



A600 heads for Britain

THE smallest and newest computer in the Amiga family – the A600 – will hit Britain during May at a £399 price point, Commodore have just confirmed.

The A600-HD fitted with an internal 20Mb hard disk drive will sell for £499 and the company have no imminent



plans for models with higher capacities. Shown for the first time in the UK at the recent European Computer Trade Show in London, the A600 will be bundled with art package Deluxe Paint III and an as yet unnamed game.

It will have a 12-month on-site warranty, which is an unusual benefit for leisure home computer owners, and is believed to have been made possible because of the move to more reliable surface mount technology.

Commodore boss Steve Franklin: "Ever since its launch in 1985, the Amiga has been subject to a program of constant

improvement and evolution, designed to keep it safely in its position as market leader."

He added: "This latest range is a giant leap forward, giving the user state-of-theart computing power at an affordable price."

Advertising campaigns have already be drawn up for the computer press and television. Insiders say

they centre on the fact that the baby machine can be carried easily.

There is, meanwhile, mounting industry speculation that the A500 will be dropped within the year and that an Amiga running from a 68020 processor will enter above the A600. The firm neither deny nor confirm the rumour.

A570 shown and gains support

THE A570 CD-ROM drive for the A500 and A500P was shown for the first time in the UK recently, as three software giants pledged their support for the system.

Acclaim, Domark and Gremlin are the latest firms to say they will be releasing Amiga titles on both floppy disk and CD by the end of the year.

"Christmas 1992 will see the first true market for CD-ROM-based games develop," said Acclaim's European vice president Rod Cousens.

"Acclaim will be perfectly placed to make full use of the many advantages offered by the new format."

Gremlin are looking at using the increased storage capacity that CD offers to improve their Amiga games.

Said boss Ian Stewart: "As Amiga games become more and more complex, conventional floppy disks are becoming a less suitable storage medium."

He continued: "The compact disc is the format of the future and Gremlin intend to be a leading player in this market from the very start."

As we went to press, Commodore were still unable to confirm an on-sale date or price for the drive, although industry sources have speculated it will cost £269.

Commodore in crisps link

THE A600 is to feature in a new nationwide promotion being run between Commodore, Ocean Software and Smiths Crisps.

Special Quavers packs will feature a decoder giving people the chance to win the new computer or copies of Pushover, Ocean's game starring Quavers' character Colin Curly.

"Smiths' agency, BDP, came to Commodore after their research revealed that the Amiga is the most desirable product of its type," said Commodore's Dawn Levack.

"This is the first time home computers have featured in this type of promotion and we're sure it will get the new Amiga off to a flying start."

Quavers' Sally Hollowell offered: "This is the first ever promotion of this type in the snacks sector and we are delighted to be involved with Commodore and Ocean.

"The promotion is directly targeted at kids' number one leisure activity and we're convinced that this will secure a significant demand for Quavers during the summer."

Price plunge for A500P

PRICES for the A500P Cartoon Classics pack have plunged further in the last few weeks, despite Commodore claims that chains would return the bundle to £399 after Christmas. At least one High Street giant is now selling the pack for less than £350. With the cur-

rent price war among electrical retailers, others are likely to follow. And one insider has told *Amiga Computing* to expect more cuts as shops attempt to

clear stock as the arrival date of the A600 nears. Meanwhile, a rival manufacturer claimed retailers have been forced to drop prices

because they are holding surplus Amigas after a slack winter.

CDTV grows Amiga bits

THREE new CDTV peripherals to enable the player to operate like any other Amiga were launched in London recently.

They included a 96-key Qwerty keyboard, a mouse and a 3.5in floppy disk drive. Each is housed in a black case, enabling them to blend in with the player.



They were released in Germany earlier this year in a

bundle called Amiga CDTV, but in Britain, where the standalone player is now sold as Amiga CDTV, Commodore will not be finding a new marketing name.

"Thousands of homes are already enjoying the benefits offered by the standalone Amiga CDTV," claimed Commodore boss Steve Franklin. "These add-ons can only serve to make the system even more interactive and productive.

"With the launch of other CD-ROM-based systems, including [Philips] CD-I, creating an even greater public awareness for this new form of home entertainment, Amiga CDTV can only continue to grow in stature."

Prices were unavailable.





Upgradable laser released

DESKTOP publishers are being targeted for an upgradable HP Laserjet III-compatible laser printer, just released by Silica Systems (081-309 1111).

Selling for £699, the Ricoh LP1200 has a resolution of up to 400 dots per inch, 2Mb of memory and a print speed of six pages per minute.

A unique Flash ROM upgrade feature allows owners to keep up to date with laser developments such as printer command languages.

Silica spokesman Andy Leaning said: "The Ricoh LP1200 is the ideal printer for Amiga users. With 2Mb of RAM as standard and up to 400 dots per inch, it is perfect for DTP work.

He continued: "Other laser printers with less memory cannot handle such work without expensive extra memory. Silica recommend the LP1200 for any Atari ST user."

Frontier products saved

MARPET Developments have grabbed all rights to Frontier Software's Amiga products including the Xtra-RAM A500+ memory expansion board.

The move follows the recent collapse of Arben Electronics, who traded as Frontier Software. Based in North Yorkshire, Marpet can be telephoned on 0423 567140.

G-Force powers up

AMERICAN peripheral giant Great Valley Products' have redesigned their Combo range of A2000 accelerators to give improved performance.

The old 22MHz board has been replaced with the G-Force 030 running at 25MHz and featuring a built-in SCSI controller and maths co-processor.

One megabyte of memory is supplied – expandable to 13Mb – and it costs £599.

Taking the place of Combo 33 is a 40MHz version. Also fitted with a maths co-processor, it has 4Mb of memory which can be increased to 16Mb. Price: £999.

And at the top of the range is a

.

50MHz board, running from a standard 68030 processor. Sold with 4Mb of RAM and accepting a maximum of 16Mb, it costs £1,399.

The 25MHz and 40MHz versions use economical 680EC30 processors and the 50MHz board runs from a standard 68030 chip. All three can be bought with an optional hard drive mounting kit.

GVP president Gerard Bucas commented: "There is no reason to look beyond G-Force 030 for performance or price, no matter what your accelerator needs."

t's a big month for Amigans who use their machines for more than shoot-'em-ups. Soft-Logik have released the Hotlinks Edition add-on for PageStream, Gold Disk have finally shipped Professional Page v3.0, and New Horizons have yet another ProWrite update.

Gamers shouldn't despair, either. Although it seems that more and more entertainment software is coming from the UK nowadays, a few superb entertainment packages of US origin have been released as well.

Most notable is the long-awaited Black Crypt, Electronic Arts' labyrinthian game that includes 20 interconnected dungeons and hundreds of horrid, cunning beasts, all rendered in beautiful 64-colour halfbrite graphics.

While Black Crypt is technically impressive, some hard-core gamers have reported finishing it in as little as a few days. If this happens to you, check out New World Computing's Might and Magic III: Isles of Terra for the Amiga.

Over 4Mb of compressed graphics and sounds, a great 3D perspective, and both dungeon and outside locales will make the 100+ hours of challenging play contained in this game exciting and fun.

A third dungeon game of American origin, MindCraft's The Keys to Maramon, is worth skipping, unless you really want to relive the experience of playing dungeon games on a circa-1983 Apple II.



Animation

ost of you will probably own some version or other of DPaint, one of the most versatile and simple to use graphics packages available for the Amiga.

Having said that, how many of you will have had occasion to put any or all of DPaint's numerous features to use, either during an animation, or as static Amiga art?

Initially we planned to release a complementary animation on the CoverDisk to help explain the finer points of the animation process. Unfortunately the arrival of SID 2 means that the release of the anim has had to be delayed.

As a result, to get the full benefit from the tutorial you'll have to wait for next month's issue of AC. To run the anim, you'll need a 1Mb machine and a copy of DPaint 3 or upwards.

When I set out to create the animation I was faced with a dilemma. The brief was to create a DPaint animation using as many different techniques as possible, employing DPaint as the centre pin.

Perception

First off, everyone's perception of animation is different. A superb piece of character animation could be done on DPaint, but for the purpose of a tutorial it would be pointless, since character animators have a whole host of tricks at their disposal that can't be found in any animation package, however comprehensive it may appear.

Designers of animated graphics and title sequences will insist that what they do involves animation, for example tumbling logos. Character animators would disagree by explaining they are merely moving things around, and so the general confusion goes on – well, that's my excuse...

At the outset, one thing becomes clear after tinkering with DPaint – you can create a lot of fancy effects in terms of a "look", regardless of whether you are enhancing existing DPaint animations by employing additional digitising with systems such as DigiView, or perhaps trying to emulate the look of video game graphics.

In the case of the demo animation, the intent has been to approach the look of something slicker than you'd expect to see from DPaint. The software allows you to do all sorts of crazy things that you'd expect to see in high-end systems such as Quantel's PaintBox – plus there's the added bonus of animation.

Believe me, I tried very hard to avoid the cliché of an animated logo when it came to arriving at an idea. However, after a lot of brainstorming – and the fact that I only had a week left to do the sequence! – the all-important idea seemed obvious.

I say "all-important" because anything you do has to start with an idea, hopefully providing you with an initial structure to create the animation around. OK, so superficially speaking the demo is basically a "tumbling logo", but how does its creation involve animation? Well, it's moving, and it exists within

a predetermined time frame.

Basically you're trying to get something to go from A to B in a hopefully interesting and entertaining manner, as well as informing people that they should buy Amiga Computing instead of any other magazine – as if anyone needed telling.

Don't be put off by the fact that the demo is not of some cute animated person doing strange things – this is also possible with DPaint, but would take infinitely longer to produce and require much more pre-planning to execute. All the bits necessary to recreate or create your own animation will be available on next month's

> CoverDisk, comprising of a couple of IFF files. As a result, you can learn the finer points of the animation process this month and apply your newly-acquired

skills with the assistance of next month's Disk.

Thankfully most software designers working on Amiga products have sensibly enabled users to load images created on a wide variety of other graphics packages – in this particular case I've used Imagine, the 3D ray tracing package from Impulse.

The only proviso is that images satisfy the rule of compatibility with the Amiga's standard IFF format. However, since the demo employs DPaint 3, which cannot accept 4,096 Ham images, the graphics created in Imagine had to be re-saved as 64-colour lo-res IFF files, using DigiView to do the re-conforming.

Challenge

Why bother, you may well ask, when you could originate everything in DPaint? In this particular case, the reason was that I set myself a challenge to try to see if you could achieve certain effects more quickly using another package – namely the appearance of solid objects, light and shade and so on, and then import those images into DPaint for animation purposes.

True, you can create a very convincing 3D effect in DPaint, if you have a rudimentary knowledge of how things should

incing rudilook, and a few artistic tricks up your sleeve. Nevertheless I plumbed for Imagine and spent the next two hours setting it up to render a reasonably convincing relief image of the AC logo.

Once set up, and with the aid of numerous test renderings, I could change the lighting conditions, colours, bumpiness and so on in a way that, at best, would be difficult in DPaint. My only concern was that all this would be lost in the Ham to lo-res conversion process.

I was wrong... DigiView does an excellent job in re-computing a reduced colour palette and resolution for any image you may load into it.

The end result in this case was something that still looked remarkably realistic and solid. I rendered all the bits and pieces in Imagine simply because it was so quick and easy to do – this included the support columns of the Logo panel.

Different palette

When you do this with different objects, you will find that the colour palette saved will be different for each IFF file. This can be a nasty surprise when you load them into DPaint, but it's easily remedied by executing the ReMap function.

Any errors in the palette can be corrected by simply re-mapping all successive images so they match the entire collection of frames to the original palette.

The animation elements have been broken down into the background image and

Power packages

The additional packages used in the creation of the demo were Imagine from Impulse and NewTek's DigiView. Both of these require a minimum of 2Mb of RAM to be of any use and of the two, Imagine is the most memory-hungry since it is a 3D package.

Obviously the ability to bring in material from other sources will extend the usefulness of DPaint in creating animated sequences. The DigiView package is just one of many that will allow you to grab images from any source, whether it be video camera or TV, saving them in a variety of resolutions.

These can then be loaded into DPaint and used as additional elements within your animations. If this approach is taken then it is advisable that some means of mass storage be found to handle the large number of frames that may be required for an animation.

Ideally this could be a hard disk, unless you intend creating everything as short cycles strung together, which soon becomes tedious.

One application I had occasion to use involved digitising drawings created by a traditional animator, which were taken into Photon Paint – a Ham paint package – along with some other material digitised in DigiView. The frames were then treated and given a look that would have been difficult to achieve any other way.

It is very difficult for computers to emulate the methods used by animators to create animation. Some 3D packages are able to implement processes like in-betweening or 'tweening as it's more often known, where the animator will set up key positions for a character or object, and the software will work out the intermediate frames.

In a 2D situation this is more complex, unless the 2D package involves what is called structured drawing, a type of vector-based drawing, which uses more memory than a package like DPaint.

At best, something like DPaint can figure out screen locations between key positions which you may define, but the object it moves will not change in itself.

Some recent packages allow you to draw images on successive frames for an animation and then, rather like traditional animators using a light box to see the drawing underneath, enable you to overlay a ghosted image of the previous frame on the current page you are working on. What it boils down to is that a large part of an animator's understanding is based upon an awareness of illusion, and the tricks of perspective, whereas a computer can only see things as logical absolutes.

Animation AC

For example, a computer can show you a cube that looks the way it looks in the real world, with diminishing perspective and so on, but to the computer it is simply a perfectly mathematical entity, without any of the distortions that arise from vision and point of view.

This leads rather neatly to the subject of 3D packages for the Amiga, which vary from ones which allow you to create simple 3D objects to others which allow you to generate entire universes in your bedroom.

Some 3D packages that I would recommend are Sculpt Animate 4D, which to some extent has been left behind by other ray tracing packages, but nevertheless still has some unique features. Perhaps the premier packages are Real 3D – which is what's called a solid modeller, and the excellent Imagine 2.0.

Since Real 3D is primitive-based, creating complex objects is more difficult than with Imagine, although the very latest version – 1.4 – does support very similar organic object modelling tools as Imagine, and like Imagine it's possible to load objects created in other packages into Real 3D in order to take advantage of its superior rendering capabilities.


Of the three, my personal favourite is Imagine, since it knocks spots off the others in terms of features. These include most kinds of surface mapping, a complex but powerful animation interface, and a sophisticated modeller.

All these packages require a fair bit of work in order to produce anything worthwhile, but the results can be stunning – especially considering the price.

No package is going to do all the work for you in any case, and where animation is concerned it's best to do some preplanning before you even decide which package is best suited to your needs.

I anticipated my sequence being a 25frame cycle. You will see a lot of "cycles" in Amiga PD anims, simply because they can be very effective and look like a lot more work than is actually involved. If the timing is correct they can have an almost hypnotic effect.

The actual animation part of the sequence - once I had prepared all the actors (or mobile elements) - employed functions which for the most part are to be found in the Anim/Move requester.

Before I go on, I should explain that, depending upon the complexity of your scene, like traditional animators, its a good idea to pre-plan the in and out points of actors, and the duration of cycles on paper.

Dope sheets

Animators use what are called dopesheets which are divided up into frames, onto which all the different levels of animation can be entered on a frame-byframe basis.

The Move requester is an extremely powerful means of controlling animated effects in DPaint, and because parameters are entered numerically, they are infinitely more accurate than, say, using the Left Amiga key and dragging a brush around manually - a technique which has its merits, but would

require an entire additional article to explain in full.

It's a good idea to build animations from the back up, ie the furthest away element first and then successive levels, in rather the same way that traditional animation is done. This is because you are dealing with a two-dimensional medium.

If you don't do this, then its almost impossible to correct mistakes without rebuilding the sequence from scratch saving each level as a separate anim is one way around this.

In our example anim, the background had to scroll continuously and the foreground spin. As a result, a layered construction was ideal for the job.

The first job in the creation of any DPaint-based anim is to enter the anim length into the appropriate requester, and ensure that frame one is the current screen.

I loaded the background image into the "scratch" screen next, accessed using the J key, and then cut out as a brush.

The brush was then carried over into frame one and stamped down so that it filled the entire screen. At this stage, I entered the Move requester. Since the animation was to move from left to right, I entered a positive value in the X box.

You can preview the move by hitting Preview and then OK, after which a ghosted grid performs the move, showing the start and end points and every position in between.

Once this is over, the Move

requester reappears and you can make adjustments, or commit yourself to the move by selecting Draw, which actually initiates the creation of the animation frames.

Useful gadgets

Two very useful gadgets in the Move requester control the way in which frames are laid down before Draw has been selected. These have no name as such, but are depicted graphically at the right of the requester as symbols not unlike the forward/reverse symbols on a VCR.

The requester defaults to laying frames down logically from frame one upwards, and if you have followed the previously outlined procedure, you should have a smoothly scrolling panel going from one end of the screen to the other - depending upon the X value that you entered.

Assuming that most people trying this are not going to have more than 1Mb of RAM to play with and do not possess a coprocessor, speed of playback is dependent upon the amount of RAM available, and also the size and changes within the image being animated.


At this stage you should have an animation of a very large brush, moving from left to right across the Amiga screen. The final effect is to get the sense of a continu-

You will notice that the demo uses only the very basic techniques, without any frills. If the same animation had been done with just a flat-coloured background with some lines on it and a coloured box to represent the panel, it would have been extremely dull.



ous scrolling background. Re-entering the Move requester finds the forward/reverse symbols previously mentioned. You then change the leftmost symbol to the one next to it - an arrow with a dot on it.

You then go to the group of three symbols and change the highlighted arrows pointing right - to the ones pointing left, ignoring the symbol in the middle which looks like two vertical lines.

Preview

If you hit the Preview button, you'll see the animation in reverse, but no ghosted grid - this is because you have not yet stamped down the brush.

If you do by chance hit Draw at this point, the new move will be created from the last frame of the previous move. To create the move seen in the demo, go to the very last frame of the animation and stamp the brush down so that it butts right up to the edge of the previously laid down brush.

Going back to the Move requester and

hitting Preview verifies that the animation is now to be laid down in reverse.

A note here - always use Preview before committing yourself to any predefined move, just in case it is not quite right, as the Draw function is not Undo-

able. A value of approximately 230 units should be in the X box for this to work as a continuous scroll, but I have purposely avoided giving an exact figure since it is best to employ a bit of trial and error to see exactly how the Move requester

works. Under the directional boxes for each axis, at the top of the Move requester, are boxes for entering an angle value. This refers a perspective value for either the X, Y or Z axis, and can produce some stunning effects, not unlike DVE or Digital Video Effects, seen on TV, when used alone or in combination.

These were used, in the Y axis, to create the spinning AC logo on the next level of the animation, by cutting the Logo out as a brush, as before, and then placing it

in the centre of the screen over frame one of the background animation.

For a beginner, the end result of the above should provide some idea of what you can achieve using DPaint's animation tools. The demo example, however, includes some animation which uses DPaint techniques to simulate 3D motion using 2D images, namely the panel supports.

This took some time to create - about three hours - but really only employed the Size/Stretch function on a brush, and used the edge of the animated panel as an anchor-point for the animation. It shows that with a bit of careful fiddling about and tweaking, some interesting effects can be achieved.

The IFF files included with next month's demo include some other brush images which you can use in other anims created using the base elements supplied.

For example, try using the Move requester to plot non-linear motion paths, or use the Z axis to make objects seem to travel towards or away from you.

Interesting animations have as much to do with timing as anything else.

Following the above very basic outline, things would certainly move, but in a very linear and even manner - if everything moved like this it would be very dull.

Two additional and very useful functions exist within the Move requester. Ease In and Ease Out enable you to enter what are called Cushioning or Fairing values to an animation over a period of frames which you define numerically.

Objects in the real world accelerate and decelerate, and this speeding up and slowing down can help to lend weight to a move, as well as reducing the effects of strobing, when objects move too fast.

Interestingly, they can also be used in conjunction with the angle values in the Move requester to cushion 3D rotations. as well as moves along any of the axis.

Form and motion

The point of the animation was, in part, to suggest that you can enhance an interesting image with movement, and that very often if the image is interesting enough, you can get away with a very basic motion.

Conversely, a very simple, bland shape could be given enormous character by virtue of the way it is made to move.

A drawback of animation on the Amiga is memory, so it's always a good idea to see how to work around such constraints economically, and still arrive at interesting solutions

In writing this article, I have deliberately avoided some of the finer points of the DPaint software, like the use of the Function Keys 1 to 4, which enable frameby-frame advancement of the animation, playback and, in the case of the 3 Key advancing to any frame in the animation, since most users of DPaint should be familiar with them.

DPaint is a versatile package for producing 2D animations on the Amiga. To get the best out of it you need a lot of memory and speed, as is the case with most graphics applications, which are ver memory intensive. So raid that digital piggy-bank. Now!

Starting with some traditional animation, this was digitised and saved as hi-res DPaint files. Once in DPaint the ani mation was treated in various ways and then saved to floppy

The completed animation frames were then transferred onto High band U-Matic tape as a series of stills, which were subsequently taken into Quantel Paintbox for compositing at a much higher resolution than the Amiga, before finally being transferred to Betacam SP tape via a LaserDisk.

This is one of many possible routes you could take to get your animation out of the Amiga. If all of the above seems a little too complex, you could always stick to using DPaint and saving short animations to disk for playback on other peoples' computers, or alternatively wait until CD video takes off, as it will, and take advantage of its high quality and interactiveness



n this month's Disk you will find the result of two years' work, 2,300 hours of programming and over 2.9 million bytes of code -Timm Martin's SID2.

Just stop and think for a moment exactly what it is we're giving away free, then recall the now much maligned shareware principle which states that an author should not suffer for his or her honesty, but be rewarded for a great deal of work.

SID2 is a shareware product, and its registration fee is a suggested US\$25 (about £15). The unregistered version of SID2 you now own is identical in all respects to the registered version except that it will not allow you to save out your preferences.

As the program is one of the most configurable ever designed, and as tailoring it to your particular needs is half its power, you should by now be scribbling out those US money orders and posting them to Timm Martin, whose address can be

found in the on-disk documents or by selecting the information option on SID2's Program menu.

On with the show! Your first job as a SID user is to decide which version is best for you. There are three on the CoverDisk - one each for Workbench 1.3 and 2.04, and SID2 Personal for users of half megabyte machines. Select the SID of your choice from the ShortCut menu and away you go.

Standard layout

When the program has loaded, you will see the by now standard layout for a directory utility, including a title bar, two large listing windows, and several rows of command buttons at the bottom.


Owners of most directory utilities, especially those used to SID 1.06, will be instantly comfortable with this screen and will need no further introduction, especially as there's 200k of online help files to keep you going.

For those of you who've never used such a program, I'll run through a general outline before we launch into a blow-byblow look at SID2's features.

Take a long look at the screen and try to familiarise yourself with the layout, paying particular attention to the command buttons below the two main windows.

These are almost all dedicated to actions which will only work on selected

files, none of which you will have at the moment, as you haven't yet loaded a directory listing.

To do this, click on the button on the top row - just below the directory window - marked DF0, and a listing of the root directory of your CoverDisk should appear


after a bit of disk whirring. The top half of the list will be in orange and the bottom half in white, which is the colour setting used with our configuration to denote the difference between directories and single files

If you want to pop into a directory for a quick nose around, just double click on it and the display will change to the directory contents.

To move back out of the directory, move the mouse pointer to the outside edge of the window as far as it will go, click the left mouse button, and the parent directory will appear.


Jumping straight to the directory of your choice is even easier. Look along the top row of buttons until you see one marked VOL, and click on it with the left button. This is the volumes button and will list all the legitimate volumes your CoverDisk contains along with any aliases set up since the disk booted.

At the moment, you'll see just C:, DEVS:, FONTS:, L:, LIBS:, S:, and T:, and

the names of any disks presently in your drives.

To go to the S: directory without having to first click on DF0, just double click on the S: listed in your window.

Note that you can jump back to the parent directory from a volume in the usual manner – an improvement over SID 1.06, which wouldn't know where to go if you had originally dived in through the volumes button. While we're in the S: directory, let's examine the CoverDisk startup-sequence to see what it looks like. You might think this is a job for Shell or CLI, but with SID all you have to do is double click on the file – so do it now.

What happens is that SID looks in C: for the MMPP text reader, which we've told it to do through the QuickPrefs program, then loads it along with the text file you've double clicked on. Press the Escape

The personal touch

With all its help files, doc files, and so on, SID2 can take up the best part of a floppy, so you might be thinking "what use is that to someone like me who uses a single or dual floppy system?". Never fear, SID2 Personal is here.

SID2 Personal is a cut down version of SID without the Load and Edit Prefs option which runs in 512k and takes up a lot less space on your floppy. We might have to distribute SID2 with all the related Help and Doc files, but there's nothing to stop users scrubbing them from their own system disk once they've mastered the use of the program.

Having disposed of the 200k help file and the docs, a crunched SID2 Personal will leave plenty of room on your Workbench disk for programs of your own.

The procedure for setting up SID2 Personal on a fresh disk is fairly straightforward. Just boot up SID and use it to copy the following files to your new disk:

> SID2_Personal SID2-Personal SID2-Personal.info Quickprefs Quickprefs.info

Now make sure you copy ICONX to the C: directory of the new disk – if it's not already there – and all the SID2 Prefs files found in the S: directory of your CoverDisk.


If you don't want the help files and doc files, that's it, but please remember that if you give a copy of SID2 to a friend you should always pass on the full doc, distribution, and help files.

key for now to get out of MMPP and double click on the file SID2.config. Unlike the text file we've just looked at this is a binary file, which SID recognises as such and just pops up an information panel with details on the file's size, datestamp, protection flags, and so on.

If there was a hex editor in your CoverDisk C: directory, you could click once on a binary file then on XEDIT to examine a file's hex listing. There wasn't enough room on the CoverDisk to squeeze in many of the utility programs you'd normally want to control through SID2, but if you register with Timm Martin you will receive the fully configurable version and can then set it up to use the programs at your disposal.

Utilities such as PPShow, for viewing normal and crunched IFF files, the NewZap hex editor, QED text editor, and

The competition

Since the release of the original SID, the number and variety of directory utilities available for the Amiga has gone through the roof.

Most of these followed the general SID layout and attempted with varying degrees of success to accomplish the same tasks, but until recently none of them could oust SID v1.06 from its spot at the top of the heap.

TDM, as distributed on a recent Amiga Computing CoverDisk, was the first shareware release to beat SID v1.06 on functionality, presentation and ease of use, and Directory Opus from INOVAtronics (a commercial release) was the first to go one up on power, though it became a virtual SID clone in order to do this. The release of SID2 has put paid to most of this competition.

No other directory utility has the range of features and the complete configurability of SID2, and none is easier to use. Expect SID2 to become a star performer in the collections of most decent shareware and PD libraries over the next few months, but remember that this excellent utility made its European debut exclusively on the best Amiga CoverDisk in the business.



a host of others are available through PD and shareware, none of which you'll have to use through CLI as long as you configure SID properly.

Timm has made the new user's job as easy as possible by including a 200k help file which you can access directly from SID2

If you are confused about the function of any of the buttons or menu items, just hold down the Ctrl key and click on the offending button or select the troublesome menu item and a help panel will appear with a full description of the item in question.

Thi: feature can't be too strongly emphasised for the first time user, and to give yourself a full guided tour of SID2 conducted by the author of himself, I'd recommend you hold down the Ctrl key and click on everything in sight. After ten minutes you'll be well on your way to becoming a SID2 expert user.

Configuration


Now for the fun bit. Configuring SID has always been the route towards complete system harmony and the sort of warm inner glow previously only available after a rousing bowl of certain breakfast cereals, but with SID2 it has assumed Zen-like proportions.

Tailoring SID to seamlessly interact with your existing system has never been easier or more completely possible, though if you only have a 512k machine and are using SID2 Personal, you'll be unable to change any Preferences settings.

The rest of us should by now be holding down the right mouse button and selecting Edit Prefs from the program menu. You should see seven sub items, one each for Buttons, Colours, Configuration, Fonts, Layouts, Menus, and Path.

The topmost selection - End - will finish your Prefs editing session. To begin with, we'll make a few simple changes to the colour scheme, so select Colours and release the right mouse button.

At first it would appear that nothing has happened, but if you look at the message strip right at the bottom of the SID screen, you'll be told to "check out

As there are so many configuration options open to the user, it really is down a your own personal tastes and needs as to how unique your own copy of SID becomes. By way of a few pointers, however, here's a run-down of the most usel Prefs options.





Remember that unless you register with Timm Martin, any changes you make will be lost when you turn off your Amiga.

Quit out of this section after making your changes then choose the Edit Prefs/Buttons item to bring up probably the most powerful and flexible part of SID2.

Customisation

You may have noticed that by clicking with the right mouse button anywhere in the button bank you toggle to a second bank of buttons with more available commands.

What you may not have realised is that you can design as many different button banks as you like or swap and change the existing banks to put all your favourite commands and actions in the same place.

Most of this complex section is explained in a straightforward way using the Help function, but for confused users we'll take a quick stroll through some of the features.

The first panel you'll see is the bank control panel, offering various options to insert a complete bank, delete or edit the current bank, or move, copy, swap, and edit individual buttons.

To begin with a single button, click on Swap then on the first and second buttons in the bank that you'd like to swap positions.

Now try Move, and you'll notice that when the operation is complete you have a blank space where the button used to be before you moved it. To get to the really sticky bits, click on Edit then on this blank button.

A much more involved panel will appear in front of the Bank Control Panel which enables the user to specify exactly what a button is called and what it does when clicked on. In the middle of the SID2's main screen in custom 16-colour mode

panel is a scrolling list of internal SID commands which can be attached to the button, and above this is the usual colour/text editing section.

After naming your button and choosing its colours, hold down the Ctrl key and click once on the scrolling list of commands to summon SID's online help.

Probably the best way to find out about each function is to assign it to a blank button, click on OK until the button appears in your button bank, then click on the new button with the Ctrl key held down

The Help file will tell you as much as you need to know about the function you've assigned to the button, and if you decide it doesn't do what you wanted it to, you can always edit it again.

Note that once you're back in the main SID screen, you can edit a button by simply clicking on it while holding down the left Alt key. This produces the button editing panel, and holding down the right Alt while clicking on a button will enable you to set the button's keyboard short-cut.

Experimenting

We have, of course, merely scratched the surface as far as SID configuration goes. The program can be used as a simple directory utility or can be totally configured to virtually run your hard drive for you - the choice of how far to go is yours.

Only by experimenting and messing about with all the preferences settings can you fully understand how powerful a tool SID can be, and as the Preferences settings will not be saved out in this unregistered version, you can happily play away safe in the knowledge that your SID copy will not be corrupted or permanently messed up by tinkering.

AG Spreadsheets

u know, it never occurred to me until now to get a spreadsheet program. Life's too short to start messing around with cellular calculation engines, right?

But alas, there comes a time when every man must come to the aid of the party, and besides I drew the short straw, which meant I had to look at these things if I liked it or not. I'm a professional. I'll rise above it.

After getting all the programs in the post, the first thing that struck me was the lurid packaging that most of the companies had chosen for what is, let it be said, a boring but necessary product. "OK, so it's boring inside, but

"OK, so it's boring inside, but check out the wrapper, dude!" they seem to say. The second thing which caught me completely by surprise was, in fact, how interesting a spreadsheet is when it's powerful and easy to operate. In case you've had your head in a

In case you've had your head in a bucket of cement for the last ten years, spreadsheets are the computer equivalent of the kind of accounts books you see in WH Smiths, where you fill in all your figures and miraculously reach a grand total.

Easy, right? Wrong. What happens if you write a figure incorrectly or add up the same number twice? You have to rub out all the figures that this affects, and add them up again. This paper and pencil approach slowed down the progress of accounting for centuries, and still does in certain quarters.

Now we have spreadsheets, which take your accounts onto a grid on the screen, and this time when you change a figure all the others relating to that figure change automatically, like a lot of little numerical dominoes falling over.

Each figure on the grid is said to be inside a "cell", and inside that cell you can have a number or even an invisible calculation which is applied to other cells, the answer being printed in the current cell.

It's very neat, and even if you think you don't like this sort of thing, it can be almost as addictive as a game. A fairly mathematical and pointless game, but a game nonetheless.

Let's line up the contenders and see what they've got. A surprising turn-out for this match, with most offering some kind of presentation graphics, and no discernible bugs in any of them, at least for the test period. Soft

Kuma • £105.75

This is the big one. I knew this before I even clapped eyes on it, as everyone I spoke to about spreadsheets asked if I'd seen it.

They all said the same thing: "Well, that's the one." So what did Kuma do to this program to get it such a stonking good reputation?

Well, they loaded it down with features for a start. The first thing you notice when you open the box is the size and weight of the huge, baffling manual. Sure it's nicely presented, but not as nice as the manual for a product like Wordworth, for example.

OK, so it's not slickly produced, but all the information is there if you need it. And you will.

When you first start the program – remembering to run the Install program first, to install the tiny fonts that the spreadsheet uses – you get a feeling for its power right away.

When you start the system you see that KSpread has its own desktop. Icons for the various menu items are arrayed along the side, and menus are along the top title bar. Buttons for regularly used functions are in a row along the top, and the spreadsheet grid sits there blinking its cur-

sor, waiting for your numbers to crunch. You can reorganise the desktop to suit you, and after you've done it you can save the results so your default setup will always pop up when you boot the program.

One thing you will notice straight away, if you have ever used the Atari ST, is that the alerts and graphics bear a striking resemblance to the ST's Desktop, and there's a sound reason for this. The program was clearly designed on an Atari and ported over. But don't be put off by this.

The impression of latent power isn't diminished when you start pulling down menus and pushing buttons. You can tap the cursor keys or click on the right cell using the mouse, and you can also select a range by holding the mouse button and moving the mouse down or across a required range of cells.

Almost all the functions are duplicated in

buttons and menus, from toggling absolute/relative to loading a new spreadsheet.


KS4 also has some very useful tricks up its sleeve, like the ability to load in Ascii files as data. So if you have a file like this:

data	465.99	467.88	
data2	65.95	47.00	

you can load this as Ascii into the spreadsheet, and it's just spooled in as it comes – the word "data" will be in cell A0, the number 465.99 in cell B0, "data 2" in cell A1 and so on.

Once the strings have been loaded, they are parsed by the program to interpret them as labels or numbers. This is a good way of importing data from non-compatible systems, as simple Ascii dumps of the data.

KSpread has too many features to mention here, but suffice to say it's the king of the heap. Its database functions and extensive import and export routines to Lotus 1-2-3, Data Interchange Format (DIF) and DGCalc – from but not to in the latter case – ensure that it would be just as at home in the office as in the home.







PostScript output is available if you have a compatible printer, and being a Gold Disk product you have the ability to save your graphs to disk as ProDraw 2.0 clip art.

This means that you can produce a presentation as IFFs for the screen, and produce similar graphics for a document to accompany your demonstration.

The manual is a very nice piece of DTP, as you would expect from the makers of one of the best DTP programs on the Amiga, and ranks up there with the EA and Digita manuals for slick presentation and good layout.




Another nice touch is the control panel arrangement across the top of each sheet, giving you access to different fonts and sizes, and the ability to alter and arrange your spreadsheet as if it were a wordprocessing document, which to a certain extent in ProCalc it is.

The range of graphs you can create is the most extensive of all the programs I tried, and it's this that makes it my personal favourite. Not only can you create graphs for your data, but you can try a number of different types, too.

It's not unlike having Peter Snow sitting by your side with the Newsnight computer whizzing up swings to the left and right as your data changes. Professional is the word, and apart from KSpread 4 there's not much to touch it for professionalism and graphics.

The previous opus from Gold Disk on which ProCalc is based, and seeing this, it's easy to see why they produced ProCalc. It offers similar kinds of options to its new brother, but is obviously less flash and less WB2.0 looking.

Although now superseded by ProCalc, it's still available and for less money too, so it might be a good idea if you lack the necessary funds to run to ProCalc, but you want some of the features.

It reads and writes 1-2-3, and like all the other American products, has an ARexx port, although quite why I'm not really sure.

OK, so you can whizz data from one program to another, but the programs have to be compatible or it all goes horribly wrong. Gold Disk products have no trouble with this, but as for others - you'll have to suck it and see what happens.

Just a smaller version of ProCalc then, and in the charts I'd say it ranks in front of KSpread 2 but behind it's big brother.

Conclusion

By far the best program, even in the eyes of some of the people who sell the others, is KSpread 4 by Kuma Computers. It has the biggest range of features, and is compatible with more programs than any of the others.

Anyone who expects to make much of an impression on the Amiga spreadsheet market had better be sure that their idea has all these features and more, or they stand no chance.

Although KSpread 4 was undoubtedly the winner from the sheer weight of features, my own personal choice would be Professional Calc, for its 1-2-3 read/write ability and the option of being able to export graphs to ProPage in ProDraw clip format.

So if you want the best, choose Kuma's KS4. But if you just want a little pocketable piece of personal protection, ProCalc is your man.







ProPage 3.0

ot on the heels of the much improved PageStream 2.2 comes Gold Disk's latest salvo in the DTP war, ProPage 3.0, which concentrates, unlike version 2.1, on new features rather than bug fixes. A quick glance at these features is enough to tell you that Gold Disk have gone straight for the power user's jugular.

The most significant improvement has to be the comprehensive ARexx support which, given its 330-odd commands, offers complete control of ProPage from ARexx.

Better still, in order to get the most from ARexx, the program uses what it calls "genies" – really just ARexx scripts – which are directly accessible from ProPage at the click of a button.

When you boot ProPage 3.0, you'll find that the mop tool has been replaced by an Aladdin's lamp button, which brings up the genie requester (corny!) when clicked on.

Tweaking


There are over 50 function genies aready defined, ranging from the simple AllCaps and similar text effects, to box attribute control and even an ADPro "hotlink" which enables bitmap tweaking in ADPro and automatic re-importation of the graphic once it has been tweaked.

As ARexx is being used by more and more programs, the genie feature makes ProPage 3.0 a much more powerful tool, and gives the ARexx-conversant user the opportunity to write macros for virtually every situation.

My one complaint about genies is that there is no auto-record function. When you click on the Define button, ProPage simply loads up the Article Editor and expects you to write your own macro.

This is all very well for those who use ARexx or who have the patience to learn to use it, but those unwilling to go near even so simple a language as this will more than likely never realise the full potential of MIGA



ARexx control. An auto-record function capable of generating ARexx scripts would have made ProPage 3.0 a "must buy" product.

Other enhancements include a font conversion utility which will convert Adobe Type 1 PostScript fonts to the Compugraphic fonts Gold Disk seem deter-



mined to stick with. FontManager works well, and the converted fonts are of perfectly good quality, but it can be a bit slow if you're copying a complete set of PostScript fonts across to your Compugraphic drawer.

Nevertheless, its inclusion gives ProPage access to the hundreds of Adobe Type 1 fonts available and, as typefaces are the bread and butter of DTP, this has come not a moment too soon. Nine Compugraphic fonts, including Caslon and Uncial, are now supplied with the package, so most users will have enough to get started with.

Another feature which will be music to the ears of existing ProPage users is the irregular text flow option. Using this, text can be made to flow round the outline of any structured drawing rather than its box, as was previously the case. Unfortunately, although Gold Disk have at last seen the light on this one, they have failed to implement it properly.

Text can flow around the left or right of an object, but not both, so it is still impossible to have a circular hole in your text unless it is at the juncture of two columns and you create an ellipse either side of the gutter. I have to admit to shrieking with annoyance when I discovered this relatively simple omission. The direct Hotlink to ProDraw 3.0 (due for release later this year) is easily the most attractive to users with a lot of clip art or other structured drawing in their pages. The user need only click on the box containing the ProDraw clip, select the ProDraw option, and ProDraw is loaded with the clip ready to be edited

In combination with ProDraw 3.0's new Fountain Fill option, which will allow fullpage gradients, the hotlink adds a great deal of functionality to ProPage, saving a lot of time and hassle if you use ProDraw clips.

Text filters

With the new auto-tiling print option, a long-needed Undo feature, text filters for most American (not British) wordprocessors, and a few tweaks to the colour separation process, ProPage 3.0 will be far and away the most welcome disk to have dropped through the letter boxes of registered users. There are still areas in need of improvement, but Gold Disk have done a fine job in boosting the package the way they have.

Want to know if it's better than the rest? Then buy the next issue of *Amiga Computing* and read our three-way battle of the DTP giants. ProPage 3.0, PageStream 2.2 and Saxon Publisher 1.2 will all be fighting it out for the DTP Lonsdale belt, so for all you fight – and font – fans out there, it should be unmissable.

Imagine 2.0

Impulse Inc of Minnesota, USA have just released a major upgrade to their flagship 3D rendering and animation program, Imagine. This comprises of revisions and improvements to all sections of the package as well as a new version 2.0 look to the interface. Together these constitute a significant improvement in the power and functionality of this already impressive software.


One of the most striking aspects of the new version of Imagine is the configurability of the interface as a whole. This has been achieved through the introduction of a Preferences page which is accessible from any of the other modules.

Previously the user had to access Imagine's all-important config file through the CLI but now you can set up all preferences from within the program. In addition to this, each editor can have its menu options assigned to any one of the function keys of the Amiga keyboard or create special Unix-style "buttons" along the bottom of the workscreens to perform these tasks.

This means that you can set up the program in such a way that you need hardly ever touch the keyboard or access the menu bar. A double blessing, as not only does it speed up user interaction, but it avoids the eye straining and totally superfluous drop shadow fonts found in the menus.

Overall, the program has been given a

silkier feel and users will find themselves flying around the various modules in creating their animations and renders. The manual, though greatly improved, still has its shortcomings, but at least is an improvement on Impulse's previously lamentable efforts.

The 300-page volume contains reference and tutorial material on all aspects and applications, presented in a reasonably clear if badly structured manner. Not content with ably instructing the user about the program, it also offers a more than generous helping of Impulse Inc's unique in-house philosophy.

As far as functionality and potential goes, this upgrade places Imagine firmly at the top of the 3D tree and confirms it as a tremendously powerful and enjoyable program to use. However it is seriously flawed in its rendering by Impulse's persistence in employing an extremely crude form of anti-aliasing.

Text animation, for instance, is ruined by this shortcoming, even in 24-bit colour. For it to be considered as a professional product this oversight must be addressed as quickly as possible. This (major) gripe aside, Impulse deserve all credit for developing this superb new version.

... to the full glory of a 24-bit render

Workbench 2.10

Before you all scream "but they've just released 2.04!", I'd better tell you that we've laid our sticky hands on an early developer's copy of Workbench 2.10, and Commodore are unlikely to officially update Workbench until at least the end of the year.

Having said that, the improvements offered by the new system are enough to make the mouth water even at this early stage in its development.

The most annoying bug for single floppy users of Workbench 2.04 has been the Format command's insistence on being

very stupid. When a floppy is formatted, even if fresh and write enabled, the Amiga insists on complaining that it is write protected. You can get round this by clicking on Retry, but in 2.10 the bug has been removed.

It's too early yet to look at the other bug fixes, especially as Commodore can supply no documentation for Workbench 2.10, so I'll concentrate instead on the new features.

The most obvious enhancements can be found in the preferences drawer. These are Sound, Locale, PrinterPS, and CrossDOS.

Sound is a program to enable the user to attach the sound sample of his or her choice to an alert, which means every time you do something stupid you can have you Amiga belch beep, or fart at you. This at first is great fun, but after a while you get the feeling simple beep will do.

Locale gives the user a choice of work time zones in which to work, and languages to use, but its function is otherwise a little unclear. How it will be implemented we will tell you as soon a Commodore admit that Workbench 2.1 exists.

PrinterPS enables full Workbench comtrol of PostScript output specs, including font selection of the Adobe 35 PostScription font set supplied with most compatible laser printers. There's a full text option panel where users can set the text size leading, line spacing, and margins.

Paper size, orientation, and most other settings are also catered for, with the notable exception of scaling. Let's hope this last feature can be included before the final version is released.

CrossDOS

CrossDOS, at long last, provides a standard by which Amiga users can format read, and write to MS-DOS format floppies. Implementation of the feature excellent, as the standard Format command does all the work, and depending on what drive you tell it to format, which type of disk you're after.

In addition to this, there's a neat little fuel gauge box showing how far the format is proceeding which pops up onscreen whenever you initialise a dis from Workbench.

To cap it off, Workbench 2.10 is the first version to arrive complete with in own installer program, using Commodore's now standard Install pregram, which makes life a lot easier for hard drive users. More on Workbench 2.10 as happens, especially if we can squeeze some official documentation out of Commodore.

Imagine's new features

The Forms Editor – This has seen substantial rewriting and what was a rather baffling inclusion in Imagine 1.0 has become a powerful method of creating complex organic shapes. It does this through a process involving "key slices" and while it demands a great deal of application in the learning stages it offers a degree of modelling control found nowhere else on the Amiga.

The Cycle Editor – This module, where animation sequences such as walking can be prepared, now offers the great potential of morphing between shapes.

Unfortunately, however, these new features do not work as they are described in the manual. This is a great pity as they would be an extremely powerful facility to have.

The Detail Editor – The main modelling page now offers true bump mapping, reflective diffusion to prevent pixelisation when using reflectance maps on flat surfaces, soft and hard edge control to avoid the "bulging" associated with phong shading on acute angles, fog objects which fade out at their edges and a host of new procedural textures such as water effects and even leopard spots! Spline paths can now be edited within this editor and used by the Mold (sic) function to extrude and replicate outlines. Another handy feature is the ability to perform a "auickrender"

This is a full-colour preview within the editor using a fixed light source for speed and it obviates the need to set up an entire project in order to view your models. This function is found in all editors allowing previewing at all stages before commitment to a final render.

The Stage Editor – This is where models, lights and paths are combined to make up animation sequences. Apart from making the snapshot function work, the main change to this section is that it is now separated from the Action Editor.

The Action Editor – This scripting page now allows rendering over background pictures, and the use of two of Imagine's unique special effects, such as ripples and explosions, at once. With Control of background fog you can eliminate distracting detail from scenes and simulate depth of field effects.

Background frames and reflectance maps can be indexed to allow digital layering of animations within your computer to create infinitely complex sequences without any degeneration between passes.





ver the last 12 months, I've had the pleasure of playing with just about every 24-bit board on the market. As a result, the imminent arrival of yet another system was greeted with interest, but to be honest not exactly wild excitement.

As it turned out, my initial apathy was transformed into amazement as what appeared to be a bargain basement release proved to be one of the best systems I've had the opportunity of using, regardless of price. Rather than a simple display board, AVideo offers a vast array of features only matched in variety by GVP's less than impressive IV24.

One of the few drawbacks of the board concerns installation. The problem isn't caused by the procedure itself but rather by its implications for your warranty

The board is designed primarily for the A1500 and upwards, although Checkmate claim compatibility with A500s. Unlike all other systems, AVideo doesn't employ a Zorro slot as an installation point. To fit the board you must first remove the drive bay and pop out the Denise - Amiga's designer display chip. Once free from her moorings,

the aforesaid chip is then popped into an identical slot on the board. When secure, the new PCB with its selection of additional chips plus good old Denise are mounted back in the original chip socket.

All that remains is to trail the accompanying cable to a suitable Zorro through slot complete with its RGB connector ready to accommodate the monitor.

There are basically two problems with this process. Firstly, piggy-backing chips is strictly illegal in the eyes of Commodore. As a result, being caught with the offending addition on your motherboard will invalidate your guarantee. If however your warrantee is no more than a distant memory, who cares what Commodore think!

Direct soldering

Perhaps a more serious threat to the future of the board is Commodore's planned move to surface-mounted technology. In other words, all major components will be soldered directly on to the motherboard.

This annoying change of direction is sure to put all piggy-back style products in real trouble. Therefore, if you're planning to upgrade to a A1500 or above with an AVideo on board, you'd be well advised to do the decent thing, sooner, rather than

Price later, otherwise you could miss your chance altogether. With these two points out of the way, it's time to get down to some serious flattery. Once the hardware is safely



installed, the next task is to add the impressive collection of software.

Aside from the commercial software, the system offers a powerful array of control utilities which add a lot of weight to the board's potential as a multimedia workstation.

Perhaps the most obvious, and instantly appealing, option allows you to load either 12- or 24-bit images and display them through colour zero on the Workbench screen. By applying the aforementioned colour to the majority of the Workbench environment, the board achieves a pseudogenlocking effect with either 12- or 24-bit images appearing as the ultimate Workbench backdrop.

As well as offering designer backdrops, it's also possible to produce Picture in Picture or PIP effects with the graphic of your choice floating in a window all its own. As with the majority of AVideo's display formats, this is controlled via the Opera animation software - which I'll cover in detail a little later in the article.

Imagery

To produce any effect obviously requires imagery, but thanks to yet another control utility the board isn't merely restricted to 12- or 24-bit creations.

Any standard Amiga graphic can be converted via the AVRemap utility for display on the board, so there's no reason why standard Amiga art can't appear alongside 12- or 24-bit images as part of either an animation or a slide show. As

well as the amazing TVPaint bundle (see box), an equally important piece of software must be the ARexx-based interpreter, Opera.

Opera allows the user to compile impressive animations and slide shows by employing the power of ARexx via a CanDo-style script-building interface.

The software automates the development of ARexx scripts to the point where even relatively inexperi-

enced ARexx users can produce stunning effects and anims. By using the board's own icon-driven installation software, AVideo can be made resident via the Workbench or CLI and then address directly via ARexx.

Once active, the Opera utility opens a user interface which allows simple click selection of files and effects, which then instantly translate into an ARexx script and appear in an adjacent script window. Either complete scripts or individual lines can then be run and tested as required.

If faults occur, the errors are trapped in

an additional output console with a standard ARexx error message detailing the offending line ready for correction.

No doubt you're thinking Opera sounds a bit too good to be true, and to be honest – for the average ARexx novice – it is. Although the interface and console are indeed friendly and do take a lot of the drudgery out of script compilation, the ARexx scripts created are exactly that – pure ARexx.

For the novice, tracking down and

debugging even an automatically-generated ARexx script can be a painful and confusing process. As a result, it's not a good idea to expect a miraculous performance without a reasonable knowledge of the language.

For example, when errors occur within a script, bog standard

In terms of resolution, AVideo more than matches up to the opposition with a full broadcast 768 x 580 display – ideal for video applications – or standard Amiga output of 640 x 512 (hi-res interlace).

Image quality is also impressive, with a full 24-bit 16.8 million colour display. During editing and animation, two 12-bit buffers are employed giving a true 4,096 colour display which can then be toggled via TVPaint or the board's own software to display full 24-bit as a separate still frame display.

An additional genlock adaptor allows full genlocking of 12-bit images over live video, or alternatively Amiga graphics and animation can overlay the output of the board in both 12- and 24-bit modes.

Picture in Picture is available for still images in both 12- and 24-bit display modes, with a maximum refresh rate of 3/50ths of a second for each 12-bit buffer.

According to Checkmate, the system is capable of running on a standard Amiga, although to be honest I wouldn't recommend it. To employ TVPaint properly, you'll require a 68030, and you'll need at least 8Mb of fast memory to use the program's 24-bit Undo option when using full overscan.

The board also offers full broadcast resolution for 12-bit double buffered animation with a maximum speed of 12.5 frames a second in hi-res interlace and 25 frames a second in non-interlace. Both these figures depend on your system and the amount of movement during subsequent frames in the anim.

When utilising the highest possible quality, 12-bit update times are reduced to nine frames per second for hi-res interlace and 17 seconds for non-interlace. The first format is designed for TV and video, while the second offers the maximum clarity for multiscan and VGA monitors.

ARexx error messages are reported via the console, so unless you have some understanding of the scripts themselves, debugging can be a tricky business.

Having had a slight whinge, it's perhaps worth recapping what Opera can offer when mastered. Aside from simple sequential slide shows, images can be introduced with an impressive range of supplied effects.

Additional text can be included in the font of your choice, while images appear in windows on the Workbench, or as overlays on existing graphics. Animations can be compiled from full screen images, while individual objects or brushes can be animated and overlaid to add even more excitement to the presentation. In short, Opera is an impressive addition which in time is sure to become an invaluable tool to any serious user, especially those involved in multimedia and animation.

As a general purpose 24-bit multimedia/graphics card, AVideo literally blows the opposition out of the water with a combination of state-of-the-art software and flexible applications.

The only aspect I'd like to see improved is the documentation for the board itself, with perhaps a detailed tutorial on how to get the best from Opera.

Unrivalled

In terms of 24-bit RGB output, it's unrivalled for both price and performance in comparison to both the IV24 and G2's Imagica. This is a position which will soon be enhanced even further by the addition of a 24-bit frame grabber which Checkmate are planning to supply as an add-on to the system.

In terms of animation, AVideo's only rival is DCTV which because of its built-in frame grabber and microscopic file format is arguable still the ideal 24-bit option for animation aimed directly at VHS video.

Having said that, DCTV's composite output doesn't match up to AVideo's 12bit anim display for higher quality animation and slide shows. In short, if you're about to invest in a general purpose 24-bit system, it's almost impossible to consider any other board as a better buy than this truly excellent product.

The spectacularly tasty TVPaint

The most notable commercial addition has to be the premier 24-bit paint package, TVPaint v1.6. This alone is enough to make the board a spectacular bargain – in its Harlequin form the software alone retails at \pounds 940!

In the case of AVideo, TVPaint comes as part and parcel of the system and still somehow manages to sell for just £599 inclusive of both the board and all additional software.

In relation to the Harlequin you effectively get the board for nothing and still save £200 plus on the price of the software alone. Of course this calculation doesn't include the cost of the Harlequin card itself which will set you back a further £1,100 in its basic form.

Like the board, AVideo's version of TVPaint is an impressive product with all the latest additions that v1.6 has to offer. The only elements missing in relation to the Harlequin software is the Big Edit option, which allows you to move around and edit images above the board's maximum screen size, and secondly TVPaint's Alpha channel support – this particular feature requires 32-bit architecture.

Aside from these two options, the software is identical. The only operating difference is the restriction of two 12-bit buffers as opposed to true 24-bit double buffering on the Harlequin card.

Because of the 12-bit Edit option, the actual paint display is in

4,096 colours. This should not be confused with Ham's 4,096 colours, as the AVideo display is true 12-bit and as a result does not suffer any fringing or other problems associated with Ham.

On general imagery it's quite tricky to tell a 12-bit display apart from 24-bit. The difference only really appears when graduated painting is applied either via the spray can or during graduated effects. All such additions produced noticeably stepping or colour bands as the saturation fades.

To the 24-bit purist this probably sounds like a unacceptable sacrifice, but all is not lost. The board displays TVPaint's edit screens in 12-bit but actually paints in full 24-bit. Slightly confusing, I agree.

Because the image is in fact true 24-bit disguised as 12-bit, it's possible to view it in all its 24-bit glory by simply accessing the sys menu and switching the board into its 24-bit single frame display mode.

The only noticeable difference between the Harlequin and TVPaint during editing is the slightly slower screen update and a particularly infuriating tendency for the pointer on the AVideo version to float a quarter of an inch above the point of application during painting in video mode (768 x 580) – a minor bug, but an annoying one which I'm assured will be put right in the next update.

ast month's column took us to the point where we should have a home-made disk, called MyDisk, with the barest of AmigaDOS files on it to allow auto-booting.

If you didn't follow last month's column, you'll have to buy a copy of the magazine through our back issues offer towards the rear of the mag. Just follow the instructions in the column and you'll be bang up to date with the rest of us.

Before you can properly use the Workbench that your startup-sequence loads, you'll have to be able to click on icons and to open a Shell. For this, MyDisk will require a "library" file and the correct commands and so on to make a Shell work. First of all, we'll add the library.

Icon.library is the AmigaDOS file containing the routines needed by Kickstart to display icons onscreen and has a sister in the shape of Info.library, which enables the user to mess about with icon tool types.

We'll worry about tool types in later columns, so as you're probably eager just to get those icons to appear, copy icon.library from your Workbench disk to MyDisk using the command:

COPY LIBS: ICON.LIBRARY TO MYDISK:LIBS

Now we're ready to delve into some of the more esoteric areas of AmigaDOS. We have a very empty disk and over the next few months we'll progressively fill it with files, dealing in each column with a new practical application.

For the rest of this instalment, we'll concentrate on Shell so that when we use the disk we can access its gradually increasing power.

Shell has changed a great deal in the transition from Workbench 1.3 to 2.04, both in its user interface and in the files needed to make it function. On a

Workbench 1.3 disk, there are several more steps you'll need to take to get Shell up and running, so we'll start with a 2.04 Shell and then detail the further steps needed by 1.3 owners.

For those using Kickstart and Workbench 2.04, setting up a Shell has been made very easy. All the Workbench 1.3 device-handlers and so on have been made resident in the Kickstart ROM which means you need only copy a Shell icon and Shell-startup file to MyDisk to equip it with a window into AmigaDOS.

To do this, boot with your Workbench disk and locate your Shell icon - it may be in the main window or could be stored in the system drawer. Now click on it to open Shell and change directory to wherever the Shell icon is situated.

If it is the main disk window (the root directory), you should already be in the correct place. If it is in the system drawer, type:

CD SYS:SYSTEM

to change directory. Now all users should type:

COPY SHELL.INFO TO MYDISK:

and the shell icon, designated, as all icons are, by the ".info" bit tagged on the end, will be copied to your designer disk.

You will now have a basic operable Shell, but to add a final touch, the Shellstartup file should be copied across as well. This is a script file - we discussed these last month, remember? - executed one command at a time when you open Shell, in much the same way as a startupsequence is executed when your disk boots up.

The standard Shell-startup contains a few Alias commands (explained later) and the Prompt command. The file will be the

Mountlist

An Ascii file containing the AmigaDOS definitions of every device to be mounted Without this file and the correct entries in the DEVS: drawer, you'd get one of those "Entry not found" error messages, and nothing would happen. A mountlist will usu ally contain entries for NEWCON:, SPEAK:, RAD:, and so on.

Resident

Using the Resident command, AmigaDOS can make a variety of commands and device drivers "resident" in memory, which means they are kept in RAM until a program needs to use them. Only "pure" commands can be made resident, so if the file in question is not "pure" it will be forced into that state by the resident command.

Pure

If an executable file – such as an AmigaDOS command – is "pure", it can effectively be used by more than one Shell process or program at a time, and if a pure file is made

tasking operating system, and saves a lot of time. A file's pure status can be set on or off by altering the file's protection flags, one of which is reserved in the role of keeping tabs on this. Not all files can be made pure, but many of the standard AmigaDOS commands, such as Execute and Assign can.

For example, if you wanted your current directory to be SYS:WORK when you loaded Shell, the command CD SYS:WORK could be inserted somewhere in the Shell-startup to carry out the directory change automatically when you click on your Shell icon. Smart, eh? For now, we'll refrain from tampering with the file and just look at what it does.

If you type ED S:SHELL-STARTUP while in Shell, you should have a copy of the file visible onscreen, and have noticed an entirely new command, namely Alias. This is an extremely useful command which only works in conjunction with Shell and which can make life a great deal easier. It is used to give an "alias" or shortened version to any single command string you care to define.

To set up an alias, you would use the following sort of line:

ALIAS [your choice of alias] "AmigaDOS command string"

This means that if you get bored typing the full command for a simple diskcopy, you could insert a line in your Shellstartup to substitute a much easier to type alternative such as:

ALIAS DO1 "DISKCOPY FROM DED: TO DE1:"


In future all you'd have to do to carry out the diskcopy would be to type D01 and the clever little Shell would know what you meant.

The other command you'll find in the Shell-startup file is the Prompt command, usually the last one in the file. Prompt is used to tell Shell how much information to display before the cursor, and can be configured to display just the process number or the full-blown pathname of the directory in which you are working.

The latter can be useful when you jump through several directories as you always know your position in the directory "tree", and for this reason is the recommended mode of operation. The Prompt command you will see in your Workbench disk's shell-startup file is best left as it is, as it takes the form:

PROMPT "IN.IS> "

The %N part just displays the number of the Shell process, and the %S part displays the full pathname of your current



directory. After that there's a space, for purely aesthetic purposes, and a little arrow just in case you need to be told where to start typing which, as we're rapidly becoming Amiga experts, we won't particularly require!

Right, we've looked at the two steps for setting up a Workbench 2.04 Shell, both of which are applicable to Workbench 1.3 owners, so we'll now look at the extra files and setup conditions required by a 1.3 Shell. First the files.

To get it over with as painlessly as possible, here's a list of all the additional files needed by a 1.3 Shell and their location on your Workbench 1.3 disk:

• C:PROMPT C:RESIDENT C:MOUNT DEVS:MOUNTLIST

- L:NEWCON-HANDLER
- L:SHELL-SEG
- SYS:SYSTEM/CLI

Before copying them to MyDisk, you'll have to make an L: directory and one called "system" in the disk's root directory, as our disk doesn't have either of these yet.

The L: directory, you will remember, is where we keep device handlers to complement the devices kept in DEVS:. The file Newcon-Handler is the device handler used to set up the NEWCON: device, which is in effect the Shell window itself. For now, type:

MAKEDIR MYDISK:L MAKEDIR MYDISK:SYSTEM

111

then, if you're a single drive owner, copy all the files you need into RAM like this:

COPY COPY TO RAM: COPY CD TO RAM: COPY C:PROMPT TO RAM: COPY C:RESIDENT TO RAM: COPY C: MOUNT TO RAM: COPY L:NEWCON-HANDLER TO RAM: COPY L:SHELL-SEG TO RAM: COPY SYS:SYSTEM/CLI TO RAM:

The next step is to CD RAM:, eject your Workbench disk, insert MyDisk in the internal drive, then type:

> COPY PROMPT TO MYDISK:C COPY RESIDENT TO MYDISK:C COPY MOUNT TO MYDISK:C COPY NEWCON-HANDLER TO MYDISK:L COPY SHELL-SEG TO MYDISK:L COPY CLI TO MYDISK:SYSTEM

Once all that's over, type CD SYS: and replace Workbench in the drive when prompted. We now have the correct files in place for a version 1.3 Shell, and all that's left is to put in place the startup commands needed to mount the device.

To do this, we'll need to create a file called "mountlist" in the DEVS: directory of MyDisk, and insert two new lines in MyDisk's startup-sequence. A mountlist is an Ascii file containing one or more entries describing the devices we wish to mount, but in the case of MyDisk, it needs only one entry (for NEWCON:).

Users of 2.04 machines won't need to create a mountlist yet as NEWCON: is mounted automatically by Kickstart. However, you should carry out the following instructions in any case, as it'll save you creating a mountlist later in the series. Step one is to open Shell and type:

ED RAN: MOUNTLIST

which will create a blank file in the RAM disk and open the Workbench text editor. Next, type the following mountlist

This month's commands

Resident

Used to make a file "resident" in memory, thus speeding up any process using the file, and leaving the way open for the file to made pure for multitasking purposes See this month's jargon for further details. The command's syntax takes the form:

RESIDENT CNAMES (AMIGADOS COMMAND) [REMOVES [ADD] [SYSTEM]


Where [name] is an optional resident name you can give to the file. Using the parameter Add will add the file to the resident list, and using Remove will do the opposite. The System parameter will add the file to a special "system" resident list.

Mount

This command is used to mount any AmigaDOS device which is not automatically mounted by Kickstart or an external ROM, such as with hard drive controller cards The syntax used is:

MOUNT (DEVICE) [FROM]

where {device} corresponds to the name of the device in the mountlist entry. You can use the From argument if you have an alternative mountlist containing entries not fount in DEVS:MOUNTLIST, the file to which mount refers by default



entry verbatim, to give your mountlist a description of Shell which the Amiga will understand:

NEWCON: HANDLER = L:NEWCON-HANDLER PRIORITY = 5 STACKSIZE = 1000

The first line of our mountlist entry tells the Amiga the name of the device, in this case NEWCON:, and the second designates the device handler to be used, which is the Shell-seg file we've just copied to MYDISK:L.

The third and fourth lines don't concern us at this stage, but priority basically sets out how high in the device list a device will appear, and stacksize sets aside a buffer of 1,000 bytes which Shell uses, among other things, to remember the last few commands you've typed in.

Don't forget the hash mark at the end on a line of its own. Without this, the Amiga will not recognise the device entry as the hash mark acts as a sort of full stop. To save the mountlist file, press Esc then X, and it will be written to the RAM disk ready to be transferred to MyDisk. Assuming the commands you earlier copied into the RAM disk are still there, you should be able to do this by typing:

CD RAM: COPY MOUNTLIST TO MYDISK: DEVS

then typing:

ED MYDISK:S/STARTUP-SEQUENCE

- we have still to add the startup commands which will mount Shell ready for

So far, the startup-sequence will contain only two lines, LOADWB and ENDCLI. To ensure that Shell is initiated on startup,

add the following lines at the top of the file:

RESIDENT CLI LISHELL-SEG SYSTEM PURE ADD NOUNT NEWCON:

The first of these lines is the real biggie. It uses the Resident command to place the Shell-seg device handler in memory under the name "CLI", at the same time making sure it is "Pure", which means more than one Shell window can use it at once.

This complicated piece of AmigaDOS chicanery is best taken at face value, as all Workbench 1.3 shells are set up in exactly the same way. The second command mounts the NEWCON: device, which will now function as its device handler has just been made resident.

If you're wondering why Shell is so much more complicated on a Workbench 1.3 machine than on a 2.04 Amiga, it is because version 1.3 was a straightforward upgrade of version 1.2, so that Shell had to be grafted on top of the original CLI device.

In 2.04 machines, Kickstart has been rewritten and expanded to twice its original size, allowing the coders to put all the device handlers and so forth in ROM so that users needn't worry about them.

Well, if you've survived this month without going mad and assaulting the dog, you should be able to cope with what's to come later in the series. Shell, for 1.3 owners at least, is a real pain in the backside, but I've no apologies for introducing it this early in our stroll through AmigaDOS. Without Shell, you can do precious little on a new disk, so it's best to set it up as quickly as possible.

With the worst out of the way, we'll go on next month to look at how to set up

printer devices, printer drivers, and the preferences drawer.

hen the original Vista landscape generator hit the Amiga you could hardly hear yourself think for the sound of countless ex-hippies screaming about the ins and outs of chaos theory, interspersed with the occasional lament on favourite fractals past and present.

After the final mushroom had met its maker, the cold light of day soon brought the grim realisation that although generating fractal landscapes is indeed an impressive application, it does have a fairly limited field of application, especially if the end result can only appear as a Ham.


Revised

As a result, Virtual Reality Labs Inc needed to find a use for what was, in effect, an application without a cause. With the release of VistaPro2 they've done exactly that.

The new version has been revised dramatically and now offers the kind of power that professional animators and still-frame graphic artists demand.

Before we delve into the program's latest enhancements, it's perhaps worth recapping the basics of the program itself, with a brief guide as to exactly what a scenery generator is, and what it can offer.

Perhaps the best place to start is with

the landscapes themselves. Although the program is capable of generating random fractal landscapes and islands, perhaps the most interesting starting point for any would-be traveller is on one of the supplied DEM landscapes.

DEM stands for Digital Elevation Model. The data for these models has been compiled via official US geological surveys which sampled the ground level every 25 metres over the entire northern United States.

As a result, once a DEM is loaded, your machine holds an incredibly accurate 3D model of the entire region in question.

Around 20 DEM files come as standard with the software, giving you instant access to famous landmarks such as the Grand Canyon, Mount St Helens - before and after the eruption - El Capitan in Yosemite, and so on.

Interplanetary

Thanks to the United States' exploits in space, the available landscapes aren't restricted to the Earth. The collection even includes DEMs depicting Olympus Mons on Mars!

If the included files aren't enough to whet your appetite, VRLI have another 2,000 landscapes ready and waiting.

As I mentioned earlier, DEMs aren't the only source of landscapes, as the program can create its own fractal landscapes to order - either as islands or entire regions.

Although the process of random generation is indeed haphazard, the results are, more often than not, stunning to say the least.

If we assume the program now contains a landscape, the next task is to add the natural features which transform a

Importing the real world

The icing on the cake lurks within the program's Property pull-down menu. Here you'll find a whole series of options which help translate the 3D world of Vista into the two dimensions we humans know and love

For example, the colour map within the program can be exported to DPaint as a standard IFF and then re-imported with varying degrees of altitude or alternatively as specific features. All are added by a few simple mouse strokes in DPaint

As a result, if the altitude option was employed, it's possible to either draw or scan a conventional Ordnance Survey map, and then have Vista translate this into a virtual 3D equivalent. Alternatively, you could take another route and export the colour data representing the actual features of the landscape.

As a consequence, adding a line of trees is simply a matter of drawing a line in DPaint and then re-importing the new colourmap back into Vista. It's even possible to add simple builds by the same process.

What Makepath is to animation, Terraform is to land shaping. As a result, it's an essential additional tool for those interested in real-to-virtual world conversion, because lo-res DPaint images produce very stepped and unnatural landscapes - this is where Terraform comes into its own

lump of fractal rock into a living, breathing entity. It's here where the new program really starts to shine. The first task is to set the climatic constraints on the environment by assigning the sea level, tree line, snow line and haze.


Adjustment of the first three parameters is simply a matter of assigning an altitude for each. The fourth option is one of the all-new additions to the program. As you've probably guessed by the name,



the haze definition allows you to define atmospheric distortion at a predefined distance. Low values produce a misting effect, while higher levels bring on a real pea souper...

Once the atmosphere and its effects have been taken care of, the next task is to embellish the land with the odd bit of greenery. This again is another new feature.

You now have the choice of palms, oaks, pines or cacti with which to populate your imaginary land. The choice isn't limited to a single type of plant - you can add all four variants to a single scene if

required. Once the variety or varieties are defined, the next task is to assign their size in metres and relative density. At this point, experimentation is the key to realistic results. If the trees are too small or perhaps to thinly spread they can, and often do, look ridiculous.

Having said that, with some patient experimentation and intelligent camera placement, the additional foliage can really breath some life into a otherwise sterile scene.

To be honest, real close-ups don't do the program any favours, as even the best attempt at a fractal tree can't really hold a candle to its organic equivalent.

The only other slight whinge concerns the rather methodical placement of the trees themselves. The end result is a forest which appears to have been sown by a chartered surveyor rather than a bearded, beer-guzzling lumberjack.

Still, if more than one variety is on hand it does help to break the monotony, as indeed does the fact that the trees vary – even within a single variety – from plant to plant.

The final addition takes the form of optional waterways. Either rivers (which automatically meander down to the valleys) or lakes (which flood the lowlands) can be selected. The two can be combined to add even more variety to the scene.

Watery grave

All such additions are controllable, in as much as you're given the option to accept or cancel before committing large tracts of your new world to a watery grave.

Once the actual scene-setting is complete, the final design tasks are to either adjust or load the colour palette for your particular scene. If you want to create the very Blue Ridge mountains of Virgina, you can.

Alternatively you can transform an existing lush green landscape into an arid desert by simply applying the colour map of another more desolate DEM.

The colour map screen gives you the usual palette adjustment options every DPaint fan will be familiar with, plus a completely silly option to listen to the landscape as it renders via the Amiga's internal sound.

As a result, you can now hear creative

Get it in perspective

Having completed the creative stage, the next task is to select a placement for the camera and the target or finishing point for a fly-through animation.

Selection of the two points is simplicity itself – you simply click on either target or camera and then select two likely spots on the landscape.

If you want to check your placement, the Preview icon transforms the landscape area into a wireframe representation of the image. A crosshair appears allowing you to make the final adjustments which are automatically updated in the numerical input windows.

When you're happy with the appearance of your panorama, the X,Y and Z co-ordinates can be locked either singly or as a whole, preserving the perfect viewpoint.

Aside from simple still frames, VistaPro2 – even in its standard form – is capable of basic animation. All that's required is a starting point or camera view and a target to travel towards.

Once the two points are established, the software asks for the desired number of frames and the program automatically begins the rendering process.

The only limitation is that the flight path is strictly limited to straight A-to-B. To be honest, even with this limitation the effect for the first time user is nothing short of astonishment, especially if the anim is in one of the higher resolutions.

Just like the still-frame alternative, the fly-through can be previewed in its 3D wireframe form, so any potential collisions can be spotted before committing your machine to the lengthy rendering process.

Subtlety or speed?

The scene is set, the camera's ready, now all that's needed is an exposure. This is the point at which you have to make a decision.

If you want real quality as shown in several of our examples, it's going to take time, and in scenes with numerous additional features such as trees, graduated skies and high levels of image enhancement, the average unaccelerated A500 is looking at an overnight exposure for a single frame.

The reason is that VistaPro isn't simply a number-crunching fractal generator but, in fact, a full-blown, high quality ray tracing program to boot. The highest quality output combinations are very fine indeed and as a result there's no way of avoiding vastly increased rendering times.

Having said that, if you're planning to employ VistaPro2 as a fast action animation tool, it's doubtful that you'll need the very highest quality in every frame. As a result, rendering times can be dramatically improved.

If you can survive without the smallest possible polygons, truly life-like textures and assorted shading and blending techniques, you can save hours or even days in rendering time.

Similarly, smaller screen sizes and lower resolutions help immensely. Basically the choice is yours – if you want the best, you've got to pay for it, either through long rendering times or expensive additional acceleration.

process as well as enjoy the finished product. As I said, a silly but amusing addition. I can only assume than VRLI are not adverse to the odd mushroom themselves....

On a more serious note is the essential option to lock the colour palette of all frames destined to become a part of an animated sequence.

If for the moment your only real interest lies in still-frame creations, the option to lock the palette of numerous frames may seem unimportant, but to the animator, locking subsequent

frames to the original is essential to achieve continuity.

For the professional user, perhaps the most important addition of all is the much enhanced output. This alone is sure to transform a formerly interesting application into a really powerful artistic tool.

Continuity

With the option to output your creations as RGB or 24-bit IFFs or even DCTV display files, the commercial door has been swung wide open.

The program will output individual frames or entire animations in the format of your choice. These could be individual sequential 24-bit files, ready for still frame recording on high-end video kit, or for compilation into Vista's own proprietary Vanim format which allows you to play your sequences direct from disk.

All standard Amiga display formats – including Ham – are on offer, plus the option of applying full video spec overscan and interlace.

This leaning towards animation may appear slightly confusing considering the rather limited animation options within the basic program – the reason is that the internal options are only the beginning of VistaPro's animating potential.

The program only really starts to shine

as an animation tool when combined with the additional Makepath program which VRLI offer as an addition to the original package.

Thanks to this beautifully simple and immensely powerful program, it's possible to skim the surface of your creation in a anything from a cruise missile to a helicopter, twisting and turning as you go, following every contour of the land and banking with every turn.

In short, I think the results speak for themselves. VistPro 2 is indeed a memory and accelerator-scoffing beast, but for serious artists it's a tool you simply can't afford to be without.

ACPreview

uring last month's Updates column I promised to review a frame grabber designed to work directly with the Harlequin 32-bit graphics card. On arrival it transpired that the kit in question isn't merely restricted to the Harlequin, and is in fact ideal for grabbing in a whole range of formats, Ham included.

After a few hours it became clear that this particular hardware/software combination is worth far more than a simple mention in Updates, and could be the ideal answer to the question of real-time frame grabbing across the board.

Unfortunately for A500 users the new system is reliant on Zorro slots which are only found on the A1500 and above. As far as I'm aware there are no plans to port the system over to the 500, so I'm afraid it's a case of upgrade or settle for another system.

Composite inputs

The grabber itself comes on a hard card-style board, offering two composite inputs on the rear. The restriction of composite is perhaps the only chink in the armour of the system - as far as professional users are concerned.

The average serious enthusiast/professional is more likely to require S-VHS and upwards as a potential grabbing environment.

Having said that, I think the results speak for themselves. All the images in the article were captured via a very ageing

and average S-VHS VCR providing a composite signal to the card. The two available inputs can be toggled via the software, providing the ideal setup for the professional user.

In fact, up to three cards can be placed in a single machine, offering a total of six potential source machines all controlled from the software simultaneously.

With the hardware and software safely in my sticky little fingers, it may seem strange that the article is flagged as a preview rather than a review. The reason is that both the manual and the software are in German.

As a result, a complete and in depth review is understanderbly a bit tricky. Nevertheless you can rest assured that when the English version arrives, any fresh information will be instantly posted in Updates.

According to Amiga Centre Scotland's Martin Lowe, an English version is already on its way with the manual to follow as soon as the translation process is complete.

Aside from pure grabbing power, the most important aspect of any system is its interface. In this particular area Vlab does extremely well, even with its present linguistic difficulties.

The program can appear in one of two forms, either as a full screen interface or as a dormant pulldown menu on the Workbench screen.

The only restriction is that the program only operates on machines using WB2. As a result, even A1500 and above owners still working with WB1.3 haven't totally escaped a certain amount of incompatibility.

If you're thinking of upgrading to WB2, this is the ideal excuse. The insistence on WB2 isn't merely a matter of basic soft-

ware compatibility. The program actually puts the additional features of WB2 to good use.

For example, whenever the program is exited it automatically saves the present setup to the ENV directory. As a result, every time you return to the program your favourite settings are automatically installed.

The necessity for only pertains to the Kickstart ROM, so there's

no need to invest in an entire enhanced chip set. Fortunate really, as you're more likely to come across a bucket of chickens' teeth than the aforesaid upgrade.

Once active, the first job is to open the monitor which appears as a small, independent Workbench window or PIP, housing a constantly updating display of the incoming video signal. The window can appear in anything from four to 16 colours or alternate levels of greyscale, in either interlace or med-res.

The beauty of the window system is that when in menu bar mode the window sits quietly alongside the assorted Workbench clutter, happily displaying the signal. When an appropriate grab appears, a simple click on a small accompanying control window instantly captures the image.

Actually capturing images is literally that simple - you merely sit back watching your miniature TV waiting patiently for the optimum moment to click on the control panel.

A particularly pleasant aspect of this additional panel is the option to switch between capturing the complete interlace image or merely a single field.

High speed images

The beauty is that when you're dealing with high speed images, sacrificing a field within the interlace signal is often well worth the lose of clarity. Obviously a noninterlaced image isn't quite as impressive, but it does abolish the perennial problem of the dreaded interlace flicker.

An additional weapon in the anti-interlace armoury lurks on the pull-down menu. If you happen to capture a flickery but nevertheless impressive image, a deinterlace option can be applied to remove the offending field after capture instantly transforming a migraine-inducing grab into a perfect picture.

Once grabbed, the captive can appear in all standard Amiga colour and resolution combinations, either with or without Floyd Steinburg dithering.

The actual importation process can also have a variety of filters available to produce the optimum image. As you've

Sequential selection

Although singular grabs are impressive, they're not the limit of the system's capabilities. With the assistance of the ever-present pull-downs, you can access the sequential grabbing option which allows you to grab a maximum of 255 frames from the live video source.

Aside from the system's pure image quality, this has to be one of its most impressive capabilities. Vlab grabs all its


imagery in its most impressive capabilities. Viab grabs all its imagery in its own proprietary format, namely YUV. As a con-sequence it's possible to grab 24-bit sequences and then con-vert from there into the format of your choice. As far as I'm aware, Vlab is the only independent grabber to offer such power. Obviously sequential frame grabbing is very memory intensive, so investment in a large amount of extra RAM is essential - especially if you're planning to employ the system's 24-bit output. While on the subject of memory and possible expansion, it's worth mentioning the

system's liking of both RAM and acceleration.

If there's a slight flaw, it's the program's preference for copious amounts of memory and acceleration, especially dur-ing a sequential grab. During testing I employed the services of a GVP 030 combo card with a whopping 16Mb onboard. Although I never ran out of RAM, there was a very significant slowing of additional software, even when the program was empty. To be fair, the program itself remained faultless, but I'd say it's not a particularly good idea to employ the system in the midst of a busy multitasking environment

My only real concern is the grabbing rate of the board – unlike the majority of systems, it samples at a maximum of 18 frames a second, as opposed to the 25 frames which some others offer. Having said that, the de-interlace and single field options plus the impressive 24-bit spec more than make up for that particular compromise.

Saving and storage

Yet another innovation is the system's preferred capture and storage format. Was is the first serious application to employ the impressive YUV file format. All captured images are stored in it and then converted to a particular display medium, whether that be 24-bit or two colour – the choice is yours.

The beauty of YUV format is primarily its size, which on average appears be approximately one-third that of an identical 24-bit IFF, and yet still retains all the relevant colour data. The only problem – as with any new format – is its incompatibility with existing software.

To combat this, Vlab offers the option to save out a standard Amiga/24-bit IFF. According to Amiga Centre Scotland's Martin Lowe, this minor inconvenience should soon be put right thanks to the inclusion of a new YUV loader and saver in the latest version of ADpro, plus an option to import the board's output directly into the program.

Martin went on to mention that Version 1.7 of TVPaint – which is due for release shortly – already supports YUV within its Load and Save options. As with all upgrades of the offensively expensive TVPaint, this new version will be free to all registered users.

The Harlequin connection

If there's one thing that the premier graphics card has sadly lacked it's the option to grab live video. Now that is all about to change.

Thanks to the program's Output pull-down, the captured image can be displayed in a variety of ways, Harlequin included. Rather than saving the captured file and loading it back onto the Harlequin, the software has a direct connection to the board and instantly ports the 24-bit image straight onto it.

This leaves you with two options – either you can use the Harlequin image as a reference point and save the 24-bit data directly to disk, or alternatively you can go straight to TVPaint and employ its Keep Screen option which boots TVPaint while retaining the image.

ARexx capabilities

Like all the latest high power hardware and software combinations, Vlab boasts an impressive range of ARexx commands that cover all the system's major functions. Perhaps the biggest impact is made by the potential ARexx control of the software's sequential grabbing option.

With a relatively simple ARexx script, an impressive stop frame recording sequence should be simplicity itself. The software has a complete pull-down dedicated to ARexx macros, five of which come as standard with it. Also, ARexx can be addressed directly from the software via yet another pulldown-inspired control panel which allows you to execute additional ARexx scripts manually.





Once out of the map option, you view your squad from up above, a "plan view" kinda thing. If you have ever seen the excellent Alien Breed by Team 17, then Special Forces is sort of like that, but smaller.

Now you might be pondering the question "how do you control four members of the team at the same time?" and the answer is, you don't. You can only control one Rambo at a time, but you can put your team in formation. Then when you move your team member, the rest of the team will follow him about.

You can swap and change between team members by hitting the F-Keys. A handy option is Multi-View, which allows you to view all four team members at the same time - sort of like a fourteam University Challenge view,

but without Bamber Gascoigne.

If you are a sort of, well how can I put it, err, lazy git, then there is an autopilot mode. You know when you're playing a flight sim and you just can't be bothered to fly the plane hundreds and hundreds of miles? You just stick on the autopilot, set the waypoints and hey presto!, you don't have to do anything for 20 minutes.

Well the principal is exactly the same. You can't be bothered running through dense jungle shooting, so you set each team members a destination point, press the spacebar and the computer takes over.

Well that's basically it. You choose your mission, men and weapons, enter the warzone, run around for a bit, waste a few enemy soldiers, complete your objective, get picked up by the helicopter, go home in time for **Coronation Street, congratulate** your men by giving them a couple of decorations and even a promotion, have a few beers, go to bed

sion, Hurrah.

Overall, Special Forces is a bit of a larf. My word, it's fun running round deserts and jungles killing the enemy and blowing things up. OK, the graphics aren't going to make you leap out of your seat and shout "arroogggaa", but they serve their purpose.

In fact the intro is quite good graphics-wise, but the intro music is, well let's say it sounds as though it's been loosely based on the A-Team theme music. In the game there are some suitable machine gun noises and big beefy explosion noises.

Playability is brill. For instance at one point you might be wandering around the jungle by yourself, when suddenly enemy soldiers appear from nowhere and you have to leg it as fast as you can because you've run out of bullets. It's exciting stuff, this war business.





t's time to set off to those sundrenched islands in the Pacific Ocean. Just think of it - the warm climate, the sea, the white beaches and the hordes of commie infiltrators for you to blast into oblivion. This is my kind of life.

Pacific Islands (PI from now on) is the sequel to Empire's earlier tank game, Team Yankee. However, there are a few changes to the game which make it even more playable.

The scenario has it that a large force of disaffected Soviet communists, aided by the North Koreans, have invaded the Pacific atoll of Yama Yama.

Now this is quite unfortunate due to the fact that Yama Yama is a communications link for the early warning monitoring system in the Pacific Ocean, so the United Nations is understandably concerned about secret - and bloomin' expensive - communications equipment falling into enemy hands.

This is where you come in. You must assemble a team of tank units, four in all, which will be the spearhead of the first offensive, and you must recapture all five islands of the atoll to succeed.

You start on the island Aloha which you must traverse, destroying enemy installations and communications, as well as other commie tanks.

However, unlike Team Yankee, you actually have to purchase your tanks and their ammunition. You are initially given a budget of \$55 million to spend (that's not much - Biff spends twice that on T-shirts - Ed) but you are able to gain more money during the game by destroying enemy installations and vehi-


The enemy shoot back too though, so after each battle you can purchase replacement tanks for those that have been destroyed, repair damaged tanks and even increase the morale of your crew by having a booze-up.

All of this costs money unfortunately, so at some point you will find yourself running short. This is where you have the dubious option of selecting second-

I can just picture it - a big sign outside a heavily fortified building with the words "Stormin' Norman's Used Warmongering Ware. Lowest Prices Around" written on it.

Each of the five islands you will be fighting on are split up into square zones. Blue coloured zones are free from enemies, allowing unrestricted passage to other parts of the island, while red zones indicate an enemy presence.

Upon entering a red zone, you will be taken to the purchase screen to buy your equipment, or repair vehicles damaged in a previous battle prior to engaging the enemy.

You are then given the mission description which lists the objectives to overcome in order to liberate that zone. When you have accomplished your mission, the red zone will turn yellow and you are free to move to the next square,

One of the reasons why I enjoyed Team Yankee so much was because it was game orientated rather than being a pure simulation. So the ability to choose your path through an island makes for a more strategic game.

For instance, it is important that you make your way to enemy-held zones which also contain communications equipment in order to destroy the transmitters. If you fail to do this fairly early on, you will find that the enemy will know of your location and you will be faced with increasing opposition making your life potentially rather short.

This strategic element makes PI



slightly more interesting than Team Yankee's rather linear approach to the play, while at the same time not being too much of a brain drain to destroy the shoot-'em-up feel.

The artillery support feature, where you can arrange for HE (high explosive), DPICM (Duel Purpose Improved Conventional Munitions) and SMOKE shells to be fired at certain times on specific areas, has a new addition with the ability to lay mines at critical areas on the map.

You have to remember where you put them though, otherwise you might find yourself trundling inadvertently over them only to find you are suddenly a vehicle short.

The control system in PI is almost identical to its predecessor, with a few minor additions. This is a good thing because the control system in Team Yankee was excellent and easy to use so any major changes weren't required.

If you have played Team Yankee,

you will quickly be able to get into the game without having to wade through the manual beforehand.

For those of you who have not played Team Yankee, the 3D graphics are quite excellent. Not only do you have vector graphics but all vehicles are bitmapped. This gives greater detail than that achievable through vectors and improves the appearance of each vehicle infinitely. The actual 3D routines have been speeded up quite a bit and you are also able to destroy any object in the 3D view.

Because of the increased 3D speed, you will now occasionally come across a whole village, rather than solitary buildings. Such an object would have slowed down Team Yankee considerably. You will also find that the enemies' intelligence has been improved too, making them harder to overcome (oh bugger). There are no changes in the sound effects department, which is no bad thing at all, with the usual

explosions as you let loose that lethal Sabot at some unsuspecting commie tank, or give him a good strafing with your machine gun.

The overall gameplay has improved quite a bit and I enjoyed playing PI. The , improved speed in graphics and the ability to blast everything in sight makes the game great fun.

The packaging includes six full colour maps of the islands, which mark key features such as roads, communications and rivers, helping you to plan your strategy. The manual is well written, making it easy for those new to the game to quickly get into the action. There is also a "training" island for you to practice on.

Is it my imagination, or are software companies beginning to realise that people with hard drives exist and play games too? Empire have thoughtfully provided a installation program on the game disks for those of you with such hardware. Nice one, Empire.

So, if you have already sampled the delights of Team Yankee, you will not be overly disappointed at what PI has to offer.


In the game there is no music, but


Perhaps in the not-too-distant future, governments have advanced beyond those of today. Control of cities and civilisations is handled from central control points."

I don't know about you, but this summons up visions of computer-controlled systems with megalomaniacs operating them. "Big brother" policies towards the population is the common method of social control and any antigovernment attitudes will be severely dealt with. Yes, very bleak indeed.

Mind you, it would seem pretty silly and inappropriate to have a story line that went something like this:

"Perhaps in the not-too-distant future, governments will abolish taxes and depravation along with homelessness and wars. Everyone must wear flowers in their hair and chant peace, love and happiness.

"Mary Whitehouse shalf be

appointed supreme overseer and censor of all forms of media and her word is final. In fact, the world will be a very spiffing place to live in indeed."

You'd be hard-pressed to come up with a good game from this kind of background, wouldn't you? And if someone did come up with a game simulating such a world, I'd bet my entire collection of Mr Bean videos that that person would be French.

Anyhow, the first scenario is that which applies to Global Effect. It may be bleak, but it certainly does make for an interesting game.

In essence, Global Effect is very much in the vein of Sim City. You are a

government leader, assigned control of either a new or existing world, depending on the options chosen at the start of the game. Your task is to ensure the continued survival of both your people and the environment.

You are given information about the status of your people and of the effects on the environment of any actions you take, such as clearing forests to expand your community or creation of oil or coal mines used to fuel power stations and so on.

Depending on which scenario you

chose at the start of the game, you may also have to contend with opposing parties who pose a threat to your own people

In this situation, you have a number of military options to choose from. These include building control centres and early warning radars, as well as constructing air and naval bases with nuclear or conventional weaponry.

Of course, any nuclear conflict can also cause massive damage to the environment so this has to be taken into consideration before entering into a major battle.

As mentioned earlier, there are a

number of options to choose from that will decide your role and goals within the game. For instance, you can assume control of an existing colony, where previous leaders have ever-soslightly buggered up and it is your job to repair the damage. Alternatively, you can attempt a completely new command, starting on a world of your choice.

When playing the game, the screen display shows a portion of the map of the world which you are attempting, along with various command icons, message windows and status displays. You build your colony using a selection of icons which represent such objects as city blocks, power stations, water purification plants and even sewage

treatment farms! To be able to construct these objects, you need to have sufficient game power.

This is represented by a bar on the far left of the screen and increases if your colony and the environment have a good rating, or decreases if they have a poor rating. If game power gets to a

low level, you may not be able to afford to build the required object.

One of the first objects on your list should be a power station. You have the choice of either oil-powered, coal-powered,

solar-powered, wind-powered and ultimately, nuclear-powered stations.

Of course, these have differing effects on the environment which must be taken into account, but once a station is operational you can build power lines across the land to join up to city blocks.

When you build a city block, it will be dark, meaning there are no people in it. When you hook it up to the power station via the power lines, it comes to life. From there on, your city will begin to develop automatically as new city blocks begin to appear. You have to be careful not to let the development



increase too quickly or you will find the game power will start to decrease. As your colony grows, it will start to

require basic services such as waste recycling and water supplies. Any deficiencies in these areas contribute to a poor colony rating. There are ways of controlling the colony and these

> involve building city limits to prevent expansion beyond a certain boundary, thus keeping the population to a reasonable size.

You can also use green belt boundaries instead of city limits. These are more environmentally friendly and will

add to your environment rating. To aid you in maintaining a balanced colony and environment, you have a number of information screens that help you decide what measures to take. Via the environment and economic data icon, you can receive information on such things as carbon diox-

pollution, to name a few. There is also a seismic survey mode which allows you to search for natural resources for mining. You can view the entire world map here too. I enjoyed

What makes Global Effect so good is that everything you do has a knock-on effect on the environment and economy, so you are kept on your toes all the time. Even natural disasters such as earthquakes can occur, causing unforeseen damage to your colony.

Once you master the wealth of control icons, the game is very playable. You may find it a little frustrating at first




when you get messages about problems with your colony and you don't know why it's happening, but persevere and you'll be hooked.







A good working knowledge of mythology will make things more obvious, but even then a smidgen of brainpower will be needed to figure out how to defeat the various legendary beasts. Cerebus, for instance, can only be killed with a special trident. Where can you get this fabiled trident? Well, you can only get it from a demon. How do you make the demon rise up from the pits of Hell? How do you kill it when it does appear?

Ahal That would be telling. You get the picture. Each big baddie requires some magic weapon to kill it, and to get the magic weapons, you'll have to put your grey matter into gear.

And not only is Myth blessed with deeper gameplay than other games of this lik, it's also the proud possessor of some of the tastiest graphics and sound





ever to thunder onto the Ahiga. The bit when Satan looms up out of the flames with a spine-chilling laugh is absolutely gob-smacking.

And there's no disk accessing before he pops up either, so you can't guess he's coming. None of your 'oh look the games frozen while the computer loads in the big baddle graphics' here.

All the sprites are loaded at the start of the level, so each big baddle pops up completely out of the blue, causing many shrieks and squeals from little kiddies.

Sound is excellent as well, and it often plays an integral part in the game. As well as the eerie howls and crackling flames of Hell (which get louder as you get deeper), you also get a strange woman who beckons you forward, and then tells you to stop, then beckons you on again.

If you fail her bizarre game of musical statues, she transforms into a gargoyle and kills you, but get it right and she'll give you a pressie.

The digitised speech is crisp and clear, but you'll have to pay attention as the slightest foot wrong results in much blood splilage.

I have to admit that I was a bit dubious at all the superlatives being heaped upon this game, as early demo versions were a bit simplistic. But It's come on leaps and bounds since then and is one of the best arcade adventures around. For once, a game that's worth all the hype that sumounds it. Buy it, or forever be giggled at by small children in the street.

The Berlin Amiga 92 show - small, but perfectly formed

n a capital city still sporting the obvious scars of decades of destruction and forced segregation, whose two peoples retain enough of the siege mentality to view each other with suspicion and sometimes even mild hostility, the notion of holding a jolly little Amiga show might seem a bit strange.

The Berlin Amiga 92 Show, however, was united and vibrant enough to throw up some interesting new releases and not a few insights on the European and German Amiga scenes.

The German TV market is dominated by small and medium-sized cable and satellite stations, many of whom use Amigas for their stock-in-trade production graphics. It was hardly surprising, therefore, to find a show and a marketplace given over mostly to the Amiga's role as a video workstation.

The number of stands exhibiting the machine side by side with professional Betacam SP video editors would alone have supported this impression had it not been for the proliferation of genlocks, DCTVs, and AVideo cards being put through their paces at the same time.

New products recently released or previewed at the show included the Supra FaxModem, Rainbow II 24-bit graphics card (selling for the equivalent of £595), Commodore's A600HD, the Golem TurboCard 68030 accelerator for A500s (first to fit in the external bus),

Vortex's AT386SX emulator board, Checkmate Digital's Hi-Q tower system (vying with Golem's tower for the Tallest-Amiga-at-the-Show award), CanDo v1.6, and a host of products of newer and older origin.

One very interesting low-cost accelerator released at the show was the Hardital Big Bang and its bigger brother, Super Big Bang. The former is a 25MHz/25MHz 68030 with 2Mb RAM selling for DM1,090 (about £385), the latter being a combo-type card with SCSI-2 controller at DM1,340 (£471).

Price war

At these prices, such cards could clean up the UK accelerator market overnight, and if the 68040/4Mb version is released, as a Hardital spokesman suggested it might, for less than £1,000, we could see the most beneficial high-power price war ever. Not for nothing have Hardital christened the card "Over the Top".

We had to be helped off the floor when we strayed in front of a stand selling the A3000/25 complete with 52Mb hard drive for £1,100, and when we later learned the price had fallen to £900 it was off to the bar to cry into zwei gross biers in lament for the poor overcharged British consumer.

Similar throat-cutting was in evidence as A500 Plus prices fell towards the £200 mark and DCTVs started a run on the £250 barrier, so much so that zwei more

gross biers were needed to calm us down. Thank God we'd left our credit cards at home.

As a companion to all this hardware, the software side was relatively muted, with Imagine v2.0 and Caligari Broadcast hogging most of the limelight on the videography stands.

From the demonstration tapes splattered across numerous monitors, it was fairly clear that a large proportion of the average German TV viewer's day is spent watching Amiga generated images from the Caligari or Imagine duo.

Adept Development were showing their Painter 3D package and TVPaint was making its ominous début on the AVideo board, but neither seems as yet to have made the impact of the big two, and Real 3D was surprisingly nowhere to be seen.

Both the main contenders directly sup-

DCTV port which was selling by the Volkswagen load, so the boom towards home 24-bit video production seems well and truly on in Europe. In true never-

say-die fashion,

a spirited appearance in the shape of the Phoenix Ressurection board (sic), a complete motherboard replacement designed to give the oldest Amiga the same specifications as the latest models.

The board comes complete with ECS, 2Mb RAM, internal SCSI optional fitting, a co-processor socket, and Kickstart ROM sharer. The A500 and A2000 were, of course, the best supported machines in terms of peripherals, but it speaks well of the German market that A500 add-ons did not totally engulf the others as is so often the case at A500-dominated British shows

Bargain hunters were happily walking off with A2000 52Mb Quantum hard cards for as little as £280, and the number of beaming customers we saw clutching what would in Britain be rare purchases, such as 24-bit boards and accelerator cards, was out-weirded only by the sight of hungry punters demolishing what looked suspiciously like oily feather bolsters stuck between two mattresses dipped in bread crumbs, but which on closer inspection turned out to be aggressively proportioned sausage sandwiches.

Spurned

Subdued to begin with, busy towards the end, and spurned by Commodore, Amiga Berlin shouldn't have been a success.

That it managed in the space of what would be a normal-sized British show to display more high-end equipment than you might see in a year in London is a testament both to the higher purchasing power enjoyed

the A1000 made Hardital's range of accelerators could be a price sensation AVideo eat into

the low-end video market to complement Harlequin and company at the upper reaches of 24-bit quality.

Whether it will do so fast enough is hard to tell, but one thing is clear falling prices are inevitable.

Commodore UK will continue to recommend that the Amiga be sold at its own retail price, but if enough of the larger retailers take advantage of the cheap machines appearing on the continent, Commodore could be chopped off at the knees and the high street forced to exert pressure if they are to avoid losing vast swathes of sales to mail order.

On the other hand, this prediction could be as accurate as the BBC's exit poll, so we'll just have to wait and see, won't we?





Accelerators

f you listen to more than one conversation about accelerator boards, it quickly becomes clear that there's not a lot to be said about them unless you enjoy the . sight of your friends collapsing at your feet in a bored stupor,

They are fast, usually provide space for extra RAM, the odd really exciting one has a hard drive interface built in, and that's it.

Having said that, the range of 68040s available is now wide enough to provide a proper buyer's choice for the Amiga's most powerful add-on, unlike a year ago when they were thinner on the ground than Gorbachev supporters.

There are only three important questions to ask of any 040 card:

How fast is it?How stable is it?How cheap is it?

We tested the Fusion Forty card from RCS Management Inc, GVP's G-Force, and Progressive Peripherals' Mercury, all of them 28MHz cards, and asked the same three questions about each.

For testing purposes, we've used real life applications rather than the standard benchmarks because prospective buyers want to know how fast a card will run existing software, rather than how good it is at calculating the square root of its navel fluff.

Best software

Of the three boards on test, the Mercury and G-Force cards have the best software with Fusion Forty's much improved but still clunky installer disk lagging behind a bit.

All three are fairly easy to use, but G-Force employs Commodore's excellent standard installer program and the PPS install sequence takes very little time.

Again, both G-Force and Mercury make use of the official 68040.library from Commodore along with their own startup programs, giving them an apparent systemlegal edge over Fusion Forty, and both automatically configure to the amount of memory on the card.

Fusion Forty's software, though hugely better than the confused mess it was six months ago, is a little less "clean" than the other two offerings. Most of this, thankfully, is transparent to the user as installation is just as quick and painless as Mercury or G-Force, except that the user has to choose a particular installer for the board's RAM configuration.

The Fusion does not use Commodore's 68040.library, but this doesn't seem to make much difference as it is easily as stable and compatible as the other two boards and if anything is a bit better certainly than the G-Force card, if not the Mercury.

Unfortunately, the resident Fusion Forty code alters Cold Capture and KickTag vectors to the dismay of most virus checkers. This is unavoidable given the route taken by RCS to implement the 040, but it's still a tad annoying to have to click four times to cancel a Zerovirus requester every time you

boot up. In addition, at time of going to press, RCS are still working on a software update to allow Fusion Forty to accept the presence of 16-bit fast RAM, with which it will not co-exist at the moment.


In stability terms, the only card to give me more than the usual clutch of problems was G-Force. Before it would work with the office A3000 I had to remove a resistor from the card – something the manual claimed should only be necessary with A3000 tower systems – and there were significantly more hang-ups during a warm reboot than with the other cards.

Once booted, G-Force was as well behaved as the rest of the gang and worked very smoothly, so the problem is not seriously detrimental to GVP's latest baby.

All the cards are supplied with control software to allow data and instruction caches and copyback mode to be turned on and off, which is just as well.*

Some software will drop dead if you try to run it with copyback on and any peripherals or software packages which make direct memory accesses (DMA) will fail to pick up on the contents of the CPU's data cache thus promptly – and messily – expiring.

For the purposes of switching out of 68040 mode when the odd piece of software refuses to speak to the new card, Fusion Forty employs a hardware switch which sticks out of the back of the machine and the others use software switches available through icons on the Workbench



screen. All require rebooting once a switch has taken place and all worked well. The improved Fusion Forty 68000 mode now runs at the proper speed and automatically detects which position the hardware switch is in – unlike the original, which would run 68000 mode at half speed and had to be told which mode you wanted at startup.

Complex

The long term stability of any 68040 card will often depend on heat build up, which is a particular problem with chips as complex and transistor-crammed as these.

G-Force and Mercury take care of the problem by means of a miniature fan mounted on top of the 68040 CPU while Fusion Forty has stuck with the immensely ugly heat sink of the original cards.


Both solutions seem to work perfectly well, and none of the cards became unstable during prolonged operation, even when this involved extended stints with Imagine v2.0 renders.

Fusion Forty has a small advantage when it comes to the rest of the chips on the board as the A2000 shell is better ventilated than the A3000's, but this didn't make an appreciable difference.

So much for stability. The next question, and the one you've probably been waiting most for the answer to, is that of speed:

Dozens of silly and downright ridiculous claims for the benefits offered by 68040s have been made since the first cards became available, and most of them are plain wrong.

Using benchmarks, which we provided last month as a quick indicator of the relative speed of the cards, it is just about possible to claim a 10,000 per cent (100 times) increase over a standard A500/A2000, but in practice you won't get close to this figure.



Accelerators AC

This is because most benchmarks run in very small amounts of memory so that they usually fit in the data cache on the chip itself, and they test only for internal speed ratings.

The results don't take into account screen refreshes, hard drive access times, or any of the Amiga's custom chips which must be used in most day-to-day operations and which still run at 8MHz.

For this reason we've done away with benchmarks this month and concentrated on real-life applications such as PageStream, Art Department Professional, and so on.

For a discussion of how these tests were set up, we've listed how each one was done, and the results are given in numerical and graphical form to suit most needs.

Don't get annoyed because we've used an A3000 for our test results. To compare an 040 to an A2000 or A500 is about as pointless as comparing Concorde to a Gypsy Moth – they use different methods of propulsion and live worlds apart.

Suffered

Pundits and old lags might be surprised, given GVP's record in the accelerator business, to find that G-Force suffered in comparison to Fusion Forty and Mercury. So were we, but the test results don't lie unless our copy of PageStream has suddenly developed a mind of its own complete with opinions and prejudices.

Remember that all boards and software were installed exactly as the manufacturers recommend, and that all caches and copyback modes were utilised for maximum

Test information

To ensure the tests were at the same time strict and fair, a careful note was kept of the exact settings used in each. The following is a list of those settings in case anyone cares to confirm or deny our findings:

ADPro: Convert 787k Targa to HAM and display on-screen. Lo-res, interlace, overscan, PAL.

PageStream: Zoom from full page view to 121 per cent. Text greeking set to 4pt, page full of bitmap graphics and bold Stone Sans 6pt body text – chosen for its slowness to update.

DPaint IV: Full screen fill. HAM mode, interlace, translucency on, anti-alias set to high.

PowerPacker 4.0: Crunch 787k Targa data file. Large speed-up buffer, best efficiency.

Imagine 2.0: Render very complex galleon scene. ILBM 24-bit, Trace method, image size 704 x 582, lights cast shadows.

speed.

If anything, the Fusion Forty was the only board discriminated against as it was running in a 16-bit A2000 rather than a 32-bit A3000 and did not have the advantage of the A3000's quicker screen refresh for tests such as the PageStream page zoom.

The results show that last month's benchmarks, if not particularly relevant to real applications, were a good indicator of the relative speeds of the boards. Mercury emerges as the clear leader, in some cases embarrassingly so, with Fusion Forty in the middle and G-Force bringing up the rear.

This neatly inverts the prices of the units, as G-Force is the most expensive and Fusion the cheapest. Of course, when buying a unit as expensive as an 040 the price has to be offset by technical backup and future support, which is where the two more expensive cards will score over Fusion Forty.

The latter, however can hit back with a UK technical support line supplied by Hydra systems, the board's distributor, which is as good as Silica Systems' support for G-Force.

Choices

Put a gun to my head and ask me to choose between the boards and I'd have to go for the Mercury on A3000s and the Fusion on A2000s, both in terms of price and performance.

If you want the GVP name and reputation for reliability, by all means buy a G-Force, but for a more expandable system I'd stick with one of the others, both of which can accept up to 32Mb RAM as opposed to the GVP's 8Mb.

If PPS can ship the Mercury 2000 for a similar price to Fusion Forty (current US price is $$2,430 - about \pm 1,500 - for the 4Mb RAM$ version) the choice in this field would be very difficult, though would probably swing in Fusion's favour given the UK availability of technical help.


If you've got the cash and a high-end application which needs a bit of extra oomph, I'd recommend any 68040 card. They simply jump all over the tender parts of 68030 accelerators and transform your Amiga in five minutes into a machine only the very fastest 486 PCs can match.





Amiga Introduction Package

Battleaxe PD

Being the new owner of an Amiga can be pretty daunting. That machine you have there is pretty awesome and complicated. You may have seen other Amigas up and running with their own startup sequences on disk and want to know how to create your own – or you may be unsure just what a virus is and how to avoid or get rid of one.

Nearly every new owner has these initial problems, but unless you have a friend who is experienced at using the beast, you are in for a frustrating time.

Well luckily, now that the Amiga has been around for quite a while, there are a wealth of people out there who have overcome these initial problems and are now able to share their knowledge with the less experienced.

One such person is Ron Fonteine, who has produced a three-disk introduction package aimed at alleviating the problems first encountered by the new user.

The disks contain a collection of programs such as disk utilities, text editors and text file display programs, virus killers and communication packages to name but a few.

Also on the disks is information on such topics as creating startup sequences and bootable disks, and explanations of what a virus is and the varying types you may encounter.

Accessing the information is made very easy by the use of a very friendly "perusing system" written by Nico Francois, a name not unfamiliar in the PD circuit. It consists of a series of menus and submenus, each selectable using the mouse.

The disks are described as "postcardware", which means that if you use them and find them useful, you should drop the author a line with any comments, improvements and even any tips you have learned. If the response is good enough, there will be further development of the program with future updates.

Electronic magazines

TDH and Digital Access

Another good source of information about the Amiga is provided by disk-based magazines. Again, if you are new to the Amiga, these can be a great help in finding out how to get the best from your machine. They also contain some good PD programs.

So when two such disk-based mags were found among the *Amiga Computing* postal avalanche, I decided to give them a plug.

The first is called *TDH*. Apparently, the title is formed from the first letters of the three guys who compile it, Tom, Dick and Harry! The first issue is public domain so you are allowed to copy it and give it to your friends to look at. Sections covered



Techno Attack is not PD but is licensed exclusively to 17 Bit software.so you won't find it in any other PD library.





Text editors don't exactly make you jump up and down in anticipation while they load, yet where would we be without them?

They are fundamentally important in computing life, rather like a certain magazine not too distant from your visual organs at this very instant. So it is hard to ignore them, especially when they are well written and feature packed, as EdWord is.

EdWord began as a programmers' integrated editor/compiler which could be used for any language. However, with a constant list of features being added during development, it soon evolved into quite a powerful general purpose text edtor with facilities such as block commands, search operations and an Undo function.

The programmer will find some of EdWord's features very useful. These include auto-indenting, casing of keywords (forcing them to uppercase), number base converter and the ability to send AmigaDOS commands.

It is entirely menu-driven, making it simple to use. It would be a mistake to compare it to a wordprocessor however, for it lacks such facilities as margin setting. typeface alterations and page numbering.

EdWord is shareware and I am led to believe the author, Martin Reddy, will welcome a minimum £5 contribution for his Irn Bru addiction.

A good all-round editor any programmer will find useful.

in an attempt to install the program to my hard drive, I found that it was of the protected kind and impossible to use other than on floppies.

Hard drives are becoming cheaper and more popular all the time and companies like Core are putting games on more and more disks to stretch the Amiga to its limits, so why are so few games hard drive installable?

I know we have to combat piracy, but at the end of the day the games companies are hurting genuine customers. To add insult to injury, the PC section of the manual stresses how Core think their PC customers are "trustworthy" and so the game is installable on PC hard drives!

You've raised a very sore but important point. Piracy is one thing, but equal game for equal money is just as important an issue, and at the moment the Amiga community isn't getting its fair share.

The PC market is as rife with piracy as any other, yet because of the high level of hard drive ownership, PC games almost always install on hard drives. This is far from true on the Amiga.

For single disk games there's little to worry about, and where the company concerned makes an effort to cut down on disk swaps, such as Microprose with Knights of the Sky, even two and three disk games can be relatively painless to play from floppy. However, as Heimdall shows, there are more and more games these days which come on four or more disks.

If an Amiga owner pays the same as a PC owner for a game, then he or she has a right to expect the game to be as playable, and constant disk swaps definitely affect playability.

Are Commodore just after your cash?

Why don't Commodore bring out the Kickstart 2.04 upgrade for the Amiga 1500/2000 on a card? They could put the new ROM chip and the full ECS on it with a switch sticking out of the back of the machine to turn it on and off, thereby giving full compatibility with Kickstart 1.3 – unlike the currently popular ROM switchers which don't live up to their promise.

I believe the present upgrade options available to owners of 1.3 machines are nothing short of disgraceful. To upgrade to the level of a current 500 Plus costs £80 for the ROM and manuals, £50 for the new Denise chip, and a staggering £200 for the Super Agnus chip which isn't even an official option!

For an owner of a 1.3 Amiga, it's hardly worth paying almost £350 for the full upgrade when a new A500 Plus costs about the same. I can't help feel that owners of older machines have subsidised new owners by paying over the odds for their machines while they were still in need of serious improvements. Better machines now cost less and we don't get the benefits from developments we funded in the first place.

(Commodore's official repair centre – Ed). After years of poor service and hundreds of complaints from customers, Commodore in my opinion have done nothing about it.

If some other firm brought out an Amiga-compatible equivalent to at least a 1500 Plus I'd sling my Amiga in a quarry, buy the competition, and Commodore could go forth and multiply. It's about time you Amiga magazines developed some spine and made a commitment to your readers – we don't pay upwards of £3 a month for you to ignore what's going on. *P E Browne, Eccleshill*

Well said that man! While I don't agree that Commodore are the total bogeymen you seem to think they are, I quite agree that they've been both tardy and inconsiderate in regard to the Workbench 2.04 and ECS upgrades. For a sizeable manufacturer they have, over the years, left far too much of the Amiga's development to the third-party peripherals market.

Perhaps this is a consequence of a radical, far-sighted machine landing in the hands of people with considerably less imagination than its creators, or perhaps they are just too busy with other projects.

Whatever the reason, it is clear to anyone with half an ounce of grey matter that the Amiga's development as a major mass-selling contender for the PC and Macintosh has been almost completely retarded by Commodore's lack of support for the machine.

In the humble opinion of your postbag delver, Commodore should take the following steps:

 License the Amiga's custom architecture to third-party compatible manufacturers, thus increasing competition in the market and forcing prices down.

• Develop the Amiga's graphics capabilities beyond their obsolete level. PCs now have a 256-colour VGA standard, and many cards giving 32,000 or even 65,000 colours onscreen at once are now available for less than £100.

Commodore could transform the Amiga's

potential in almost every field by boosting standard graphics capabilities. Industry scuttlebutt suggests this is on the cards later this year, but it should have been done ages ago and, given Commodore's previous pricing policy, will probably cost more than equivalent systems on other machines.

Provide technical support and a "hotline" telephone service for end users. Most other sizeable computer manufacturers, when you spend hundreds or thousands of pounds on their equipment, will support your commitment by offering prompt and useful support.

Commodore's technical support division will speak only to dealers and there's no support for the problems experienced by most new users which, though simple, can cause a lot of people to give up and go back to their favourite game.

If one or more of the steps outlined above, or some other drastic action we can't foresee, isn't taken some time this year, we could see the Amiga squeezed from one end by games consoles and from the other by cheaper and cheaper PCs which, though archaic in their basic design and nowhere near as modern as the Amiga, offer more power for less money.

There now, is that enough "spine" for you? **AC**Letters

I would urge all hard drive owners who feel the same to write to their favourite software companies and protest.

I mean, if the games houses don't appreciate how many potential customers there are, why should they bring out an easily pirated game for what could be a small market of Amiga hard drive owners?

Tie a yellow ribbon

I noticed with more than a passing interest an article in another magazine about the Hewlett Packard Deskjet 500c printer which can switch from black and white to colour printing simply by changing the cartridge for the correct colour one.

Why don't other manufacturers adopt the same principle? Is this possible, or too technical? It could certainly solve some of our problems, and leads to a much better service for the end user. What do you think?

Many other manufacturers do exactly what HP have done with the Deskjet 500c. Star's range of colour printers, for example, are capable of printing in either black, and white or colour. What you may have failed to notice is the little "c" on the end of the printer's name.

The Deskjet 500c is actually a colour printer which is happy to print in boring old black and white, and is thus more expensive than a mono-only printer. If you want the same capability on your Amiga, either buy the 500c or go for one of the colour dot matrix printers. Simple, really.

Tweaks for Plus

I recently purchased an A500 Plus to replace my v1.2 A500, but soon realised that a vast quantity of my software would not work with the new Amiga.

After contacting several software companies it became evident that with an often small piece of code this incompatible software could be modified to work on the Plus. However, distribution is a problem so ... Amiga Computing to the rescue!

If "tweaks" for popular incompatible games could be provided on CoverDisks every month, or several on a separate disk, I believe you'd have a very big first for the magazine and it would be very beneficial to your readership.

Your idea is an interesting one, but its practical application is a little problematic. First of all, the majority of incompatible software is in non-AmigaDOS format so any software patch used would be difficult to implement, and the software houses are unlikely to spend the time and money on old or de-listed games to make them compatible for people who have already bought them.

This is not an irresponsible attitude, just commercial sense. The most popular older games may end up being tweaked by their authors if they still sell well, but I would be very surprised if games of more than about a year in age were converted. By far the cheapest method for someone in your position is to buy a ROM switcher for your Kickstart chip.

This won't solve all the problems, as many games are incompatible with the Denise chip rather than the 2.04 Kickstart ROM, but it would be a start, and you could always try using a ROM switcher with two Denise chips for total compatibility.

As for encouraging hackers - aka pirates - to twiddle with copyrighted code, if we took this stance we'd quite rightly end up in court five minutes later.

While reading your March issue, I noticed a news piece entitled "Whither WordPerfect" which stated that WordPerfect was only available on the Amiga in version 4.1.12. I enclose a disk with what I believe to be an Amiga WordPerfect v5.0 on it!

Is this version five of the program or a renamed version four? It came with a spell checker, thesaurus, and a printer disk, and as I've never used WordPerfect before I don't know if this version is a later one than 4.1.12. It was bought in Singapore last year.

Oh, and do American hard drives and interfaces work on British machines?

The so-called WordPerfect disk you sent us is in fact a pirated copy, as WP5.0 does not exist on the Amiga. As it was bought in the notoriously pirate-ridden Singapore, there's no doubt that it is a professionally pirated piece of software reboxed as a new version and sold illegally.

Your first course of action should be to send a copy of the disks, complete with details of where they were purchased to the Federation Against Software Theft. Once that's done, you should wipe the disks you have, as possession of them is illegal.

This is unfortunate, but anyone buying software in Singapore should be aware that it is one of the world's busiest piracy centres. You were simply taken in by what can often be a very well produced, but pirate copy.

In answer to your question on US hard drives, our ACAS people, to whom that enquiry should really have been addressed, say that they should work perfectly.



Demo Maker

ver since the sound of the first "boing" reverberated and the juggler went through his routine, mousands of starry-eyed Amiga owners around the world have drooled at the prospect of creating mega demos of their

However, many may not realise that Red Sector International's Demo Maker can serve as a powerful graphics tool for desktop video applications such as titling, corporate image logos, movie credit sequences and so on.

The only thing necessary for making the transition from a desktop presentation mentality to a desktop video approach is some lateral thinking in the application of the program's capabilities.

What we need to do, in effect, is slow down a galloping graphics workhorse to a more pedestrian pace. The hardware requirements are no different to any other desktop video titling package - except for the audio, if you plan to record that pulsating rap beat.

More on the hardware requirements later - for now let's have a quick overview of the RSIDM's features to see which of these we can utilise for our needs.

Features

Demos are assembled into a sequence of patterns, with each pattern being a standalone graphics routine capable of displaying text, animated objects, colour background scrolls etc, or any combination of the above selected by the user.

To use the Demo Maker as a character generator we simply isolate those patterns which display text. The Preferences List in the main menu holds the various items where text can be entered and edited. These include the top and bottom scrollers, the sine text scroller and the text screens for the three font sizes.

Text is entered by moving the flashing cursor line onto the item to be edited and selecting edit on the top command line.

The Help key toggles insert mode, while pressing Enter returns you to the main menu. In the Pattern Editor, text is entered directly into the Zoom Text pattern and the Textline patterns for each of the three font sizes.

The Textscreen patterns for each font size however, use the numbered and preedited textscreen items from the preferences list, of which there are ten for each font size.

Because a picture is still worth a thousand words and an example is easier to follow, load up the tutorial demo on this month's CoverDisk to see how it was constructed. Load it into the RSIDM as a short under Titles Demo and run it a couple of times to get a feel.

Then, examine the preferences list, select items which are highlighted in green and check their contents by clicking on Edit. Text areas will reveal how much can be entered and the optimum layout. Next go into the Pattern Editor to see which patterns were used and in which order. "Test" each pattern to see which parameters were selected for its execution.

Try tweaking some of the parameters

Saving your presentations

Once you have created your title sequence or demo, you can save it in one of three ways - Save Final, Save Bootintro or Save Short, with each option offering distinct advantages for different applications.

The first option allows you to access the completed demo from the CLI or Workbench if an icon is first created using a suitable utility. This makes it possible to compile special disks with different types of sequences, or to link several sequences to form longer ones by pause editing the tape or similarly, using greater variety of fonts and logos than are normally possible within the Preferences list.

Saving with the Bootintro option will create a self-booting disk where your sequence will play automatically after loading. This option has the obvious advantage of not having to load the host program or Workbench first, thereby saving time and memory but even more importantly allowing you to quickly "plug in" special sequence disks such as your own personal production logo or end credits, so you can "top and tail" your productions.

The third option, or saving as a short, lets you reload your sequence into the Demo Maker for further editing, changing certain presets such as fonts, logos and music, and creating template sequences. That way blank template sequences can be loaded with all the preset items already present in the preferences list, ready for your next work session.

such as Mode to see how it changes the way the pattern runs. The Little and Big Logo patterns let you create your own custom graphics in the form of IFF brushes which you can create in Deluxe Paint or even part of a digitised picture provided it has the right resolution and dimensions.

When cutting brushes to be used as logos, use the Co-ordinates option in DPaint, as the sizes must be pixel perfect. Specifically they are 320 x 158 and 320 x 54 for big and small logos respectively. The screen mode must be lo-res 16 colour with overscan set to standard.

Logo patterns

By using the logo patterns you can have multiple fonts at once, thereby overcoming the limitation of only one font being memory resident for each font size.

Now that you've seen the Tute demo a couple of times, let's look at it in closer detail. It starts with a restrained amount of razzamatazz - from an overwhelming choice of possibilities - in the form of the zoom text and sine scroller for the opening sequence.


This is consistent with a typical style which might be used for the start of a program or title sequence. It then proceeds at an even pace with conventional-style of presentation of the facts and continues so

until examples of some specific techniques are offered - all taming this graphical beast to best serve our special needs. Of course you can make your own titles as fancy as you like - the program is more than capable. The intention of this article, however, is to focus on producing conventional titles using a very unconventional program - a fact which can be far from obvious while being dazzled by a spectacular demo complete with stereo soundtrack.

As for the hardware requirements, the humble RF modulator will let you record your titles directly off an A500 or 2000 onto your VCR. Simply connect the video out of the modulator to the video in on your VCR and switch the input selector to external.

If you are fortunate enough to have access to a genlock, you will know the required connections which will let you superimpose the titles over a live video background.

That's it - the rest is up to your imagination. May your creative juices flow, and let the credits roll.



ROM problems

I have a problem with my Commodore #2630 accelerator card and Workbench 2. All I get on power-up is a message onscreen saying "A2630 Monitor 7M" and a question mark on the line below. What am I to type in?

I spoke to FCC of Leeds, from whom I purchased the 2.04 ROM. They were unable to help but offered me a full refund on my sharer and 2.04 ROM.

I then spoke to Commodore and was told that I should speak to my dealer about the problem, but as the dealer who supplied the card went bust some time ago, I was stuck.

I told this to Commodore and they suggested I write to the technical support department in Milton Keynes. Ha...ha...ha... I wrote to tech support on another matter in December 1991 and have heard nothing from them since.

I finally found out about the compatibility problem from Silica Systems who have offered to upgrade the ROMs on the A2630 free of charge.

All I can say to Commodore is thank God there are good dealers around willing to help people who have bought the best machine in the world, and are treated like dirt by Commodore after spending thousands of pounds on their products.

As you have just found out, the A2630's original ROM chips, used among other things for shadowing Kickstart to 32-bit RAM, are incompatible with the new operating system. Commodore have upgraded the ROMs for this product, and the new version 7 chips enable the board to function perfectly with Kickstart.

You seem to have sorted out the problem, thanks again to helpful thirdparty dealers, but your plight highlights a sad weakness in the way Commodore "supports" the Amiga range. Relying on dealers for thirdparty technical support is a good idea as long as the dealer network is developed and of a high standard.

However, as Amigas are sold by every box-shifter under the sun as well as the more reputable companies, many thousands of owners find themselves in a position similar to your own every month.

This is as good an argument as I can think of for a proper end-user telephone support service. If companies like Electronic Arts can offer this for games players, why can't Commodore do the same for all Amiga users?

Upgrade worries

About six months ago, I bought an Amiga 1500 with Kickstart 1.3 and recently heard that the machine is now being shipped as the A1500 Plus, com-

plete with version 2.04 and the ECS chips.

As Kickstart ROMs and ECS chips are available, and being interested in programming, I have decided to buy the new chips to upgrade my Amiga but would like a few answers before I do.

1. Does the Kickstart 2.04 chip come with manuals and Workbench disks?

2. Can I fit the chips myself? I know this will invalidate my warranty, but will it involve soldering and do they come with fitting instructions?

3. To fit the new chips, will I have to buy extra boards or do they just slot into the motherboard in place of my old chips?

4. How many RAM boards are there which are compatible with the new Super Agnus chip?

As long as you buy the official upgrade pack from a Commodore dealer, you should receive manuals, disks, the new ROM chip, and fitting instructions.

This will cost a ridiculous £80, but if you wimp out and go for the £40 Kickstart chip alone, you'll have no Workbench 2.04 disks or manuals.

Fitting the Kickstart chip is quite easy. You just open the machine, prise out the old chip with a screwdriver, and slot the new one in its place. No soldering is required.

There are no ordinary RAM boards which will take advantage of the Super Agnus chip, because unlike the Kickstart and Denise chips, you can't just replace your old Agnus with a Super Agnus. The motherboards on non-Plus machines are incompatible with the new chip, even though it is the same size as the older Agnuses.

MegaChip 2000 - which will fit in any A1500/2000 - is the only board at present which will allow you to upgrade to 2Mb chip RAM. It fits in a standard Zorro slot and comes with the extra memory and a Super Agnus chip installed. It will cost you a hefty £199, so you'll have to be desperate for more chip RAM.

Quirky Quantum

I recently fitted a Quantum 52Mb replacement drive in my A590 case and although everything is working OK, I would be extremely grateful if you could answer the following questions:

1. In my ignorance the first thing I did

was a low level format using HDToolBox and then initialised the disk. I have since been told that this will slow the drive down. Is this correct and if so can I do anything about it? In any case, is the speed not restricted by the A590 controller card?

2. I use the KCS Powerboard and when booting up the software it kept asking me to low format the drive or press Esc to continue. Again in my ignorance [took this to mean that the drive needed low level formatting and did so. Strangely, all the data on the hard drive remained intact, but the software no longer prompts for a low level format. Why?

3. The PC program CheckIt states that the transfer rate is 674Kb per second, which is far lower than the 2Mb quoted in the drive specifications, so I am concerned I may have done something wrong.

Finally, I read Mr Ankin's letter in the April edition and would like to spring to Diamond Computers' defence. Over the last couple of years they have been pacemakers with their pricing policy. I frequently use them and on the whole find their backup service satisfactory.

I think the problem lies with their sales staff who, I agree, promise to return calls and don't, but whenever I have dealt with their technical engineers I have found them extremely helpful.

Low level formatting should be carried out once on a hard drive and it shouldn't need to be done again. Most hard drives will have already been formatted at the factory, which means you need only prep and partition them.

There is no possibility of this actually slowing down your Quantum, as it wouldn't work unless you formatted it! As you rightly point out, speed of access and transfer rates are dictated partly by the drive mechanism, but more by the controller board.

In your case, the speed of the Quantum will be affected by the relatively slow A590 controller, which is why you are achieving transfer rates of only 674Kb per second.

Ignore the "best case" 2Mb transfer speed, as this is just the manufacturer's estimate of the mechanism's physical limits. In practice, the fastest A500 hard drive, GVP's Impact Series II, will transfer data at about 1.05Mb per second.

The PC software seems to have assumed that you are booting from a hard drive or wish to use a hard drive as your boot partition. In this case, the KCS software would like to prep and format a partition of its own, thus the

request to low format the drive. As the data survived, which it should never do when a drive is formatted, I can only assume the low level format in question never took place.

Dead Amiga?

Last June I purchased an Amiga 500 with 1Mb memory. In addition, there is an A590 hard drive which the Amiga refuses to access. It either informs me of a guru, tells me to check my hardware, or asks for Workbench disk to be inserted.

The A590 does not seem to interface properly. There's a quarter-inch gap between it and the Amiga which I've tried for hours to reduce, but can't. Also, my Star LC-200 printer will not work. Is it incompatible? The shop refuses even to allow me to take my equipment along and have it checked out, so I'm getting desperate.

It sounds as if your A590 has not been formatted or prepped. Try booting from your A590 setup disk and use the HDToolBox utility to go through the formatting procedure. If the drive still won't work after this, then there's something seriously wrong either with the A590 or the Amiga itself.

Don't worry about the small gap between the Amiga and the A590. As long as the edge connector has been slotted in correctly, it doesn't matter if there's a slight gap – you'll find this happens with all hard drives which fit in the DMA port.

The Star LC-200 printer should be completely compatible with the Amiga as long as you have the correct printer leads. Check with your local dealer if you are in doubt about the lead.

By the sound of it the shop you bought the Amiga from is less than helpful, but if the machine is less than one year old you have a right to free repairs under your Commodore warranty. Remind the shop of this, and if they still won't help you, report them to Commodore and send your machine to the national repair centre (FMG).

Productive Denise

Thank you for a great mag, especially the Almanac DTP column. I just have a couplc of questions.

Can you tell me the address for George Thompson Services? There was a wonderful article in the April issue about cheap fonts for PageStream, but the contact address was left out.

Secondly, I know that the new ECS Denise chip can use Productivity mode on a multi-scan monitor, but could the same monitor be used for lower resolutions?

I intend to add an accelerator board at some stage and won't have room inside an A500 for this and a video card. I know that this kind of expansion is fully possible with an A1500/2000, but I haven't got room for one of those machines. Vicious little circle, isn't it?

To use productivity mode with a multisync, you must ensure that the monitor will properly display the new mode. Commodore, predictably enough, recommend their own 1950 monitor, which is a good quality multisync, though a little expensive.

You can risk a cheap VGA monitor, but try to test it before paying for it, as productivity mode is not a standard VGA-style signal and may not perform well with cheaper monitors.

As long as the monitor is happy, and you have a cable which will connect its 9- or 15-pin input to the Amiga's 23-pin RGB socket, you should be able to use all Amiga modes with the multisync.

The display will probably be a bit sharper than your average Amiga monitor but you will, of course, still get flicker in interlace mode unless you have a flicker fixer.

More memory

I am thinking of upgrading my A500, but I am not sure if some upgrades will be compatible with the others. I am planning on a Virgo V1500 board to give me 1Mb of chip RAM and 1Mb of fast RAM. Will this board be compatible with the new Kickstart 2.04 chips I am thinking of getting?

I wouldn't like to think I'm wasting my money on one or the other. Please help. *Richard Turton, Retford*

I have to confess I've never clapped eyes on a Virgo V1500, but it sounds like a perfectly ordinary 1.5Mb card with Gary connector and DIY solder job. As long as you install it properly, you should find little to worry about. Kickstart 2.04 should be happy to coexist with the new RAM board.

Confused startup

I have a query. When I turn on my A500 Plus and hold down both mouse buttons, a screen appears. Please can you explain what it is for and what it actually does? Peter Hicks, St Albans

The startup menu screen activated by holding down both mouse buttons is of most use to users of auto-booting hard drives without game switches, as it allows you to stop a floppy or hard drive from booting, and gives you a choice of which drive to actually boot up from. If you don't have an extra floppy or a hard drive, just ignore this screen.

Duff driver?

I'm on the verge of destroying my printer, as it's been causing me no end of grief lately. I recently switched from using an old shareware text editor, called Uedit, to the Pen Pal wordprocessor, but I've not been able to print anything out.

It all started when the disk, which I ought from a friend, turned out to have a read/write error. There wasn't a backup, so we used FixDisk to sort it out and managed, through luck more than judgement, to get Pen Pal to boot up. However, all was not well.

When I finished my first letter and tried to print it, I got the "Can't find printer device" error message. Now, I think either my Amiga is going mad, or Pen Pal is corrupted, as I have selected the printer driver using preferences and there was no problem. Can Pen Pal have been damaged by the read/write error? B Henson, Birmingham

revision 4.4 A2000 which I purchased in America in 1988. What is it that makes the Amiga PAL or NTSC? Do PAL and NTSC versions have a totally different motherboard, or is it only the display chips that differ? How can I change my system to PAL?

There should be no problem installing the new Kickstart ROM in your old machine – the Kickstart chip socket is exactly the same size as in all the latest machines and will accept any Commodore Kickstart chips except the double-chip A3000 version of Kickstart.

The difference between a PAL and NTSC Amiga is in the Agnus and Denise display chips. Make sure you fit a Fatter Agnus, which will work in PAL or NTSC, and while you're at it buy the ECS Denise so that you can take advantage of Kickstart 2.04's new display modes. After that, you should be in full PAL mode.





Workbench system files was wiped out by FixDisk when it sorted out your read/write error. You will probably find that port-handler (from the L: directory), parallel.device, or serial.device (both from DEVS:) have gone missing. Use Shell or TDM to track down the missing file and copy it across from your Workbench disk.

If Pen Pal had been corrupted, it wouldn't run at all, so you can rest assured you expensive software is safe.

Monitor mayhem

My monitor makes a very annoying highpitched whine whenever I use it, and has recently become so bad that I've resorted to using the TV modulator rather than go mad. Is there anything I can do about it? The monitor is a Philips CM8833 Mk2 and is just out of warranty, so if there's a way of sorting it out without an expensive repair, I'd love to know what it is.

Also, when I use my internal drive for loading large files, it sometimes hangs up. When this happens, the drive light stays on, and the drive keeps cluncking away on the same part of the disk. Is it fritzed as well?

Some people with very acute hearing in the high range can constantly hear the whining sound made by cathode ray tubes, but unless you get this with TVs and every other kind of CRT-based visual display, it's much more likely that your monitor is at fault.

You probably won't be able to do anything about it yourself, as from the sound of thinhs your tube is on its way out. To avoid sending the monitor to a computer repair shop, try lugging it down to your local TV repair man. He may not know much about monitors, but they're basically similar to TVs and he should be able to confirm which component is at fault.

As for the internal drive, the only solution is to replace it. Commodore's internal floppies are not the best in the world, though usually adequate, and many need to be replaced after only a year or so. The replacement will cost you about £45-£50, and will be available from many of our advertisers.



f you're anything like me, your first instinct on the arrival of any new toy is probably to rip open the packaging, toss the manual aside, and start pottering about looking for the interesting bits.

If that's exactly what you did when the GraphicStation dropped through your letter-box there's a strong chance you've probably overlooked one of the most powerful utilities on the disk.

PrintStudio is a fairly bland and minuscule window which hides a plethora of printing options that make the GraphicStation one of the most powerful printing environments in the business.

Before you delve into the utility itself, the first task is to add the printer driver of your choice. If there's one area that causes more problems than any other it's printers, both in their installation and operation. As a result, we'll go through the entire printer installation process step-by-step.

Boot up!

If we assume you've just booted the GraphicStation, either double click on the GraphicStation disk icon or alternately click once on the short-cut pull-down with the left mouse button, then expose the pulldowns themselves by holding down the right.

Either way, select the TDM icon or menu item and load up the aforesaid software. Once loaded, click on DF0 to load up the GraphicStation directory. Now double click on DEVS: followed by the printers directory. At this point you should see the EpsonX printer driver supplied with the disk.

If you use an alternative driver, delete the EpsonX file and copy your preferred driver into the drawer. If you're using a dual-drive system, this should be simplicity itself.

Simply click on the opposite directory window and load a disk containing the driver you require. Select the driver from the parent disk and copy it into the now empty printers drawer on the GraphicStation. If you're working with a

single drive system, follow the same loading procedure for the disk containing the new drive, then click in the GraphicStation directory and select RAM. Now highlight the driver from the parent disk - a small arrow will appear alongside the file. Copy the driver into the RAM disk.

Replace the GraphicStation and move through the directory structure by double clicking on DEVS: and then printers, or alternatively click in the path window above the directory list and type:

df0:devs/printers

This simply speeds up the process by directing TDM straight to the necessary drawer on the disk.

Once in the correct spot, simply click in the opposite directory window displaying the contents of the RAM disk, select the driver and hit copy. The GraphicStation disk should now be complete with the correct driver, ready for configuration.

Now exit TDM and load PrintStudio. Click on the PrintStudio window to remove the information screen and select the preferences icon within

The program will automatically load the standard Amiga preferences program. Once loaded, click on the printer icon which will reveal a secondary window.

You should now see either the original EpsonX driver or alternatively your latest addition plus the generic driver all waiting in the select window. To choose your new driver, simply highlight it using the arrow gadgets alongside the requester.

Once your driver and any other printer

preferences are defined, click on Use to return to the main menu. If you are happy with all the other preferential options, click on Save and you'll be return to the PrintStudio interface.

Because of the usual space restriction imposed by a single page, it simply isn't possible to go into real depth concerning the program itself, so for the time being we'll have to make do with a brief guided tour, returning in later columns for a more in-depth look at the options on offer...

On the very top of the PrintStudio window you'll see the interface colour options,



but perhaps more importantly, concealed between these two gadgets lies the system information dropdown which is revealed by clicking on the central title bar. This produces a small window which shows your available fast and chip RAM plus a running total of the two.


Below the title bar lurk the four main power gadgets. The first of these is the ILBM icon which allows you to load any IFF and print either the entire image or just

selected parts. additional An screen gives complete control over the palette of the picture to be printed

with options to convert to negative and to exchange foreground to background. The screen icon has a dual purpose. It not only allows the user to capture entire screens or individual windows which can then be saved to disk, but also provides an ideal way to capture graphics which can be

feed into the ILBM element of the program for printing.

As the name suggests, the Text gadget gives full control over the printing of text files - which incidentally can be written with the GraphicStation's own built-in text editor

The Text printing options are many and varied, as a result we'll be devoting additional space to a full explanation during a later issue of the support column.

Finally we come to the Preferences option which we explored earlier. As this merely gives access to the standard Amiga preferences program, a detailed recount of its options isn't necessary.

If you require further assistance have a dig around and retrieve the Workbench manual which contains all the necessary information.





Unlock your

aving covered most of the bare-bones basics of ARexx, we now make a small diversion to look at a subject that will interest almost all new users of the language.

The Amiga's reputation is built on its graphics capabilities, its multitasking and its interface, and a newcomer is bound to ask: "How can I make use of these advanced features easily?"

One might have thought that the loading and saving of graphics, the use of file requesters and so on would be easily available from the system, but up to now this has not necessarily been the case.

While the Amiga's old utility language, AmigaBasic, did give access to some of these features, it offered an unfriendly and cranky interface. Many people turned to AMOS Basic, because of its excellent access to the Amiga's bells and whistles, but AMOS needs its own environment and does not multitask with the Intuition graphic user interface.

So, bizarrely, there has not really been an effective utility language for the Amiga – most users have relied on diverse PD utilities to perform their various management tasks.

It is here that ARexx comes into its own in a way that really shines, and which has not yet received the acclaim it deserves. By supporting the addition of limitless extension libraries, ARexx lets us create custom functions that will do the aforementioned jobs easily and cleanly.


For instance, functions to open a window or a screen, to display a graphic, create a menu or get a file requester might look something like OpenWindow(), OpenScreen(), DisplayPic(), MakeMenu() & GetRequester() – in other words, intuitive and easy to use, much as you would expect them to be.

A small library with features like these – rx_intui.library – is included on this month's CoverDisk. This library gives access to many Intuition functions and system functions, as well as the Basic-like peek() and poke(). Normally, functions like these are only available to programmers using assembler, C and their ilk.

Remember to install the library before use with the command:

rxlib rx_intui.library 0 -30 0

- you may even want to have it in your startup



Alex Gian looks at graphics and intuition with ARexx, and predicts a bright future for the language

sequence. We use rx-intui in the example below to show how we can write a simple picture viewer in just a few lines. The reason it seems so simple is that the hard work has already been done by the author of the library.

It is therefore all the more remarkable that all the best ARexx support libraries are freely distributable, and more are appearing daily – this demonstrates the support that ARexx receives, and its true utility nature.

Of course, you will have to learn something of the workings of Intuition if you want to produce anything fancy, but for simple purposes, everything you need is already there.

Let us look at the example now, which will recap some of what we have already seen, and also demonstrate the use of nested loops and If statements:

The first part of the program merely checks whether it was run with an argument supplied or not, using parsing techniques we have already seen. If no argument was given, then the user is prompted to supply a file name.

You could also use a file-

requester to do this, as we showed in the last issue. A check is made to ensure that the file exists, and its contents are then displayed with a simple function, in this case LoadIFF().

A useful feature is that

The usefulness of ARexx lies in two general directions. Firstly, in the extendability of the language via special libraries (and external command hosts – we saw this in the ClockDJ program, which provided us with a file-requester and window control) and secondly as a powerful automation tool for applications that need script control – for jobs that would otherwise have to be done manually. This is, of course, a generalisation, and there are wide overlaps.



Obviously, both elements of the equation are equally important, and it is their combination that gives ARexx its unique abilities.

Let us now look at some more programs that link ARexx and graphics, in order to get a better idea of what is possible.

RexxArpLib.library FreeDraw CanDo ASDG Art Department APIG.library RexxPIPlot Hyperbook

The first, RexxArpLib, is a library similar to our own rx_intui, in that it allows easy access to Intuition features – despite its name! It started off as an interface to the ARP.library – a library that successfully replaced parts of AmigaDOS – but acquired many graphic features along the way.

It has been around for a while, and is quite popular. Unusually, it opens ARexx port for every graphics task, but once you get the hang of it, is very pleasant to use.

APIG – at least you won't forget the name – is another library with similar features, which also tries to cover some gaps left by RexxArpLib. As you can see, the user is spoiled for choice.

FreeDraw is an interesting example of how ARexx can transform a program. It began life as a simple drawing package that could do lines, squares and other simple tasks. As you can imagine, its practical real life value was limited.

However, it acquired an ARexx port when various programmers (particularly T Rokicki with minrexx) took advantage of its simplicity to show how a port could be attached to any program with a simple module. The resulting FreeDraw can now perform quite complex plotting routines via custom ARexx commands; the accompanying illustrations show this.

RexxPIPlot is another interesting case. It started off as a powerful library of plotting routines, with very high quality output, but it was only available for inclusion in C programs. With its ARexx interface it is now available to anyone.

Of course it does run a bit slower under ARexx, it needs to be learned, and if you want professional PostScript output you will need lots of memory. However anyone requiring an interactive professional quality plotting module will be more than pleased with it.

Next, we mention CanDo and Hyperbook. These are multimedia software authoring packages, both of which sport ARexx ports. Anyone who has used this kind of program will appreciate the ease that they bring into the creation of presentations.

CanDo is implemented as a command host, and since it has its own script language, is more likely to rely on ARexx for information about the system. Hyperbook, on the other hand, uses ARexx solely as its script language, and because it is implemented as a function host (ie all its operations are also ARexx functions) it can be controlled very easily, even from other programs.

Using powerful programs like this you can really let your creativity loose, without getting bogged down in messy coding details!

Finally, ASDG's Art Department is a powerful industry standard package which can perform a vast amount of graphic operations, including 24-bit work, and the conversion of almost any picture format ever devised. The fact that it proudly carries an ARexx interface only underlines that graphics and ARexx have a bright future together.

We will look at Amiga system programming with ARexx again in the future, but next time we will return to ARexx proper, to have a look at some important control features in the language as well as the excellent debugging and tracing facilities, which will be appreciated by beginners and old hands alike.

while the window and screen settings can be fully customised, they can also be left unspecified, in which case the function uses its own default values. These are quite adequate in most cases.

All necessary windows and so on will be dealt with automatically. This makes the function useful to beginners and more advanced programmers alike!

An average PD file viewer is over 20k in size, so you can see that the libraries are doing a lot of work to bring all that programming into just one line. Rx_intui.library actually calls a further library (ilbm.library) to handle display and saving, but this is invisible to the user. All you have to do is make sure that all necessary libraries are in your libs: drawer.

The other advantage of doing it this way, rather than using, say, a standard PD viewer, is that you can tailor it exactly to your needs. You can create a custom slide show, with the prompts that you want, and you can easily tie it in with other ARexxcompatible utilities.

For instance, you could edit the pictures as you go, perhaps "stamping" them with some informa-

tion generated by the system. The next line in our listing uses the Peek() function to look at the window data (structure) in memory, and get the address of the screen on which our window has opened.

We will need this when we exit the program – we will then close the screen and leave everything behind us nice and tidy.

We'll look at the system structures in a later article, but for now all you need to know is that the address of a screen is 46 bytes into the window structure.

Next we have a loop that checks the messages sent by the system to the intuition windows when things like mouse clicks and keypresses occur. These are known as IDCMP (Intuition Direct Communication Message Port) messages.

Again we will go into no detail here – suffice it to say that the first part of the message sent when the mouse key is pressed has a value of three. The library documentation for the WaitMsg() function goes into more detail.

We use this loop so that we can break out of our picture viewing with a mouse click. Once we are out of the loop we use the rx_intui supplied functions

EndWindow() and EndScreen() to give us back the memory we have used.

Well that's all there is to it! I know that it may initially appear daunting to beginners, but it really is one of the cleanest ways to go about this kind of work. Experienced programmers often turn to ARexx when designing prototype work, and leave the complex coding to the end, when the design has taken form.



DTV

Videophile rolls on

n last month's column we went through the essentials needed to establish the nucleus of a home-based DTV setup. This month we'll continue in the same vein with a look at the additional hardware which can transform your first faltering steps into full-blown, stylish spectaculars.

As promised last month, our first port of call concerns a near essential element of any serious studio. The genlock comes second only to the Amiga - and, of course, the video - within any serious setup. As a result, it's well worth thinking long and hard about your investment.

To help you make such a big decision it's probably a good ideal to explain exactly what a genlock can offer, how it works and finally how to get the best from your investment.

The first job is to cut through the jargon and explain what your newest investment will actually offer. First, the word genlock is a concatenation of "general locking" - a tedious bit of trivia, but always handy as an ideal dinner party conversation stopper.

Achieving the results

More important aspects of a genlock concern how it achieves such impressive results. Basically there are three elements that make up any genlock. The first and most obvious feature is its ability to overlay, or key, computer-generated images over a video signal. Although impressive, this is perhaps the simplest part of the equation.

The really clever bit concerns the synchronising of the video and computer signals at sync pulse level. Without this ability, genlocking as a concept would be impossible.

The final element concerns coding, a process which converts the Amiga's RGB signal into a

PAL composite or S-VHS signal, depending on your setup.

With these three elements in place, you have the essence of a genlock. Of course, more expensive units offer a whole range of additional whistles and bells which enhance the output and flexibility of the unit.

Nevertheless, for as little as £100, a basic genlock will provide all of the three elements which combine to produce impressive results.

Application

The actual application of a genlock remains a mystery to many, but really it's a very simple process. A common misconception is that genlocks "key" onto a specific colour. This is not the case, as the majority lock solely to colour zero in the Amiga's colour palette. Like all the registers in the Amiga's repertoire, it can be any colour you want it to be.

Because the genlock keys to a specific colour

Genlock buyers' brief

With so many genlocks on the market it would be unfair to single out one or two as perfect buys. Nevertheless, there are a few pointers which should make your decision a little easier.

Obviously your choice may be restricted by available funds, but there are a few points to look for. First is an RGB through port. Not all bargain basement units have this option but it's an important addition which can save a lot of hassle during production - if you can manage the extra investment, it's well worth it.

If there's a choice, plump for a unit that employs sliders as opposed to knobs to achieve wipes and fades between the two signals. This isn't as important as a through port but it does minimise jerky transitions.

If possible, look for a unit that offers an invert option. You're only likely to find it on more recent releases but it's a handy addition allowing you to make colour zero the transparent element while all other colours form a mask.

Creating clear windows within a masked or semi-transparent background can really help to emphasise certain aspects within the image.

If you want more details on units, prices, performance and the like, look at last November's issue of AC for a complete roundup of the available hardware. Next month I'll be taking a look at Oxxi's excellent Presentation Master, detailing how best it can be incorporated into the average DTV setup.

option to genlock but still require your art on video, a PAL encoder is the perfect alternative for anyone who needs to transfer their art onto tape.

Unlike a genlock, a PAL encoder has only one aim in life, that being to convert the RGB output of the Amiga into a high quality PAL VHS composite or S-VHS Y/C signal. The attraction of an encoder is that it provides the best possible Amiga to PAL conversion, but it does mean your art is restricted to Amiga only.

For animators this could be ideal, as live action

video usually isn't required. An added bonus with many encoders is their built in expandability, with composite, Y/C and even Hi 8 outputs as standard, plus a built in audio through port. Unfortunately this is usually mono only.

A perfect example is the CP10 PAL encoder from Third Coast Technologies. It offers as good a PAL signal as you're are ever likely to need plus a full complement of the upgrading options as listed above - all yours for £150. Not bad value, as a glimpse at the price of similarly expandable genlocks will illustrate.





Get the picture

Responding to queries by readers, I have now written a full assembler version of a routine to read an IFF picture file – the routine is available on this month's CoverDisk.

Interchange Format Files (or IFFs) are a convenient way of storing data in a way that any program can recognise. Usually the file starts with a group header. This has a group ID of four Ascii letters, the total file length, and then the ID of the type of file.

The picture files that I have come across are usually ILBM (interleaved bitmap) or ACBM (contiguous bitmap) but there could be others as well as files for music or text data. The file would consist of a series of chunks, starting with a chunk ID and chunk length followed by the chunk data. All chunks are read by the program. Chunks like DPPV and CRNG are ignored, but the following are processed:

BMHD	The bitmap header has the depth, width and height of the picture and the screen it came from, and a flag to indicate whether the data was compressed.	
СМАР	This chunk contains a list of the colours used.	
ABIT	This is the main data for an ACBM picture. The information is stored for a complete bit plane at a time.	
BODY	Data for an ILBM file. The data for all the bitplanes of the first screen row is followed by similar data for the other rows. If there are a lot of bytes the same colour the data may be compressed to save disk space. The usual algorithm is to use a flag to indicate whether the next few bytes are to be read individually or cloned.

It is interesting to look at the data in a real IFF file to see how it is put together. Enter "type piccy opt h" for a look at the different chunks and their contents. A typical chunk header for a BMHD chunk of 20 bytes would look like:

42404844 00000014

Colour information would start:

43404150 00000030 00000000 600000A0 0000E000 A0804000

This would indicate 30 bytes of colour information starting with black (00 00 00), dark green (00 60 00), lighter green (00 A0 00), light green (00 E0 00) and camel or taupe (A0 80 40).

I wrote a general purpose file reader that could be accessed from any assembler source module. The picture filename, destination bitmap and colourlist vary, so they would be the input parameters for the routine. The routine "readfile" reads an ILBM or ACBM file where:



Devpac macros


A macro is a small piece of frequently used code that is included in a source file when it is compiled. This macro is called in the source code, and included at compile time like a header file, so the source code can remain fairly compact.

The macro code is included in the object code every time the macro is called (unlike a call to a library routine) so there are no extra overheads at run time. Some extra memory is needed for object code, but this is usually offset by other advantages, especially on short macros.

The Devpac assembler has macros available for calling Amiga library routines. To take full advantage of these, use the following routine to open the DOS library:



where space is reserved in the data section for each library pointer and library name.



The macro CALLDOS would save the contents of register a6, load a6 with the address in location _DOSBase, call the required DOS Library routine, and restore the original contents of a6.

It is the no longer necessary to declare each library routine as an external reference, but the header files exec/exec_lib.i, libraries/dos.i, and libraries/dos_lib.i need to be included. The module assumes that the file is present, is ILBM or ACBM, and that the bitmap and colourlist are OK. When these conditions are met the module will read in the named picture file, unscramble it, put it in the chosen bitmap, and put its colours into your colourlist.

The module also assumes that there is enough memory for the compressed data while it is being decoded; this memory can be reused later. If memory is short, the module could be adapted with a smaller buffer to read in part of the data at a time. This would slow down the program – there would be more processing and disk access would be less efficient.

The routine runs slightly faster than its C equivalent; a C programmer may want to resort to such a routine if picture files are to be read several times during a program run.

It is possible to call an assembler function from a C module by declaring the assembler function address as an external reference. Any values are returned via register d0.

If using any address registers other than a0 and a1, push the registers on to the stack at the beginning of the assembler routine, and pull them off at the end. C routines would put their input variables onto the stack, rather than into data registers, so the assembler routine would need to be adapted slightly when being called from a C program.

The demo program on the CoverDisk contains two source modules, pix.a and iffread2.a, which can be assembled and linked together in the normal way.

The object module, pix, clears the screen by blanking out the colours. The ILBM picture file, with the filename specified in the calling program, is opened and read. The BMHD chunk gives instructions on the dimensions of the picture, and the number of bitplanes and colours.

The colours from the CMAP are copied to the colourlist in the calling program. The picture data in the BODY chunk is read in, decoded, and copied to the bitplanes specified by the bitmap structure in the calling program. The file is closed, and control goes back to the main program.

The picture is displayed on the screen until the user presses the joystick Fire button, or clicks a mouse button. If you want to watch the operation in slow motion, comment out the first jsr _LVOLoadRGB4(a6) instruction in the main program.

Then you will see the current screen contents in the default colours while the picture is loading. Call the "wait" routine after each line – or even each plane to see how the picture is slowly built up.

The dance decade

udible plagiarism is big business in the music scene. As a consequence, it was only a matter of time before the stickyfingered exploits of numerous producers and musicians made their way onto the Amiga.

Whether you agree with the practice or not, sampling other peoples' work is a fact of life and has become the norm rather than the exception.

The two latest floppy-based collections offer radically different approaches to the art of second-hand song compilation. The first comes from Time and Space and features edited sampled backbeat song sections rather than individual sounds.

The second selection of swag appears courtesy of Gajits' Music Software and arrives as a five-piece, floppy-based selection containing between 30 and 40 individual samples on each disk, all borrowed/pinched/lifted/blagged and generally leased on a permanent basis from a variety of the very latest state-of-the-art sequencers and modules.

We'll open with the dance-dedicated element of the duet. Zero-G comes hot from the all-nighter, bringing with it a selection of 72 edited samples universally know as Breakbeats.

The collection is derived from the personal collection of Ed Stratton – AKA Man Machine – who, according to the bumph, is a world renowned techno pioneer.

All the samples have been captured as IFF files at 16,726 cycles per second. As you might expect, this makes for very impressive results – it is, after all, roughly double the sampling rate for the average Amiga sample.

Where appropriate, loop points have been added making it possible to build an entire section

Perfect packages

All the programs listed below are ideal for handling Amiga-based samples. For the newcomer MED is perhaps the perfect choice. It's not only cheap but boasts one of the best piano roll formats

or song around a single looping sample. The breaks themselves have been pre-edited to cycle perfectly. All you need do is glue the various elements together.

Aside from simple cycling repeats, some beats offer intro breaks with associated backbeats that continue on perfectly after the initial intro sample.

All the samples are tuned to middle C, so there should be very little editing required. Nevertheless, the accompanying manual offers advice on how to create or recreate looping samples, and how to combine a single intro sample with an infinitely repeating backbeat.

Advice

The tutorial goes on with further hints and tips on adjusting loop points and the creation of single instrument sustain loops. The entire tutorial section is based around AudioMaster III, but don't be put off if you're the proud owner of either Audition 4 or Intersound, as the advice is fairly general and should port over to other packages very easily.

Generally speaking, the Zero-G collection is excellent for dance fans but next to useless for anyone else. Having said that, there is a chance to do a little poaching of your own, as sounds can be isolated with a decent sample editor and lifted for latter use. The sound quality and editing is very impressive,

and the samples could easily slip back into the rave scene without anyone noticing their Amigan ancestry.

As mentioned earlier, Gajits' collection offers a slightly more purist approach to audible plagiarism. Rather than offering complete sections, they concentrate solely on individual sounds sampled directly from various unnamed sequencers and modules.

As a consequence, song construction is a little more longwinded but infinitely more original than its dance-orientated counterparts.

All the voice samples are recorded at 1,200 cycles per second, which at first glance appears inferior in comparison to the Zero-G collection. It's true that the quality at the ideal pitch isn't as good but this is negated by the added range which the slightly lower sampling rate provides.

The choice is a simple one. If a sample is taken at a high rate, its sound at perfect pitch

Power players

If you consider yourself a serious dance devotee, the world of 8-bit sampling is probably well below your requirements. As a result, the CD-based version of the Zero-G collection could be ideal.

The complete three-CD set contains approximately 3,000 assorted samples covering the entire spectrum of modern dance music. All the sounds included are fully blown 16-bit replicas of the originals, with breaks, vocal hooks, special FXs, keyboard samples and just about everything else any would-be DJ or producer would ever need.

is indeed better. But when high rate samples are moved up or down through the octave range they become distorted far quicker than samples recorded at a lower rate. As a result, there has to be a compromise when recording sounds which are to be played over numerous octaves.

Because percussion is generally used at or around perfect pitch, Gajits' have sampled all such sounds at 25,000 cycles, which even

outstrips the impressive fidelity of the Zero-G collection.

For the true musos out there, this collection has to be the better choice of the two, especially if you want truly original results and don't mind putting a little more time into their creation.

ast month we looked at bulletin boards and conferencing systems and ended with a warning about costs. But costs can be cut dramatically in a number of ways.

Although you should be able to find plenty of boards which are only a local call away, some of the more interesting ones are likely to be at the other end of the country, and long distance calls are expensive. If you think you'll be making lots of long distance calls, it's worth getting a Mercury account.

This alternative telephone system is now available from almost anywhere in the country, although some areas are still not covered. The system works on a PIN code basis. For about £8 per year you are issued with a personal code which is dialled before the normal telephone number. This puts you into the Mercury system and cuts BT out altogether.

Any calls made in this way are billed to you by Mercury so that theoretically you need only ever pay BT for their standing charges - line and equipment rental and so on. Mercury calls work out a good deal cheaper for all except local area calls and if you use the phone a lot, this can add up to a substantial saving.

Another useful feature of Mercury is the option of allocating cost centre codes to the PIN. These two or three digit numbers are chosen by you and are a handy way of separating different types of calls when the bill comes in.

For instance, a different code could be allocated to each member of the family, plus one for each BBS you dial regularly. The bill is itemised with cost centres totalled separately.

One small problem with Mercury is that you might need to buy a new telephone to handle it. However, these need not be too expensive, and for around £30 you will be able to get hold of a spanking new phone with number storage facility which saves you from having to feed in a 10 to 20 digit code every time you dial.

There is a simple way to join chat sessions inexpensively, and here a high speed modem can be a great money-saver. Since reading and writing messages takes a lot of time, it makes sense to do so while not connected to the BBS, by means of an OLR (offline reader), such as OLR2, as found on the Amiga Computing CoverDisk a few months back

This is simply a piece of software which will log on to a board automatically, find all the messages you haven't read yet, bundle and compress them and finally download the file to disk. When this is done, the OLR will log you off automatically.

The next time you log on to the board, the OLR will upload your messages and place them in the system before downloading the next batch of unread messages. This method of working is called "blinking" and is a tremendous moneysaver. In fact you shouldn't think of using any system regularly without investigating which OLRs are available on that board.

Most OLR software is shareware, including the one I am currently evaluating. Amiga Silver Express is installed in my local board as a menu option. When I log on I can simply choose this option, decide which messages I want to capture, then download the compressed bundle created by the system.

Although this part of the operation is automatic, the logging on and off is not. This has to be handled by a script, which is rather like the start-up sequence used when you boot your Amiga. It is simply a list of instructions saying what to answer when the BBS offers various prompts. Setting up scripts demands quite a good knowledge of each BBS you wish to use, as each will present prompts and menus differently. This is easily handled by having a range of different scripts, one for each board, and a piece of comms software which can handle them.

The most widely used comms software on the Amiga is Ncomm, which handles scripts effortlessly and allows a phone book to be created to store both the telephone numbers of each BBS and all the settings, usernames and passwords required. Ncomm is available for download from most bulletin boards which offer files, and is well worth a look.

AMOS

Psychedelic scenery

Peter Hickman shows you how to hypnotise your relatives using just your Amiga... and a copy of Amos!

our Amiga is blessed with a wonderful collection of 4,096 different colours. With these colours we can create new worlds and alternate realities with art packages like Deluxe Paint. With Amos we can go a step further and use the power of colour to produce animation.

Before we go into too much detail, it will help for you to know a little bit about the way colours are handled by the Amiga. Under ordinary circumstances you can display 32 individual colours onscreen. These are stored in colour registers. You can think of a colour register as being an empty paint pot, which we can fill up with any colour.

At its simplest form you can see colour cycling at fairgrounds and fancy Christmas displays. This happens when a string of unlit bulbs are switched on in sequence one at a time. This gives the illusion that a bulb is moving along. We can demonstrate this with a simple program.

The first step is to open up our screen, so go into the Amos editor and type:

Screen Open 0,320,200,16,Lowres Flash Off Cls O Curs Off

Now we must set up our palette. Remember that

each of the numbers in the following line represent the "paint" that we are pouring into the paint pot (colour register).

The colour which we have poured into colour register number one – remember that the 32 different colour registers are labelled from 0 to 31 – is white (\$FFF) and represents our bulb which is switched on:

Now we must draw our light-bulbs. Each one will use a different colour, selected with the PEN command:

Paper 0 For LOP=1 To 15	
Pen LOP Wait VbL	
Print "0 "; Next LOP	

The final stage is to start the colour cycling up. We will do this using the Shift command, which uses four parameters. The first is the speed at which the colours will cycle, the second and third specify the start and end colour registers which will be cycled and the final parameter is for special effects – which we will not be using!

Just how does it work? Well, the Shift command will move the colour stored in register number 1 into register number 2, the colour in register 2 into register 3, 3 into 4, 4 into 5 etc. It's a bit like pouring the paint from one pot into another!

shift Up 2,1,15,1 Direct

That's it. Simple, huh?

Another interesting use of colour cycling is to produce weird backgrounds for games and demos – or hypnotising friends and relatives!

In the next example we will draw a small block

Practical Amos

We have seen how to create a simple Pacman-type game in Amos, but what's next? How about education!

An absolute wealth of educational software has appeared in shops and in public domain catalogues since the release of Amos. Many people who have good ideas but have been unable to implement them in traditional languages – like Amiga Basic – have found that Amos allows them to breathe life into their ideas.

In the next issue we will look at how to write a simple educational game using Amos. Who knows, you could go on to write something amazing using the ideas I will present – this is you chance to get ripped off by a top software company, so don't miss it!

16 x 16 pixels in size, grab it as a Bob and finally paste it all over the screen. Once again, our screen must be opened up, and a palette selected. In this case I have used shades of blue:

In the picture

ractice makes perfect, the old saying goes. And as far as using greyscale hand scanners is concerned, the old saying rings true.

The quality of the resultant image will always depend on the quality of the original. The natural assumption here is that black-and-white photographs will always provide better greyscale scanned images than colour ones. Not true.

What matters is contrast. A good quality, bright and colourful photograph - one taken in strong light, like bright sunlight or under photographic lamps - will scan perfectly well and in most cases will result in a better 16 greyshade image than the same image scanned from a black-and-white equivalent.

You should always use the scanner's halftone setting for scanning anything but line drawings, usually marked on the scanning head as the smallest of three dots. Ignore the two larger dots - on the whole these are a waste of time, although they can sometimes be used to get a better scan of a low contrast ("muddy") original.

Preparation

Use the highest dots-per-inch setting available, usually 400 dpi, and to start with set the brightness wheel to the lightest setting.

In preparation for the scan, try to find a horizontal line on the original to line up with the front of the scanning head. I don't mean through the window, I mean in front of that look over the front of the scanner and line its foremost edge up with something horizontal in the picture, preferably as near the top of it as possible - often this can be the actual top edge of the photograph.

Once the head is straight, start the software scan so that the green scanning light comes on, but before pressing the scanning button on the head, look through the window and push the

Processing by hand

If you can't afford image processing software and want to get better printed output of muddy greyscale images, you can do it by hand if you have an art package and a little patience.

To adjust the brightness of an image, simply click on each colour in the palette and change its RGB value to the next lightest shade. So 0,0,0 (black) becomes 1,1,1; 1,1,1 becomes 2,2,2 and so on all the way up to 14,14,14 which becomes 15,15,15.

Keep in mind that each time you go through this process you turn one more shade of light grey into solid white, so the more you do it, the more detail gets lost. A better way is to leave black and white alone and drastically brighten the greys in between. Change both 1,1,1 and 2,2,2 to 8,8,8; change 3,3,3 and 4,4,4 to 9,9,9; change 5,5,5 and 6,6,6 to 10,10,10; and so on until the two greys before white are 14,14,14.


You might find it easier if you work backwards from white. Leave white alone, and then create pairs of greys one level of grey darker than the previous level, until you hit black, which you leave alone. The onscreen image will look a little wishy-washy, but the printed output will look much better than before.

In the first of two parts, Ben Pointer shows you how to achieve superior greyscale scanning

head upwards slightly until the bar of light is positioned correctly across the top of the image to be scanned.

Sometimes this will result in the front of the scanner protruding over the top of the image, and when you start to pull the head it gets stuck on that leading edge of the paper. The solution is to place a clear sheet of plastic or

acetate over the photograph or picture beforehand, or slip it inside one of those clear plastic A4 paper sleeves that stationers sell.

Always remember that a single, even pull is better than lots of very slow jerky pulls. The trick is not to put too much downwards pressure on the head.

You need to press down a bit or the roller underneath the head will stop rolling (it's this roller that keeps track of the length of the scan) and bits of the image will not be scanned, but the pressure should be light. The

amount of downwards pressure you apply also affects the brightness of the scan because the more pressure you apply the less light gets in underneath the scanning head to add to the illumination of the picture, and therefore the amount of light reflected from it. Heavy pressure results in darker images.

Straight scanning

You'll find it easier to scan in straight lines if you use some sort of straight edge to run the head down when scanning. I find that the spine of a thick and heavy book is best, something like a telephone directory.

It needs to be heavy so that it won't slip if you accidentally lean against it a bit too much. Even then you may have difficulty keeping the head straight because the bit at the front that you push against the book is too narrow and might wobble about a bit

The way to solve this is to use two heavy books, one either side of the head, forming a kind of valley down which to pull the scanner. If the books are heavy enough there's no way that the head can wander off line, so it's just a case of lining the books up correctly before scanning.

Once bitten...

he Commodore CDTV is not the only interactive CD unit being aimed at the home market. Philips have had their CD-I interactive unit ready to launch for several years now. They have held back the launch in Europe awaiting the FMV (Full Motion Video) chips that would allow the CD-I unit to display moving VHS-quality video direct from CD.

These have not yet appeared at a cheap enough price to fit as standard, so the European CD-I players will come without the FMV chips, but with a socket to add this at a later date.

With manufacturers such as Philips, Sony, Matsushita, Sanyo and JVC bringing CD-I players to the market, does this spell the death of CDTV?

Firstly, let's compare the technical specifications of the two systems. The CD-I has a faster processor (16Mhz), and a larger colour palette. The CDTV has a standard 7Mhz 68000 chip and standard Amiga graphics modes, but it also has the Amiga custom chip set, which can make up for the speed difference between the two machines, and more.

Uniquely placed

CDTV is uniquely placed. The CD-I unit can cope very well with interactive multimedia-type applications, the Sega Megadrive-CD unit can play mean CD-ROM-based games, but only the CDTV can really perform well as both a home multimedia reference/education system, and a home entertainment system.

Games on the CD-I just don't cut it. The hardware is new and non-standard, so there are few programmers who really understand CD-I. CDTV is essentially an Amiga 500 with a CD-ROM drive, and there are thousands of good Amiga programmers out there ready to produce CDTV titles.

Initially Commodore tried to hide the fact that the CDTV contained a computer - now they are actively selling the machine on its expansion capabilities. The CD-I box can't be expanded into a computer., but by adding an inexpensive keyboard, mouse and disk drive to the CDTV you can use the machine as a standard Amiga.

The CDTV has Midi ports allowing the use of the new CD+MIDI audio disks (CD audio disks with Midi data encoded with the music) the CD-I box doesn't. CDTV has

an optional internal genlock, and with recently the announced AVM card it is possible to bring CDTV graphics up to and beyond CD-I quality, for an extra £50. This technology will almost cer-

tainly be built into future CDTVs.

The major problem with CD-I is not hardware, but software. A typical CD-I development system includes a Sun Sparcstation, emulator hardware, authoring system, tools and training, total cost around £44,000.

On CDTV the costs are far less, as there is already a large Amiga user base, and peripherals and software are very cheap. Several CDTV titles have

been produced with very basic Amiga systems an Amiga 500 with 100Mb hard drive and colour monitor - costing under £1,000, although it must be said that an A2000 or an A3000 is a far better system for CDTV development.

Lower costs

Because the costs are far less than on CD-I, there are far more companies developing for CDTV than for CD-I, and there are more titles currently available, despite CD-I having a three year lead on CDTV.

Philips are saying that some of their complex CD-I titles are taking 10,000 hours to test. At eight hours a day, that's five years!

Without the software CD-I is doomed. There may be a few high-quality titles out for CD-I, but without a large catalogue of titles the machines will not sell. Both Philips and Sony got their fin-

gers burned in the home video market; they were beaten by the VHS format, not

Commodore initially told developers that machines would come fitted only with Kickstart 1.3, but recent CDTV purchasers have been pleasantly surprised to find that their machines have Kickstart 2.0 fitted. There is not an easy way to tell whether a CDTV is fitted with a particular Kickstart version, except to boot from a Workbench floppy

This corresponds to the CDTV ROM version, not the Kickstart ROM. If the machine has a 1.0 CDTV ROM then it definitely has Kickstart 1.3 – if the machine has a 2.0 CDTV ROM, then it probably has Kickstart 2.0, but older models may still have the 1.3 Kickstart

because their formats were any worse technically (Betamax was a far superior system to early VHS), but because most movies came out first on VHS.

And the combined strength of all the Japanese manufacturers together against Commodore isn't necessarily a one-way fight either. The Japanese tried to take on Commodore and Sinclair in the home computer market back in the early 1980s. They produced the MSX computer, which despite being a nice machine, with lots of different models, flopped in most of Europe because there just wasn't the software to go with it. The Spectrum and the Commodore 64 are still selling today.

Sales of CD-I in the States have been very disappointing. Philips are banking on the European market to build CD-I, but without the software it hasn't got a chance.
