Bundesbank helps mark against soaring dollar

FRANKFURT, Feb. 13 (R) — West Germany's central bank, the Bundesbank, sold a record \$164 million in a massive intervention in the foreign exchange market Friday to help the mark against a soaring dollar.

The dollar, which leapt ahead again against major currencies, was fixed in Frankfurt at 1915 marks, brought down slightly from 1965 by the Bundesbank's efforts which amounted to the biggest-ever sale in a single one-day session. But the mark was still all down on Thursday's 2.1855 to the dollar.

The mark has been particularly hit by the dollar's buoyancy because of West Germany's economic slowdown and big balance payments deficit. It has lost more than 20 percent of its value against the dollar in the last six months.

Hilton Hotel fire blamed on marijuana

LAS VEGAS, Feb. 13 (R) — An apprentice waiter charged with causing a fire at the Las Vegas Hilton Hotel Tuesday in which eight persons died has told police he accidentally started the blaze while engaged in a homosexual act.

Police Lieutenant John Conner told a press conference Thursday that Philip Bruce Cline, 33, had admitted that his marijuana cigarette set fire to curtains in a lift lobby while he was involved in a homosexual act with a man he knew only as "Joe".

Earlier Thursday, Cline was charged with eight counts of murder and one count of first-degree arson. The penalty for arson resulting in death is capital punishment in Nevada.

Algeria may receive C-130s

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 — The Reagan administration is seriously considering the sale of C-130 Hercules military helicopters to Algeria, Pentagon sources said. The sale, which would be the first military deal with the Algerian government, is being considered as an important symbol of gratitude for Algeria's role in the resolution of the hostage crisis.

Algeria's ambassador to the U.S. Redha Alek Friday met with Secretary of State Alexander Haig when Haig again expressed America's thanks to Algeria for its crucial role as mediator in solving the hostage problem, according to state department sources. In that meeting, the Algerian ambassador also raised the question of possible U.S. arms sales to Algeria, sources said, adding that Haig promised to give the issue serious consideration. According to administration sources, officials from the department of defense and state favor the sale of the C-130 transport planes to Algeria. The proposed sale is still under review at the White House.

Nonaligned urge withdrawal from Afghanistan

NEW DELHI, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — The nonaligned movement Friday called for the withdrawal of foreign forces from Afghanistan and demanded that the Afghan people be allowed to determine their destiny free from outside interference. Foreign ministers at the movement's conference here also urged that foreign forces in Kampuchea and surrounding countries must be pulled out.

The agreement on Kampuchea and Afghanistan, two issues which had split the conference, was reached early Friday morning after nightlong wrangling to find a consensus. The call for a troop withdrawal from Afghanistan was seen as a victory for the moderate countries which have opposed attempts by Cuba and other pro-Soviet states to ally the nonaligned movement with communist bloc countries.

The declaration which was adopted by the 16-member groups emphasized the need for a political solution to both problems and called on all sides to de-escalate tension in the

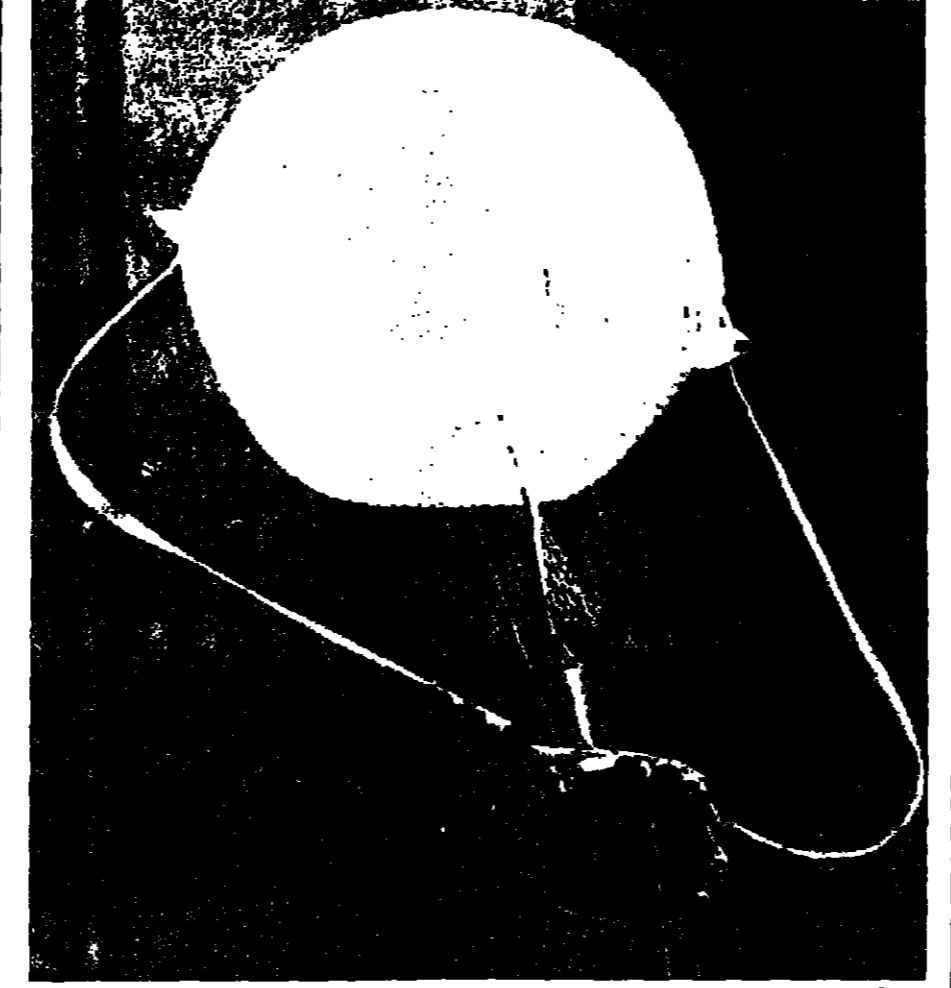

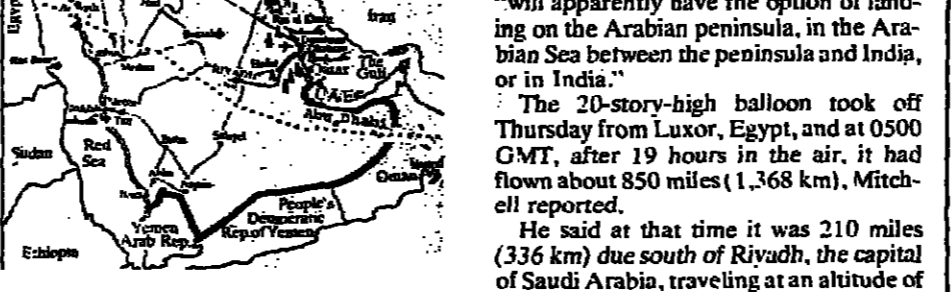

Trudeau plays down tension

OTTAWA, Feb. 13 (AP) — Prime Minister Elliot Trudeau appeared Thursday to play down tension with Britain over Ottawa's constitutional package and implied that British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher would be wise to stay away from Ottawa at this politically critical time.

Trudeau said at his weekly news conference he personally has no complaints against British High Commissioner Sir John Ford and "will try to ally" Quebec premier Rene Levesque's fears of tension with Britain.

He also discounted chances that British authorities monitored Canadian diplomatic messages to Ottawa — "I'm not aware that such wiretaps took place, nor any methods used." The possibility of wiretapping was

U.S. rejects Soviet protest

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — The Reagan administration has rejected complaints by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko of U.S. interference in Poland's internal affairs and criticized the Soviet embassy for publicizing Gromyko's views. State Department Spokesman William Dyess Thursday declined to comment on other aspects of a letter from Gromyko to Secretary of State Alexander Haig, but described its release by the embassy as an unprecedented and regrettable step.

Since confidentiality was essential to the conduct of diplomacy, the department did not intend to make public Haig's earlier message, to Moscow, he said. But the administration chose to specifically reject charges that American-sponsored radio broadcasts constituted meddling in the Polish labor crisis, and to reaffirm that the United States adhered to a policy of strict non-intervention in Poland's internal affairs.

In his letter, Gromyko criticized the "provocative and instigatory" voice of American broadcasts which, he said, were aimed at generating unfriendly sentiments among the Poles toward the Soviet Union.

Gromyko's letter said that in addition to the radio broadcasts, the United States was engaged in other types of interference in Poland. He did not elaborate.

Dyess said the claims were "simply not true" and added that the United States looked forward to a constructive relationship with the new Polish government.

Other officials, meanwhile, said the administration would consider Poland's multi-billion-dollar request for economic aid and debt rescheduling before Feb. 20, the date of a Paris meeting of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD).

Meanwhile, the Soviet press has accused the U.S. administration of trying to discredit all third world independence movements in hopes of assuring U.S. domination of the world.

Shamir to meet Reagan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 — Israel's foreign minister Yitzhak Shamir, who arrives in Washington early next week without an official American invitation, has secured an appointment with U.S. President Ronald Reagan.

He will be the first foreign minister to meet with the new American president, and political observers here point that this represents a coup for pro-Israeli groups who have been lobbying for power positions with the new administration.

One of the first goals for the pro-Israeli forces, the observers continued, has been scheduling talks between Israeli officials and American leaders before they could meet with any Arab leaders. Shamir, who is now on an official visit to several south American countries, is also scheduled to meet with Secretary of State Alexander Haig during his

Syrian-Israeli jet fighters clash

BEIRUT, Feb. 13 (AP) — Syrian and Israeli warplanes clashed in an aerial battle over southern Lebanon Friday and one jet was shot down, Lebanon's state radio reported. A privately-owned radio station in Beirut said it was a Soviet-made Syrian MiG jet fighter.

Massaoud says

Kingdom reaffirms nonaligned support

NEW DELHI, Feb. 13 (SPA) — Saudi Arabia Wednesday reaffirmed its adherence to the principle of nonalignment, but at the same time warned the Non-Aligned Movement that its present lopsidedness will discredit it in the eyes of the whole world.

Sheikh Muhammad Ibrahim Massaoud, state minister and cabinet member, said that colonialism must be condemned, no matter whether by a Western or an Eastern power. The main reason for the movement is its freedom from superpower pressure, he added.

Saudi Arabia strongly regretted the apparent bias in the movement these days and the tipping of the required balance during the debates, Massaoud said. The movement's resolutions and recommendations were no longer based on abstract objectivity, he added.

If such a state of affairs were to continue, the official said, the movement will lose its strength and credibility among both the non-aligned countries and the big powers. He pointed to the opposing stands every time the

Greetings cabled

RIYADH, Feb. 13 (SPA) — King Khaled Thursday cabled his greetings to Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr and to Sir Paul Socon, the governor general of Granada, on their countries' national day.

The Kingdom wished the two heads of state health and happiness and their peoples further progress and prosperity.

Meanwhile, Canada's Ambassador to Saudi Arabia Jacques Rouard arrived here Wednesday evening. He was met at the airport by Sheikh Hussein Marzuqi, deputy chief of protocol at the Foreign Ministry, and Canadian embassy staff members.

group came to condemning Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan. "The odious colonialism has no color and no shape," Massaoud said.

Saudi Arabia remains committed to the principles and objectives of the Non-Aligned Movement as was clearly indicated in King Khaled's opening speech at the third Islamic summit in Mecca last month, the minister pointed out. "Our allegiance should go neither to a western bloc, nor to an eastern bloc," the King had said. "And the security of the Islamic world will not be ensured by joining a military alliance or shelter behind a big power. Only our faith in God and confidence in ourselves can secure it," the King had added.

On the issues under discussion, Massaoud said that any proposal to solve the Palestinian issue is doomed to failure unless the Palestinian people, led by the Palestine Liberation Organization, are given a chance to determine their own future and set up an independent state on their national soil after the total evacuation by Israel of all territories occupied in 1967, including Jerusalem.

He called on the Non-Aligned Movement to exert more pressure and to apply all sanctions provided for in Chapter VII of the U.N. Charter on Israel to compel it to honor Palestinian Arab rights. All resolutions and recommendations adopted by various international bodies still remain a dead issue, he added. Palestinian and Arab territories are occupied still and the inalienable national rights of the Palestinian people still usurped, Massaoud said.

The Saudi Arabian representative lambasted the Soviet Union for the military invasion of Afghanistan which, he said, threatened the whole area.

Bahrain ruler meets Algosaihi

MANAMA, Feb. 13 (SPA) — Industry and Electricity Minister Dr. Ghazi Algosaihi was received by Bahrain ruler, Sheikh Issa bin Salman Al-Khalifa Wednesday night.

Sheikh Issa reiterated Bahrain's absolute support of the joint industrial projects to be carried out in the Arab Gulf region, Dr. Algosaihi said after the meeting. The Bahraini ruler also said his country supported the effects of the Gulf Industrial Consultation Organization which promotes the drawing of a comprehensive strategy in the Aluminium industry and other joint projects planned.

Dr. Algosaihi added that Sheikh Issa has commended the Gulf Cooperation Council and said the council will lead to clear results in bringing the people of the Gulf closer. The Bahraini leader added that these moves will link the region's people in a network of economic, commercial and industrial interests that will bring noticeable benefits for Gulf citizens.

The Saudi Arabian minister is here on a visit after attending a meeting of Gulf industry ministers that ended with the signing of an agreement to set up a joint venture aluminium industry. The Kingdom holds 20 per cent of the SR240 million Aluminium Rolling Mill Company. The remainder is owned by Bahrain, Oman, Qatar, Iraq and Kuwait.

Gulf youths meet to discuss sports festival

RIYADH, Feb. 13 (SPA) — Youth Welfare President Prince Faisal bin Fahd received at his office Wednesday delegations of 16 Gulf universities. The students are in the Kingdom to attend a preparatory meeting for the Gulf Youth Sports festival.

Prince Faisal bin Fahd welcomed the youths and stressed the vital role of universities toward young people in the region. He expressed his support for the idea of organizing the Gulf youth festival which will deepen the spirit of cooperation and bring the region's youth closer together. He said the Presidency of Youth Welfare is ready to exert all its resources to put the festival in an honorable light.

Three Saudi Arabian universities — the University of Petroleum and Mineral of Dhahran, King Abdul Aziz University of Jeddah and Riyadh — announced their desire to host the first Gulf youth sports festival tournament jointly.

The representatives of the 16 universities agreed in their meeting earlier in the day to hold the festival in February, 1983. The delegates also approved at the end of their two-day meeting the games and contests to be included in the festival. The festival will last ten days, they decided. Islamic leaders urged to break Soviet ties

MECCA, Feb. 13 (SPA) — The World Council of Mosques called on all Islamic heads of state to sever relations with the Soviet Union, in relation for the hardships the Afghan people are enduring, including the destruction of mosques, cities and villages.

At the end of its sixth session, the council endorsed the Mecca Declaration and the resolutions of the third Islamic summit held in Saudi Arabia last month under the auspices of King Khaled, especially those relating to Palestine and Jerusalem. It called on Islamic states to let Koranic law govern all aspects of their daily life.

The council said it watched with great pain the bloody war between Iraq and Iran in which the continuation is having an adverse effect not only on the antagonists themselves, but also on world peace and economy. It urged the leaders of both countries to care for their own people and the Islamic world as a whole and put an end to the bloodshed. It urged leaders of other Islamic countries to redouble their efforts to reconcile the two

brothers." The council decided in particular to address a cable to Habib Chatti, secretary general of the 42-nation Organization of the Islamic Conference, and ask him to convey the council's desire to members of the committee set up at the third Islamic summit to try to reconcile the two warring parties.

Moreover, the council sent a cable to King Khaled and Crown Prince Fahd to express gratitude for Saudi Arabia's constant assistance for the construction and renovation of

mosques throughout the world.

As the meeting of the World Supreme Council of Mosques ended Wednesday evening, another conference was inaugurated at the headquarters of the Muslim World League here. Deputy Governor of Mecca, Prince Saud ibn Abdul Mohsen, on behalf of King Khaled, opened the fourth session of the board of the Islamic Fiq'h (Jurisprudence) Academy. He said that no secular system on earth could understand and

respond to human needs as much as Islam. Therefore, he said, Muslims today need than ever to know everything about their religion which caters for every aspect of their daily life.

The Islamic Jurisprudence Academy was set up in 1964 by a resolution of a conference held at the league. It comprises religious scholars from around the world who issue rulings on legal questions regarding Islamic affairs. Its first session was opened three years ago, and members have met three times to date.

In his message read out by Prince Saud, King Khaled said that he emphasized in his speech at the third Islamic summit the Islamic world's need for such an academy. The same thing was stressed in the conference's final declaration.

On pilgrimage problems

Nazer to open seminar

JEDDAH, Feb. 13 — Planning Minister Sheikh Hisham Nazer will open a two-day seminar Tuesday sponsored by his ministry on transport problems in the holy places during pilgrimage season.

Communications experts and officials concerned with pilgrimage will consider methods

to ease transportation from one holy place to another. They also will consider density of pilgrim concentration in Mecca, Jeddah and Medina.

In addition, the Central Pilgrimage Committee will meet here Sunday under Deputy Governor of Mecca Prince Saud ibn Abdul Mohsen to seek alternatives for tents and other issues connected with pilgrimage arrangements.

A specialized firm had been contracted by the Planning Ministry to prepare a comprehensive study on transport problems among holy places in Saudi Arabia. Tuesday's agenda includes a summary of the study; the linking of the inner transport network at the holy places with the Kingdom's general transport network, a background complete with statistics about pilgrimage over the past ten years, statistical provisions for the coming two decades, problems and solutions for transport among the holy places, transport to and from the holy places and factors affecting transport during the pilgrimage season, such as housing, public utilities and health.

In a separate development, planning Undersecretary Dr. Faisal Al-Bashir said Wednesday that Saudi Arabia has seven universities and that 15,000 students are studying abroad. He was addressing a seminar organized by the British Industrial Association and attended by 300 British businessmen. He highlighted Saudi Arabia's efforts to build a materially and socially advanced society without departing from Islamic tenets. He said the Saudi government's backing of private enterprise was confined to housing and industrial development loans.

Holland official arrives

RIYADH, Feb. 13 (SPA) — Holland's Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, Dr. G.J.M. Braks, arrived here Friday on a six-day visit to Saudi Arabia at the invitation of Dr. Abdul Rahman Al-Sheikh, minister of agriculture and water, to discuss cooperation in the various agricultural fields.

The Dutch minister will be accompanied by 35 officials and businessmen concerned with agriculture, who will confer with a large number of Saudi Arabian officials.

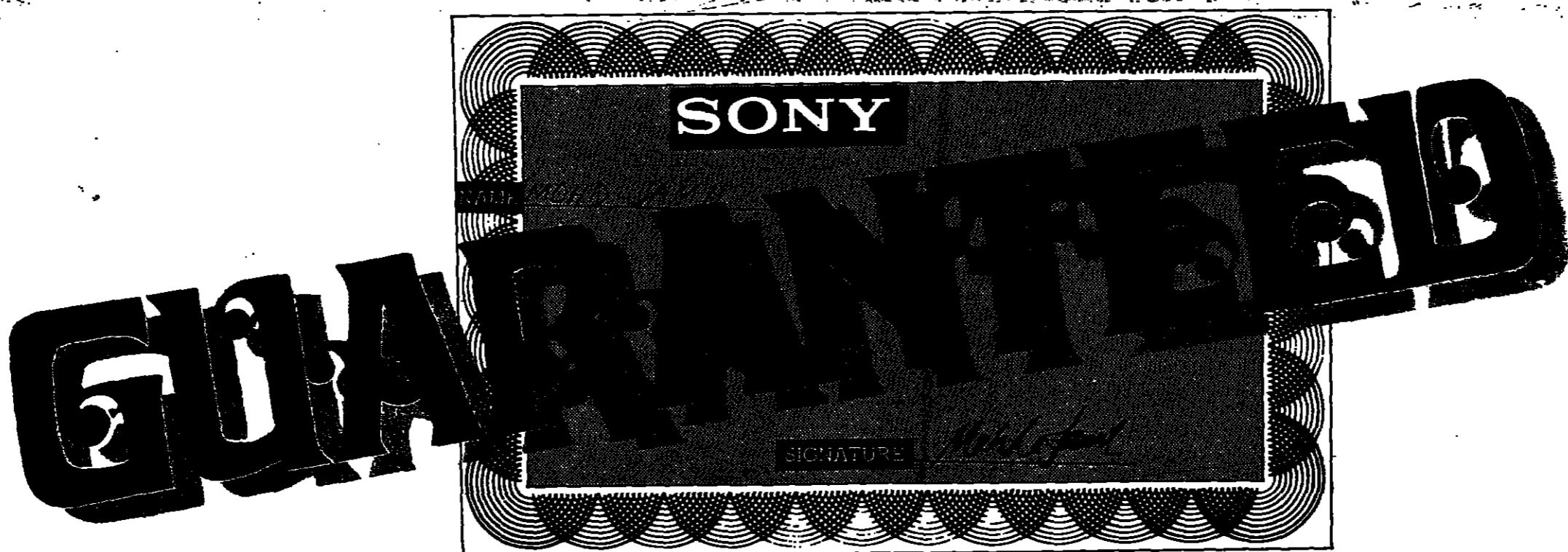

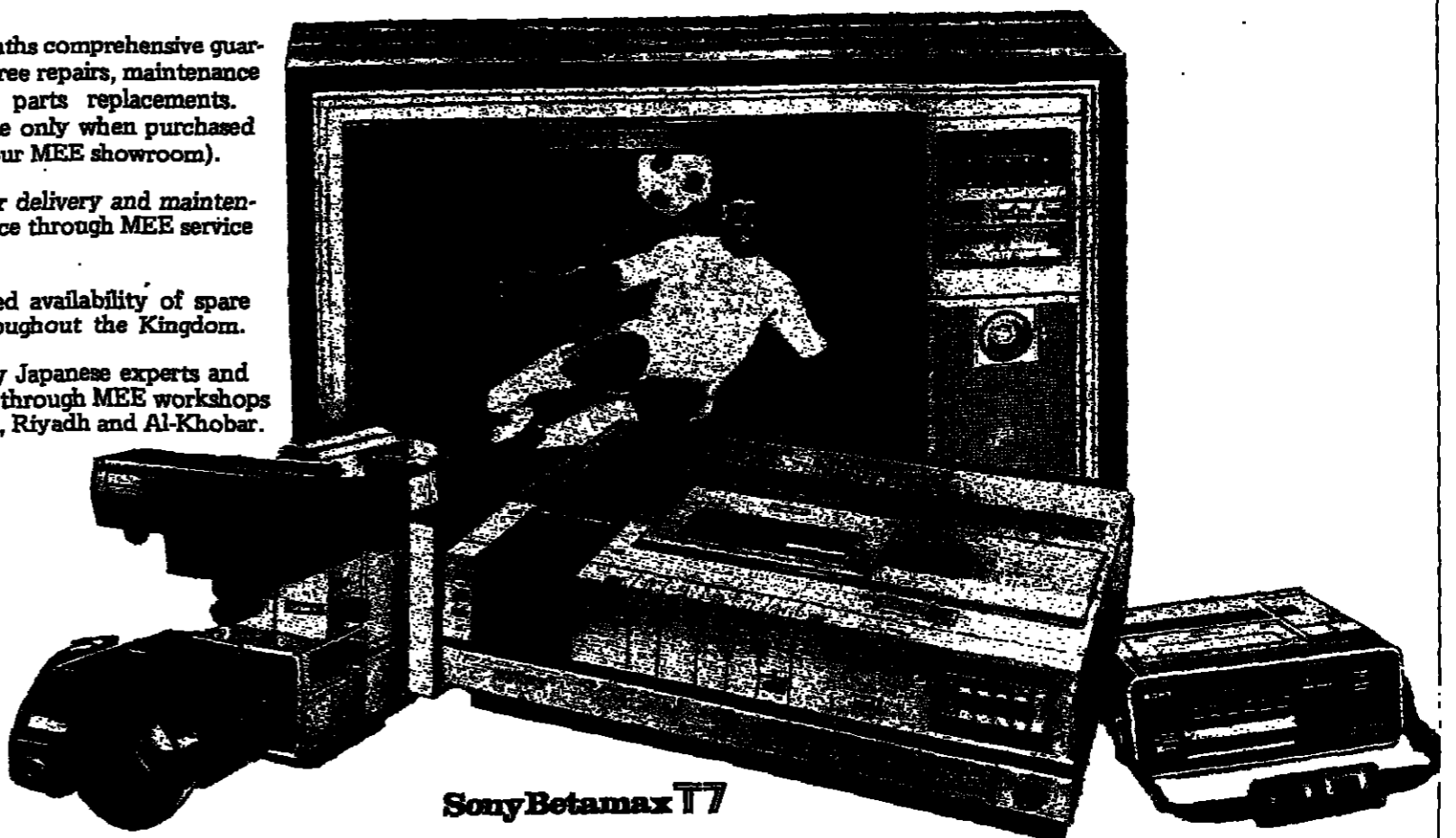

'Unhelpful to peace process'

America criticizes Israeli settlements

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — Any move by Israel to expand Jewish settlements on the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River endangers the peace process and "can only harm prospects for negotiations," the Reagan administration has said. William Dyess, the chief State Department spokesman, said the administration is "deeply concerned" by reports that Israel is closing off large tracts of land on the West Bank for new settlements.

"Such unilateral acts tend to prejudice an issue which must be addressed through negotiations," Dyess said. "As such, they are unhelpful to the peace process and ill-advised."

In the new administration's strongest criticism to date of Israel's settlements policy.

Klaauw confers with Klibi

THE HAGUE, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — The latest phase of the European Economic Community's attempt to promote a Middle East peace settlement was launched Thursday when Dutch Foreign Minister Christoph Van der Klaauw met Arab League Secretary General Chadli Klibi. A Dutch Foreign Ministry spokesman said the one-day talks effectively marked the start of a mission with which Klaauw, as current president of the EEC Council of Ministers, was entrusted by his EEC colleagues last month.

Dyess told reporters that "both the president and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. have indicated that the continued creation of settlements can only harm the prospects for negotiations" over the future of the West Bank.

Meanwhile, American banker David Rockefeller Thursday surveyed the expanding new Jewish settlements high on a hill in the West Bank.

Rockefeller, chairman of the Chase Manhattan Bank, heard Israel's hard line Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon expound his dream of a big Jewish city rising in the Middle of Arab land.

Asked by Reuter whether his visit to the Jewish settlements had any business purpose, Rockefeller replied: "Absolutely not."

France, Egypt sign nuclear agreement

PARIS, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — France and Egypt have signed a nuclear cooperation agreement under which France will provide the Egyptians with nuclear power generating stations and the necessary fuel and technology to operate them.

French Foreign Minister Jean Francois-Poncet said after the signing ceremony Thursday that details of the cooperation agreement still had to be worked out. He said the accord provided for a maximum capacity of 2,000 megawatts to be furnished by France.

Egyptian Foreign Minister Kamal Hassan Ali said the deal with the French was part of Egypt's overall plan to use atomic power for peaceful purposes.

The agreement was signed on the second day of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's three-day visit to France. Sources in the Egyptian delegation said that the Cairo government was expected to sign a similar agreement soon with the United States that would involve three nuclear generating stations.

U.N. panel condemns Israel's Jerusalem move

GENEVA, Feb. 13 (AP) — The United Nations Human Rights Commission has voted 31-3 to condemn Israel's proclamation of Jerusalem as the capital of the Jewish state and to declare the decision "null and void." The United States, Canada and Australia cast the sole dissenting ballots.

LAGOS (AFP) — A proposed summit in N'Djamena between the leaders of Nigeria, Libya and Chad seemed certain to be delayed Thursday as the Lagos government awaited the return here of a fact-finding mission sent to Tripoli to obtain certain information in advance of the conference.

TOKYO, (AP) — North Korea and Lebanon have established diplomatic relations at ambassadorial level, the official North Korean Central News Agency announced Friday.

Syria, Jordan continue war of words

BEIRUT, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — Syria and Jordan maintained a bitter propaganda war against each other Friday but stopped short of any move to sever relations. A simmering dispute between the two reached a critical point this week when they withdrew from a joint border post and recalled their respective ambassadors.

But despite a steady stream of accusations between the two, the border remained open

and their embassies in each other's capitals continued to function. Syrian and Jordanian officials said they had set up separate border security posts on the main-Damascus-Amman highway and eyewitnesses said "traffic was still flowing in both directions."

The long-running conflict deepened last week after a senior Jordanian diplomat was kidnapped in neighboring Lebanon and a Syrian assassination squad was said to have

been arrested in Jordan. At the United Nations, Secretary General Kurt Waldheim, through his spokesman, Francois Giuliani made a public appeal Thursday for release of the kidnapped diplomat.

"The secretary-general appeals to those responsible to release the charge d'affaires unharmed. It is essential that diplomatic personnel be permitted to perform their duties free from threats," he added.

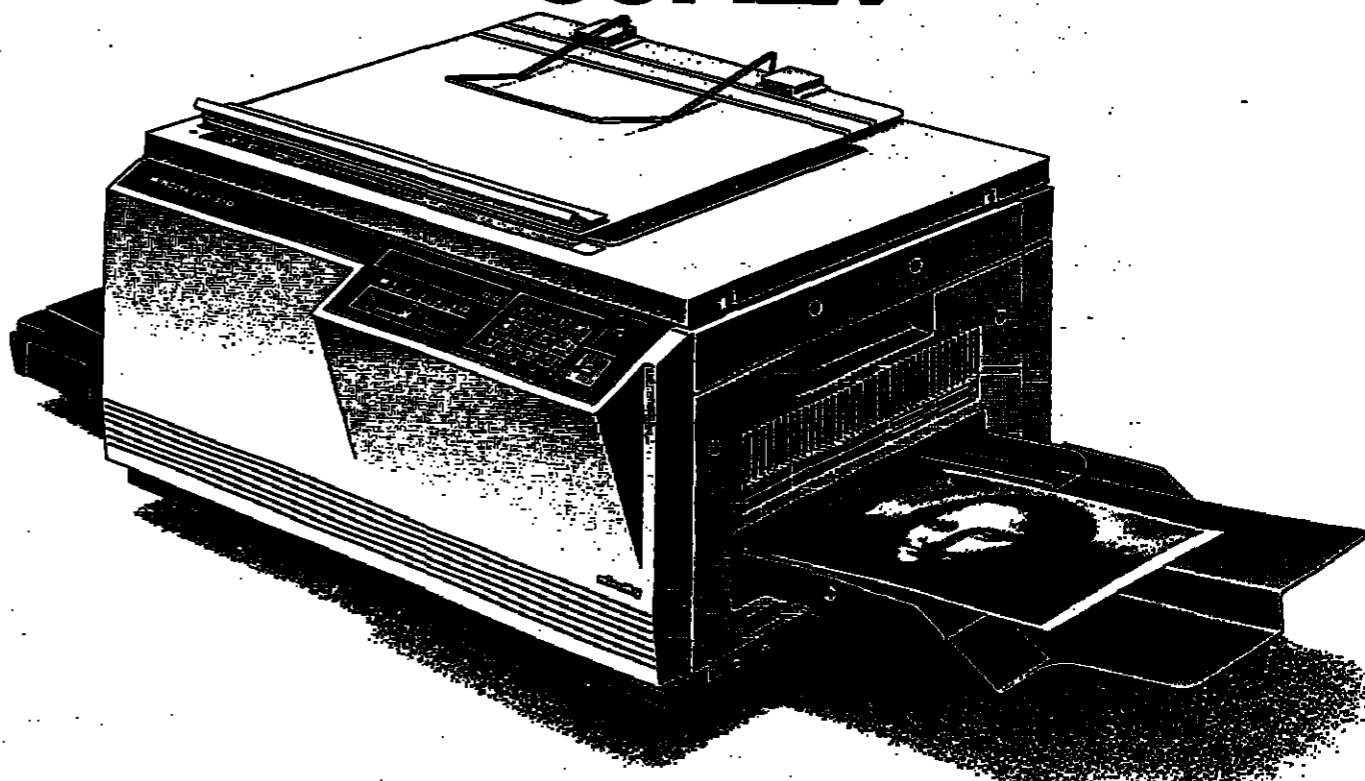

Wood: The fuel of the future

LONDON, (ONS) — The fuel of the future will be wood, according to a study published in Washington.

In the United States, wood is a major source of energy, but nuclear power, which has grown more rapidly in the past decade than any other fuel. The report estimates that its use could grow five-fold by the end of the century.

In Ireland, trees have already been planted on worked-out peat bogs, and power stations are to be converted to burn wood. Experts believe that wood and other crops grown liberally as energy sources (and known collectively as 'biomass') could provide up to a quarter of all Ireland's energy demand.

The dramatic recovery of wood-burning as an oil prices went through the roof is fuelled by sales of stoves designed to be fuelled by wood. In the United States sales are up on 200,000 units in 1972 to a peak of 1.5 billion in 1979. In 1980 demand fell back, as people waited to see if Congress would pass legislation allowing tax credits for buyers of wood stoves.

Growth in Britain has not matched that of the United States because of the ready availability of gas at reasonable prices and a shortage of forests. But worldwide consumption of wood as a fuel is expected to double by the end of the century, according to Nigel Smith, senior researcher at the Worldwatch Institute and author of the report.

At present, he says, a lot of wood is simply used by loggers and sawmills. When trees are felled for timber or paper, a third of the wood is left behind as the trunk is dragged away. Every year 170 million tons of bark, branches and twigs are left strewn on the ground in the United States.

While most of the growth in wood burning has been in the home, industry is also turning to wood. Machines have been developed that shred trees and waste wood into

matchbox-sized chips, which are easier to transport and handle.

Two power stations in Burlington, Vermont, have been converted to run on wood chips with such good results that a large 50 MW power station is now being built. It will burn such a million tons of wood chips a year, generating electricity 20 per cent cheaper than a coal-fired plant of the same size.

In the Third World, wood has never been displaced as a source of fuel, though supplies are now becoming a serious problem. Tree planting should be increased five-fold, Smith says, in order to supply sufficient fuel to meet growing demands, particularly in poorer countries.

More efficient wood stoves for use in the developing countries could also help. An open fire with a pot suspended over it is only 6 to 8 per cent efficient. The woodstoves can

achieve efficiencies of 80 per cent. Such well-made stoves are far too expensive for the Third World, unfortunately.

The Irish program, partly financed by the EEC, involves 1,000 acres planted with conifers and farmland will be 'topped' in traditional fashion — simply chopped off, leaving a stump which will produce new sprouts to grow and provide the next harvest, four years later.

Wood can even be used to provide a liquid fuel — methanol, or wood alcohol.

The technology is well known, and Smith estimates that a gallon of methanol produced from wood could be retailed for between \$1.50 and \$2.00 a gallon. Since methanol contains about half as much energy value as petrol, it might be able to compete with petrol at \$3 to \$4 a gallon — a price much of the world, though not the United States, is already paying.

Scientist dismiss forecasts on jets

WASHINGTON (LAT) — Remember the catastrophes scientists predicted 10 years ago if supersonic jet engines were built?

A "greenhouse" effect would raise temperatures around the globe, they said. Radio communications would be disrupted. More people would get skin cancer as jet exhausts depleted the stratosphere's ozone layer and allowed more ultraviolet rays from the sun to penetrate the atmosphere.

All of these forecasts were used effectively by congressional opponents to kill the government-sponsored Supersonic Transport (SST) project in 1971 after \$1 billion had been spent.

They were all wrong, according to scientists who have taken a retrospective look at the once-bitter controversy.

"But the decision to cancel that program was right, even if for the wrong reasons," according to Dr. Jack A. Suddreth, manager

of supersonic cruise research for NASA. He said the SST would have been uneconomical and would have created intolerable noise problems.

Suddreth said however, that technological advances in noise control and changes in airline economic conditions since 1971 could make an American SST attractive.

Reflecting this attitude, a recent study by Congress's office of technology assessment recommended that the nation step up its research on the SST so it can reach a decision on building the plane later in this decade, if conditions warrant.

In the most critical issue of the 1971 SST debate — that involving the ozone layer — the initial predictions actually were reversed. A thinning of the ozone layer was first forecast, but later studies showed that the SST exhausts instead actually would increase the amount of ozone overhead.

"The past mistakes in the SST controversy won't be repeated," Dr. Harold S. Johnston of the University of California, Berkeley, told a recent "10 years later" meeting in Toronto of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Johnston presented a paper in 1971 and engaged in other activities that drew worldwide attention to the alleged ozone-cancer link put forward by the late University of Arizona scientist James E. McDonald.

"This may seem like a comedy of errors," Johnston said, referring to the flip-flops in predicted ozone effects from SST gases. But the earlier predictions "were the result of honest efforts by dedicated scientists" attempting to estimate the risks arising from technological developments, he said.

The honesty of those efforts were challenged, however, by Dr. Hugh Ellisasser of Lawrence Livermore Laboratory in Livermore, California.

"Observational evidence that ran counter to theory was suppressed," he contended. "Johnston's paper (of 1971) had discrepancies."

Malaria vaccine breakthrough

LONDON, (ONS) — A substance essential for the production of an effective vaccine against malaria has been found and tested successfully at the University of Hawaii, according to a report published by *Nature*, the authoritative British science journal.

The use of the adjuvant, identified as CP20-961, opens the door to collaboration by many scientific institutions working toward the same objective under the United

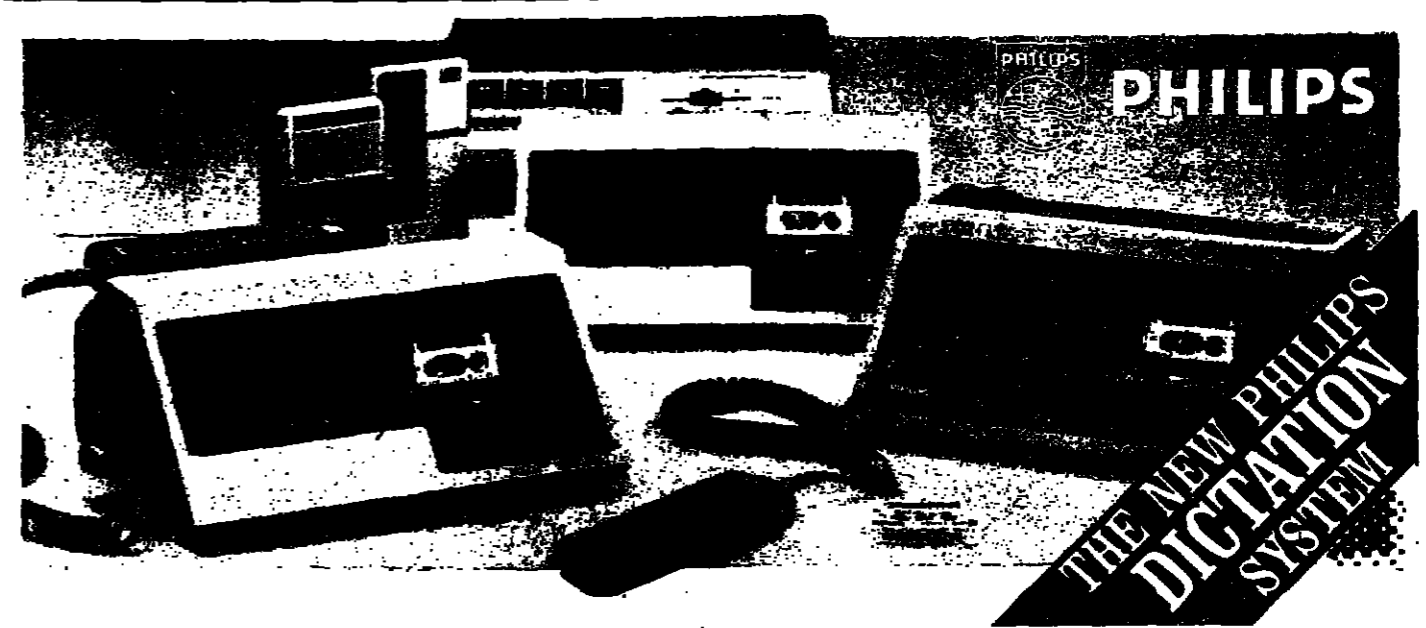
Nations' global research program run by the World Health Organization in Geneva.

Malaria directly threatens a billion people; and it kills several millions of its victims every year, most of them in Africa and Asia. It is also an economically significant disease problem because the debilitating illness reduces labor productivity by a quarter in areas where it is endemic, and claims more than a third of the total health budgets of many countries.

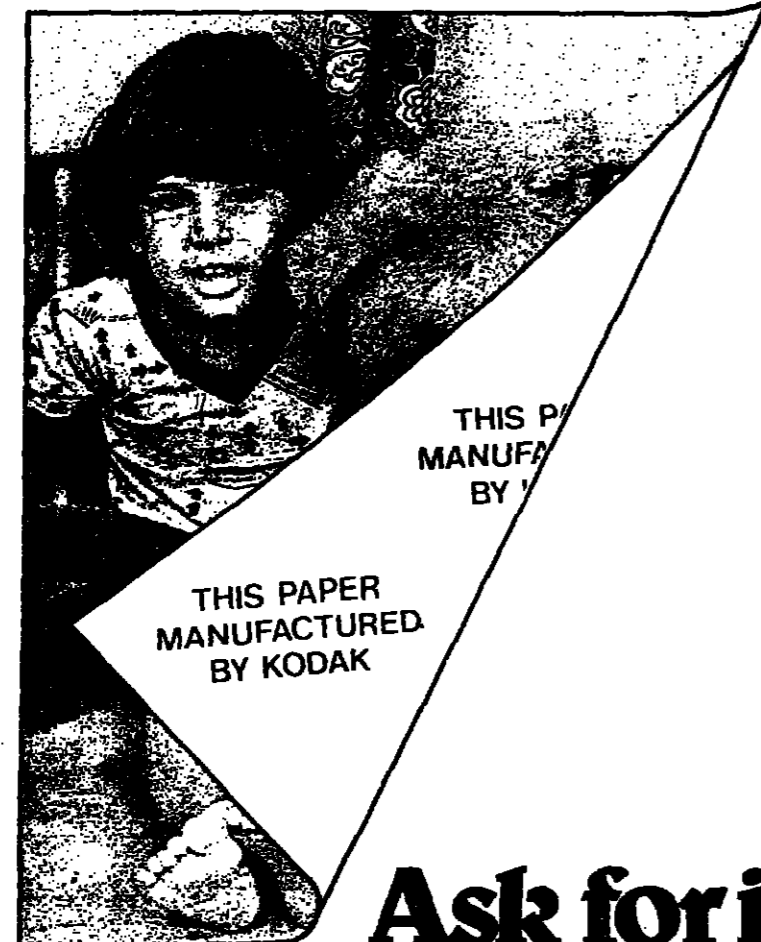

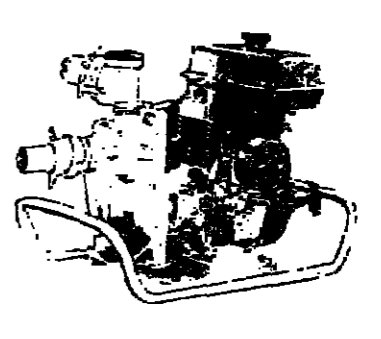

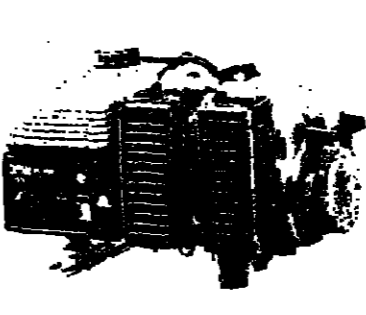

Egypt impatient for U.S. arms

CAIRO —

The arrival here this month of American-made M60 tanks is expected to quell the uneasiness reportedly felt by some Egyptian army officers who question the value of buying their military hardware from the United States. The tanks, the first of 250 ordered, are part of a \$3.5 billion aid package agreed more than a year ago, but which has been implemented slowly because of the Americans' need to meet the needs of their own forces as well as those of their allies abroad.

In addition to the tanks Egypt is also due to receive more than 75 fighter aircraft, including Phantoms and F16s, 1,200 armored personnel carriers (APCs) and 11 batteries of Hawk surface-to-air missiles.

The Egyptian Defense Ministry has in the past bought its weapons almost exclusively from the Soviet Union. During the honeymoon years between Cairo and Moscow the Russians supplied Egypt with 2,500 tanks, more than 1,000 APCs, hundreds of field artillery guns and 300 warplanes. President Sadat's abrupt break with the Kremlin in 1976 led to a slowdown in the arrival of Russian military spares for the Egyptian forces. A subsequent decision in 1978 to start purchasing arms from the United States was accordingly welcomed by all ranks in the armed forces who saw no other way of maintaining their operational efficiency.

Since then some of the enthusiasm for all things American has noticeably waned. One reason lies in the allegations made last year that new batches of American trained officers were being promoted more rapidly than older, Russian-trained ones. Another reason has been the impatience felt by younger officers with the slow rate of arrival of their American equipment.

It was in response to this feeling of impatience that the Carter administration last year acted to speed up the delivery of 35 Phantoms to the Egyptian Air Force. Since no Phantoms were readily available for export at the time, the planes were taken away from a serving United States Air Force unit and sent on to Egypt.

The Americans are concerned that there may be a residual feeling still within the Egyptian officer corps that the United States should simply step in with military aid where the Soviet Union left off by flooding Egypt with all kinds of weapons. For reasons of both cost and strategy, however, such a development is considered unlikely. For one thing, the cost of producing weapons has soared in the past 10 years. For another, as Americans in Cairo point out, Egypt is no longer in a state of confrontation with Israel and therefore does not need the kind of military transfusions it was given in the past by the Soviet Union.

The Americans say Egypt must wait in the queue for its remaining weaponry. They also point out that, unlike the Soviet Union, military equipment in the United States is produced on a commercial basis with long lead times for research, development and production in the factories of private companies.

Although in exceptional cases some arms deliveries can be speeded up, especially if the arms are already in service with United States forces, the room for maneuver is very limited. Short of returning cap in hand to the Russians, a political impossibility, there is not much the Egyptians can do except wait and hope for the best. One possible option is to look to Western countries other than the United States for arms purchases.

The disadvantage here is that none of the major European arms exporters can match the easy credit terms offered by the Americans. Nevertheless, the Egyptians have bought some frigates from Britain and they are considering the purchase of at least one surface-to-air missile system from either France or Britain. Agreement is also reportedly near for manufacturing under license in Egypt the French Alpha jet trainer aircraft.

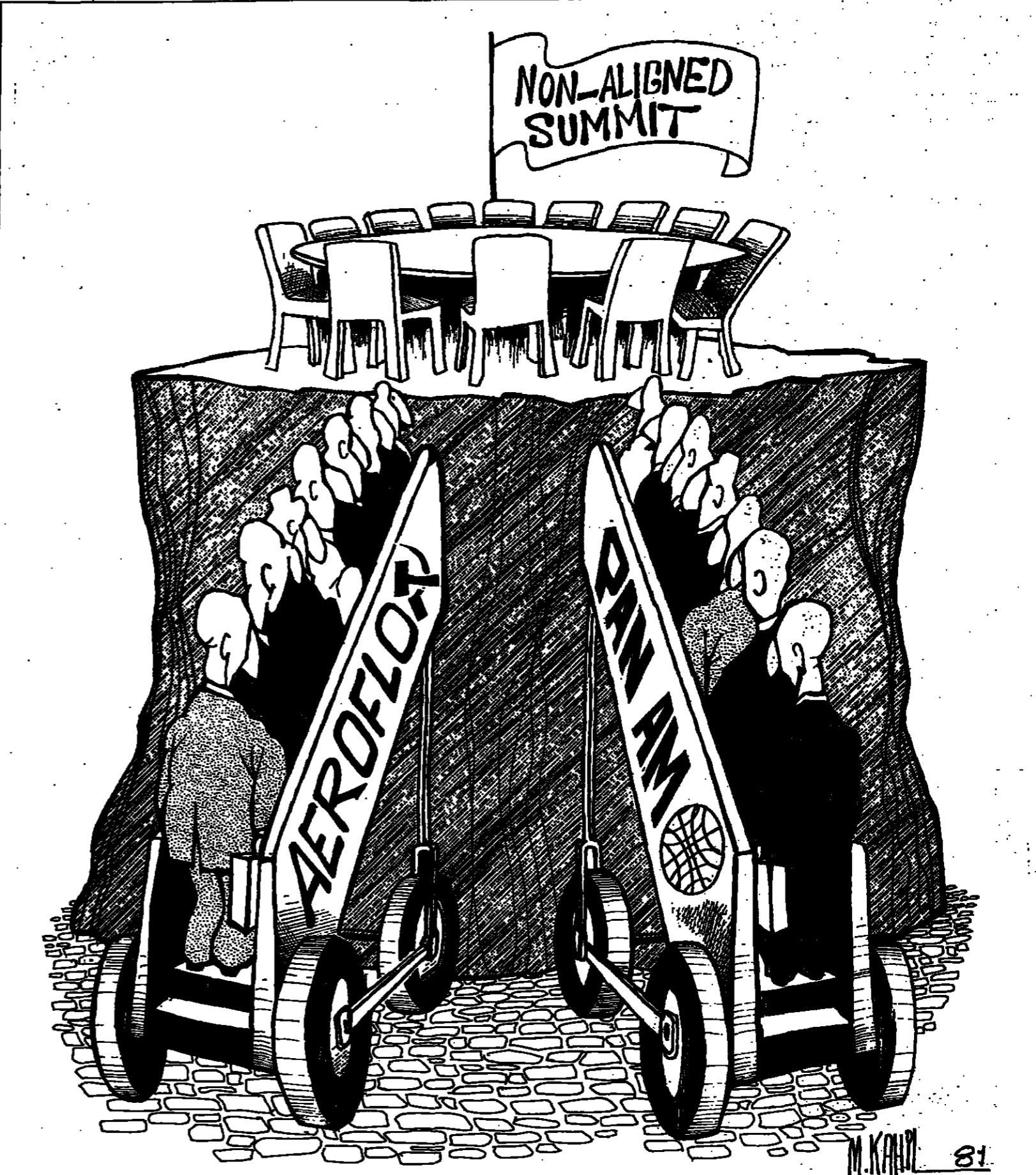

The demise of nonalignment

LONDON —

Foreign ministers of the nonaligned countries are meeting in New Delhi to review developments since the 1979 Nonaligned Summit in Havana and start preparations for 1982 summit in Baghdad. The New Delhi meeting marks the 20th anniversary of the nonaligned movement, which was born in Belgrade in 1961 at a meeting attended by President Tito of Yugoslavia, Prime Minister Nehru of India, President Nasser of Egypt and President Sukarno of Indonesia.

Nonalignment was based on nonmembership of superpower alliances and peaceful coexistence with states with different political and economic systems. Support for national liberation movements and decolonization were major criteria for membership. The movement has grown in membership — from 25 members in 1961 to 95 in 1981 — but decline in importance. Since 1961 its summits have become more pompous and noisy and the discrepancies grew between the rhetoric of the nonaligned leaders and their actions.

In many cases colonial oppression and exploitation were replaced by appalling tyranny and economic chaos. The cruelties of the regimes of Pol Pot in Kampuchea and Macias Nguema in Equator-

Guinea, to name only a few, equalled if not exceeded colonial atrocities.

In a dozen Latin American countries "violation of human rights appears to be a permanent feature of government policy in dealing with citizens," according to the 1980 Report of Amnesty International.

On the "strengthening of peace and security" front, moreover, Iran is now at war with Iraq and Ethiopia with Somalia. Civil war rages in Lebanon, San Salvador and Kampuchea. Morocco conducts a colonial war in West Sahara. Ethiopia wages a war of attrition against the people of Eritrea and Indonesia against the people of East Timor. The preference of Iran and Iraq for the mediation efforts of Sweden's Olof Palme rather than of the "Goodwill Committee of the Nonaligned Countries" is an indication of the skepticism of nonaligned countries toward their own councils.

This is partly because the nonaligned movement now has no leader of great international stature and prestige. Fidel Castro, the current chairman of the movement, lost his credibility by supporting the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. Josip Broz Tito of Yugoslavia, who preserved a semblance of nonaligned unity at the Havana summit, died last May.

U.S. set for huge arms spending spree

LOS ANGELES —

As President Ronald Reagan assumed power last month, America's defense contractors are rubbing their hands at the prospect of a huge arms spending spree by the new administration. After four years with Jimmy Carter, virtually every segment of the U.S. military-industrial complex is gearing up. Nowhere is the post-inaugural euphoria

higher than in California, where aerospace firms traditionally capture some 30 per cent of the defense budget.

Under Reagan, that could top \$200 billion this year, a \$15 billion increase over Carter's projected spending of \$184.4 billion. "The president knows the nation is low on everything from bullets to battle-cruisers," beamed a top executive at the Los Angeles-based Litton Industries last month. "Our expectation is that he'll increase every item in the inventory."

Litton's own great expectation is a contract to build all 24 new cruisers called for under the navy's Aegis program, the largest surface ship project in eight years.

For Reagan, nothing outranks in importance this beefing-up of American military might. It was a main topic at meetings with his Californian "kitchen cabinet" and business cronies here before his departure for Washington.

No one knows what the ultimate price tag on the build-up will be, but given the Republican-dominated Senate and a prodigious Congress, experts are talking of an additional \$200 billion over current projections of \$1 trillion over the next five years to "revitalize" the U.S. military. The Reagan blueprint calls for a worldwide expansion of competition with the Russians, with special emphasis on the Indian Ocean and protection of Western access to Middle East oil.

At the top of the commander-in-chief's shopping list is a long-range bomber of the type scrapped by Carter in 1977. The B-1 is heavily tipped for a revival. "We make a great multirole bomber," boasts Rockwell International in full-page ads in the current aviator journals, "... always have."

But the bomber project has split Reagan's military advisers. Hard-line "Reaganauts" are pushing for an initial order of 100 updated B-1s, employing the new anti-radar "stealth" technology, while new Defense Secretary Gaspar Weinberger is looking at "quicker" alternatives to the controversial plane. For Rockwell, a B-1 comeback means a \$12 billion contract, for California at least 14,000 aerospace jobs.

Next in priority comes the navy. The Reagan

India's Premier Indira Gandhi, who aspired to taking over Tito's influence in the movement, dis-qualified herself last May by signing a \$1.6 billion arms deal with the Soviet Union which drew India into the Soviet embrace. India is not the only member which broke the basic rule of nonalignment by establishing close military ties with a superpower. Egypt agreed to provide air bases for the United States Air Force and Somalia is likely to join it by offering port facilities to the U.S. Navy.

U.S. military support for Pakistan and most Latin American countries and Soviet support for Ethiopia, South Yemen, Syria and Vietnam cast serious doubts about the nonaligned character of these countries.

Apart from the predictable fireworks about Egypt's peace treaty with Israel, the New Delhi meeting is dominated by economic problems. All recent nonaligned meetings have assailed exploitation of the poor Third World by the rich West.

There is another aspect of world poverty which is never mentioned at nonaligned conferences. According to 1980 World Development Report, the income of 40 per cent of the poorest people in six out of 15 selected developing countries was below 10 per cent of the national average. This is the case in Malaysia, Mexico, Venezuela, Honduras, Peru and Brazil.

NEW MEDIATION NEEDED

Once again, relations between Jordan and Syria deteriorate to the point of crisis. This time round, reports have it that the tension started with the arrest in Amman of a ranking Syria officer who, it was claimed, headed a team of gunmen sent to assassinate Jordan's prime minister.

A few days after that, the Jordanian charge d'affaires in Beirut was kidnapped. Syria denied any involvement, and rejected all Jordanian calls for the release of the diplomat. There are however reports, still to be substantiated, of behind-the-scenes negotiations to arrange for a swap. It is not known who is acting as mediator.

The crisis between the two countries has already resulted in travel restrictions across their borders. It already recalls the time, toward the end of last year and just before the Amman summit, when they appeared to mobilize against each other.

That time, the worst of the crisis was averted as Saudi Arabia's Prince Abdullah intervened to work out an acceptable settlement. The armies were withdrawn, and the two sides seemed ready to patch up their differences or at least freeze them for the time being.

What is needed now is a new mediation effort, since the tension between the two countries serves no interest but that of the enemies of the Arab nation as a whole. The two countries, both of them facing the Israelis across their borders, ought to have that as their first priority.

Saudi Arabian Press Review

Weekend newspapers led with King Khaled's advice to Muslims to study and understand their faith in order to cope with their problems. The advice was contained in a message read by Mecca Deputy Governor Prince Saud bin Abdul Mohsin while inaugurating the fourth session of the council of the Academy of Islamic Jurisprudence in Mecca Wednesday. They also gave lead prominence to a statement by Riyadh Governor Prince Salman, in which he confirmed that King Khaled and Crown Prince Fahd were pursuing the projects of Der'eyyah with great concern and interest. The reported escalation of Syrian-Jordanian conflict formed the headline story in *Al Medina* while *Al Jazirah* said in lead story that Arab League Secretary General Chadi Klibi received an unprecedented welcome in Holland.

Newspaper editorials commented on the formation of the Gulf Cooperation Council and the meetings of the Academy of Islamic Jurisprudence with a special reference to the King's message. Some papers also dealt with the Middle East issue and Europe's stance on it, urging the European ministerial council and the parliament to clarify what Europe should adopt as a collective policy to improve the future of the region.

Discussing Gulf cooperation, *Al Jazirah* reiterated that the council would work for regional cooperation and would not be directed against anyone. It said the council would provide a substantial economic and political force that would help to consolidate world peace and security.

On the same subject, *Al Bilad* noted that the six Arab states of the Gulf have adopted a realistic attitude, in order to be able to confront the challenges which are intended to hamper the progress of the peoples of the region. Their decision to form a cooperation council reflects their confidence in their unity and similar culture and heritage, said the paper, adding that the Gulf states possess enormous potentialities to serve the peoples of the region. The paper also said the council, with all its economic dimensions, would provide a significant base for political, diplomatic and military moves to enable the region to play its constructive role in confronting the hostile challenges.

Commenting on the meetings of the Academy of Islamic Jurisprudence, *Al Riyadh* said Islam, with all its spiritual force, is capable of helping improve the human society at the present stage. It added that the meeting is being held to fulfil a great need being felt by the Islamic states toward the improvement of their situation.

On the same subject, *Okaz* gave prominence to King Khaled's message in which he stressed the need for Muslims to study and understand their faith to be able to cope with their present problems. The paper reaffirmed that, amidst the machinations of the communist and colonialist forces in the world, it becomes imperative on the Islamic nation to unite and to strive to safeguard its entity and faith from all challenges.

Dealing with the European stance on the Middle East issue, *Al Jazirah* noted that the European bloc has already expressed its faith in justice of Palestinian

rights and demands. It said the whole world has now understood that Israel's strategy is to perpetuate its occupation of Arab lands and to continue to mislead world public opinion. Israel is only trying to jeopardize European efforts toward finding a peaceful and equitable solution to the Palestine problem, it said, adding that Israel does not want the European bloc to go beyond the Israeli concept of justice, morality, legality and historic essence of the Arab-Israeli conflict.

Al Medina and *Al Yam*, showed concern with the kidnapping of the Jordanian diplomat in Beirut last week, and said the Arabs ought to feel duty-bound to intervene and to see that such incidents do not reoccur as they would leave their negative impact on Arab and Islamic action against the hostile forces. They expressed the hope that Arabs would devote themselves to achieving the just and legitimate rights of the nation.

In an editorial on the non-alignment movement, *Okaz* noted that the movement's activity is far from its principles owing to hassles now plaguing the member states, as well as the Soviet Union's attempt to influence those states with its own principles and dogmas. The paper held the view that if the movement was strong, as it used to be earlier, it would not have stood silently in the face of events now taking place in Afghanistan as a result of Soviet occupation of that country. It urged the movement to rearrange its set-up, in order to be able to subdue all maneuvers being made by the Soviet-backed forces against the non-alignment movement.

Travel together

Desert camping in the Kingdom

JEDDAH — Desert camping is a favorite pastime in Saudi Arabia. But too often unwitting adventures don't realize the hidden dangers involved.

under the heading of "General Precautions" it notes that many places of interest in Saudi Arabia are fortunately now served with good tarmac roads.

Only four-wheel vehicles are suitable for the cross-country driving in Saudi Arabia, particularly for stretches of soft sand.

TOOLS TO TAKE: Tyre changing kit (jack, lug wrench); tyre pump, preferably hand (if an airline type of pump which can be connected to one of the sparking plug holes is available as an addition, so much the better); pliers; large and small crescent wrenches; two open-end wrenches of proper size to fit fuel line connections and fuel pump, screw drivers; low tyre pressure gauge; insulating tape; small tin lubricating oil and tin of bolt loosening liquid; short "D" handle shovel; tow rope — 50 feet of 1 inch rope.

SPARES TO TAKE: Fan belts; timing

belt; hoses; fuel pump; carburettor; distributor; tyre (preferably two). Tubes should always be inserted in the tubeless type of tyre and a spare tube and repair kit carried.

Other necessary items: Fire extinguisher — dry chemical or CO2; first aid kit in each vehicle; sand tracks — two pieces of canvas about 12 inches wide, 8 feet long. Fuel: take at least one spare jerrycan as fuel consumption is high in a four-wheel drive.

WARNINGS: Even if you are travelling in a party a reliable friend staying behind should be told of your estimated time of return so that if you are excessively overdue, the authorities can be warned.

Water is vital. A moderately active man will drink from five to 10 quarts of liquid a day when the temperature is about 40 degrees C. Even sitting in the shade at this temperature can lead to perspiration of 4/5 pint of water per hour; walking in the sun a man would probably lose about one quart (half a litre) per hour.

Each vehicle should carry a minimum of four gallons of water per person per day, plus a day's reserve. Allow sufficient water as well for the vehicle cooling system (if a bottom hose goes it will need completely refilling). Always take the opportunity to top up water reserves. Try to keep drinking water separate — unknown water should be boiled for one minute. Be aware of drinking radiator water — diesel vehicles in particular will have corrosion inhibitor systems installed. Use a fun-

nel to avoid spillage.

SALT: This is an essential "food" in the desert. The best way to take it is in water although some people can tolerate it in tablet form. If taken in water you should be able to taste it; if you cannot, you need more. Children will probably find salt more palatable if dissolved in one of the powder base fruit drinks. Food: Canned is best, both to avoid spoilage in the heat and food poisoning.

DRESS: Always make sure you dress properly. Don't forget the desert can be both hot and cold. During the day: head covering, dark glasses, shirt, trousers (not shorts), woollen socks (better than cotton), desert boots, gym, shoes or hockey boots. Never allow children to run barefoot.

MAPS: If a good large-scale map of the Kingdom is not available a standard road map is better than nothing. Find out as much as possible about your route beforehand. Leave a record of it with a friend.

DESERT DRIVING: Don't attempt it in the wrong vehicle. For sand, deflate tyres until they show a slight bulge while standing on hard ground. Do not over deflate, check with pressure gauge for even pressure on all tyres.

EMERGENCY: Once you realize you are lost, stop, don't panic! If you go on you may make yourself more difficult to find. If you park on high ground it will be easier to spot you. If stuck, don't panic! Don't overwork or

overheat yourself. It is better to take many hours to work your way out of a situation slowly than to try and do it in a hurry. If you are stuck in soft sand, dig sand from all contact with the belly of the vehicle using your shovel or short wooden plank — there is no point in just removing sand from around the wheels.

If you are forced to remain overnight, build a fire for signal purposes and wait for

someone to come. Don't expect a search party after night fall except in the case of a known emergency.

Do not leave your vehicle. Use shade of vehicle during the day. Wait until the cool of the evening to dig yourself out or to attempt strenuous repairs of your vehicle. Keep your body covered as clothing holds moisture and aids body cooling. Survival is basically a matter of conserving body water. Keep cool men-

tally and physically. If you have plenty of water, keep children cool by soaking clothing. Make signals! By day, flash mirrors; by night, fire (also good for morale). A tyre soaked in petrol burns for a long time, makes a lot of smoke and provides a good signal. Just remember, you can survive in the desert and the chances are that bedouin will soon find you, probably before an organized search.

CAMPING GEAR: Since comfort is very much a matter of personal priorities, there is no point in detailing a long list of elaborate gear. One or two items are basic however, such as bedding of some sort (camp beds and sleeping bags), cooking kit (don't forget the matches!) and lighting (lamp and hand torches).

Prepare a list before your trip; add to it when you return those items you forgot for future trips. A sample check list is as follows: Clothing: trousers, socks, gym shoes/hockey boots, sun hat, warm hat (for night); pullovers/anoraks, sunspec. Toiletries: sun cream, moisturising cream, insect repellent, towel, flannel, toothpaste, toothbrush, shaving kit, toilet paper, tissues.

Deputies to meet Feb. 25

Chun wins South Korean poll

SEOUL, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — South Korean President Chun Doo-Hwan's Democratic Justice Party (DJP) won 3,676 seats in the 5,278-member presidential electoral college election, according to the final returns, assuming Chun of a new seven-year term. The major opposition Democratic Korea Party (DKP) obtained only 411 seats in Wednesday's poll, while 1,123 independents were elected. The two minor splinter opposition groups, the Korea National Party (KNP) and the People's Rights Party (PRP) won only 48 and 20 seats, respectively.

The electoral deputies are to meet Feb. 25 to formalize the choice of the 50-year-old Chun to continue serving in the office he has held since taking power in a series of military-backed political moves over the past 18 months. Only a simple majority is required in the electoral college voting.

There already was speculation that some minor parties now may drop out and throw support in the electoral college voting to the Democratic Justice Party. Even before the results were announced, Park Kyung-Suk, spokesman for Chun's party said that he feels "much more responsibility to meet the people's expectations now that it has been given their overwhelming mandate."

The government, meanwhile, announced that the presidential inauguration will be held March 3, and said Prime Minister Nam Duck-Woo will head the preparatory committee for the inaugural. Many foreign dignitaries be invited to Seoul to attend, he said.

The outcome of the voting for the presidential college electors had been expected since Chun last month was named standard-bearer for the dominant government party, and opposition had been regarded as only token.

Following a typical pattern, voter turnout was lower in major urban areas than in other

parts of the country. In Seoul it was put at 72.1 per cent of 4.8 million eligible voters. In Pusan, the second largest city, it was 75.3 per cent of 1.7 million voters. Countrywide, the final turnout figure was 78.1 per cent of 20.9

million eligible voters.

Japan is ready to try and improve relations with South Korea, Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki announced in Tokyo Thursday. He was still deciding whether to visit Seoul to attend the March 3 inauguration of a new government, he added.

Cynthia Dwyer 'likes Iran'

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP) — Cynthia Dwyer, who said she likes Iran and its people and "would return if possible" despite a nine-month stay in an Iranian prison, returned to the United States Wednesday to be greeted by her anxious family. She was met at the arrival gate by her husband and three children. Airport police hustled them to a nearby conference room.

Earlier, in an interview with the Associated Press on her flight aboard a Singapore Airlines jet that took her from Dubai to Zurich, she said that despite her imprisonment and the anxiety caused to her family, she did not regret her stay in the Islamic republic. "I like Iran and its people. I would return if possible," she said.

Times deal finalized by Murdoch

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP) — Australian press baron Rupert Murdoch finalizes his purchase of *The Times* of London and *The Sunday Times* Friday after clinching agreement with print unions for more than 500 lay-offs and the introduction of computerized printing.

The tough-talking Murdoch, *The Times*, fifth proprietor since it was founded in 1785, warned that if he runs into the kind of union problems that have plagued the papers "I'll close the place down." The takeover of the two world-famed newspapers, plus three specialized weekly supplements, to add to his international press and media empire will make the 49-year-old Murdoch one of the world's most powerful press magnates.

The Times said in a downbeat profile of its new owner that the "Australian with the soft voice and hard-bitten reputation" now becomes "the most powerful figure" in Fleet Street, hub of Britain's newspaper industry, since Lord Northcliffe who founded the country's popular press 70 years ago.

Neither Murdoch nor *Times* newspapers have disclosed how much he will pay for Britain's most prestigious papers, but it is believed to be at least £15 million.

BRIEFS

TAIPEI, (AFP) — A Taipei military tribunal has sentenced two Malaysian youths of Chinese origin, who have worked as writers, to three years in a reformatory for spreading propaganda for the Peking regime. According to a Taipei Garrison Command (TGC) announcement, Wen Jul-An, 26, and Miss Fang O-Chen, 27, used the "Shen-chou (Divine Continent) Literary Club" to spread Communist literature, music, movies and political pamphlets.

METZ, Eastern France, (AFP) — A woman was sentenced in absentia Thursday to 18 months' jail for having refused to split a lottery win of over \$100,000 with her sister, who had shared the bet. Marie Jose El Malach had deposited \$80 worth of tickets in her name in the "Loto" national numbers lottery. But when one of them turned up the big win she refused to share with her sister Anne Marie, although she admitted they had shared the stake.

NEW DELHI, (AP) — One demonstrator was shot dead by police Thursday as street battles between agitating students and armed police flared again in India's troubled Gujarat state, the United News of India reported. Police units were said to have truncheoned and teargassed demonstrators in several towns, including Baroda, Mehsana and Bhavnagar. Scores of people were injured, the agency said.

Woodcock sees no change in Sino-American relations

PEKING, Feb. 13 (AFP) — United States Ambassador to China Leonard Woodcock has said there was nothing to suggest that there would be a "necessary worsening" of Sino-U.S. relations under President Ronald Reagan's administration. Woodcock, who is leaving Peking Friday at the end of his posting here as ambassador, however noted that the "sharp disagreement" between Peking and Washington on continued U.S. arms sales to the Republic of China remained unchanged.

The diplomat was giving his last press conference here Thursday at the end of 43 months as ambassador. He was nominated ambassador by former President Jimmy Carter, and has just resigned. The departing ambassador said he was "reassured" by statements from American State Department spokesman over the Reagan administration's adherence to the Sino-American communique on the normalization of relations, which

Woodcock negotiated in 1979. "I have no reason to anticipate that anything inconsistent with that would necessarily develop on Taipei Woodcock said. He did not know who would replace him as U.S. ambassador to China, but that Peking would be told as soon as possible.

On military cooperation between China and the U.S., he said he was convinced Chinese leaders knew it was impossible for them to buy sufficient arms for their huge military establishment made up of 4.5 million soldiers.

Last week Woodcock made his official goodbye to China's de-facto leader Deng Xiaoping. In a rundown on the political and economic situation in China he said that Peking was moving in the right direction as far as human rights were concerned, although Chinese leaders viewed the issue in a fashion that was basically different to that of America.

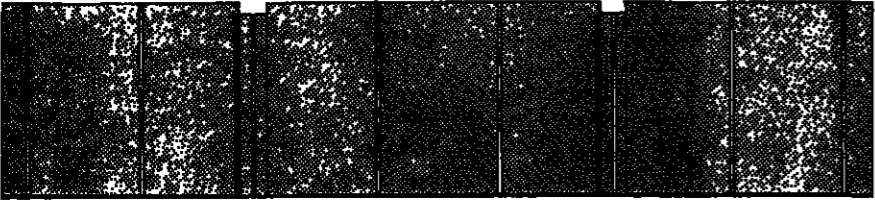

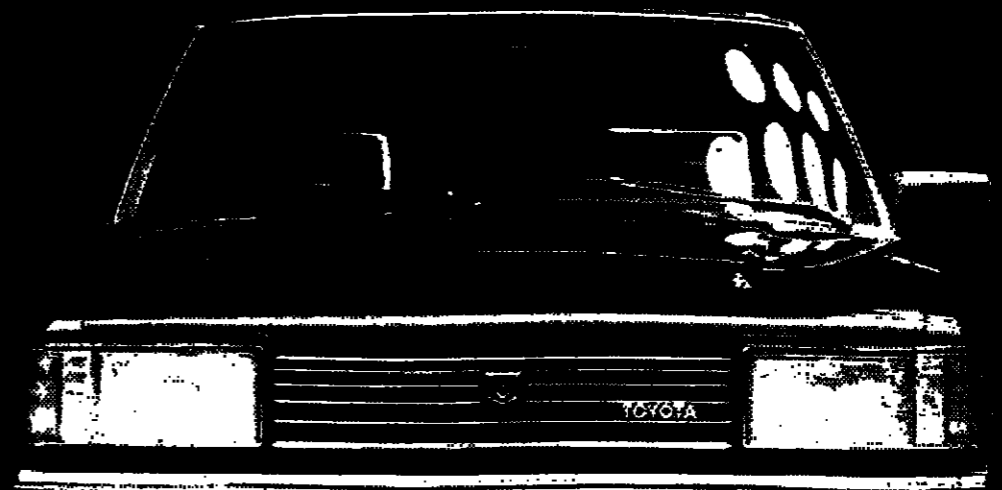

S.-Italy talks

Reagan wants code to deal with Soviets

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP) — President Ronald Reagan and Secretary of State Alexander Haig told Italian Foreign Minister Amintore Colombo that they want Soviet leaders to agree to a mutual "code of conduct" one that former President Richard Nixon had with Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, a senior Italian official said Thursday.

Colombo was the first European leader to meet with the heads of the new U.S. administration. The Italian official said Colombo had asked Americans about objectives of U.S. policy. He was told, according to the Italian, that the changes will concern East-West relations, and on the changes in the world balance of power.

Without specifying whether Reagan or Haig did the explaining, the officials said the U.S. administration considered it important that the Soviet Union abide by a code of conduct such as Nixon and Brezhnev set up in July 1972. The United States, he added, would also conform to such a code and reinforce its defenses as a preliminary to negotiations.

The official said Colombo made it clear to Americans that his government wants to be included in future economic summit meetings, not left out as it was from the meeting in Godesburg in 1979. There was no indication of any American reply.

Colombo suggested more frequent direct consultations between the United States and members of the alliance, and also more general consultation such as took place in

December through the North Atlantic Treaty Organization on the situation in Poland.

The Americans asked about terrorism in Italy. Colombo was said to have replied by acknowledging its existence, but emphasized what he called good results in combatting terrorists — saying that the overwhelming majority of Italians are against terrorism and ready to defend their institutions.

After the White House meeting, Colombo said that he and the president had discussed the "military equilibrium" between East and West.

Colombo told reporters that he and Reagan "made an assessment of the situation of crises throughout the world." A review of current East-West relations and the need for closer collaboration between the United States and Western Europe "included the question of military equilibrium," he said.

Secretary of State Haig, accompanying Colombo, was asked to explain the reference to military equilibrium. He said the question arose "of the importance of the United States and our partners in Western Europe to rectify the military imbalances that have developed between ourselves and the East in recent years, and the dedication we have on both sides of the Atlantic to correct these imbalances to achieve the necessary equilibrium."

Haig said the meetings with Colombo "confirm a new dedication here in the United States to institute a new era of the most intimate and extensive consultations," recognizing the growing interdependence between the United States and its European partners.

Bid to seize town foiled in Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, Feb. 13 (AP) — Army patrols fought off an attempt by leftist guerrillas Thursday to seize key sections of the nearby city of Soyapango and two guerrillas and a civilian were killed in the shooting, an army spokesman said.

Seven other civilians were wounded in the crossfire, including a 10-year-old student who was hospitalized. Witnesses said guerrillas commandeered two city buses outside a school in the early morning and started torching the vehicles when army patrols rushed up and opened fire.

The guerrillas fled firing automatic weapons, except for two who were shot dead by government soldiers a couple of blocks away. The spokesman, who asked anonymity, said the attack outside the school was part of a guerrilla attempt to seize key areas of Soyapango, an industrial city 11 kms. east of the capital.

After the shootout, army and security patrols searched the poorer districts of Soyapango and the capital almost house-to-house for guerrillas hideouts.

Meanwhile, 13 University of El Salvador officials, including eight faculty deans, have been released but eight others continue under arrest for questioning "for possible subversive activities," a police spokesman said.

Guatemala gunmen set plantation afire

GUATEMALA CITY, Feb. 13 (AP) — Suspected leftist guerrillas attacked a sugar cane plantation southeast of here Thursday, setting fire to equipment and causing \$1 million in damages, a police spokesman said. The gunmen, wearing olive-green fatigues, surprised and disarmed the plantation guards at dawn, then set buildings, barns and warehouses aflame at Las Palmas, a wealthy plan-

tation 61 kms from the Guatemalan capital, before they fled.

Fire-fighters who rushed from the nearby town of Escuintla could not control the blaze, the spokesman said. The fire destroyed two helicopters, two small private planes, a number of utility vehicles and plantation equipment.

None of the three leftist guerrilla groups

fighting to overthrow Gen. Fernando Romeo Lucas Garcia's rightist regime claimed responsibility for the attack. But police sources said the attack was similar to previous actions against large landholdings recently which guerrillas have admitted to authorize. Leftists and rightist "hit-squads" are fighting a bloody terrorist war here, with hundreds of people killed every year.

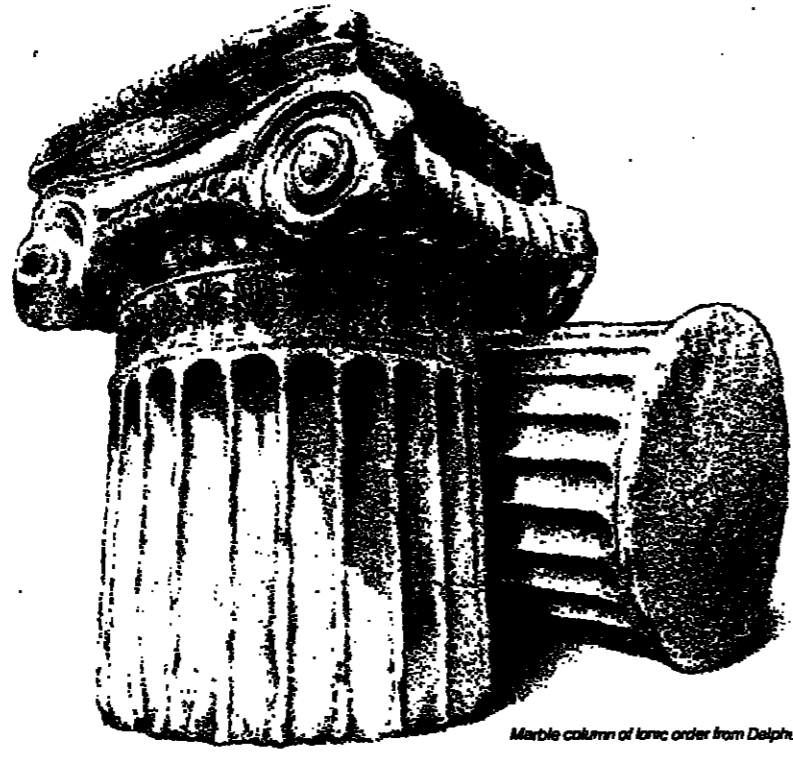

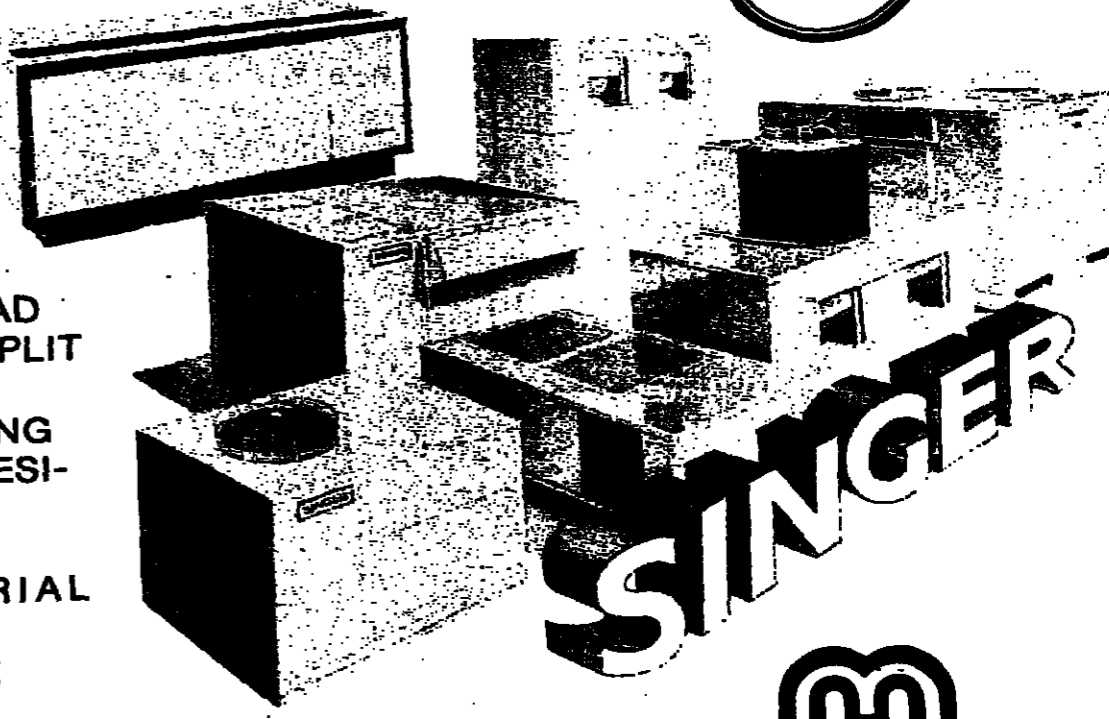

With U.K. adamant

EEC fails to reach pact on fishing issue

BRUSSELS, Feb. 13 (AFP) — Tension between the 10 members of the European Economic Community (EEC) has risen following the failure Thursday of talks to establish a common fisheries policy.

West German Fisheries Minister Joseph Ertl said he was "disappointed" with the hardline taken by British Minister Peter Walker.

Walker refused to enable an agreement between the community and Canada to go ahead until a common policy is established within the community's 320-km limit.

As several hundred West German fishermen blocked the ports of Bremerhaven and Cuxhaven to bring pressure on the council of ministers and the commission, Ertl stressed Thursday that it was vital for Germany to obtain the agreement with Canada. There remained only a few days in which German fishermen can catch cod in Canadian waters under traditional arrangements.

By way of compensation, the 10 ministers agreed to grant Germany some extra fishing rights off Greenland.

The Danish government, which wants to win better conditions for Greenland fishermen against background of fears that the

island might break away politically, raised its objections to the deal.

Walker refused to budge on one of the main sticking points, access for community fishermen to British waters, which contain 60 per cent of the community's fish resources.

Having given the impression of some flexibility in December, he adopted the demands of former Labor Party Minister John Silkin that community fishermen should be refused access to the 18-km limit and also to a 80-km limit off the Shetland and Orkney island and in the Irish Sea.

\$32m Iraqi loan to aid Mauritanian projects

BAGHDAD, Feb. 13 (R) — Iraq will lend Mauritania 9.5 million dinars (\$32 million) under an agreement signed here, the Iraqi news agency has reported.

The loan, to be repaid over 20 years, would help to finance hospitals, schools and irrigation projects, the agency said Thursday.

The agreement was signed by Iraqi Housing Minister Muhammad Fadhi and Mauritanian Minister of Water Resources and Housing Louled Ould Weddan.

KFAED's capital doubles to \$7.6b

KUWAIT, Feb. 13 (AP) — The Kuwait government has decided to double the capital of the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED) to two billion dinars (\$7.6 billion), a government spokesman has announced.

The fund, founded in 1961, so far has extended loans totalling \$2.2 billion to 52

Arab, African and Asian states, a fund report said earlier this month.

Jassem Al-Marzuq, acting minister of state for cabinet affairs, said Wednesday the cabinet also decided to raise the capital of the Kuwait Airways Corp. (KAC) from 77 to 370 million Kuwaiti dinars to finance the purchase of 11 European airbuses.

Federal court rules Carter order on Iran funds illegal

DALLAS, Feb. 13 (AP) — A federal judge has ruled that former President Jimmy Carter acted unconstitutionally in nullifying all court-ordered attachments of frozen Iranian funds. The ruling could have broad implications for the U.S.-Iran accords that led to the freeing of the 52 hostages.

U.S. District Judge Robert W. Porter ruled Thursday in favor of Electronic Data Systems Corp. in the first major challenge to Carter's executive order issued at the climax of the hostage crisis.

Porter issued a preliminary injunction blocking the transfer of \$20 million in Iranian funds that he had frozen in a New York bank in June 1979, before the hostage crisis began. The attachment was ordered pending Porter's ruling on EDS' breach of contract suit against Iran. That decision, which was in favor of EDS, came last May.

Porter ruled that Carter's action, which swept away such court orders and lawsuits by decree, was an "unwarranted intrusion" into the realm of the judicial branch of government.

In Washington, Justice Department spokesman Mark T. Sheehan said, "We have not had an opportunity to study the judge's order and, therefore, we have no comment on it at this time."

Justice Department lawyers were known to believe, however, that the EDS case is

unique among the 388 pending lawsuits by American firms or individuals seeking compensation from Iran. Unlike the rest of the cases, the EDS case had already proceeded to a final judgment before the agreement was reached. The Justice Department, which entered the case shortly after the hostages were released, has appealed the judgment to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

EDS, a company whose chairman is computer magnate H. Ross Perot, was awarded the \$20 million judgment in May after Porter ruled that Iran had defaulted on a contract involving EDS' work in helping computerize Iran's national health, welfare and social security records.

In a 32-page opinion Thursday, Porter said he agreed with the argument by EDS lawyers that Carter acted unconstitutionally in voiding all court-ordered attachments on U.S.-held Iranian assets.

Carter's executive order overturning previous court decisions for the attachments of Iranian funds "raises serious constitutional issues with regard to the power of the executive branch to nullify or negate the constitutional and statutory authority of courts with regard to pending cases," Porter said.

Besides the question of whether Carter acted constitutionally in issuing the executive order, the judge said there is doubt about the legality of the document itself.

Western analysts foresee increase in prices of crude

LONDON, Feb. 13 (R) — Crude oil prices can be expected to rise steadily even if a glut forecast by some experts should develop in the world market later this year or early next, Western oil company executives has said.

They said Wednesday Saudi Arabia and some other OPEC exporters would probably respond to any glut cutting production, with Saudi Arabia taking advantage of a stable market to introduce a much-debated long-term OPEC oil price strategy designed to raise prices by about three per cent a year in real terms.

The glut forecast rests on two assumptions. One is that world demand for oil will continue to slide as it has done in the past 12 months. The other is that Iraq and Iran will end their war and then struggle to export as much oil as they can to earn the revenue needed to rebuild their economies.

Saudi Arabian Oil Minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani is among those who have predicted a possible glut, saying that Iraq and Iran could boost their exports if the war ends to around seven million barrels per day (BPD) from under-two million BPD now.

But oil companies, note that Yamani has said that Saudi Arabia, the biggest OPEC exporter, would then consider cutting its output in order to restore a balance between supply and demand. A glut might, therefore, be short-lived, oil analysts said.

Under the formula, Saudi Arabia would help keep supply and demand finely balanced while prices would go up every three months, indexed to the West's economic growth and inflation rates.

The formula is designed to find an open floor price by about three per cent a year in real terms and would result in an average price of \$50 a barrel (42 U.S. gallons) before the end of the 1980s, compared with just over \$35 now.

"Whichever way you look at it, you must expect a trend to higher prices," one Western oil economist said.

He added: "But having said that, it is better for the West than OPEC that if it should happen then the market is potentially soft and Saudi Arabia has room to increase production so as to exercise a moderating influence."

British seamen call off strike

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AFP) — A crippling five-week strike by 26,000 British seamen on the pay issue ended Friday after a provisional settlement granting them a 12 per cent increase.

The National Union of Seamen ordered its members back to work after an overnight agreement with employers. They agreed to send their dispute to arbitration, the men's claim being for 16 per cent, the employers offering 12 per cent.

Pending the result of arbitration, seamen are granted an immediate 12 per cent rise backdated to Jan. 2.

U.S. administration expects 11% increase in inflation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (R) — A grim new economic forecast by the Reagan administration predicts worse inflation, growth, and unemployment than expected earlier, U.S. officials have said.

And presenting a separate report on the economy, President Reagan said inflation and unemployment were threatening the American way of life as never before. There would be further deterioration without urgent action, he added.

Officials said Thursday the new forecast, worked out by the president's senior economic advisers in recent weeks, was considerably more pessimistic than those made previously by some of his staff.

It projected growth of four per cent in the 1982 financial year beginning on Oct. 1 compared with earlier predictions of up to seven per cent.

The new information also said that inflation, now running at 12.5 per cent, would stay up at 11 per cent this year before falling to around 7.5 per cent in 1982, officials said.

Unemployment, now at 7.4 per cent, would climb to eight per cent later this year before dropping to 7.5 per cent in 1982.

Economists said the new forecast was an admission by the new leadership that caring U.S. economic woes would be more difficult than it appeared during last year's election campaign.

"There can no longer be a business as usual approach," President Reagan said Thursday in introducing a report on the country's economic state when he took office on Jan. 20. "Inflation and unemployment are threatening the American life as never before."

The report, drawn up by Murray Weidenbaum, chairman of the Council of Economic

Advisers (CEA), was used by the president in a televised speech last week in which he said the economy was in the biggest mess since the great depression.

Reagan will appear before a joint session of Congress next Wednesday to propose a package of tax and spending cuts and business incentives. This is part of an urgent program to improve the economy and reduce government intervention.

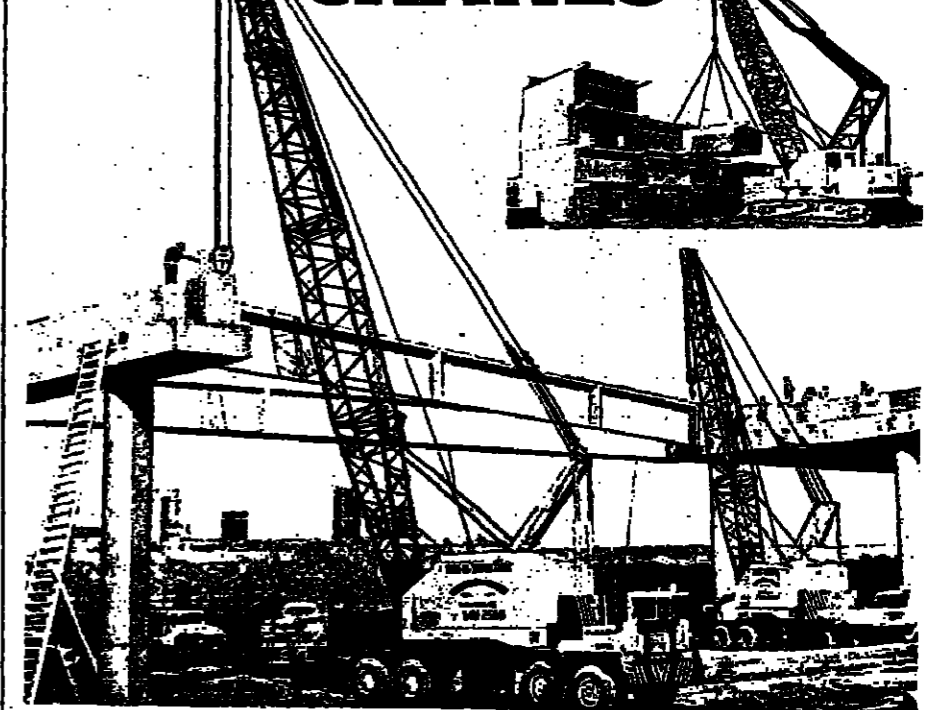

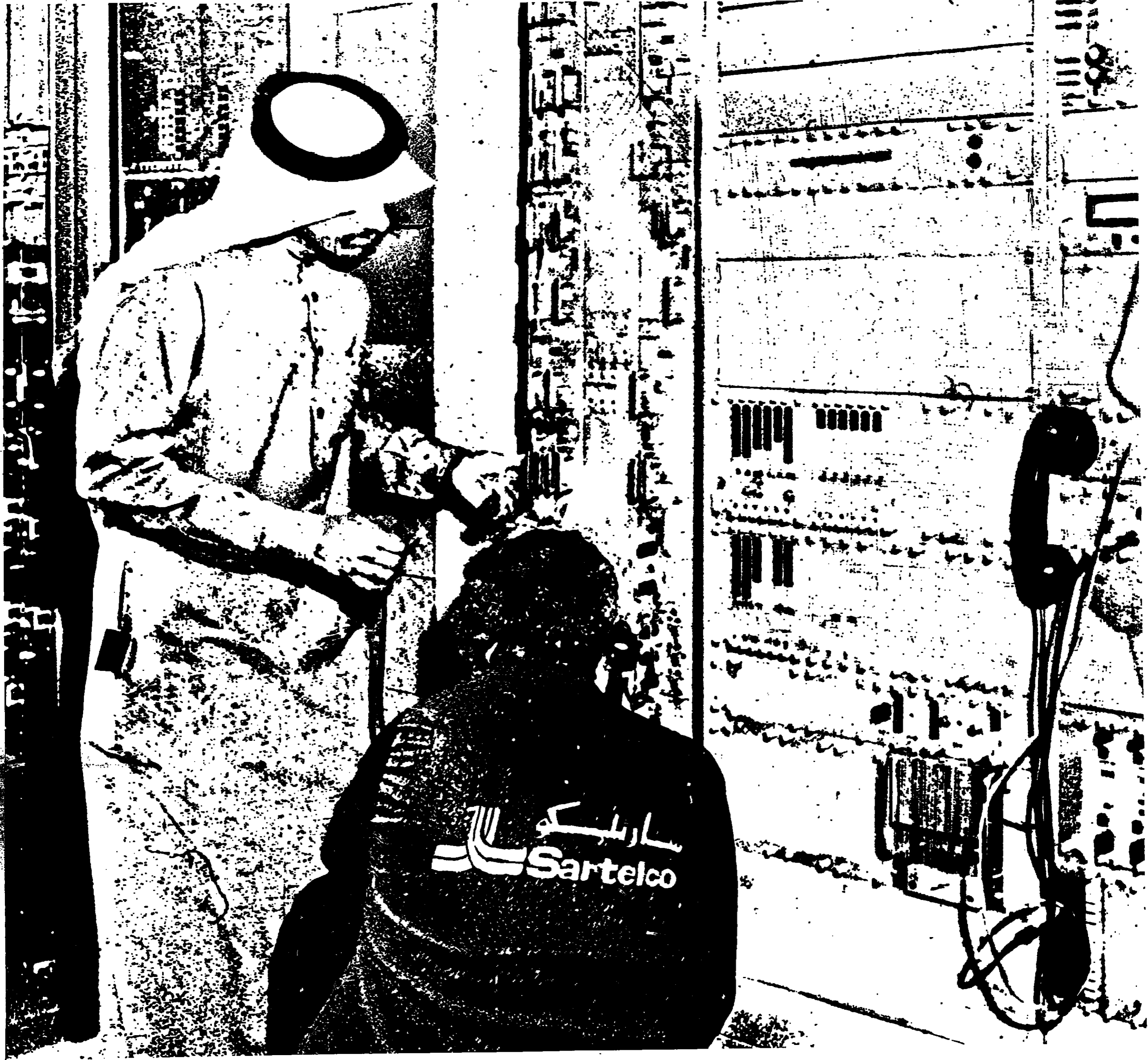

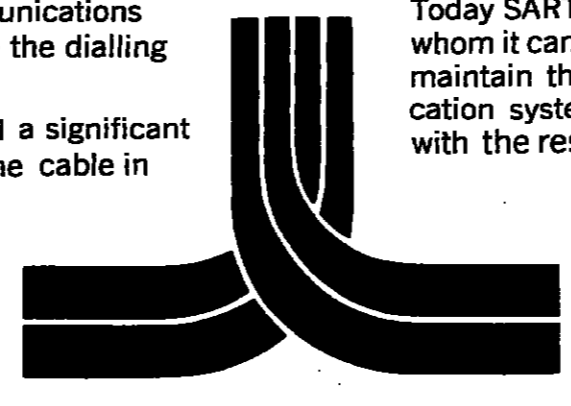

Sixth straight win for Knicks

Silas helps Spurs scrape past Hawks

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Feb. 13 (AP) — Everyone in HemisFair Arena, including the Atlanta Hawks, was expecting the San Antonio Spurs to go to James Silas for the winning shot.

Two Hawks jumped in Silas' face at the critical moment, but with seven seconds left he connected on a 15-footer anyway and the Spurs won a 110-109 squeaker that kept alive a 16-game homecourt victory streak.

"The key shot of the game was Silas'," said Hawks guard John Drew, one of two defenders unable to stop the Spurs' captain. "We were all over him and he still put it in. We played a great game Thursday night. What made the difference was Silas' last shot."

Lazio directors quit over \$6.5m deficit

ROME, Feb. 13 (AP) — The entire board of directors of Lazio of Rome announced their resignations Thursday after the soccer team's accountants reported that it had a deficit of 6.5 billion lire (\$6.5 million).

The board named former Lazio general manager and international soccer umpire Antonio Sbardella as chief adviser to team president Aldo Lenzi to help choose new directors.

A group of fans occupied part of Lazio's headquarters during the board meeting to protect the team's performance, but left afterward.

Lazio was demoted to the Second Division this season because of its involvement in last year's nationwide game-fixing scandal. The team is currently in second place in the Second Division, three points behind Milan.

DAYTONA BEACH, Florida, (AP) — Darrel Waltrip slipped past Benny Parsons on the inside coming off the last turn and barely held on to join Bobby Allison as a winner in Thursday's twin 125-mile (201 km) qualifying races for the Daytona 500. The green flag came back out after the third yellow of the race with only lap remaining and Waltrip wheeled his Buick Regal across the finish line three-quarters of a car length ahead of Parsons' Ford Thunderbird to win the second of the 50-lap events at Daytona International Speedway.

FLORIDA, (AP) — Bjorn Borg, coming off his first loss to Jimmy Connors since 1978, says he's not concerned about his slow start this year. Borg is favored to capture the \$300,000 Pepsi Grand Slam Tennis Tournament here this weekend. He's won it four straight years.

NEW YORK, (AP) — Ayab Kalule will defend his World Boxing Association Junior Middleweight title against Sugar Ray Leonard June 19 at a site to be determined, promoter Bob Arum announced Wednesday. Arum said he hoped the scheduled 15-rounder would be held at the Meadowlands Arena in East Rutherford, New Jersey, which is still under construction.

"It was a very even game," said Atlanta coach Hubie Brown. "Silas made that big shot on our double team." Silas and Mark Olberding scored 19 points each.

In other NBA action Thursday night, it was New York 122, Cleveland 111, and Seattle 112, Portland 109.

Knicks 122, Cavaliers 111: Ray Williams scored 24 points and Campy Russell added 20 to pace New York to its sixth straight victory. The Knicks led the Cavaliers throughout, building a 39-29 lead after one quarter and expanding it to 70-57 at halftime.

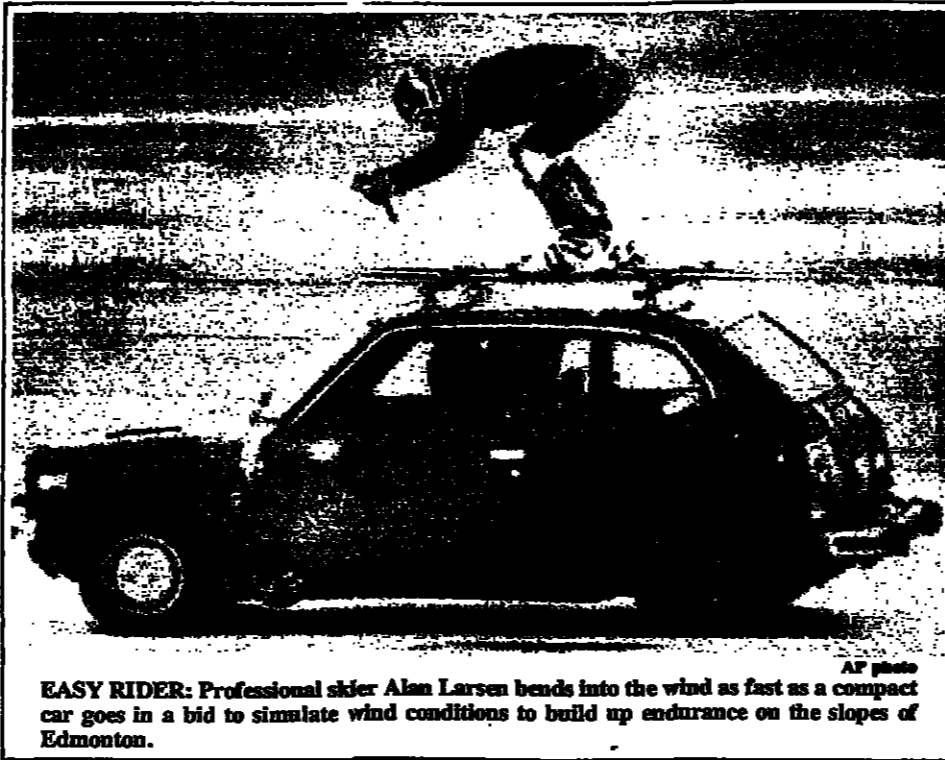
Cleveland was led by Mike Mitchell's 28 points and Roger Phegley tossed in 24 points for the losers.

Boycott threat hangs over England-West Indies Test

PORT-OF-SPAIN, Trinidad, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — Cricket officials here are worried that a proposed crowd boycott of the first Test between England and the West Indies starting here Friday could reduce attendance and lead to financial losses.

The boycott proposal has built up since the West Indies squad for the match was announced and excluded wicket-keeper Deryck Murray, the Trinidad and Tobago captain.

Local fans are incensed over his omission, and radio stations and newspapers here

reports various groups are organizing a protest boycott. Even as early as Wednesday morning, a few demonstrators were carrying placards outside the ground declaring: "No Murray, No Test".

A large demonstration is expected before start of play Friday. Noting the threats of a boycott over the selection, the Trinidad and Tobago Express Wednesday devoted its editorial to the subject. "One hopes that the West Indies cricket selectors will ignore this blatant attempt to terrorise them," the newspaper declared.

Murray, a 37-year-old veteran of 62 Tests, was dropped for the recent West Indies tour of Pakistan. His place in the team has been taken by unrelated David Murray of Barbados.

Meanwhile, it is likely to be a battle between England's spin bowling and West Indies pace with the deciding factor being the character of newly laid pitch on which the match will be played.

The West Indies Monday announced four fast bowlers and only one spinner in their squad of 13 from whom their final team will be chosen. England Thursday responded by including all their three off-spinners — John Embury, Geoff Miller and Peter Willey — in their 12.

The square at the Queen's Park Oval, scene of the Test, was dug up last year and a new one put down in an effort to make it faster and bouncier.

However, on the evidence of three first-class matches played on it so far including one between the England tourists and Trinidad and Tobago earlier this week — it remains slow and favorable to spin.

Selectors of both teams will make up their minds on the final composition of their elevens just before start of play Friday. But it is certain that the West Indies attack will depend heavily on pace, as it has done for several years now, and that England will look to their spinners to contain the West Indian batting.

Tom Watson recovers to share top berth

HONOLULU, Hawaii Feb. 13 (AP) — Tom Watson, struggling back from a double bogey, scrambled to a 6-under-par 66 and tied four others for the first-round lead Thursday in the \$325,000 Hawaiian Open Golf tournament.

Watson shared the top with Bruce Lietzke, a two-time winner this season, Jay Haas, Scott Simpson, and Jon Chaffee.

The group at 67 included veteran Don January, Bill Kratzert, Pat McGowan, Doug Tewell and Terry Diehl.

There was a starry crew at 68, including Ben Crenshaw, John Mahaffey, two-time U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin and John Mahaffey.

"The course played about as easy as I've ever seen it," Watson said. "If the weather stays like this, I think the tournament record (22 under par) is in jeopardy. I'm only surprised the scores aren't lower."

The weather was near perfect, but some of the game's leading lights had their problems on the 6,881-yard Waialae Country Club layout that is nestled less than a mile from the looming heights of Diamond Head. Arnold Palmer took 38 putts on the way to a 73. Defending champion Andy Bean had a 69, far off his pace when he set the tournament scoring record. Lee Trevino had to rally for a 70 that left him four shots back.

Lietzke, already the winner of the Bob Hope Classic and last week's San Diego Open, had no such problems. He didn't make a bogey and played the par-5 holes, which he says are the key here, 3 under.

He got off to a fast start with three consecutive birdies early in the round. He reached a par 5 in 2 for the first one, then his short irons within two feet of the cup on the next two. Lietzke weged close for two more birdies, then claimed a share of the lead with a 20-foot (6 m) putt on the final hole.

After hitting an iron to four feet (1 m) of the pin for a first-hole eagle and going 3 under par with a birdie on the second hole, Watson hit into the water on the third and made double bogey.

The key to his round was a burst of three consecutive birdies on the back nine, two on putts of less than three feet and the other from 10 feet. He had to make a 25-footer (7 m) to save par on the 17th.

"I'm just not at all pleased with the way I'm playing," he said. "Nothing is working right with my swing. I'm very fortunate to shoot 66."

Norton makes semis

OAKLAND, California, Feb. 13 (AP) — Beth Norton, who fought her way into the tournament through a qualifying round, beat Pam Teeguarden 7-5, 6-3 Thursday to reach the semifinals of the \$125,000 Avon Championships of California.

Norton became the first player to win a quarterfinal match, and the 23-year-old reached the semis of a major tour event for the first time in her career. In a second-round match, seventh-seeded Sue Barker of Great Britain struggled past American Sandy Collins 4-6, 7-5, 6-4.

Norton broke the serve of Teeguarden at 5-5 in the first set and, as she said later, "everything started to click for me then."

Things have been going well for her all week, starting with the 6-3, 6-3 qualifying victory over Les Anconopolis which gave Norton a spot in the 32-player singles field. In the first round, she upset no. 4 seed Kathy Jordan, and then she handled a hot teen-age player, Kathy Horvath, in the second round.

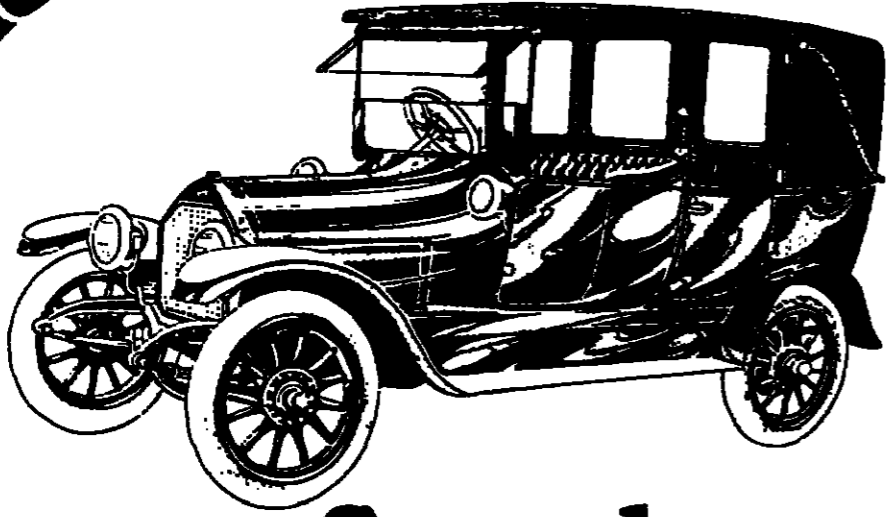

Walker to stage a comeback

Coe storms to new 800m mark

Wolverhampton, England, Feb. 13 (AFP) — British Olympic champion Sebastian Coe, racing indoors for only the second time since last summer, dashed to a new world best performance in the 800 meters in an athletic meet between Britain and East Germany in which East Germany dominated winning 19 of a possible 24 events.

In Cosford Wednesday, the Olympic 1500 meters gold medalist nipped four tenths of a second off the previous world best time, held by Italy's Carlo Grippio, covering the distance in 1 min 46.00 secs. Coe holds the 800 meters outdoor record.

Challenged by East Germans Andreas Busee and Detlef Wagenknecht, 800 meters finalists in Moscow, Coe stormed ahead in the final lap to finish a magnificent 10 meters clear of Busee. "I didn't realize I was in this kind of shape" Coe said.

In other results, 28-year-old Paula Fudge set a new Commonwealth record in the women's 3,000 meters, finishing ahead of Wendy Smith, in a time of 8 mins 56.4 secs. But despite his splendid performance, Coe has stuck to his decision not to participate in the European Indoor championships in Grenoble, France next week. He wants to devote his time to studies at Loughborough College.

David Shaw, secretary of the British Amateur Athletic Board, in naming the 16 who will represent Britain in Grenoble, said: "We are using the championships as a guide to greater things and I would not be too disappointed if we come back with no medals." Shaw added: "On paper we can't expect to win any."

British hopes could lie with 26-year-old pole vaulter Brian Hooper, who set a new indoor national record of 5.41 meters Wednesday. But he will be competing in Grenoble against top-notch French, Polish, and Soviet teams.

LONDON, Feb. 13 — West Ham, Trevor Brooking's team, is heading for a unique soccer double 4 promotion to the English First Division plus the English League Cup.

Victory over Coventry Wednesday sent West Ham into the League Cup final. And the London team has a seven points lead at the top of the Second Division standings and appears certain to go back to the First Division at the first attempt.

"Our football against Coventry was the best I have ever seen from a West Ham side," said manager John Lyall. "Their football was just brilliant," said Coventry manager Gordon Milne.

West Ham fans are still wondering how their team ever came to drop out of the First Division at the end of the last season. 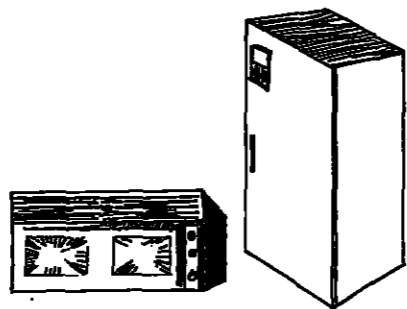

Test Your Play

1. You are West, defending against Four Spades.

It is true that East, for his two diamond bid, might have this holding:

♠ A5 ♠ 862 ♠ J1032 ♠ KJ92, in which case your king of hearts lead would prove unsuccessful. But note that if you led a club at trick two, instead of a heart, it would not stop declarer from making four spades.

The point is that when, as a defender, you have to decide which of two or more hands your partner could reasonably hold, you should assign your partner the one that's most likely to defeat the contract.

2. Assuming that North has the spade length, which seems reasonable, there is a sure way to make the contract. Play the queen of spades from dummy. If the queen wins, lead the three of hearts and finesse the nine! Win or lose, you have nine ironclad tricks.

If the spade queen loses to South's ace, which could easily happen, duck the spade continuation and win the third spade. Then cash the queen of hearts and finesse the nine. If the nine loses to the jack, South may not have a spade to return (because he started with only three), in which case you're sure of at least nine tricks.

If South does have a spade to return, because he had four to start with, you make the contract because North also started with four spades.

♠ J 10 9 4
♥ A J 10 9
♦ A
♣ A Q 10 3

1. Your best chance to defeat the contract lies in leading the king of hearts at trick two. This aggressive play is based mainly on the hope that your partner's hand looks something like this:

♠ A5 ♠ Q82 ♠ J1032 ♠ 9762. In that case declarer would go down one, losing a spade, a heart, a heart ruff and a diamond.

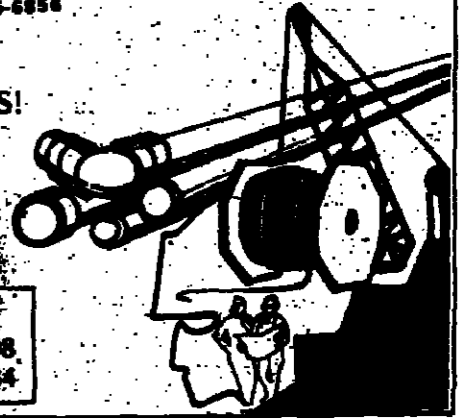

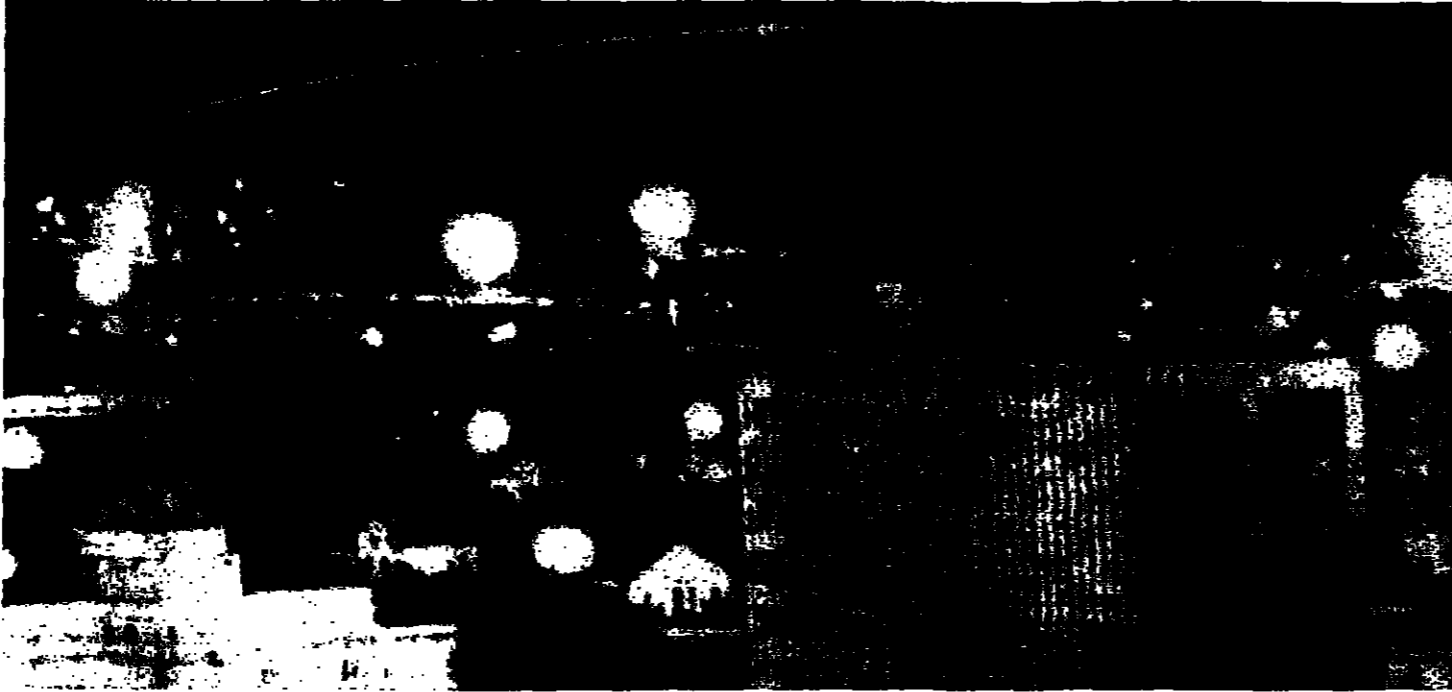

Mugabe forces recapture Bulawayo camp Nkomo men surrender

SALISBURY, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — Government forces Friday recaptured the Comemara barracks in central Zimbabwe, seized Monday night by rebel national army troops loyal to minority Patriotic Front (PF) leader Joshua Nkomo, military sources said. Government troops supported by tanks moved on the barracks early Friday. They are reported to have met little or no resistance, and most of the pro-Nkomo rebels were believed to have scattered into the surrounding bush.



ZIMBABWE SKYLINE: Rocket flashes and tracer bullets light the skyline over Bulawayo Wednesday as fighting flares up between rival factions in the country's new national army. Zimbabwe's regular army troops, both black and white, began lobbing mortar rounds shortly before mid-day into Entumbane township on the outskirts of the city where fighting had been raging all night.

The Zimbabwe Inter-African News Agency (ZIANA), quoting "highly placed sources" said that the dissidents put down their arms as soon as they saw Canberra jet bombers swooping toward the camp. "When the bombers flew over head," one source was quoted as saying, "the dissidents gave themselves up without a shot being fired." Government troops then moved into the camp, where at least 36 soldiers loyal to Prime Minister Robert Mugabe are reported to have been killed. ZIANA said the troops were disarming the rebels, whose exact number was not immediately known.

The agency also said a dozen armored vehicles carrying Nkomo's fighters to the aid of comrades fighting in a township outside Bulawayo turned back during the night and returned to their base at the Gwaai river, near Fort Victoria.

The rebels mutinied Monday night, attacking national army men loyal to Prime Minister Robert Mugabe as they slept.

Nearly 40 bodies have been found in the area since Monday, around the barracks and near the main road linking Salisbury with the south of the country which passes near the barracks.

Nearly 200 pro-Mugabe troops from Comemara have reported to police stations in the area describing how they were attacked. At least three men have been hospitalized, two with bullet wounds and the other badly beaten. Military sources said a campaign to round up the rebels would be launched soon.

Police have confirmed that the main road, closed since early Tuesday, has been reopened, but have warned white farmers living near the barracks to stay home until the rebels have been rounded up.

A second trouble spot, the southern city of Bulawayo, was Friday reported quiet but tense in the wake of Thursday's fierce fighting between government forces and pro-Nkomo rebels in the Entumbane black township. Government forces were reported to be carrying out mopping up operations, but military sources warned that the fighting could erupt again at any time.

Several hundred guerrillas from the Nkomo faction and those loyal to Prime Minister Robert Mugabe are still in four camps in Entumbane township. Reporters who visited the area Friday saw bodies still lying amid the ruins of civilian homes badly damaged in the fighting. The Bulawayo mortuary is said to be full and railway refrigerator cars are being used to store bodies.

Nkomo arrived in Bulawayo late Thursday but has made no comment on the fighting. His Patriotic Front party central committee has cancelled a planned meeting in the city this weekend.

200 Bangla fishermen missing after cyclone

DACCA, Feb. 13 (AFP) — Two hundred fishermen are missing after a cyclonic storm last Monday in the Bay of Bengal, the Bangladesh daily Inqilab said in a delayed report Friday. Twenty other fishermen were known to have drowned, it added. The paper quoted the crew of a motor launch which returned to Cog's Bazaar, 190 miles southeast of Dacca, Thursday after rescuing eight survivors.

22 drowned in Java

JAKARTA, Feb. 13 (AFP) — A total of 22 persons, including schoolchildren, were feared to have drowned when a crowded ferry capsized and sank in the Klawing River, central Java, the Indonesian daily Sinar Harapan reported Friday. So far only eight of the 30 people on board, mostly schoolchildren, had been rescued after waves hit the ferry and overturned it Thursday, it said.

Iraqis repulsed, claims Iran Drop visits to Khomeini, Montazeri says

BEIRUT, Feb. 13 (AP) — The heir apparent of Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini appealed to his 36-million countrymen Friday to refrain from seeking visits to the Imam and "bear in mind his state of health," Tehran Radio reported. The broadcast, monitored in London, said the appeal was made at a Friday sermon in Qom by Ayatollah Hussein Ali Montazeri, generally considered the nation's second most powerful religious leader.

Neither Montazeri nor the state radio elaborated on the state of health of the 80-year-old Islamic revolutionary patriarch whose aides frequently urged the people in the last two months to refrain from calling on him without prior appointments.

Khomeini lives in Tehran's Husseinieh Jamra, a religious center with a mosque that aides said was not spacious enough to

Reagan hopes son will be cleared

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AFP) — U.S. President Ronald Reagan has full confidence that his son Michael, named in two investigations of alleged embezzlement, will be cleared of any wrongdoing, the White House said Thursday.

Michael Reagan, 35, has been questioned by Los Angeles police, who are principally interested in what happened to some \$17,500 he was entrusted with for investment in a

business venture. A White House spokesman said that the president talked to the younger Reagan over the telephone Thursday morning and "has every confidence that any charges that might be made against his son will be proved baseless."

Michael Reagan said that he had done nothing wrong and would never have become the object of an investigation were he not the president's son.

Blast tears open Indian oil pipeline

NEW DELHI, Feb. 13 (AP) — A powerful explosion tore open a major crude oil pipeline in the troubled northeast Indian state of Assam early Friday, flooding vast areas of surrounding fields, the United New

of India reported. There were no immediate reports of casualties. It was the third bombing incident in the state within 48 hours.

Explosions hit the All India Radio transmitters in the capital of Gauhati and Dibrugarh, some 350 kms to the northeast, about midnight Wednesday, UNI said. The news agency quoted official sources as saying workers repaired the Oil India pipeline, but not before vast quantities of crude escaped into the surrounding fields in the village of Mikirhar, in Nowgong district. Villagers who were awakened by the explosion raced out of their homes to find the thick crude oil flowing across the fields, the report said. Police, civil and oil company officials rushed to the scene, UNI said.

The explosion came 17 days after the resumption of full-scale pumping from the Assam oilfields to the Oil India refinery. Authorities did not immediately connect the pipeline explosion with the blasts that damaged the two radio transmitters. Assam has been rocked by 14 months of agitation by students protesting the ouster of alleged millions of aliens, most by from neighboring Bangladesh.

Albania says Soviet leadership in trouble

VIENNA, Feb. 13 (Agencies) — Tiny Albania, isolated from major communist camps because it claims to be the only true communist state, said Friday that not only the Polish, but also the Soviet leadership was "in great trouble."

In a lengthy article, Albania's communist Party paper Zeri i Popullit took issue with the situation in Poland without referring to the latest government change.

The paper said that although it was technically not difficult for the Soviet Union to interfere in Poland, this would endanger East-West trade relations, and the flow of billions of dollars the Soviet Union and its satellites have taken from the United States and western Europe, would ruin detente, and the "ostpolitik" of France and West Germany "which the Kremlin wants to exploit in its rivalry with U.S. imperialism," the paper said.

The paper claimed the situation in Poland became "more complicated" as it was "going from bad to worse" and that party and government had "been forced to make concessions after concession" to the independent Solidarity trade union.

Solidarity's aims, the paper said, were to gradually seize state power, cut Poland out of the Warsaw pact alliance and push toward the West.

Meanwhile, a respite in Poland's seven-month labor crisis appeared likely Friday following a call by the new soldier-prime minister in Warsaw for a 90-day strike moratorium and a hedge to sit down and work out agreements with the unions.

Solidarity quickly ordered an end to the regional wildcat strikes. Lech Walesa, the Solidarity leader, responded with a guarded acceptance of the peace overture from Prime Minister Wojciech Jaruzelski who was giving his inaugural address to parliament Thursday.

Alleged espionage

U.S. expels Cuban diplomat

HAVANA, Feb. 13 (AFP) — The first U.S.-Cuban skirmish of the Ronald Reagan presidency has erupted following the State Department's expulsion of a Cuban diplomat from Washington. Ricardo Escartin, first secretary of the Cuban interests section, was ordered expelled Wednesday for alleged espionage. The charges were denied by the Cuban Foreign Ministry in a communique issued the same day.

No mention of the incident appeared in the official Cuban press Thursday, an absence attributable either to a wish to avoid verbal attacks that might ruin the possibility of detente with Washington or to the need for some time to reflect before making any statements.

Escartin was accused also of attempting to set up trade relations between Cuba and several American companies, thereby violating Washington's 20-year-old economic blockade against the Caribbean Island. "Certain

American businesses, unfortunately, collaborated with Cuba in this illegal exchange," a State Department spokesman said.

In rejecting "categorically" the accusations against Escartin, the Cuban government called them "a clear threat against American citizens, including members of Congress, with whom our employee has maintained completely legitimate relations perfectly known by American authorities."

Havana's principal anger seems aimed at the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), which it accuses of carrying out "diverse actions of harassment and provocations against our officials at the Cuban interests section in Washington during the past several months." It accuses the United States, too, of treating anti-Castro terrorists with impunity, a charge repeated after the assassination in a New York street last September of one of Escartin's colleagues from the Cuban interests section.

Both countries seemed eager to provide proof of goodwill after the tension caused last year by the influx of 125,000 Cuban emigres to the United States. The United States began to take action against boat hijackers who forced their way illegally to Florida, while Havana freed 30 American prisoners, ended the giant exodus from the port of Mariel, and extradited two airplane hijackers who had detoured a flight from Miami to Havana.

Negotiations in December and January provided for the return to Cuba of people deemed undesirable by U.S. immigration authorities and the setting of a quota of 20,000 Cuban emigres annually to their "northern neighbor."

22 top Soviet officers killed in air accident

MOSCOW, Feb. 13 (AFP) — Twenty-two high-ranking Soviet officers were killed in the aircraft which claimed the life of the commander of the Soviet Pacific fleet Saturday, a well-informed Soviet source said here Friday. Soviet officials have refused to comment on this information, which follows a report in the Soviet army newspaper Red Star Tuesday that three generals had been killed in an aviation accident.

The newspaper named the three as Admiral Emile Spiridonov, 56, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, Vice Admiral Valdimir Sabanayev and Air Commodore Guergui Pavlov, but it gave no further details of the accident. The Soviet source said Friday that a further 19 high-ranking armed forces officers died in the crash. No details have been released about where the accident happened.

U.K.'s inflation rate drops to 13 per cent

LONDON, Feb. 13 (R) — Britain's annual inflation rate dropped to 13 per cent last month, the eighth consecutive month of decline, from 15.1 per cent in December, the employment department announced Friday.

The cost-of-living figures over 12 months have been falling steadily since they peaked under the present Conservative government last May at 21.9 per cent. They stood at 10.3 per cent when Margaret Thatcher became prime minister in May 1979. The retail price index rose 0.6 per cent last month compared with 2.5 per cent in January 1980 and 0.5 per cent last December.

Mrs. Thatcher has made curbing inflation the administration's main economic priority. Many economists expect single-figure inflation to be achieved this year.

Corsicans launch bombing attacks

PARIS, Feb. 13 (AFP) — Three bombs caused damage but no injuries here Friday and were later claimed by the Corsican National Liberation Front that Thursday set off almost 50 devices all over the French Mediterranean island. The first bomb shattered the plate windows of the Italian tourist office on the elegant Rue De La Paix around 1.30 a.m. Ninety minutes later, a device rigged up with two camping gas canisters went off under a stationary train in the Gare De Lyon which services the southern routes. The train was not seriously damaged.

Less than an hour later a third bomb went off in the car park of Paris's Orly airport and a dozen cars were burnt out in the fire that followed.

The Corsican organization claimed the attacks in a call to Agence France-Presse. The record wave of bombs in Corsica came only hours after the state security court in Paris handed down jail terms on 15 Corsican autonomists for kidnapping pro-French demonstrators on the island and seizing a hotel in the coast resort of Ajaccio.

Ito to visit Washington

TOKYO, Feb. 13 (AFP) — Japanese Foreign Minister Masuyoshi Ito will visit Washington March 21-26 for talks with U.S. government officials, informed sources said Friday. The trip will pave the way for Japanese Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki's tour of the United States, probably in April, the sources said. It will be Ito's first trip to the U.S. capital since the inauguration of President Ronald Reagan.
