Britt Solos with POA

Gay Clubs Back Away from Police Deal

"The Police Officers Association has been our enemy but it has come to us. I would be grossly irresponsible if I and others did not use our power as a political force in this city to gain precisely this kind of concession from people — people who recognize our power, not because they happen to like us. Because of the power that we have developed we have negated the campaign against a civilian complaint office in the police department and now have a good chance of winning in November. I am proud of that"

am proud of that."

Supervisor Harry Britt was answering a question this week after a press conference called by himself and Bob Barry, President of the Police Officers Association. Allegedly an agreement had been reached in which the POA would drop its opposition to Proposition A, the civilian complaint office measure authored by Britt, and Britt and the Gav community would thored by Britt, and Britt and the Gay community would endorse Proposition I, which would bring recently hired officers up to the pension benefits established for older officers, and Proposition J, which will give the police time-and-a-half for overtime instead of straight pay.

GAY SUPPORT?

Britt became the center of controversy himself. Although he urged that he spoke for himself, he added that he had consulted with many Gay and minority people before the press conference. No Gay or minority person from any group spoke at the conference. Instead, the media heard a phalanx of ten elected Democrats, from Congressman Phil Burton to supervisorial candidate Bill Maher, in support of A, I, and J. When Britt was questioned later about where his broad support came from he answered that Gwenn Craig, president of the Harvey Milk Gay Democratic Club, was present. The Milk club has taken no vote on the measures, although Craig was involved in the negotiations.

Britt would not name supporters

The S.F. Chronicle printed a story ten days ago about the alleged "secret" meetings involving Britt, Britt aide Dana Van Gorder, Craig, and political consultant Dick Pabich. Pabich had leaked the story to writer Larry Liebert. It brought immediate criticism. brought immediate criticism of Barry from within the POA. It is no secret that a planned Gay/POA press planned Gay/POA press conference was scrapped by Barry. A broader group of lib-eral Democrats were brought in to, as one reporter put "save Barry's neck."

"save Barry's neck."

More confusion surfaced when it became known that Britt had told The Pettit Report in September that he. Britt. had first approached the POA in mid-August with a proposal that if the POA would become neutral on A he would urge Gays to support I and J. Police Officer Dan Linehan said at that time that A was no real threat to the department. One police officer told the S.F. Examiner that the POA "neutral" position on A happened because many officers voted in a POA poll that they were not really many officers voted in a POA poll that they were not really interested in the issue. The POA executive board some time ago voted (14-2) to be neutral on A. The question has now become "Who approached who and who won concessions?"

POLICE BRUTALITY

Britt says he also has re-

ceived an assurance from the POA officials that there is now POA officials that there is now going to be continuing dialogue between the cops and Gays and Britt is hopeful that there is now an era of cooperation. The supervisor has been the central critic of the police for its alleged harassment of Gay people. Britt was informed that the Committee United Against Violence has reported a high incidence of police brutality complaints from Gay people since the S.F. Chronicle leaked the Gay/POA story. Director Diane Christensen told B.A.R. there had been seven harassment incidents report-ed in one week, compared with the usual weekly average

Britt responded that the police "homophobes in the department could go crazy. There is a real danger. That is the price you have to pay for progress . . . There might be some backlash."

LEADERS RESPOND

"Harry stuck his neck out," was the reaction of Connie O'Connor, President of the Alice B. Toklas Democrats. She said, "This is very controversial and has to be widely talked about. We were lobbind by Harry and had a talked about. We were lobbied by Harry and had a luncheon with POA officials but we made no commitment. This requires a vote of our membership. I am not going to be railroaded into doing this." She said she resented Britt saying "Toklas has had its own meetings with the POA" because it implied her club was supporting the measures. measures.

Stonewall Club's Gerry Parker urged the membership of that club to endorse I and J and it did so by one marginal vote. He explained that he was for I and J because they are labor issues and that the public should support adequate wages and benefits for all people. The Stonewall club has since issued a press release saying it is not part of any "deal" or alliance and remains independent.

Randy Stallings, Issues

Randy Stallings, Issues Chair of the Toklas Club, said, "I have never done anything secret in my political career and I am not going to start now. I would not participate in any agreement with pate in any agreement with the POA. Harry speaks for himself and he misrepresents a great deal. The implication he is making is that he has broad-based support and he

the Issues Committee urged its membership to take a "No Endorsement" position at its October 11 meeting. Stallings told the 100 present. "Policy cannot be determined in back rooms by political deals." When Supervisor Carol Ruth Silver spoke at the same meeting she was booed by some when she announced her support of the police measures. measures

Duke Armstrong, President of the Concerned Republicans for Individual Rights, told B.A.R., "I do not support the police proposition and I do not believe our club will." He also said Britt never talked to him about the POA or a possible agreement. possible agreement.

Proposition A would establish an Office of Citizen Complaints in the police department at the cost of \$625,000 for its first year. It would be staffed only by civilians and no former officers. The OCC would have its own Director and be independent of the current Internal Affairs Bureau. The OCC would not handle complaints involving reau. The OCC would not handle complaints involving officers reporting other offi-cers. All disciplinary decisions come only from the Police

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Atlas Robbed — Again

Gays Give Chase

They did it again, only this time they didn't get as much. Three young black men stormed into Atlas Savings and Loan last Saturday at 11a.m., vaulted over the New Accounts desk and scooped up almost \$5,000. They were out of the bank and running down Duboce Street by the time police responded to the alarm — just two and a half minutes after it went off.

Two Atlas customers, who were in the parking lot at the time of the robbery, gave chase in their pickup, but they lost the robbers at the low income housing project on Valencia, between 14th and 15th Streets.

Precautions taken after the last robbery June 26, in which three black men made off with \$16,000, limited the haul this time, according to Atlas president Gerry Flanagan. Less cash was available at the teller stations and a red dye and tear gas explosive that was in with the stolen cash caused one of the robbers to drop his loot and cap

outside the bank

Of the \$4,930 taken, \$2,072 was recovered — drenched in red dye, accord ing to a spokesperson at Mission Police Station.

Flanagan said that unlike the first robbery — also done on a Saturday — there were many more witnesses present. Besides the seven Atlas employees there were 18 to 20 customers in the lobby. Two Atlas employees were slapped by the robbers during the holdup — apparently because they weren't moving fast enough — but otherwise no one was injured

The robbers wore ski masks during the robbery and carried guns.

Flanagan said that Atlas has hired uniformed and undercover guards off and on since the last robbery, but none was on duty last Saturday. "I think we're going to have a Saturday guard from now on," he said.

Police have suspects in the June 26 robbery, but no hard leads on who the latest robbers are, according to Inspector Tim Casey.

Flanagan says his employ-ees don't think the second set of robbers is the same as the

Migden Rejected; Britt/POA Deal Not for Alice

Calling for unity among warring factions of the Lesbian/Gay political community, the Alice B. Toklas Memorial Democratic Club denied endorsement to Lesbian College Board candidate Carole Migden, at least until next month.

Alice Vice President Sal Rosselli, also a College Board candidate, had been en-dorsed at a previous meeting. The Political Action Commit-tee recommended that no fur-ther endorsements be made in the College Board race un-til problems between the cam-paigns of the two Gay candi-dates had been ironed out.

PAC Chair Louise Minnick wrote, "In an effort to mend the wounds in the community that have arisen in the last few months, we urged Carole to consider a dual endorsement so that politically conscious community members could rest easy supporting two, not one, very qualified candidates. Carole informed us it

was not a possible option she could consider, although Sal Rosselli, early endorsed Alice candidate, has offered publicly on several occasions just such an arrangement.

"Even though many of us feel Carole is qualified and would be an asset to any po-litical office, we have, at this

time, decided not to recom-mend her for endorsement by the full membership. The majority of the committee felt a mutual effort to coalesce, on both candidates' parts, was essential to the survival of the Gay/Lesbian political future.

In the Supervisor's race,
Gay candidate Greg Day joined incumbents Doris Ward,
Nancy Walker, and Richard
Hongisto on Alice's slate.
School Board members Rosario Anaya, Sodonia Wilson
and Myra Kopf got the nod,
along with Pat Lucey for Municipal Court Judge.

Propositions A, G, 4, 11, 12, and 15 received a "yes" endorsement, while Prop. 14 got a "no." Although Props. I

and J (police benefit packages) will not be considered until October, Issues Chair Randy Stallings emphasized that the committee recommended a "no endorsement" position

"I want to make it clear that Alice is not a part of any deal," Stallings pointed out. "(Alice President) Connie O'Connor and I met with POA members and said we could open doors for them, but they had to walk through on their own."

All other propositions, as well as the unfilled candidates' slots (two College Board, one Supervisor) will be voted on at the October meeting

Commission, appointed by the mayor, whether the complaints come from the OCC, IAB or the chief himself. (The daily press has erroneously reported that Prop. A would "add civilians" to the Internal Affairs Bureau.)

Affairs Bureau.)

In 1978 Supervisors Harvey Milk and Silver introduced a measure before the Board of Supervisors that would have established a Civilian Review Board in the police department. This board would have heard cases and meted out discipline itself. Britt later supported this measure and he says he still favors it. Realistically, Britt now believes that the

milder OCC measure is more palatable and can become a reality in November.

reality in November.

Britt says the best he could hope for at this time is for the POA to remain neutral on A. Although he has endorsed I and J he said it would not be possible for the POA to endorse A. He said, "That would be like asking me to come out against Gay rights. What we needed was to stop the POA from campaigning against A. We achieved that and it is like getting a \$50,000 gift for the Yes on A campaign. Now we can win in November."

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Toklas Celebrates Its 5th

Rosebuds at the Garden Court

The largest Gay political club in the city celebrated its fifth annual awards banquet with a Sheraton-Palace banquet on Saturday. It was a bland affair, although the purpose was just — raising \$5,000 for the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club treasury and honoring attorney Herb Donaldson, Democratic activist Jane McKaskle Murphy, and paying tribute to the remarkable five-year-old Lesbian Rights Project

Supervisor Dick Hongisto reflected that in the mid-1960's it was difficult for Gay groups to even rent space in a hotel — any hotel. Now it was the Garden Court with all of its historical elegance. Once again the great and near-great in city services and politics gathered to pay tribute, to see and be seen. Now the prestigious names (almost everyone present is introduced at such affairs) which in the 1960's would have impressed the entire city have actually become routine. The traditional framed certificates were presented to many — all deserved. What was missing was a dynamic personality or was a dynamic personality or faux pas to top the evening. It

didn't happen.

"We are all part of the world humanity." Congressman Phil Burton told the several hundred in attendance. "It is arrogant to discriminate. I fight against such arrogance. That shall always be my cause and the flag that I will continue to carry." Burton is running for re-election.

Judge John Dearman introduced his friend, Herb Donaldson. Donaldson, a modest person and a successful businessman, has been known for some time as a behind-the-scenes "angel" for Democratic candidates and special Gau projects. Ha for Democratic candidates and special Gay projects. He was the major bankroller of

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the Gay/police outreach program and is active in directing a senior citizen housing project and the SF Mental Health Association. He accepted the Toklas achievement award for the "hundreds of Lesbians and Gay men who serve us

Jane McKaskle Murphy, Jane McKaskle Murphy, whose warm, charismatic personality and genuine concern about civil liberties is widely recognized, told the crowd, "Do not be discouraged. The Moral Majority appears to have the money and claims to have the Lord on its side, but the polls still have the public with us on the important social issues."

In a rare gesture, Toklas paid tribute to an organization — The Lesbian Rights Project. Judge Mary Morgan presented the award to Donna Hitchens, who founded the group. Although low-key in publicity, the project has litigated and won numerous parent custody cases and developed written materials to help Lesbians. Part of the evening's profit went directly to the project.

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
everyone but the waiters was Brown received a special cheer for having authored California's private consensual sex law. Brown has brought life to many banquets but he was not called upon.



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Shirley MacLaine's Kiss Goes Nation Wide

Mystery Man Snares Photos For National Enquirer

Last week the **National Enquirer** published photos of Shirley MacLaine at the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence's Dog Show. The pictures, by photographer Robert Pruzan, had appeared originally in the **Bay Area Reporter**. Pruzan told the **B.A.R.** he had no knowledge that the pictures would appear in the publication.

The photos, which show the actress kissing a Lesbian member of the Gay Games committee were sold by Pruzan to the **B.A.R.** and to Larry Williamson, representing himself as a staff writer for **Update**, a Southern California Gay publication. The pictures were physically picked up from Pruzan by a person identifying himself as Bill Mann from the San Francisco **Chronicle**.

from the San Francisco Chronello Pat Burke, editor of Update, said that there was no Larry Williamson connected in any way with Update. The San Francisco Chronicle has no person in their directory by the name of Bill Mann. Furthermore, Burke stated that he had never seen the pictures, had no knowledge of the pictures' existence and, to his knowledge, did not believe anything had appeared in their newspaper regarding the Dog Show or Shirley MacLaine.

This reporter also received a call from a person claiming to be from *Update* regarding the Dog Show. It is believed that the person who called the Bay Area Reporter and the person who purchased the pictures from Pruzan are the same person. At no time was there mention of the *National Enguirer* in the communication. Enquirer in the communica

The article describes the Dog Show as part of a weekend Gay celebration. It says the weekend festivities included a "beauty" contest of Gay men, during which a Gay man who was dressed as a nun burned an American flag. Also quoted in the article is Marcus who, at the time of flag. Also quoted in the article is Marcus who, at the time of the show, was writing for the

B.A.R.

Any legal action that might be taken is the option of the photographer, Robert Pruzan. He was disturbed by the appearance of the pictures in the National Enquirer. Pruzan said that he will be discussing the legal issues with an attorney this week. After that time he will make a decision regarding any action he might take against the National Enquirer.

The National Enquirer in the past few years has taken numerous exploitative swipes at San Francisco's Gay community. One feature in the publication resulted in a lawsuit by the Gay Freedom Day Committee. After the Committee filed a lawsuit against the publication, the paper ran mittee filed a lawsuit against the publication, the paper ran a story noting that the Lesbian/Gay Freedom Day activities received a larger grant from the San Francisco hotel tax fund than the Veteran's Day parade.

The article, which appeared in the August 31 issue of the Enquirer, was entitled "Shirley MacLaine Shocker / That Guy She's Kissing is a Gay Gal." The text was neither negatively judgemental against the film actress nor the Gay lifestyle.



"Peace in Our Time"

Sitting on the Governor's desk is a piece of legislation that is more a piece of legerdemain than one likes to contemplate. The sinister item is \$8 1025. Nobody is talking much about the bill because somehow it was slipped through the cracks in the closing hours of the legislative session in August with the blessing or the eyes closed of our Democratic party leaders.

As best as I can learn about the bill, it permits a police officer to sue for damages if a citizen files a complaint against the officer and there is malice. As the laws read now, a public official gets nowhere in a libel suit against a private party or the media. A public person (in particular a public servant) surrenders part of their privacy rights, and almost totally when one comments on their job performance.

Under the present law one is absolutely protected when one files a complaint about a police officer's performance. Under SB 1025 such will no longer be the case.

All of the Gay Demo clubs had vociferously complained about the bill when it first surfaced. All thought it had been deeply buried in the committee structure for this session. Abruptly it landed on the floor the session's last day. Only the implicit hand of Speaker Brown makes this happen. The Democratic locals voted for the bill which was piggy-backed on some other

And the local ACLU had an apoplectic seizure . . . and where had all the progressives gone?

*P.S. At this point in my rumblings I became perplexed by my own thinking. And I put in a call to Assemblyman Art Agnos' office for his rationale on the Democratic embrace.

Agnos proceeded to tell me I was wrong on what I thought the bill was about and that it was a good item. I countered lamely; he said he would check further. An hour later Agnos called back to reveal that the bill indeed was bad, the legislators had made a mistake. He said he would hand-carry a letter to the Governor urging a veto.

* * * * * SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL POLICE

Meanwhile, this Monday the local Democratic Headquarters witnessed the facile marriage of Supervisor Harry Britt and POA Field Marshall Bob Barry.

A gaggle of local progressives and Demo hopefuls were paraded out to witness the Unholy Alliance. Not one member of the bride's family was on the presenting side of the press event. Even with the godfather officiating, no one believed the POA/Harry Britt nuptials for a moment.

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

Marks Scores Tops on Poll

Independence Key to Beating Burton

"Milton Marks can beat Phil Burton," says San Francisco pollster Bernard Walp. His company, Western Polling & Research, was responsible for the poll of the Fifth Congressional District race which was recently released by Marks' campaign manager, Ed Slevin.

"A major question in the campaign is how the issues are defined," stated Walp. "If Burton can make Ronald Reagan, his administration, Reagan, this administration, and his economic policies the issue, then Burton has some chance. But to do so, he will have to overcome the public's current perception. If the current perception. If the electorate continues to see the race as one between Burton and Marks, then Burton probably will not be reelect-

Burton's poor public image stands in direct contrast to the popularity of State Senator Marks. Said Walp, "Burton was the only Democrat in our survey who trailed a Republi-can in the Fifth Congressional

District. What is shocking is that Jerry Brown — probably the most unpopular Democrat in the state — was running 15 points ahead of Burton."

The survey, which was done in the last week of July, showed Marks leading Burton by a 43%-36% margin. showed Marks leading Burton by a 43%-36% margin. Marks ran ahead of Burton in all age, income, and gender groups, although by varying margins. The poll also show-ed Attorney General George Deukmejian behind Los An-geles Mayor Tom Bradley by 56%-27%, and Brown ahead of San Diego Mayor Pete Wilson by 51%-36%.

Walp said that the most sur-prising aspect of the survey

was the size of the undecided vote. "In a case where there are two well-known and highly visible candidates for the same office, one would expect the undecided vote to be a lot higher. It is an indication of Burton's unpopularity that voters who usually vote Democratic committed themselves to Marks rather than stating they were undecided. The poll showed a tremendous pool of voters who are concerned about Burton's reapportionment plan and beapportionment plan and be-lieve that he has lost touch with their needs. A high per-centage of Democrat and Republican voters feel reapportionment to be the key issue of the campaign."

The survey also tested perceptions of Fifth Congressional District voters regarding favorable/unfavorable ratings of San Francisco public officials. For example, Marks follows only Supervisor Kopp in job rating approval with 69% of the voters giving Kopp a good job rating and 61% giving Marks the top score. The ratings for Kopp, Marks, and Burton are as follows:

Although Walp refused to predict the outcome of the Fifth Congressional District fight, he concluded with these remarks, "Burton doesn't look good to the voters when compared to Marks. National Marijuana Convention Held in San Francisco

Robert "Stoney" Gilbert will be sentenced at $9\,a.m.$ Friday, October 1, in Judge Claude Perasso's court at the Hall of Justice, 850 Bryant Street. Several dozen people picketed on the steps of that hall Monday morning in protest of the September 9 jury verdict that convicted Stoney of felonious sale of \$10 worth of marijuana and calls for a 2-4 year prison sentence.

Many of the participants in the picket has been at last weekend's California Mari-juana Initiative/Yippie na-tional conference, held at The Farm, Potrero near Army.

In a press statement issued In a press statement issued Tuesday afternoon, confer-ence delegates also urged support of Ben Sasway, "the first draft resister indicted in the selective prosecution of over seven hundred thousand draft evidence." Sequencies draft evaders." Sasway is to be sentenced Monday, Octo-ber 4, in San Diego.

Local spokesperson for the Local spokesperson for the Youth International Party (YIP) Dennis Peron also threatened pee-ins on the fifty yard line in support of the National Football League Players' Association resistance to owners' plans to initiate urine testing of athletes suspected of drug use.

Says the YIP press statement: "This is only the first step toward forced urine testing of all American workers. Is nothing private?"

Peron also threatened urine balloons "to water the astro-turf and throw at the owners" if the players are forced into testing. Other delegates suggested pee testing, if initiated against football

players, could soon be man-datory in the schools and en-visioned pee narcs of the Moral Majority wiring urinals to nab any offensive urinator showing any intake of drugs.

One delegate suggested that urine testing for drugs is already done in the Army.

already done in the Army.

This year's initiative drive was seriously damaged when police raided California Marijuana Initiative headquarters in San Francisco after Stoney had sold \$10 worth of mari-juana to a narcotics agent posing as a petitioner and working within the organiza-

Stoney's supporters at Monday's picket of the "Hall of Injustice" chanted "Nuke the Narcs, Narc the Nukes" and "The Law is a Crime — Free the Victim Now!" according to marijuana and Gay activist Peron. Another slo-gan was the theme on a post-er for last summer's Washing-ton, D.C., smoke-in: "Pot's an herb; Reagan's a dope."

Stoney, who represented himself in the trial, was denied release on his own recognizance and is being held at San Francisco County's jail facility in San Bruno pe his sentencing October 1

Citizens Against Marijuana Laws (CAML) are also plan-ning a spring caravan of smoke-ins across the country beginning with the Hash Bash in Ann Arbor on April 1.

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

Police Beatings Increase

SSAULTS ARE ALWAYS UGLY. Taking assault inci-dent reports day after day is extremely draining.

When an assault is committed by the police — whose job it is to protect and serve our citizenry — the drain of the incident intensifies. When one of CUAV's own community volunteers working to monitor a social event — working to keep people safe — is beaten by the police, a rage swells in the guts of our workers. And that is exactly what happened at Golden Gate Park at the Bandshell while monitoring Art in the Park.

At about 1:30p.m., CUAV volunteers found an artist who had been convulsing. One of the CUAV monitors, who had been convulsing. One of the CUAV monitors, and the victim in this particular incident, applied first aid techniques in an attempt to save the artist's life. Other monitors quickly phoned an ambulance crew at the request of the attending monitor. Twenty minutes later the ambulance crew arrived, and the attending monitor yelled to the ambulance crew to hurry since the artist was beginning to choke on his own blood. The ambulance driver seemed irritated that he was being told what to do and called for a back-up of police. Six police cars showed up, twelve officers got out of their vehicles and surrounded the CUAV volunteers, threatening to arrest all of them. Six of the officers then surrounded the attending monitor, who had assisted in saving the life of the artist. They handcuffed the attending monitor, beat his head against a stone wall the attending monitor, beat his head against a stone wall and pushed him down a flight long concrete cement ps. In the meantime, the

categories of assaults have been increasing and in particular we are receiving a dra-matic increase in police bru-tality and misconduct reports tality and misconduct reports.
Males are continuing to report as victims and witnesses in anti-Gay attacks. Additionally, the Women's Outreach Program of CUAV figures heavily on the increase of women reporting on violence directed toward Lesbian-identified persons. One of the major trend changes aside from issues of police brutality are reports involving Gay men and Lesbians who come to each other's aid during the process of a violent attack.

Another trend change involves males who are victims of a sexual assault. Dialogues between the Sexual Trauma Services indicate that sexual assaults against males appears to be reported at a greater rate than known in the past. Previously, the subject of male sexual assault had not been categorized as a major been categorized as a major statistical entity of CUAV. Ad-ditionally, the recent summer program of SOS Ministries

other monitors were kept in a bandshell office and besieged with questions. After the questions, after the beating of the attending monitor, after pushing him down a flight of steps, the police left!!! No arrests were made, no citations were given. Our CUAV volunteer was left with welts, bruises, and a leg so severely injured that he required a cast and is presently able to walk only with the aid of crutches.

Ironically, there is a question as to whether he is qualified for state medical compensation for victims because the police have refused to file an incident report on the matter. He has, however, filed a report with the Internal Affairs Bureau and plans to file a report with D.A. Arlo Smith.

All of a sudden, two unidentified and ununiformed officers grabbed the victim lying on the street and shoved his face into the cement. The victim had no idea that these persons were idea that these persons were officers and when they attempted to cuff him, he resisted. At this point, a uniformed officer approached the scene of the altercation and the victim stopped resisting, thinking the officer would stop this assault. When the officer began talking to the persons holding the victim, the victim realized that the persons holding him were plainclothes. The victim was then placed in an upright position and was told that the officer in the bus claimed that the victim took a swing at him. The victim denied this. Then, the officers told the victim to get into the black-and-white police vehicle. The victim hesitated, unsure of how to get into the police vehicle. One of the officers grabbed the victim and showed him so that his head struck the side of the car. The victim then managed to get into the vehicle. that his head struck the side of the car. The victim then man-aged to get into the vehicle and decided not to say any-thing else. Then the victim's bag was checked and they discovered half a joint. The officer in the car told him that officer in the car fold him that no charges would be pressed unless he agreed to remain silent about the incident. Otherwise they would charge him with possession. The victim agreed and was released. He filed with the Internal Affisis. Burgay, the following. Bureau the following

LAFAYETTE PARK

Two victims were in the bushes of Lafayette Park. Two plainclothes officers jumped into the bushes and without identifying themselves as officers, handcuffed the victims and pushed them down the hill. Both of the victims were without trousers and the police refused to let them dress themselves prior to the arrest. Throughout the incident, the officers referred to the victims as "butfluckers" incident, the officers referred to the victims as "buttfuckers" and "faggots." They were marched still unclothed through the park and onto a public street at Gough and Clay where they waited for 20 minutes for a police car to take them to Northern Station. The first victim asked the officer to see his police badge. The officer responded by hitting him on the side of the head with his nightstick. Later he asked for his cuffs to be loosened, since his circulation was cut off. The response to this request was tightening his cuffs another notch and pushing him to the ground. Both ing him to the ground. Both of the victims were given a citation and released.

The cook of Marcello's Pizza was talking to a person who was described as a "punk rocker" by the reportee of this incident. On the street, as both of them were speaking, the reportee observed a police car with three officers suddenly turn around on Castro Street in front of the two victims. All of the officers jumped out of the police vehicle and rousted both of the victims. Then, the officers handcuffed the punk rocker. The witness/reportee asked handcuffed the punk rocker. The witness/reportee asked the officer what had happened and why this man was being arrested. The officer responded, "Because he's drunk and he has fleas." He added, "We're taking him to the hoosegow." The victim/reportee overheard the officer tell the cook that the police reportee overheard the officer tell the cook that the police would contact his supervisor at Marcello's and get him into frouble with the management. The reportee stated that he could not understand the hostility of the police as none of the persons involved appeared to be drunk. He stated that the only reason the police responded as they did



The Alice B. Toklas Memorial Democratic Club, the state's oldest and possibly largest Gay political club, endorsed Monday night at the Swedish American Hall on Market Street. And Alice members cast 151 votes for the five supervisorial seats open in the November election (91 votes needed for endorsement). Endorsed were incumbents Doris Ward, Richard Hongisto, Nancy Walker, and challenger Greg Day (a well-known Gay activist), all of whom had been endorsed by the club's Political Action Committee.

Supervisor Ward led the voting with 134 votes, followed by Richard Hongisto with a 120 vote total. One of the few surprises of the voting outcome was the failure of Lesbian Carole Migden to receive the Alice endorsement for a seat on the Community College Board. A total of 146 votes were cast in that race with 88 needed for possible endorsement and Migden fell short, receiving only 78 short, receiving only 78 votes. Another candidate for the College Board, Sal Ros-selli had been endorsed earSupporters of Community College Board candidate Carole Migden are furious that the Alice Toklas membership refused to endorse their candidate Monday night and are threatening to return the favor when Alice's candidate, Sal Rosselli, seeks the endorsement of the Harvey Milk Gay Club . . . Migden, incidentally, is being aided by a party at the home of Bob Dockendorff next Tuesday (Sept. 21, 6-9p.m., 863-1696 for info); the Choral Majority will appear and a contribution of \$5, \$10 or \$15 is asked.

ay Games I has been a mostly wonderful, uplifting event to see. My heartfelt compliments to those organizers/athletes who've put so much work into making this timely event happen.

The way that the Games are being presented to the media so far has been very disturbing. This event, like so many others before it that include a cross-section of our community, seems to mean different things to different

I was angered and insulted to hear organizers state that (a) one of the main (and I'm sure not the only) purposes of the event was to "counter the negative stores." "counter the negative stereo-type of homosexuals (read men) as limp-wristed people who lisp, flounce around, etc, etc. etc. (You'll pardon me; my quote is as accurate as memory permits; I did not write it all down.) Making a special effort to qualify that many of the participants are

Frequently a vocal admirer of Rita Mae Brown's, I was disappointed and angry to read her statement (at an opening event far too pricey for me to attend) that this event was "not to celebrate homosexuality" but rather "individual rights and freedoms." Really sorry you think so, Rita. Perhaps you'll take a minute someday and explain to me how a "respectable"

campaign for "individual rights and freedoms" has a prayer of advancing our Gay asses out of an increasingly embattled position in this country. This seems to attempt to down-play the really positive contribution that being Lesbian/Gay adds to the Games.

With regard to (a) countering negative stereotypes; What in the hell kind of reason is this to organize and hold events for Lesbian/Gay athletes? Talk about groveling for acceptance! There seems to be a vocal portion of the GGI Committee who seem hell bent on proving that most of us are just like straight people (or trying real hard, anyway). This seems particularly evident in statements to the press about Gay men, although I'm sure there are many Lesbians who just as desperately favor assimilation in return for a measure of "tolerance." I'm as painfully aware as any of us that homophobic stereotypes are not what we're all about. But I'm equally and emphatically aware that we are not "just like everybody else." Our different-ness is one of the best parts of being Gay. With regard to (a) counter-

followed the competition with, as well as friends who are competing, are doing so as an incredibly positive action, not a reaction to nega-

tive stereotypes. Some of the best athletes thus far have been butch women as well as Gay men who hardly seem obsessed with the tense, uptight, jerky self-presence so treasured as "butch" on Castro St. And no wonder. I doubt they have time, being far too preoccupied with an incredibly high standard of athletic excellence. Most seem content to be simply Perceived as open, proud Gay athletes.

It's embarassing to hear

Gay athletes.

It's embarassing to hear you and your associates, Dr. Waddell, rail away against stereotypes, and carefully point out to people that a large part of what GGI is about concerns making a squeaky clean impression on middle America. Seems to many of us that Lesbian/Gay athletes are doing far better than that by being exactly who and what we are. I have no apologies whatever for dykes on motorcycles or in black leather, and I found out some years ago that drag queens are truly some of the toughest men I'm proud to know.

know.

Inally, (and on a somewhat different tack) I'm very much looking forward to competing in GG2. And I'm wondering if there isn't some way of setting up a fund (starting now) whereby partial airfare could be subsidized for deserving athletes from Asia. Africa, or Latin America? I really like the emphasis on our internationality this time, but found most of the too-few participants from other countries to be from "developed" origins. It's a well known fact that athletic excellence is hardly confined to the First World. While this certainly is in no way your responsibility alone, it would be a great thing if the next games could be an even more global event. event.

So that I'm not misinter-preted as heaving pot-shots from the sidelines, please know that I'm ready, willing and eager to assist in the set-up of such a fund.

Don't forget "Atlantis... city beneath the sea" this Satur-day at the Lake Merritt Hotel.



Policing the Police

The San Jose Fair Police Practices Committee is moving ahead on some of the plans developed at the strategy meeting I mentioned in this column a couple of weeks ago, relative to the bookstore arrests.

So far, as a result of their efforts, members of the Santa Clara County Bar Association's Board of Trustees were pushed to a vote on a resolution calling for a halt to the arrests. Due largely to what appears to be collusion between the current President of the Bar Association and the San Jose Chief of Police, the resolution was voted down The Chief was invited to present "statistics" to a pre-vote agenda committee review, an unusual move according to my sources.

To add insult to injury, the Bar Association Prez, in his regular column in the Advocate Journal (the local law rag), on August 2nd, wrote a review on each of several restaurants he frequents, saying that the only alternative discussion whould have been about the resolution vote, and "now aren't you glad you heard about restaurants?"

If that's not a hint of collusion to bury the bookstore arrests as an issue, it's at least akin to "let them eat cake."

To exemplify the waste involved in these arrests, committee member David Tread-

well (conservatively) points out that \$250,000 has been spent on police and court costs to maintain this arrest policy since it began last September while the incidence of violent crime such as rape (two a day in San Jose) continues to climb.

tinues to climb.

Hundreds of men who were interviewed have identified their arrests as entrapment. They are arrested under criminal code 647A, which carries with it mandatory registration as a sex offender, jail time and up to \$600 in fines. This is for talking to an undercover cop about having sex. — not actually having sex. The cops try to get the "offender" to agree to have sex in their car, then the cop makes his arrest, allegedly whether or not the "offender" agrees.

According to a committee

"offender" agrees.

According to a committee report, one judge estimates that 85% of those arrested plead guilty and do not seek legal advice because they don't understand the charge. Some who have pleaded guilty have been jailed for terms ranging from three to twenty-five days, and many have lost their jobs. Many of those willing to fight the charges are discouraged when they realize that taking it to trial could cost more than \$3000.

Treadwell and other members of the committee have compiled information for a pamphlet that they plan to distribute locally as well as a petition calling upon the San Jose Police to halt the arrests. There are several other plans that were revealed during the meeting, but identified as "off the record" until they're put into effect.

My more loyal readers know by now what I think of closets. Enforced closets with steel bar doors and not a top man or even a decent slave in sight is cruel and unusual punishment and is therefore intolerable. I stand behind this committee's work 100%, and will keep you posted on developments.

In the interim, please write Mayor Janet Grey Hayes at 801 N. 1st Street in San Jose or call her on her hot line at 297-3489 and protest the waste of taxpayers dollars and the hundreds of police hours spent hanging around in the back of bookstores while violent crime statistics skyrocket.

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

WE WERE PART OF US

hat do you do in a city that Bob Damron hasn't been to yet? Glen Helen Regional Park was such a "city" Labor Day Weekend during the US Festival. With a population approaching 200,000 it was the largest Hooverville of the current depression. How many of us were part of US? See "Gay Presence" below.

Unlike Woodstock which grew out of a movement, US was an effort to start a movement—the end of the "Me" decade and the beginning of "US" working together and loving each other. Can it succeed? See "Philosophy" below.

The festival was the brainchild of Stephen Wozniak, co-founder of Apple Computers, who reportedly poured \$12.5 million into it saying he didn't care whether he made money or just threw a party for a few hundred thousand friends. He did, however, include an exhibit area where people trying to beat the heat could see and try the latest equipment of Apple and other high tech companies. See "Capitalism" below.

The main attraction was the music, 19 bands booked by impressario Bill Graham. The main distraction was the heat, which got up to 110 degrees. For a San Franciscan that indicates a fatal disease — temperatures over 100 don't relate to weather at all. From new wave to heat wave US was, depending on your era, the cat's meow (not many of them there), real cool, crazy man crazy, far out, fanfuckingtastic or totally awesome. See "The Music" below.

Drugs were as readily available as junk food, but consumption was less conspicuous than distribution. The Woodstock generation was trying to prove something; for US drugs are a part of life as optional as if they were legal.

The San Bernardino area where the festival was held is known as the dustiest spot in California outside of my apartment. The nickname "dUSt Festival" sprang up spontaneously all over the park. The dust turned to mud in areas around fountains, showers and fire hoses. Water was definitely the opiate of the masses that weekend, the best thing in life and it was free. The amount used at the festival could probably have effected a compromise in the Peripheral Canal dispute.

GAY PRESENCE

his is going to be the controversial part, because both the festival's attitude and mine will be seen by some as homophobic.

It was definitely not a minority festival. Hoping to attract a quarter of a million people they booked acts that would appeal to white, middle class Southern California mainstream rock and rollers. A lot of those people are Gay, but that's not their primary identity.

primary identity.

Even The mainstream is somewhat factionalized, and not everyone appreciated both the Friday new wave of Ramones, Talking Heads, English Beat, Oingo Boingo, Gang of Four, B-52's and Police; and Sunday's shit-kicking country/folk of Grateful Dead, Jerry Jeff Walker and Jimmy Buffett.

Only two bands featured Only two bands featured blacks prominently, one (English Beat) as lead singer, and black non-attendance was proportionate. Santana was there to give Hispanics someone to relate to, and a number of them turned out. The only openly Gay artist I know of in the lot was Ray Davies of the Kinks. Oingo sang "Gay Banter" but the comic who preceded them on stage was a Gay baiter.

The festival didn't and probably shouldn't have tried to book entertainers with specific Gay appeal; I can't think of one who would have fit in.

one who would have fit in.

That's where we've painted ourselves into a corner by becoming so strongly associated with disco and cult performers. If promoters were aware of our actual diversity (as opposed to the 31 flavors we parade every June) they'd realize we have the same percentage of rock and rollers (and other types, if not stereotypes) as the general population.

They don't, so they didn't come to the Gay press for advertising or publicity, and they didn't honor our request for credentials. They said we asked too late, but you can be sure there was no deadline for press they considered important.

Why are we giving them coverage then? Because in a return to "invisible minority" status we failed to let them know we were part of US; and if we don't we can expect the Gay press to be similarly ignored on the Who's farewell tour and other future rock ignored on the Who's farewell tour and other future rock events, even though Gay money will be spent on tickets. And because we were a part, however small, of what may have been an historic event, and for once we want to make sure Gays aren't written out of history.

cause all of US were sharing a common experience. Close to the stage people were jammed so tight that you couldn't be particular about whose ass you were rubbing up against or whose cock was pressed into your ass as you both moved to the music. I had that experience with sehad that experience with se-veral women as well as men and even enjoyed it some-times; but anyone wanting more would have had to pro-ceed with caution.

ceed with caution.

It was "The good old days" again. There were no bar guides, no local hairdresser to ask and no quicherie among the concession stands. You couldn't tell by earrings (I'm sure the men wearing them weren't all Gay so I don't know if any were) or skimpy attire (by bikini barely made the top ten) either. There was no common look to adopt or one type of music to listen to to be Gay identified. It was three days with neither clones

As for the number of Gays in the crowd I can attest to only two — myself and the

I saw one woman in a "Gay Pride Festival" T-shirt and one man in a "Castro" T-shirt, so count them as probable non-Gays the overage preppies who responded crudely to the nymphets who courted it by running around topless and the men whose T-shirts read "I may not go down in history but I'd sure like to go down on your little sister" and "Smoke pot, eat pussy and trip like a big fucking dog." They're not subtle, but non-Gays don't have handkerchief codes to rely on. rely on

Friendly smiles were re-rned without attitude be-

nor disco — and you know what? I loved it!

what? I loved it!

I don't mind being Gay and I don't care who knows about it, but I think we've overdone it in San Francisco where it can be a full time job. I was never unaware of being Gay at the festival (so many men—so little clothing) but other parts of my being could take precedence. My friend and I kissed or held hands if we felt like it and no one seemed bothered, if they noticed. It was nice for sexuality to be a non-issue for a few days.

favorite set was the y tavorite set was the Kinks, not (conscious-ly at least) because of Davies' Gayness, which I didn't remember until later. There was no act I really disliked, and I caught at least part of all of them. To complete the record, the ones I haven't mentioned yet are Fleetwood Mac, Pat Benatar, Tom Petty, Jackson Browne, Dave Edmunds, Eddie Money and the Cars. Most sets were a combination of greatest hits and cuts from the latest album. Pat Benatar was one of the few to do unreleased material (with several plugs for the November album release).

blimp; on hot air balloons; on all souvenirs that were given away and some that were sold; above the stage; on T-shirts and buttons; on concession stand; and in the exhibit booths. The evangelists were there too, handing out tracts and displaying a sign (anti-sin but not specifically anti-Gay) that's been seen at some Gay Pride demonstrations. Near



It was excellent programming; I would listen to a radio station that played this assortment of artists. And every band advertised showed up! No one could say they didn't get their \$37.50 worth of music; plus video, laser shows, a full moon and other special effects, the Goodyear blimp and a massive balloon release (not as impressive in that larger area as the one at the Gay olympic Games opening had been). I missed Woodstock and may be too old for the next major festival, so I'm glad I was part of US.

f Wozniak wasn't out to make money on the festi-val, somebody was. There seemed to be as many people seemed to be as many people running concession stands (food, T-shirts, etc.) and hawking in the crowd as listening to the music. Festival programs sold for \$3. Food was only moderately overpriced (\$1.25/hot dog, \$1/soft drink) but far less varied than at the average street fair. The availability of video games in the exhibit tents may have kept some youngsters have kept some youngsters from seeing any of the con-

Speaking of video, when I found myself watching the screens instead of the distant screens instead of the distant stage i began to worry about the generation that's grown up unable to distinguish TV from real life or to believe anything they haven't seen on the tube. I felt as if I might as well be watching a film of the concert in a theater with an exceptionally good sound system. system.

There was advertising everywhere: in the skies via three kinds of planes and a BAY AREA REPORTER

the end of the Fleetwood Mac set that ended the weekend a plane flew overhead flashing the message: "Sinners repent — believe in Jesus Christ or go to hell." The crowd generally ignored all this, but those well-meaning assholes certainly did their cause more harm than good. Don't confuse them with Christians. If Jesus had been asked to speak at the festival he would have talked about love, not condemnation. He was the original US person. Which brings us to brings us to

here were hassles ahere were hassles aplenty, as you might expect at such a tremendous undertaking in such tremendous heat. This offered countless opportunities for us to start acting like US by helping each other or just showing consideration. I could point to numerous small courtesies, mostly involving the sharing of water: volving the sharing of water; but most began after the sharer's own needs had already been met.

There was also considerable rudeness, beginning with the staff, most of whom seemed unhappy to be working. When it came to standing in line or trying to get close to the stage it was everyone for himself. Radios blared past 2 AM in the campgrounds, and at festival's end near-empty cars sped laughingly past desperate hitch-hikers.

It was disappointing but not surprising to learn that "US" is just the plural of "me."

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Cloggers Triumphant!

Following last week's story on the Barbary Coast Cloggers, group member Richard Talmy sends this report.

The moment we had worked for all summer is almost upon us. Here we are, the Barbary Coast Cloggers, the first Gay as well as all male clogging group to be invited to perform at the Southern California Clogging Association convention getting ready to face a crowd of 1500 mostly conservative people from middle America in the main hall of the Hemet Fairgrounds. We participated in the workshops last evening and today and everyone has been very friendly. But then maybe they didn't know we were that Gay group from San Francisco. Tonight they'll know it! The entire group is nervously wondering what kind of reception we'll get when we are introduced.

Artistically, we are confident in our ability to do a topnotch performance. Just before dinner, Jeff Cowden, our leader and team captain, ran us through the number we will be doing and it looks fine. The whole routine is hot! Our artistic director, Janice Hanzel, wrote it just for us to perform here and it has some of the most interesting patterns and complicated footwork that we have ever done.

The program is starting early, and first we join the whole audience in dancing "Red Hair Boy," one of the numbers most everyone here knows how to do. This has a calming effect and I forget about being nervous.

As we line up on either side below the elevated stage, the

announcer is asking people to clear the space within the yellow lines on the concrete floor for the next performing group. I can hear a male voice saying, "I want you to give particular attention to this next group. I saw them in San Jose last year and they are a super group." Then I hear Janice announce, "And now ladies and gentlemen, from San Francisco, the Barbary Coast Cloggers." The applause is so loud that I can barely hear Jeff call out "... one... two... three... four..." We begin with an a cappella entrance right on cue. As we enter I hear loud applause. We come to center stage in pairs from two opposite lines on the sides to do some fancy solos, still a cappella. I almost lose my con-

centration when I hear some shouts of "all right" followed by applause while Doug and I do our solo number. When Jeff and Albert begin to do an original step that Jeff wrote, the whole place erupts in applause. As we finish the a cappella entrance we are supposed to go right into the musical portion but we have to wait for the applause to die down. The smiles that we pasted on at the beginning of the routine are now coming naturally.

The music starts and we go into the routine with full confidence. I can see Janice and some of her fellow instructors on the stage giving her the thumbs up sign. When the music ends we receive an ovation equal to the best groups that preceded us. We

-

also hear some scattered shouts of "More, More!" We exit a cappella and the applause crescendos again.

Janice comes up to us outside and she is on cloud nine. We are all a little giddy and dying to exchange impressions but people keep coming up to congratulate us. Dennis Cobia from the National Utah Clogging Festival comes up and extends us an invitation to come to Provo next year. He explains the clogging festival is a part of the week-long American Freedom Festival that Donny and Marie Osmond (!) sponsor every July 4 and they will PAY us to come and perform. We are now so dazed that we are numb.

We go back in the hall to savor our moment of clory

We go back in the hall to savor our moment of glory and receive more congratulations. A Gay man tells us that he had to wipe away a tear when he saw the reaction to our introduction.

our introduction.

I can now see the main reason for this convention and how we fit into it. Even though clogging is one of the oldest American dance forms, relatively little is known about it. Since it is now enjoying an explosive revival, it is basically being re-invented. Different styles, steps, and terminology are popping up all over the West and especially within California. There is a desire to create some uniformity in clogging and a national organization will be formed this year. Meanwhile, conventions like this one are forums where groups can compare and learn from each other. The fact that we are taking clogging back to its all male roots is of interest to the other groups. The fact that we happen to be Gay makes little or no difference to them. We have been accepted solely because of our artistic ability and isn't that what Gay liberation is all about?

Studio Rhino has seats for less than one hundred, but their stage will soon hold many times that. A solo performance titled Charles Busch Alone With A Cast of Thousands will receive a one night showcase on Wednesday, September 22, at 8p.m. in Studio Rhino.

The twist is that these thousands appear on stage one at a time, and all are played by Busch, whose show was praised by New Yorkers.

In Hollywood Confidential Busch portrays not only platinum blonde starlet Lola Lame, but the Hollywood types who surround her — The Film Director, The Second Husband, The Gossip Columnist ("she knew all and was willing to squeal"). A Theatrical Affair takes place at a producer's party and is highlighted by Busch's portrayal of an aging actress meeting the illegitimate child she conceived with the party's host

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Madame, The World's Oldest Teenager

The Best Little "Place" on TV

hile Madame is the lone star of her new to series Madame's Place, you can bet her friend Wayland Flowers has a hand in things. And they are just friends. "Strictly p-p-platonic," she insists. As she stumbles over the word someone hollers "Spit it out" and she snaps. "That's why it is platonic!"

The scene is a party aboard the Defiance, the luxury yacht owned by James Gabbert, who also owns TV-20. As Whiskey, the station mascot breezes by, Madame lunges at him: "Wait a minute, I'm not through yet!"

Although the press has been invited to meet the cast and preview Madame's Place, which will air weeknights at 7:30 PM and Sundays at 10:30 PM beginning Sept. 20, the bay cruise is designed to give a mini-vacation to these people — including supporting players Judy Landers, Susan Tolsky and Johnny Haymer — who have taped 25 half-hour shows in the last five weeks and have 50 to go to complete their first season.

Madame's apparent age shows what fast living can do. Her creator swears she's only 17 years old. Here in paraphrase is Wayland Flowers' story of the outrageous lady's origins:

"The first Madame was a gift from a friend (Bob Payne). We were working in Bil Baird's show at the New York World's Fair in 1965 and she was the Wicked Witch in 'The Wizard of Oz.' When she was supposed to melt she actually fell through a trap door. Up to then I'd always worked with marionettes but I really liked her. At the end of the season he gave her to me in a box with a ribbon on it...

"I was sitting in a bar in New York when a little old lady came in." He mimes her walk, led by a dog on a leash, and how the bartender put his hand between her legs and picked her up. "She said, 'Put me down, you cocksucker!' and the tone was just perfect." Wayland was from the South where little old ladies didn't talk that way. That woman's style gave his new puppet what she needed — a dirty mouth.

dirty mouth.

"When I was between jobs I did street theatre — I took Madame out on the streets. Or if I wanted a drink I'd go into a bar and prop Madame up and she'd say, 'Buy me a fucking drink,' and somebody down the bar would always say, 'Give the old lady what she wants.' We'd order what I wanted and I would drink it while Madame would mime the songs. One night someone who owned a bar in the Village asked me if we would sit on her piano and do a show. That was how it started, working for \$20 a night."

As if called to defend what

As if called to defend what he has now, Flowers tells how hard it was in the old days, "living in a cold water flat where I had to go down the hall to shower and walk two blocks to take a shit."

Sometimes Flowers sounds almost like Madame, as in the anecdote about going home with someone to a sixth floor walk-up apartment. "When we got inside the floor was this deep (indicating knee level) in crumpled up newspapers. But I was hot for it so I just asked one question: Do you smoke?"

If you think Madame's a camp now, you should have heard her in the early days when she and Wayland played a lot of Gay bars, such as the old Sweet Gum Head in Atlanta where I first saw

them about ten years ago. "Sure, I did a lot of Gay material then." Flowers says. "What would you do in a Gay bar? Give 'em what they want."

Actually, it's surprising how little the act has changed in the intervening years. Middle America has accepted a lot from Madame — and will continue to with her new show — that no human entertainer could have gotten away with.

Madame's Place has 12 writers, Flowers says, but he does a lot of instant rewriting as they shoot. The show has a stock situation comedy format with Madame's persona being its sole distinguishing characteristic, judging from one priview episode — but what a distinguishing characteristic she is! She hosts a tv talk show from a room in her palatial home, so each program features a show within a show as Madame interviews a real (Debbie Reynolds) or fictional ("Mr. Honesty") guest. Flowers starts to tell about one man with a chicken strapped to his head, but breaks up and can't get it out. He 'says he'll probably do a guest shot himself before the season is over.

One guest you'll never see on Madame's Place is that other symbol of international glamour, Miss Piggy. They've never appeared together and you'll see a Beatles reunion before they do. Flowers feels that Muppeteer Jim Henson stole a lot of his ideas "and took that little 'piggy' to market."

When someone tells him he was "the best thing on Hollywood Squares," Flowers disagrees. "The best is gone." he says, launching into a series of stories about the late Paul Lynde. Because of Lynde's sarcasm, he says, some people thought they weren't friends; but that isn't true.

He describes Lynde as a sad, lonely man who had always wanted to be rich. They toured together in summer stock for ten weeks in 1976 in a variety show. "Paul was used to touring in plays and wasn't comfortable playing himself," Flowers says. (Lynde made that point in the show. I reviewed it at the time, saying that shouldn't have been a problem because he always played Paul Lynde in all the other shows. I said Lynde was the weakest thing about The Paul Lynde Show, as it was called, but I had only the highest praise for Way-

land and Madame. I still remember her line about visiting Disneyland, sitting on Pinocchio's nose and saying, "Lie, kid, lie!")

Flowers seemed to have friends in every city they traveled to who would invite him out after the show, while Lynde was always alone. "He was a man of extremes," Flowers says, telling of Lynde's alternate eating binges and crash diets: "You just don't do that to your system."

Many of Flowers' best anecdotes are "not for print," probably including the one about Paul Lynde that ends with the punch line. "One ass in my Jockey shorts is enough!" He won't discuss his own sexuality on the record either: "If I can do a good thing for everybody, make everybody laugh and be happy, why fucking kill it?

"What's the point anywar?

"What's the point anyway? Why does everyone have to have a label? I don't know what I am. I've tried everything, although I have my preferences. My biggest regret is that I'll never be able to have a baby from my own

body, because I'd like to experience that too."

While things have loosened up in many ways. Flowers doesn't feel that things are any better today for Gay entertainers who come out — "and they never will be." Artists from Liberace to Lynde have been able to get away with incredible flamboyance, but Flowers believes those "three little words" ("I am Gay") would create a barrier that fans wouldn't cross.

We all know the opposing argument — that if everyone came out at once there'd be too many of us for even the most bigoted person to reject;

but that's not likely to happen, so we'll never know who's right.

In the meantime, Madame will continue to make everybody laugh and be happy, using "fucking" in every other sentence ("never as a verb, always as an adjective," her platonic friend points out, lest you think her less of a lady) except on television. There she'll confine herself to such mild outrageousness as when a psychic, after a burglary, senses that Madame has been "broken into and entered." and she responds, "It was wonderful, but it was a long time ago."

Underbelly Blood and Beauty

Life in the Gay Demimonde

In Torn Tulle, playwright Charles Heinrich takes us down from the Gay world of gilt-edged Ralph Lauren brunches, past the bearded, butch hunks and the leather lairs to the very underbelly of the Gay world inhabited by the pimps, the prostitutes, the transvestites, the purveyors of porn and others of their ilk whom the more "genteel" choose to reject and demean. The setting of Torn Tulle is a room behind a sleazy New York porno theatre where Orlando, theater owner and pimp, houses four transvestite prostitutes who work the pimp, houses four transvestite prostitutes who work the streets as well as the theater between reels. Madeleine, Charlotte, Trixie and Maria are a sorry lot: ever abused and exploited while living in some romantic fantasy that a better life is just around the corner. Playwright Heinrich has made us voyeurs to a side of Gay life most of us rarely get to see, and though the picture is far from pretty the play is quite rivetting.

Though the plot contains three murders — all bloodily and skillfully executed — director Charles Solomon has rector Charles Solomon has opted to temper the play's shock value and focus as well on the reality of these people's existence. The four transvestites are not cartoons. J. Carlton Powers, R. Scott Lyons, Doris Fish, and Alexis retain distinct personalities, each sympathetic in his own way. Though the play fails to

offer insight into how these men evolved into their bizarre circumstance, the four maintain credibility as real human beings. There is a goodly amount of bitch-fighting amongst them, but when it comes to survival they know they have few friends beyond each other, and they rally in support.

Mitch Welenken is despicably sinister as the pimp, Orlando, who simultaneously protects and exploits the "girls" for his personal gain and perverse pleasure. His Act II scene with Maria, his favorite, dramatically illustrates Orlando's hold over his brood; it is an intense, particularly well-acted portion of the play.

As a corrupt cop who triggers the play's violence, Glen Perkins does well with some surreal, sexual moments. To say more would be too revealing of the plot.

There are a few problems with the play as it stands. Some poetic, philosophical monologues seem a bit out of place, and there is a need for ensemble tightening in Act I. Nonetheless, Torn Tulle is a substantial piece of theater that takes us on an eyeopening walk through the darker corners of the Gay netherworld.

It's been a great week for Gay theater. First Studio Rhino unveiled **Torn Tulle**, and then the 544 Natoma Iheater Workshop opened **Sunsets**, three one acts by Cal Yeomans. All three plays are sexual in nature and range from suggestive to boldly erotic.

range from suggestive to bold

The Line Forms to the
Rear is a rewrite of a piece
first presented by Studio
Rhino several years ago.
Here it has been shaped and
tightened, by both the author
and actor Blaine Souza, into a
richly wrought character
study of a former drag queen
who now spends his time
giving blow jobs to all comers
at a rural Florida beachside
tea-room. In a monologue
delivered directly to the audience, Henry Wayne (alias
Henrietta) tells us the story of
his life including his calling to
sex service after being hit in
the head by an exploding can
of tuna at a local K-Mart. The
monologue is both funny and
touching and is deftly performed by Souza under Peter
Hartman's direction.

At the End of the Road gives us another virtual monologue, this time by Leona who arrives, potbellied and becurlered, at the same beach. While her husband, Manny, prowls the tea-room in search of men who will service his wife while he watches, Leona tells us about herself and her husband and their sex life of which there is never enough for Leona. When a young hunk appears on the beach and enters the tearoom, we see why Leona is so sexually unfulfilled.

Ann Block is a touch hesitant as Leona but still manages a funny, believable characterization. David Baker as Manny and John Ponyman as the hunk are both fine. What needs cutting from the

play is a gratuitous theatrical joke — homage to Edward Albee — in which a son and daughter drag their Ancient Mother across the beach. It adds absolutely nothing but distraction to the story at hand In the Shadow of a Rain-

In the Shadow of a Kainbow is the closing piece of the evening, and it is a knockout. John, a Gay man who hangs out at the beach, encounters Dan, a straight family man, and their attraction is undeniable. After quick sex at John's house, Dan hurriedly departs, but each subsequent en but each subsequent en-counter becomes longer and more intense, culminating in a nude wrestling match (a la Women in Love) in which Dan finally submits to con-cious beorganual loss. scious homosexual love.

John Ponyman as John and Dennis Yount as Dan are both wholly believable in their roles, and their chemistry is exciting to watch. Peter Hartman directs Rainbow as a mating dance and creates a sexual tension that is spell-binding through the play's final moment. final moment.

final moment.

Cal Yeoman's plays are illustrated sexual attitudes that are most effective in their depiction of homosexual urges in substantially heterosexual men. He has an erotic sensibility to his writing, and his use of overt sex acts to illustrate the powerful draw of man-to-man sex is both fitting and exciting. Sunsets is an intensely homosexual and homoerotic evening of theater. The entire triple bill is highly recommended.

Endangered Species Well Done Bull Story

A while back the press reported strange mutilations of cows in the midwest. The animals had all the blood sucked out of them as well as their internal organs cleanly removed. Nobody could figure out how it could be done. In Endangered Species director Alan Rudolph provides a taut, crisply paced film that provides a reasonable yet hypothetical answer to the mystery.

mystery.

The film never steers us wrong, but does not really provide any resolution either. It stars Jobeth Williams (the mother in Poltergeist) as a sheriff of a small farming community in Colorado and begins with a written adviso that since 1969 ostensibly all germ warfare research was stopped by law. It ends with a note that since this research ended there have been more than 10,000 unexplainable mutilations.

What's sandwiched in between them is a Hollywood fashioned thriller about government coverup and radical right wingers testing their own chemicals on poor unsuspecting cattle. Set against Gary Wright's ominous synthesizer score, the film dishes out information in teasing, gradual portions to keep us ever involved in the bizarre happenings.

The ending, in the "lady or the tiger" mold, offers us no catharsis, no relief to the web of intrique that has been established. If we ask why the movie was made, it would seem only to want to incite our anger— and that's a lot of bull!

Close your eyes and imagine you are at a festive election night party. There are tables filled with munchies and all the booze you can drink. There is, however, one slight problem: all the people at the party are obnoxious. They are loud, vulgar and they surround you for 90 minutes. Occasionally they say or do something funny but most of the time you feel you're in one of those inexplicably claustrophobic plays

written by Harold Pinter in which everybody thinks screaming is the only way to communicate.

communicate.

Drugstore Romance Endless Love Story

If it hadn't been made first. Drugstore Romance could have been Endless Love II. It's about an allegedly mature man named Pierrot (Nicolas Silberg) who at first sight becomes obsessively attracted to a more mature woman (Helene Surgere).

She's nothing special, a bit elegant for a pharmacist maybe; but he's a certifiable loony who freaks out when she rejects him. After he's suffered enough she tells him she has three months to live and wants to spend them with him.

This plays out against music of Gabriel Faure, who works cheaper than Diana Ross and Lionel Ritchie, having been dead for 57 years.

Frankly, I thought Pierrot and his Pierrette deserved each other. I was only afraid they'd both outlive me as the film dragged on.

Some peripheral characters are more interesting than the leads: a teenaged girl with a dirty mouth; a part-time prostitute; and the owner of the garage where Pierrot works. All three have the hots for our hero. When the boss reveals his longing, Pierrot is willing: "If one inspires love one has no right to refuse."

If Drugstore Romance hadn't been bad enough to laugh at occasionally, I would have walked out in the middle—something I rarely do. (Bridge)





Parker in the Sky with Dawson

The opening scene of Al Parker's new movie, **Turned** On, occurs in conventional reality. The rest of the movie, which Parker himself admits is which Parker himself admits is more bizarre than anything he's ever done, is a heady dream, a floating free-fall of sexuality. It's a tea smoker's delight, the measured, insistent pace of the synthesizer background score complementing the slow and relentless sexual onslaught. It's the most carefully staged porno I've ever seen (not necessarily a compliment) and the combination of slow pace, deliberate staging, and incessant sex make the 90-minute length seem a good deal longer than that.

Turned On is never boring, but it becomes a marathon—would I last to the end? How long can I sit there with a hardon? This abundant length hardon? I his abundant length makes it perfect for home video viewing, which is how I screened the film. In a theatre I'd probably O.D. But at home one can start and stop, and that's probably the best way to control this hardon dream

Technically speaking, the movie is a marvel. The lighting is particularly beautiful, its bluish-white shine bringing the lucid brilliance of a Greek the lucid brilliance of a Greek mountain landscape to the muscular terrain of the performers' bodies. The cinematography of Tom Howard is equally brilliant, sharply focused and close up to the action, coming through a TV screen with state of the art clarity and no feeling of confinement. finement

the several years since his initial appearance he's been cloned and Nautilused. His shorter haircut accentuates his cheekbones and his lithe, taut body is just a touch beefy. Other than a trim of his previously bushy pubic hair, his cock hasn't undergone any change, and didn't need to. Constantly erect, standing up instead of out, it's so hard as to appear steel-cored. Not lengthy, like Parker's, this cock broadens near the base to impressive girth. It may not reach bottom, but it sure scrapes hell out of the sides. scrapes hell out of the sides.

Their differing cock types aside, Parker and Dawson could well be brothers. Their blushing cheeks, delicately colored eyelids, and intense gazes match exactly. I could hardly wait for what I assumed was their inevitable standard. star duet

That's the problem with Turned On. Dawson and Parker never get to bring their inspired matching to full consummation. They have sex, but only momentarily. Parker traces Dawson to Mac's Baths, an actual Los Angeles establishment (and a pretty lush looking one at that), where Dawson is employed. He keeps catching sight of Dawson over his shoulder while having sex with a dozen other guys. Sometimes he fantasizes that his partner is Dawson, and we see the two making it, but we never get the grand, culminating tangle that the pairing demands.

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



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
