THE search is on to find the best Amiga game in Europe. It is part of a prestigious new series of awards linked to the European Computer Trade Show to be held at London's Business Design Centre from April 1 to 3 next year.

National competitions will be arranged with the winners of each going through to the final at ECTS 90. Negotiations are underway with key industry organisations in France, Germany, Spain, Italy, Scandinavia and throughout the UK to coordinate the awards on the lines of the Eurovision Song Contest. The 23 award categories will be broken down into leisure, small business, trade and media sections. Judging will be by an independent panel of computer journalists from various countries.

"What makes these award not only different but more important than any other is the fact that they are European", said Michael Meakin, joint managing director of the Europess Group and chairman of the

Links cover the country

SINCE the new MicroLink communications service was launched, 124 extra telephone access points have been opened in various parts of the UK from Dunfermline in Scotland covering the Edinburgh area down to Plymouth.

This brings the total to 280 compared with the 63 which were previously available over British Telecom's PSS network which MicroLink subscribers used before they switched from Telecom Gold to the independent Istel-Inet network on October 1.

DEVPAC Developer, a professional version of HiSoft's assembly language development system has now been launched for the Amiga.

Offering more power and new options, it is aimed at professional users.

Main improvements over the ordinary Devpac Amiga version involve the handling of multiple filetypes, a new linker and the provision of dual debugging.

The assembler itself has

Assembler for the professional

been extended to allow the creation of multiple output file types independent of host machine. A new linker also allows this type of cross-development and the program can now generate absolute files and Motorola S-records.

The 68010/20/30/881/ 882/851 instruction sets are also supported, together with numerous new options for power users. Despite this increase in power, the assembler is actually faster than the original, thanks to new parsing techniques.

Using additional hard-, ware available for the Amiga, Devpac Developer allows dual machine development.One machine can be used to edit, assemble and link, then it can transmit the code to the other machine for execution.

In addition a special remote debugger, ostensibly similar to its MonAm predecessors, allows complete remote machine control, placing no special requirements on the remote machine.

This gives games programmers who tend to wipe out native debuggers their first chance to use what is a powerful diagnostic tool.

At least 1Mb of ram is needed on the development machine to use Devpac Developer. Price from £199.



In the drivin' seat



Juergen Friedrich: "I don't like driving very much"

FASHION is fickle, and the arcade industry is as footloose as any, other. Keeping up with the trends is hard work for the likes of Domark, the company which produces the official Atari coin-op conversions.

Mimicking the heavy duty custom hardware in the newest arcade simulators is tough. Hard Drivin' is the toughest. Juergen Friedrich is Domark's saviour. He is the man who has produced the stunning conversion. And he did it in C.

Juergen is something of a C fan. His first programming experience was in Basic and assembler on a Tandy TRS-80 and then on an Atari 800, the real precursor to the Amiga. He switched to C when he started programming professionally on an Apple II.

This led to producing some graphics routines for a CAD package. Away from the computer, Juergen is something of an arcade addict. He got to be very good at Star Wars, but hated pouring money into the coin-op. So he wrote his own version for the newly launched Apple Mac. And very good it was too.

After touting Star Wars around software houses for a bit he was approached by Domark, which had already won a fierce battle against other companies for the rights to produce a home computer version. Juergen dived into his C source and produced the excellent ST and Amiga versions, recently rereleased in the Star Wars Trilogy. Today they look a little simplistic, but there are new challenges, and Hard Drivin' is the greatest.

Starting with the ST version Juergen wrote the game in Turbo C with machine code subroutines. For the Amiga version he has used



"It is not necessary to do everything in assembler", he explains, "because only a very small percentage of the code is used at any one time. A lot of it might be in C, but while the action part of the game is running the computer spends 90 per cent of its time in the assembler subroutines.

"I've got a frame rate of 10 to 15 frames per second. I don't think any speed improvement from rewriting the whole game in assembler would be noticeable".

And he is probably right. The early demo looks great, but it will take a proper review to determine whether he has captured the true driving feel of the arcade original.

ZZKJ was the man for the job. It is doubtful that anyone else could convert an arcade game as mindnumbingly taxing as Power Drift. This stems from his training as a chip designer and love of a challenge.

Zareh (that's what the first Z stands for) doesn't like easy programming jobs. "I get bored," he told Amiga Arcade. "Because I understand how the silicon works, I can program at the lowest level, although this can cause some problems. I found a bug in the blitter that no one I've spoken to knows about".

It is these qualities, and the excellent Super Hang-On conversion, which led Activision to call on him again.

Before starting to write the code, ZZKJ played the game again and again until he got really good at it and knew the subtleties of the gameplay by heart. Then he set about satisfying the sometimes opposing objectives of playability and accuracy.

"Limited memory was the main problem, there are five courses, 12 drivers and 27 circuits. Squeezing that lot in meant something had to go. That something was rotation, because tilting the screen took three times the number of sprites and didn't have much effect on the gameplay".

There are a couple of touches only the Amiga makes possible. The score and extended time text use hardware sprites. ZZKJ's special technique which uses sprites instead of solids to emulate a 3D vector world benefits from the power in the Amiga Blitter.

The sky doesn't use the copperlist because the arcade version only has two sky colours. Driver characteristics have been faithfully replicated – the woman is the fastest of the 12 drivers.

The result is exciting, driveable and an accurate representation of what happens in the arcade. Practise with this at home and you will be able to impress the girls at the seafront.







S OMETHING terrible has happened in Fairyland. I mean to say, evil queens, incessant thunderstorms and various species of itinerant thugs and no-goods is one thing – a man can learn to live with that – but locking up all the cute nymph-like fairies in outsize bubbles is another bowl of washing up completely.

Your mission, and Mr Stormlord's, is to rescue said nymphettes and ultimately engage the wicked queen in battle for the party leadership.

You get a seemingly generous nine attempts at regeneration should you fall foul of the local flora and fauna, but you must also take into account the fact that Stormlord is a bit of a fairy himself – he is easily driven down the dusty way to death when confronted by anything more dangerous than a blade of grass.

I don't know, in the old days a hero would be knee-deep in gore with savage steel whipping the gullet out of everything that drew breath, and here we are with a bearded old pansy flicking little bits of pixie dust around the place, without much effect I might add. Caution is definitely recommended.

Rather than wait for a break in the weather you'd better get going, because you only have a day to save the universe.

By way of public transport, the fairy folk have enlisted a giant eagle which can be picked up at any convenient terminus. It may be a bit rough and ready, but it's a damn sight more reliable than BR.

I must say, Fairyland isn't exactly what I expected. It seems to be exclusively populated by irate dragons, poisonous caterpillars, silly old men with wands, murderous goblins, carnivorous plants and some strange lifeform which baffles any effort at biological definition. Sounds a bit like Format's office.

All of them are, of course, deadly and only some can be dispatched with liberal sprinklings of pixie power.

Gameplay will test you to superhuman levels of cunningness and dexterity as you balance on a daisy petal preparing to leap over a sticky, tricky venus plant or run the gauntlet of the dragon woods in



For a bit more excitement you can declare war on the peasants. who are revolting in both senses. For a little more rapid social

advancement you could always take yourself a wife from the gentry, but don't expect the dowry to be small. In this department your otherwise shrewd and cripplingly expensive business advisors aren't of any use.

This is a complex game, one that will take a long time to get very far. Unfortunately, the initial stages are so stunningly ennuie inducing that it would be a truly Herculean (sorry - don't know any Egyptian heroes) task, maybe even requiring the patience of Job as well, to get anywhere useful.





For the benefit of those who, like me, are new to the game, here's a brief run-down of the rules I have grasped so far:

1. A team consists of dozens of players, up to 11 are on the pitch at a time. Some of them have silly names.

2. Each member of a team can attack any member of the other team, with some minor exceptions, even if the referee is looking.

3. Each team has four attempts to get the ball moved 10 yards up the pitch towards the opposition's goal line. If they don't manage this, the ball is given to the other team, who have a go instead.

 Points are awarded if the ball is successfully transported or caught across the goal line.

5. There are four quarters, each of 15 minutes. Thus a game can last two hours.


And you thought the rules of cricket were strange?

GridIron! can be played with a friend or against the computer. The two-player option is more fun, but really needs two mice to play properly. If you only have one mouse and a joystick, you will have to keep swapping over with your opponent. Very annoying. There is an advertisement in the back of the manual offering to sell you an extra mouse. Very tacky.

Each of the computer players plays the game independently, with his own direction, speed and momentum. You select from a predefined series of team movements at the start of a play, and each player gets on with it. Later you can create and save your own movement patterns.

If you are interested in American Football, or even if you only enjoy simulations and sports in general, GridIron! demands a look. You too could soon be shouting "Hup! Hup!" and not know why.



It's a sideways scrolling saga, right to left, though there are sections where it pays to go up and down ramps, which introduces diagonal scrolling. Very smooth it is too, but unfortunately it's also very slow. So slow it has a detrimental effect on the gameplay.

Bin the duck, for that is thee, sets forth on a very strange journey through a rather hazard filled town. Chomping mouths dance along the pavement like Chinese firecrackers, while Zebedee-like creatures on springs hop around like demented one-legged grasshoppers.

A marker shows how far through the level you've managed to get. Expect something nasty at the half way point as well as at the end.

Bin is armed initially with only his fist, but alas this is one boxer who doesn't dance like a butterfly

Oh no, it's moose's head

and sting like a bee. He dances like a bricklayer.

There are three types of punch – regular pow, hold the fire button down and twirl the arm for big boy POW, and hold that fire button down until the sun goes supernova for mega POWWWW!!!

As you stop moving when the arm starts twirling, Bin has probably bin biffed by this time. Hohum, search out the extra weapons.

The most crude extra weapon is the armament of your average rioter, a supply of rocks. For the nasties further on you're more likely to need the exploding bombs with faces, which have a wonderful explosion, the flamethrower or the rocket launcher.

The homing missile rocket launcher is almost as good as it gets. The big problem is that every time a sprite runs into you – which is quite hard to judge as there is no depth to any of them, yet there is depth to the playing area – you drop any weapon being carried.

If something like the snake hap-


pens to be treading all over your feathers, as soon as you recover you are hit again without any chance to pick the weapon back up again. It can be very irritating.

The animation and the graphics of the characters, duck and the bad guys are all very good, but the mediocre backgrounds detract slightly. The music is very jolly and arcadish, but can grate – at least there are different tunes. My favourite is the Bongo special on the jungle level, which is pretty good.

The problem with Dynamite Dux, which scores well in the graphics and sound department, is that it can be irritating in some places, and too slow in others. That apart, it's a reasonably good conversion.

Now, if you'll excuse me I'm off in search of those pork scratchings to round off the brandy.

STRIDER More of the same

W ITH a metallic ching and a sampled yell of "Paw!", an animated figure runs across a landscape, chopping in half anything that gets in its way. Kill everything that moves and don't worry why.

Controlling this figure is quite exceptionally frustrating. She – yes, it's a girlie – seems to have an incredible urge to jump 20ft in the air, doing so regularly if you don't point your joystick in exactly the right direction.

Making a game challenging to prolong interest is all very well, but if thing get impossible no one will want to play it in the first place. We all know that getting the balance right is tricky, but Strider is close to the edge.

Technically, what we have here is a long way from being state-ofthe art. The playing area is a small rectangle way up the screen; the scrolling is almost awful.

Diagonal movement has been achieved by first moving the screen horizontally and then vertically in quick succession, with the result that the figure flashes between these two positions as it runs – the sign of a straight ST port caught red-handed. Which is a pity because the landscapes are all very well drawn and change sufficiently between levels to add that feeling of exploration.

After the initial frustration of getting acquainted with the controls, you can start to appreciate the game.

Strider reminds me very much of R-Type – you battle your way through several groups of baddies, picking up extra weapons until you meet the bigger-than- average baddie who lives at the end of the screen. In time honoured tradition, this bigger-than-average baddie needs more-than-usual hits to die.

Once you have done this, unless there is an even nastier biggerthan-average baddie to dispatch, you can move on to the next level.

Sometimes the baddie is just a large sprite, sometimes it's a bouncing laser beam. Always it only needs a bit of dodging and extra shooting. Not what you might call intellectually stimulating, but fun in a nihilistic kind of way.

In between each level you are given words of encouragement from your enemies, along the lines of "This is it, you're going to die". These are accompanied by some Polaroid Instamatic photographs taken with a camera one of the programmers must have got for his birthday.

A simple and annoying tune bleeps its merry way throughout, accompanied by the aforementioned metallic clang and gutteral cry as you wave your sword around in a threatening manner.

The speech at the start of the game which says "You dare to fight me?" soon has you shouting back some suitable responses. Come back the AY8910, all may be forgiven.

Enough. Strider has plenty of puzzles to keep you playing, all of which are of the "remember what to do here" variety. If it had some decent programming, it would have been good.





RED LIGHTNING Apocalypse Now?

NTHINKABLE though it may U seem, it has happened. What-ever caused it, whether by mistake or murderous intent, is now irrelevant as men and tanks line up either side of the great divide, waiting to pull the curtain on Armageddon. Whatever happened to the postwar dream?

What happened to all the nukes? Did the Green Party finally get their way and have them all destroyed? Did we shell out all that money to discover that Trident didn't work after all? None of these questions are answered in Red Lightning.

As the commander of either the Nato or Warsaw Pact forces it is your job to respectively save the world for democracy or save the world from democracy, with the help of your logistic talents, your cunning mind and, of course, a few hundred thousand foot soldiers. vehicles and planes, all armed to the teeth with death-dealing weaponry. I know whose side I'm on.

As the informed reader will realise, it will all develop into a battle of superior equipment versus superior forces. For some reason SSI assumes that the Sovs have initiated the aggression and that all the nice Nato blokes were at home with their wives and families when it started, so all three scenarios have the Pact at full mobilisation with the good old allies in various stages of disorganisation.

Battle takes place on an impressively large 54 x 54 hexagonal map covering Western Europe from Brussels to Gdansk and as far south as Munich, although some of it is sea, and naval battles aren't handled in this simulation. The display is colourful, easy to read and quite pretty.

Players take it in turns to move and assign orders to their units, each turn lasting 12 hours of game time. Nato forces always move last because of their more effective communication network, which can give them a distinct advantage as they can step out of trouble when they see it coming.

Air combat is directed by one of the menu options. Weather conditions are taken into consideration

RGGH! What have we here? A defection from the Code Masters naming department? An update of one of the oldest scrollers of all time? A tutorial on cooking eggs? A game about motorbike scrambling?

The latter is nearly correct. Super Scramble Simulator is really motorbike scrambling with one player. As everyone knows - or at least should know - that scrambling is a massed-start race, the game would be better called Super Trials Simulator.

Great attention to detail has been applied to this game, so much so that all of the actual game data lives on the second disc, with all the intros and tunes on disc one.

Instead of being purely two-dimensional, SSS dabbles with the other in a split screen display. The majority of the screen is the side on display, where the actual tricky bits are done, while a tiny strip underneath shows the overhead position.

This is only of use where narrow obstacles do not take up'the full width of the course; unfortunately that's the time you need your eyes glued to the main display.

And as Gremlin has been incredibly lazy, the screen is 22 per cent smaller than it should be, so each display is depressingly weeny.

The game is fairly standard stuff, much the same as KikStart gave us all those years ago on the C64. As in real trials, making mistakes (falling off) costs time, and the time limit is short enough as it is.

At least we're not left mystified by why our homunculus has just made like a projectile - SSS dispenses with the animation and prints up exactly why your time limit has been shorn of seven seconds.

What really annoys is that the SSS bike doesn't quite behave like

real life. You land on the back wheel, time loss. Land on the front wheel, no time loss. Back in the real world you usually lose first steering, then control, followed by balance and several ounces of flesh, by landing front first. Ouch.

The graphical detail almost merits description in graphic detail. The scoreboard has a collection of bystanders who have a large repertoire of moves, each subtle and easy to miss.



Other special operation features include deployment of parachute regiments, special forces and tactical battlefield missiles. Concurrent campaigns, which you do not control but can influence, run in Norway, Iceland and the sea around Europe.

The different levels and "realism toggles" provide the scope for a variety of game types from the purely strategic to real in-depth unit management. A wonderfully concise and yet informative manual tells you everything you could ever want to know – except where Mr Benn lived – and even supplies some of the formulae the combat algorithms are based on.

The whole war experience is driven by mouse with the aid of pull-down menus. Some annoying



features exist, like the inability to change your mind about troop movements, but I suppose if I complain SSI will only say that it adds to the realism of the simulation.

The computer is a worthy adversary and doesn't rely on cheating to bolster its overall strategy. It can occasionally get a bit thrown if you attempt something impossible or unusual, like a massive airlift of troops miles behind enemy lines to cut off supply routes, but it recognises and deals effectively with all the big plays.

With such a range of skill levels and great playability, Red Lightning is suitable for both novices and hardened warmongers. SSI has set the standard for strategy games on the Amiga.



SSS impresses the senses – there's no doubt about that. But it's either too badly planned or is too difficult to get into. The gameplay's stiffer than an uprated monoshock, which is a pity, because with a little more freedom, SSS would have been good.

W HAT is the secret identity of this superhero? Is it Ed, the high flying executive? No. Is it Armitage, the brilliant washbasin? No. Is it Joe, the mild mannered window-cleaner? Could be.

Life as a window cleaner isn't much fun. Tired of cleaning in the sunshine or staying home to watch the rain? So what are you going to do about it? Well, for a start you could do something about Ed, your fascist boss on secondment from the Waffen SS.

You just weren't cut out for following orders. Stand up to him – or better still run away, get away, far away. But where to?

Without giving too much away, it is fairly obvious from the title that there is going to be some sort of time travel involved – plus some trouble perhaps at a lesser known publishing house – so mapping may involve donning the pointy ears and taking a correspondance course in non-euclidian geometry.

Thus you embark on a journey which will pit you against aliens, spear weilding guards, savage chickens, mechanical monsters, swamps and the inevitable mad monks who will beat you to death as soon as pray for you. Better remember to take a packed lunch.

If you think a Wimp adenture is one where you must find a cure for your acne or rescue your pet hamster from the top of the wardrobe, then check this out.

All actions are performed with the mouse. Position the pointer anywhere in the play area, click the button and your character will move towards it. Not only that, but it does it intelligently, avoiding obstacles where it can.

The mouse can also select options from a set of text gadgets for the manipulation of objects. For example, if you choose Examine you will get a roving crosshair which will identify any objects it passes over. Further information is given by pressing the left button. Be sure to examine everything very thouroughly – some objects are very small indeed.

In a similar way you can take, use or operate any object on the screen or any of the objects in your inventory which pop up as text gadgets whenever relevant.

Graphically the game is wonderful, as you might expect from the same French programming team



that brought you Bio Challenge. The play area varies in size, adding variety and creating some very nice effects, especially the screens which have been edged in with silhouettes in the foreground. All that and animation too.








your route well in advance if you are to deliver the goods on time, and even then you've only got about a 50 per cent chance.

If you have a death wish, you have a choice of around a couple of hundred ways to die, all of them quick but not always painless. (Well, some of them brought tears to my eyes.) With about 100 locations, a quick sum will tell you that you are in constant danger.

The abundance of routes to a swift demise and the policy of keeping the player in the dark not only breeds paranoia but also helps to keep the game alive as you progress through it, striking the happy balance between frustration and boredom. You honestly don't know what's going to happen next.

Future Wars and the Cinematique adventure system may owe some of its design to earlier efforts such as the Sierra On-line series – for example the character's movement directed by the mouse pointer – but it is several miles further along the path to icon driven adventure enlightenment. Nice One.

the one, you'll need to recruit other characters, but unlike Dungeon Master this isn't quite straightforward – people can be dumped from your party and others hired at any stage.

Recruiting someone demonstrates the communications side of the game. Down the left side of the screen, under the pictures of the characters, are various menus.

To recruit potential allies, you'll need to praise them, to assure them of their worth, and then boast a little, because they aren't likely to join someone who doesn't think very much of themselves. You can also insult people, should the fancy take you.

On top of these options for interacting with other characters you can ask their name, reveal yours, and inquire about artifacts, legends and rumours. You'll need to, so don't go chopping everything that you encounter – the kiss-my-axe style of play is going to leave you floundering eventually.

The last of the communications options lets you praise and admonish members of your own party and shout to attract attention.

Operating a party in Bloodwych is complicated, which is one reason why, when it comes to combat, everyone is fairly autonomous. If you praise a character of yours too heavily, he or she will act more and more independently.

This could mean that as you approach a shopkeeper to buy something, Butch the Barbarian will suddenly leap forward and chop him to bits. The counterpoint to this is that if you henpeck them too much they will never do anything independently that is useful.

Each character has ratings for strength, intelligence, charisma and agility, and belongs to a character class – fighter, mage, assassin, adventurer – and a magic class, which are based on suits of cards, each representing a different aspect of magic.

U S Gold's timing is immaculate – not merely is the summer well and truly over, but these Games are set at the 1988 Seoul Olympics. So we are doubly out of date.

The delay can be almost wholly attributed to US Gold not being over keen the original Epyx PC version, and commissioning The Code Monkeys to do the Amiga and ST versions. It was the right decision.

After a rather neat opening sequence it's time to choose the players and their countries. Each country is denoted by its flag and a short burst of national

anthem, which is, again, rather nicely done.

There are eight events in total – two more than the usual six – and in competition any number of them can be played in any order. There's a good practice mode where any of the sports can be played singly, useful for learning up an event to thrash the competition next time around.

First on the list is target archery, and jolly playable it is too. Separate scenes allow you to choose the draw length and the aim, which leads up to the release of the arrow.

Six arrows have to be shot in 90 seconds, which is a bit of a rush. Hit the target and you are rewarded with a white rabbit running across

M



the screen – miss high or low and... No, I won't spoil the surprise for you.

Anyway, the whole thing is completely unauthentic because they've got the draw length all wrong. I know this because I'm a target archer, albeit a mediocre one.

Next off is velodrome cycling. This is done in a very swish filledpolygon track. The event is the exciting 1000m Sprint. Only the last 200 metres are timed, the rest being an exercise in tactics.

The idea is to let your opponent act as a windbreak until the last moment, when you scoot out for your final sprint.


The tactics are captured well, but the actual riders are too small to give any impression of the type of real-life acceleration that is needed – so explosive that bicycles have snapped under the strain. It's still my favourite event, though.

Springboard diving is good family entertainment, but perhaps a little too confusing to be anything else. Even with the initial run-up and jump timed correctly, a similar sequence of joystick moves produced either 1 per cent or 90 per cent of the top score. Your guess is as good as mine as to how this works out. But it's good for a laugh, with animated crowd and judges, plus something nasty that appears if you take too long.

Hammer throwing is straightforward. All this little beauty requires is the correct swing and the correct release timing, both of which are easier said than done.

There are a few ways of getting it wrong – release on the backswing for example, which makes a hole in the fence, and release at the side, which makes a hole in the monitor. There are more. Actually scoring points is far less interest-

ing. The 400m hurdles is run over

What is really nice is the tune, with a groovy James Taylor style organ break – James Taylor as in the eponymous Quartet, not as in BOF. Although running is easiest using the keys, a new keyboard for the A500 is a tad more expensive than a new Konix, so I'm sticking with the latter.

Most athletics games make the Pole Vault the difficult bit. The Games is an exception – it is very difficult, maybe even extraordinarily so. There are many variables to get exactly right, but I guess that's the way it has to go until someone thinks of a better way of presenting it. The vault can be made, but it takes a long time trying. Again, as in almost all the events, there are some laughs to be had along the way when things go wrong.

Making up the eight are the two gymnasium events – the rings and the asymmetric parallel bars.

The rings need fast and accurate movement between set positions, and then a hold in each position for two seconds. Like the diving, until you've become very experienced at the controls a random set of joystick moves can give as good results as following the script.

If you fail in any way, the little man – whose animation, like most of the competitors in most of the events, amounts to hundreds of frames – dismounts, and starts crying. Aww!

You then have the honour, or the ignominy, of being photographed

for the back page of a digitally plagiarised tabloid.

The asymmetric parallel bars – Epyx calls them Uneven, which is shorter and easier to spell – has your female competitor doing a set series of moves, egged on by her companion on the sidelines.

Again, random moves can prove fruitful, but then again they can result in the Back Splat Fall, which earns no points and is somewhat painful looking. Again, the tabloids are there to record your success or failure.

After all is finished there is a neat medal ceremony followed by a small closing ceremony, complete with flypast. And that's about it. Polished, very well presented, some good events, some bearable ones, and plenty of scope for competition.

Niggle the first: Although the graphics are good, only the top 200 lines are used – three marks deducted for that, I'm afraid.


Niggle the second: The game loader spends at least half of its time seemingly not doing anything, with the drive motor off. It's almost certainly de-compressing data, but it does make you yawn now and then.

Niggle the third: Even though The Games comes on two discs, it won't use the second drive. OK, so the code fills a 512k machine completely meaning that a second drive – which needs about 20k – can't be used, but why can't it auto-detect a disc change? We're talking "Insert disk into A: and press button" here. What a pain!

Niggle the last: The usual caveat about additional hardware should be heeded – The Games caused my elderly modem to get confused and hang the telephones for several hours. Not funny.





Everybody, that is, except for one. Some baldy old bloke with a face only the front of a very large truck could love will intervene, trying to do his dirtiest to stop you.





combatants sometimes look a bit murky - perhaps because of the choice of colours. Their animation isn't up to quite the same standard, either.


It's a good job Activision has

LSFAR The bitterest hill is hard to take

any sort of warning whatsoever. Anyway, then you ride into the much fabled metropolis of Hillsfar. Well, maybe they didn't have much to fable about in those days.

Travelling the highway is itself an adventure. Watch out for all the obstructions in the road - trees. puddles, bales of hay ... Added to that, the occasional crazed lunatic takes a pot shot at you from the trees. Who said raving paranoia was a disadvantage? If you don't believe in predestiny then you are going to be very upset by this game.

There are four character classes - fighter, thief, cleric and magic user. Each has three quests available to him, always the same and always in the same order. Of course, what you do in your time off is up to you.

You can become horrendously wealthy by offering to clean out various persons' chests while they are not about. You can also become horrendously dead 'cos if they catch you in the backstreets trying to pick door locks they're going to send you home to mother in a cardboard box.

The city includes a cemetery, an arena, a shooting range, various pubs - you can't get a decent pint of Guinness in any of them - and a fair sized sewer system. What you do is totally up to you.

There are other locations outside the city if you want to brave the equestrian challenge again, but they are only really worth visiting if you have to go there as part of a quest.

Otherwise you may as well have robbed somewhere closer to home, since once you break in, most places are the same - a maze with chests of booty lying about.

Sounds are generally OK but can be a bit strained at times, so they fit in excellently with the gameplay. To be truthful, it is probably a very accurate simulation of life in a primitive environment, it certainly captures the timeless tedium and pointlessness of it all.

The modus operandi of thievery has just reverted from touch screens and modems in high rise city offices to the more noble lockpicks and large swords in dank dungeons, but the quality of life is just the same.

Some of the little sequences you stumble upon, like the arena for example, are quite entertaining and graphically effective, but there is not too much to keep the interest above critical boredom level.





Then I happened across release v1.1 of QView. It was no contest. In 3372 unpacked bytes, author Lyman Epp has managed to shoehorn 18 keyboard control options for moving around a document, a hex display mode and an Ascii search routine.

Y OUR Christmas present from us and Commodore is something that money can't buy – the official Workbench 1.3.2 upgrade. Lots of those annoying little "features" in 1.3 have been fixed, and lots of those begged-for enhancements have been made, resulting in 20 replacement files.

This is going to be your last upgrade before 1.4 next century. Did I say century? Sorry, I meant year. It just seems like century. Anyway, make the most of it, is the point I'm trying to make.

Don't forget to have a gander at the ReadBeforeUsing file. It's a very serious licence agreement and you should compose yourself before reading it.

Banging your head against the wall will probably put you in the correct frame of mind.

I wouldn't for a moment dream of taking the mickey out of such legalese statements as "you may not decompile, reverse engineer, disassemble or otherwise reduce the software to a human perceivable form." No siree. You won't catch me pointing out that it would be impossible to reduce it to a human *imperceivable* form because if you did it wouldn't be any use because wouldn't be able to perceive it.

Nor would I suggest that "The licence is effective until terminated" is just another way of saying "Till death us do part", so don't read the thing aloud with a priest in the room or you may end up married to your monitor. (Go away, Green. No I won't be your Best Man.)

There's also a list of countries that you are not allowed to send the upgrade to. Poor old Hungary and Poland – make themselves democracies and they still can't own Amigas.

ISKDOCTOR doesn't work miracles, even though it claims to. It is such a cack-handed program to use that I was determined to put Dave Haynie's vastly superior DiskSalv on to the first cover disc.

From the letters and phone calls I've had, it seems DiskSalv's only slightly less confusing than DiskDoctor to those of you who are new to the CLI.

So here's a Workbench alternative, FixDisk by Werner Gunther. Jeff's three golden rules apply here: 1) Read the documentation thoroughly

2) Only work on a back-up of your corrupted disc, and

3) Don't rush, take it one step at a time.

Don't come crying to me if FixDisk makes an even worse mess of your only - albeit corrupted -

VD0:

RECKON I'm asking to a cover disc. The author, Perry Kivolowitz of ASDG Incorporated, isn't over the moon about the idea either. We share the same concern. Phone calls. And letters.

You see, VD0: does something very clever. It gives you a recoverable ram disc, like RAD:, only this baby is dynamic like RAM:, which means it only takes up as much memory as it needs.

If you copy lots of files to VD0: it'll reserve however much memory it needs to store that total amount of data. If you then delete some files, VD0: will free the memory those files was stored in.

Wonderful stuff. Totally transparent to the user. But there's a snag. And it's a biggie.

Perry doesn't guarantee that VD0: will work in memory mapped in at \$c1000. All 512k ram expansions map themselves in at that address. What this means in enduser terms is that VD0: won't work with a 1 meg Amiga – that is, one with only a 512k ram pack installed. It'll work on a vanilla 512k machine, and it'll work if you've expanded to 1.5 meg or more.



POSITIVE feedback has led me to think harder about the presentation of the cover disc. Many readers have written to say what a good idea it is to leave the CLI window open and include a few useful commands in the C directory

With this in mind I dug out a program I picked up years ago which lets me re-size and reposition the AmigaDos window from the Startup- Sequence.

When you boot the cover disc, it's WinSize that picks up the window, makes it smaller and moves it down to the bottom of the screen. The line in the Startup-Sequence which does this is:

winsize/winsize 0 210 640 46

When you double click on CD005 yuo'll see the method behind my madness. Like it? Let me know.

Dneishe Start

K ENNETH THORNELS. Is it pos-me a begging letter. Is it possible to offer your cover disc menu display to your readership on a future disc, he asked. No sooner asked for than got, Ken.

Select (aka Dneishe Start) is that program. And it isn't ours, it's - you guessed it - shareware.

The program has a couple of idiosyncracies (Otherwise known as bugs - Ed) which I'd better tell you about.

Firstly, it won't work with the 1.3 release of Execute, which is worrying. But it seems to run perfectly well with the Workbench 1.2 Execute command. You'll find that on the cover disc in the C directory.

The second problem is that you can't use boot sequences with spaces in their filenames. No, not even with quotes around them. So:

select "This Boot" "That Boot"

will not give the desired result. What you'll end up with is four menu selections to choose from: This and Boot and That and Boot. You have to use hyphens or underscores if you want to separate words. Like so:

select "This-Boot" "That_Boot"

It also refuses to load and run some commands correctly. It's trial and error time, I'm afraid. The only one I've found is EndCLI. I don't use that in my cover disc boot sequences any more, so I don't care. You may have to find a work-around.

And before I get a letter from the Format reader asking if it will assemble with the limited version of Devpac he got free, I don't know. Suck it and see.


PUZZLE

R IGHT now, this minute, there is someone dropping a disc in the post, or transferring a file by modem. Commonplace events among commonplace people. But these people are different. The disc contains illegally copied programs being sent to someone who has not paid for them. The files they are transferring are not theirs to upload.

They are the crackers.

Is their existence detrimental to the computer industry? Listen carefully as massed ranks of programmers leap as one to their feet and shout "Yes". They can sit down now. They have a vested interest. Listen again, and hear the crackers and the recipients of their copied software say "No". They too have an interest in this.

Let's step back and look at the issues. First, the two forms of piracy. Two forms you say? Yes, counterfeit and cracking. Counterfeit is rife in many industries, duplicating anything from perfume to plastic pearls. Ripping off packaging and designer labels to pass it off as the real thing. No one can condone this. It hurts everyone.

You buy Zappow2000, the fantastic new game. When you get home its packaging is not as good as it should be, but you play the game anyway. Your money has gone into the pockets of a criminal who made that fake. If you buy a word processing program and need support from the authors you'll be distressed to find that had you bought a fake the authors won't help.

So, counterfeit is wrong. But what of cracking? It doesn't do anyone much good. What crackers do is take programs and remove their protection so they are easily copied. Then programs are swapped between cracking groups, who compete to get the newest games out first.

Very little serious software circulates this way, mainly because the crackers tend to be kiddie shoot-'em-uppers who wouldn't know a good word processor if it leapt into their disc drive and typed the works of Shakespeare without the monkeys being in the room.

What do get around are beta test versions of games, mega-trained ones that have been modified to make them easier to play, or crunched versions of games on release. The crunched software tends to come with a number of other crunched games on one disc, all squeezed on so that the crackers can impress fellow groups with their cleverness.

And all these cracked discs carry the

modern irritation of computing - the demo. In the good old days (1986), demos showed off what the machine could do. Joe Public was well impressed. But cracker demos tend to be all the same. Pretty coloured screen - look, he can use the copper - pretty scrolly picture - er... and the blitter electropop music which goes on and on, and daft scrolling text, of the "Hi from Smegman of the Smegs and here is our latest disc so ya boo sucks to the noztrils of" type. Pretty for 30 seconds, useless thereafter. And usually as Amiga friendly as Jack Tramiel with a machine gun.

C RACKERS who write demos always go and beat metal with astounding regularity, with no care if it's upwards downwards or standing still compatible. They all seem to use two drive, one meg, A500s, and it's tough luck if you don't because these demos will break if you have anything else.

The demo reaches new levels of tedium with the mega-demo. Whole discs of demos, each one doing something more mind numbing than the one before. The crackers think you'll be impressed by 64,000 bobs on the screen. I'm not, and most people aren't. 64,000 bobs in a game would be a different matter, but your average cracker is too dumb to think of writing anything as complicated as a game.

As for the infantile groups themselves, they're like a cross between train spotters and D'n'D freaks, all trapped in their very silly world of swapping discs and writing demos. They seem to live in the postal version of cyberspace, oblivious of the world outside.

All pretty negative stuff. It's a pity really, because in that vast array of computer freaks there are occasional



SOUNDTRACKER treats music as numbers, not blobs on a staff. It divides up music into four tracks – one for each Amiga voice – of 64 events. Each event can be either empty, or signal a change to the sound playing on that track. You can have as many patterns as required and change their tempo, repeat or loop them to form music.

Initially this appears to need a lot of effort, but after you have the hang of the basic controls, Soundtracker works like a smart sequencer.

The latest version is v2.4. It has the ability to play 32 samples, known as presets in Soundtrackerese, previously the limit was 16 samples. There is a preset-editor with which you can manage your library of presets. This can be used as a separate utility. There are print options and lots of little useful goodies like a filter switch and a bug fix to make it friendlier to hard discs.

Because it is no longer a commercial program, Soundtracker hasn't been properly tested. It's got a lot of bugs in all the new parts of code. Version 2.4 is a master of confusing its screens with multicoloured garbage and then crashing. It's not OS legal, so won't multi-task, and still has disc names

for the preset library hardwired in. This is all very much in the style of the development of cracked Soundtracker, and it is a frequently voiced wish when Amigaphiles gather that the people who work on it should do a new commercial version.

But recently Soundtracker clones have started appearing, like Linel-Tracker, Pro-Tracker, Sidmon and Seq, all looking superficially like Soundtracker but often with major improvements internally to the code, and externally to the user interface.

Hopefully someone will write the definitive clone, Real Soon Now and then everyone can get down to exploiting the Amiga sound system the way Soundtracker users can.


Let me tell you the story of Soundtracker. Once upon a time, a German person wrote a rather average music editor called Soundtracker. It wasn't a masterpiece of code, but it was particularly liked by some German crackers who managed to get their hands on the source.

And they sat down and worked on it, tweaking and adding, changing and improving it. It's now the most popular Amiga program you can't buy.

Dozens of games out there have Soundtracker soundtracks. In its most recent incarnation it's a quite good music program, and almost all the demo writers use it.

Programming wise, it still is a mess. The cracker's code is leaping off into rom, fiddling with structures and generally abusing the operating system. To crackers, that doesn't matter, but to the rest of the world, kicking your hard disc controller into space is at least an irritation.

Some crackers and the original author are getting together to release a

new commercial version, properly finished and hopefully OS legal. But crackers are snobs, and don't like muddying their hands with commercial software writing.

Well, most don't, some have made the leap into commercial software and the programs (no names, no pack

Pirate-proof computers

COMMERCIAL programmers would like to see each computer built with a unique serial number in the rom. Modern mass production techniques make this economically possible, although it does mean using more expensive chips. When you buy a program it could use this code to decrypt the disc in a way which meant that it would only run on your machine.

It is an idea which has been proposed for the Amiga 3000, but that is a 16Mhz, 68030 Unix workstation. There won't be many kiddies in the playground with one of those.

But many people buy a computer because they know they can pirate software from friends. So it is not in the hardware manufacturer's interest to produce a pirate-proof computer. Some crackers even argue that because piracy helps sell hardware there are more customers for software in the future. In the end it's all down to conscience.



drill) are quite good. But the rest of the energy of other crackers just goes to waste in a macho fantasy.

The macho id breeds strange ideas into these folks. Like "C is for wimps, real men use 68000" and "Amiga operating system, yes that's the thing you kick out of memory first" and "Copper lists are for hacking and appending". All of which makes no real sense to anyone who spends five minutes with anything *but* the hardware reference manual and the odd Abacus book.

You aren't going to stop crackers, try as you might. You can help by not taking the software, or at least buying games you like when you see them on a cracker's disc. Telling the crackers their acts are illegal is a waste of breath. All you can really do is try and talk them into doing intelligent things with their Amigas.

Say to your local cracker: "So what? Any idiot can trash the machine and do pretty demos. Getting rid of protection is very clever but you aren't actually making anything". Are you listening crackers out there?

Real programming is a lot more fun. Writing programs that *do* things. It's why I and a whole lot of other people like the Amiga. Sit down and write a game, it's a whole lot more fun than writing a two- bit demo that will be in the "For formatting" pile at the end of the day.

Meanwhile, software developers, you might as well ignore these folks, because quite honestly no matter how clever a protection you put on your discs, crackers will get through it. It's not that they are smart, just persistent. No protection scheme can survive constant bombardment.

Programmers, get back to producing great software for the Amiga. Help organisations like FAST – the Federation Against Software theft – chase after the criminals. And please, stop putting those daft protection schemes on discs which just make life difficult for the legitimate user.

Nobody comes out well from this look at the world of piracy. The crackers are so disorganised and so macho motivated that you'll never stop any more than 10 per cent of them even if you try really, really hard.

And the crackers themselves have yet to realise that they are engaged in one of the most futile and dumb pursuits known to man, called achieving nothing.







W ANT to hear a success story? Well, once upon a time there was a man with a computer and a son. Both were very good at drawing. The man decided to get them both together, so he wrote a program.

He looked at the program and the program was good – but it could be better. So he developed mouse handling routines, drawing conditions, links and variable definitions. The man took his adventure writing utility – for such it had become – to Microdeal, which signed it up. And he lived happily ever after.

Now Microdeal hopes it can do the same. Talespin, incorrectly called an adventure *game* on the disc label, is a utility designed to help you make your own adventures, although Microdeal adds somewhat reservedly that it is useful as a teaching aid or for business presentations as well.

Programs created with Talespin are icon driven. This is a bit of a misnomer, because the icons are actually part of a picture. As far as the user is concerned though, he or she is just clicking on an area of the picture and not an isolated icon.

This effect is achieved by defining

each part of the picture separately and then overlaying them all, rather like the way an animation cell is built up.

Pictures can be drawn with the en suite art package or standard IFF files may be imported. At least that's what the manual says. The IFF files in question are only allowed to be 320 x 200, 16 colours – the NTSC standard favoured by the colonials. If you try loading anything else, it won't crop it – it won't take it at all.

This would not be the end of the world – nor indeed the end of the program – if it were not for the fact that the graphics package included is so primitive. Perhaps I am asking too much, but using an art package without a brush cutting option and associated tools sends me straight for an Aeroflot sick bag. (They are the biggest.)

As John Symes of Microdeal

Ripping yarns

explains: "The graphics package is not terribly good – but we always envisaged people using Neo or Degas (two ST art packages) and then importing images into Talespin. The internal package is really just for touching up and changing the colours".

This may account for the rather farout artistic style on the sample adventure included on the disc, which I had previously assumed to be attributed to an intimate knowledge of controlled substances, and I don't mean Apple roms.

T HE sound side of things is a little better, but this may be due to the fact that all it has to do is import samples and tag them on to the pictures. You can copy sounds which have been tagged on to other pictures or projects as well, but this is accompanied by a bad bout of disc swapping and menu clicking.

Sound can be replayed at a number of different frequencies, useful for trying to make out that you have more samples than you actually do.

If you want nice effects on your

own work then you will have to buy your own sampler and software. There are no facilities for editing sounds at all in Talespin. Presumably Microdeal reckons you need a sampler to import your own sound, and if you have a sampler then you probably already got some decent software to drive it. Fair enough, I suppose.

A demo mode can be set up to cycle through the screens and perform actions in a predetermined order. While this is not so useful for an adventure, it could be very handy if you want to create business demonstrations.

Menus are not the usual pull-down type, but are large speech balloon things which invert text on the option chosen. True Amigans will be ill at

Child's play to link pictures and sound to produce a story

P ICTURES and sound can be easily strung together in Talespin to make a story. This is achieved by using the program's variables, which are not quite true variables but are more like flags with a discrete number of values.

Choices are made by clicking on an area of the screen or highlighting an area of text with the mouse. These actions can then be interpreted to change the screen, play noises, change variables and so on.

For example, in an adventure story say you want to be able to go to a location and pick up a disc. First of all create the graphic for the disc and import it into Talespin. Then from the main menu choose Add Picture To Page.

After specifying the page, go to Variable Definitions, define a variable – let's call it *flag* – and give it two possible values: 0 or 1.

Set the entry condition for that page to zero. This means that when the program first enters that page, it will assign the variable *flag* to be have the value of zero. Add a drawing condition to the disc picture to prevent it being drawn when *flag* becomes 1.

Now add the condition to the drawing that it sets *flag* to 1. This means that when the drawing is clicked, the value of *flag* will change to 1, the drawing condition will no longer be met, and it will be removed.

Follow that? It's a lot easier following the menus because they are



ease in this unfamiliar environment.

The pointer has mutated into a great clumsy ornate arrowhead and the "busy" alternative has turned from the reassuring sleepy cloud to a strangely familiar looking bumble bee. Hmmm.

There is a modest online help feature, which is not context sensitive and only useful to the absolute beginner. Nevertheless, brownie points are awarded for its inclusion. All the menu options are fairly easy to understand, so you shouldn't need to have one limb in the manual all the time.

Ah, the manual. I knew I had



in plain English. The above set of operations will put your image on the page. When it is clicked it will disappear, as though it has been picked up.

From this example it is easy to see how this simple method of using variables as flags can produce some seemingly complex interactive systems. Sound effects, text and further screens can be added as options in just the same way as the variable was changed. It really is easy enough for a child to use.

forgotten something. Well, it's quite easy to really. It is well written, but so much of the program is intuitive and easy to use that there isn't a lot of point in looking at it more than once.

I looked at it about seven times in order to see if I was maybe missing something – but no, that's all he wrote, to corrupt the yankee vernacular.

The cunning idea of writing one large menu in easy to understand language has put an end to the manual being a creative requisite for decoding the options. It is quite possible to use this software without ever having seen the manual at all.

Talespin is being deliberately mismarketed. It was originally written for children to use, and it shows. All the features, right down to the menus and the shape of the pointers, have been designed with children in mind. That is not to say that it is inferior or nonprofessional, merely that it was designed for a different objective – one which it is much more able to accomplish.

John Symes himself used it to help his son learn to count, a task which it can perform admirably. With its completely icon-driven system, the kind of environment used by most education packages, it is very suitable for children to learn from. All the elements of early education are





AR be it from me to criticise the Collins English Dictionary, and while I certainly wouldn't disagree with the above definition, I think there's a case for adding 4. Citizen 120-D, the best selling 9-pin printer in Europe.

If you ask most owners of lesser machines than the Amiga what printer they have, the odds are that they will have a Citizen 120-D, a printer that combines respectable 9 pin performance with a very low price.

Amiga owners, being somewhat more discerning, need something a little better, and Citizen may just have come to the rescue of those people who broke their piggy bank buying the Amiga in the first place.

The Citizen Swift 24 is, as its name might suggest, a low cost, speedy 24 pin printer, which Citizen naturally hopes will do for the 24-pin market, what the 120-D did for the 9-pin. Consume it alive.

For £389 (not including VAT) you are paying for a chunky, yet stylish looking printer, 41cm in width, 32cm in depth and 13cm in height, a dimension to which the addition of the single sheet feeder adds to considerably. It's a small footprint for a 24 pin printer – they normally give the impression that the foot consisted of several elephants.

As well as a standard tractor feed, which is easily removed, there is the single sheet feeder as mentioned, which is notable for its sturdiness.

Single sheet feeders are normally

terribly wobbly and sloppy, but this one has some backbone. Usefully, it also has notches and symbols to mark the maximum paper width, and also where to set the guiders for A4 paper. No more printing and guessing.

One thing I wasn't too hot about was the hinged smoked plastic part of the cover. When closed it keeps the noise level down to less than 55db normally or under 52db in the slower quiet mode. But it forces the outcoming paper out at a sharp angle, risking the paper being re-fed and ruined.

It's simple enough to correct, you just have the top at a 30 degree angle, but there is more noise.

The small light which glows when the paper runs out has its function duplicated by a warning on the eight character, two line liquid crystal display. Dropping a sheet into the feeder while off-line results in the paper being sucked in.

The parallel interface comes as standard, but there is the option of installing a serial interface. More useful options include a colour kit and font cards. The lid on the serial interface and font card area doesn't have a fixed hinge, so once opened comes off in your hand. Don't panic, it's equally easy to refit.

There are menus covering emulation, font, copy mode, line spacing (6 or 8 LPI), normal or colour ribbon and character set (which ranges incredibly from the obvious UK and USA, to Denmark, Sweden, Italy, Japan, Latin America, legal, France and others).

Beside macro 1 there are a further three macros available for less obvious computer-printer configurations. All macros can be defined to match your computer setup.

Once redefined, you can save your macro permanently into the printer's eprom (electronically eraseable programmable rom), which will not only survive a power off, but when

You should note that although the manual states that you can redefine certain selections without having to save the entire macro into memory, they will reset to their original selections unless you actually have saved the macro.

There are three types of printer emulation predefined in the macros, Epson LQ850, IBM Proprinter X24 and NEC P6+.

A couple of the other external features are a paper adjuster which can accommodate paper from 0.06 to

Is the Swift 24 something to crow about? Do you find Citizen's figures hard to swallow? Duncan Evans takes a gander

0.1mm in thickness, and the large plastic switch to go from fanfold to single sheets of paper.

Peering into the guts of the machine reveals a print head with a large heat sink on top, which works very well since the printer wasn't particularly warm after I'd left it on for most of the day. Power consumption is a reasonable 90 watts.

For quality printing there are four NLQ fonts and one draft. These use 360 dots per inch for NLQ and graphic modes, and 120 DPI for the draft mode.

The fonts which are built in are quite nice except for the horrible sans serif face, and include Courier, Times Roman, Prestige, Helvetica and draft. Of course there's the option of plug in font cards from Citizen, or software driven fonts from your Amiga.

The print head itself has a life expectancy of 200 million dots (it must have been dull counting them) while the rest of the moving internals will see you through 4,500 hours. That might not sound a lot but if you used the printer for say 22 hours a week (which is seriously heavy usage) then the poor Swift would only fall

over after about four years.

One feature that helps keep that speed up is the printer buffer, which can store 8k of data. A really nice feature is that the LCD tells you what percentage of the buffer is full of data, so you can see roughly how long a document is going to take to print.

The output is pretty good, but not lipsmackingly amazing, which is to be expected since this is a budget 24 pin printer.

So that's the printer for you, and a delight it is to use as well. But what's the documentation like? The dreaded printer manual?

Thankfully since this one comes from Citizen Europe, as opposed to Citizen Land of the Rising Sun, it's in English, readable, helpful and informative.

Starting with how to unpack, assemble and set up for your first print run, the manual takes you through an excellent section on getting the printer to work with various computers, to a full and frank expose of how to program and control the printer yourself. Not a section for beginners. And remember that if you want to send funny commands from AmigaBasic you'll need to open a file to the printer. A simple LPRINT filters out clever codes.

Really swift?

SPEEDWISE manufacturers make great claims for the printer that all defy reality. If the designers think that 53 characters per second in NLQ mode (at 10cpi, or 64 CPS at 12cpi) is fast then I wouldn't like to see a printer they thought was slow.

For just chucking out reams of data the speed rises to a respectable 160 CPS at 10cpi, and almost 9 pin speeds with 192 CPS at 12cpi. But if you wanted fast and cheap output then you wouldn't buy this printer.

The speed for decent quality output is disappointing. All of which makes the title Swift 24 something of a misnomer. Stride 24 or maybe even Hasty 24 would have been more accurate. Doesn't sound as good? Oh well, that's marketing for you. With a two year guarantee from Citizen, a set of decent quality typefaces built in supplemented with the option to add more, reasonably spritely printing speed, a clear and useful manual, you have all the ingredients for a nice printer. Size is just the icing on the cake.



Custom hardware is the key to allowing the Amiga to multi-task, something which the competition in the business market still can't get working efficiently.

The Amiga's custom chips contain special circuitry to detect collisions between objects on the screen. These objects can be either sprites or playfields. The Amiga has eight sprites - four in overscan mode - and either one playfield containing up to six bitplanes or two playfields in dual playfield mode containing up to three bitplanes each.

If you have set up a display consisting of several playfields and sprites you have to tell the system in which order you want to display them - whether you want the sprites in front of the playfield, behind the playfield or in between two in dual playfield mode.

This is done with by setting the "video priorities" in the BPLCON2 hardware register (\$dff104). Sprites have a fixed priority relative to each other. If all eight sprites are set to overlap, you will see that sprite 0 appears to be on top and sprite 7 at the bottom - that is, it has the lowest priority. You cannot change the priority of the sprites relative to each other.

Collision detection the hardware way is easy when Jolyon Ralph shows how

In dual playfield mode, playfield 1 will appear above playfield 2. This can be reversed by setting bit 6 of BPLCON2.

The playfield priorities are then set relative to the sprites. Each playfield is allocated a number from 0 to 4 for one of the five possible settings.

This value (see Figure I) is put into the corresponding bits of BPLCON2. Bits 0 to 2, called PF1P0 to PF1P2, are set for the first playfield and bits 3 to 5, PF2P0 to PF2P2, are set for the second playfield.

For example, if you wanted a dual playfield screen with sprites 0 and 1 on top, then playfield 2, then sprites 2 and 3, then playfield 1 and finally sprites 4 to 7, you would set it up like this: Playfield 2 above playfield 1, so set bit 6. Sprites 0 and 1 above playfield 2, so set PF2P0-2 to 001. Sprites 0, 1, 2 and 3 above playfield 1, so set PF1P0-2 to 010.

Consequently the correct value to set BPLCON2 to would be - taking all the bits from above to form a binary number - %1001010, or \$4a in hex.

However the playfield priority is taken from bit six and can look a little strange if, for example, in the above example we set it so playfield 1 appears above playfield 2.

This would mean that sprites 2 and 3 would appear above playfield 1 but below playfield 2, but playfield 1 would appear above playfield 2. Think about it. Sounds strange? Not as strange as it looks.

Once you have your priorities right you can check for collisions between the sprites and playfields. When the

co- processors try to display a bit from a sprite or a playfield and there is an overlap with another sprite or playfield a collision bit is recorded in the collision register, CLXDAT. This is a read-only register which is cleared to zero each time it is read.

The make-up of the register is fairly complex and is further complicated by the control register CLXCON. The format of these registers is explained in Figure II. All collisions between even numbered sprites and bitplanes are registered. However, the odd numbered sprites in the sprite pairs are by default not registered in collisions. For odd sprite collisions you have to set the relevant bits in CLXCON.

There are two bits for each bitplane in CLXCON. One is to enable the bitplane in collision tests – so if, for example, you only wanted to test a collision between sprites and bitplane 2, you would only set bit 7 and enable plane 2 in collision tests. This masks out unwanted bitplanes from the test.

The second bit in CLXCON is for the match value. This is the bit that will actually generate a collision. For example, if you set up for only bitplane 2 as above, and then set the match value for bitplane 2 (bit 1) to zero, it will register a collision between sprites and gaps on the bitplane and no collision between sprites and solid areas on the bitplane.

W hen several bitplanes are used you can set the match value to generate a collision with a particular colour on the screen. If you have a 5 bitplane, 32 colour screen you can enable the first five bitplanes and put in the match value (bits 1 to 5) of the number of the colour register you want to generate a collision with.

The music play routine in The Right-Button Demo on this month's cover disc uses this feature to detect when the mouse pointer (a sprite) is over one of the boxes that control the program. As we can only detect one collision at a time, the routine switches between checking for each of the three different colours of the boxes. They appear the same colour because they are defined to the same colour value.

In this way the routine checks for a collision with each box every third frame. Obviously with more boxes we would either have to use more colours and test less frequently or use some sort of coordinate testing system which would tell us which box was selected if the collision only told us that a box had been clicked, but not which one.

Cavorting with commands

W ORD processing is curiously like driving a car. There's something to *do*, which is driving, or writing, and there's the machine you're doing it with. I know it's just a bunch of bits in formation, but after a while the bits feel like a whole. And that's when it all starts to become really enjoyable.

And thinking of Skodas, I had a lot of crashes to start with. With the Amy, of course. How about you? Yeah, I thought so.

I started out running Protext over the Workbench so I could do some of those things you absolutely have to be able to do all the time, like formatting and relabelling discs. What a pain that was. I'm using a 1 meg machine, but I waltzed with the Guru all the time.

I was writing to a deadline, as well as trying to cope with Real Life, so I cast about for advice. Never be ashamed to ask people who seem to know what they're doing. My friend Alex says that he always runs Protext500, even with a meg available, and has no problems multi-tasking. Well, OK.

I prefer to stay inside Protext. I'm not a programmer, I'm a user, and I like to type a few words in and change the world. A bit like Hitler really.

If you boot Protext from the disc, as opposed to double clicking on its icon from Workbench, you have the command line interface (CLI) immediately underneath, and that's how most of the guys in the know run the program – including the brains behind it, Arnor boss Mark Tilley.

To do this you have to re-size the windows. Click on the background gadget and you get the CLI window. Shrink it as short and wide as it will go and drag it down to the bottom of the screen. Then click back to Protext, and re-size that window so that it lets you see the CLI window at the bottom. Remember, you can only re-size Protext in Edit mode.

And that's it. If you want the CLI,

you click in its window; the same for Protext.

But this is all boringly manual. There *has* to be an automatic way – and there is. It involves a lightweight Sumo session with the Startup-Sequence file, which is in the S directory of the Protext disc.

Figure I is a modified version of the boot sequence supplied on the Protext program disc.

The objective is to define the

windows for both Protext and the CLI. After *run Protext500* you enter the window parameters with the prefix -W. Top left corner is 0,0; the window is full width, 640, and 200 deep. You can see how this is tacked on to the command.

You do the same for the instruction to run the full sized Protext.

The last line in the file sets up the CLI window. Workbench 1.2 takes the instruction *NewCLI CON:*, and 1.3 takes *NewShell NEWCON:*, and then the window details, using the same parameter system as for Protext, but with slashes instead of commas for separators. Finally you should give the CLI window a name. And that's it. Deeply wonderful.

OK? Well.... no, not OK.

F IRST, I believe that you need as much screen space as you can get when you're using a word processor. Giving any up to the CLI is bad. You could always work with the full screen and then move the bottom of the Protext window to reveal the CLI, or click the back gadget, but resizing or clicking any time you want to do something feels inelegant.

There's another way. Typing a CLI command on the Protext command line preceded by an asterisk runs that command invisibly. The basic requirement is that you have the file to run that command in the current directory or the C: directory on the Protext disc. So for instance, with Relabel in the directory:

*RELABEL DF1: "Review Files"

at the Protext command line will relabel the disc in the second drive to "Review Files". But there's a snagette. If you type this:

*RELABEL DF1:"Review Files"

nothing will happen at all. Can you spot the crucial difference? If you click Protext into the background you can see the CLI telling you that there was an improper argument to Relabel. We left out the space that should be between the colon and the opening quote of the filename. No good at all.

You have to remember the syntax for all the AmigaDos commands you want to use. Unlike Protext's built-in commands - Copy for instance, which prompts you in a friendly way - with AmigaDos you just get a cold wind from Bristol.

Is there any way, I thought as I breathed heavily over the manual, to make this wretched thing friendlier? Well, hold on to your eyeballs fans, here it is - Friendly AmigaDos.

OU use mail merge. After all, you're paying for it, and I'll bet you don't use it for mail merging much - no, neither do I - so it might as well earn its keep. Mail merge can be used to prompt for words, and it can make pre-formed sentences out of your input, so it should be ideal. Here's how.

Let's start with re-labelling discs. We'll run this with an exec file, called Rel, which goes like this:

> L relabel.mm PS

Log on to DF0: and save it there.

Typing X REL at the command line will cause Relabel.mm to load, and then be printed to the screen, which is the mail merge way to run things. This is Relabel.mm:



Again, save it to DF0:. This is how it works: The first line opens a datafile. Mail merge needs to grab a file, but as we don't have to read any data I've made it grab Rel, which I know is there because I've just executed it.

The second line prompts you for the drive spec (DF0:, DF1: or whatever) and assigns the answer the the mail merge variable drive. The third line asks you for the new name of the disc, and assigns whatever string you type in to the variable label.

The fourth and fifth lines prepare to write a file to ram. I've called it Hobo because the only requirement is that there shouldn't be another file with the same name already there in case it overwrites it.

Line six uses the *drive* and *label* variables and makes them into the proper AmigaDos command line. Lines seven, eight and nine stop the



file-write and close the datafile. Finally line 10 calls an Protext command to execute RAM:Hobo, which is the file containing the command line we want.

That's it - Friendly AmigaDos. And they said it couldn't be done.

NCE you've done the first one, you can do any number. All you have to do is alter the prompt lines and change the file names to, say, FormatD for formatting discs, and Bob's your thingy. (And thanks to Doug Thompson of Arnor for his help.)

So the FormatD file is:



which loads and prints to the screen (runs) the Format.mm file of mail merge commands:

The plain vanilla version with no options formats the long way round; it's for discs that have never been touched before. A quick format would have Quick as the option, which formats in seconds any disc that's been formatted before.

The disc to be formatted has to be in the drive before you start. If you're doing this with one drive, you must copy FormatD, Format.mm, Rel, Relabel.mm, Format and Relabel into the ram disc at the start of the day, or simply as you need them. Log on to RAM: to run the process. If there's some problem, click on the back gadget to see what obscure message the CLI has sent you.

To run properly these tricks need an empty file in Protext, so Swap to the second file. If both files are full and you need to format a disc to save one or both of them, you can either save one of them to ram, clear it from Protext and recover it later, or you can merge one file on to the end of the other temporarily.

At the end you'll have Format.mm

left in your editing file. To format another disc, just print it to the screen again (PS) and follow the prompts.

B ELIEVE me, it works, I've just used it. Between this para and the one before lies more than an hour of messing about. The system started to crash kind of fuzzily – things didn't quite go right – and when I reset the system the Amy refused to read my Protext work disc.

This is the second disc failure since I've started to write these articles. I'm not used to it. In five years of using 3in discs on various Amstrads I've never had one go down. I don't fancy these 3.5in floppies at all right now, but because on the Amiga you're stuck with them, the only thing to say is back up everything. That's the important thing.

Anyway, at the end of the whole grinding process, using DiskSalv from the August cover disc and more help from my friend Alex, I recovered all the odd config and macro files I'd built up. Then I re-formatted the bad disc using FormatD, *and it worked*. Forged in action, fellers. You'll find the relevant exec and command files in my drawer.

I've learnt my lesson. Back-up. Back-up. Back-up. This is Obvious Advice country, but really necessary. The truth is that a lot of the pleasure and performance of the program has nothing to do with fancy coding on our part. It's all in the user's approach.

P ROTEXT is very powerful and unbelievably quick. In fact, like most good WPs, the program is too powerful to be learnt completely. The thing is not to try and hammer it all in, but to be relaxed about the idea that you *don't* know it all.

I've been using it on the CPC for nearly five years, and to come back to the car analogy, all the controls fall readily to hand, but I keep on discovering new accessories.

And there's the fun. I really enjoyed working out how to use mail merge to

do the formatting and re-labelling. Drawing new characters on the screen isn't something I ever thought I'd do, but doing it sure beats watching TV. Isolating the address for envelopes gives me pleasure each time I use it now. And the key to success is browsing.

Browsing may not sound very hitech, but it *is* a major productive activity. "Just" browsing through the manual with the machine fired up, and "just" fiddling about with things like mail merge, gets you familiar with the system and suggests lots of nice wheezes, some of which might even be useful.

Read a lot of magazines – definitely read the letters columns – and join a club. For every problem, there's always a friendly techie out there who knows the solution. The trick is to meet him, and a club is the place.

In the meantime, hang loose. It doesn't matter what you do; the program as it comes from Arnor works fine, so there's no hurry.

Make the program yours. Play with Protext

You will need a standard one, something like Spritz or Deluxe Paint III, and then you'll need another for those occasions when you want to play with HAM.

Art programs have come along leaps and bounds over the last few years, from the first glimpse of King Tut on DPaint, right up to the two newest, DigiPaint 3 and Photon Paint 2 – both sequels to successful HAM packages which use all 4,096 colours to get stunning life-like pictures.

D IGIPAINT 3 has many new features to help you get the best results in the shortest time. Menus have been made easy to use and there are now 11 different painting modes.

Your pictures can be larger than the screen, Super Bitmaps let you have your canvas as big as 1024 x 1024 pixels. You can get around this massive painting area by moving your pointer to the edge of the screen – NewTek's auto-scrolling does the rest.

The menu bar is held within the control panel, not where you expect it to be on a title bar at the top of the

Photon has a stencil (DigiPaint 3 doesn't). With it you can mask off the part of the canvas you wish to keep, and any of the colours within that

screen. The control panel has been well designed. It has been spaced out into three sections - tools, text and controls. You get a little icon of what can be done with each gadget, which will save you a lot of experimenting.

Making brushes is a breeze. Not only can you cut square and freehand brushes, but also any of the drawing gadgets can be used to cut something out. Ever tried cutting a freehand circular brush?

Once you have grabbed your brush you can lay it on top of your artwork, fade it in with the background, warp it, light it appropriately and still use it to paint with.

The menu system for selecting where your light source position will be includes control over the type of dither. Gone are the days of airbrushing slight changes of colour, taking hours. It can all be done with the press of a button.

Tiling is another new feature. It enables you to duplicate the brush, making patterns and giving everything an early '80s Top of the Pops look.

DigiPaint 3 has an unusual text function. Letters are not typed on to the picture, but into a requester box. This becomes a brush in the selected font, which can be warped, rotated and smoothed to get rid of all the jagged edges on letters like O and S. Text can also be made transparent or multi-coloured, so you don't have to go back and do it by hand.

HOTON PAINT is the other HAM art package to have had a facelift. Animation is the major new feature. You can now make HAM pictures move. That is, if you have a vast amount of memory. Which most of us don't. The anim demo supplied will not work fully with 1 meg, but it puts the point across. Lots of action means lots of frames, and that swallows ram.

The title bar at the top of the screen has not changed since Photon Paint 1, but the menu bar has had a lot of new features crammed into it. I much prefer the layout in DigiPaint 3, but once you have learned the hot key short cuts in Photon, the menu bar will rarely be used.

Altered images

TRANSFER 24 is an extra program on the second DigiPaint 3 disc. This takes a HAM screen and turns it in to a lo-res 32 colour picture. The loading screen pops up to allow you to select hi-res, interlace, horizontal overscan and vertical overscan before you load in your picture.

It produces a histogram that tells you how much red, green and blue you have on your screen. This has no relevance to drawing a good picture, but is useful if you have imported a digitised piccy from DigiView and want to adjust the tint.

You can also fiddle with brightness, contrast, saturation and sharpness. If you have used DigiView all the menus will look familiar.

A common problem when pulling together a screen from a number of bits of clip art is that different brushes need different palettes. Lifting a damsel in distress from a

castle balcony and putting her on a sun-drenched beach all too often results in giving her sea-green skin, yellow lips and a dress which clashes with her shoes.

Transfer 24 can play games with the pallette. So if you have a 25 colour princess and a 20 colour beach, you can use Transfer 24 to remap the beach into 12 colours and the girl to 20 colours. By using a 32 colour mode there is room for everything. After merging the two you can touch up the result and paint her lips red.

The utility is really designed for using pictures which have been saved using DigiView in the 24 bit (16 million colour) mode. Hence its name. But it is a program which most Amiga artists could have used at some time or other.

Turning a 4,096 colour screen into a four colour one for an icon may not yield useful results, but it is a mark of flexibility that it is possible.




A mock-up screen showing all DigiPaint 3 gadgets panels

Cutting brushes is easy, with either square or freehand cutting tools. Brushes can be wrapped around shapes. I liked this feature in the original Photon Paint, and I'm glad to see it was kept in Photon Paint 2. Wrapping is something DigiPaint 3 can't do.

Contour has been added to the list of shapes brushes can be wrapped

around - Tube, Cone, Ball, Ellipse, Free, and two kinds of Cube - so now you can remould the brush. adding perspective to your work. It does it properly and doesn't skimp around the edges. My favourite is Free, which lets you make a random shape to wrap you brush on - you can cram your brush into a egg timer

with the greatest of ease.

Other new features include Shadow, which throws a drop shadow under wherever you are on the screen. A problem with this is if you have a shadow going to the bottom right of where your pointer is and you start drawing upwards, the shadow will overwrite the colour you are working with.

Everyone seems to want to jump on the video titling wagon, and the genlock option is MicroIllusions' ticket to ride.

It doesn't do anything clever, it just takes all the menus and cursor off your canvas. So in conjunction with a system like MiniGen you can lay HAM images and animations on your home vids.

B OTH packages come with demo pictures showing what can be achieved with them. Photon Paint 2 has a second disc full of HAM artwork which you can load up and use in the tutorials. DigiPaint 3 not only gives you the pictures to view in the art package, but a routine on the second disc which does wipes and fades,


DOCUMENTATION can make or break a program. The manual for DigiPaint 3 is well laid out, with room after each chapter for notes. A good idea, but I prefer to scribble comments in the margin.

I don't understand how anyone can produce a manual which lacks an index.

This is a crime for which NewTek

should never be forgiven.

The manual that comes with Photon Paint 2 presents you with endless pages of text but no diagrams or pictures to help put the point across. The problem is alleviated by explanations being well worded, so it won't be long before you will have your first masterpiece on the screen.



showing all the artwork on the disc. But art is about freedom of expression and control over your medium, and nothing dries the creative juices faster than having to wait for a slow program to update a HAM screen.

In a side-by-side comparative test DigiPaint 3 was the faster all round, especially on brush movement and fills. The fact that all the menus are close to hand and easy to read also makes DigiPaint 3 faster and a pleasure to use.

If you are just starting out in HAM, then for its speed, ease of use and very good layout, DigiPaint 3 is the best place to start. It's going to take a Photon Paint 3 to beat it.




Simon Rockman meets the Cray twins – Professor Ad Wiseman and Eric Lugtigheid AD professors are supposed to live in castle towers surrounded by flasks of bubbling liquid. By this definition Professor Ad Wiseman is not mad. He lives in a comfortable flat in a very select part of Chelsea with his colleague Eric Lugtigheid. There are no flasks, just three Amiga 2000s.

Who else but a madman would want to interface an Amiga to a Cray? Not only is it difficult to find one of these water-cooled supercomputers, you couldn't fit it in the front room. That is

Straightening out the graphics kinks

DESPITE the heavy computational side of the Cray project, the main aim is to provide tools for students on art courses. Sculpt is the best program on the Amiga for designing shapes, but some things are quite difficult to do. Freehand drawing is one of them. It is often easier to sketch an outline in 2D and then convert it to a solid shape.

The obvious method of sketching on paper seems a bit low-tech. DigiWorks is a program which can take an IFF file and spot the edges of a shape. It then turns the edges into vertices for a 3D shape. Eric wasn't happy with the

if you can persuade the US Department of Defense to let you part with \$5,000,000 for one.

Well according to Professor Wiseman, lots of people. Mainly universities and colleges who have a lot of students and need cheap, powerful graphic terminals. They'd like super expensive terminals but can't afford to equip computer labs with 30 personal Irises at £20,000 each. They can afford Amigas.

And if anyone knows what the educational establishments want Ad does. In his native Holland he teaches 136 students at the Utrecht School of Art. The school has 80 Amigas and at least 90 of the students have an Amiga at home. He sees the real benefit to Commodore as being the role his students play spreading the word. At the end of each year they go out into the world of industry and commerce where they persuade employers to buy Amigas. Eric and Ad are in quality of the results. Some lines which should be straight come out with kinks, and it cannot transfer colour information.

His solution was to write a program which was more accurate. The two scientists share the philosophy that computer languages are just a method for communicating with the computer and that they should choose the language which suits their purpose best.

For the edge detection program they chose GFA Basic. Ad wrote a procedure to load an IFF picture which so impressed GFA it is now included with the Basic interpreter.

England on a six month project for the Royal College of Art to produce software to link the Amiga and a Cray 2 at the University of London Computer Centre (ULCC). The main thrust of this is to get the supercomputer to do all the work necessary in crunching numbers for ray tracing.

While the three Amigas they have can produce pretty good results thanks to their 68020 processor cards, it still takes somewhere between an hour and a day to produce a screen. The Cray can do it in seconds. Unfortunately the Cray cannot run Sculpt-Animate 4D, it uses a program written in Utah called MovieBYU.

The obvious thing to do is forget about Amigas and just use MovieBYU. Obvious but stupid. When you are using an Amiga the processor time is free, you've paid for the whole machine. When you are on-line to a Cray every microsecond is shared with other users and you have to pay.

It is far cheaper for students to fiddle with designs on the Amiga and then get the Cray to do the final high quality work. It is also far easier. MovieBYU has no graphical user interface. Shapes are designed by typing in numbers. A decent sphere needs 600 points, each with three coordinates. A fair bit of keyboard bashing.

The student, who may well be on an art – not a computing – course uses an Amiga and designs shapes, trying them out in low resolutions before logging on to the Cray. Then Ad and Eric's program translates the Scuplt data file into MovieBYU format. The The result is so quick it is hard to believe the software is written in Basic. Given a complicated Deluxe Paint screen to read, the edges were spotted at least as quickly as DigiWorks and the accuracy was very much better.

A magnify option is useful in tidying up over-complicated areas where vertices meet. But the most powerful utility is a rotation option. This can give a 2D shape perspective before it is saved out in Sculpt format. Each object is saved separately - not as a scene, which makes the final assembly more flexible.

student logs on to Cray and uploads the file for the heavy calculation to begin.

Seconds later the picture is complete and ready for downloading, but it is not a standard IFF file. The picture will use 16 million colours and needs around a megabyte of screen memory. So some special software converts this into an Amiga HAM picture, which only needs 300k and is quicker to download.

When the project is complete the way will be open for all universities to interface cheaply with a Cray.

A hand from Commodore

UCH of the work Eric and Professor Wiseman have done has only been made possible with cooperation from Commodore. Jennifer Perry from the marketing department arranged the loan of three Amiga 2000s with A2620 processor cards, hard discs and multi-sync monitors.

These are used extensively both at the flat and at the Royal College of Art. Ad also uses his own machine, which has a Commodore 2080 monitor. This looks like the standard 1084 but has a special longpersistence screen. The effect is to hold an image.

Rapid movement – such as moving the mouse pointer or the screen scrolling – results in the whole object smearing. But it is ideal for working in interlace mode because it hides all the flicker.

Back scratching?

I REALLY am surprised to read that you dare to call yourself "an independent publication"! I am referring to advice given to Marcus Barrett on Letters pages in the August issue of your magazine.

If Commodore has to advertise its A590 Hard Drive Plus then why not do it in an inoffensive manner? Please have some respect for your readers!

Don't get me wrong, as a micro owner with years of experience I have never been as satisfied with my machine as I am since I have bought my Amiga. Personally I don't think any micro on the market at present (including all models of Archimedes) comes close to its level of sophistication. But unfortunately drive design and production is one thing Commodore is absolutely useless at. Do you remember the 5.25in drive for the Commodore 64? Yes - the ones with the speed of a Spectrum cassette and reliability of the English weather.

Similarly with second drives for Amiga (3.5in floppy). I compared my Triangle with my friend's Commodore. Mine was 12 per cent faster, 40 per cent smaller and makes virtually no noise at all. For reasons unknown my drive is also £40 cheaper.

Therefore, if you must name only one supplier when advising your readers about hard drives, why not suggest Amdrive (40mb at £399), which is more advanced, more reliable and without question a much better buy? I'm convinced that there is a purpose in the existence of Commodore drives, but as yet I haven't been able to discover what it is. It would be nice if in

future you could remember that there is more to being independent that just calling yourself independent. I think apologies are in order.

DTP printer

I have just upgraded from an Acorn Electron and am completely lost with Amiga Basic. The manual just confuses me. My mum is interested for educational software for 11 and 13-year-old children (my brother and me) for the Amiga 500 or do we have to get a BBC emulator?

The Star LC-10 colour printer is very popular among Amiga owners. Not up to high quality DTP, but if you are working to a tight budget it's highly recommended.

Publishers Choice is the cheapest "proper" DTP program, although you could skimp a bit and use Kind Words, which is a word processor with some DTP functions.

The Basic Commodore supplied with the Amiga isn't much cop. Have a look at Hisoft Basic. There isn't much educational software. Check out the articles in the July and October issues on teaching and Fun School 2. moment are the Microlink MultiSpeed and the Amstrad SM2400.

The Multispeed runs at up to 1200 bits per second full duplex, which is compatible with most bulletin boards and subscription services.

It is available from Database Direct on 051-357 2961 and costs £179.95. Ask them for an IBM compatible cable.

The Amstrad costs £250 but is often available for less. It works at twice the speed, which means it works with all the same systems as the MicroLink modem but will also work with the newer 2400 bits per second systems.

I tried a couple of dealers near you but had no joy in finding anyone who stocks modems. Y2 in Watford stocks the Amstrad. This is a good dealer and understands modems and Amigas. Call on 0923 510161 and hassle Rod.

The Star LC-10 colour seems to be winning a lot of friends in the Amiga world. It is a good cheap mono printer but will splash a bit of colour around with the appropriate ribbon.

The cheapest way to get one is to visit one of the Christmas computer shows – the Commodore Show or Computer Shopper – or to haggle in Tottenham Court Road. Service? Wassat?

Diskdoctor is on the main 1.2 disc, you need to click on the CLI icon and type Diskdoctor. A better program is DiskSalv, which was on the August issue cover disc.

This might teach you something about game design, but you'll learn zilch about programming. A better route is to buy a copy of Hisoft Basic and learn something about programming.
