# "KICKING UP SAND"

On May 26 Edward J. Alofs, Commissioner of the Netherlands Antilles Economic Mission in New York, presented a stained glass window\* replica depicting Peter Stuyvesant and the six Netherlands Antilles islands, to Oliver Pilat, Mayor John V. Lindsay's assistant.

At the presentation ceremony in New York's City Hall Mr. Alofs recalled that in 1647, exactly 320 years ago, Peter Stuyvesant became governor of the city of New York, then known as "New Netherlands".

Peter Stuyvesant is of particular interest to the Netherlands Antilles because he was for a number of years concurrently, governor of both the city of New York and the Netherlands Antilles. Under his dynamic leadership both New York City and the Netherlands Antilles did very well.

It is interesting to note that Peter Stuyvesant lived up to his name which in Dutch means "kicking up sand". In fact it was during a battle on the N.A. Windward Island of St. Maarten that he lost his leg and thus became familiar to all New Yorkers as "old silver nails".

Historically, Stuyvesant has created an unbreakable link between the city of New York and the Netherlands Antilles. As a result of the several millions of dollars which the N.A. spends on importing goods from New York City and because of the well over seventy five thousand New Yorkers who visit these six Caribbean islands each year, the people of the Netherlands Antilles have always had a warm feeling towards New Yorkers. The N.A. has had the greatest admiration for New York City's Governor Peter Stuyvesant, and his achievements. And, today the Netherlands Antilles holds in great esteem the honorable John V. Lindsay, New York City's Mayor, who is "kicking up sand" in a most admirable and modern way.

Mr. Alofs presented the stained glass window, not only as a symbol of warm feeling and appreciation towards the citizens of New York City, but as an expression of our desire to strengthen the economic ties between New York and the Netherlands Antilles through trade, industry and tourism. The Netherlands Antilles Economic Mission is located at 866 United Nations Plaza.



WHAT IS PAPIAMENTO?

Spring that question at the next party and see how many people know the answer! You can top-em all with the following information.

Papiamento is the tongue that comes most naturally to all people born in three of the six islands of the Netherlands Antilles ... Aruba, Bonaire and Curaçao. Local people insist that it is not a dialect but a true language belonging to the Latin group of languages (French, Spanish, Italian, and Portuguese). It has been described as "broken Spanish", and although this is far from correct, it does indicate the greatest linguistic influence. The Dutch language, which is the official language of these islands, is strongly represented along with words from the Portuguese and English, with some Indian words thrown in.

Strangely enough, this obscure language is taught at the university of Amsterdam in the Netherlands. For the amazingly small number of people in the world that speak Papiamento, it sure gets around. Don't be surprised if you hear it on a New York subway!


It is not unusual to find people in Aruba speaking 4 to 7 Janguages. English, Dutch, Spanish, and French or German, are taught in school. You'll know it's Papiamento though, when you hear them say: "Bon Biní... welcome, "Con'ta Bai"... how are you, "Cuanto"... how much, "Masha Danki"... thank you, "Ayo"... goodbye. Just for fun, there's a booklet of Papiamento words and phrases translated into English, available at the local bookstores.

# ARUBA AND THE UNITED STATES BALANCE OF PAYMENT DEFICIT

Shopping in Aruba and in the other N.A. islands does not necessarily contribute to the U.S. balance of payment deficit! Dollars spent on your Aruba holiday will not only bring you sun, fun, and shopping bargains, but they will find their way back to the U.S. as well.

Last year the Netherlands Antilles imported 80 million dollars worth of foodstuffs, clothing, automobiles, building materials, machinery, medicines, cigarettes, etc. from the USA. Against these 80 millions, the U.S. tourist spent about 13 million dollars in the N.A., a ratio of about 6:1. Uncle Sam fares pretty well here, don't you think? While your tourist dollar helps keep our economy healthy, it, encourages our purchases from the States.

So, let this knowledge set your patriotic mind at ease, and enjoy your Aruba holiday to the fullest.



The currency of the ABC islands is the florin (guilder). The exchange in restaurants, hotels, banks, taxis is 1.85 guilders for one dollar. However, most tourist shops give the visitor an extra break by figuring two guilders for the dollar. The guilder is divided into 100 cents, and there are coins of 1 cent, 21/2 cents, 5 cents (square nickel), 10 cents, 25 cents, and the 1 and 21/2 guilder coins. Banknotes are issued in denominations of 21/2, 5, 10, 25, 50, 100, 250 and 500 quilders.

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

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# The "Scoop" on U.S. Customs Regulations

U.S. Customs Regulations need not frustrate the traveling shopper. Shopping in the Netherlands Antilles can result in many a worthwhile saving. Here are some of the facts about the October 1, 1965 Customs Regulations and some tips which will make your shopping in the Netherlands Antilles pleasant and profitable.

The U.S. Customs Regulations allow that:

- Each returning resident may take back with him, free of duty and tax, articles totaling \$ 100.—, providing the stay abroad has exceeded 48 hours and that the \$ 100.— exemption or any part of it has not been used within the preceeding 30 days. (The \$ 100. is based on the fair retail value of the items in the country obtained).
- The advantages to be considered are:
- 1. There is NO LIMIT to the number of articles you can take back, as long as you pay duty on the amount in excess of the \$ 100.—. The duty on purchases in excess of \$ 100.— is levied on the WHOLESALE PRICE of the item IN THE COUNTRY OBTAINED (the customs officer generally subtracts 40% of your retail cost to arrive at the wholesale value).

Now here is where you can effect your savings. For example: Let us say that a camera retailing in the U.S. for \$ 50.— is retailing in Aruba for \$ 30.— U.S. Customs will levy a 15% duty on 60% of the \$30 Aruba price. This is only a duty of \$ 2.70. Thus, the total cost of the camera to you, including the duty you will pay on arrival in the U.S. is only \$32.70! which is still considerably lower than the U.S. retail price of \$ 50.—.

- 2. GIFTS... In addition to the \$ 100.— exemption, each traveller can mail an UNLIMITED NUMBER of gifts valued up to \$ 10. each, to friends and relatives back home, provided the addressee does not receive in a single day gift parcels exceeding the \$ 10. limitation. NO declaration is required, and NO tax is levied. Gifts of liquor and tobacco are not permitted, but perfume, valued at less than one dollar, is permitted in this privilege.
- 3. LOW DUTY items are GOOD BUYS because even when including the duty they will cost you far less than you would pay back home.

Such items as cameras, watches, perfume, cultured pearls and shoes are goods buys.


- 4. FREE OF DUTY are portable typewriters, foreign photographic film, original paintings, drawings and sculptures, foreign language books, antiques over 100 years old... and of all things, caviar and truffles!
- 5. WEAR AND TEAR on items purchased during your trip and used during the trip, such as clothing, cameras, binoculars, watches, will be considered by the customs authorities. When declaring these items, mention that they have been used on the trip and the customs officer will make an appropriate reduction for wear and/or use on the value of the items and on the subsequent duty.
- 6. An UNLIMITED AMOUNT of cigarettes can be brought in dutyfree (within your \$ 100.— exemption) for personal use (New Yorkers, please note!). Cigars, however, are limited to 100.
- 7. DUTY-FREE LIQUOR may total one quart per person over 21. Substantial savings can be realized when taking back more than one quart because even with the duty it comes out cheaper than at the corner liquor store in the U.S. This is especially so on higher priced brand items, and on brandy and wine. E.g. a bottle of liqueur retailing in the U.S. for \$ 9.26 is sold in bond in Aruba at \$ 2.75. The duties levied are \$ 2.35, thus the total cost of this bottle to you, including the U.S. duty, is only \$ 5.10, and your savings amount to \$ 4.16! The savings on five such bottles amount to \$ 20.80.!!!
- 8. Remember that you are not allowed to bring back merchandise originating in Communist China, North Korea, North Vietnam and Cuba.
- 9. SAVE MONEY by using your \$ 100.— exemption for the high duty items. Pay duty on the low duty items.
- 10. Go through U.S. Customs SMOOTHLY by filling out your declaration carefully, keeping your dutiable items together and your sales slips handy.

## WATERSPORTS SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

To protect swimmers and bathers from possible disagreeable encounters with watersport boats, a strip of the sea of about 250 feet along Aruba's Palm Beach has been strictly reserved for swimming and bathing only.

The seaside boundary of this strip is marked by a line of yellow bouys. All boats must stay beyond this line, while swimmers remain inside the line.

To enable boats access to shore, two areas have been designated for this purpose.

These areas are marked with six black bouys, three on each side, connected by floating lines.

There is a notice on the beach warning swimmers to keep out of these areas.



Swimming beyond the line of yellow bouys, or in the areas provided for boats as marked with black bouys, is dangerous and should be avoided.

# UNDERWATER HOLIDAY

There's a growing army of people who march off in skintight rubbersuits, glass masks, and with loaded spearguns.... their stamping grounds are the vast and fascinating territories of the underwaterworld. If you are one of them, you have certainly come to the right place.

Aruba offers the snorkelers and scubadivers excellent waters with beautiful marine life and an endless variety of multicolored tropical fish. Visibility, under favorable conditions is up to 90 feet. The temperature of the water is never below 70°F. and wetsuits are therefore not necessary.

All one needs is a face mask, a snorkel (breathing tube) and the ability to swim. Flippers are helpful, but not necessary.

Snorkeling is often done in rather shallow waters, and it's a sport that youngsters can enjoy right along with you. But soon, the snorkeler is no longer satisfied snatching brief moments in this new environment. He is anxious to learn scuba diving. With scuba gear (Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) a diver can remain underwater for as long as his air supply lasts.

In Aruba's unbelievably clear, beautifully colored waters, there are extensive coral reefs, splendid hunting grounds for spearfishermen. The underwater photographer will find Aruba waters a veritable paradise too. Not far from Palm Beach, off the northwest tip of the island, lies the hulk of a German ship that was scuttled at the beginning of World War II. It's a favorite with the scuba set.

For professionally guided tours or for instructions call Mr. Art Lamour at the Aruba Caribbean Hotel-Casino, who is the manager of the fully equipped Water Sports Department.

Mr. Lamour, whose prime concern is "Safety First", does not recommend indulging in this sport without a boat. All equipment can be rented, even an underwater camera.

Top European and U.S. equipment is also for sale in Aruba.

The Aruba Golf Club welcomes visitors. As you can see by the map on page 7, the 9 hole golf course is located near St. Nicolas on the other end of the island.



# town & country landmarks





COLORFUL WHARFSIDE MARKET ... not far from where the cruise ships dock. Fruits and vegetables for sale from other islands, fish from surrounding waters, all brought by the stoutbeamed sailing vessels seen quietly rocking at anchor in the harbor.



PUBLIC LIBRARY (Tel. 1580) Wilhelminastraat 6: Books loaned to tourists free of charge. In English, Spanish, or Dutch. Open weekdays: 9-12' a.m. and 2:30-5:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Fridays 7-9 p.m.



WILHELMINA PARK, on Oranjestad's seaside, named after the present Queen Juliana's mother, is an ideal spot to enjoy Aruba's famous sunset. The white marble statue of the Netherlands' previous Queen is an impressive centerpiece in this tropical garden.



WILLEM III TOWER, just off L. G. Smith Blvd, and dating back to 1867 has functioned as a prison and a lighthouse. It is now Oranjestad's most colorful "time piece". Plans are afoot to house a historical museum in this interesting structure.



RANCHOSTRAAT'S LIME KILN... a fascinating gigantic size oven employed in the early nineteen hundreds in the processing of "kalk" (lime). It is only a few years back that most of the walls of Aruba's homes were plastered with "kalk" produced in this and in similar ovens.



THE UNUSUAL DIVI DIVI TREE ... shaped by the constant winds, the dividivi tree grows straight up for eight or ten feet and then takes off horizontally. A hiker never needs a compass on Aruba, the divi-divi tree always points southwest!



MT. HOOIBERG... it means "haystack" in Dutch. And that's exactly what the wind and the weather have made the Hooiberg look like. It's a landmark that helps you get your bearings no matter where you go. There are concrete steps to the top, the climb is worth it because the view is magnificent!



PROTESTANT CHURCH... in Oranjestad. One of the town's finest landmarks is this modern new church. Although the church is painted gray, the quaint old houses sport the brightest paint jobs... raspberry red, Delft blue, sunshine yellow and all other brilliant colors giving Oranjestad a charming kaleldoscopic effect.



SECLUDED COVE FOR TWO... as a contrast to the sugar white beaches on the south coast, the quiet little coves to the north are virtually uninhabited. Accessible over land, by car, ...pack a picnic lunch and put yourself in the picture above.



DE OLDE MOLEN, here is truly a little bit of Holland in the Caribbean. An authentic 150 year old windmill, shipped dissembled from Holland and reconstructed a breeze away from Aruba's "côte turquoise" hotel strip. The old "windmill" houses a fine restaurant, bar and swinging nightery.



BEACHSIDE, ARUBA CARIBBEAN HOTEL... with sailfishes at the ready for a sunny ride on the placid Caribbean. The less energetic toast to a well turned tan, cooled by the gentle tradewinds.



NATURAL BRIDGE ... on the northcoast, carved out of solid coral rock over the ages by the crashing sea. The Island Government has built a road along the wildly dramatic coast, and has constructed a parking area and stairs at the site.



A NEW Aruban landmark will be a handsome \$9 million air terminal. The terminal building shaped in the form of a huge seashell will be serving KLM, ALM, TCA, PAN AM, VIASA and probably 2 or 3 more airlines when finished.



UNIQUE to the Caribbean are Aruba's fascinating boulders and rock formations presumed to have been shaped and fashioned by the wind and/or the sea. The largest group of boulders is clustered in Ayó, 20 minutes drive from either Oranjestad or San Nicolas. The particular rock in the picture called the "masked pinhead" is located on the grounds of the Aruba Caribbean Hotel, having been "trans-scaped" from Ayó.

# **RIJSTTAFEL, AN EXOTIC CULINARY ADVENTURE IN ARUBA**

Rijsttafel, the "Asian Smorgasbord" which the Dutch Shell and Civil Service ex-patriates adopted from the East Indies and introduced to the West Indies, is often served in several Aruba restaurants and hotel diningrooms.

Because Rijsttafel (sounds like heist-waffle) consists of anywhere from 15 to 40 separate and unusual dishes, it is generally prepared for a group of diners. Some obliging managers, however, will serve a 10 or 15 dish rijsttafel for one, two or three couples. It does take quite a bit of doing though, so whenever you hear of a rijsttafel on the menu, strike while the "pot" is hot because it's an experience not to be missed!

You begin this gargantuan feast unobtrusively enough with a serving of plain, white rice. Heaping the rice on to the center of your plate, and using the rice as a "base of operations", serve yourself portion after portion of pork, shrimp, chicken, beef, fish and vegetables around and on top of the rice until your plate is well filled with broiled, stewed and fried delicacies.

"Goreng" are the fried foods, "Atjar" the pickles, "Sate" the tiny bamboo 'kebab' of pork cubes. "Kroepoek" resembles overgrown potato chips, but is really a batter of shrimp juice and casava roots, dried, sliced and deep fried to serve as bread or crackers to crunch upon between spoonfuls of rijsttafel. "Kroepoek" (sounds like crew-puck) is also great at cocktail time in place of the customary nuts or chips.

With your tablespoon in the right hand, take some rice, forking onto the spoon of rice, one of the delicacies which border your plate. This way you will savor the full taste of each different preparation together with its own particular blend of spices and unusual flavors. The rice serves as a filling, albeit bland base enabling you to keep your taste buds clean and sharp ready for the next spoonful!

Be careful of the "sambals", which are innocent looking relishes that turn out to be flavored blends of hot pepper!


Although there is an Indonesian wine which was traditionally served with rijsttafel, an ice cold beer is truly the perfect mate ... especially so after you've inadvertantly spooned a bit too much sambal onto your tongue.

Another Indonesian meal which you will love, is "Nassi-Goreng", a "mini" rijsttafel of fried rice and fewer side dishes (chopped meats, chicken, shrimps and vegetables are cooked and added to the rice). Requiring less preparation, Nassi-Goreng can always be found on Chinese restaurant menus in the Antilles; and it is served at least weekly, if not daily, in most of the hotel dining rooms.



# **ISLAND HOPPING IN THE NETHERLANDS ANTILLES**



A visit to Aruba is not complete without a stop at one or all of our sister islands. It's less than a 30 minute hop to Curaçao with its famous free port shops and swinging pontoon bridge called Queen Emma. Yes, island hopping in the Netherlands Antilles is fun **and inexpensive** as in many cases your ticket from abroad may be extended to one or more of the islands at little or no cost.


