this third hand are at the end of the volume. Foll. 66-97, 120-153, &c., are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 258.*

14491. In English, on paper : written in about 1680-1703 : $5\frac{1}{2} \times 4$ in., 98 leaves.

Abstracts of 25 sermons, one dated 1680, preached chiefly by messrs. Wilson and Wright (four each). At fol. 77 is a sermon in another hand, on Ps. xlvi. 10, preached at Hampstead, 26 May, 1703.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 259.*

14492. In English, on paper : written in about A. D. 1700 by C. Lucy : $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 276 pages.

Copies of two courses of sermons, on 2 Thess. ii. (p. 1), and on Rom. vi. 13-15 (p. 139) : apparently by 'Constance Lucy.' At p. 274 *rev.* are some questions and answers in shorthand.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 260.*

14493. In English, on paper : written in the first half of the 18th cent. : $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ in., 114 leaves.

Three sermons, on Is. lvii. 21, Heb. ii. 16, Acts iii. 15 : the first *beg.* 'In the first verses' : foll. 1-22, 91-end are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. E. 261.*

RAWLINSON F (POETRY).

14494. In English, on paper: written in about 1700: 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 289 leaves.

'Godfrey of Bulloigne or Hierusalem rescued, written in Italian by Torquato Tasso, and translated into English (with a preface concerning the Croisade) by Sr G. T.,' probably sir Gilbert Talbot, see no. 14623. The text is in many places altered by paper pasted over the original words bearing improved readings, but even in the first hand the diction in this volume is a later recension of what is found in no. 14497. Both volumes have been ascribed to 'sir' George Turberville, the Elizabethan author, but the whole style is post-Restoration. The poem *beg.* 'I sing of pious armes, & of a man | Who holy Sepulcher from bondage free'd.'

14495. In English, on paper: written about 1670: 16 × 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 47 leaves.

'Henry the Fift,' a drama in rhyme, several times printed: by Roger Boyle earl of Orrery, whose name is not mentioned in the volume. A list of the actors is given on fol. 1^v, including Thomas 'Batterton.' A sealing wax impression from a gem is on fol. 1. See no. 14672.

Owned by 'Katherine Brudenell," and in 1706 by 'Joseph Allen.'

Now MS. *Bawl. poet. 2.*

14496. In English, on paper: written early in the 18th cent. by T. Moore: 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 11 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 90 leaves.

Literary pieces by Thomas Moore:—

1 (fol. 1). 'The Arcadian lovers, or Metamorphosis of Princes,' a prose drama: *beg.* 'Strephon. O, my Claius, heither are we come,' the original draft with corrections, see fol. 46^v.

2 (fol. 42). 'Mirata, a pastorall': dedicated by the author T[homas] M[oores] to his kinswoman Honora Lee.

3 (fol. 47^{av}). 'The answers to the Epistles [Heroïdes] of Ovid, whereof three are translated out of the Epistles of Sabinus, the rest composed by Tho: Moore gent.': some leaves badly mutilated.

14497. In English, on paper: written late in the 17th cent.: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 269 leaves.

'A history of the Holy Warr, or a Translation of Torquato Tasso Englished by Sr G. T.' (Gilbert Talbot?): with a preface. See no. 14494.

Owned by 'Elizabeth Brenand' ('E. B.') (18th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 4.

14498. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1670: 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 108 pages.

'The tragædie of Mustapha,' by Roger Boyle earl of Orrery, whose name is not mentioned: several times printed.

Owned by 'Cæcillya Husey,' perhaps afterwards 'Cicillia Freke': also by 'W. Shaw.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 5.

14499. In Latin, on paper: written in 1659 at Breda: 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 16 leaves.

'Cæcilia Bredana, sive ad . . . regem Carolum II Elegia & alia . . . Labore MU^sICI greg^sIs breDanI,' 1659, containing besides the elegy, complimentary poems to the king by Breda citizens, with allegorical drawings, 'Symbolum et emblema regium ['Tandem revirescat'] musice expressum 3. vocibus, cum Basso continuo,' an epigram and five chronograms (1659).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 6.

14500. In French, on paper: written in or soon after 1660: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., v + 42 leaves: binding, red leather with gold tooling.

'Tragi-Comedie sur les derniers troubles d'Angleterre, et l'heureux retour de sa Maiesté de la Grande Bretagne en ses royaumes, par le sieur Euvertre Jollyvet d'Orleans viuant Advocat en Parlement,' in rhyme: *beg.* 'Je vous l'ay dit souvent': with a key to the characters.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 7.

14501. In English, on paper: written in about 1670-80: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 35 leaves.

Elkanah Settle's Pastor Fido of Guarini, the title and Epistle dedicatory being torn out: Settle's translation was based on sir Rich. Fanshaw's.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 8.

14502. In English and Latin, on paper: two MSS. (A, B) both written about 1630-40 (?): 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., iii + 85 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 1). 'The Inconstant Ladie, acted at Blackfriars,' a play,

beg. 'Treb. Who's that, Antonio? Well mett.' Probably by Arthur Wilson, in whose name a play with this title was entered at Stationer's Hall in 1653, which was never printed, and was supposed to be destroyed after being in Warburton's possession: see no. 14621. On fol. 45^{bv} is the title and list of characters of another play by Wilson, 'The Corporall,' entered at Stationer's Hall in 1646, but also not printed.

B. 2 (fol. 46). 'Comædia: Senilis Amor, 1635': *beg.* 'Castruchio. Levia calamorum vulnera quis asserit sapiens?' bound in perturbed order.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 9.

14503. In English, on parchment: written in about the middle of the 15th cent. in England: 13 $\frac{3}{8}$ x 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., iv + 69 leaves.

Occeleve's *De regimine principum*, with the introductory dialogue: no title in the MS., but colophon 'Explicit Hoccleue.' The book is based on the pseudo-Aristotelian *Secretum Secretorum*, Aegidius de Columna's *De Regimine Principum*, and Jacobus de Cessolis' *Tractatus de Scacchis*: see no. 14660.

'Ceste liure est asture a John Lyle' (about A. D. 1500): 'By me Thomas Lyst' (Lysl?), 'Arth: Cotton' with motto (16th cent.): 'Nich. Lysle,' 'John Webb,' 'E. Southerne,' 'Edward Lenton . . .' (fol. 2), 'Anne Weston' (fol. 14), 'Henrici Spelman lib.' (17th cent.). Owned by lord Somers and sir Joseph Jekyll.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 10.

14504. In English, on paper: written in the second quarter of the 18th cent., &c., by Robert Samber, &c.: 13 $\frac{3}{8}$ x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., v + 104 leaves.

Miscellanies in prose and verse by Robert Samber, chiefly drafts with corrections: among which are poems to lord Harcourt on his marriage, 1735 (fol. 1), to the marquis of Carmarthen on his marriage, 1719 (fol. 18), on the death of the duchess of Chandos, 1735 (fol. 20), to the duke of Montagu, 1730, &c. (foll. 27, 29), Musæus's *Hero and Leander* in English prose and verse (fol. 35), and the *Paradox*, three poems from the Italian of Bernardo Morando (fol. 49). At fol. 56 are 'Monita secreta patrum Societatis' (Jesu?), and at fol. 74 some Masonic formulæ. A few religious papers by Jacobus Saintbarb, in Latin, occur at fol. 68 (17th cent.)

14505. In English, on paper: written in 1692-93: 13 x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 107 leaves.

1 (fol. 3). 'Davideis, a sacred poem . . . in four books, by mr. Abr. Cowley . . . 1692.'

2 (fol. 60). 'Davids Lamentation for the death of Saul & Jonathan paraphras'd, an ode, by mr. John Oldham . . . 1692.'

3 (fol. 68). 'Absalom and Achitophel, a poem, by mr. John Dryden
... 1693.'

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 12.**

14506. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1700: $12\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., xi + 385 pages.

Robert of Gloucester's Chronicle of England, in verse: a note by W. Aldis Wright says that this MS. appears to be a copy from the Cambridge University Library MS. Ee. IV. 32 (15th cent.), foll. 52-199: containing about 10,610 lines. No title or author is given.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 13.**

14507. In English, on paper: written in the second half of the 15th cent.: $12\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ in., 95 leaves.

Part of the English form of the Romance of Partonope of Blois, comprising, (foll. 8-92), pp. 23-33^a, 33^b-95, 104-113, 116-193 of a larger MS.: imperfect at beginning and end, and at intervals; see Buckley's *Partonope of Blois* (1862) Introduction and Appendix. At fol. 3 are some notes by dr. Bliss.

'William Chaner' (or Chancellor) (fol. 8), 'John Holme' (fol. 64), both perhaps 16th cent.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 14.**

14508. In English, on paper: written perhaps in 1731: $12\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ in., 56 leaves.

'Avarice outwitted, or the plotting fathers, a Comedy': at top of fol. 1 'March 18, 1731': *beg.* 'Sir Joseph. It behoves every man.'

On cover 'Cockinton.'

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 15.**

14509. In English, on paper: written in about 1670 (?): $12\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ in., viii + 168 pages.

'Poems, Songs, and a Pastorall [and a play] by the rt. hon^{ble} the lady Jane Cavendish and lady Elizabeth Brackley,' copies, made later, probably for the duke of Newcastle, whose initials 'W. N.' are on the binding. The play is 'The Concealed Fansyes.' In the pastoral the two authors' parts are indicated by initials, not elsewhere. The period of the original poems must be later than 1641 but before 1649.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 16.**

14510. In English, on paper: written in 1702 by Addison: $13\frac{1}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ in., 13 leaves.

Joseph Addison's Letter from Italy to the Rt. Hon. Charles lord Halifax, dated 19 Feb. 1703, printed in 1703, the author's autograph, on 6 leaves.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 17.**

14511. In English, on paper: written perhaps in the last quarter of the 17th cent.: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{3}{4}$ in., xviii + 80 pages.

'The Lover's Stratagem, or Virtue rewarded,' a play founded on a

tale by Boccaccio: prol. *beg.* 'Long has the husband,' play *beg.* '1st Rabble. Wel neighbours this seignior Gilberto': apparently written and corrected by the author.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet. 18.*

14512. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of many MSS. written chiefly in the second half of the 17th cent.: 12 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 8 in., 208 leaves.

Miscellaneous English and Latin pieces, chiefly poetical, many political, among which are:—*a.* (fol. 26) 'Advice to the painter on the . . . execution of the late duke of Monmouth,' a poem, *beg.* 'Since by just flames': *b.* (fol. 32) 'On the death of . . . William Dugard . . .,' 1662, by his nephew Samuel Dugard, a poem, *beg.* 'Amidst the blinder rage': *c.* (fol. 38) 'The Oxford Alderman's speech to the duke of Monmouth . . . 1680,' in verse, *beg.* 'Stout Hanibal': *d.* (foll. 31, 36) Cambridge poems: *e.* (fol. 79) 'To Madam Stewart . . .,' by Edm. A tragedy, with no title. The scene is laid at Tunis, the chief characters are Asembeg, viceroy of Tunis, and Mustapha, pasha of Aleppo: *beg.* 'Iseppo. The shop, sir, is furnishd': apparently the author's autograph with corrections.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet. 20.*

14514. In Latin, on paper: written in A. D. 1616: 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 8 in., xiv + 43 leaves.

'Fucus siue Histriomastix,' a Latin academical comedy, dated at end 1616: Prol. *beg.* 'Populi primus motor,' play *beg.* 'Cornelius. Deus bone, quam mihi hic placent.'

Owned by M. Maittaire.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet. 21.*

14515-16. In English, on paper: written in the first half of the 18th cent.: 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ and 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., 90 and 88 leaves.

Two copies of 'Eumenes,' a tragedy: *beg.* 'Eumenes. Right worthy

leaders': the first copy adds a Prologue, and is in a slightly more corrected state, but both seem to be in the same hand, presumably the author's.

No. 14516 was owned in 1750 by Thomas Jones (?).

Now MSS. *Rawl. poet.* 22^a, 22^b.

14517. In English, on paper: written probably in and soon after 1635: 12½ × 8½ in., 310 pages: binding, brown leather stamped with the royal arms, thistles and fleurs-de-lys.

A collection of words of 'the full Anthems' (fol. 11) and 'the single Anthems' used in one of the royal chapels in and after 1635. At the end is a list of 'The King's Chaplains in ordinarie attendance, 1635,' with later corrections. A letter from J. Bowack pasted on the front cover, presenting the book to John earl of Leicester (?), 29 Apr. 1732, suggests that it is the volume used by Charles I himself. Pp. 44-100, 237-290, &c., are blank.

See above: Rawlinson purchased the MS. 15 Jan. 1748 at an auction in St. Paul's Churchyard, London.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 23.

14518. In English, on paper: written in about 1620-30 (?): 13½ × 8 in., iv + 227 pages.

'The Psalmes of Dauid translated into diuers . . . kindes of verse . . . begun by . . . S^r P: Sidney K^t, & finished by the . . . Countesse of Pembroke, his sister, & by her direction & appointment.' Pss. i—xlili are known from other MSS. to be all that sir P. Sidney wrote himself: see next MS.

Owned by 'W. Barkwith' (18th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 24.

14519. In English, on paper: written in 169½, &c., by S. Woodford: 11½ × 8½ in., vii + 157 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). Sir Philip Sidney's and the countess of Pembroke's translation of the Psalms, i—lxxxvii, cii—cxxxii, copied out from an original MS., corrections and all, by Samuel Woodford in 169½. The following notes by Woodford are on foll. ii, 131^v: 'The Originall Copy is by mee. Given me by my Brother M^r John Woodford who bought it among other broken books to putt up Coffee powder, as I remember.' 'But from this place [heading of Ps. cxxxii] to the end my Copy is defective, the leaues being torn off. Ita testor Sam: Woodforde who for S^r Philip Sidnys sake, & to preserue such a remaine of him undertook this tiresome task of transcribing, 169½.' See Grosart's ed. of Sidney, vol. 3: and preceding MS.

2 (fol. 146). 'An ode to the memory of . . . Iohn . . . earl of Rochester [*d.* 1680]. By S. W[oodford],' with signatures of T. W[oodford] and 'Mary Woodforde.'

3 (fol. 124). Epitaph by S. Woodford on a daughter M., who died young in 1683, quoting a Latin votive tablet.

'Totus mundus in maligno positus,' a poem, *beg.* 'Complaine we may, much is a mis,' printed in lord Surrey's *Songs and sonnets*, 1587, among those of 'uncertain authors': on fol. 3 is 'Sir John Cheek' followed by a prose quotation and 'Gabriel Harvey': dr. Bliss considered the former to be the author of the poem and the latter the transcriber.

14579. In English, &c., on paper: written late in the 16th cent.: 8 × 5½ in., vii + 130 leaves.

Poems written perhaps at Wickham in Hampshire: the first is 'a poem of blindness vpon Bartholomew Price, esq.' J.P., *beg.* 'Thrice happy pilgrim': the next 'On the departure of the lady Victoria Vuedall from Wickham, 167¾,' *beg.* 'As the blest Indians': many are amorous.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 87.**

A few poems, chiefly religious, the first is 'A view of Paradiçe . . .' *beg.* 'Descend some angels of your warbling trong': foll. 7—end are blank.

'A boocke intituled Ne l'un ne l'autre, wherin is discovered the Vnfortunate Loue of an vnfortunat Englishe gentleman,' a prose story with poems interwoven. The name of the gentleman is given as Swerdna (Andrews), and on fol. 3^v are the arms and motto of Andrews of Suffolk, in colours: many leaves have ornamental borders: the first poem, *beg.* 'Desyer desyers you graunt to geue me my requeste': a poem precedes on fol. 1, *beg.* 'Be she far a fairer lasse.'

A prose comedy, *beg.* 'Antonio, All this is most true': the chief characters are Octavio and Alessandra, daughter of a Turk.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 93.

14587. In English, on paper : written in about A.D. 1680-90 by J. Chatwin : $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., vi + 368 pages.

'Poeticall translations of some Psalmes, and the Song of Solomon, with other divine poems by that noble . . . soule now sainted in heaven . . . Henry earle of Cumberland . . .,' who died in 1643. See Wood's *Ath. Oxon.* ed. Bliss, iii. 82.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 95.**

14589. In English and Latin, on paper: written in 1639 by R. Codrington: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., iii + 56 leaves.

Poems by Robert Codrington on the death of Henry O'Brien, 5th earl of Thomond, in 1639, dedicated to his widow, entitled 'An elegie . . .' (fol. 1), 'The second . . .' (fol. 22), 'Epicidium,' in Latin. The three titles are in silver letters on a dark ground, and on foll. iii^v, 21^v, 39^v are the arms, &c., of the earl in colours.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 96.**

14590. In English, on paper: written in the first half of the 17th cent. partly by R. Daniell: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 86 leaves.

i (fol. 1). 372 Meditations in verse, with an introductory poem: *beg.*

'Med: i. God the

2 (fol. 77). A few short religious poems, one about sir George Whitmore, kt. by Richard Daniell, in a hand of about 1640. Possibly the whole volume is by Daniell, written at two different times. On the last cover is a poem 'The Midsummer Wishe': *beg.* 'Waft me, some soft and cooling breeze,' (late 17th cent.?).

Owned by 'Robert Sandys,' later in the 17th cent.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 97.**

14591. In English, on paper: written in the first quarter of the 17th cent.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 48 leaves.

A poem on the fall of King Edward ii, in 440 7-line stanzas, the end (one leaf) being lost: *beg.* 'I sing thy sad disaster (fatall king.' A fragment of a similar poem is in no. 14662, fol. 79.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 98.**

14592. In English, on paper: written in 1698 or 1699 by C. Gildon: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{4}$ in., 10 leaves.

'A letter to Mr. Congreve occasioned by the death of the countess dowager of Manchester, &c.' a poem: *beg.* 'How long, ye Bards, shall your great Patron mourn': the dedication to lord justice Charles Montague is signed by the writer Charles Gildon.

Owned by 'P. Cecill.'

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 99.**

14593. In English, on paper: written in the first half of the 17th cent.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., 45 leaves.

Religious poems in the author's handwriting: the first *beg.* 'For God I know did man create.'

Owned apparently by 'John Huldroyd,' 'W. Brickley (?),' 1648-9, and 'John Batty' (about 1650): see foll. 45^v, 45, 15.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 100.

14594. In English, on paper: written in or soon after 1701 by W. T.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6$ in., i + 120 leaves.

'Original poems on several subjects,' sacred and moral: the first *beg.* 'Vanitie. Some creatures I have doated on': the author in one place signs his initials 'W. T.' in answer to a nun of Pontoise, 1695 (fol. 68, cf. 66): he had written 'A Vision of Hell' (fol. 73^v): some poems are dated 1695-1701: some engravings are pasted in the book.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 101.

14595. In English, on paper: written in the first half of the 18th cent.: $8 \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 9 leaves.

'Rules for the conduct of humane life . . .,' in verse: *beg.* 'In nothing base or mean dare to confide': 'Sam. Green' mentioned on fol. 8^v.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 102.

14596. In English, on paper: written in the 3rd quarter of the 17th cent.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 46 leaves.

A translation into English verse of L. Annaeus Seneca's treatises *De vita beata* and *De otio aut secessu sapientis*: *begg.* 'All (brother Gallio) blessednesse would find,' 'It is agreed by all, that vice is taught.'

'James Elyott his book 1677 Jan. the 25th.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 103.

14597. In English, on paper: written in the 17th cent. by W. A. and W. Ryv.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., x + 66 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). 'Horace in an English habit,' the Odes and Epodes translated into English verse by W. A.: *beg.* 'O my Maecenas of a princely race.'

2 (foll. 62-3). Anagrams and poems by 'Guil. de Riv.,' partly on Cambridge (?) men, e. g. on the death of J. Seddon 'coll. Mag.,' and of Mr. Flood 'coll. Regis.'

'Thomas Drax' (fol. 63): 'Pa. Bowker' (fol. 21): other names are scribbled in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 104.

14598. In English, on paper: written in about 1640 by Sir G. Buc.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 34 leaves.

'*Δαφνις*, or the polyanthine ghirland, by George. Buc. gent.,' with a dedication to Sir John Burroughs garter king of arms, and a long preface. The piece is 'An Eclog between Damoetas . . . and Silenus,' in verse,

and chiefly about the Plantagenet line: *beg.* 'Of all the trees.' This is sir George Buc^r Buck's *Δαφνις πολυστεφανος* printed at Lond. in 1605: but here altered to suit king Charles's accession. The date of Buc's death given in the *Dict. of Nat. Biogr.*, 1623, cannot be correct, since sir J. Burroughs was not Garter king of arms till 1633.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 105.

14599. In English, on paper: written in 1717: 8½ × 6½ in., i + 37 leaves.

'The luckey mistake, or The way to win a Quaker, a comedy, . . . Jn^o Markland 1717.' The volume reversed seems to contain an (imperfect) other form of the same play. At fol. i is a description of a pageant of Whittington and his Cat.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 106.

14600. In English, on paper: written late in the 17th cent.: 8½ × 6½ in., vi + 84 pages.

A translation in prose (except prologue and epilogue in verse) of Molière's *George Dandin*. Rawlinson notes that it differs greatly from any other translation he knew: *beg.* 'Alass! What a perillous thing it is to have a Gentlewoman for ones wife.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 107.

14601. In English, &c., on paper: written in about A.D. 1570: 8½ × 6½ in., i + 89 leaves.

A common-place book of poems, songs &c. of considerable interest, of which a full description is printed in the *British Bibliographer* ii (1812) p. 609, by dr. Philip Bliss: among the contents are:—*a.* (fol. 10) The figures of 15 dances: *beg.* 'The Pavyan. ij singles and a duple forward // ij singles syde. Reprynce backe': *b.* (fol. 24) 'The cotype of an oration made & pronounced by mr. Pownd . . . with a maske at the marriage of the Earle of Sussex syster to mr. Myldmaye off Lincolnes Inne. 1566,' in verse, *beg.* 'Lysten ye lords & ladyes all,' at which qu. Elizabeth was present: *d.* (fol. 44^v) 'Verses made by the Quenes maiestie,' *beg.* 'The dowbt off future foes': *e.* (fol. 45) an English glossary, A—Ba only, *beg.* 'Abandon, forsake. Abalienate. Abase, humble.' The flyleaves are from a 14th cent. missal.

Owned by 'Eliner Gunter' sister of Edw. Gunter of Lincoln's Inn (16th cent.), and 'William Oldisworth' (17th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 108.

14602. In English and Latin, on paper: written early in the 18th cent.: 8½ × 6½ in., ii + 30 leaves.

'Poems on several occasions by several hands,' 'Vol. 2':—*a.* (fol. 2)

Horace's *Ars Poetica*, tr. by the earl of Roscommon : *b.* (fol. 14) 'Hoglandiæ discriptio,' about Hampshire, anonymous, by Tho. Richards, in Latin : *c.* (fol. 22) 'The choice of the pleasures of a country life by [the rev. John] Pomfret' : *d.* (fol. 27) 'A tale,' *beg.* 'That gods sometimes incognito.'

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 109.

14603. In English, on paper: written in 1646 by E. Mamsly: 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., vi + 122 pages.

'A paraphrase upon the Song of Songs or the Song of Solomon, sett in 4 partes,' in verse, with a commentary : *beg.* 'Sponsa. Kisse mee sweete with the kisses': dedicated to Bernard Hide by the author 'E. Mamsly': this is the presentation copy to mr. Hide.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 110.

14604. In English, on paper: written (and printed) late in the 17th cent.: 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., viii + 66 pages.

1 (p. iii). *The Hind and the Panther transvers'd* (chiefly by Matthew Prior), Lond. 1687, 4^o (*printed*).

2 (p. 29^s). 'Lælius of Friendship,' a poem : *beg.* 'Fan. Since time & your good company invite,' apparently a short paraphrase, in verse, of Cicero's *De Amicitia*.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 111.

14605. In English and Latin, on paper: written in about 1582-92 in more than one hand: 8 × 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in.,

1 (fol. 99^v *rev.*-77^v *rev.*) A Latin treatise on procedure in ecclesiastical courts, in 104 sections, preceded by a table of contents : *beg.* 'i. De citatione. In citatione continenda sunt, nomen iudicis, curiæ.'

2 (fol. 1-7). The latter part of a Latin Epitome of some of the minor physical treatises of Aristotle (pp. 161-173 of another book).

3 (fol. 8, 12^b-17). Sixteen Forms of legal documents, in Latin and English (pp. 175-195 of another book).

The above were written in about 1582 : the succeeding pieces were added subsequently :—

'Miscellanea: or, A collection of Letters, Poems and Translations, upon several subjects; by John Morrice, A: B: Scholar of Lincoln-College, Oxon. . . . 1707,' with additions in 1721 and 1727. Some of the papers are about his college and university life: dedicated to lady Mary Allstone and prepared for the press.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 114.

14608. In English, on paper: written at the close of the 17th cent. in two hands: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ in., ii + 81 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). The Hind and the Panther, an anonymous poem, by John Dryden, apparently copied from the first printed edition (1687).

2 (fol. 55). 'Megalesia sacra, a sacred poem upon the Assumption of the Great Mother of God, the B.V.M.,' written originally in Latin by mr. Reeves, translated into English by J. Cumberlege: *beg.* 'When first to Solyma.' Some other piece or pieces were at one time in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 115.

14609. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of 4 MSS. (A-D), written in the 17th and 18th centt.: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ in., iii + 187 leaves.

A. (written in or soon after 1612) 1 (fol. 1). 'Cestria lugens, or epitaphs elegiacal sacred to . . . her [i. e. Chester's] deceased Earle, the late . . . Henry Prince of Wales . . . written by G. B. . . .', mostly in English, a few Latin.

B. (written in 1640-55 by W. Elyott) 2 (fol. 16^d). A common-place book of poems and letters collected by William Elyott, and dated 1640-5 $\frac{1}{4}$: among the names of authors mentioned are sir R. Aston, Tho. May, Edw. Leigh, Will. Hodnett: a Latin *Tractatus de structura Syllogismi* begins on fol. 80^v *rev.*: *beg.* 'Logica si non sit scientia': some of Elyott's own compositions occur.

C. (written in about 1710-22 by T. Axton) 3 (fol. 86^o). 'Poemata per Thomam Axton, M.A., S.C.T. Cantab. Volumen tertium,' English poems: followed by transcribed poems, some by Will. Pavey

of Trin. coll. Oxford: one a hymn by Addison, *beg.* 'When all thy mercies.'

D. (written in the first quarter of the 18th cent.) 4 (fol. 120^v). Religious poems: the first, on the Temptation, *beg.* 'How durst this dogg.'

No. 289 in the Thomas Rawlinson sale, Mar. 1734.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 116.

14610. In English and Latin, on paper: written in the 17th cent. partly by C. Wasse: 8 x 6 in., 279 leaves.

Miscellaneous poems, epigrams, anagrams, &c., many extracts, partly written or collected by Christopher Wasse, in the 17th cent.: among them are:—*a.* (fol. 267^v *rev.*, 257 *rev.*) metrical versions of some Psalms: *b.* (fol. 239^v *rev.*) 'Aphorismes diuine and morall, collected as they were . . . spoken by . . . kinge James': *c.* (foll. 248 *rev.*, 225^v *rev.* &c.) poems by dr. Donne: *d.* (foll. 192 *rev.*) 'Convivium philosophicum . . . autore doctore Rodolpho Colfabio Aeneo-nasensj,' a Latin poem. At fol 279^v *rev.* is an inventory of some of Wasse's books. Foll. 42-140, &c., are nearly blank.

Owned by Christopher Wasse (*d.* 1690), lord Somers and sir Joseph Jekyll.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 117.

14611. In English, on paper: written perhaps in the 3rd quarter of the 15th cent.: 8½ x 5½ in., x + 130 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). John Capgrave's metrical Life of st. Katherine, with prologue: no title: at end 'Per Capgrauē': on fol. x is an autograph preface 'Sir H. Spelman to the Reader,' printed with the Prologue in the Rolls series ed. of Capgrave's Chronicle, p. 335. One leaf is wanting after fol. 60.

2 (foll. 113^v, 116, 118^v). Three English poems, *a. beg.* 'Man, of thi myschefe thou the amende,' against 'spowsebreche': *b. beg.* 'Ihesu that heuyn & erthe began,' an 'aventure' of a man of Mythmayn: *c. beg.* 'Here may euery man lerne bothe more & lesse,' on the benefit of hearing mass. Foll. i-ix, 119-end are flyleaves.

'Iste libellus constat Willelmo Gybbe capellano' (fol. 113: 15th cent.):

'John Kempe' (16th cent.): probably Sir Henry Spelman owned it.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 118.

14612. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1700: 8½ x 6½ in., xii + 128 pages.

'The Siege of Croja, a tragedy.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 119.

14613. In English, on paper: made up of 4 MSS. (A-D) written in the 17th cent.: 8½ x 6½ in., iii + 152 leaves.

A. (written early in the 17th cent.) 1 (fol. 1). Miscellaneous poems, perhaps by H. S. (see foll. 24^v, 25^v), among which are poems on the

death of John Mynne (fol. 28), and on Coryate's *Crudities* (1611 : fol. 32^v).

B. (written early in the 17th cent.) 2 (fol. 37). A long poem, designedly nameless, of an unfortunate lover, in 5-line stanzas: prologue *beg.* 'The stately cedar trees,' text *beg.* 'There was a tyme when erst as shepherds liue.'

C. (written in the second half of the 17th cent.) 3 (fol. 71). 'The second booke of Publius Ouidius Naso concerning Transformations,' *Metamorphoses*, bk. 2, in English verse: *beg.* 'The pallace of the sunn most lofty was.'

D. (written in the second half of the 17th cent.) 4 (fol. 92). 'Sal-macis and Hermaphroditus,' with introductory poems, by Francis Beaumont: all is a late copy except fol. 122 (the last) which is dated 1634.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 120.

14614. In English, on paper: made up of 2 MSS. (A, B) written late in the 16th cent.: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 7 in., ii + 83 leaves.

Alchemical treatises:—

A. (written by G. Lideatt) 1 (fol. 2). 'The booke of Barnard earle of Treuers [Bernard of Treviso] of Alchamye,' dated 1453, in 4 parts, in prose: *beg.* after prologue and after a lost leaf, 'The first inventors of this noble scyence': at end 'Coppied out by George Lideatt mar-chauttailor of London.'

B. 2 (fol. 35). 'The Vizion of sir George Ripley chanoun,' a poem.

3 (fol. 35). 'Here begeneth the Compounde of Alchamye, made by a chanon of Bridlington . . .,' i. e. sir George Ripley, a poem: with the Prologue and Recapitulation, but not the Epistle to Edward iv.

4 (fol. 68^v). 'The power of diuers things . . .,' a poem: *beg.* 'After all this I will trie,' with a diagram which includes another poem.

5 (fol. 71). 'The Visione': *beg.* 'Not full aslepe nor full awakinge.'

6 (fol. 76^v). 'A letter written by George Riplye': *beg.* 'Recipe lymall of which thou wilt.'

7 (fol. 78). 'Experience and Philosophy,' a poem: *beg.* 'Haue ye not harde, ye princes.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 121.

14615. In English, on paper: written perhaps late in the 17th cent.: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., vii + 80 leaves.

'Perkin Warbeck, an historical play,' anonymous, by John Ford: *beg.* 'King. Still to be haunted': printed in 1634 and 1714: this is a copy of the 1634 ed., with excisions and corrections, to adapt the play to later requirements.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 122.

14616. In English, &c., on paper: written in 1675-82 by J. Oldham: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 310 pages.

'Poems written on several occasions,' with Satires, a few letters, &c., some in Latin: autographs by John Oldham the poet, dated from 1675 to 1682. A letter to him from John Baker, about the King's entertainment at Cambridge, 17 Oct. 1671, is at p. 174' *rev.*

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 123.

14617. In English, on paper: written in about 1710-20 by W. Diaper and J. Jones: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{3}{4}$ in., v + 214 leaves.

'Oppian's Halieuticks, or Of fishes and fishing . . . done into English verse . . .': bks. 1-2 only with notes and a draft of part of the preface. The translation is written by William Diaper, much of the rest apparently by John Jones, both of Balliol college, Oxford. The complete translation (5 books) was published at Oxford in 1722. A letter to Diaper from C. Shelbery, 16 May 1716, is at fol. 206.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 124.

14618. In English, on paper: written shortly before 1591, partly by sir J. Harington: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{3}{4}$ in., vi + 512 pages: binding, brown leather with gilt tooling.

The English translation of Ariosto's Orlando Furioso, by sir James Harington, books 1-24, with inserted engravings from both English and Italian printed editions, some coloured. The corrections, as in st. 30 of bk. 1, seem to be by the author and anterior to the first edition (1591).

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 125.

14619. In English, on paper: written in the second half of the 17th cent.: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., 84 leaves.

'The Martial Queen, a tragedy': in rhyming verse, *beg.* 'Martesia. Now is the time I must by arms alone': foll. 2-25, 67-end are blank.

Owned by John Murray.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 126.

14620. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of 5 MSS. (A-E), written in the 17th and 18th cent.: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 78 leaves.

A. (written in about 1671) 1 (fol. 4). Miscellaneous poems, partly religious: two are on the deaths of Francis Usher and John Christian, senior fellows of Trin. coll. Dublin (4 Sept. and Nov. 1671): preceded by two Latin addresses, apparently to archbp. Usher.

B. (written late in the 17th cent.) 2 (fol. 25). 'Batrachomyomachia, ref. . . the Battail of the Frogs and the Mice,' a burlesque imitation, *beg.* 'Since 'tis began, assit me to go on.'

C. (written in or soon after 1687) 3 (fol. 40). 'A poem panegyricall

on . . . the duke of Albemarle, with Remarks on his voyage to Jamaica, 1687': *beg.* 'Happy those islands,' with a dedication.

D. (written in or soon after 1714) 4. (fol. 50). 'Sacred to the . . . memory of . . . queen Anne . . .,' a poem, *beg.* 'Clemena. What mean these horrid visions of the night.'

E. (written in about 1670-75) 5 (fol. 56). 'Panegyris,' a Latin poem on Roger earl of Orrery: *beg.* 'Indue Dædaleas, securas indue pennas': wanting a leaf at end.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 127.

14621. In English, on paper: written early in the 18th cent.: $9\frac{3}{4} \times 7\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 63 leaves.

'The Inconstant Lady, a tragi-comedy': probably by Arthur Wilson, see no. 14502. This is a later and careless copy, partly modernized in orthography.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 128.

14622. In English, on paper: written in about 1714 by A. Hammond: $9\frac{3}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 30 leaves.

Miscellaneous poems by Anthony Hammond, written in about '1714': but the first $5\frac{1}{2}$ leaves seem to be by James Hammond: all are of a very poor kind.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 129.

14623. In English, on paper: written in about A.D. 1700: $10 \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 94 leaves.

'Fillis of Sciros, a pastoral written in Italian by Count Guidubaldo de' Bonarelli, and translated into English by sir G. T.,' i. e. sir Gilbert Talbot, who signs the dedication to Charles ii written in 1657: *beg.* 'The dawning light break's forth: I heare from far.' See no. 14494.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 130.

14624-29. In English, on paper: written in about 1710-29 by R. Samber: $9\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ and $9\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ and $8\frac{7}{8} \times 7$ and $8\frac{3}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{4}$ and $10\frac{3}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{4}$ and $10 \times 7\frac{3}{8}$ in., ii + 308 and iii + 211 and i + 198 and i + 216 and ix + 198 and i + 56 leaves.

Miscellaneous works of Robert Samber, chiefly narrative and dramatic, among which are:—

14624 (131) *a.* (fol. 1) 'The true . . . history of Lyracumpopius and Cis Onion . . . or the amours of Chelsea Betty and Arch Robin': *b.* (fol. 44^a) 'D—ck, a poem': *c.* (fol. 155) 'Orosmanes, a tragedy,' in two forms, and some plays without titles.

14625 (132) *d.* (fol. 3) 'Brutus, a tragedy,' in two forms: *e.* (fol. 132) Narrative of the king of Sweden's movements in 1709-14 (?).

14626 (133) *f.* (fol. 1) A chemical treatise, imperfect: *g.* (fol. 83)

'The Magician,' a tale: *h.* (fol. 162^b) 'Psychology, or a treatise of the apparition of spirits.'

14627 (134^a) *i.* (fol. 1) 'The adventures of Izaf, merchant of Bengal': *j.* (fol. 4) 'The adventures of Gebur, prince of Tunis': *k.* (fol. 45) 'The fatal events of unlawful love . . . with . . . reflections . . . by Basil Herbert esq.': *l.* (fol. 90) 'A specifick for the Cholick,' a tale: *m.* (fol. 111) 'The Fryer unmasked, written in French by . . . Anthony de la Mothe . . . translated into English . . . by Jeremy Brightwell esq.': *n.* (fol. 196) 'Sir Isaac Newton, a poem . . . by mr. Samber . . ., 1729,' see no. 14628, fol. 136: *o.* (fol. 207) Poem to the marquis of Caermarthen on his wedding, by Robert Samber, 1719.

14628 (134^b). Theological works, poems, and private correspondence: *p.* (fol. 97) 'An account of all the Heresiarchs from . . . 34 to 1605.'

14629 (135) *q.* 'Memoirs of the house of Savile,' from the earliest times, in several forms from 1716 to 1731. The binding is part of a legal deed of 1738 concerning Tho. Perkinson of London.

Now MSS. *Rawl. poet.* 131-133, 134^a, 134^b, 135.

14630. In English, on paper: written in 1716, &c.: 10½ × 7¼ in., ii + 133 leaves.

Three plays by Lewis Theobald, all without titles: *a.* (fol. 1^v) 'The Perfidious Brother, 171½': *b.* (fol. 34) chief character, Warcourt: *c.* (fol. 81) chief character, sir Charles Traplove: imperfect. At fol. 109 is a printed piece, Theobald's 'The Entertainments for *The Lady's Triumph*,' with MS. notes.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 136.

14631. In English, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. by T. Fullalove (?): 10½ × 6¼ in., vi + 46 leaves.

'Hic incipit liber qui uocatur Pers Plowman': at fol. 29 'Explicit hic Visio Willelmi de Petro &c. Et hic incipit Vita de Dowel Dobet & Dobest secundum Wit & Resoun': at end 'Explicit Dowel. Nomen scriptoris Tilot plenus amoris,' i. e. Tilot Fullalove, or else Plenus amoris is a mere expletive phrase, as sometimes. This MS. of William Langland's *Piers Plowman* exhibits the A-text of Skeat (composed in 1362-63), and is the only MS. which contains the whole of Passus xii. At the end of the Passus before the explicit are 12 additional lines, *beg.* 'And so bad Johan But busily wel ofte.'

This MS. once contained 4 parchment leaves containing fragments of the French romance of Guy earl of Warwick, 'missing Feb. 1877.'

'Simpson' is scribbled on fol. 22^r with a lead point (15th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 137.

14632. In English, &c., on paper: written in the first half of the 15th cent.: 9½ × 6 in., i + 114 leaves: binding, original boards covered with red leather.

At end 'Explicit liber vocatus Stimulus Con[s]ciencie' (Prick of Con-

science), ascribed to Richard Rolle of Hampole: *beg.* 'The my[g]th of the Fadyr Al myghty.'

On a strip of parchment used originally as a bookmarker is written in a hand of about the middle of the 15th cent.:—'. . . Kal. Septembr' frater Thomas. iij^o kal. Apriles frater Radulphus canonici sacerdotis & professi monasterii beate Marie de Vluescrofte ordinis sancti Augustini Lincolniensis diocesis. domina Elizabet de S. . . .' perhaps obituary, but showing that the MS. was at Ulverscroft priory in Leicestershire. On fol. 113^v is a Latin riddle on the word *Muscatum* (*mus*, *musca*, *mustum*), &c., 'quod Phillip' (late 15th cent.). Owned by Thomas Rawlinson.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 188.

14633. In English, on parchment: written in the second half of the 14th cent.: 10½ × 6 in., vi + 122 leaves.

'Her byginneth in presence | The book cald Pricke of Conscience,' by Richard Rolle, see no. 14632: text *beg.* 'The myght of the Fader almyghti.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 189.

14634. In English, on parchment: written in the 15th cent.: 9½ × 6¼ in., iii + 110 leaves: with coloured initials, &c.

The Life of the Virgin Mary by John Lydgate: *beg.* 'This boke was compild by Jon Lidgate monk of Bury at the excitacion & steringe of oure worshipful prince kyng Herry the fifthe in the worshipe honour & glorie of the birthe of the moste glorious mayde wif & modir of oure Lorde Ihesu Crist . . .'; then, after a table of the 87 chapters, 'O thoughtful herte plunged in distresse.'

'N. Mawnsell' (15th cent.): 'Cest l[i]ure apelle la Natiuite de notre Dame et appartient a cest arms, scil. party per pale, on the dexter side an eagle displayed, on the sinister lozengy, with 'T. (?) M.' (15th cent.): 'Tho. Wilson's purchased out of the library of the reverend mr. Jo. Briggs M.A., later Vicar of Kirkburton in Yorkshire,' so that Rawlinson's note that this is a Thoresby MS. is probably wrong, though many of the Thoresby MSS. came to Rawlinson through Wilson.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 140.

14635. In English, on paper: written in the first half of the 15th cent.: 10¼ × 7½ in., ii + 159 leaves.

Part of Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, beginning in the *Knight's Tale* (Six-text ed. l. 2567, 'Bi ordynauce thugh out the cyte large'), then the *Miller's Tale*, the *Reeve's Tale*, the *Cook's Tale*, the *Sergeant's* (Man of Law's) *Tale*, the *Squire's Tale*, the *Clerk of Oxenford's Tale*, the *Shipman's Tale*, the *Prioress' Tale*, *Sir Thopas*, *Melibeus*, the *Monk's Tale*, the *Wife of Bath's Tale*, the *Friar's Tale*, the *Summoner's Tale* (to 2066, 'his bowe on his hond,' some leaves being lost after this), the *Nun's Priest's Tale* (from 4265 'And casten hem'), the *Manciple's Tale* (to 140 'more than his lyf').

Owned by Thomas Rawlinson.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 141.

14636. In English, Latin, &c., on paper: written in the first half of the 17th cent.: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{3}{4}$ in., 84 leaves.

A commonplace book of extracts and transcripts, both in prose and verse, made perhaps in about 1630-50, apparently by an Oxford man, on diverse subjects, ranging from directions about fighting cocks (fol. 6^v) to poems by Bacon (fol. 20^v, 'The World's a bubble . . .'), Herrick's Sack (fol. 44^v), Ben Johnson (fol. 43^v, 'To Burlace the painter'), John Cleaveland (foll. 12, 18, 21 &c.), John Earle(s) (fol. 35 &c.) and others. Fol. 29 is torn.

'William Bloys' probably owned the book (17th cent.) and 'Elisebeth Hosman' (about A. D. 1700?).

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 142.

14637. In English, on paper: made up of two MSS. (A, B), see below: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 37 leaves.

A. (written in about the middle of the 15th cent.) 1 (fol. 1) The book of hunting by dame Juliana Barnes or Berners: *beg.* 'Mi dere sones where ye fare by frith or by fell.'

B. (written in the first half of the 17th cent.) 2 (fol. 12) 'The Stanleys antiquytes in Englishe meeter,' by bp. Thomas Stanley: *beg.* 'I intend with true report to praise.' Fol. 27 is a separate leaf containing a poem, *beg.* 'My Love, my thrice fayre Love J did behold.'

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 143.

14638. In English, on paper: written in the second half of the 15th cent.: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 407 leaves: imperfect at end.

The Siege of Troy, by John Lydgate, largely a translation of Guido de Columna's *De Bello Trojano*: *beg.* [M]yghty Mars with thy sterne lyghte': *ends* in the last book 'With benigne hert and humylite,' a leaf or two being lost. A hand of 1586 has added on fol. i^v a note on Lydgate, and on fol. 407 some verses on this poem.

'This boke heys meyn my lady Elbysabethe Peche—~~A~~ Whom God preserue Amen' (about A. D. 1500?): 'John Golldewell' (cover, see fol. 386, 16th cent.): 'Edward Bonister' (17th cent.): 'Ex dono Thomæ Santacilia' (17th cent.).

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 144.

14639. In Latin and English, on paper: made up of three MSS. (A, B, C) written in the 17th and 18th centt.: $11 \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 46 leaves.

A. (written early in the 17th cent. by H. Peacham) 1 (fol. ii) 'Βασιλικον Δωρον In Heroica Emblemata resolutum, ac digestum per Henricum Peachamum Anglum. Scripta in gratiam serenissimi principis Henrici Frederici Regis Iacobi . . . filij, cui optimo jure debentur,' in three books, containing 56 emblems, each with a Latin quatrain and a quotation from the Basilikon Doron, in the author's handwriting. A leaf may be missing after fol. 21. See below.

B. (about A. D. 1700) 2 (fol. 31) 'A version of Ariadne to Theseus,

an Epistle of Ovid's,' by R. Herbert, an autograph, in English verse (*beg.* 'Unkindest Theseus! oh! I finde in thee').

C. (A.D. 1724) 3 (fol. 36^b) 'Upon the marriage of M^r H. Jennings with M^{rs} S——n K——t,' in verse, *beg.* 'Let us not treat,' dated 1 Jan. 172 $\frac{3}{4}$.

With respect to A, 'John Candy [?] oweth this booke' (late 17th cent.): owned also by H. Whatton (fol. 3: 18th cent.).

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 146.**

14640. In English and Latin, on paper: written in about 1640-60: 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 278 pages.

Poems chiefly in English, collected by a Cambridge man ('H. S.,' 1647?), and largely concerned with Cambridge events of about 1630-58 (e.g. 'Caius Coll. plate lost, Jan. 165 $\frac{7}{8}$, p. 239 *rev.*). Many are by Henry Molle (p. 2 &c.), Isaac Ollivier (p. 9 &c.), Clement Paman (p. 44 &c.), sir H. Wotton (p. 47 &c.), S. Briggs (p. 274 *rev.*, &c.), and Rich. Williams (p. 235 *rev.*, &c.).

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 147.**

14641. In English, on parchment: written early in the 15th cent., by W. Stevens: 11 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., iv + 138 leaves: imperfect.

Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, imperfect: *beg.* 'Olde Ypocras Holy and Galyene' (Prol. 431 in Six-text edition), but fragments of the leaf preceding are still left. The order is General Prologue, Knight's Tale, Miller's Tale (wanting from 3490 to end), Reeve's Tale (wanting all before 4202), Man of Law's Tale, Squire's Tale (at end of which, after 'begynne,' come two lines 'Apollo wolleth . . . the sligh,' and in margin 'Explicit 2^a pars & deficit 3^a pars,' a page and a half being left blank, Merchant's Tale (wanting all after 2003): then Gamelyn (from 'Two gentilmen gouerned the place'): Wife of Bath's Tale, Friar's Tale, Summoner's Tale, Clerk of Oxenford's Tale, Second Nun's Tale, Canon's Yeoman's Tale, Doctor's Tale, Pardoner's Tale, Shipman's Tale, Prioress' Tale, Sir Thopas, Melibeus, Monk's Tale (wanting all after 3299), Nun Priest's Tale (wanting all before 4183), Manciple's Tale, Parson's Tale. At end 'Expliciunt fabule. script' per [then after a short space in reversed letters] William Stevenns.' On fol. 91 is a transcript of part of an English deed of 1607, and on fol. 136^v a poem (about A.D. 1600) on the word 'jest' scraped out in a lady's Chaucer.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 149.**

14642. In French, on parchment: written in the 13th cent.: 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 156 leaves in double columns: imperfect.

French metrical romances, comprising about 25000 lines of the Chansons de geste called Chansons des Lorrains (Lohérains), namely the Romance of Garin le Loherain (fol. 1), of La mort de Garin le Loherain (fol. 64^r), and others. For details, so far as they have been worked out, see Stengel in Bohmer's *Romanische Studien* I. 383-390

(1875). After fol. 1 six leaves are lost, after fol. 33 one, and the last leaf ends with 'Qui estes vos ce dist li chamberiers' and the catch words 'Hues respont.' A later possessor gave it a title 'Roman de Pepin.'

The volume bears the armorial bookplate of Nicolas Joseph Foucault (*d.* 1720).

14643. In English, on parchment: written in the 15th cent.: 10½ × 7½ in., iii + 111 leaves, imperfect: binding, original oak boards covered with leather.

A translation into English verse of Boethius *De Consolatione Philosophiae*: the colophon is 'Explicit liber Boecij de consolacione philosophie de Latino in Anglicum translatus Anno domini Millesimo CCCC^{mo} X^o per capellanum Johannem' [i. e. John Waltwn, canon of Oseney. E. W. B. N.]. A leaf is cut out before fol. 1 (containing part of the translator's preface), fol. 3 (end of prologue, beginning of text), fol. 37 (end of second bk., beginning of third), and fol. 65 (near the end of the third bk.). The prologue *beg.* 'The whyle that Rome was regnyng in his floures.'

'Iste liber constat Nicholao Tycheborne, ex dono Johannis Bollere Cim [?] & Grocere London' (about A. D. 1500?). 'Iste liber constat Willelmo Tycheborne ex dono Nicholai Tycheborne patris mei.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 151.

14644. In English, &c., on paper: made up of many MSS. written in the 17th and early 18th cent.: 9½ × 7½ in., i + 250 leaves.

Miscellaneous poems of the 17th and early part of the 18th cent., many on political subjects, some amorous, a few in Rawlinson's hand: recently bound together. Among them are:—*a.* (fol. 36) 'The lamentable cries of at least 1500 Christians . . . now prisoners in Argiers vnder the Turkes . . .' about A. 'A song of the drinkers of the iron waters at Tunbridge,' *beg.* 'Come, you that do bost,' late 17th cent.: *g.* (fol. 221) 'The Ladle,' a poem, *beg.* 'The Scepticks think t'was long agoe.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 152.

14645. In English, &c., on paper: made up of three MSS. (A, B, C) written in the 17th and 18th cent.: 8½ × 6½ in., i + 79 leaves.

A. (about A. D. 1640) 1. (fol. 1). The Song of Solomon, in English verse, *beg.* 'Joyne thy life-breathing lips to mine.'

2 (fol. 8). 'Some select copy's of verses, or poetry,' short pieces.

B. (about A. D. 1718–19) 3. (fol. 30). Short poems copied out by 'Thomas Axton' of Trin. coll. Cambridge.

C. (early 18th cent.) 4 (fol. 51). Short poems, apparently copied out by dr. Rawlinson.

'A collection of loyal poems, satyrs and lampoons in the reign of Taurus [i. e. George I?], vol. 1,' about 220 pieces (nearly 11000 lines), chiefly relating to about 1712-16. An index precedes.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 155.

14648. In Latin, on parchment: written perhaps in the second quarter of the 15th cent. in France: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 1 + 56 leaves.

Title on outside of binding 'Josephina magistrj Johannis Gersonis, 837,' containing the prooemium, short analysis, *beg.* 'Clare Ioseph,' the poem in 12 divisions (on the life of St. Joseph), and the oratio. On fol. 1 is a portrait of Gerson with dog, staff and wallet, bearing his arms on a shield, all in colours: and on fol. 56^v a later poem to Gerson as author of the Josephina.

'De conuentu fratrum Celestinorum sancte Trinitatis de Marcoussiaco,' Marcoussis, near Paris (15th cent.): this volume was probably no. 837 in the convent library.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 156.

14649. In English, on paper : written early in the 18th cent. : 9 × 6½ in., xiv + 21 leaves.

'Brent. A poem, to Thomas Palmer esq.,' complaining of the extreme wetness of East or South Brent in Somerset : 'by Mr. [William] Diaper,' Rawlinson's note. Foll. i-xiv, 9-end are blank.

Now MS. *Bawl. post.* 157.

14650. In English, on paper : written in 1732 : 8 × 6½ in., i + 20 leaves.

'The Excellence of Art, or an encomium on Painting,' with 'Hodge Pew's preamble to hur Versifications' : the poem *beg.* 'Art, thou most glorious of temporal acquisitions,' sorry verse : at end 'March the 13 : 1732' :

Now MS. *Bawl. post.* 158.

14651. In English, &c., on paper : made up of many MSS. written chiefly in 1680-90 : 9 × 7½ in., iii + 242 leaves.

Ballads and satires on public affairs and persons, with a few prose pieces and other poems, chiefly written in 1680-90 : specimens are :—*a.* (fol. 1) prose account of Versailles, 1683 (*beg.* 'Among the many palaces') : *b.* (foll. 106, 131) 'On stealing the candlesticks in Westminster Abby,' 1683, (*beg.* 'If pagan Papists') : *c.* (foll. 150, 170) Tunbridge poems, 1683, 1684 (*begg.* 'Big with the thoughts,' 'Tunbridge which once'). To judge by a title on fol. 228 some of the poems, perhaps foll. 206-227, are by John Bulteel.

14652. In English, &c., on paper : written in about 1640 : 12½ × 7½ in., iii + 231 leaves.

An interesting collection of English poems, chiefly on persons (epitaphs &c.), but some on public events from about 1600 to 1640, and some religious : among them are :—*a.* (fol. 5) 'A distracted elegie vpon that . . . murder of Thomas Scott preacher . . . at Vtrecht . . .,' (*beg.* 'Keep thy teares, reader') : *b.* (fol. 13) 'Shakespeares Epitaph' (*beg.* 'Renowned Spencer,' by W. Randolph : *f.* (fol. 41) 'An epitaph on Elias James,' here ascribed to Shakespeare (six lines, *beg.* 'When God was pleas'd, the world vnwilling yet') : *g.* (fol. 45) poem by John Fletcher, *beg.* 'Ye that can look' : *h.* (fol. 46) 'R. Herricks Farewell to poesye,' followed by his 'Charge vnto his wife' : *i.* (fol. 57) 'Sir Walter Raleighs Pilgrimage' : *j.* (fol. 108) a poem here attributed to Shakespeare (95 lines, *beg.* 'Shall I dye, shall I flye') : *k.* (fol. 110) 'Ben Ionson to the painter' : *l.* (fol. 117) 'Sir Walter Ralegh to queene Elizabeth,' *beg.* 'Our passions are

most like': *m.* (fol. 159) 'In Tobaconistas,' *beg.* 'Great Jupiter being at a solemne feast': *n.* (fol. 165) 'Mr. Herick his farewell to sacke,' his welcome to sacke, and (fol. 169^v) 'King Oberons Feast': *o.* (fol. 173) 'Ben Iohnsons Maske before the kinge' (*beg.* 'Now God preserue'), cf. fol. 175^v. Many leaves are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 160.

14653. In French, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent.: 12 × 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., iii + 83 leaves, in double columns.

The treatise of Boethius De consolatione Philosophiae in French verse: prologue *beg.* 'Cellui qui bien bat les buyssons.' Some short later French pieces are written on the flyleaves &c., and a French legal deed of 1641 is in the binding.

Owned by 'J de Doirier [?] de la Ramée d'Amboise Med. f. Monpel. 1682,' and by N. J. Foucault, whose armorial bookplate is in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 161.

14654. In French, on paper: written in 1528-78 at Caen by C. de Bourgueville: 11 × 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., iii + 131 leaves: binding, see below.

1 (fol. 1). 'Aucunes oeuvres de la composition de Charles de Bourgueville escriptes de sa main a sa grande ieunesse': followed by other poems and pieces of the same author, dated from 1528 to 1578, many dealing with persons and events connected with Caen. At fol. 59 is an epitaph on his father Jehan who died in 1514, composed in 1547, and at fol. 76 copies of the Latin epitaphs of William the Conqueror and his wife Maud, found in their tombs at Caen.

2 (fol. 80^v). 'Aucunes chozes adueneuez en la ville de Caen' from 1530 to 1560, a local chronicle of events, also by Charles de Bourgueville.

The binding is of black leather tooled, no doubt contemporary (except the back), and bearing the name 'P. Mabrau' on a centre panel. Some printed leaves on Logic were originally in the binding.

Owned by N. J. Foucault, whose armorial bookplate is in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 162.

14655. In English, on paper: written in the 15th cent. by Tregentil?: 12 × 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., iii + 120 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). At end, 'Tregentyll { Heer endith the book of } Chaucer.
{ Troylus and of Cresseyde }

Foll. 17, 80 are mutilated, and only a fragment of fol. 99^b is left.

2 (fol. 114). A poem to Rosamond, in 24 lines, *beg.* 'Madame, ye ben of al beaute shryne,' at end 'tregentil — || — chaucer.' This poem though here distinctly attributed to Chaucer escaped the notice of editors until prof. W. W. Skeat printed it in the *Athenæum*, 4 Apr. 1891. Tregentil is more probably the name of the scribe than 'très gentil.'

Owned by 'Thomas Howlet' in 1568, see fol. 80^v: and by Thomas Rawlinson.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 163.

14656. In French, on paper: written in about 1715 at Hanover: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., 14 leaves.

'Poesie satyrique sur plusieurs personnes a Hannover, par M^r. G. D. B.,' the first piece is 'Dialogue sur la paix fait entre la France & l'Angleterre. 1712.,' *beg.* 'Courtin. O rage, ô desespoir ! O paix qui m'assassine !'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 164.

14657. In English and Latin, on paper: written in 1715-17 by E. Cromwell: $12 \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., 41 leaves.

(fol. 22). Poems by Edward Cromwell rector of Walkington in Yorkshire, 1715-17, a few in Latin. Foll. 1-21 were accounts or a journal, almost completely torn out.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 165.

14658. In English, &c., on paper: written in about 1525-30 by A. Mervall and J. Harvey: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 92 pages.

Poems by Alphonso Mervall, dated 1625-28, chiefly amatory, and many signed 'Tettix.' The name Mervall may be assumed, as a 17th cent. hand has written on the outer cover 'English versse by J. Cobbes.' James Harvey added some notes and on p. 82 some poems in Latin, in a hand slightly later. On pp. 83-89 are Ben Johnson's Ode to himself, and his description of lady Venetia Stanley. On p. 89 is a poem on Gray's Inn Walks, May 1628 (*beg.* 'Friende, sette not heere'). The binding is part of an English deed between John and Thomas Godfrey about lands in Bury St. Edmund's, 1567.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 166.

14659. In English, on paper: written in about A.D. 1700: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., 19 leaves.

Sisigambis, queen of Syracuse, a tragedy: *beg.* 'Barzanes. Hail to Thamelus': ends abruptly in Act II, sc. 3.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 167.

14660. In English, on paper: written in about the middle of the 15th cent.: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 147 leaves.

'Hic incipit liber de regimine principum': at end 'Here endeth the Boke of gouernaunce of princes that Thomas Hoccleue made, which is a boke of moraltees and of vertues, of highli dispreising lewednesse and vices': see no. 14503. Foll. i-iv, 59-end are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 168.

14661. In English, &c., on paper: made up of many pieces written late in the 17th and early in the 18th cent.: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 55 leaves.

Short pieces and fragments of poems on public affairs, chiefly about 1678-1710: specimens are *a.* (fol. 24) 'A new narrative of the Popish Plot' of 1678, *beg.* 'Good people, I pray you': *b.* (fol. 27) 'Upon the Dutch invasion,' 1688, *beg.* 'Since dire presagings.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 169.

14662. In English, on paper: made up of many pieces written in the 17th and 18th centt.: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{8}$ in., 87 leaves.

Short pieces and fragments of poems, chiefly religious and for the most part of the 17th cent., but some later. Among them are:—*a.* (fol. 3-23) 'The Gaole-deliuerie or the arraignment of the New man & old,' a poem, *beg.* 'This judge mee-though[t] then sate vpon his throne,' perhaps complete: *b.* (fol. 48-63) 'The Wanderers Lament,' a poem, *beg.* 'I haue this while a prissner cloase': *c.* (fol. 64-69) 'A paraphrase on the prophet Jonah, in meeter' by R. [Don Rodrigue?],' a French tragicomedy, *beg.* 'Eluire. Lvj ci laue': *i.* (fol. 225) Oxford Latin verses chiefly Encaenia poems of 1674, and the like.

Now MS. *Bawl. post.* 171.

14664. In English, &c., on paper: made up of many pieces written from late in the 16th cent. to about A. D. 1730: $13\frac{1}{4} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., v + 179 leaves.

Oxford (about 1740-50?), *beg.* 'Betty who yet had looked on man': *f.* (fol. 162) 'Prologue to the play for erecting a monument to Shakespear in Westminster Abbey, written by mr. Theobald . . . 1739.'

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 172.

14665. In English, on paper: written in about 1705: 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ × 8 in., 1 + 191 leaves.

'The Muse's Magazine, or Poeticall Miscelanies, in two parts. The first consisting of choice translations and paraphrases selected from the Ancients, done by the best of our modern Poets, the second part consists wholly of original poems, selected from many of the best of our own Poets . . . 1705,' intended for publication. A complete list of the poems precedes, but some (on foll. 1-3) were added in about 1715.

'John Duntton his book, for which mr. Corbet at the Addison's Head accepted one half guinea in full payment for it . . . ' (about 1720?).

Perhaps therefore Corbet was the compiler of the volume.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 173.

14666. In English, on paper: written late in the 17th cent.: 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., viii + 104 pages: injured.

Poems by Edmund Waller, whose name does not occur, but pasted on the cover is a printed set of verses by Thomas Tooley 'To Miss Nanny Chapman with Waller's Poems.' Many of the poems are mutilated by mice having gnawed the outer lower margin. A list precedes. On p. 103 is a notice about an embezzlement of some of Tho. Rawlinson's books immediately after his death, in 1725-7.

14667. In English, on parchment: written in the middle of the 14th cent.: 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 8 in., 1 + 136 leaves, in double columns.

Old English religious and moral poems:—

Owned in 1630 by 'Christofer Fauell' : perhaps earlier by 'Raphe
 Wormond.' The MS. came to Rawlinson from the Thoresby collection.

'The adventures of Don Shoemackero and his trusty squire Cobbellero

 satyre, in 10 cantos : *beg.* 'Canto I. When men fell out, they knew not
 why' : preceded by a dedication and introduction.

14669. In Latin, on paper : written in the second quarter of the 18th cent. :
 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 27 leaves.

'Hermaphroditi libri duo, Antonio Panormita [Beccatelli] auctore,'
 with various readings from another copy : see no. 13130.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 177.

14670. In English, on paper : written in about 1623 by J. Cobbe : 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.,
 ii + 29 leaves.

'*Ἀλωπίχορ*, the first part of a most pleasaunt comedy, as it hath been
 sundrie tymes acted with great applause . . . by his highnes seruants att
 the Globe on the Banck side. Made and composed by James Cobbe
 esquire . . . Printed att London . . . 1623.' This does not seem to have
 been printed. The old binding is part of an English deed of 1614
 relating to property of the family of White of Winchilsea.

14671. In Latin, on paper : written in the 16th cent. : 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 5 leaves,
 mutilated.

14672. In English, on paper: written in about 1670: $11\frac{1}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 35 leaves.

'King Henry the Fifth,' an anonymous drama, by Roger Boyle earl of Orrery: see no. 14495.

Owned by John Murray.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 180.

14673. In English, on paper: made up of many pieces written in about 1690-1720: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 88 leaves.

Poems chiefly short and satirical on the Jacobite side, partly on general public affairs, about 1690-1720: among them is (fol. 33) 'The Demi-Juror, a satyre. By C[hristopher] Lamb,' corrected by the author, the original signature to the preface having been 'Pseudo-nacto-misos': *beg.* 'Must I have patience still the din to hear.'

14674. In English, on paper: written late in the 16th cent.: 8×6 in., 69 leaves.

Alchemical treatises:—

Poems, chiefly religious, by John Williams (see inside cover ; 14680, fol. 51, &c. : the full name is in no. 14683, fol. 105^v ; 14684, fol. 156), some dated from 1709 to 1726, many addressed to miss M. Ashe daughter of sir James Ashe of Whitton. See nos. 14680-81, 14683-85.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 184.

14677. In English, on paper : written in the last quarter of the 16th cent. : $6\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 26 leaves, in double columns : some leaves slightly imperfect, and one or two gone.

'Prepare with speed, Crist commyng is at hand.'
- 11 (fol. 13). A proper new ballade wherein is plaine to be seene, How God blesseth Englahd for loue of our Queene.
'London, London, singe and praise thy Lord.'
- 12 (fol. 14^v). A new balled of mother Watkins Ale.
'As Watkine walked by the way.'

- 13 (fol. 15^v). A proper new ballett, intituled Rowlands god sonne.
 'Besse. Tell me Jhon why art thou so sade.'
- 14 (fol. 19^v). A proper new ballad intituled the mery life of the
 Countriman.
 'A prince doth sit a slippery seate.'
- 15 (fol. 21). A plesante new sounge called the Carmans Whistle.
 'In a pleasant morninge.'
- 16 (fol. 22^v). A sounge in praise of the single life.
 'Some do write of bloodie warres.'

A few English and Latin sentences follow on fol. 23^v: fol. 24 is almost entirely torn out.

Owned by Thomas and William Wagstaffe (see foll. 25, 9) about A. D. 1600.

14678. In English, on paper: written at the close of the 16th cent. (?): 7 × 5½ in., iv + 100 pages.

'The Passion of the Spirit,' a religious poem, dedicated to mrs. Mary 'Houghton' wife of Peter Houghton sheriff of London: *beg.* 'Where shall I finde': apparently dated at end 1641, but this is probably an addition, for Houghton was sheriff in 1593-4.

Owned by 'Mary Mathew,' in 1641 (?).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 186.

14679. In Latin, &c., on paper: written in or soon after 1573: 7 × 5½ in., 26 leaves.

'Carmina Scholæ Wichamicæ ad Elisabetham reginam,' about A. D. 1573, 48 poems, all in Latin except three in Greek.

Owned by 'W. R.' (initials on cover).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 187.

14680-81. In English, on paper: written in the first quarter of the 18th cent. by J. Williams: 7½ × 6 and 8¼ × 6½ in., 85 and 84 leaves.

Poems, partly religious, by John Williams, the writer of no. 14676: one (14680, fol. 79) on the death of John son of sir John Humble, which took place 24 Mar. 171½; many are to miss Ashe. Most of 14681 is blank.

Now MSS. *Rawl. poet.* 188-189.

14682. In English, on paper: written in about 1704-36: 7½ × 6½ in., i + 112 leaves: imperfect.

'Divine meditations &c. 1704' (on cover), chiefly poems: but the latter part of the volume contains extracts from London journals, partly in prose, epitaphs (fol. 54^v), &c. (such as, on fol. 38^v, a story of a bell-ringer at Oxford supposed to be dead), up to 1736. Eight leaves are missing.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 190.

14683-85. In English, on paper: written in the first quarter of the 18th cent. by J. Williams: 8 × 6½ and 8 × 6½ and 8½ × 6½ in., 181 and 194 and 107 leaves: no. 14683 is slightly imperfect.

Poems and pieces by John Williams (see no. 14676), written in about A. D. 1709-26, many addressed to miss Ashe: some personal details are in no. 14683, fol. 152; 14684, foll. 18, 28, 31, 118^v, 124. In no. 14685 (fol. 1) is 'The Fudling Husbands and the Furious Wives, a comedy written by J. W.,' chiefly from the Terentius Christianus of Schonaeus, not completed: and at fol. 101 *rev.* are notes on gardening, &c. Many leaves in the volumes are blank.

Now MSS. Rawl. poet. 101-93.

14686. In English, Latin, and Greek, on paper: made up of several MSS. (A-D, &c.) written in the 17th and 18th cent.: 8½ × 6½ in., ii + 174 leaves.

A. (about A. D. 1700) 1 (fol. 1). Φλῆς, a comic poem in imitation of the Iliad, partly macaronic, books A-2, apparently incomplete: *beg.* Μῆνιν δεῖδε, Θεὰ, Ταφνητιάδω Κίμβρου, about fleas. A note by Hearne suggests prof. Joshua Barnes as possibly the author: see no. 14575, art. b.

B. (1679?) 2 (fol. 15). 'For prologues &c.,' some short poems, dated 'Ap. 8. 79.'

C. (early 18th cent.) 3 (fol. 29). English and Latin verses, epigrams &c., including (fol. 43) an English translation of Ovid's De Remedio Amoris, bk. 1 (*beg.* 'When this bookes name and title').

D. (early 18th cent.?) 4 (fol. 59^v). 'Zara, a tragedy,' *beg.* 'My dearest Zara, little did I dream,' adapted from Voltaire's Zaire.

Some short poems follow, e. g. (fol. 161) 'Hortus Mertonensis,' in Latin, *beg.* 'Hortus delitiæ domus politæ': (fol. 167) 'Roberto Graio Scoto . . . Archibaldus Pitcarnius Scotus S.,' *beg.* 'Ille qui terris latitat Britannis.'

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 104.

14687. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of six MSS. (A-F) written in the 17th and 18th cent.: 13½ × 8½ in., li + 171 leaves.

English plays, &c. :—

A. (late in the 17th cent.) 1 (fol. 1^v). 'The Younger Brother, or the amorous jilt, a comedy . . . by the late ingenious mrs. Behn,' preceded by an account of the author.

B. (2nd half of the 17th cent.) 2 (fol. 49). 'The faithfull Virgins,' a tragedy 'apoynted to be acted by the Duke's company of actors': *beg.* 'Merantha. What soule's so weary of her mansion.'

C. (about A. D. 1615) 3 (fol. 79). 'Susenbrotus, comœdia. Acta Cantabrigiæ in collegio Trin. coram rege Jacobo & Carolo principe, anno 1615': *beg.* 'Susenbrotus. Ecquid parantur omnia ferule': not mentioned in Nichols's Progresses of James I or Cooper's Annals of Cambridge.

D. (2nd half of the 17th cent.) 4. (fol. 99^b). 'Iugurtha, or the fait[h]less cosen German, a tragedy. Opus posthumum recognitum': *beg.* 'Jugurtha. Now Spaine may be at rest.'

E. (about A. D. 1700) 5 (fol. 136). 'The Sixth Satyr of Juvenall made English,' *beg.*: 'Perhaps dull Chastity remained.'

F. (1st half of the 18th cent.) 6 (fol. 154^b). Poems, entitled 'Sweden's Lamentation,' 'Liberty,' 'Epistle to Zaretta,' 'The Batchelor': of the last Rawlinson has a note, 'My friend mr. Cowper is of opinion that this poem is the product of some butler or Muse in a livery.'

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 195.

14688. In English, on paper: written in several hands in the first half of the 18th cent.: 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 132 leaves.

Songs and poems, partly in a Scotch dialect, almost all amatory, with an index: one 'made by mr. W. Turner,' one (fol. 50) on Street Cries: foll. 55-125 are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 196.

14689. In English, on paper: written in and soon after A. D. 1710: 8 × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 49 leaves.

'Verses, some made, some translated from the Latin, anno Domini MDCCX,' partly school exercises, some (copied) on public affairs: foll. 17-44 are blank.

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 197.

14690. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1620: 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., iii + 61 leaves.

Ovid's *De Arte Amandi* in English verse: *beg.* 'If there be any in this multitude': on fol. 61^v is an *Imprimatur* dated 8 June 1623.

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 198.

14691. In French, English, and Latin, on paper: written in the first half of the 18th cent.: 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 129 leaves.

Short religious poems and hymns in French (foll. 1, 76), English (foll. 37^v, 81, 113), and Latin (foll. 37, 43, 56^v, 97^v): a few pieces are in (Latin) prose (foll. 49, 107, cf. 76^v): by a Protestant.

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 200.

14692. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1600: 8 × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 53 leaves.

'Sainte John the Baptiste, the Morning Starre or the Forerunner of our blessed lorde and Sauieur Jesus Christe, their Birthes versified,' by Robert Wentworth, who states in the dedication to the countess of Huntingdon that the poem is 'enlarged and made twice as great as before': all apparently in a copyist's hand. The poem on Christ's birth begins on fol. 20.

Owned by 'Robertus Osborne, 1657.'

Now MS. *Rawl. post.* 201.

14693. In English, on paper: written in 1692-96 by R. Fleming, &c.: $7\frac{1}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., vii + 94 leaves.

Poems by the rev. Robert Fleming, dated from 1692 to 1696, chiefly epitaphs on relations and friends, one (fol. 16) is 'Moral Blazonry, a poem on the Company of Scotland trading to Africa and the Indies, in allusion to the . . . arms . . . of the said Company . . .' Some miscellaneous papers occupy foll. 25-34: foll. 35-93 are blank.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 202.

14694. In English, on paper: written in 1715, &c., chiefly by R. Rawlinson: $7 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 121 leaves.

'A collection of loyal poems and songs written in . . . MDCCXV,' with a list of contents, cf. no. 14698: some are printed poems and letters: at fol. 102 are copies of the declarations issued by the Old Pretender at Rome 10 Oct. 1720, and at Lucca, 10 Sept. 1722: some French poems are at fol. 107. Most of the volume is written by dr. Richard Rawlinson, and at fol. 106 is a certificate of his identity, dated at Padua, '17 Feb. 1722.'

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 203.

14695. In English, on paper: written in 1640 by H. Colman: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., v + 42 leaves.

'Divine Meditations by H[enry] C[olman], Philo-musus . . . Maij xx^c: 1640': the author signs his full name at the end of the dedication to William Rokeby, esq.: some of the poems are acrostics.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 204.

14696. In English, on paper: written in about 1670: 6×4 in., ii + 220 leaves.

'Manicotta, or the Janezary Mistresse, in 5 Canto's,' a poem, *beg.* (Canto 1) 'When Fanus tooke, at expiration | Of Brama's lease, new habitation.' At fol. 197 is 'An exegesis of the propper names . . .,' and a glossary. On fol. 2 'Licensed June 22. 1671. Roger L'Estrange.'

No. 259 in the Thomas Rawlinson sale, March 1733.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 205.

14697. In English, on paper: written in about 1630-40: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 98 pages.

A collection of verses, largely connected with Oxford persons and affairs, written in about 1630-40, probably by some member of New college, Oxford (arms on p. v): among the poems are:—*a.* (p. 1) 'A journey into the North by Ri. Corbet,' cf. p. 52: *b.* (p. 44) 'Chess Play,' signed 'dr. Lapworth,' cf. p. 49: *c.* (p. 62) 'On Samborne, sh[e]reiffe of Oxford,' by Ben. Stone. At p. 35 are some medical recipes. Some papers in dr. Rawlinson's hand are added at p. 78.

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 206.

14698. In English, on paper: written in about 1715, chiefly by dr. R. Rawlinson: $7 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 224 pages.

A collection of Jacobite songs, many in a printed form, with a list of

contents, cf. no. 14694 : the manuscript part is in the handwriting of dr. Rich. Rawlinson, about A. D. 1715. At p. 1 are copies of some instructions &c. from the Old Pretender, 3 Mar. 170½, 2 May 1711, 25 Apr. 1712.

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 207.

14699. In English, on paper : written in about 1660-70 by J. Hooper : 7 × 5 in., 1 + 23 leaves.

'Verses' by John Hooper of Devon, partly religious, some to or on members of his family (e. g. on his father and brother dying of the Plague in 1665, fol. 4). The binding is part of a 17th cent. agreement between Christopher and Katherine Mason.

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 208.

14700. In English and Latin, on paper : written about 1620-30 and about 1670 : 6½ × 4½ in., 49 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). Copies of poems by Thomas Carew ('T. C.,' foll. 2^v, 12, 19^v), Thomas Randolph (foll. 21, 23^v) &c., including the 'Convivium philosophicum . . . autore doctore Rodolpho Colfábio Æneonasensi' (fol. 13).

2 (fol. 28). Family notes (1647-64), Latin sentences, a few verses &c., apparently by John Peverell, who owned the book in 1674. On fol. 48^v is a receipt by Francis Blackitt, 30 June 1653.

14701. In English, on paper : made up of two MSS. (A, B) written in the 17th cent. : 6½ × 4½ in., 1 + 69 leaves.

A. (about A. D. 1653-8) 1 (fol. 1). 'Solitary houres, or a sad soules solace. By W. C[orbet] . . . 1653,' religious poems.

B. (about A. D. 1610-20?) 2 (fol. 44). Poems copied or composed (apparently) by Isaac Ollivier, including some by Henry Molle (fol. 47^v, &c.), sir Samson Darell (fol. 56^v *rev.*), Ben Johnson (foll. 68 *rev.*, 58 *rev.*).

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 210.

14702. In English, on paper : written in about 1640-50 by T. Weaver : 3½ × 6½ in., ii + 83 leaves.

A collection of original poems, ballads &c. made by Thomas Weaver (family notes 1650-62 are at fol. 82, cf. 71^v *rev.*) during the Civil War and often relating to incidents of the war : among them are :—
a. (fol. 15) 'On the archbishop of Yorke's revolt to the Rebels' :
b. Owned in 1646 (as a blank book?) by Charles Williams.
Now MS. Rawl. poet. 211.

14703. In English, on paper: written early in the 17th cent.: 5½ × 4 in., i + 155 leaves.

Poems and pieces at the end of the 16th and beginning of the 17th cent., collected by an Oxford man, among which are:—*a.* (fol. 88) Three poetical answers to sir W. Open thine eares my sonne, open I bidd': *g.* (fol. 66^v *rev.*) 'English Epigrammes much like Buckminster's Almanacke, servinge for all England, but especially for the meridian of . . . London, calculated by John Davis of Grayes Inne . . . anno 1594 in November,' the first *beg.* 'Ad Musam. Fly merry Muse': *h.* (fol. 54^v *rev.*) 'Trickes at cardes' in prose. At fol. 87^v is a Latin distich and translation, 'On the Flowre de luce [inn], Oxon. R. L.,' *beg.* 'Quæ bene.'

14704. In English, on paper: written in 1670-85 by R. Fleming: 6½ × 3½ in., 82 leaves.

Pieces in prose and verse, partly composed and partly copied by Robert Fleming, chiefly religious. There are many personal notes, one giving a list of the pieces which are his own composition: the others are from Vavasor Powel (fol. 6), 'Cowley, Herbert, Quarles' &c.: see fol. 82 *rev.*

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 213.

14705. In English, on paper: written in the 17th cent.: 6 × 4 in., ii + 90 leaves.

1 (fol. 1). 'Sicelides,' a comedy: prologus *beg.* 'Beginne thou royal muse, enuie ne'er vses': written in the first half of the 17th century.

2 (fol. 86^v *rev.*). Amatory songs, written in a different hand, perhaps about 1650: some by Thomas Head.

14706. In Latin, on paper: written about A. D. 1600: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 127 leaves.

Latin exercises in verse, chiefly religious, some on classical subjects, made by Roman Catholic students in about A. D. 1600, written out in a foreign hand. Now MS. Rawl. poet. 215.

14707. In English, on paper: written early in the 17th cent.: $4 \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 119 leaves: imperfect.

Ovid's De Arte Amandi in English, wanting the translation of i. 1-56: *beg.* 'More eares of ripe corne growes not in the feildes.' Some amatory poems follow on fol. 92.

'E libris Matt. Postlethwayt Augusti 1. 1697': perhaps (earlier) 'Henry Price' owned the book.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 216.

14708. In English, on paper: written in 1596: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 84 leaves.

'A Christians A B C, which he compiled in English meter, for the instruction of his children . . . wherein is conteyned the Argumentes of the New Testament, and the brefe contentes of euery Chapter of the same . . .,' *beg.* 'The Argument of the foure Euangelistes. In this history following, | Of Christ his Gospell pure': at end (fol. 68^v) 'xviii^o Junij 1596 . . .' On fol. 71 follow 53 riddles, in rhyme, with an introduction: the first *beg.* 'I know som parkes, wheare is no dere.'

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 217.

14709. In English, on paper: written in 1660 by R. Robinson: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., iv + 358 pages.

'Epigrams, Epitaphs, and other observations, divine, morall, charitable, satyricall, by Robert Robinson, London, 1660,' in verse. Pp. 178-358 are blank.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 218.

14710. In English, on paper: written early in the 17th cent., perhaps by D. C.: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 45 leaves.

1 (fol. 1) title on a detached slip, 'A poeme of the contempte of the world and an exhortacion to prepare to dye, made by Phillipe earle of Arundell after his attaynder': *beg.* 'O wreched man which louest earthly things,' 126 6-line stanzas.

2 (fol. 14^v). 'A brefe di[s]course of the Holy Euchariste. Peter Heskins,' *beg.* 'Manhu, manhu, what thinge is this,' 27 4-line stanzas: at end 'Finis D. C.' Partly printed in the *Gent. Mag.* March 1867, p. 340.

3 (fol. 15^v). A poem on Contentment: *beg.* 'My soule, what moueth thee to be sadd.'

4 (fol. 16). A poem on the ruins of Walsingham abbey: *beg.* 'In the wrackes of Walsingam': foll. 17-end are blank.

Owned by 'Αρθουο Μαρτυρ' (fol. 14) early in the 17th cent.

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 219.

14711. In Italian, on paper: written soon after 1681: 5½ × 4½ in., v + 47 leaves.

1 (foll. 1, 25). Six Italian poems by dr. Francesco Redi, one dated 1681, the chief being (fol. 25) 'Bacco in Toscana, ditirambo.'

2 (fol. 5). Four Italian prologues to comedies, three by dr. Giovanni Cosimo Villifranch: two dated 1680 in introductory letters: in verse.

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 220.

14712. In Latin, on paper: written in the first half of the 18th cent.: 15 × 9½ in., 15 leaves.

'Gideon, seu Pater Patriæ, carmen epicum in duodecim libros compositum. Liber primus': *beg.* 'Igne sacro candens,' in hexameters: bk. 1 only.

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 221.

14713. In English, on paper: written in about 1730: 13½ × 8½ in., 38 leaves.

Copies of English poems, some dated 1730-32: the authors are sometimes named, as sir Charles Sedley: specimens are (foll. 11^v) 'The Norwich assembly, or the Decent of Venus' (*beg.* 'Norfolk's proud villas'), and (fol. 19^v) 'An epistle to mr. J. W. at Poplar' from Cambridge 21 July 1730, with the Reply. The collector was a Cambridge man. Many are 'from a book of poems that mr. Head lent me.'

Now MS. Bawl. poet. 222.

14714. In English, on parchment: written in the 15th cent.: 16½ × 11½ in., xi + 272 leaves: imperfect, illuminated, see below.

Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, in the following order:—General Prologue (wanting all before 'There as this lorde' l. 172 in the Chaucer Society's Six-text edition), Knight's Tale, Miller's Tale, Reeve's Tale (wanting the last two lines, ll. 4323-24), Cook's Tale (wanting all before l. 4383. 'And ther they setten'), Man of Law's Tale, Squire's Tale, Merchant's Tale, Clerk's Tale (wanting ll. 804-871), Wife of Bath's Tale, Friar's Tale, Summoner's Tale, Second Nun's Tale, Pardoner's Tale, Manciple's Tale, Sir Thopas, Melibeus (wanting ll. 2484-2959), Nun's Priest's Tale, Doctor's Tale, Shipman's Tale, Prioress' Tale, Franklin's ('Marchaunt's') Tale, Parson's Tale.

Illuminated letters abound, large letters with border occur on foll. 44,

55, 63, 79^v, 90, 109, 142 (with a figure of the Friar), 149, 165^v, 175, 183 (with a figure of Melibeus), 204, 215^v, 219, 234.

Foll. i-x are a fragment of a 15th cent. MS. of Lydgate's *Siege of Troy*, containing the prologue from the words 'To rede bookes of thantiquitie,' and the first book as far as 'For of thyn age thy wytt, thi prouidence': on fol. v is a large illuminated initial and border.

'John Cowland' is written on fol. 270^v (16th cent.).

Now MS. *Bawl. poet.* 228.

14715. In French and Latin, on parchment: written in the third quarter of the 15th cent and (art. 9) in 1528: 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ x 9 in., vi + 117 leaves: with illuminations, see below.

Poems, liturgical pieces and documents connected with the Holy Tear (supposed to have been shed by Christ at the grave of Lazarus) preserved in the monastery of the Holy Trinity at Vendôme:—

1 (fol. 1). A French poem: *beg.* 'Du hault ciel & souuerain empire': see below.

2 (fol. 6). The Latin office of commemoration of the Tear, consisting of antiphon, versicle, response, prayers &c.

3 (fol. 9). The Seven Penitential Psalms, in French verse: *beg.* 'Domine ne in furore. Mon tresdoux Dieu ie te supplie.'

4 (fol. 19). Latin prayers &c. to the Virgin Mary.

5 (fol. 21). A Latin poem on the miracles connected with the Tear: *beg.* 'Ad laudem domini Patris Natique benigni.'

7 (fol. 35^v, 36^v). 'Sensuient les Miracles' preceded by an introductory poem, in verse: *begg.* 'A lonneur de la Trinite,' 'Premier ie vous racomptera.'

8 (fol. 67^v). A Latin poem on the history of the relic: *beg.* 'Est lamentatus Deus olim nos miseratus.' Foll. 69-106 are blank.

9 (fol. 107). A copy of the French document by which Louis of Bourbon founded the 'Procession du Vendredi du Lazare' (Friday before Palm Sunday), in 1428 in pursuance of a vow: 'a este faicte ceste presente copie le xxiiij iour dapuril lan mil cinq cens xx.viiij apres Pasques.'

10 (fol. 111^v). 'Memoriale fundacionis ecclesie monasterij sanctissime Trinitatis de Vindocino repertum in Cronicis ecclesie collegialis Sancti Lupi Andegauensis.'

11 (fol. 113). Latin Benedictions ('Benedictio pere,' 'ad baculum,' 'panis' &c.).

On fol. 1 is an illumination containing four scenes of miracles worked by the Holy Tear, an initial letter enclosing a shield bearing an *Agnus Dei*, and in the borders 4 shields and other ornaments. The shields

bear (1) the Fleur de lys of France, crowned, (2) arms of France impaling those of Savoy, (3) arms of Dauphiné quartering those of France, crowned, (4) party per fesse, in the upper part the arms of Hungary, Naples or Sicily, Jerusalem; in the lower part the arms of Anjou and Bar; crowned. These seem to point to Louis xi King of France (*d.* 1483), and René i, duke of Anjou, Bar &c. (*d.* 1480). Louis presented to the Church at Vendôme for the Holy Tear a silver lamp and in 1476 gave it a letter of protection. This volume would seem then to have been written at Vendôme after Louis' marriage with Charlotte of Savoy in 1451, and to have had the arms of patrons of the monastery emblazoned in it. Art. 9 was subsequently copied in. Initial letters are illuminated throughout the book.

Owned by lord Somers and sir Joseph Jekyll.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 224.**

14716. In English, on paper: written in the 15th cent.: 12 $\frac{3}{4}$ x 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 123 leaves: imperfect.

Lives of Saints, &c., in English verse, part of the well-known South English Legendary: Stt. Katherine (wanting the beginning: *beg.* 'Vpon that othir day wel sone to hym cam the knyght Porphir'), Barbara, pope Clement, 'Hic incipit historia quomodo Tiofelus vendidit animam suam diabolo & quomodo per sanctam Mariam deliberatus fuit' (fol. 11, *beg.* 'Listenyth both grate & smal,' at end 'Explicit Tyofle'), Simon and Jude, Eustacius, A Life of our Lord (? fol. 24: *beg.* 'Whan men herin telle'), Nicholas, James the Greater, Thomas of Canterbury (fol. 53, 93^v), on All Souls Day (fol. 90), Stephen, John the Evangelist, pope Gregory, &c. Fol. 115 is a liturgical leaf, partly Latin.

The whole volume is worn and rubbed, and in many places fragmentary or wrongly bound.

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 225.**

14717. In Italian, on paper: made up of two MSS. (A, B) written in the second half of the 16th cent., the first by G. Guicciardini: 11 x 8 in., xvi + 47 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 1). 'La Sposa di Noruegia, drama per musica di Girolamo Guicciardini,' title in a coloured frame with 'G. G. F[ecit?].'

B. 2 (fol. 37). 'S. Cresci, oratorio a quattro voci . . .': *beg.* 'Panfila. Itelle voi, che già deste.'

Some Italian fragments precede, one 'Accidente amoroso,' in verse, 24 stanzas: *beg.* 'L'empia coglioneria, l'amor nefando.'

Now MS. **Rawl. poet. 226.**

14718. In Italian, on paper: written in 1714: 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 8 in., iii + 73 leaves.

'Scielta di varie composizione raccolté in Roma l'anno 1714 da un Vmorista Accademico Fantastico,' followed by (fol. 14) 'Raccolta di

varii sonetti fatto l' anno 1715 in Roma dall' istesso soggetto Vmorista Accademico Fantastico': a few similar papers are added at fol. 67.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 227.

14719. In Italian, &c., on paper: written chiefly in the middle of the 17th cent.: 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 225 leaves.

Italian miscellanies chiefly poetical, written in the 17th cent., not all in one hand, a few Latin, among them are:—'Amorose' (fol. i), 'Morali' (fol. 40), 'Spirituali' (fol. 60): (fol. 131) 'Intermedi da Rapresentarsi in Ancona l' anno 1632,' the arguments only: (fol. 147) Latin poem by Albertus de Grassis on his illness and cure in 1662. Some are dated from 1656 to 1667.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 228.

14720. In English, on paper: written in about A. D. 1720: 10 x 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iv + 70 leaves: binding, red morocco with gold tooling.

'The Revenge, a tragedy,' anonymous: by dr. Edward Young.

Prefixed is a letter from the rev. Daniel Perkins to dr. R. Rawlinson, 5 Sept. 1747, about this MS., which was no. 4139 in the sale of the duke of Chandos, 1746-7; and about dr. Desaguliers (*d.* 1744).

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 229.

14721. In French, on parchment: written in about A. D. 1500 or shortly before: 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 8 leaves.

'Espitre de la vertue damitie et de paix. Au Roy mon souuerain seigneur,' in verse: *beg.* 'Obsecration. O Paraclit de bon cueur vous supplie': 3rd line from end 'Escript par vng nomme de Saint Gelay.' On fol. 1 is a full-page miniature of Octavien (?) de St. Gelais, a monk, offering the book to the King (Charles viii or Louis xii?), and there is other coloured work.

'C. Chapelle' (16th cent.): 'Achepté a Saumur . . . le 12^e Aoust 1703. Foucault,' and the volume bears N. J. Foucault's armorial bookplate.

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 230.

14722. In Latin, &c., on paper: written perhaps in the second half of the 17th cent.: 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 8 leaves: binding, stamped coloured paper.

Congratulatory poems to Nicolaius Gascon marquis of Acerno, a Spaniard, and to his son Antonio on the birth of a son Joseph to the latter: by the Spanish abbot, Dominicus Raphael, and others, in Latin, Greek (one) and Italian (one). Foll. ii, 6^a are detached leaves bearing emblazoned arms on parchment (1. a tree between a fleur de lys and a lion rampant, both gules: 2. two lions argent holding up a hurt, the field gules, surmounted by a cardinal's hat).

Now MS. Rawl. poet. 231.

14723. In French, on parchment: written in the 16th cent., perhaps by L. Pouchin: 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 46 leaves: binding, stamped leather, antique style.

Short French poems of moral instruction, used as a vehicle for a dis-

play of penmanship : among the titles are :—*a.* (fol. 3^v) 'Cest ammonition concerne les biberons du temps moderne' : *b.* (fol. 5, cf. 18^v, 24, 25^v) 'Icy suyent plusieurs beaulx enseignemens vtils et necessayres a tous peres de famille . . . faict en grosse rime ancienne . . .' : *c.* (fol. 36^v) 'Sensuit la consideration du poure pecheur bien profitable a recorder a tous bons crestiens' : *d.* (fol. 38^v) 'Icy apres sensuyent les douse vertus que vng noble homme . . . doibt auoir . . .'

'Cest present liure appartient a Louys Pourchin piemontoys natif de la ville de Chier,' apparently the writer himself : in 1587 the book belonged to 'Abraham Luls.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 232.

14724. In Italian, on parchment : written in the 15th cent. : 9½ × 6½ in., 1 + 133 leaves.

'Sonetti, ode, madrigali,' a later title : on lower edge 'Sonetti et altre Poesie Vismari [?: Visconti?]' : the first sonnet *beg.* 'Voi che ascoltate in rime sparse il sono.' Each piece has a coloured initial letter, but there are no titles or indication of author. On fol. 1 is a border and miniature of the poet struck through by Cupid's dart.

'Iste liber est clarissimi ac generosi viri domini Johannis Jacobi [this word on an erasure] de Vincemalis' (late 15th cent.?).

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 233.

14725. In French, &c., on parchment : made up of three MSS. written in the 13th cent. : 9½ × 6½ in., iii + 110 leaves.

A. (13th cent. : in double columns) 1 (fol. 1) at end 'Ici finist la uie Thobie,' in French verse : *beg.* 'Ki ke seme bone semence | en bone parole comence' : ll. 23-25, 29-30 are 'Li priors Guill' me prie | De leglise seinte Marie | De Kenilwerthe en Arderne . . . | Ken romanz li die la uie | De celui ki out nun Thobie.' The author was probably Guillaume le clerc de Normandie.

B. (about A. D. 1300 : in double columns) 2 (fol. 10) at end 'Explicit Balaam e Iosaphat,' in French prose : *beg.* 'En celui tens que les eglises et li moster' : fol. 11 is slightly mutilated : on fol. 56^v is 'les enseignemenz des viii bonurtez' in prose.

C. (late 13th cent.) 3 (fol. 57). The Song of Solomon paraphrased and applied to Christianity, in French verse : *beg.* 'Ki uot leument amer primes se humilie.' On foll. 105^v-106 is a prophecy in English verse of the 16th cent., very roughly written : *beg.* 'To judge the truth that beffore vs bene,' to be fulfilled in 1552.

A note by E. U(mfreville) on the contents of the book is inside the cover.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 234.

14726. In Italian, on paper : written in about 1720-30 by R. Rawlinson : 9½ × 6½ in., xiv + 82 pages.

'La Cortona convertita, poema . . . del P. M. R. Francesco Moneti

de minori Conventuali dell' Ordine di S. Francesco nel convento dell' istesso santo in Cortona,' *beg.* 'Canto le pompe i fasti e l' Ambizione.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 235.

14727. In Italian, on paper: written in or soon after 1574: 8½ × 6½ in., 127 leaves.

Italian pieces:—

1 (fol. 4). 'La discription di duo diluuij successi in Napoli . . . 1566 et 1569 in uersi . . . da Bartholomeo Portio.'

2 (fol. 28). 'Lettera di F. Ambrosio Fontana da Massa mandata à fra Dionysio da Capua in Castelloamare,' and reply dated 1574, both in verse.

3 (fol. 54). 'La Vendemmia del Zansillo, corretta da M. R.,' *beg.* 'Gioueni donne, e belle, che souente.'

4 (fol. 98). 'Cento ottave, viz. cinquanta dubij, et cinquanta solutioni delle liti tentate in bordello, quali per lo mag. vtriusque ser Anello scribere nescientis caesaria sono determinate. Le Proposte sono di Cesario aliquante corrette da M. R^a.' The first *beg.* 'Vn giorno Portia vacca, hor ben ascolta.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 236.

14728. In Italian, on paper: written in about A.D. 1700: 8½ × 6½ in., i + 18 leaves.

Three Italian poems in honour of St. Rosalea:—*a.* (fol. 1) 'Dialogo para santa Rosalea en su fiesta': *b.* (fol. 8^b) 'A santa Rosolea . . .': *c.* (fol. 11) 'Interlocucion en la fiesta de santa Rosolea de Palermo para Septiembre de 1698.'

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 237.

14729. In Latin, on paper: written in about the middle of the 17th cent.: 8½ × 7 in., 67 leaves.

Latin elegiac poems (14 lines each) on leading ecclesiastics, senators &c. of or connected with Paris, from the close of the 16th cent. to the middle of the 17th: 4 leaves are lost at the beginning, but on fol. 5 begin poems to members of the family Gondy. As an example the poem on Jaques Auguste De Thou (fol. 27) *beg.* 'In statione tuâ, quâ maximus arbiter orbis | Erectam, mea Mens, ponere te voluit.' The poems are religious meditations addressed to the writer's mind.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 238.

14730. In Italian, on paper: written in the 17th cent. by G. Redi: 8½ × 6½ in., 26 leaves.

'Scelta d'alcune Odi d'Orazio tradotte in canzonette toscane dal Bali Gregorio Redi pastore Arcade,' chiefly from the 1st book.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 239.

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14731. In Italian, on paper : written in the second half of the 17th cent. : $8\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., 16 leaves.

'Il colascione a tre corde, scherzo poetico': *beg.* 'Corda prima. La mia musa, uuol' dir' robba che puzza': apparently a satire on pope Alexander viii.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 240.

14732. In French and Latin, on parchment : written in the second half of the 13th cent. in England : $8\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., vi + 290 pages : chiefly in double columns.

1 (pp. 1, 20, 195). Short theological and other notes, in Latin.

2 (p. 8). A French moral poem, on how to live well : *beg.* 'Chers amis recevez de moi | Vn bon present que vous en voi | Noun pas dor ne dargent | Mas de bon enseignement | Que en escripture ai troue | Et de latin translate,' sometimes called 'Proverbe de bon enseignement,' probably by Nicole Bozon, see *Romania* xiii (1884), p. 540. On p. 20 are the dimensions of the monastery and church of St. Paul's at London, in Latin.

3 (pp. 21, 37, 50). Three or more French religious poems : *begg.* 'Amour, amour, ou estes vous,' 'Chekun doyt estre amee | Par la mesure de sa bonnte,' 'Si come ieo ai en liuere apris.'

4 (p. 77). The miracles of Our Lady, in French verse, translated from Latin, *beg.* 'Quanque est en liuere escrit | Que seinte eglise recoit & list.'

5 (p. 163). at end 'Ci finist le sermon que seint Eadmund [Riche] de Pounteneye fist & est apele Speculum amicicie,' preceded by a table of contents, in French : often known as *Speculum ecclesiae*: *beg.* 'Videte vocacionem vestram. Ceux moz del apostle partinent a nous genz de religion.'

6 (p. 189). 'In nomine Christi incipit liber Metodij episcopi . . . quem de hebreo & greco sermone in latinum transferre curauit, id est De principio seculi,' in Latin.

7 (p. 196). 'Ici comence vn tretitz coment le deable maria ces ix files . . . solom Robert Grocete,' *beg.* '[D]e gestes ne voil chaunter': the colophon gives a title 'le mariage des ix files au deable,' and the beginning and end (only) are the same as in Räuſ de Lenham's *Comput*, see *Romania* xv (1886), p. 286 : on p. 207 are French notes on the characters of each month, and the proper diet for each.

8 (p. 211). A geographical and astronomical poem, in French : *beg.* 'Moultz volenters escriueroie | Et moultz des choses enditeroie.' Artt. 8 and 9 are in a different hand from the rest.

9 (p. 246). A French poem on the 30 days of the month (? , 'lunes') and their astrological character : *beg.* 'Le jour qe prime est apele | Et des gentz ici nome,' here ascribed to King Solomon : see art. 8.

10 (p. 259). A French poem on the end of the world : *beg.* 'Seignors vous qe en dieux creez.'

'MS. 110' in the library of 'Sir Thomas Tempest baronet.'
Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 241.

14733. In Italian, on paper : written in more than one hand in about 1660-70 : $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 179 leaves.

'Malmantile racquistato, poema di Lorenzo Lippi,' a burlesque with dedication and key to the names : in twelve cantatos. First printed in 1676 under the assumed name of Perlone Zippoli : the author died in 1664.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 242.

14734. In French, on parchment : written in about 1560-70 : $7\frac{3}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., x + 52 leaves.

French poems :—

1 (fol. 1). At end 'Fin de l'Erynnne francoyse de la France affligée,' in 4 books : *beg.* 'Quand l'ardent fureur et que l'ire bouillante,' written in the reign of Charles ix.

'Ce present liure est & appartient a moy Jacques de Busserat . . .' [16th cent.] : later 'Euuertre Jollyuet.'

14735. In French, on paper : written in 1699-1700 at Rotterdam by P. Lardeaux : $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., 87 leaves.

Songs and short poems in French, religious, amatory and bacchanalian, 'commencé le 14 Novembre 1699 . . . Paschal Lardeaux' : the introductory poem bears 'Rotterdam 12 Feb. 1700' : the first song *beg.* 'Quand je voy la gorge ouverte.' The collection was made by Lardeaux, but there is more than one handwriting in the book, and some English and Dutch words.

Now MS. *Rawl. poet.* 245.

14736. In English and Latin, on paper : written in about 1648-60 : 6×4 in., ii + 78 leaves.

Poems and pieces in English and Latin, evidently collected by a Cambridge (King's College?) man who had been at Eton, relating to a period of about 1620-60 :—among them are *a.* (fol. 3) 'Second-course versers at Recent-time at Eaton' by Is. Olivier, cf. fol. 5 : *b.* (fol. 10) 'The hunting of the hare' two songs, *beegg.* 'When cold winter's withered browe,' 'Cleare is the ayre' : *c.* (fol. 31) 'Upon the coale-pitts about

New-castle upon Tine,' *beg.* 'England's a perfect world': *d.* (fol. 37) 'Βατραχομυομαχία, or a publique Commencement at Cambridge, July 1st & 2nd 1650,' *beg.* 'Hum to your witty worships': *e.* (fol. 40) 'A panegyre . . . in memory of . . . the lady Theophila Cooke,' by Rich. West, of C. C. C. Oxford: *f.* (foll. 48, 50) Poems by Henry Molle (in English and Latin) and 'Raphael Thorius' (Latin): *g.* (fol. 63) 'In arcem regiam Windsoræ sitam et institutionem Ordinis Garterij . . . carmen panegyricum,' *beg.* 'Qua Thamesis fluuius': *h.* (fol. 65^v) 'Querela Sancti Petri Cantabrigiæ, 1626,' a poem by M. Wren, with notes, in Latin: *i.* (fol. 69) 'Apotheosis Caroli' primi, *beg.* 'Ordior arma dolos,' by 'Thomas B' [onham?].

1 (fol. 1). Sallust's *Bellum Catilinarium*.

2 (fol. 19). 'Liber II,' Sallust's *Bellum Jugurthinum*: at end 'Explicit Liber Salustii.'

The above have notes and glosses, and various readings from another MS.

3 (fol. 52^v). The invectives of Sallust against Cicero, and Cicero against Sallust: *begg.* 'Grauiter et iniquo animo,' 'Ea demum magna voluptas est.'

2 (fol. 22^v). 'Eiusdem De opificio Dei vel hominis formatione.'

3 (fol. 43). 'Basilius' de legendis libris gentilium, in the version, and with the preface, of Leonardus Aretinus.

4 (fol. 51). 'Petri Pauli Vergerii de Iustinopoli ad . . . Ubertinum Carrariensem de ingenuis moribus & liberalibus studiis adolescentie liber incipit.'

2 (fol. 133^d). 'Introductio ad Logicam,' *beg.* 'Sicuti duæ partes sunt,' dated 'Neomagi,' 1657.

The volume was clearly written for an English religious house: 'Pertinet Willelmo Fysher' (16th cent.): 'pertinet, sed nunc pertinet domine Katherine Vaux': owned also by John Blaney in 1620, possibly also by 'Thomas Basse' and 'Richard Perkens': no. 1416 in the Francis Pole sale, March 1751.

The Comedies of Terence (Andria, Eunuchus, Heautontimorumenos, Adelphi, Hecyra, Phormio), with prologues and the subscriptions of Calliopius: at end '... explicit Phormio ... scripta cum reliquis precedentibus Papie per Vbertum Decembrem de Viglevano &c., sub anno Domini millesimo quadringentesimo octaua indictione de mense Februario.'

Owned by Augustus Tremulanus a priest who according to a note entered the household of Hieronymo Foscari bp. of Torcello at Venice 15 Dec. 1526: also by 'Joannes Perlotus' (15th cent.) and 'Ludouicus Saptus Termulanus nepot. presbiter Aug^o' (16th cent.).

14861. In Latin, on paper: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in Italy: 10½ × 8½ in., iii + 138 leaves.

The Comedies of Terence, written as if prose, in the order of no. 14860, with prologues and the subscription of Calliopius: the first leaf containing Andria i. 1, 1-164 ('malus animus') is lost, and the last (Phormio v. 9, 17-end).

'Liber Vallis ' (conceivably 'Sancti Lamberti') : no. 156 in the Thomas Rawlinson sale, March 1734.

14869. In Latin, on paper : written in the first half of the 18th cent. by J. J. Zamboni : $13\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., ii + 266 leaves.

'Supplementum Secundæ Decadis Livianæ, jampridem a Francisco Turchio Tarvisiano fratre Carmelita italicè conscriptum, nunc vero Latine redditum ab I. I. Zambono,' with a preface by the translator.

No doubt bought from Charles Marsh in 1753 or 1754 by dr. Rawlinson, as were the other Zamboni papers (see nos. 14869, 15004-26).

14870. In Latin, on paper : written in the first half of the 18th cent. by J. J. Zamboni : $13\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., iii + 68 leaves.

'Caii Julii Cæsaris Commentarii juxta Italicam versionem Francisci Baldelli Florentini, Latinè redditi a Joanne Jacobo Zambono,' bk. i. of the De Bello Gallico : done as an exercise.

See no. 14869.

14871. 147. = Qu. Catal. i (Greek), cod. Misc. 165 (Maittaire).

14872-73. In Latin, &c., on paper : made up of papers written at the close of the 17th cent. by M. Maittaire : $14\frac{1}{2} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ and $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8$ in., iii + 109 and i + 351 leaves.

Notes on Chronology, Jewish, Greek, Roman, and later to about A. D. 1560 : partly in a confused state. Foll. 108-321 of no. 14873 contain notes on Greek dialects. The whole is apparently by Michael Maittaire, who dates one set of papers 1692.

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14875 (151). A long paraphrase or adaptation of Horace's *Ars Poetica*, in Latin: with the text and translation. At foll. 1-3, 77-79 are extracts from Juvenal with English verse translations.

14877. 153. = " " " " 167 (Josephus).

14878. In Latin, on paper: written in about A.D. 1530-35, chiefly by J. Secundus: $11\frac{1}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., xxvi + 159 leaves.

Latin poems by Johannes Secundus (*d.* 1536):—*Elegiae*, *Funera*, *Epigrammata*, *Basia*, *Elegiae Epistolicae* (including *Heroica Carmina*), *Odae*, *Syllvae*. All are stated to be autograph except the *Basia* (fol. 79) and one other poem (fol. 135), which are written perhaps by Philippus Morus and corrected by Secundus. There is also later handwriting, as if by an editor.

'Nicolajj 33' (fol. xviii: perhaps a brother of Secundus, 1533) 'This was purchased amongst Ld. Somers's M.S.S. and has I believe been collated for the 2^d edition by Scriverius, *Lugd. Bat.* 1619. 120,' Rawlinson's note, which shows that the MS. also belonged to sir Joseph Jekyll.

Now MS. *Rawl. G.* 154.

14879. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 12th cent.: $13\frac{1}{4} \times 10\frac{1}{4}$ in., iv + 63 leaves, in double columns: binding, red leather, with some gold tooling.

1 (fol. 2). Letters between Isidor and Braulio (in Migne's *Patrol. Lat.* lxxxiv. col. 908, *Epistolae* nos. ix-xiii).

2 (foll. 1^v, 5^v). Bks. i-ii and iii. 1-xix of the *Etymologiae* of bp. Isidore of Seville, ending with 'siue in flatu siue,' a leaf being lost, after which follows a blank leaf. These books contain 'De grammatica,' 'de rhetorica et dialectica,' de arithmetica, geometria, musica.

' [erased] in Leodio pro iiii libris alborum . . . ': the volume probably belonged to a religious house in Liège. No. 84 in the Thomas Rawlinson sale, March 1734.

14880. 156. = Qu. Catal. i (Greek), cod. Misc. 168 (Chrysostom, &c.).

14881. 157. = " " " " 169 (on Jude).

14882. 158. = " " " " 170 (Canons).

14883. 159. = " " " " 171 (Chrysostom).

14884. 160. = " " " " 172 (Chrysostom).

14885. In Latin, on parchment: written in A.D. 1399, see below: $13\frac{1}{4} \times 10$ in., i + 537 leaves, in double columns: imperfect at end, with illuminated capitals, &c., and two miniatures in capitals (foll. 1, 3^v).

The Bible, in Latin, with prologues: on fol. 507 'Incipiunt Interpretaciones nominum Hebraicorum tocius Bible' (as far as Senaab), preceding which is 'Explicit liber Bible per manus [?] Vene Anno Domini m^occc^olxxxix^o die vltima mensis Aprilis.' The style of

illumination is Italian, but the writing apparently French. 'Vene' may possibly represent 'Venetiis.' Fol. 180 is torn.

Now MS. Rawl. G. 161.

14886. In Latin, on parchment: written early in the 14th cent. in England: 12½ x 8¼ in., ii + 256 leaves, in double columns: with coloured capitals.

1 (fol. 10). Parts of the Old Testament:—Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, Ecclesiasticus, Wisdom, Maccabees: the Psalter is followed by the usual Canticles and Creeds, a Litany, and a few prayers.

2 (fol. 98). The New Testament, following with scarcely a break:—General Epistles, St. Paul's Epistles (Rom., Cor., Gal., Eph., Phil., Col., Thess., Tim., Titus, Philemon), Ep. to the Hebrews, Four Gospels, Acts, Apocalypse. Foll. 135-158 (Matt. i. 1-Luke vii. 12) is from another MS., and duplicates the first part of St. Luke.

3 (fol. 802). The usual interpretations of Hebrew proper names in the Old Testament, in Latin.

In some ways this is a peculiar collection: at fol. 2 prologues to the separate works of the whole volume are collected.

'Caucio Johannis de . . . [erased word] pro Domo Sumonitorum anno xxvij° [A. D. 1327 or 1353?] salvo jure cuiuslibet': 'liber Philippi Butere' (first two letters of the last word doubtful), 15th cent.: once in the possession of Thomas Rawlinson.

Now MS. Rawl. G. 162.

14887. In Latin, on parchment: written in about the middle of the 11th cent. at Tegernsee (?): 13 x 10 in., ii + 259 leaves, in double columns: with illuminations, see below: binding, Thomas Rawlinson's.

1 (fol. 1). The Psalms of David, preceded by prologues, among which occurs one leaf (fol. 2) bearing a short Litany: half of every page of the Psalter contains the commentary of Bruno, bp. of Würzburg (d. 1045), in parts abbreviated; and there are some glosses. A leaf or two of the prologues are missing.

2 (fol. 213). Canticles:—Of David when he fought with Goliath, Isaiah, Hezekiah, Hannah, Moses (at the Red Sea), Habakkuk, Moses ('Audite Celi que loquor'), the Song of the Three Children, the Song of Zacharias, the *Magnificat*, the *Nunc dimittis*. All with Bruno's Commentary.

3 (fol. 227). The Lord's Prayer, Apostles' Creed, *Te Deum*, Athanasian Creed, ending (imperfect, some leaves being lost) in the last clause: all with Bruno's Commentary.

4 (fol. 234). 'Incipit Letania maior,' in which Stt. Quirinus, Benedict, and Othmar are specially distinguished, among about 500 saints: at fol. 237^v follow prayers, and on fol. 255^v the so-called Psalter of St. Jerome, the end of which and of the volume is lost.

Three fine full-page illuminated initials occur on foll. 5, 73^v, 140^v, the ground red or dark purple with coloured border, the letters red, green, blue, or gold, with parts of the text in silver, German work: there are also numerous smaller illuminated initials.

Tegernsee monastery seems to combine relations to Stt. Quirinus, Benedict and Othmar, being a Benedictine house, dedicated to St. Quirinus, and having drawn its first monks from St. Gall when Othmar was abbot of St. Gall, in the 8th century. Owned by Thomas Rawlinson.

14888. In Latin, on parchment: written in the second half of the 14th cent. in England, in two hands: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 212 leaves, in double columns: with coloured capitals, &c.: binding, original leather on boards, worn.

The Postils of Nicolas de Lyra on Genesis to Joshua, with the general prologues: probably vol. 1 of a set.

Owned by 'William Jones,' 'Wylliam Heming' and 'Johannes Prise' in the 15th or 16th centuries: motto at foot of fol. 2 'Qui nimis preperat serius absoluit.'

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 104.*

14889. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 14th and the first half of the 15th cent.: $14\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 266 leaves, in double columns: with coloured capitals, &c.

The Catena compiled by Thomas Aquinas on Stt. Matthew and (fol. 195) Mark, including the text of those Gospels, in Latin: foll. 1—28 are in an earlier hand than the rest of the volume: and St. Mark's Gospel is in a different hand from that of St. Matthew.

'Sum Roberti Woode aldermanni Norwici et amicomum,' 17th cent.: owned by 'Robert Sadler' in 1683 (fol. 4').

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 106.*

14890. In Latin, on parchment: written perhaps in the 8th cent.: $13\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ in., v + 109 leaves: with illuminations, see below.

1 (fol. 1). The Gospel of St. Luke, with corrections: wanting all after xxiv. 47 (remissionem peccatorum in omnes).

2 (fol. 63). The Gospel of St. John, with corrections: wanting i. 1—v. 1, and all after xxi. 16.

This is a fine MS. written in Hiberno-Saxon half-uncials, with 20—22 lines in a page. On fol. 1^r is a full-page illumination containing a large Q and VO | NIAM | QUIDAM | MULTI | CONA | TISUNTOR | DINARENAR-RATIONEM |, with a border round. The chief colours in this, and in the numerous smaller capitals, are yellow and red (especially in rows of red dots surrounding letters): there is also some purple and light pink.

The name 'Combe' occurs at fol. 106^r attached to some notes (16th cent. ?).

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 107.*

14891. In Latin, on parchment: written early in the 13th cent., &c.: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 167 leaves: with coloured capitals, &c.

‘Euangelium Domini nostri Ihesu Christi secundum quatuor Euangelistas,’ the Eusebian sections (698 in all) woven into a continuous narrative or Diatessaron, with notes. At fol. 164^v is a discourse on the Sections and the Harmony generally, addressed to a pope, apparently by a monk of St. Alban’s (‘biblioteca quam Rome conscriptam beate memorie rex Offa ecclesie nostre contulisse dicitur’): *beg.* ‘Amonius quidam Alexandrinus.’

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 168.*

14892. In Latin, on parchment: written late in the 12th cent. &c., in England: $13\frac{3}{4} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 99 leaves: with coloured capitals, &c.

The Gospel of St. Matthew, with prologue and copious notes, in Latin. The first leaf of the text and notes, containing i. 1, is cut out.

‘Iste liber est magistri Michael rectoris ecclesie de Cropthorne & traditur Ade de Furches diacono usque ad Festum sancti Johannis Baptiste anno Domini m^o cc^o lxx^o nono’ (altered from . . . lxxv^o?): on fol. 95^v ‘Ledbury scripfit’ (16th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 169.*

14893. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 14th cent. in England, perhaps at or near York: 12×8 in., 239 leaves: with some illuminated capitals and borders, &c.: binding, original leather on boards, worn.

The Psalms of David, preceded by a Calendar, and followed by canticles (foll. 194, 207^v), creeds (foll. 206, 209^v), a Litany with prayers (fol. 212), and the Placebo and Dirige (fol. 220^v). The Litany and Placebo are marked ‘Ista Letania et que sequuntur sunt de vsu Eboracensi’ and ‘De vsu Eboracensi, non Sarisburiensi’ in a 14th cent. hand: and as there are prayers for an archbishop only, not a bishop, it may be inferred that the book was written for use in the diocese of York. On fol. 239 a 15th cent. hand has written the hymn ‘Lauda Syon Saluatorem.’

See above. The (14th cent.) obits of ‘dominus Henricus de Winquike’ and ‘Agnes de Wynquike’ occur in the Calendar.

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 170.*

14894. In Latin, on parchment: written in about A. D. 1200: $13\frac{3}{4} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ in., 265 leaves, in double columns: with some illuminated capitals, &c.

The Epistles of St. Paul, with a commentary consisting chiefly of quotations from the Fathers: the order is as in an English Bible.

‘Rheynes’ is written on fol. 263^v (16th cent.): ‘Phin. Fowke M.D. Donum Joan. Huntbach de Fetherston in Agro Staffordiensi Generosi. A. D. 1691.’ No. 153 in the Thomas Rawlinson sale, March 1734.

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 171.*

14895. In Latin, on paper: written in 1664 at Utrecht: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., viii + 238 pages.

'Explicationes in Justinum dictatæ à . . . Johanne Georgio Grævio professore Historiarum & Eloquentiæ in Academia Ultrajectina. Anno 1664.'

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 173.*

14896. In Latin, on paper: written in or soon after A. D. 1586: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{4}$ in., vi + 248 pages.

'Annales qui historiam viginti et octo annorum regni Elizabethæ complectuntur, totidem libris comprehensi,' presumably by a student or students of Eton, poetical annals of public events 1558-86, preceded by a dedication to the queen signed 'Schola Ætonensis': the first book *beg.* 'Venerat e mediis terris.' On p. v. is 'AA. June 15. 1649.'

The royal arms with 'E.R.' are let into the side of the present (18th cent.) binding: so possibly this was the presentation copy to the queen.

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 174.*

14897. In Latin, &c., on paper: written in about A. D. 1700 in Germany or the Netherlands: $8\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{7}{8}$ in., 56 leaves.

'Notæ breues in Maximum Tyrium,' 'dictata a T. I. B. in Collegio': another title is 'Collegium in Maximum Tyrium': *beg.* 'p. 16, l. 9. *πότερον.* Hos versus Cicero ad Atticum l. xiii. 37. 39 adhibet.'

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 175.*

14898. In English, &c., on paper: written in about 1740-50: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 8$ in., iii + 33 leaves.

'Remarks on the Odyssey of Homer. Odys. Θ,' bk. viii. 1-ix. 11: *beg.* '4. Τοῖσι δ' ἡγεμόνευ'. As here is no mention': foll. 14 to end are blank. The writer mentions Warburton's *Divine Legation*, first published in 1738.

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 176.*

14899. In Latin, on paper: written early in the 18th cent.: $10\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., v + 140 leaves.

'De antiquitatibus Romanis, dictante cl. v. P[etro] Burmanno' seniore, notes of lectures delivered at Leiden.

Now MS. *Rawl. G. 177.*

14900-01. In Latin, on parchment: written in the second half of the 13th cent.: $16\frac{3}{4} \times 11\frac{1}{4}$ in. and do.: ii + 185 and 169 leaves: with a few miniatures, many illuminated capitals, &c.: imperfect.

The Pentateuch, in Latin, with a commentary chiefly consisting of a catena from the ancient Fathers. No. 14900 ends with Ex. xxxiii. 33 (delebo eum): no. 14901 begins with Levit. xxii. 12 (-dotis cuilibet ex populo). Leaves are lost after foll. 176, 180 of no. 14900, and perhaps elsewhere.

claro | Londonie': with many scholia and glosses, in Latin, at end. 'Expliciunt misteria sacre Scripture.' The treatise is a mystical interpretation of the services of the Church, and alludes to Fulk Basset as bp. of London (1241-59). On p. 131 is the last page of a grammatical treatise in verse 'In terminaciones vocabulorum,' as a scholium suggests, written after A. D. 1204, and mentioning the author's fame at Paris: the last line is 'Metrifica recte, uoces intellige recte.' The author may be Nicolaüs (de Brakendale??). On the margin of p. 145 are some semi-retrograde verses on St. Thomas of Canterbury, in Latin, *beg.* 'Nobilis Anglorum.'

4 (p. 155). 'Morale Scholarum,' a satirical poem in leonine verse, the prose pref. *beg.* 'Humiles in spineto,' the poem *beg.* 'Scribo nouam satiram': with scholia and glosses. John Blund is mentioned (p. 175) as living and chancellor of York cathedral (*d.* about 1248): so too an allusion to Fulk Basset as bp. of London makes it probable that artt. 3 & 4 are by the same author. On p. 176 is added the hymn 'Gaude virgo mater Christi.'

D. (13th cent., in double columns) 5 (p. 177). A grammatical commentary on Alexander Neckam's treatise *De nominibus Utensilium*: *beg.* 'Qui bene uult disponere &c. Virorum [i. e. Cum rerum] notitia precedat notitiam causarum.' On p. 196 follow some slightly later notes on the Calendar: and on pp. 198-9 the beginning of a *Dictionarium de Anatomia*: *beg.* 'Dictionarium dicitur iste libellus.'

The only four churches dedicated to St. Nectan were Hartland (where he was buried), Welcombe near Hartland and Ashcombe and Ashton both near Exeter. The only church dedicated to St. Uritha (Hieritha, Herygh, Vritha, Fritha) is Chittlehampton near Barnstaple. Hartland had a cell named Frithelstock or Fristock. A Thomas Oldeston was chosen prior of Pilton in 1472.

A cycle on fol. 15^v suggests the date 1489. On foll. 16, 68^v, 89 are illuminated capitals and borders. A leaf or two may be wanting before fol. 1.

'Heures de Nostre Dame a l'usage de Rouen,' in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 2), Latin Capitula and prayers, &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 58), '[Heures] . . . de la Croix' (fol. 73), '[Heures] . . . du Saint Esprit' (fol. 75)^v: fol. 78 should precede fol. 77, the Burial Service (fol. 77), and 'Les xv Ioiies' (fol. 100^v) and 'Les vij Requestes,' both in French.

There are five large fine miniatures (at foll. 14, 26, 58, 73, 77) and several illuminated capitals and borders.

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, *imperf., preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by the Penitential Psalms (*imperf.) and Litany (fol. 72), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 87: *imperf.), the 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 91: *imperf.), the xv Joyes, in French (fol. 122) and the vii Requestes, in French (fol. 127).

At least four leaves bearing miniatures have been cut out (after foll. 25, 71, 86, 90), leaving only some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On the binding (17th cent., red leather with gold tooling) is 'Francoize Deligny' (or, de Ligny).

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg.* f. 22.

15775. 62. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in France: $6\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{3}{4}$ in., 1+138 leaves: illuminated, imperfect: binding, Grolieresque, worn.

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Le Mans (Cenomanum), in Latin, im*perf., preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1) and Latin capitula, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 56), the Burial Service (fol. 72) and Commemorations, Offices, &c. The Hours of the Cross (fol. 36, &c.) and of the Holy Spirit (fol. 37, &c.), both imperfect, are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin.

Leaves bearing illuminations have been cut out after foll. 24, 32, 35, 43, 45: but nine large and fine miniatures are left, with illuminated borders, capitals, &c., in a style rather of the 14th than the 15th cent. The four flyleaves are from a late 13th cent. book of Latin homilies.

With the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg.* f. 28.

15776. 64. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{3}{4}$ in., vii + 93 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

Heures 'de Nostre Dame,' according to a French use, in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 52), and Burial Service (fol. 67). The Hours

of the Cross and Holy Spirit are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin at fol. 32, &c.

Every part is mutilated by the barbarous excision of leaves bearing miniatures, after foll. 12, 13, 21, 31, 32, 36, 40, 43, 46, 47, 51, 66, 82 (several leaves), and the end of the Burial Service is wanting. Only some coloured capitals are left, which show that the MS. was originally one of great beauty.

'Hic liber pertinet ad Stephanum le Cauelier tertianum,' (16th cent.: fol. 53): 'Ludouicus Degoix' (17th cent.: fol. vi^v): the volume bears the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 6.*

15777. 65. In Latin, on parchment: written in about A. D. 1420 in England: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., iii + 86 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin, imperfect: followed by the Penitential Psalms (fol. 40), the 15 Gradual Psalms (fol. 47) and Litany, the Burial Service (fol. 55) and Commendatio Animarum (fol. 82). The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 23^v, &c.

Almost every part is imperfect, one or more leaves perhaps bearing miniatures having been cut out after foll. 23, 25, 27, 54, and at the end: only illuminated capitals, borders, &c. are left.

On foll. 1, 11^v are the arms of John Wakering as bishop of Norwich (1416-25): and for him the book was no doubt written and painted.

See above.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 9.*

15778. 66. In Latin, on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. in France: $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 116 leaves: illuminated, imperfect: binding, gold tooling on leather (17th cent. ?)

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rouen, in Latin, preceded by Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 56), Burial Service (fol. 72^v) and Commemorations (fol. 99^v). The Hours of the Cross and of the Holy Spirit are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 30, 31, &c. At fol. 111^v is an office or 'Oraison de saint Rene confesseur euesque dAngiers,' which suggests a connexion with Angers.

Two leaves bearing miniatures have been cut out after foll. 29, 55, and a leaf is gone after fol. 58: but eight fine full-page miniatures are left, including St. Sebastian, St. Claudius (archbp. of Besançon?), and St. Christopher.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 10.*

15779. 67. In Latin, on parchment: written in the second half of the 15th cent., and in 1555, in France: $6\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., 134 leaves: illuminated: binding, gold tooling on black leather, French (16th cent. ?)

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar, Latin capitula, prayers, &c. (including 'Les Gaudes de Nostre Dame' in Latin, fol. 26^v), and followed by 'Septem Psalmi Penitentiales' and 'Letania' (fol. 77), Horae 'de Cruce' (fol. 95) and 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 99), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 103), Commemorations (fol. 121^v), and, in French, the 15 Joyes and 7 Requestes.

On fol. 1 a title, and almanac for 1556-64, and on fol. 134 a statement that the book was finished on 9 May 1555, have been added.

Six small miniatures occur, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

'Louyse Dufour' (17th cent.): the book bears the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 20.*

15780. 68. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $6\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., 127 leaves: illuminated: binding, white leather on boards, worn, English, contemporary.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin, preceded by a Sarum Calendar (fol. 2), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 48), the 'Vigilia Mortuorum' (fol. 68^v), 'Commendatio Animarum' (fol. 102^v), 'Psalmi de Passione' (fol. 117), &c. St. 'Wynwaloy' occurs in the Calendar.

The numerous arms at foll. 8, 29, 33, 35^v, 37^v, 40, 42, 48, 127 show that the book was written for one of the Rous family, and 'Alyce Rous' and 'Anth. Rous' (perhaps sir Anthony) have written in the volume in the 16th cent. Rawlinson has noted that 'This belonged to the family of Rouse of Hengham [Henham] in Suffolk.' There are illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

See above.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 2.*

15781. 69. In Latin, &c., on paper: written in or soon after A.D. 1448 in England: $6\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., 158 leaves: illuminated: binding, as preceding no.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin, preceded by a Calendar, and followed by the 'vii Psalmi Penitentiales' and 'Letania' (fol. 50), 'Octo versus beati Bernardi . . .' (fol. 68^v), the Burial Service (fol. 70), the Commendatio Animarum (fol. 94), prayers, some in English (foll. 111, 127, 149^v), the 15 Oes in Latin (fol. 120^v), and the Psalter of St. Jerome (fol. 133^v). The Hours of the Cross are worked into the Hours of the Virgin at fol. 30^v, &c.

The Calendar contains several notices of public events from 1066 to 1483, the later ones added, cf. fol. 8^v: some of the entries such as under 9 March 'Combusti sunt 5 in vna domo extra Ludgat, 1454'

and the prominence of St. Erkenwald point to London as the place of writing. The book was no doubt written for a Shepherd family ('Nata est Johanna Scheparde anno Domini 1446,' Apr. 11: 'Obitus Johannis Scheparde anno Domini 1455,' Oct. 22: on fol. 50 occur the family arms, or two shepherd's crooks in saltire azure).

After foll. 8, 43 and 138 leaves have been cut out: but several illuminated borders, capitals, &c. have been left. On foll. 7-8 is a Paschal Calendar from 1448-1537.

See above: in the 16th cent. Clement Pepys owned the book (fol. 1): late in the 17th cent. 'Obadiah Sherwin' (fol. 113): it was no. 1355 in the Francis Pole sale, March 1751, when it was bought by R. Rawlinson.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 8.*

15782. 71. In Latin, on parchment: made up of two MSS. (A, B) written in the 15th cent. in France: $6\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{3}{4}$ in., 181 leaves: with coloured capitals, &c.: binding, see below.

A. 1 (fol. 1). Hours of the Virgin Mary according to the use of Treguier (secundum usum Trecoriensem), followed by the 'Septem Psalmi' Penitentiales and 'Letania' (fol. 23^v), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 36), 'Commendacio Animarum' (fol. 55), prayers before and after Mass (fol. 69), and 'Centum Articuli se[u] Meditaciones Dominice Passionis . . .' (fol. 77^v). The use of Treguier is only indicated by a later note 'Dioc. de Treguier.'

B. 2 (fol. 95). A Dominican Processional, as used in the convent of nuns of St. Louis at Poissy (Sancti Ludovici Pissiacensis), see foll. 150^v, 153^v: with musical notes.

Several leaves are wanting at the end of the volume.

The binding is brown leather with elaborate gold tooling: 'D,' 'M,' and D + D, D + M, M + M interlaced occur (French, early 17th cent.?): and the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. f. 35.*

15783. 78. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., 1 + 197 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

'Heures de Nostre Dame,' according to the use of Paris, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1) and Latin capitula (fol. 13), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 79), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 98), Heures 'du Saint Esperit' (fol. 104^v), 'Les uigiles des mors' (fol. 110), the 15 Joyes (fol. 155), the 7 Requestes (fol. 160), votive Masses (fol. 171), and Commemorations (fol. 185).

Nearly every part is imperfect, leaves bearing illuminations having been abstracted after foll. 12, 18, 41, 51, 56, 59, 63, 66, 73, 78, 97, 154, and 159: leaving only two miniatures, at foll. 104^v, 110, with many

illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The volume was originally an octavo in shape, but the lower $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. of margin has been cut off, or folded in.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. f. 21.

15784. 77. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the early part of the 15th cent. in France: $7 \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 144 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, im*perf., preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania,' imperf.* (fol. 95), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 113), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 117), 'Hore Mortuorum,' imperf.*, containing only part of the *Placebo* (fol. 120^v), the 15 Joyes in French, im*perf. (fol. 126), the 7 Requestes in French (fol. 128^v), a French poem to the Virgin, *beg.* 'Glorieuse uierge diuine' (fol. 132) and Latin prayers: written for a lady.

Leaves bearing miniatures have been cut out after foll. 49, 76, 112 125 (several leaves), 126: but 12 fine miniatures are left, and many illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. f. 27.

15785. 78. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the first quarter of the 16th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ in., ii + 144 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rome, in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 7), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 10), and a Mass of the Virgin (fol. 13), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania maior' (fol. 61), Commemorations of Saints (foll. 75, 115^v) including St. Adrian and St. Hubert, and the Burial Service (fol. 91). At fol. 118^v are some added pieces, chiefly *Prosae*.

There are many fine miniatures, two full-page (fol. 19^v and fol. 90^v [the person for whom the book was written and his wife at table]), and many illuminated borders, chiefly in geometrical style, but in some cases themselves bearing miniatures or grotesques. The Calendar has a double set of appropriate pictures. One leaf, possibly blank, is gone after fol. 9.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 36.

15786. 79. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written perhaps in the 3rd quarter of the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., 173 leaves: illuminated.

'Les Heures de Nostre Dame, a lusaige de Beauvais' (secundum usum Bellovacensem), in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 47), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 107), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 114) and the Burial Service (fol. 121): a Commemoration of St. Blaise is added later at fol. 171^v. Stt. Lucien and Germer

are specially honoured in the Calendar. A rubric on fol. 21 shows that foll. 21-22, which are rather later than the body of the book, were written while Sixtus iv was pope (1471-84).

There are ten large and fine illuminations (one being cut out after fol. 22), and several illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Owned by 'Louie Guilloi' (16th cent.) and 'achepté par Estienne Griuel' (17th cent.)

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 13.

15787. 82. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the second half of the 15th cent. in France: $8 \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., iii + 132 leaves: illuminated: binding of sides, stamped leather, once on boards, contemporary (?).

Hours of the Virgin Mary, apparently according to the use of Evreux (secundum usum Ebroicensem), in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by a Commemoration of St. Nicholas (fol. 65), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 66), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 83), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 86), the Burial Service (fol. 90), the hymn 'Stabat Mater' (fol. 123), and a prayer to St. Catherine (fol. 125^v). St. Taurin is honoured in the Calendar, and on fol. 19 is a portrait of the lady for whom the book was written, but the only arms (fol. 5^v) are those of France.

There are seventeen large and fine miniatures (including *Les trois vifs et trois morts*, fol. 90), and some smaller, as in the Calendar, as well as illuminated borders (chiefly in geometrical style, with grotesques), capitals, &c.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 20.

15788. 83. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{3}{4} \times 5\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 203 leaves.

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 4), Latin capitula, &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 83), 'Les Heures de la Croix' (fol. 106), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 116), 'Les Vigiles' (fol. 124^v), the 15 Joyes (fol. 192), the 7 Requestes (fol. 198^v), &c. Foll. 23, 182 are later additions.

Many parts are mutilated, leaves bearing illuminations having been cut out after foll. 23, 35, 48, 60, 64, 77, 105, 115, 191, and 197 (the last bearing 'Les cinq plaies [de] Nostre Seingneur'). Only four fine miniatures are left, on foll. 56, 69^v, 83, 124^v, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

This volume is stated to be connected with the diocese of Meaux, but the internal evidence does not seem sufficient to establish the fact.

'Liger chanoines,' 'Liger' occur (16th cent. ?), and the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 23.

15789. 84. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{3}{8}$ in., iii + 183 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), Latin capitula and prayers, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 75), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 92), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 95^v), the Burial Service (fol. 99), the 15 Joyes (fol. 145, *imperf.), the 7 Requestes (fol. 149^v), and French hymns on St. Margaret (fol. 153, *beg.* 'Apres la sainte passion'), St. John Baptist and St. Lambert.

There are seven miniatures, one having been cut out after fol. 144; and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The book is stated to be connected with the diocese of Meaux, but the internal evidence does not seem sufficient to establish the fact.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 25.*

15790. 85. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{3}{4} \times 5\frac{3}{8}$ in., 272 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, perhaps according to the use of Bayeux with modifications, in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar and French prayers (partly in verse, *beg.* 'Ihesu crist qui as la puissance'), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 104), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 127^v), French hymns and prayers (foll. 132, 180: one long one is on St. Margaret at fol. 136^v, *beg.* 'Apres la sainte Passion'), the 15 Joyes (fol. 173), a Latin capitulum from St. John's Gospel (fol. 202^v), and the Burial Service (fol. 205).

On July 1 in the Calendar 'Nostre Dame des Cheueulx' is in red: this was the day of the consecration of the church of St. Mary at Jumièges (Gemeticum).

There are 30 fine miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On foll. 156, 202^v are arms showing that the book was written for a member of the family of La Fresnay, whose portrait with that of his wife is at the latter reference, while numerous entries on foll. 263^b relate to births in the family, 1592-1653, with a note of the surrender of Dourdan in May 1591.

See above.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 12.*

15791. 86. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{3}{8} \times 5\frac{3}{8}$ in., 191 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), and Latin capitula, and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 87), 'Hore de sancta Cruce' (fol. 107^v), 'Hore Spiritus Sancti' (fol. 115^v), the Burial

Service (fol. 121^v), the 15 Joyes (fol. 166^v), the 7 Requestes (fol. 172^v), and some Commemorations of Saints (fol. 176), and prayers.

There are nineteen miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 24.*

15792. 87. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{8} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., 114 leaves: illuminated: binding, see below.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, perhaps according to the use of Lisieux (secundum usum Lexoviensem), in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 4) and Latin prayers and capitula, and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 60^v), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 63), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 66), and the Burial Service (fol. 82). 'Sainte Uenisse' occurs in the Calendar on Feb. 26.

There are eight fine miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The binding is black leather with elegant gold tooling (French, 16th

cent. ?), with ·IESVS·MARIA· on each cover.

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Family notes of the Le Cordiers from 1556-1606 occur on the flyleaves.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 22.*

15793. 88. In Latin and French, on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., 196 leaves: illuminated: binding, black velvet over leather and boards, worn.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Tours (secundum usum Turonensem), in Latin: preceded by prayers, the 'Stabat Mater,' a French Calendar (fol. 6), Latin capitula, 'Les quinze ioyes de Nostre Dame' (fol. 35^v: in Latin, which is unusual, and seven in number), Commemorations (fol. 37), 'Les sept vers [de] Saint Bernard,' in Latin, &c.: and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letanie' (fol. 128), the Burial Service (fol. 144, *imperf.), and some added pieces. The Heures 'de la Croix' and Hours of the Holy Spirit are worked into the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 86^v, 88, &c. St. Bricius and Gatianus are specially honoured, and the 'Turonensis ecclesia' is mentioned on fol. 38: in the Calendar St. Venice is mentioned at Feb. 26, and 'La nostre myaoust' at Aug. 15.

Eight fine miniatures occur, with some small ones, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c., but leaves have been cut out before fol. 1 and after foll. 44, 143, 190.

The volume bears the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 34.*

15794. 89. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., 137 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Coutances

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(secundum usum Constantiensem), in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1) and followed by Commemorations (fol. 61^v), the Penitential Psalms, Gradual Psalms, and 'Letania' (fol. 82, *imperf.), and Burial Service (fol. 105, *imperf.). The Hours of the Cross and 'du Saint Esperit' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 33, 34^v, &c.

There are three miniatures (at foll. 13, 33, 34^v), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c., but leaves have been cut out after foll. 52, 81, 104.

'Des Carreaux' on fol. 12^v (17th cent.): the volume bears the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 18.*

15795. 90. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: 8½ x 6½ in., i + 122 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Coutances, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1: at Sept. 30 'Reliquiarum Constantie'), and followed by capitula (fol. 64), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 69), the Burial Service (fol. 86), and Commemorations (fol. 117). The Hours of the Cross and of the Holy Spirit are worked in at foll. 34^v, 36, &c.

There are twelve miniatures, and illuminated borders (with grotesques), capitals, &c.

'Ex libris Ludouici Lescruain de Bauua' (16th cent.).

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 17.*

15796. 94. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: 8½ x 6½ in., 118 leaves: illuminated.

'Hore beate Marie uirginis,' according to the use of Térouanne, in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), 'les xv ioies [de] Nostre Dame' (fol. 14), the 7 Requestes (fol. 18), &c., and followed by 'les v Goyes [= Gaudes] [de] Nostre Dame,' in Latin (fol. 56), 'Septem Psalmi Penitenciales' with 'Letania' (fol. 58), 'Vigilie Defunctorum' (fol. 72), 'Commendationes Animarum' (fol. 93^v), 'Hore de Sancta Cruce' (fol. 99), 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 102), 'La loenge [de] Nostre Dame' (a hymn, *beg.* 'Glorieuse uierge royne' (fol. 108^v), &c. A Commemoration of St. Apollonia is added, on fol. 117.

There are five miniatures (at foll. 13^v, 22^v, 57^v, 71^v, 105^v), with fine illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Avranches, in Latin, preceded by a Calendar, and followed by the Penitential

Psalms and Litany (fol. 80), the Burial Service (fol. 101^v), &c. The Horae 'de Sancta Cruce' and Horae 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 43, 44^v, &c., and some Commemorations follow Lauds at fol. 38.

There are twelve fine miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On fol. 15, 101^v is a coat of arms, gules, three cronels argent. Fol. 1^v contains two French notes about Jullien Dobeys or Doveys, *b.* 1526, *d.* 1568: and fol. 2 some more about the family of Hullin, 1621-4.

'Hore de beata Virgine Maria, secundum vsum Romane ecclesie,' in Latin, used in a French diocese, possibly that of Troyes, since the antiphon to the *Magnificat* in Vespers is altered to 'Beata mater et intacta' on fol. 104: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), the Hours of the Passion (fol. 13), the 'Stabat Mater' (fol. 48^v), capitula, &c.; and followed by prayers, the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 136), the Hours of the Trinity (fol. 159), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 165), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (now wholly wanting after fol. 172), the Burial Service (fol. 173), Commemorations (fol. 219), &c.

Very imperfect, leaves having been apparently cut out after fol. 18, 23, 26, 30, 34, 39, 53, 67, 75, 77, 88, 92, 94, 98, 105, 135, 158, 164, 172.

'Anne Molyns' (17th cent.: fol. 114^v): 'Nathan Wrighte of Englefield, 1720,' 'C. M 1731.'

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 14.

15799. 102. In Latin and English, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in England: 8¾ × 5¾ in., ii + 128 leaves: with some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the Penitential Psalms, 15 Gradual Psalms, and 'Letania' (fol. 61), the Psalmi de Passione (fol. 80^v), 'Quindecim oo. de passione Domini' (fol. 94^v) in Latin, 'Epistola Domini nostri Ihesu Christi quam manu sua propria scripsit ad Abigarum regem' (fol. 112), the seven Verses of St. Bernard (fol. 121), and 'This prayer made the gode vycary of Norwych mastre Richard Castre' (fl. A.D. 1380), in English (fol. 123^v, *beg.* 'Jhesu lorde that madest me'): and prayers sometimes with English rubrics. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin at fol. 37^v, &c., and there are Commemorations after Lauds at fol. 22^v.

The Calendar has 'dedicatio' ecclesiae, Feb. 14, 'Sancti Laurentij martiris' in red, Aug. 10, with octave, 'Sancti Leonardi abbatis' in red, Nov. 6; and there is a Commemoration (at fol. 33) 'de Sancta

Sytha.' This saint can hardly be other than Osith (Scytha, or Sith) honoured at the monastery at Chich, near Colchester, in Essex. The *Martiloge of Syon* states that St. Sythe was another name for St. Dorothy. The Editors of the *Acta Sanctorum* (under Apr. 27) state that there was a chapel of St. Zita an Italian saint in Ely Cathedral. The book would seem to be connected with the Eastern Counties.

'William Sauage his hand Wrightine' 17th cent.): sir Thomas Pope Blount owned the MS. in the 18th cent.

15800. 103. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $8\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., 97 leaves: with illuminated borders, &c.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), the 'vij Psalmi Penitenciales,' 'Quindecem Psalmi' graduales and Litany (fol. 40), 'Officium Mortuorum' (fol. 56), and 'Commendaciones' animarum (fol. 84^v). The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin (at fol. 24^v, &c.), and there are Commemorations after Lauds at fol. 20. Foll. 7, 95^v-96 are written later: on fol. 96^v is an 'Oratio bona . . . reuelacione diuina transmissa vni monacho de Binhym [Binham, co. Norfolk] circa annum Domini M.CCCC. & LXXXV.' A leaf is cut out after fol. 92.

In the calendar 'Sancti Hugo.Episcopi' occurs on Oct. 5.

Owned by 'Harry Daubney' (16th cent.).

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 6.

15801. 106. In Latin and Dutch, on parchment: written in A. D. 1503 in Holland by P. Raes: $6\frac{3}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 144 leaves: illuminated.

'Onser Lieuer Vrouwen Getijde,' in Latin, preceded by a Dutch Calendar (fol. 1), and 'Dat heyleghe Cruce Ghetijde' in Latin (fol. 14), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany, in Latin (fol. 61), and Dutch prayers (fol. 75), including some to St. Barbara and St. Katherine, and a dialogue 'Van der Ewighe Wisheit' (fol. 115).

There are eight full-page miniatures, and coloured borders, capitals, &c. On fol. 100 is 'Bidt voer mi xv^e ende iij,' and on fol. 139 'God zij gheloeft. Philippus Parman [?] alias Raes,' both in the scribe's hand.

'Godefridus' (fol. 143: 16th cent.?): 'Apres trauell respos [erased name, for which is substituted later 'S. Charlotte de Tambu'] 1625.'

Private prayers in Latin and English, written for a member of the family of Talbot earls of Shrewsbury. The four Latin capitula from the Gospels occur, and a short office of St. James of Compostella (fol. 69). On fol. 1^v is a shield bearing the arms of Belesme, Talbot,

Neville, Furnival, Verdon and Strange, surrounded by a Garter, and with a crescent for difference. The first who could have borne these arms was John Talbot, 2nd earl of Shrewsbury (*d.* 1460), but the writing can hardly be so early. His second son was sir James Talbot knight, born in the middle of the 15th cent.

There are several finely illuminated borders and capitals, and a few small miniatures.

Owned by dr. Thomas Rawlinson, whose distinctive binding the volume bears (red leather, with gold tooling).

15803. 109. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the second half of the 15th cent. in France: 5 x 3 $\frac{3}{8}$ in., v + 126 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rome, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 53), 'Hore de Sancta Cruce' (fol. 63), 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 66^v), the Burial Service (fol. 69^v), Commemorations (fol. 96), the 'Versus sancti Bernardi' (fol. 108^v), and prayers. The Calendar raises a presumption that it is connected with Le Mans, Angers or their neighbourhood.

There are four larger miniatures (on foll. 7, 16, 53, 69^v) and a few smaller, with illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

'Qui inuenerit hunc librum reddat Petro Balduino ['Baudoyne' in another place] Parisiensi aduocato et reddenti reddet gratiam,' 'in vico Serpentis . . .,' in red pencil, (17th cent.).

15804. 110. In Dutch and Latin, on parchment: written in about A. D. 1500 in the Netherlands: 5 x 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., iii + 180 leaves: illuminated.

'Die seuen Ghetiden Onser Lieue Vrouwe . . .,' in Dutch (fol. 16), preceded by a Dutch Calendar (fol. 3^v), and followed by Dutch prayers, &c. (fol. 29), among which are the 'Stabat Mater' in Dutch (fol. 50), 'Een deuoet exempel vanden heiligen Wonden ons Liefs Heeren Ihesu Christí ende wert gheopenbaert eender vrouwen gheheeten Brigitta,' the fifteen Oes in Dutch (fol. 66^v), 'Letania' of the Virgin, in Latin (fol. 115), Latin Commemorations of Saints (fol. 130, cf. 52), &c. &c. The 'Septem Psalmus' Penitentiales with 'Letania' follow on fol. 158, in Latin. St. Digna is honoured (fol. 58).

There are three miniatures on foll. 49^v, 58, 64^v, and some coloured borders, capitals, &c. On fol. 1 is 'Tot behoue van Digne Coels, Aen lien doet ghedincken.'

In the Calendar (Aug. 6) is 'Hier stert Peeter van der Baeken int jaer m. ccccc. end xxxvii.' On fol. 2^v 'Franciscus Havens van Loovens' (17th cent.). Two coats of arms are on foll. 95, 96, and 'Helmont' on fol. 176^v.

'Hore Beate Marie Virginis secundum usum Anglie,' in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), the 15 Oes (fol. 13), Commemorations (foll. 20, 47), 7 Joys (foll. 84, 97), prayers at different altars or figures in a church (fol. 87), the 5 Joys (fol. 98^v), the 'Septem Psalmi' penitentiales (fol. 101), 'Quindecim Psalmi' graduales (fol. 108^v) and 'Letanie,' the 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 119), 'Commendaciones Animarum' (fol. 144), the 'Psalmi de Passione' (fol. 158), the 'Psalterium sancti Iheronimi' (fol. 166), &c. There are four full-page miniatures (at foll. 118^v, 143^v, 157^v, 165^v), many smaller ones, and coloured borders, capitals, &c.

Owned by 'A. R.' (fol. 1).

Now MS. Lat. liturg. g. 3.

15806. 112. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in or soon after A. D. 1473 in France: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ in., 176 leaves: illuminated: binding, see below.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary (foll. 24, 106), in Latin, according to the use of Rome, written in a French diocese: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 4), capitula, &c., and followed by the 7 Joys (fol. 94), 'Officium mortuorum' (fol. 129), 'Suffragia' (fol. 171), and prayers, partly in French. There is a table beginning with A. D. 1473 at fol. 1^v.

There are three miniatures, rather damaged (foll. 24, 97, 128^v), illuminated borders, &c. On fol. 3 is a (later) shield, azure, portcullised argent, thereon a fess or; with the motto 'Perle des voyans,' which seems to be repeated on the binding as PDV interlaced: a small shield on fol. 24 seems to bear 'd g.' The binding is brown leather with gold tooling (16th cent.?).

'Anthoyne Berbonsier . . .,' 'Berbonserius,' 17th cent.: the armorial bookplate of 'Knox Ward, Clarenceux King of Arms,' (d. 1741), is in the book.

15807. 113. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 4$ in., vi + 151 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of the Benedictine monastery of St. Peter at Gloucester, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 4), 'Preces matutine secundum usum monasterii Gloucestrensis' (fol. 10^v), &c., and followed by the Service 'in Vigiliis Mortuorum' (foll. 108, 75), 'XV Psalmi [Graduales] secundum vsum

monasterii Gloucestrensis' (fol. 116), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 125), &c. The Hours of the Holy Spirit and of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin at foll. 31, 32, &c., and at fol. 53 are 'Psalmi post Completorium secundum vsum monasterii Sancti Petri Gloucestrensis.'

In the Calendar the obit of Serlo abbas is noted on March 3, and the 'Dedicatio ecclesie sancti Petri Glocestrensis' on Sept. 18: Stt. Aldate (Feb. 3), Teleau (Feb. 9), Gundleus (Mar. 29) and Egwin (Sept. 10, Dec. 30) occur. Leaves are wanting after foll. 13, 52, 74, 125. There are illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Owned by 'Royahe Welbeke [or Wellaby?]' and by dr. Thomas Rawlinson, who lent it to Hearne on 2 Jan. 1748.

15808. 117. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France or the Netherlands: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{3}{4}$ in., i + 171 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rome, for a French or Flemish diocese, in Latin: followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 74), the Burial Service (fol. 98), Commemorations (fol. 162), &c. The Horae 'de sancta Cruce' and 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 38, 40, &c.

There are six miniatures (at foll. 1, 38, 40, 73^v [mounted], 98, 108), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. f. 9.*

15809. 120. In Latin, on parchment: written in the Netherlands in about 1520-30: $6 \times 4\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 110 leaves: with coloured capitals, &c.: binding, see below.

'Hore sancte Crucis' according to a Franciscan use, of the neighbourhood of Malines (Mechlin) in Belgium, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by prayers (foll. 26, 58^v), the 'Septem Psalms Penitentiales' with 'Letania' (fol. 41), the Verses of St. Bernard (fol. 68^v), 'Suffragia sanctorum' (fol. 73^v), &c.

In the Calendar Augustus episcopus (Feb. 28, May 5, Aug. 28), Hubertus episcopus (Apr. 1, May 30, Sept. 30, Oct. 3), Rumoldus (July 1, Oct. 18), Godeleva virgo (July 6), Litbert (July 14), and others are honoured, and all but Augustus have Suffragia. Pope Julius 2nd (*d.* 1513) is mentioned on foll. 59, 71 in a manner which implies that he was dead.

The binding bears four identical panels, representing the Annunciation, with the legend round it 'aue . gracia : plena : dominus . tecum : ecce ancilla . domini Jan tys,' contemporary Belgian binding.

'E. B.' owned the volume (16th cent.).

Minor Offices and prayers, for use in some Netherland diocese (perhaps Liége), in Latin: among which are:—a Calendar (fol. 1), Offices for each day of the week (Trinity, the Dead, Holy Spirit, Saints, the Eucharist, the holy Cross, the Virgin Mary: fol. 13), 'Hore Compassionis Beate Marie Virginis, quas papa Clemens composuit . . .' (fol. 40), 'cursus sancti Bonaurenture de Passione Christi,' an office (fol. 41^v), 'Orationes de beate Virgine. Et primo Rosarium cum articulis [de] vita Christi . . .' (fol. 59), 'Planctus beate Marie virginis . . .,' the *Stabat Mater* (fol. 65^v), and Commemorations of saints, &c. in the order of the Calendar (fol. 77). The rubrics of some added prayers are in French.

In the Calendar Servatius (May 13), Lambert (Sept. 17) and Hubert (Nov. 3) are honoured, and Hadelinus (Feb. 3) and Fredeganda (July 17) occur.

15811. 122. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ in., vii + 164 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

' . . . Hore beate Marie Virginis secundum consuetudinem Anglie,' i. e. according to the use of Sarum, in Latin (foll. 27, 10, 101: in perturbed order): with prayers, 'Memorie' (foll. 17, 41), 'Septem Psalmi Penitenciales,' 'Quindecim Psalmi' graduales, and Litany (fol. 58), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 85), the 7 Joys (fol. 117), prayers at different altars or figures in a church (fol. 120^v), 'Commendaciones Animarum' (fol. 126), 'Psalmi de Passione Ihesu Christi' (fol. 140), the Psalter of St. Jerome (foll. 145, 147), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 46, &c.

Several leaves are wanting, as after foll. 57, 84, 146, and the one full-page miniature left (of St. Thomas of Canterbury, fol. 18^v) is utterly defaced: some small miniatures are left, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The whole volume has been bound with little regard to the proper order of the separate offices.

Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (March–Dec.: fol. 1), Commemorations of St. Mary Magdalene and St. George (fol. 7, cf. 28), the 15 Oes (fol. 10), &c.: and followed by the 7 Joys (fol. 56^v), prayers at various altars or figures in a church (fol. 59^v), 'Septem Psalmis' penitenciales, 'Quindecim Psalmis' graduales, and 'Letania' (fol. 68), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 86),

'Commendaciones Animarum' (fol. 111), the 'Psalterium sancti Iheronimi' (fol. 131), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 34, &c.

Leaves have been cut out after at least foll. ii, 16, 21, 34, 37, 41, 42, 43, leaving four full-page illuminations (at foll. 6^v, 85^v, 110^v, 130^v), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The birthday of 'Margareta Normanyyle' on 23 Apr. 1537 is noted in the Calendar. Some leaves are misplaced.

15813. 144. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England by — Tyryngton: 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ix + 203 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

The Full Office of the Hours of the Virgin Mary, as found in the Sarum Breviary, in Latin, preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the 'Septem Psalmi penitentiales' (fol. 43), 'Quindecim Psalmi graduales' (fol. 48: imperf.*), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 50), 'Commendacio Animarum' (fol. 73), and the Psalter (fol. 81: *imperf.), Canticles and 'Letania maior.' The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 19^v, &c.

There are many illuminated borders, capitals, &c., but several leaves have been misplaced in binding, and some have been cut out or transposed after at least foll. 19, 22, 49, 80.

On fol. 201 is 'Pauper tyryngton scripsit' in the hand of the writer of the volume.

Owned by 'Thomas White' (foll. ix, 1) in the 16th cent., cf. fol. 121.

Now MS. Bawl. liturg. f. 4.

15814. 152. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent., perhaps in the Netherlands: 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 155 leaves: with a few coloured borders, capitals, &c.: binding, stamped leather on boards, contemporary.

The Psalter in Latin, followed by Canticles (fol. 136), Athanasian Creed (fol. 147), and a 'Letanie des S[aints]' (fol. 149). Leaves have been lost after foll. ii and 105. The binding and Litany suggest connexion with the Netherlands.

Owned by 'Willyam vycount Beaumont' and given by him to his wife Elizabeth née Scrope, on 5 March 149 $\frac{1}{2}$ (fol. 105^v), but it may be doubted whether the writing is autograph: 'Ora pro Rowlando Hnnd [Hood] quarto die Septembris 1636' (fol. 105): 'Stolen from the Library and restored by Dr. [Richard] Lawrence June 20, 1812, who purchased it at an auction in London,' in dr. Philip Bliss's hand.

15815. 154. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 5 in., i + 88 leaves, in double columns: illuminated: binding, see below.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Le Mans

(Cenomanum), in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, &c., and followed by 'Suffragia' (fol. 44^v), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 50), the Burial Service (fol. 59^v), the 7 prayers of St. Gregory (fol. 83^v), &c. The Hours of the Cross and of the Holy Spirit are worked into the Hours of the Virgin at foll. 28, 28^v, &c.

There are twelve small miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The binding is contemporary stamped brown leather on boards, bearing the Crucifixion and Pentecost with 'Gerard' beneath, with clasp.

'Je suys a Matherie femme de Collas Delosmes. Qui me trouerra a moy ou me donne ie payre voluntiers vng minot de pommes. N de Lomes' on an erased note; cf. fol. 88 'Nicolas Delosmes,' 16th cent.: 'Amelot de St. Vincent,' 16th cent. There is the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault.

Now MS. Bawl. liturg. f. 32.

15816. 173. In Latin, on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. in France: 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 5 in., iii + 98 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rouen (Rothomagum), in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 2), capitula, &c., and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 54), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 56), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 58), the Burial Service (fol. 70), the 15 Joys (fol. 89), and 'Les Sept Requestes' (fol. 92^v). St. Martial is honoured, and on July 3 instead of June 30.

Foll. 1, 14-15, 24^b-25 were added in about 1597, to replace lost ones: there remain twelve original miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

15817. 174. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in the Netherlands: 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., 107 leaves: illuminated, mutilated: binding, see below.

'Hore beate Marie Virginis secundum consuetudinem ecclesie Romane,' for use in some Flemish diocese, in Latin: preceded by 'Hore canonice de sancta Cruce' (fol. 1), 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 5), 'Missa beate Marie Virginis' (fol. 8), and capitula, and followed by the 'Septem Psalmi Penitenciales' and Litany (fol. 66), and the 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 81).

Several leaves bearing miniatures have been cut out (before fol. 1 and after foll. 7, 16, 45, 65, &c.), leaving two only (at foll. 4^v, 80^v), with illuminated borders, capitals, &c. The binding is contemporary stamped leather on boards, made in the Netherlands, bearing some such words as 'Ke: ceste: liver: lert' (??) ['ke: geste: liver: lera.'? E. W. B. N.].

'Thomas Best his Book' (17th cent.): 'Thomas Jameson his booke 1697': in the F. Pole sale, March 1751, this volume was no. 1382.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rheims, in Latin: preceded by a French Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 46), the Hours of the Holy Spirit (fol. 49), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 52), the 15 Joys (fol. 64), the Burial Service (fol. 69) and a French devotional poem, *beg.* 'Après la sainte Passion' (fol. 94).

There are five miniatures (at foll. 8, 46, 49, 52, 69), and coloured borders, capitals, &c.

'Iean Henaulx' (16th cent.): 'Apartient a present a Jehan Cophigny on achepte a la vue Jehan de Foigny le 12 May 1622': the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Bourges (Bituricae), in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, 'Stabat Mater' (fol. 23), &c., and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 74), the 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 77), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 80), the Burial Service (fol. 93), the 7 prayers of St. Gregory (fol. 115^v), &c.

There are thirteen large and five small fine miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

'Ses Heures sont a Marie vraye femme de Guillaume de Villames [?] de Melun' (16th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 37.*

15820. 179. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 155 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Le Mans (Cenomanum), or possibly Quimper (Corisopolis, Cornouaille, see below), in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 2), seven singular miniatures of saints, &c. (fol. 14), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 81), the Burial Service (fol. 110), and 'Cy comment les X Commandemens de la loy' in French quatrains (*beg.* 'Ung seul Dieu de tous createur': fol. 150^v). The Hore 'de Cruce' and 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin at foll. 47^v, 48^v, &c.

There are seven full-page miniatures (see above), four others (foll. 22, 50, 81, 110), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The diocese is apparently Le Mans (the only variation from the

ritual being that the Antiphon following the *Magnificat* at Vespers is 'Sub tuum presidium' instead of the special one at Le Mans 'Salve Regina misericordiae': and several Cenomanic saints are honoured, as Stt. Aldricus, Julianus in red, Liborius in red, Bertrannus, &c.). Yet in the Calendar and Litany St. Corentinus is specially honoured, who was the special Saint and first bp. of Quimper (or Cornouaille), and a French 18th cent. hand attributes the book to that diocese, while the full-page illuminations are of a rude type more suitable to the western see.

On fol. 1 is a French name 'Aubert' (17th cent.).

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Coutances (Constantia), in Latin, preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 60), and the Burial Service (fol. 75). The Hours of the Cross and 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 33, 34, &c.

One leaf is lost after fol. 59, and three miniatures are left (foll. 13, 35, 75), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

In the Calendar at July 12 is 'Dedicatio ecclesie Constantiensis' and at Sept. 30 'Reliquiarum Constanciensium.'

The armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 19.*

15822. 181. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{3}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 126 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Coutances, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 2), and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 63), the 'Veni Creator' (fol. 92), the Burial Service (fol. 94), and 'Ad memoriam beati Germani' (fol. 124). The Hours of the Cross and of the Holy Spirit are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 36^v, 38, &c.

There are five miniatures (at foll. 14, 36^v, 63, 92, 94), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On fol. 92 are the arms, or two cinque foils, in dexter chief a lion passant gardant sable. The armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 16.*

15823. 182. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ in., vi + 141 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Coutances, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1) and capitula, &c., and

followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 62), the Hore 'de sancta Cruce' (fol. 79^v) and de Sancto Spiritu (fol. 83), Commemorations (fol. 86), the Burial Service (fol. 91), &c.

There are nine rude miniatures (one is lost after fol. 18), with coloured borders, capitals, &c. At fol. 90^{av} is a pen-and-ink drawing of Christ issuing from a tomb with the emblems of the Passion.

In the Calendar are the same notices of Coutances feasts as in no. 15821. For the binding see no. 16044.

The armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume. See no. 16044.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg.* e. 15.

15824. 185. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in England: 7½ × 5½ in., i + 108 leaves: illuminated: binding, stamped leather on boards, much worn.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: followed by the Penitential and Gradual Psalms and Litany (fol. 39), Burial Service (fol. 59: *imperf.), 'Commendacio' animarum (fol. 88), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 20^v, &c.

There are illuminated borders, capitals, &c.: a leaf or two are wanting after fol. 58. In the binding is part of a New River Company lease to 'John Hordy' 30 Mar. 1699.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg.* e. 5.

15825. 187. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 15th cent. in England: 7½ × 5 in., viii + 68 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

'... Hore beate Marie Virginis secundum usum Sarum' (fol. 17), into which is worked the Hours of the Cross (at fol. 32, &c.): preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by 'Memorie.' The order is disturbed in the (modern) binding and several leaves are lost. The proper order is foll. 1-6, 16-23, 7-13, 41, 32-3, 42-3, 47-8, 44-5, 50-51, 46. The Memoriae occupy foll. 14-15, 24-31, 34-39, 52-57, and two illuminations de Cruce are on foll. 40, 49.

In the Calendar St. Cutlac (Guthlac) occurs at Apr. 11: and St. Sitha (Osith: Apr. 27), St. Enswytha (Eanswith: July 2 & Aug. 31), and St. Ninianus (Sept. 16) are added later. At June 17 is 'Obitus Geruasij Clyffton armigeris anno Domini M^oCCCLXXX^o.'

There are ten full-page miniatures (one of Thomas a Becket's martyrdom, defaced, at fol. 25, followed by the hymn 'Gaude lux Londoniarum'), and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

Owned by Morgan Evan, 1716 (fol. 29), and John Jenkin, 1729 (foll. 23, 29, cf. 31).

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg.* e. 4.

15826. 189. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. in France: $7\frac{1}{2} \times 5$ in., i + 84 leaves: illuminated: binding, brown leather with gold tooling (16th cent. ?).

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Rome, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 3), capitula, &c., and followed by Hore 'de sancta Cruce' (fol. 44), 'de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 46: *imperf.), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 47), the Burial Service (fol. 56^v), 'Suffragia sanctorum' (fol. 73), &c.

This volume is stated to be of the 'Dioc. de Pamiers' (Apamiae), but the reason for the ascription is not apparent.

There are four large miniatures (at foll. 14^v, 44, 47^v, 56^v, one having been cut out after fol. 45), with some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 28.

15827. 193. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $10\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{7}{8}$ in., ix + 170 leaves: illuminated.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by the *Sabve Regina* with commentary (fol. 35), 'Septem Psalmi' penitentiales with 'Letania' (fol. 40), the 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 59), 'Commendacio Animarum' (fol. 83), the 15 Oes (fol. 93^v), Commemorations (fol. 99^v), including prayers at altars or figures in a church (fol. 108^v), 'Oracio venerabilis Bede presbiteri de Septem Verbis Christi . . .' (fol. 111^v), 'Versus beati Bernardi' (fol. 114), part of the Psalter, imperfect (fol. 115), the Psalter of St. Jerome, imperfect (fol. 122), 'Letania sancte Marie Virginis' (fol. 134), &c. St. Erkenwald is honoured in the Calendar, which suggests that the book was for use in a church (fol. 21^v) in London, or the neighbourhood.

Leaves are apparently wanting after foll. 6, 70, 77, 114, 122, 128, 144, but there is also some perturbation in the binding. There are thirty small miniatures, with illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

'E[lias] Ashmole': 'N.B. I purchased this at L^d Somers's Sale of MSS. [1738: no. 41]: it formerly belonged to Mr. Ashmole,' Rawlinson's note.

'Hore intemerate Virginis Marie secundum vsum Romanum curie totaliter ad longum sine require,' preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1),

capitula, &c., and followed by the 'Septem Psalmi Penitentiales' and 'Letania' (fol. 87), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 95), 'Hore sancte Crucis' (fol. 126), 'Hore de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 129), 'Missa beate Marie Virginis' (fol. 131), 'Suffragia sanctorum et sanctorum' (fol. 133^v), 'Septem orationes sancti Gregorij pape' (fol. 153), &c.

On fol. 1 is a coat of arms of a Knight of the Golden Fleece, argent three bars gules, surmounted by a marquis's crown (Boulainvilliers?): also 'Besnard' (late 17th cent.?). The armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. d. 2.

15829. 106. In Latin, on parchment: written in the first half of the 16th cent. in France: 8½ × 6½ in., ii + 174 leaves: with illuminated capitals, &c.

Prayers, hymns, &c. for private use, in Latin, preceded by a Calendar with memoria technica (fol. 2) and capitula. The chief contents are, an alphabet (fol. 40) with Pater Noster, Creed, &c., the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 48), antiphons (fol. 84) including one to St. Thomas (Didymus) at fol. 86, psalms (fol. 88^v), the Athanasian Creed (fol. 100^v), &c.

A leaf is lost after fol. 109: 'Clemens papa viii^{us}' (1523-34) occurs in a rubric on fol. 114.

On foll. 40, 48, 128^r, 142, 158 is the following coat, the separate parts of which appear to be not uncommon:—Quarterly, 1st and 4th, azure three pinetrees coupéd or, 2nd and 3rd, argent a fesse gules: over all a shield paly of six or and gules. The arms of N. J. Foucault are on the binding.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 40.

15830. 228. In Latin, &c., on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. i France: 3½ × 2½ in., i + 142 leaves: with some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin, preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 87^v), the Hore 'de sancta Cruce' (fol. 109), and 'de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 113), the Burial Service (fol. 118), &c. At fol. 139 is added a Commemoration of St. Sebastian, and (fol. 141) the hymn 'Vexilla regis.' Leaves are lost after foll. 28, 87, 117.

On fol. 142 is a note of the deaths of Nicolas Mongin Lesuty 'mon grant pere' and Toussaintz Mongin Lesuty 'mon pere,' both in 1522. 'Ex libris Nicholai Creaghe an. Domini 1683' (fol. 138).

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. g. 9.

15831. 230. In Latin, on parchment: written late in the 15th cent. in France: 3½ × 2½ in., iii + 157 leaves: illuminated: binding, red morocco, with some gold tooling (17th cent.?).

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Chalons-sur-

Marne (Catalauni), in Latin, preceded by a Calendar (fol. iii : *imperf., July-Dec. only), &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 68), a Prose to the Virgin (*beg.* 'Ecce ad te confugio,' fol. 96), Commemoration of St. Sebastian (fol. 106), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 110) and of the Holy Spirit (fol. 115), the Burial Service (fol. 120), &c.

There are six miniatures, worn, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c. In the Calendar St. Memmius is honoured (Aug. 5), and at Oct. 26 is 'Dedicatio ecclesie sancti Stephani,' at Chalons.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. g. 8.*

15832. 234. In Latin, on parchment : written late in the 15th cent. in England : 4 x 2½ in., iv + 75 leaves.

A collection of Latin Commemorations, prayers, and hymns, made from a Breviary by a Benedictine monk, apparently for use in St. Peter's Abbey at Westminster. They are largely connected with the services of the Virgin Mary, but also very specially with those of St. Edward the Confessor (foll. 36^v, 51, 59, 71, &c.), who is mentioned as 'patronus' on fol. 38. At fol. 1 is a Calendar, at fol. 7 a 'Letania,' and at fol. 13 the Burial Service. There are musical notes for Versicles and Responsories on foll. 15-21. A leaf is wanting after fol. 69.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. g. 10.*

15833. 235. In Latin, on parchment : written in the 15th cent. in England : 4 x 2¼ in., ii + 144 leaves : binding, stamped leather on boards, broken, with a rubbed name of the binder ('Joh' . . .').

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin : preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), the 15 Oes (fol. 13), Commemorations of St. Thomas of Canterbury, &c., and followed by the Penitential and Gradual Psalms and Litany (fol. 68), the Burial Service (fol. 89), the Commendatio Animarum (fol. 121), the Psalms of the Passion (fol. 138), &c. The Hours of the Cross appear to be worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 60^v, &c.

Almost every part of the volume is badly mutilated by a leaf or leaves having been cut out, as after foll. 12, 21, 22, 23, 24, 32, 50, 54, 56, 58, 60, 61, 67, 80, 89, 120, 137.

The Calendar is interesting, and seems to suggest the diocese of Lincoln (St. Hugh in red, Oct. 6 and Nov. 17) : it is certainly not a Sarum, York, or Hereford Calendar. On Nov. 3 the infant St. Rumwald is mentioned, who is generally connected with Buckingham and very rarely occurs in Calendars : there was a church dedicated to a St. Rumwald at Lincoln. On Dec. 14 St. Nicasius is in red.

15834. 236. In Latin and English, on parchment: written late in the 14th cent. in England: $4\frac{1}{2} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 277 leaves: with some coloured borders, capitals, &c.: binding, stamped leather on boards, injured.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by prayers and hymns, the latter partly in English, as at foll. 4^v, 19, 58, sometimes with French rubrics; and a Calendar: and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 113), 'Ordo [= Horae] Sancti Spiritus, quem composuit papa Benedictus [xii] anno Domini M^o. ccc^o xxx^o v^o . . .' (fol. 132), 'Oracio uenerabilis Bede presbiteri de Septem Verbis Christi . . .' (fol. 138), the 'Quindecim Psalmi' graduales (fol. 144), the Burial Service (fol. 146^v), 'Commendacio Animarum' (fol. 188), Horae 'de Sancto Spiritu, que debent dici . . . in commemoratione Sancti Spiritus' (fol. 210), a Litany (fol. 235^v), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 88^v, &c.

The occurrence of St. Withburga in the Calendar indicates connexion with the Eastern Counties. There are added entries of obits, &c., 1409 (at latest) to 1494, including the obits of Anne and John 'Oxenbregge,' 1494 and 1488, and 'Peter Lese yng' (?), 1412. Leaves are cut out after foll. 70, 78, 236.

Now MS. Bawl. liturg. g. 2.

15835. 256. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $4\frac{1}{2} \times 3$ in., vii + 197 leaves: illuminated: imperfect.

Horae 'de Sancta Maria,' according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by Commemorations (fol. 14), and followed by the 'Septem Psalmi penitenciales,' 'Quidecim Psalmi' graduales, and 'Letania' (fol. 83), the 15 Oes (foll. 116^v, 9-13), 'Vigilie Mortuorum' (fol. 122), 'Psalmi de Passione Domini' (fol. 167), 'Oratio uenerabilis Bede presbiteri . . .' de Septem Verbis Christi (fol. 185^v), &c. The Hours of the Compassion of the Virgin are added latter, at fol. 1^v.

The volume is much mutilated, small miniatures and leaves having been cut out (leaves after foll. 13, 25, 50, 70, 75, 83, 113, 167) leaving only three small miniatures (foll. 25^v, 58, 167), with illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

15836. 282. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 47 leaves: illuminated: imperfect.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: preceded by the 15 Oes (fol. 2), and followed by the 'Salve Regina,' with metrical exposition in quatrains (fol. 21), the 7 Joys in Latin (fol. 25^v), prayers at various altars or figures in a church (fol. 27^v), 'Oratio uenerabilis Bede presbiteri de Septem Verbis Christi . . .'

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(fol. 28^v), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 32), the Burial Service (fol. 40), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at fol. 15^v, &c.

Every part is mutilated by leaves cut out after foll. 6, 9, 16, 17, 18, 20, 27, 31, 32, 34, 39, 43, 47: one defaced miniature is left on fol. 6^v, and a few illuminated borders, capitals, &c. Saint Cytha (= Sitha, Zita, Osith?) occurs in the Litany.

'John Throkmerstone' (fol. 39^v: late 15th cent.?): 'Nathaniell Pallmer' (fol. 16^v: 16th cent.): 'Ex dono Joshue Worrall. A^o Dⁿⁱ 1715 Mense Julio': 'Codicem hunc, mihi mutuo datum ab amiciss. Viro Thoma Rawlinsono Arm., pervolvi Jan. 17, 1724. Tho. Hearne.'

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 8.*

15837. 288. In Latin, on parchment: written in the second half of the 15th cent. in France: 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 265 leaves: binding, stamped leather on boards, contemporary.

Part of a Dominican Breviary, in Latin: containing a Calendar (fol. 1: *imperf., March 7-end only); Psalter with some musical notes (fol. 9) with Litany (fol. 43); Proprium Sanctorum (fol. 46: Jan. 17-Nov. 29, but complete except one leaf; Commune Sanctorum (fol. 214); and Lectons for the Office of the Virgin on Saturdays throughout the year (fol. 228^v).

Leaves have been cut out before fol. 1 and after foll. 8, 14, 42, 45, 264. The House would appear to have been dedicated to Stt. Peter, Thomas, Vincent, and Katherine (foll. 45, 228).

'Ce liure est a seurs Marie Sanguin, Angelique Remon, et Anne Maillard, et Anne Du Bec dite de Boury, et Anne du Laurens' (16th cent.).

A Processional according to the use of Sarum, in Latin: with musical notes.

'Robertus Paternoster est possessor huius' (16th cent.): 'Jacobi Dowdall' (17th cent.?): 'Giles Burrowes, 1672': owned by dr. Thomas Rawlinson.

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. e. 45.*

15839. 800. In Latin and English, on parchment: written in or soon after A. D. 1404 in England: 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 124 leaves: with some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, or a Primer, according to the use of Sarum (cf. 'secundum usum Sarum,' fol. 11^v), in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1: imperf.*, wanting Nov.-Dec.), cycle of years, 1405-1539 (fol. 6), and a few psalms, graces, prayers, &c., including

a poetical paraphrase of the Ten Commandments, in English (fol. 14 : *beg.* 'The ten commaundementis that I have broke'), and 'Salve Regina' with Latin exposition (fol. 14^v); and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Ad quindesim Psalmos' with 'ad Leteniam' (fol. 62), the Burial Service (fol. 81), 'Commendatio Animarum' (fol. 112), &c. The Hours of the Cross are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin at fol. 43^v, &c.

Leaves have been cut out after foll. 5, 17, 29, 61, 80. In the Calendar is 'Obitus Willelmi North' (May 2), hardly later than the rest.

A Manual according to an English use, for the purposes of a convent, comprising a Sarum Calendar (fol. 3), benedictions (fol. 13), the Canon of the Mass (fol. 17), Masses throughout the year (foll. 25, 70), sequences (fol. 62), 'Ordo ad faciendum sponsalia' (fol. 112^v), 'Ordo ad infirmum visitandum' (fol. 120), Burial Service (fol. 127^v), 'Ordo ad cathecuminum faciendum' (fol. 139), &c.

The Calendar contains several items concerning the families of More of Church Oakley ('Ockley') and Bramley near Basingstoke, 1476-1582, and of Warham of Beaurepaire, 1581-95: and on foll. 12, 24-6, 28^v, 56^v, 69^v, 85-6, 150 (cf. 113) are personal notes of John More 1558-85. Many initial letters are cut out, and leaves after foll. 16, 61, 84, 108, 112.

The English in the Marriage Service at fol. 113 is in North English dialect.

See above.

15841. 303. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: 8½ x 5½ in., i + 134 leaves.

A Manual according to an English use, in Latin, including benedictions (fol. 1), 'Ordo ad Cathecuminum faciendum' (fol. 4), 'Ordo ad facienda sponsalia' (fol. 18), 'Ordo ad uisitandum infirmum' (fol. 30), the Burial Service) fol. 43^v), &c.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 44.*

15842. 304. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 14th cent. in England: 8¼ x 5¼ in., i + 454 leaves, in double columns: with one small miniature, and a few illuminated capitals, &c.

Part of a Breviary, apparently connected with the monastery of Hyde near Winchester, in Latin, containing the Proprium de Tempore (fol. 1), Proprium Sanctorum (fol. 179), and the Commune Sanctorum (fol. 410): at fol. 453 is a list of Benedictions. On foll. 168-178 are

inserted the services 'In festo dedicationis Ecclesie' (fol. 168) and 'In festo Sancti Sacramenti,' i.e. Corporis Christi (fol. 173^v: cf. foll. 382-3).

The connexion with Hyde Abbey seems to be proved by the honour paid to St. Judocus (Jodocus, Josse) at foll. 43^v, 189, 403^v, and similar marks.

The name of John Fursdon occurs written on foll. 133^r, 143^v, cf. 137^v, in the 17th cent.

15844. 309. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., i + 81 leaves: imperfect.

Part of a Processional according to an English use, in Latin: containing from Wedn. in Passion Week to Advent, and (fol. 59^v) the Saints' days from about Jan. 20 to Oct. 13, the feast of the dedication of the Church separating the two parts of the book, which is imperfect at each end.

Now MS. *Rawl. liturg. e. 47.*

15845. 310. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in England: 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 101 leaves: binding, red leather on boards (15th cent.).

'Martilogium,' a list of saints commemorated on successive days, in Latin. The Calendar which precedes (fol. 1) is a Sarum one, altered to suit the Benedictine abbey of the Trinity at Norwich (Mar. 8, 'Sancti Felicis . . . non Sarum sed Senodale': Sept. 24 'Dedicatio ecclesie Norwicensis Senodale': Oct. 16 'Dedicatio sancti Michaelis in Monte Tumba,' a chapel near Norwich).

At fol. 81 is a *Scala Caeli* of 31 or 30 steps, a theological treatise, *beg.* 'Primus gradus huius sacratissime scale est fides recta': at fol. 86 'Incipiunt monita de Soliloquiis Isidori excerpta, de consideratione tui ipsius, distincta per gradus triginta unum,' another *Scala Caeli*, *beg.* 'Primus gradus est de consideratione tui ipsius.' Some Latin Lections for the full office of the Virgin (fol. 90) and for St. Thomas of Canterbury (fol. 96^v) follow.

On fol. ii^v are notes of three Bedfordshire marriages in the 15th cent. (Amphill and Eyworth are mentioned). On fol. 9^v is 'Orate pro animabus Ricardi Fuller capellani & Ricardi Aleyne kerver qui dederunt hunc librum ecclesie beate Marie virginis de Bury sancti Edmundi anno Domini 1472.'

15846. 387. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 14th cent. perhaps in Ireland: $11\frac{1}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 191 leaves: binding, white leather on boards, contemporary.

A Sarum Processional, in Latin, with musical notes. The ownership below shows that the volume may have been written in Ireland: there is a service of St. Patrick on foll. 188-190.

On fol. 189^v is 'Jste liber pertinet ecclesie Johannis Evangeliste' (15th cent.) and a later hand has added 'Dublinie.'

15847. 388. In Latin, on parchment: written in the 14th cent. in English: $11\frac{1}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., iii + 126 leaves: binding, white leather on boards, contemporary.

A Manual according to the use of Sarum (foll. 38^v, 40, &c.), in Latin, with musical notes: comprising benedictions (fol. 1), 'Ordo ad faciendā sponsalia' (fol. 12^v), 'Ordo ad seruiciū peregrinorū' (fol. 21^v), 'Ordo ad visitandū infirmū' (fol. 24: *imperf.), the Burial Service (fol. 33). Foll. 72-123 is a separate part containing directions and services for Christmas to Easter, especially a long service 'in Festo de Corpore Christi' (fol. 101). The English in the Marriage Service is of a South England type.

Foll. ii-iii, 124-5 are leaves of a 14th cent. Missal: leaves are wanting after fol. 23, 100.

'Sum Ricardi Hunt ex dono generosissimi et optimæ spei juvenis Johannis Eden de Sudbury in Com: Essexiæ armigeri, quondam dilecti pupilli' (17th cent.).

Now MS. *Bawl. liturg. d. 5.*

15848. 387. In Latin, on parchment: written late in the 13th cent. in England: $10\frac{1}{4} \times 7$ in., ii + 114 leaves: with a few small miniatures, illuminated borders and capitals, &c.

A Gradual (Gradale), probably of the use of Sarum, in Latin, comprising the musical parts of the service of the Mass: Proprium de Tempore (fol. 1), followed by Kyries (fol. 49), Gloria in excelsis, the Trisagion, Agnus Dei, &c.: Proprium Sanctorum (fol. 75^v), Commune Sanctorum (fol. 93^v).

On fol. 111^v are two Sarum synodal decisions, in Latin, about excommunicate persons and the observance of feasts, hardly later than the rest of the volume: and on fol. 112^v a Latin hymn (*beg.* 'Fac cum vocante somno castum petis cubile') written 'per me Johannem Rows curatum de Radeford' (15th cent.) Two leaves at least are wanting after fol. 91.

The volume at present contains the Proprium de Tempore from Christmas, the Proprium Sanctorum (fol. 54), the Commune Sanctorum (fol. 130), and votive masses (fol. 136), and was probably written before A.D. 1115. A few leaves are imperfect. Foll. 1-2 are parts of a quite distinct 12th cent. missal.

'Edward Letts' owned the book late in the 17th cent. (foll. 13, 55, 59, 128^v).

15850. 390. In Latin, on parchment: written perhaps in the third quarter of the 14th cent. in England: 15 $\frac{3}{4}$ x 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 283 leaves, in double columns: with some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

A Missal written for use in the Benedictine abbey of Whitby, comprising a Calendar (fol. 4), Proprium de Tempore (fol. 12), with Ordinary and Canon of the Mass intervening at Pentecost, and Proses or Sequences at fol. 186, Proprium Sanctorum (fol. 201), Commune Sanctorum (fol. 250) and Votive masses (fol. 269). There are added offices at several points, as for St. Barbara (fol. 3^v), St. William of York (fol. 11^v), St. Anne (fol. 185^v), &c.

The proofs that the book is a Whitby missal are that the church contained relics of St. Peter, St. Paul, St. Hilda and St. Bega (foll. 216^v, 274), while St. Hilda, St. Bega and St. Cuthbert are specially honoured. It is odd that *Indract* should occur in the Calendar (May 8), and have an office (fol. 212^v), and St. Egwin be honoured (Sept. 10). A leaf is wanting after foll. 127, 230. Fol. 282 is a fragment of a Latin logical treatise (15th cent.).

15851. 394. In Latin, &c., on paper: made up of two MSS. (A, B) written in France: 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., ii + 284 leaves: binding, see below.

A. (15th cent.) 1 (fol. 25). The Hours of the Virgin Mary according to the use of Dol, preceded by a Calendar (fol. 7), &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 92^v), Burial Service (fol. 117), &c. The Hours 'de Cruce' and 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 53^v, 54^v, &c. The prominence given to St. Samson, Magloire and Turiavus (the first two, Brioc and Guillermus [of St. Brioc?], occur in the Litany) seem to prove the provenance. There are eleven fine large miniatures, and illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

B. (in or soon after 1504?) 2 (fol. 170). The Hours of the Virgin Mary according to the use of Rome, followed by the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 216), Burial Service (fol. 228), 'Loffice de la Conception

[de] Notre Damme,' the Hours (fol. 252), capitula and prayers, including the 'Stabat Mater' (fol. 264^v). Fol. 6 is a fragment of the Calendar belonging to this part, and contains a cycle of years from 1504 to 1527. The Hours 'de Cruce' and 'de Sancto Spiritu' are worked in with the Hours of the Virgin, at foll. 186^v, 187, &c. One miniature is pasted on fol. 216, and leaves are wanting after foll. 258, 275, 276.

Among the additions are (fol. 1) 'le libret de Ihesus,' a short collection of French prayers; (fol. 4^v) notes of obits &c. of the family of Matignon of that place, 1456-1510, chiefly copied from another record; and (fol. 166) 'Les noms de ceulx qui sont en la Confrairie du Psaultier [de] Notre Dame,' 11 names, 16th cent.

The binding is leather with fleurs-de-lys and other devices stamped in gold, and a picture of the Crucifixion on each side (16th cent. ?).

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, &c., and followed by the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 92), the Hours of the Cross (fol. 112) and 'de Sancto Spiritu' (fol. 119), the Burial Service (fol. 124), the Hours of the Trinity (fol. 175), Hours 'd[i]e Lune . . . pro Defunctis' (fol. 179), 'die Mercurij . . . de Omnibus Sanctis' (fol. 184), 'die Iouis . . . de sancto Sacramento' (fol. 186), 'die Sabbati . . . de Nostra Domina' (fol. 189), 'Octo uersus sancti Bernardi' (fol. 192), 'Responsorio Misse' (fol. 193^v), 'Antiphone . . .' All the above Offices, as far as the work of St. Bernard, are mutilated by the first leaf being cut out (after foll. 25, 63, 68, 72, 76, 79, 85, 91, 111, 118, 123, 174, 178, 183?, 185, 188, 219, cf. fol. 17^b): one small miniature is left on fol. 52.

'Clermont' is on fol. iv^r (16th cent.): 'Donné par m. le mareschal de . . . Sept. 1704': the armorial bookplate of N. J. Foucault is in the volume.

Now MS. Rawl. liturg. e. 29.

15853. In Latin and French, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in France: 6¼ x 5 in., 135 leaves: illuminated, imperfect.

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), capitula, &c., and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 70) and of the Holy Spirit (fol. 72), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 75), the Burial Service (fol. 88), 15 Joys (fol. 122) and the 7 Requestes in French (fol. 124^v).

Several leaves and miniatures have been cut out (after foll. 49, 63, 69, 71, 87), but eight large ones are left (at foll. 13, 18^v, 23, 41^v, 53^v, 57, 60^v, 75), and several smaller, with illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On foll. 133^v-134^r are a few obits, &c. of the Guiot and Maretz families, of Pontoise, 1512-73: the book belonged to Ambroise Maretz (née Guiot), in about 1512. This MS. was at one time called by error 'MS. Jones 47', then equally erroneously 'MS. Barlow 47.'

The Hours of the Virgin Mary, according to the use of Paris, in Latin: preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1: imperf.*; Jan.-June only), &c., and followed by the Hours of the Cross (fol. 69), and of the Holy Spirit (fol. 76), the Penitential Psalms and 'Letania' (fol. 81), the Burial Service (fol. 99), &c.

Nearly every part of the above offices is imperfect, leaves bearing illuminations having been cut out after foll. 3, 68, 75, 98, leaving two miniatures only (at foll. 12 and 81), and coloured capitals, &c.

The volume bears the arms of N. J. Foucault on the binding (a lion rampant crowned, surmounted by a crown), and his armorial book-plate.

'Onser Vrouwen Getide,' in Dutch, preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by 'Die langhe Cruus Getide' (fol. 49), 'Die Heilige Gheest Tide' (fol. 71), 'Die Wijsheits Ghetide' (fol. 88), 'Die Seuen Psalme Domine,' the Penitential Psalms and 'Letanie' (fol. 109), and 'Die lange Vigilie Circum,' the Burial Service (fol. 127).

'Lucy Claes Iisbrants wyf in Hoern' (16th cent.).

Now MS. *Rawl.* liturg. f. 8^r.

15856. 295. In Dutch, on parchment: written in the 15th cent. in the Netherlands: 7¾ × 5¼ in., iv + 124 leaves: with some coloured borders, capitals, &c.: binding, stamped leather on boards, contemporary.

'Onser Vrouwen Getide,' preceded by a Calendar (fol. 1), and followed by 'Die Heilige Geest Getide' (fol. 43), 'Die Cruus Getide' (fol. 63), 'Die Wijsheit Getide' (fol. 71), the Penitential Psalms and Litany (fol. 87: *imperf.), the Burial Service (fol. 98: *imperf.), &c. Leaves have been cut out after foll. 86, 97.

'Pieter Willems, Goeree' (16th cent.): 'Anna von Winkel' (about A. D. 1700?).

Now MS. *Rawl.* liturg. e. 9^r.

15857. 335. In Latin, on parchment: written in or soon after 1434 in Poland: $9\frac{1}{2} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., ii + 80 leaves: illuminated.

Private prayers in Latin, written and illuminated for the use of Wladislaus vi or iii, king of Poland (*d.* 1444). They are chiefly addressed to Christ or the Virgin and abound with references to a magic crystal (*cristallus*), which had the property of exhibiting 'omnia que in mundo in terra uel sub terra sunt sub quatuor elementis contenta,' and which is represented in trefoil shape at foll. 15, 72.

There are many miniatures of religious subjects, and in several the king is represented with the arms of Poland and a sceptre, always as a young man. There are also some illuminated borders, capitals, &c.

On foll. 78^v-79^v is a Latin epistle from Joannes Ferrandus a Jesuit to dr. 'Guerinetus' on the book, dated at Besançon 1654, perhaps a copy.

St. Wulstan is honoured in the Calendar, and among the additions in it are St. Oswald at Feb. 28, St. Keneburga at June 25, 'Obitus Roberti Russell anno Domini m^occcc^oxxx^oiiij^o' at July 13, and at Dec. 10 'Dedicacio ecclesie de Duryst' (Deerhurst?).

On fol. 260 is 'Iste liber pertinet magistro Wilhelmo Carsy . . . 16th cent., cf. fol. 256^v: on fol. 260^v is a note about Giles Reed born at the Wynieard [in Walton Cardiff?], 29 Jan. 157 $\frac{1}{2}$, and christened at 'Tewkysbwry.'

of sir Thomas Gresham,' with a copy of the ground plan of Gresham College, &c.: copied by 'Andrew Tooke' for his own use, partly at least in 1719. The Act passed the House of Lords, but was rejected by the House of Commons in 170 $\frac{1}{2}$.

'John Pulteney, 1618': 'March 19, 1659. This was founde amongst Mr. Jo. Dentons sons books': 'This belongs to the executors of Mr. Ed. Denton. Alex. Denton,' late 17th cent.

15896. In English, on paper: written in the second half of the 17th cent.: 11 × 7½ in., 33 leaves: binding, green leather with the arms of the Garter on each side (17th cent.).

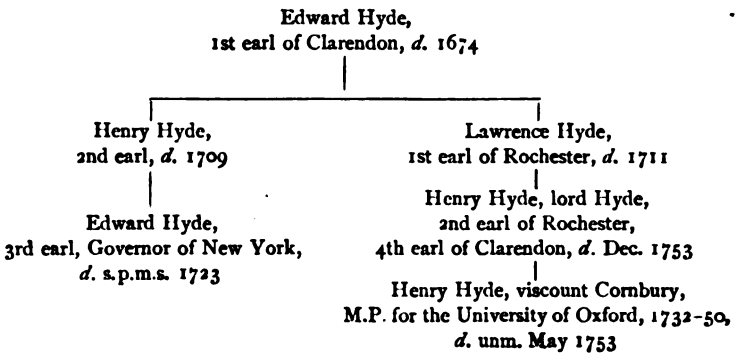
CLARENDON MSS., A. D. 1759—1888.

(Nos. 16088—16232.)

THE Clarendon State Papers cover the whole period of the Civil War, the Commonwealth and the Restoration until Clarendon's impeachment in 1667. They are supplemented by many volumes in the hand of the first Earl, and by papers of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th earls and of viscount Cornbury who died in 1753. The series is of great value for the historian of the 17th century, and undoubtedly in the Clarendon, Tanner, Thurloe (Rawlinson) and Carte MSS. the Bodleian possesses 'the great bulk of the [existing] general State Papers for the whole period of the Interregnum.'

Edward Hyde, the first earl of Clarendon, son of Henry Hyde of Dinton in Wiltshire, was born on 18 Feb. 160 $\frac{7}{8}$, and became a barrister of the Middle Temple. His first marriage (with Anne Ayliffe in 1629) connected him with the powerful Villiers family, and his second in 1634, with Frances Aylesbury, substantially improved his position. He represented Wootton Bassett and Saltash in the Parliaments which preceded the Civil War, and during the Long Parliament attracted the king's attention as a champion of the royal prerogative. Throughout the War he was prominent among the king's advisers, and took the leading part in the negotiations which preceded the Restoration. In June 1660 he was rewarded with the office of lord high chancellor, and in the next year was created earl of Clarendon. In 1667 his enemies procured his impeachment, and Clarendon fled to the Continent, where he set himself to literary labour, revising and completing his *History of the Rebellion* (which he had begun in 164 $\frac{1}{2}$), writing his autobiography, and composing essays and meditations on political and religious subjects, until his death at Rouen on 9 Dec. 1674. His daughter Anne married James duke of York and was the mother of queen Mary and queen Anne. From Oct. 1660 to Dec. 1667 Clarendon was Chancellor of the University of Oxford, where he had previously resided from 1642 to 1645.

The Clarendon papers, which are largely the materials on which the *History of the Rebellion* is based, were unfortunately not preserved together intact, and the following list of the successive sources from which the Bodleian collection was built up will illustrate their vicissitudes : but it should be remembered that the long chronological series of papers contained in nos. 16088-16179 was compacted from all available sources within the present century, and that the proximate provenance of many of the other volumes cannot now be ascertained. A short pedigree is necessary to show the connexion of the chief persons concerned :—



A (1759).

Henry Hyde viscount Cornbury, by his will, left all the Clarendon MSS. to the University of Oxford, directing that the proceeds of publication should be applied to building an academy for riding and other exercises. But as the testator died a few months before his father, in 1753, he never actually possessed the MSS., and the will was consequently inoperative. His sisters however, coheirresses of their father, carried out his intention, and in 1759 the bulk of the papers was received by the Library. The profits of the *History of the Rebellion* were partly used for the Clarendon Printing House built in 1713 (now the Clarendon Building), and partly in 1868 to erect the present Clarendon Laboratory. The exclusive right to publish Clarendon's *History*, enjoyed by the Clarendon (University) Press, is one of the very few perpetual copyrights allowed to exist. See also no. 16209.

B (1767).

Bryan Richards esq., of Mattingley, whose first cousin, lady Flower Backhouse, was the 2nd earl of Clarendon's 2nd wife, received from the 3rd earl some Clarendon papers. Some of these were obtained from

mr. Richards in 1757 by dr. Richard Powney, and part of these were in 1767 presented to the Library by dr. Powney's executors.

C (AFTER 1767 AND BEFORE 1773).

The executors of the 3rd earl of Clarendon were his godson, Joseph Radcliffe esq., a barrister (*d.* 1760), Thomas Chiffinch and lady Frances Keightly, sister of the 2nd earl. Rightly or wrongly mr. Radcliffe's executors regarded such Clarendon papers as came to them as having been the private property of the deceased, and sold them by public auction on 9-10 Apr. 1764. A large selection of these was purchased for £170 by the Trustees of dr. John Radcliffe, the celebrated physician, and many of these were subsequently presented by them to the Bodleian. These included nos. 16188, 16190-94, 16198 among others: but many lots, of a less important kind, known to have been purchased at the sale and deposited in the Radcliffe Library, have never reached the Bodleian.

D (PARTLY BEFORE 1773).

Through dr. John Douglas, canon of Windsor, bishop successively of Carlisle and Salisbury (*d.* 1807), the Clarendon collection received valuable accessions. He purchased papers from dr. William Guthrie of Brechin, the historian, and obtained some from viscountess Midleton (papers from the 1st earl of Clarendon to sir Allen Brodrick, ancestor of viscount Midleton), and presented both acquisitions to the Library: while through his mediation came documents from Thomas Astle (letters between Thurloe and Lockhart, and a treaty of Cromwell with the French, 1654), and from the earl of Hardwick (one paper about Spanish affairs).

E (1780?).

Some papers which dr. Powney had not obtained from mr. Bryan Richards were bought from a son of the latter by the Radcliffe Trustees, who in 1780 sent them to the editor of vol. iii of the *Clarendon State Papers*: presumably they were in about that year placed in the Library.

F (1781?).

William Man Godschall esq., of Albury, Surrey, was the possessor of 220 letters (lord Clarendon's correspondence with sir Edward Nicholas, 1649-57), and communicated them in 1781 to the editor of vol. iii of the *Clarendon State Papers*, after which they seem to have come to the Bodleian.

G (1785 OR 1786).

The marquis of Queensberry (lord William Douglas), a cousin of that marquis of Queensberry who married Catherine daughter of the 4th earl of Clarendon, presented nos. 16200-06, 16230-31, in 1785 or 1786, though the gift is entered under 1793 in the Bodleian Register of Benefactions.

H (1854).

Lord Derby presented no. 16214.

I (1860).

The Clarendon trustees finally handed over some papers in their custody, largely contained in an escritoire and chest which belonged to the first earl, the catalogue of which is probably nos. 16228-29.

J (1888).

After the death of dr. George Radcliffe, prebendary of Salisbury, in 1849, some Clarendon papers were unfortunately burnt as valueless, and only nine which survived (three letters from the duke of York (king James ii) to Henry 2nd earl of Clarendon in 1680; four from the duchess of York to queen Catherine of Portugal in 1679-80, and two from Lawrence Hyde while ambassador at the Hague in 1678) were presented by Charles H. Radcliffe esq. of Salisbury, after they had been printed in full in the *National Review* for Aug. 1888.

A fire at the earl of Rochester's house, New Park, Petersham, on 1 Oct. 1721, probably destroyed part of the original Clarendon Collection, and other parts are no doubt in private hands. Nos. 16209, 16211, 16225 with others, were at Cornbury house in 1751 when it was sold by viscount Cornbury to the duke of Marlborough. As late as 1789 a large trunk of papers belonging to lord Clarendon was in the possession of a country attorney (Nichols, *Literary Anecdotes*, ix. 277).

The chronological series of Clarendon State Papers, dealing chiefly with English history from 1608 to 1689, with a few earlier and later. The printed Calendar, see introduction, stops at the end of 1657, but is continued in manuscript as far as about 1663. The papers themselves are from almost all parts of the successive Clarendon donations.

16179. 93. (178 leaves) Papers of the same period as vols. i-iii of the *Calendar* (ending with 1657), omitted in the printed volumes; with a few earlier and later.

Sixteen ciphers used in the Clarendon State Papers on the royalist side.

16181. In French, Dutch, &c., on paper: written from (or soon after) 1642 to 1651: 15 $\frac{1}{4}$ × 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., 411 leaves.

Copies of letters and papers chiefly from, and all connected with, Johan van der Kerckhoven, baron of Heenvliet, 164 $\frac{1}{2}$ -51, addressed to the king and queen of England, the successive princes of Orange, &c.: some are from Heenvliet's wife, lady Katherine Stanhope, afterwards countess of Chesterfield, 1644-50. A few are in Dutch, the rest in French. See no. 14957 and *reff.* there.

This volume contains the manuscript pieces relating to the Spanish (1621) and French (162 $\frac{3}{4}$ -24) Matches, which are calendared in the *Calendar of the Clarendon State Papers*, vol. i (1872), appendix no. 1 (64 papers), preceding which are two papers (a letter from lord Digby, Aug. 1621, and a despatch from the Prince of Wales in Spanish, 1623) printed in the *Clarendon State Papers* vol. i (1767) appendix, pp. xiv, xxii. Charles i himself arranged these papers (with some others which have been taken out).

16183. In French and English, on paper: written in 1624-4 $\frac{3}{4}$: 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., i + 79 leaves.

This volume contains papers (holograph letters and drafts in French)

which passed between Charles i and Henrietta Maria before and soon after their marriage, 1624-25 (?), preceded by one from James i: printed in the *Calendar*, vol. i (1872), appendix ii: followed at fol. 37 by nos. 2277, 2294, 2360, 2362, 2357, 2369, 2368, 2386, 2381, 2400, 2379, 2411 in vol. i of the *Calendar*. The Library has also a modern transcript of the royal letters.

16184. In English, on paper: written in 1641-42: $14\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ in., 142 leaves.

Letters from Charles i to the duke of Ormonde, 31 Oct. 1641-27 Jan. 1642, partly in cipher: the first is dated 31 Oct. 1641 and appoints the duke to take charge of the forces intended to subdue the Rebellion in Ireland: the rest are *Calendar*, vol. i, papers nos. 1653-55, 1657, 1660, 1664-65, 1762, 1772, 1804, 1813, 1815, 1817, 1825, 1828-29, 1875-76, 1882, 1896, 1906, 2040, 2095 (a deciphered copy of 1815, and a partly deciphered copy), 2103, 2166, 2283, 2312, 2401, 2424-25. The Library has also a modern transcript of these letters.

16185. In English, on paper: written in or soon after 1651: $11\frac{7}{8} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., vi + 182 pages.

'A letter to the assembly of nobility & gentry assembled at Loughreagh [Loughrea] the 15 of November 1651,' by the duke of Ormond, containing a long and elaborate vindication of his policy in Ireland during 1650. The title is an added one, and the date at the end is 2 Dec. 1650, which seems to be the more correct. Letters, articles, proposals, answers, &c., are quoted in the course of the letter.

16186-87. In English, on paper: written in about 1660-62: $14\frac{1}{2} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ and $13\frac{1}{2} \times 9\frac{1}{2}$ in., 93 and 148 leaves.

Council notes which passed between Charles ii and lord Clarendon: the few which are dated are of 1660-62. They are chiefly single leaves, usually bearing the writing of both the king and his chancellor, having been passed from the one to the other, often more than once, in the course of meetings of the Privy Council. They are of a personal character, but of the highest importance as reflecting the private and extempore views of both on matters of state: the subjects range from constitutional principles to the question of hanging a man, or whether the king can get away from town for a few days. A few miscellaneous papers are included in the volumes. Specimens of the Council Notes will be found printed with a facsimile in T. H. Lister's *Life of Clarendon*, iii (1837), pp. 489-500.

Papers relating to the Colonies of New England between 1661 and 1713. The places or subjects specially prominent are New York about which there are many papers, 1667-1713; and the Five Nations of the Indians, 1701-08: there are also papers about the Bermudas (1661: fol. 1), Rhode Island (166 $\frac{1}{2}$: fol. 5), Connecticut (1660: fol. 10), Pennsylvania (1694-1701: fol. 24, cf. 160 'State of the case between William Penn & the Fords,' 1707), Canada (1702: fol. 38). Among the separate papers are:—*a.* (fol. 19) 'Copy of my L^d Bellomont's letter to my L^d Summers, N. York, 12th May 1698 . . .': *b.* (fol. 67) 'Journal of the General Assembly for . . . New York, . . . 5 Oct. . . . 1703' to 23 Oct.: *c.* (fol. 77) 'An Act for the defence of the Frontiers,' 1704: *d.* (fol. 217) '. . . Proposal as a means of the Advancement in the province of New York . . .,' by the rev. John Sharpe, 11 Mar. 171 $\frac{2}{3}$, suggesting a public school, library and chapel, and giving a list of books 'given towards laying the Foundation of a Publick Library at New York,' by Sharpe, 15 May 1715 (fol. 225). Some of the documents are petitions to the 1st earl of Clarendon: many are connected with the administration of his grandson the 3rd earl, as lord Cornbury, Governor of New York (1701-08): at fol. 205 is a letter from the latter (28 Apr. 1710), alluding to his 'escape' from New York, and at fol. 150 'Extracts from some letters & memorials relating to the Rt. H^{ble} the L^d C. . . .,' 1702-07, testifying to his care for the Church.

These papers appear from fol. 8 to be partly at least lots 105 (and 106-8?) on the second day of the Radcliffe sale, 1764.

16189. In English and Latin, on paper: made up of several pieces written in about 1660-70: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., viii + 176 pages.

1 (p. 1). 'A breife Narrative of the late Negotiation betweene his Majestjes Colony of the Massachusets, and . . . his Majesties Comisioners,' 18 May 1664-4 Mar. 166 $\frac{1}{2}$, followed by a Comment on it.

2 (p. 113). 'A briefe description of New England, the present Gouvernement & the Townes therein,' written in about 1670: *beg.* 'Westward from Pennobscott': the writer fortified a house in 'Winnisime' near Boston in A. D. 1625 (p. 6).

3 (p. 141). A Latin report by sir Walter Walker on the claim of France to the restoration of Nova Scotia (Acadia), written in about A. D. 1665, and signed by the author: *beg.* 'Recepto omni cum reverentia.'

16190-94. In English, French, &c., on paper: written in 1661-65: 14½ × 9½ in., 263 and 198 and 228 and 221 and 342 leaves.

Correspondence and papers connected with sir George Downing's diplomatic position at the Hague from 1661 to 1665. Many are to lord Clarendon, and in no. 16190 at fol. 4 are drafts of letters from lord Clarendon, July 1661-Oct. 1662, others being found throughout the general series which extends in no. 16190 from June to Aug. 1661: in no. 16191, Aug.-Dec. 1661: in no. 16192, Dec. 1661-Oct. 1663: in no. 16193, Oct. 1663-Apr. 1664: in no. 16194, May 1664-July 1665. Several are in cipher, and specimens are printed in T. H. Lister's *Life of Clarendon* (1837), vol. iii.

These volumes were lots 1-12 on the second day of the Radcliffe sale, 1764.

Now MSS. Clarendon 104-08.

16195. In English, on paper: written in 1660 or 1661: 12½ × 8½ in., xiv + 104 pages: binding, limp white parchment, with fine gold tooling, and blue silk strings.

An anonymous treatise of advice to king Charles ii apparently written in the 2nd half of 1660 or the first half of 1661, touching affairs of internal and external government, as well as such personal matters as the king's 'devertismentes'; in 15 chapters with a preface. It is no doubt by Clarendon, and here copied out by a clerk as a presentation copy to the king before his enthronement. Chap. 1 *beg.* 'I begin with the Militia firste.'

16196. In English, &c., on paper: written in about 1677: 15 × 9½ in., viii + 360 pages.

Copies of despatches from lord Berkeley, sir W. Temple and sir L. Jenkins, English commissioners at Nimeguen, almost all to the secretary of state, 3 Jan. 1677-14 June 1677. They deal with the negotiations for peace, but the fourth commissioner Lawrence Hyde is hardly mentioned. At the other end of the volume are copies of the credentials of all the ambassadors at Nimeguen, foreign as well as English, 167½ and 1677. About half the volume is blank.

16197. In English, on paper: written in 1715-21 (?): 12½ × 8½ in., 74 leaves.

Copies of 24 Protests of the Lords in the Upper House of Parliament, 18 Aug. 1715 and 13 Nov. 1721-5 March 172½, two in duplicate.

This was the first part of lot 103 on the second day of the Radcliffe sale in 1764.

Now MS. Clarendon 111.

- **16198.** In English, on paper: written in 164 $\frac{1}{2}$ -1672 or '73: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 1v + 650 pages.

The original MS. of the Earl of Clarendon's *History of the Rebellion*, almost entirely in the hand of the author, except that some documents are copied in the hand of his secretary Edgeman. The editions of the *History*, as is well known, are a patchwork of the *History* proper and the *Life* of the earl: this volume contains the whole of the *History* proper, ending in the 15th book with the words 'civillity, generosity, and bounty. Vid. pa. 549,' the reference being to the *Life* (see no. 16209). Three passages in bk. 16 which are taken from the *History* here precede the passage quoted above. There are some, but relatively not many, corrections in the author's hand. The first edition of the *History* (1702-4) was printed, not from this MS., but from nos. 16200-06: but the last edition (1888) is based on a careful collation of the original.

The first part of this volume appears to be lot 102 on the first day of the Radcliffe sale in 1764 ('First Draught of about Eleven Books of the History of the Rebellion in Lord Clarendon's own hand . . .')

- **16199.** In English, on paper: written not long after 1646 by W. Edgeman: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., 66 leaves.

An early draft of the greater part of bk. ix (with a small part of bk. x) of Clarendon's *History of the Rebellion*, in the hand of W. Edgeman the author's secretary. The copy is endorsed by Clarendon 'Concerning the western businesse,' and its composition was begun at Jersey on 29 June 1646. See Macray's edition of the *History* (1888), vol. i, p. xi and vol. iv, pp. 1, 8, &c.

Now MS. Clarendon 113.

- **16200-06.** In English, on paper: written at the close of the 17th cent.: about 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 10 in., 220 and 118 and 186 leaves and ii + 398 pages and 169 leaves and ii + 502 pages and 380 leaves.

The copy of Clarendon's *History of the Rebellion* (in seven volumes) from which the first edition was printed in 1702-04 at Oxford; including the first preface of the editor, Lawrence Hyde earl of Rochester, corrected by the writer. No. 16200 contains bks. 1-3: 16201, bk. 4: 16202, bk. 5: 16203, bks. 6-7: 16204, bks. 8-9: 16205, bks. 10-12: 16206, bks. 13-16. See no. 16198.

Presented by the marquis of Queensberry, probably in 1785 or 1786.

Now MSS. Clarendon 114-20.

- **16207.** In English, on paper: made up of 3 MSS. (A. B. C.) written in and soon after 1668: 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ × 10 $\frac{1}{2}$: 84 leaves.

A. 1 (fol. 4). 'A shorte view of the state & condicion of the kingdome of Irelande from . . . 1640 to this tyme, or, a Vindication of

his late Majesty of blessed memory . . .,' as far as 'unlesse those deliver'd to' in § 111 of the 1849 edition, in lord Clarendon's own hand. The treatise is an answer to bp. N(icholas) F(rench)'s *Narrative of the Earl of Clarendon's settlement and sale of Ireland*, (Louvain, 1668). A note by bp. J(ohn) D(ouglas) is on fol. 3.

B. 2 (fol. 28-33). A copy by W. Edgeman of part of the same, from 'giue orders and directions' in § 80 to 'soe good a countenance upon the' in § 96.

C. 3 (fol. 34). A copy of the Short View, made in about 1660 (?), with a motto on the first leaf in lord Clarendon's hand: from which the first edition was printed in 1720. This copy is probably a Carte MS. and is endorsed 'His Grace the Duke of Ormonds papers.'

16208. In English, on paper: written in part in or shortly before 1669: 13 × 9½ in., ii + 41 leaves.

'Characters' by the 1st earl of Clarendon, headed in his own handwriting 'Mountpelier Apr. 1669, and corrected by him.' The characters are of lord Digby (fol. 4), sir John Berkeley (fol. 28) and sir Henry Bennett (fol. 35).

Now MS. Clarendon 122.

16209. In English, on paper: written by lord Clarendon in and after 1668: 13½ × 10½ in., vi + 902 pages.

'The Life of Edwarde Earle of Clarendon,' dated at head 'Mountpelier 23 July 1668,' the first part ending with 'against all their machinacions. Mountpelier 1 Aug. 1670.' The second part entitled 'Reflexions upon the most . . . materiall passages which hapned after the Kings restoracion to the tyme of the Chancellors banishment . . .,' which is practically a continuation of the *History*, begins on p. 615 (dated 'Molins 8 day of June 1672') and ends with 'then oppressed him' (1668). The first part was largely incorporated in the *History of the Rebellion*, by the author. Almost the whole of the above is in the author's own handwriting. Pp. 885-908 are pp. 1745-66, 1743-44 of a copy of the MS. of the *History* (xii. 80 'the unjust displeasure'-xii. 120 'agree with those'), a passage almost throughout common to the *Life* and *History*, but in a later text than that printed, being corrected.

The MS. of the *Life* belonged in 1758 to the Marchioness of Queensberry and was deposited in the Bodleian as a donation from the Marquis on 18 Oct. 1759: see also p. 560.

16211. In English, on paper: written in the second half of the 17th cent. by W. Shaw: 15½ × 11½ in., 366 leaves.

'Religion and Policy; and the countenance and assistance that each should give to the other; with a survey of the Popes power and jurisdiction in the dominions of other Princes' . . . (printed as by the 1st earl of Clarendon, in 1811). This is a copy, by William Shaw the earl's secretary, with some corrections. Preceding it are papers, among which are three letters from Lawrence Hyde 1st earl of Rochester, 1710 &c., corrections by Henry Gandy, dr. Dodwell, and dr. Aldrich, and a memorandum of 7 June 1729 by Henry Hyde lord Cornbury (*d*. 1753). See preceding no., art. *h*.

16212-13. In English and Latin, on paper: written in about 1635-73 chiefly by the first Earl of Clarendon: 15½ × 10 and 12½ × 8½ in., 213 and 88 leaves: binding of no. 16213, leather with gilt ornament and strings (late 17th cent. English work).

Extracts from printed books chiefly in the hand of the first earl of Clarendon, 1646-73, almost entirely in English: as, in no. 16212, from Speed, Josephus, Plutarch, Livy, Hugo Grotius, Camden, some Latin bulls 1530-1643, &c.: in no. 16213, Barclay's *Argenis*, Plutarch, Thucydides, Bacon, Albericus Gentilis, &c. At fol. 8 of no. 16212 is a copy of the 3rd section of a work on the 'Elementa Philosophiæ' (17th cent.). At the beginning of no. 16213 are (*a*) 'Of Robert Deuereux Earle of Essex and George Villiers Duke of Buckingham. Some obseruations by way of parallell . . .' *beg.* 'Amonge those historicall imployments,' and (*b*) 'The Difference and Disparity betweene the Estates and Condicions of George Duke of Buckingham and Robert Earle

of Essex' *beg.* 'Though it shall appeare': both are copies endorsed 'For mr. Hide' and the latter was one of lord Clarendon's earliest compositions (about 1630-35?).

16214. In English, on paper: written in 1683-85 by the 2nd earl of Clarendon: 12½ × 9½ in., 69 leaves: binding, see below.

Eighteen letters from Henry Hyde, 2nd earl of Clarendon, to the earl of Abingdon as lord lieutenant of Oxfordshire during and on the suppression of the duke of Monmouth's Rebellion, 21 May 1683-9 July 1685: at fol. 59 are three drafts of replies, 8 and 10 July (1685).

The binding is tooled purple morocco (Oxford, about 1854): into the front cover is let an original pencil drawing of the duke of Monmouth 'by Foster.'

Presented by lord Derby in 1854: his letter of presentation is at fol. 2, dated 17 Oct. 1854.

16215. In English, on paper: written in 1627-67: 14½ × 9½ in., iii + 108 leaves.

Clarendon family letters, chiefly addressed to the 1st earl of Clarendon, in chronological order:—the writers are—*a.* (fol. 3) Henry Hyde, the chancellor's father (five, 1627-31): *b.* (fol. 12) sir Thomas Aylesbury the chancellor's father-in-law, 14 July 1634: *c.* (foll. 16, 51) Lawrence Hyde (one to his brother, the chancellor, *n. d.*; two to the 2nd earl, 1654): *d.* (foll. 18) the 1st earl of Clarendon, the chancellor (ten drafts, 1634-35, &c.): *e.* (fol. 32) Frances, the chancellor's wife (two, to her husband, 1658): *f.* (fol. 36) Anne duchess of York (eight, to her father, the chancellor, and to the 2nd earl, 1654-63, &c.): *g.* (fol. 55) Ann lady Aylesbury (four to her son-in-law, the chancellor, 1659, &c.; seven to the 2nd earl, 1655-60; one to her grandson Edward, 1660): *h.* (fol. 78) mrs. Barbara Inch (an appeal to the chancellor, her relation, 12 June 1660): *m.* (fol. 102) lady M. Orrery (to the countess of Clarendon, 11 June, 1667): *n.* (fol. 104) dr. James Hyde (to the 2nd earl, 22 Mar. 166½). At fol. 14 is a draft of the will of Henry Hyde, the chancellor's brother: at fol. 79 a mock decree about a wager between the chancellor and his daughter Ann. A list of the papers precedes, not quite corresponding to the present volume.

1 (fol. 1). Part of sir Edward Walker's *Journal of affairs in Scotland*, 1650 ('and principles, in defence'—'some others of the Committee' pp. 168-189 of the 1707 edition), in the handwriting of the 2nd earl of Clarendon.

2 (fol. 9). 'His Majesties Second Declaration . . . concerning Ecclesiastical Affaires' (1661?).

3 (fol. 25). 'Of the Interest of Princes and States of Christendome,' a political survey of Europe in about 1637, apparently by one who had much to do with the insurrection of the Grisons in that year.

4 (fol. 57). 'A nier Cursus Magnus, or, the ballance of Trade between then and now': 'Two Questions propos'd by a Friend . . . Answered by S^r S: C.:', written in about 1630-40 (?): *beg.* 'Since that of Intercursus Magnus.'

16217. In English, on paper: written in the middle of the 17th cent.: 14½ × 9½ in., i + 89 leaves.

'Jus Monarchiæ Anglicanæ, or, the right of the English Monarchy, wherein the sufferinges of . . . King Charles are sett forth . . .' by sir William Morton, whose name is written on foll. 1, 3. The treatise itself was written in A. D. 1648 presumably in prison, and this copy is not much later, and is in more than one hand.

16218. In English, on paper: written early in the 17th cent.: 12½ × 8¾ in., 52 leaves.

'Certaine notes gathered owt of the Recordes remaining in the Treasaurye, thexchequyre, the Towre, and the Kinges Benche, towching the kinges majestes title to the Souereyntie . . . of the realme of Scotlande . . .,' preceded by an index, and followed by some Latin notes on the same subject. The old foliation was altered to foll. '214'-'259' &c. of some volume. On foll. 46-7 are some Latin notes on the position of Cæsarea Lutrea (Kaiserslautern in Bavaria).

16219. In English, on paper: written late in the 17th cent.: 11½ × 8½ in., iv + 76 pages.

'A short and true narration of such differences as happened between the Venetians and Paul the 5th, with the agreement which followed between them,' 1605-10: *beg.* 'Italy had enjoyed.'

16220. In Italian, on paper: written in the second half of the 17th cent.: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{3}{4}$ in., 308 leaves.

United Provinces of the Netherlands. . . . In the yeare of our Lord: 1653.' The preface is signed 'T. G.,' and the period covered 1645-51: the text begins 'Though the superlative treachery.' The handwriting changes in several places and it is difficult to say whether the treatise is complete: while pages 109-12 seem to follow p. 27.

These were begun in about 1647 and laid aside in 1651 when he had reached the 70th Psalm. In 1668 the work was resumed and finished by $\frac{1}{2}$ Feb. 167 $\frac{1}{2}$, the date of the dedication. It was printed in 1727. The present volumes, which divide after the 56th and 109th Psalms, are a careful contemporary copy, bound in red leather with gold tooling and on every cover the arms of the author, combining Hyde, Langford and Aylesbury, surmounted by a coronet.

XV.

DAWKINS MSS., A.D. 1759.

(Nos. 16233—16292.)

JAMES DAWKINS, of St. John's college, Oxford (matr. 7 Dec. 1739) in 1751 accompanied Robert Wood in those travels in the East which resulted in the splendid works on Palmyra (1753) and Baalbec (1757) which were published by the latter. No doubt the greater part of the following collection of MSS. was acquired during these travels. On 14 April 1749 Dawkins was created D.C.L., and subsequently he was M.P. for Hindon from 1754 until his death in Dec. 1757.

In 1759 Henry Dawkins of St. Mary hall, Oxford, (matr. 30 Dec. 1745) presented his brother's MSS. to the Library, and on 3 July of the same year was himself created D.C.L. He was an M.P. from 1760 to 1784, and died in 1814.

The MSS. are described in the Benefactors' Register as *plus minus* 40 MSS. *Syriacos, Græcos et Arabicos*, and another Bodleian Register describes them as 'above 40.' With every allowance for the difficulty of ascertaining the exact number of unbound volumes, chiefly damaged at each end, it is clear that the present 60 volumes do not represent the original collection. Probably Henry Dawkins presented MSS. 1-35, 37, and 54 as Syriac MSS., MSS. 36, 38, 39 as Arabic, and very possibly MSS. Auct. E. 4. 22-24 (Menologia and Anthologium) as Greek—which would probably in 1759 make a total of 42. As most of the collection was in Syriac, other Syriac volumes seem to have been added on and called Dawkins A, B, C, &c. as far as S, (H at least was reached before 1787) and three more in later times. But in the absence of actual proof it has been thought better to deal with the entire set as if they formed the Dawkins collection.

XVI.

WILLIS MSS., A.D. 1760.

(Nos. 16294—16403.)

BROWNE WILLIS, of Whaddon hall, near Winslow in Buckinghamshire, was born in 1682, and educated at Westminster and Christ Church, Oxford (matr. 23 March 1708). He was a student of the Inner Temple, M.P. for Buckinghamshire 1705-08, and F.S.A. 1718. He received from the University of Oxford the honorary degrees of M.A. in 1720 and D.C.L. in 1749: and died on 5 Feb. 1760. By his will dated 20 Dec. 1741 and codicil of 25 Feb. 1758, he gave his MSS. and coins to the Bodleian, the former 'to be placed in the School Gallery next to those of my friend Bishop Tanner,' and the latter to be visited annually on St. Frideswide's Day, Oct. 19. He had before his death made many valuable gifts of coins, and had allowed the University to purchase his gold ones. The MSS. were received at the Library on 24 April 1760.

His character verged on the eccentric, and his liberality, industry, old-fashioned garb and curious ways were often commented on among his friends (see Nichols' *Literary Anecdotes*, vi. 186, viii. 217, &c.). The manuscript collections are chiefly the materials from which were published his *Survey of the Cathedrals* in England and Wales (except Canterbury, Exeter, Norwich, Salisbury and Wells, which though never printed are as well represented in the MSS. as the others), 1717-30: his *History of mitred Parliamentary Abbies*, 1718-19: his *Parochiale Anglicanum*, 1733: his *Notitia Parliamentaria*, 1716-50: and his *History of the Town, Hundred and Deanery of Buckingham*, 1755. But besides these there are large collections for every part of Buckinghamshire, for which he often employed an amanuensis, W. Slyford.

Soon after the collection arrived Humphrey Owen the Librarian wrote a list of the volumes received: and in 1873-76 W. H. Timberlake indexed fully the entire collection in manuscript slips.

HUNT COLLECTION, A. D. 1774-76.

Two sets of Hunt MSS. came to the Bodleian after the death of dr. Thomas Hunt, Regius Professor of Hebrew at Oxford, which took place on 31 Oct. 1774.

A. Soon after 8 Nov. 1774 were received (1) from Thomas Hedges, twelve books and two parcels rolled up, (2) seven books 'from the late lord Foley,' (3) one book from Deodatus Bye, (4) one book from dr. Letherland, (5) one large parcel containing Gagnier's collections for an edition of Abulfeda, 'from dr. Hunt.'

B. In 1776 were received 'Dr Hunt's Arabic &c. MSS.' 185 numbered (of which nos. 10, 30, 31, 45, 47, 63, 64, 69, 72, 84, 125, 144, 158 were wanting and 'not received at all'), fourteen folio bundles, eleven quarto bundles and three octavo bundles.

These MSS. cannot now be satisfactorily distinguished, but many form a part of 245 volumes in MSS. Bodley Oriental 1-575, which are precedent to (say) A. D. 1830, and yet are not marked in the handlist as belonging to an old collection. Nos. 314 and 411 at least are in dr. Hunt's handwriting. Under these circumstances the collection will be dealt with in general terms when the miscellaneous Bodley Oriental MSS. are reached in the second series of this catalogue.

XVIII.

BRADLEY PAPERS, A.D. 1776–1829.

(Nos. 16404–16454.)

JAMES BRADLEY was born in 1693 at Sherbourn in Gloucestershire, and educated at the Northleach Grammar school. On 15 March, 1718, he was matriculated as a commoner of Balliol college, Oxford (B.A. 1714, M.A. 1717, D.D. by diploma 174½). From about 1715 his uncle, the rev. James Pound (*d.* 1724), himself a considerable astronomer, fostered Bradley's scientific tastes at Wanstead in Essex, where his earliest observations were made. He became an F.R.S. in 1718, was ordained in 1719, and was elected Savilian Professor of Astronomy in 1721, a post which he held till his death, combining with it the Readership of Experimental Philosophy from 1729 till 1760. In 1732 he came to live at Oxford, but in 174½ being made Astronomer Royal he removed to Greenwich, still keeping up constant communication with Oxford, Wanstead and the earl of Macclesfield's observatory at Shirburn castle. In 1744 he married miss Susannah Peach, by whom he had a daughter; and died on 13 July, 1762.

His two chief discoveries, Aberration and Nutation, were made, after long preliminary experiments, at the end of 1728 and in 1747 respectively; and throughout his life he was an assiduous observer and calculator.

Dr. Bradley's papers passed to his executors, from whom all that were concerned with Greenwich were claimed in 1765 by the Board of Longitude, but after a tedious lawsuit the claim was abandoned in 1776, after dr. Bradley's son-in-law, Samuel Peach, had presented them to lord North, Chancellor of the University of Oxford; who in turn presented them in that year to the University on condition that the Greenwich observations should be printed and published—a condition tardily fulfilled in 1798 and 1805. It is not clear when the Bodleian actually first or finally received the papers: but in 1804 the Board of Longitude presented some Greenwich papers of N. Bliss and C. Green, and in about 1829 several miscellaneous bundles came after the death of dr. Hornsby, who had edited the printed volumes. On

2 May 1861 the University restored thirteen volumes of Bradley's observations to Greenwich, it having been represented that they were the only gap in the line of registers at the Royal Observatory. A further volume of Astronomical Observations was published in 1838; and in 1832 prof. S. P. Rigaud edited the Works and Correspondence of dr. Bradley. In this latter volume are printed a large part of the present collection, and many notes in red ink on the papers refer to the place where they will be found in print.

The papers were handlisted in 1890 and bound and foliated at the close of 1893.

16411 (8). On Motion.

16412 (9). On the density of fluids, and imparted Motion.

16413 (10). On Hydrostatics, partly (fol. 34) 'by Mr. Saunderson,' and (fol. 98 *rev.*) the Magnet.

* The papers are generally in Bradley's own hand, unless otherwise stated or implied.

16414 (11). On Natural Phenomena, a fuller form of no. 16404, in 4 lectures (injured at lower outer corner).

16415 (12). An abridgement of Lectures 1-5 (part) on the Properties of Bodies and Mechanics, delivered at Oxford in 1747 (not in Bradley's hand).

16416 (13). A similar abridgement of Lectures 10-19, on Optics and Hydrostatics: for lectt. 5 (part), 6-9 see no. 16420.

A Kew astronomical observation book (K. 14: chiefly concerned with the correction of the clocks) Nov. 1725-Dec. 1727. At the other end is a reduction of the Right Ascension &c. of certain stars in Flamsteed's Catalogue to the beginning of 1720.

HOLMES MSS., A.D. 1789-1805.

(Nos. 16455-16617).

DR ROBERT HOLMES was born in Nov. 1748, and educated at Winchester and New college Oxford (matr. 3 Mar. 1767, B.A. 1770, M.A. 1774, B.D. 1787, D.D. 1789). He was fellow of his college, and from 1783-93 professor of Poetry at Oxford. In 1795 he was made Canon of Christ Church and in 1804 Dean of Winchester.

In 1788 he began the task of collating MSS. of the Septuagint Version of the Old Testament, and from 1789 till 1805 published annual accounts of the progress of the work, for which he obtained large subscriptions, and which was intended to elicit a text based on a collation of all known Greek MSS. as well as old Versions in Armenian, Coptic, Georgian and Slavonic. In spite of interruptions, partly due to the disturbed state of affairs on the continent, Holmes and his collaborators amassed a great deal of material, and in 1798 Genesis was separately published, the work eventually comprising five folio volumes (1798, 1818, 1823, 1827, 1827), published at the Clarendon Press. After Holmes's death at Oxford, 12 Nov. 1805, dr. James Parsons became editor.

Each March or April the collations of the previous twelve months were exhibited to the Delegates of the Clarendon Press, and then deposited in the Bodleian, the editor being allowed to borrow them for the purposes of his work.

A handlist of the collection was made in 1890.

[In the following description of nos. 16455-596 a + following the number indicates that the volume now contains more items than when it came to the Library, — that it contains fewer. The discrepancy is to be accounted for by Holmes' and Parsons' power of borrowing the MSS., and the fact that the volumes remained unbound till 1894. The general size is about 13-14 x 9 in., unless otherwise noted. '&' between two numbers implies that the two collations are in one series, not separate. Some necessary lists are on pp. 634-41.]

BRIDGES' NORTHAMPTONSHIRE COLLECTIONS, A. D. 1795-96.

(Nos. 16618-16669.)

DR. JOHN BRIDGES was born in 1666 at Barton Seagrave in Northamptonshire, and was brought up as a lawyer at Lincoln's Inn. From 1718 till his death on 16 March 172 $\frac{3}{4}$ he was an ardent collector of materials for the history of his native county, not only himself taking notes throughout the county but also employing agents such as William Taylor (see nos. 16647-52) to do the same and to make copies from original records and manuscript collections lent by friends. Most of his collections are neatly written and carefully indexed: see no. 16656.

The collections devolved to dr. Bridges' heirs, and were at different times in the hands of a mr. Gibbons a law bookseller in London, dr. Samuel Jebb (who edited from them a small part of a History of the county, in numbers, in about 1735), William Cartwright of Aynho, and the rev. Peter Whalley. Under the editorship of the latter a first volume and part of a second were published in 1762-69, and at last a complete history in two folio volumes in 1791 at Oxford.

In 1795 and 1796 37 folios, 8 quartos and one octavo volume were received as a donation from dr. Nathaniel Bridges, and the few remaining volumes were probably soon after added. The collection was kept separate under Bridges' name until about 1885, when it was merged in MSS. Top. Northants: a full descriptive list of the collection was made in about 1875.
