— President Hugo Chavez's crusade to transform Venezuela into a socialist state, which has bitterly divided the nation, was put to the

nearly 14 years in power on Sunday in a closely fought presidential election.

Both camps said turnout was high, with millions of Venezuelans casting ballots. Long lines formed at many polling centers, with queues of hundreds of voters snaking along sidewalks and around blocks in many parts of Caracas.

Polling places were scheduled to begin closing at 6 p.m. local time, but stations remained open wherever voters were still waiting in line at the close. Officials began counting ballots at stations where voting finished, but electoral officials gave no indication of when they might begin releasing partial returns.

Chavez's challenger, Henrique Capriles, united the opposition in a contest be-

tween two sides that distrust each other so deeply that some expressed concerns whether a close election result would be respected.

## Union: Border agents opened fire on each other

**PHOENIX (AP)** — The U.S. Border Patrol agent killed last week in a shooting in southern Arizona apparently opened fire on two fellow

agents thinking they were armed smugglers and was killed when they returned fire, the head of the Border Patrol agents' union said Sunday.

The two sets of agents ap-

proached an area where a sensor had been activated early Tuesday from different directions early Tuesday and encountered each other in an area of heavy brush, National Bor-

der Patrol Council president George McCubbin said. Agent Nicholas Ivie apparently opened fire first and wounded one of the other agents but was killed in the return fire.

"I don't know what it was he saw or heard that triggered this whole event," McCubbin said. "Unfortunately it resulted in his death and another agent injured."

Acting Cochise County Sheriff Rod Rothrock confirmed the scenario but would not say if Ivie was the first to shoot, saying that was up to the federal agencies involved.

The new details add to a FBI statement Friday that the shooting appeared to be a friendly fire incident that involved no one but the agents.

Sensors are set up in different areas along the U.S.-

Mexico border to detect smugglers or illegal immigrants, with Border Patrol agents responding when they're set off. The shooting occurred in a rugged hilly area about five miles north of the border near Bisbee, Arizona, an area known for illegal trafficking.

McCubbin and Rothrock both said the two sets of agents knew the others were heading to the area on foot but apparently didn't know they were so close. McCubbin said he'd been briefed by the agency, while Rothrock's agency has been involved with the investigation.

"It was dark, very, very rugged terrain, and what they could see of each other was further obscured by the fact that there was brush and cacti and stuff like that between them," Rothrock said.

# Chinese tech giants pose security threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Intelligence Committee is warning that China's two leading technology firms pose a major security threat to the United States.

The panel says regulators should block mergers and acquisitions in the U.S. by Huawei Technologies Ltd. and ZTE Corp. It also ad-

vises that U.S. government systems not include equipment from the two firms, and that private U.S. companies avoid business with them.

The results of the committee's yearlong probe, due to be released Monday, could hamper Huawei and ZTE's ambitions to expand their business in America.

## Venezuela election sees unprecedented turnout

"We will recognize the results, whatever they are," Chavez told reporters after casting his vote in Caracas. Chavez was greeted at the polling center by American actor Danny Glover and Guatemalan Nobel Peace Prize laureate Rigoberta Menchu. He said he was pleased to see a "massive turnout." Capriles said after voting that the election had been free of violence. "We've shown the world that we're resolving our differences peacefully through the vote, as it should be," Capriles said. He noted that he had never lost an election and said he was wearing his "lucky" brown suede shoes.

"Today Venezuela is going to win," Capriles said. "We're going to respect what the people say."

The stakes in the country with the world's largest known oil reserves couldn't be higher.

If Chavez wins a new sixyear term, he gets a free hand to push for an even bigger state role in the economy, further limit dissent and continue to befriend rivals of the United States. With a Capriles win, an abrupt foreign policy shift can be expected, including halting preferential oil deals with allies such as Cuba, along with a loosening of state economic controls and an increase in private investment. A tense transition would likely follow until the January inauguration because Chavez's political machine thoroughly controls the wheels of government.

Some Venezuelans were nervous about what might happen if disputes erupt over the election's announced outcome. "There's a little anxiety on one side and also on the other," said Deyanira Duarte, who voted for Capriles

At many polling places,

voters started lining up hours before polls opened at dawn. Some said they waited in line for more than four hours to vote, while in other areas the lines moved more quickly.

Some passed the time outside polling centers with foldina chairs, chattina with relatives and friends. Others held umbrellas to block the sun. Maria Leonis was selling CDs of Chavez's campaign theme music on a sidewalk next to a polling center. "Today I've sold about 100 CDs, just Chavez's song," Leonis said, adding that she supported Chavez because "I want to keep seeing change." Chavez's critics said the president has inflamed divisions by labeling his opponents "fascists," "Yankees" and "neo-Nazis," while Chavez's loyalists alleged Capriles would halt generous government proarams that assist the poor. "I'm really tired of all this polarization," said Lissette a 39-year-old Garcia, clothes seller and Capriles supporter who voted in the affluent Caracas district of Las Mercedes.

## Obama raises California cash for race's last month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fresh off his strongest fundraising month this year, President Barack Obama is looking to raise millions of dollars from celebrities and wealthy donors in California with just one month left in a tightening race.

The two-day swing through the solidly Democratic state highlights the critical role that fundraising will play in the campaign's final weeks as Obama and his Republican rival, Mitt Romney, escalate their barrage of television ads in competitive states like Ohio in the run-up to the Nov. 6 election. The president is to return there Tuesday.

Romney, campaigning in up-for-grabs Florida, sought to build on the momentum from a debate performance last week that even Democrats conceded was "masterful." The Republican told a crowd of about 12,000 in Port St. Lucie that he had enjoyed himself,

ticking off a list of Obama shortcomings he said he had exposed during the first debate

we're hearing his excuses," Romney said. "And next January we'll be watching him leave the White House for the last time."

As Romney finished speak-

scoring the amplified role that foreign affairs and the Middle East is playing as the presidential race draws to a close. Romney on Monday plans a major foreign policy address at the Virginia Military Institute, intended to throw Obama back on his heels over his handling of unrest in Libya and elsewhere.

Obama campaign spokeswoman Jennifer Psaki, dismissing what she called Romney's fourth or fifth attempt to explain his global intentions, said the bar is high for Romney to convince voters he's prepared to be commander in chief. "We are not going to be lectured by someone who's been an unmitigated disaster on foreign policy every time he sticks his toe in the foreign policy waters," Psaki said aboard Air Force One as Obama made his way to California.

Even as Romney sought to reap further rewards from his debate performance, a string of good news for the president threatened to steal the former Massachusetts governor's spotlight. A jobs report Friday showing

unemployment at the lowest levels of Obama's presidency, down to 7.8 percent, was quickly followed Saturday by a fundraising report showing Obama and Democrats had raised \$181 million in September. It was their best fundraising month of the campaign, but fell short of their record \$190 million raised in September 2008 as the president campaigned for his first term.

Romney's campaign has not released its report for the month, and Republicans sought to downplay Obama's financial advantage. The party's national chairman, Reince Priebus, said he had been counting all along on being outraised by Obama and Democrats. "This isn't going to come down to money. This is going to come down to heart," Priebus said. "We'll beat them on the ground, and we'll have all the money we need to be competitive."

## Pharmacy linked to outbreak issues recall

FRAMINGHAM, Massachu**setts (AP)** — The pharmacy that distributed a steroid linked to an outbreak of fungal meningitis has issued a voluntary recall of all of its products, calling the move a precautionary measure.

The New England Compounding Center announced the recall over the weekend. The company said in a news release that the move was taken out of an abundance of caution because of the risk of contamination. It says there is no indication that any other products have been contaminated.

The Food and Drug Administration had previously told health professionals not to use any products distributed by the center.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention posted updated figures to its website Sunday showing

there are now more than 90 confirmed cases of the rare form of fungal meningitis. The outbreak spans nine states and has killed at least seven people.

The states with reported cases are: Florida, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, North Carolina, Ohio, Tennessee and Virginia. The steroid linked to the outbreak had already been recalled, and health officials have been scrambling to notify anyone who may have received an injection of it. The Massachusetts pharmacy that made it has said it is cooperating with investigators.

It is not yet known exactly how many people may have been affected, though it could affect hundreds or even thousands of people who received the steroid injections for back pain from July to Septem-

officer fatally shot a University of South Alabama freshman who was naked and had been banging on a window at police headauarters. Campus officials didn't

give any indication that Gil Collar, 18, had a weapon when he was shot. A university spokesman said he was fatally wounded about 1:30 a.m. Saturday after an officer heard a bang on a window and went outside to investigate.

A statement issued by university spokesman Keith Ayers said Collar, who wrestled in high school before enrolling at South Alabama, assumed a "fighting stance" and chased an officer before being shot. The officer tried to retreat numerous times to defuse the situation before opening fire, the school said.

But sophomore Tyler Kendrick said campus authorities haven't provided any satisfying answers about why Collar was killed.

"Really, it just upsets me that there's no other way student rather than shoot-

I don't understand that,"

Student Joshua Frye said it seemed the officer could have used something other than a firearm to stop Collar. "What I feel is that a cop has more than a gun," he said.

The officer was placed on paid leave, and an autopsy will determine if drugs or alcohol were involved.

Campus officials said the confrontation was recorded by security cameras. The video and other information has been turned over to the district attorney and the Mobile County Sheriff's Office, which will review the shooting.

Collar was the second person killed on the South Alabama campus since last year.

A university freshman was charged with murder in the fatal stabbing of another teenager who was slain in an on-campus apartment in July 2011. The victim was a visitor to campus and was not enrolled, authorities said.

## Some Republicans see little choice but to back Akin

**JOHN ELIGON** © 2012 New York Times KANSAS CITY, Mo. - For establishment Republicans, it is decision time in the Missouri Senate race.

Should they return to Rep. Todd Akin's corner?

Many quickly withdrew their support for Akin weeks ago after his controversial comments about abortion and belief that victims of "legitimate rape" have a biological mechanism to fight off pregnancy, hoping to force him aside so another Republican candidate could battle the Democratic incumbent, Sen. Claire McCaskill.

But Akin called their bluff. He stayed in the race, reckoning that election math would oblige them to stick with him.

Now, with Akin's name legally bound to the ballot, the election approaching and new polling data presenting a clearer idea of his chances, Republicans are deliberating whether to renege on their reneging.

It is one of the trickiest dilemmas facing Republicans this election cycle: Whether to give up on a race that could help decide which party controls "Are they willing to let a guy who should win a seat lose a seat because they sat on their hands?" asked Michael Centanni, the chair-

man of Freedom's Defense

the U.S. Senate or stand by Akin and risk hurting Republican candidates in other states.

Fund, which announced late last month that it would spend a quarter of a million dollars in support of Akin. "They're going to be in a much worse situation if he ends up losing by a point and they sat on the sidelines."

Newt Gingrich, who attended a fundraiser for Akin on Sept. 24 near St. Louis, said Republicans who rushed to judgment needed to consider the error of their decision.

"Akin's not the only one who made a mistake," Gingrich said in an interview. "Just as he had to eat a little bit of crow, there are some other folks" who will,

Some of the deep-pocketed donors, most notably the National Republican Senatorial Committee, who withdrew their financing and support of Akin will inevitably return, Ginarich said.

"I don't see how they'll avoid getting in the race," he added. But Republicans should focus on more than the Senate math, said John C. Danforth, a former Republican senator from Missouri who distanced himself from Akin after the comments in August.

"Akin has come to symbolize a version of the Republican Party that's just not acceptable to an awful lot of people," Danforth said in an interview. "I don't know if he can win or not in the election in the Senate race, but I think this is bigger than one Senate seat. I think it's the brand of the Republican Party, and I think he taints the Republican Party." While Danforth is maintaining his opposition to Akin, other Republicans are returning to his corner. Sen. Roy Blunt of Missouri and two other former senators from the state, Christopher S. Bond and Jim Talent, recently endorsed Akin after initially urging him to step aside after his comments about rape and abortion. "They're going to have to

explain to voters whether they support his position on these issues or whether they're just acting in political expediency," said Caitlin Legacki, a spokeswoman for McCaskill.

Blunt declined a request for an interview. But in a statement released shortly after the Sept. 25 deadline for dropping out of the race, he gave Akin an endorsement that sounded more obligatory than excited.

"Congressman Akin and I don't agree on everything, but he and I agree the Senate majority must change," Blunt said. "From Governor Romney to the county courthouse, I'll be working for the Republican ticket in Missouri, and that includes Todd Akin."□

## Mother of police victim: 'I want no cover-up'

**NEW YORK** - The mother of an unarmed man who was fatally shot by a police detective after being pulled over on a highway in Queens made a tearful plea this weekend for a full and thorough inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the shooting of her son, Noel Polanco.

"I'm not going to give up until I get justice," Cecilia Reyes told a crowd of a

few hundred at the offices of the Rev. Al Sharpton's National Action Network in Harlem. "I want justice, I want no cover-up. I want answers," she said as Sharpton stood alongside her. Polanco, 22, was driving on the Grand Central Parkway just after 5 a.m. Friday when he was pulled over by uniformed officers, members of the Emergency Service Unit, riding in unmarked vans, who said that he had twice cut them off.

Officers, who had been on their way to execute a search warrant in Brooklyn, rushed toward the car "like an army," said one of Polanco's passengers, Diane Defarri. A second passenger, an off-duty police officer named Vanessa Rodriguez, was asleep in the back seat. As the officers surrounded Polanco's car they shouted for those inside to show their hands, Defarri said, adding that Polanco's hands were on

the steering wheel of his black Honda.

A moment later a detective, Hassan Hamdy, fired a single shot that struck Polanco in the abdomen and killed him.

On Friday evening, Police Commissioner Raymond W. Kelly visited Reyes at her home. Sharpton said Saturday morning that he and others would support her call for a full investigation and explanation of what happened.





## NYC woman decides to stay on life support

**NEW YORK** – A terminally ill Queens woman who won a court battle against her parents to allow a hospital to disconnect a breathing tube has decided that she wants to live out the rest of her life, the woman's lawyer said this weekend.

That decision represents a striking change in direction for SungEun Grace Lee, 28, a bank financial manager who is paralyzed from the neck down and forced to communicate by blinking – once for yes, twice for no – or by mouthing words.

On Friday, a four-judge appellate court panel upheld a lower-court ruling that she was mentally capable of making decisions about her own care, handing a defeat to her parents, who argued that her medicated state had made her incompetent.

Her lawyer, David A. Smith, said that Lee told him of her decision from her hospital bed Saturday morning and said that she had given her father, the Rev. Man Ho Lee, a pastor in a Korean church in Queens the she could no longer bear to live on life support and wanted to be allowed to die. Her parents said that

she was being pressured by doctors who were able to influence her because she was heavily medicated.

Of Lee's apparent change of heart, Smith said: "When I asked her if she's doing this to make peace with her parents, she told me she was doing it to make peace with her parents and to make peace with God."

A North Shore spokesman, Terry Lynam, said the hospital would honor her wishes, "whatever they may be." Her parents could not immediately be reached for comment, and her brother, Paul Lee, did not immediately respond to an email about the developments. Ethicists said it was unusual for a life-support case in

which the patient was conscious to become so acrimonious.

"I think in other cultures the locus of decision-making is more with the family than the patient," said Dr. J. Randall Curtis, director of the palliative care center at University of Washington. "It's not terribly unusual in our increasingly multicultural society to have this clash, where Westerntrained clinicians really view the patient as the sole determinant of all decisionmaking and the family sees it different."

Curtis said at least one famous study of seriously ill patients found that even in the West most defer to relatives in a conflict over their treatment.

## Israeli jets fly mock raids over south Lebanon

BEIRUT (AP) — Israeli warplanes swooped low over Lebanese villages Sunday in a menacing show of force apparently aimed at the Hezbollah guerrilla group after a mysterious raid by an unmanned aircraft that was shot out of Israeli skies over the weekend.

Israel was still investigating Saturday's incident, but Hezbollah quickly emerged as the leading suspect because it has an arsenal of sophisticated Iranian weapons and a history of trying to deploy similar aircraft.

The Israeli military said the drone approached Israel's southern Mediterranean coast and flew deep into Israeli airspace before warplanes shot it down about 20 minutes later. Israeli news reports said the drone was not carrying explosives and appeared to be on a reconnaissance mission.

Military officials would not say where the drone originated or who produced it, but they ruled out the Gaza Strip, which is ruled by Hamas, a group not known to possess drones. That left Hezbollah as the most likely culprit and suggested the drone may have flown with the blessing of Iran. Tensions are high between Israel and Iran over Tehran's suspect nuclear program.

"It is an Iranian drone that was launched by Hezbollah," Israeli lawmaker Miri Regev, a former chief spokeswoman for the Israeli military, wrote on her Twitter feed. "Hezbollah and Iran continue to try to collect information in every possible way in order to harm Israel."

She did not offer any further

evidence and was not immediately available for comment

Hezbollah officials would not comment on speculation that the group had launched the drone. The Israeli dailies Yediot Ahronot and Maariv published maps based on military "estimates" that claimed to show the route taken by the drone.

The maps said the aircraft

took off south of the Lebanese coastal city of Sidon, headed south and then turned east over the Gaza Strip and into Israel. Yediot also claimed the drone was made in Iran.

Sunday's Israeli air raids, buzzing over pro-Hezbollah villages in southern Lebanon, appeared to be aimed at reminding the guerrilla group of Israel's air superiority.

At times of heightened tensions, the Israeli air force often carries out mock raids over Lebanese territory. Israel has U.S.-made F-15 and F-16 warplanes, but it was not clear exactly what type of planes were flown Sunday.

Lebanon's national news agency said the planes flew low over the market town of Nabatiyeh and nearby villages.

With a formidable arsenal that rivals that of the Lebanese army, Hezbollah is already under pressure in Lebanon from rivals who accuse it of putting Lebanon at risk of getting sucked into regional turmoil.

## France security on alert at religious sites

PARIS (AP) — France is boosting security at Jewish and other religious sites after blanks were fired at a synagogue and police accused a suspected cell of radical Islamists of ties to a grenade attack on a kosher grocery.

President Francois Hollande sought Sunday to allay tensions between Jews and Muslims aggravated by a recent series of violent incidents in the country

Hollande singled out hateful extremists for criticism and urged respect for all religions in a country that is officially secular, but which has Western Europe's largest Jewish and Muslim communities.

He said that authorities "in the coming days, in the coming hours" would increase security at religious sites so they won't be subject to the kind of attack that targeted a synagogue in the Paris suburb of Argen-

teuil on Saturday night. A synagogue representative said witnesses heard what sounded like a weapon being fired and that police said blanks had been fired and empty bullet casings found. Local police would not comment on the incident to the AP. Services were canceled at the synagogue Saturday night because of the incident, the representative said on condition of anonymity because a police investigation is under way.

No one was injured, though the rabbi and about a dozen others were inside the synagogue at the time, according to the Jewish Community Protection Service, a group set up to monitor anti-Semitic incidents in France. The incident came hours after police killed one man and arrested 11 in raids

## Kuwaiti ruler sets up vote

KUWAIT CITY (AP) - KUwait's ruler dissolved parliament Sunday, a step toward ending months of political gridlock and calling the second elections this year that could again swing in favor of opposition groups led by Islamist factions. The move by Kuwait's Western-allied emir, announced on staterun media, followed a failed attempt last month by the government to overturn a voting district law that appeared to favor the opposition. New elections must now be held within 60 days. Kuwait is one of America's most strategic Gulf military allies. Its strategic importance to Washington rose sharply after the U.S. troop withdrawal from Iraq in December. It is now the hub for U.S. ground forces in the Gulf region, where the U.S. and its Arab allies seek to counter Iran's military buildup. Kuwait has been locked in a political limbo for months as the government tried to challenge the voting system in the February elections, which gave Islamists and allies control of the 50-seat

Turkey and Syria fired artillery and mortars across their volatile border for a fifth consecutive day on Sunday, in one of the most serious and prolonged flare-ups of violence along the frontier.

The exchange of fire stoked fears that Syria's civil war will escalate into a regional conflagration drawing in NATO member Turkey, once an ally of President Bashar Assad but now a key supporter of the rebels fighting to topple him.

Turkish Foreign Minister Ahmet Davutoalu had warned on Saturday that Ankara would respond forcefully to each errant Syrian shell that lands on Turkish soil.

Ankara's warning was coupled by an apparent diplomatic push by the Turkish leadership to promote Syrian Vice President Farouk al-Sharaa as a possible figure to head a transitional administration

In an interview with Turkish state television TRT Saturday, Davutoglu said that al-Sharaa was a figure "whose hands are not contaminated in blood" and

been a controversial figure since the start of the upris-

He appeared in public in late August for the first time in weeks, ending reposition. A Sunni from the southern town of Daraa, birthplace of the Syrian uprising, al-Sharaa's silence since the start of the uprising made him a prime candidate for rumors that he broke with the regime.

"No one knows the system better than Farouk al-Sharaa," said Davutoglu, adding that al-Sharaa has not been involved in the violence and massacres in Svria.

The Syrian opposition is deeply fragmented, and various factions would likely disagree on whether they would accept him to lead a transitional government. Meanwhile, there was little sign that the exchange of fire near the border, although still at a fairly low level, was ebbing. It began five days ago when a Syrian shell killed five civilians in a Turkish border town. Turkey's parliament subsequently approved a bill that would allow cross

border military operations there. Damascus offered a rare apology, but shells and mortar rounds continue to fly into Turkish territory.

## 56 cities gripped by anti-austerity protests

MADRID (AP) — Tens of thousands of people marched in 56 Spanish cities Sunday to protest punishing austerity cuts they say will only increase unemployment and job insecurity in a country experiencing its second recession in three years and record high unemployment. 20,000 people marched in Madrid behind a banner that said, "They want to ruin the country. We have to stop them." The rally in Spain's capital was supported by 150 organizations. Protesters chanted slogans against cuts and waved placards reading "youth without jobs, society with no future." That is a reference to the youth unemployment rate, which surpasses 50 percent. Spain's overall jobless

rate is nearly 25 percent and social unrest is on the rise.

"They are abusing the lower social classes," 54-year-old teacher Luis Diaz said. "By backing banks, they are torturing the working class and badly affecting public education, health care and pensions when what they should be doing is exactly the opposite."

Trade union leaders said the marches warned the government that tempers were rising and a general strike was brewing.

Workers Commissions union spokesman Ignacio Fernandez Toxo said a likely date for the strike could be as early as Nov. 14.

The government has implemented tough austerity measures over its nine months in office.

## Pakistan blocks anti-US protest in tribal region

TANK, Pakistan (AP) — The Pakistani military blocked a convoy carrying thousands of Pakistanis and a small contingent of U.S. anti-war activists from entering a lawless tribal region along the border with Afghanistan on Sunday to protest American drone strikes.

The group, led by cricket star turned politician Imran Khan and his political party, was turned back just miles from the border of South Waziristan.

After an hour of fruitless negotiations, Khan announced that the caravan would backtrack to the city of Tank, about 15 kilometers (nine miles) away. There, he delivered a speech to the crowd of about 10,000. Khan has harshly criticized the Pakistani government's cooperation with Washington in the fight against Islamist militants.

He has been especially out-

spoken against U.S. drone strikes targeting militants and has argued that Islamabad's alliance with Washington is the main reason Pakistan is facing a homegrown Taliban insurgency.

## Parliament votes to remove PM

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libya's parliament ousted the country's new prime minister in a no-confidence vote on Sunday, the latest blow to hopes that political factions could agree on a government charged with restoring stability after last year's civil

Mustafa Abushagur was the first prime minister to be elected after the 2011 overthrow of dictator Moammar Gadhafi. He represented an offshoot of the country's oldest anti-Gadhafi opposition movement, and was considered a compromise candidate acceptable to both liberals and Islamists.

But his proposed Cabinet was struck down by a legislature representing dozens of divided tribes, towns, and regions across the country, many of whom feel they are owed the spoils of victory over Gadhafi. He was forced to withdraw his first ministerial line-up under pressure and his second at-

tempt to submit one resulted in his ouster. In a short statement on Libya al-Wataniya TV after the vote, Abushagur said he respected the decision made by the General National Congress as part of Libya's democracy but warned of instability if it takes too long to elect his replacement.

"There should be quickness in the election of the prime minister and formation of the government so the country does not slip into a vacuum," he said.

He had 25 days from his Sep. 12 appointment by parliament to form a Cabinet and win the legislature's approval, but that deadline expired on Sunday. The Congress voted 125 to 44 in favor of removing him as prime minister, with 17 abstaining from voting. He had just put forth 10 names for key ministerial posts Sunday when the noconfidence vote was held.

Until a replacement can be elected by the parliament, management of Libya's government is in the hands of the legislature.

## Brazilians voting in 'Clean Record' elections

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Brazil's nationwide municipal elections Sunday may be most notable for who won't be taking office.

A newly effective "Clean Record" good-governance law bars people convicted of a wide range of crimes from serving in political office. This is the first full nationwide election held under the measure since it was upheld by Brazil's Supreme Court.

Observers say the bill is a watershed in Brazilian politics, long dominated by strongmen who milk the system for personal gain and that of their cronies and who often resort to shady tactics to hold onto power.

"It's a radical change of culture, vision and moral compass," said Jorge Sanchez, president of the anti-corruption watchdog group Amarribo Brasil. "It's the beginning of a long, slow process, but one that I'm confident will change the political landscape here in five to 10 years so that it's upstanding people and not the tainted ones who will start to naturally gravitate toward politics." Under the measure, those convicted of charges such as fraud, drug trafficking, money-laundering, sexual assault and murder are barred from running for public office for eight years. Previously, those with criminal records were only ineligible if their cases

rare show of grassroots organizing. Supporters flooded lawmakers with some 4 million emails as well as a 1.3 million-signature petition. The mobilization was so effective that even those legislators who spoke against the measure ended up voting for it, and it passed the Senate unanimously in 2010.

Voters lining up in Rio's beachside neighborhood of Ipanema to choose their mayor welcomed the law, but some held back their judgment of its effectiveness, saying they'd have to see it work before believing it was really going to change the culture.

"It's about time," said Vinicius da Mata Oliveira, a retiree. "My whole life I've been seeing people run for office that I wouldn't trust to take care of my dog. The country is changing for the better; this is an essential part of that change."

Waiting next to him, Fernando de Aguiar Fonseca said he'd need to see dirty candidates not being allowed to take office before he'd really believe the law was here to stay.

"Some laws here don't 'stick'," he said. "I want to see them thrown out. I want

The law was the fruit of a to see these guys whose families have power, who have friends and connections and important patrons in politics, not be allowed to take office. Then I'll say, yes, things are changing." Already, kinks emerged.

> Out of the around 480,000 candidates running mayor or city council in 5,565 cities and towns across Brazil, 2,969 are being examined by Brazil's top electoral court in connection with the Clean Record law. The volume of red-flagged candidacies is so high that the court has processed only 764 of them to date — and it has not released a list of the candidates it has barred from taking office even if they win their races.

A spokeswoman for the court said that the list will be released in the coming days and that the court hopes to get through all the cases by December, before the newly elected officials take office. If the court disqualifies a winning candidate, the secondplace finisher would take office instead.

The Clean Record law is part of a broader crackdown on corruption that has swept Brazil.

## Rebels burn 3 helicopters in Peru

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Marxist Shining Path rebels have burned three helicopters that were being used by an international gas pipeline consortium at a jungle airstrip in Peru on Saturday, the country's military announced.

The attack came as U.S. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta was visiting Peru, though there was no immediate indication it was related.

The military Joint Command spokesman, Col. Alejandro Lujan, said no one was injured or kidnapped in the attack well before dawn in the town of Kiteni in south-Central Peru. He said troops had been sent to the airstrip, which is normally guarded by private

The helicopters were owned by local companies and had been contracted by the consortium known as Transportadora de Gas del Peru, made up of Argentine, U.S. Algerian, Korean, French and Belgian companies.

Kiteni Mayor Hugo Chavez said the airport "is almost a kilometer (about half a mile) away from the center of the town and there has never before been an attack of that type in the area."

The original Shining Path largely disappeared after police caught its messianic founder Abimael Guzman in 1992, but small remnants have been staging a comeback in recent vears.





"I was angry at myself for the fumble and I just used it," Bradshaw said. "I was disappointed with the fumble, but you put it out of your mind. I knew I was cool. We knew the running game was there, we were confident."

The passing game was there, too. Victor Cruz made a career-best three touchdown catches. Eli Manning hit Cruz for scores of 3, 7 and 28 yards, prompting Cruz's trademark salsa in the end zone after each touchdown.

## Brady tops Manning, Patriots beat Broncos 31-21

FOXBOROUGH, Mass.

(AP)—Tom Brady won his latest showdown with Peyton Manning with the help of a career-high 151 yards rushing from Stevan Ridley and the New England Patriots beat the Denver Broncos 31-21 on Sunday.

In the 13th meeting between the star quarter-backs, and first since Manning left the Indianapolis Colts, Brady directed four scoring marches of at least 80 yards and the Patriots rushed for 252 yards.

Brady improved to 9-4 against Manning, He completed 23 of 31 passes for 223 yards and one touchdown and ran for another. Manning was 31 of 44 for 345 yards and three touch-



by any player on the ATP tour. Diokovic has also won four titles this year, including defending his Australian Open title.

# Grace wraps 2-shot win at Dunhill Links

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) — Branden Grace won his fourth European Tour victory of the season Sunday by shooting a 2-under 70 to protect his lead and win the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship by two shots.

The South African led from the first round and finished with a 22-under total of 266 to hold off Thorbjorn Olesen of Denmark, who finished second after a 68. Alexander Noren of Sweden (69) was another two shots back in third.

"It's just awesome to win an event at St. Andrews as I have really dreamt of this moment all my life," said Grace, who shot a spectacular first round 60 at Klngsbarns.

It was Grace's fifth victory of the year overall after also winning a Sunshine Tour event at Fancourt in South Africa.

Another South African, George Coetzee,

equaled the Old Course record that had been set on Thursday with a 10-under 62 for a share of fifth place.

The 24-year-old Grace is the youngest winner of the tournament and his \$800,000 first prize moves him to third in the Race to Dubai money list.








## Another use for home HIV test: screening partners

The first rapid home testing kit for HIV has just gone on sale for \$40, marketed as a way for people to find out privately if they have the virus that causes AIDS.

But some experts and advocates say that another use, unadvertised, for the OraQuick test – to screen potential sexual partners – may become equally popular and even help slow an epidemic stuck at 50,000 new infections each year in the United States.

There are reasons to think that screening might make a difference. Studies have found that a significant minority of people who are HIV-positive either lie about their status or keep it secret, infecting unsuspecting partners.

And though the manufacturer, OraSure Technologies, is not promoting the use of the test for screening, 70 percent of the 4,000 men and women in the company's clinical trials said they would either definitely or very likely use it

that way. Some even suggested that the company sell boxes of two so couples could be tested together. The only study of the practice – a small one involving

The study was published online in August by the journal AIDS and Behavior.

"If it becomes a community norm, people may start testing their partners," said

27 gay men who frequently had sex with virtual strangers without using condoms – found that it probably prevented some infections.

Alex Carballo-Dieguez, the lead author of the study, who is a psychology professor at Columbia University and the associate director of the HIV Center for Clinical and Behavioral Studies at the New York State Psychiatric Institute. "On sex sites now, men advertise themselves as 'drug-and-disease-free.' They could start saying 'D-and-D-free, and willing to prove it."'

Other AIDS experts had doubts. Some thought \$40 was too much for people who need to screen multiple partners. Others said that men and women who are not comfortable demanding that their partners wear condoms would be unable to insist on a test.

And some, including Anthony S. Fauci, the country's best-known AIDS doctor, worried that a negative test could lead partners to forgo condoms, removing the barrier to both HIV and other diseases like aonorrhea. The OraQuick test is imperfect. It is nearly 100 percent accurate when it indicates that someone is not infected and, in fact, is not. But it is only about 93 percent accurate when it says that someone is not infected and the person actually does have the virus, though the body is not yet producing the antibodies that the test detects.

The men in Carballo-Dieguez's study were given 16 tests each and followed for three months. None of them had unprotected sex with anyone who tested positive.

Of the 101 partners they tested, 10 were positive. In six cases, it was how the partner first learned he was infected. (Ten percent is a very high success rate for HIV testing, experts said.)

Twenty-three other partners refused testing. Two, after being asked, admitted knowing they were infected. Seven men got angry, and one stomped on the kit. One man walked out saying he wanted to be alone and broke off contact.

Asking usually did not ruin the moment's intimacy, the men said. Some pairs did the tests together, swabbing each other's gums. Some passed the 20-minute wait talking, playing video games or in foreplay. One 47-year-old man found the wait helpful, telling the researchers, "It gives you that extra 20 minutes to decide, 'OK, if this comes back negative, am I really ready to bareback?"' - slang for having sex without a condom. Carballo-Dieguez people's decision said about whether to screen would depend on various factors, including the test's price and how comfortable they were with its imperfect accuracy.

OraSure appears ambivalent about partner screening. AIDS experts said the company might fear lawsuits by people infected by partners who got false negatives – a possibility it declined to comment on.

## The classroom evolves as technology incubator

**SEATTLE** – Leandre Nsabi, a senior at Rainier Beach High School here, received some bluntly practical advice from an instructor recently. "My teacher said there's a lot of money to be made in computer science," Leandre said. "It could be really helpful in the future."

That teacher, Steven Edouard, knows a few things about the subject. When he is not volunteering as a computer science instructor four days a week, Edouard works at Microsoft. He is one of 110 engineers from high-tech companies who are part of a Microsoft program aimed at getting high school students hooked on computer science, so they go on to pursue careers in the field

In doing so, Microsoft is taking an unusual approach to tackling a shortage of computer science graduates - one of the most serious issues facing the technology industry, and a broader challenge for the nation's

There are likely to be 150,000 computing jobs opening up each year through 2020, according to an analysis of federal forecasts by the Association for Computing Machinery, a professional society for computing researchers. But despite the hoopla around startup celebrities like Mark Zuckerberg of Facebook, fewer than 14,000 U.S. students received undergraduate degrees in computer science last year, the Computing Research Association estimates. And the wider job market remains weak.

"People can't get jobs, and we have jobs that can't be filled," Brad Smith, Microsoft's general counsel who oversees its philanthropic efforts, said in a recent inter-

view.Big technology companies have complained for years about a dearth of technical talent, a problem they have tried to solve by lobbying for looser immigration rules to accommodate more foreign engineers and sponsoring tech competitions to encourage student interest in the industry.

Google, for one, holds a programming summer camp for incoming ninthgraders and underwrites an effort called CS4HS, in which high school teachers sharpen their computer science skills in workshops at local universities.

But Microsoft is sending its employees to the front lines, encouraging them to commit to teaching a high school computer science class for a full school year. Its engineers, who earn a small stipend for their classroom time, are in at least two hourlong classes a week and sometimes as many as five. Schools arrange the classes for first thing in the day to avoid interfering with the schedules of the engineers, who often do not arrive at Microsoft until the late morning.

The program started as a

they put financial support behind the effort - which is known as Technology Education and Literacy in Schools, or TEALS - and let Wang run it full time.

The program is now in 22 schools in the Seattle area and has expanded to more than a dozen other schools in Washington, Utah, North Dakota, California and other states this academic year. Microsoft wants other big technology companies to back the effort so it can broaden the number of outside engineers involved. This year, only 19 of the 110 teachers in the program are not Microsoft employees. In some cases, the program has thrown together volunteers from companies that spend a lot of their time beating each other up in the marketplace.

While computer science can be an intimidating subject, Microsoft has sought to connect it to the technologies most students use in their everyday lives. At Rainier Beach High recently, Peli de Halleux, a Microsoft software engineer, taught a class on making software for mobile phones.

The students buried their faces in the phones, supplied by Microsoft. They were asked to create programs that performed simple functions, like playing a random song when the phones were shaken.

Leandre, who took de Halleux's mobile programming class last year and is in Edouard's Advanced Placement computer science class this year, proudly showed off a simple game he had created, Sun Collector, in which players tilt the phone to dodge black balls and hit big yellow

"I never really understood what was behind these games," he said. "Once you start getting it, it's pretty easy to understand."

One of the most alarming trends for the technology industry has been students' declining interest in computer science over the last decade.

## Can stocks continue to rise as earnings fall?

**NEW YORK (AP)** -- One type of investor buys stocks when everyone is convinced that corporate earnings will fall. He buys because he thinks they're wrong and earnings will rise instead. Call him the contrarian.

Another type of investor buys when everyone thinks that earnings will rise. He buys because he thinks they'll rise even more than expected. Call him the eternal optimist.

Now, the 31½-year-old bull market may have produced a third type of investor, an undiscovered breed with a curious strategy for success: He expects earnings to fall but buys anyway because he hopes it won't matter.

Call him the blind-faith investor. Or maybe just blind. "How do you explain where the stock market is?" Barclays Capital stock strategist Barry Knapp said Thursday, as the Standard & Poor's 500 inched higher yet again. "Stock prices are not warranted by the fundamentals."

Brace yourself: For three months, stock prices have risen while, in seeming contradiction, Wall Street analysts 11-quarter streak of rising earnings that began just after the Great Recession ended three and a half years ago. have slashed estimates for earnings. Earnings for July through September are expected to drop 1.3 percent compared with a year earlier for S&P 500 companies, according to S&P Capital IQ, a research firm.

rise 7 percent. To be fair to the bulls, it's generally future quarters that investors should be most concerned about, not the one that just passed. That's a time-honored rule of investing.

But analysts have been

cutting estimates for those quarters, too. They've lowered forecasts for earnings arowth for each of the next two quarters by a third since the summer, and as much as half since the beginning of the vear.

The bad news started in July, when UPS, the world's largest package delivery company, said the global economy was slowing and lowered its 2012 profit forecast as a result.

Then FedEx said that shipping volume had fallen to recession levels, and that investors should expect lower earnings. Norfolk Southern, the giant railroad company, cut its forecast, too.

The flurry of so-called negapre-announcements ranged across industries - from steel maker Nucor Corp. and Applied Materials Inc., which sells semiconductor-chip-making machines, to Starbucks and Tiffany & Co.

On Tuesday, Fifth & Pacific, the company behind Juicy Couture products, said sales were weakening and it was likely to report lower earnings than expected,

too. Investors pushed its stock down 11 percent in iust a day.

Tally it up and 78 percent of companies issuing preannouncements have suggested they will disappoint, according to FactSet, a financial data provider. That is the worst reading since FactSet began keeping records six years ago.

The problem is companies are running out of ways to increase earnings. You can see that in the results for the previous quarter, from April through June.

Earnings for companies in the S&P 500 barely rose from a year earlier, just 0.8 percent.

U.S. economic growth has slowed to an annual rate of 1.3 percent, practically stall speed. Meanwhile, the old formula that companies have used to compensate - pulling more profit out of each sale by trying to run leaner — suddenly isn't working.

You can only cut expenses and squeeze workers so much, and many companies seem to have reached the limit.

## What a difference a percentage point can make

Investors can't count on very much these days. The economy remains troubled, the stock market is volatile and the bond market seems fraught with risk. Overseas options aren't much better. With Europe in a nasty recession and problems growing in China and the rest of Asia, emerging markets are as vulnerable as ever.

But one thing is quite predictable: the fees that investors pay in their individual mutual funds.

"Finding low-cost funds becomes more important than ever," said Russel Kinnel, director of fund research at Morningstar. "If you're going down in fees, you're boosting your return."

When it comes to mutual funds, fees have a huge

range and vary across asset classes. Average annual fees are 1.44 percent on equity funds, 1.02 percent on bond funds and 0.24 percent on money market funds, according to the calculations of the Investment Company Institute, the mutual fund trade group. Fees for emergingmarket funds or alternative-investment funds can be more than 2 percent.

But fees also vary widely within asset classes. For instance, about one in 10 equity funds charge fees of 0.78 percent or lower, while another one in 10 charge 2.2 percent or higher. At the same time, investors who buy funds through a financial adviser may have to pay a separate load, or fee to compensate the adviser.

Clearly, though, fee-conscious investors have been


putting pressure on fund companies, and many of those costs have been coming down.

The turning point came in 2002, during the bear market after the collapse of the Internet bubble. Until then, many new investors had piled into mutual funds without much experience of bear markets.

"What happened in the early 2000s is that sensitivity to fees increased," said Brian Reed, the institute's chief economist. "We particularly saw it among 401(k) plan sponsors and financial advisers, which has contributed to the significant downward trend in fees since then."

Index funds tend to cost less than actively managed funds, which may require more – and more costly – labor. But there are also other reasons for the cost differences. Index funds tend to be far larger and thus better able to take advantage of economies of scale. Last year, the average equity index fund had assets of \$1.6 billion under management, compared with \$374 million for actively managed equity funds, according to the institute's data.

Regardless of the differences, the costs of index funds and actively managed funds have fallen over time by roughly the same proportion. From 1997 to 2011, the average expense ratio of equity index funds fell 0.13 percentage points, or 13 basis points, while the average for actively managed equity funds dropped 11 basis points. At the same


The problem involves around 268,000 vehicles. Honda said rain or other liquids could enter through a driver's open window and damage the master power switch on the door.

## The art and science of guessing a Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Guessing who will win a Nobel Prize is a bit like forecasting the stock market: Experts don't seem to do it any better than laymen.

So if you hear professors and pundits predicting the "God particle" will be the theme of the physics prize next week, or that an American writer — finally is due for the literature award, check their track record.

"My top candidate has never won, and it's the fourth year I do it now," admitted Norwegian peace researcher Kristian Harpviken, one of the most prominent voices in the annual guessing game for the Nobel Peace Prize.

A week ahead of that announcement, the Irish online betting agency Paddy Power gave the lowest odds Friday to retired American scholar Gene Sharp, Afghan women's rights activist Sima Samar and Tunisian blogger Lina Ben Mhenni. All have been among Harpviken's top picks in recent years.

Harpviken, who heads the PRIO peace institute in Oslo, admits his speculation is just that — speculation — based on current events, previous prizes and personal preference.

"I think guessing is important in that it brings attention to what the Nobel Peace Prize should be about," he said. "I would be very hesitant to speculate on a certain candidate who is absolutely undeserving."


The secretive prize committees rarely drop any hints Harpviken doesn't have any inside information. Virtually none of the Nobel guess-makers do but that doesn't stop them from trying.

The peace and literature prizes generate the strongest buzz, and are typically less difficult to predict than the awards for chemistry, physics, medicine and economics.

The six award committees will announce one prize a day, starting with medicine on Monday and ending with the economics award

on Oct. 15. The Nobel Foundation this year lowered the prize money 20 percent to 8 million Swedish kronor (\$1.2 million), citing turmoil on financial markets.

It would have been easier to guess the winners if the Nobel committees had stuck to the will of the

Swedish industrialist, who wanted the annual awards to reflect the greatest achievements "during the preceding year." Instead, the Nobel statutes were changed so that committees can reward discoveries made decades ago, to make sure they have stood the test of time.

"I think Alfred would have been OK with that," said Per Carlson, a former chairman of the physics prize committee.

Handing out a prize too soon increases the risk of jurors failing to identify the right scientists behind a discovery, Carlson said.

That happened in 1974, when the Nobel Prize in physics went to British radio astronomers Sir Martin Ryle and Antony Hewish. The latter was cited for the discovery of pulsars — rotating neutron stars — though

it later became clear that one of his graduate students deserved the credit. The Nobel time lag could hurt the chances of the most talked-about scientific breakthrough this year: the identification of the Higgs boson, a subatomic particle also referred to as the "God particle."

Though British scientist Peter Higgs predicted the existence of the particle in the 1960s, it was only in July this year that scientists at an atom-smasher outside Geneva claimed to have identified it

Whether Higgs was even nominated is unclear — the deadline was in February and nominations are not revealed for 50 years.

Secrecy is paramount to the Nobel committees. Literature jurors have been known to use code words when discussing Nobel candidates and using fake book covers when reading their work.

After suspected ahead of recent announcements, the literature panel has taken additional measures this year. A press release declaring the winner will no longer be delivered by courier to the offices of major news organizations in Stockholm, including The Associated Press. And the panel's permanent secretary, Peter Englund, has stopped giving his customary interviews in the weeks leading up to the prize

"We just think it's better this way," Englund told the AP in an email.

Betting on the literature prize is in full swing, with Ladbrokes offering 3/1 odds for Japanese writer Haruki Murakami and American singer-songwriter Bob Dylan — an outsider whose name appears in

the Nobel buzz every year though the committee has never given the prize to a musician — placing fourth at 10/1. The last American to win the Nobel Prize in literature was Toni Morrison, in 1993. In perhaps the most elaborate example of Nobel guesswork, the scientific division of news and financial information provider Thomson Reuters analyzes thousands of citations and papers in high-impact academic journals to identify possible winners of the science and economics awards.

## Mexico: Sacred Aztec temple nets 50 skulls

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican archaeologists said they uncovered the largest number of skulls ever found in one offering this weekend at the most sacred temple of the Aztec empire dating back more than 500 years.

The finding reveals new ways the pre-Colombian civilization used skulls in rituals at Mexico City's Templo Mayor, experts said. That's where the most important Aztec ceremonies took place between 1325 until the Spanish conquest in 1521.

The 50 skulls were found at one sacrificial stone. Five were buried under the stone, and each had holes on both sides — signaling they were hung on a skull rack. Archaeologist Raul Barrera of Mexico's National Institute of Anthropology and History said the other 45 skulls appeared to have just been dumped on top of the stone.

The team of archeologists unearthed the skulls and jaw bones in August. They stumbled on them as they were renovating a section of the Templo Mayor in the heart of Mexico City.

Barrera said they believe the 45 skulls were those of women and men between 20 and 35 years old and could have been dug up from other sites and reburied

Last August, the Mexican

government announced experts had found an unprecedented human burial at another spot in the same temple in which the skel-

eton of a young woman, possibly sacrificed personifying a goddess, was surrounded by piles of nearly 1,800 bones. Another unusual finding this summer was a "sacred tree," which looks like a battered oak trunk emerging from a well and which experts say was brought from a mountain region for a ritual.

The skulls shown to the media Friday were in good condition but cracked on each side of the head, possibly because of the wooden stake that ran through them so they could be placed in a skull rack.

Barrera said the key in the discovery was the sacrificial rock, which looks like a gray headstone.

"Underneath the sacrificial

stone, we found an offering of five skulls. These skulls were pierced with a stick," he said. "These are very important findings."

University of Florida archaeologist Susan Gillespie, who was not involved in the excavation, said it caught her attention that the skulls that had been on the rack, called tzompantli, were buried separately.

"It provides rather novel information on the use and reuse of skulls for ritual events at the Templo Mayor," Gillespie said in an email.

Also, the common belief about Aztec sacrificial stones is that a person being sacrificed was killed by cutting open the chest and pulling out the heart.

## Mayan ball court was celestial 'marker'

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexican archaeologists say they have determined that the ancient Mayas built watchtower-style structures atop the ceremonial ball court at the temples of Chichen Itza to observe the equinoxes and solstices, and they said Friday that the discovery adds to understanding of the many layers of ritual significance

that the ball game had for the culture.

The structures sit atop the low walls of the court, where the Mayas played a game that consisted, as far as experts can tell, of knocking a heavy, latex ball with their elbows, knees or hips, through a stone ring set in the walls.

The bases of the structures — essentially, look-out boxes set atop the walls, each one with a small slit running through it —had been detected before, but archaeologist hadn't been sure what they were used for. Since the ball court was built around 864 A.D., the boxes and the stairs leading to them had crumbled. The government's National Institute of Anthropology and History announced Thursday that the boxes had been 90-percent reconstructed, based on stone footings that remained. Late last year and early this year, a team led by archaeologist Jose Huchim confirmed that the sun shone through the slit-like openings when the setting sun touches the horizon at the winter solstice. The sun's rays also formed a diagonal pattern at the equinox in the slit-like open-

equinox in the slit-like openings, which are about tall enough to stand up in.
Huchim said he knew of no similar structures at other

similar structures at other Mayan ball courts. "This is the place where we're finding this type of pasaje (structure)," Huchim said. He said a

stone structure atop a ball court at the nearby ruin site of Uxmal appeared to have been used as a sort of spectators' stand for elite audiences.

Huchim said the slits may have been used to determine when ball matches were played, given that the ball itself, as it was knocked through the air by the players, may have been seen as imitating the sun's arc as it passed through the sky. It may have also been used "like a calendar, to mark important periods for agriculture," like planting the

core crop of corn.

Huchim noted that old descriptions of the ball courts sometimes depicted people atop the walls, and that they may have been acting as umpires in the game. Huchim said Thursday that stairways to the structures are being restored so visitors can observe the phenomenon.

Boston University archaeologist Francisco Estrada-Belli, who was not involved in the project,

said the solar sighting lines were part of "part of Maya architecture and cosmology."

## Neeson's 'Taken 2' debut tops weekend box office

Liam Neeson's action sequel has proved twice the hit among fans as the original movie was.

"Taken 2" led the box office with \$50 million domestically over opening weekend, according to studio estimates Sunday. That's double the haul for Neeson's "Taken," which took in \$24.7 million in its U.S. debut in early 2009.

"Taken" went on to become a \$145 million smash for Neeson, the Academy Award-nominated star of "Schindler's List" who has become an unlikely action hero in his 50s.

In "Taken 2," Neeson returns as a retired CIA agent using his expert espionage and killing skills to take on a gang of thugs out for revenge against him and his family.

"He gives hope to aging men," said Paul Dergarabedian, an analyst more butt." for box-office tracker Hollywood.com. "He's done the reverse of most actors, where you do the action stuff when you're younger

The Disney release is an update of Burton's 1984 liveaction short film, about a boy who brings his dead dog back to life.


Released by 20th Century Fox, "Taken 2" gave a big boost to Hollywood revenues, which have lagged most weekends since late summer. Domestic business totaled \$138 million, up 45.5 percent from the same weekend last year, when "Real Steel" led with \$27.3 million.

"Most people go to the movies for a certain dose of escapism," said Chris Aronson, head of distribution for 20th Century Fox. "It doesn't have to be high art. It doesn't have to be serious and contemplative. They go to the movies to be entertained, and my gosh, that's what this movie does."

## 'Duck Dynasty' luring audiences

WEST MONROE, La. – The
moments before a religious
service begins are generally ones of quiet reflection
for the congregants, but on
a recent Sunday at White's
Ferry Road Church of Christ
here something incongruous was going on two-thirds
of the way back in the spacious hall.

Parishioners were walking up to perhaps the scruffiest, most disheveled-looking man in the church as he sat in his pew, offering a greeting and making a request. They were asking him to autograph copies of his biography.

The man was Phil Robertson, who along with his heavily bearded sons is famous in this part of Louisiana and, increasingly, all over the country. The Robertson family's duckcall-making business, Duck Commander, has been an evolving media phenomenon, beginning years ago with videos aimed at hunters, then becoming the subject of a show on the Outdoor Channel and last March moving up to the much bigger stage of A&E. That A&E series, "Duck Dynasty," begins its second season Wednesday night, now firmly established as one of the quirkiest, most enjoyable reality shows on television. The Robertson clan – Phil and his wife, Kay; their sons; the sons' wives; weird Uncle Si; even the grandchildren – all seem to have a natural gift for deadpan humor.

They are busting the image of what might collectively be called backwoods TV,

the ever-growing list of reality shows about wrangling alligators and catfish and wild hogs. Where most of those shows are onenote and aggressively low brow, "Duck Dynasty" has a varied cast of characters who fit together seamlessly, and any idiocy is deliberate. Sure, making an impromptu duck pond in the warehouse loading dock, as some of the guys did in a Season 1 episode, might not have been the most productive use of time, but it was pretty funny. "Duck Dynasty" is loosely centered on the Duck Commander business, which is headed by Willie Robertson, 39, the third of Phil and Kay's four sons.

Very little duck-call-making actually takes place in any given episode. Instead the focus is likely to be some harebrained project instigated by Willie's older brother Jase, or Phil's obsession with ridding his land of beavers, or Kay's determination to open a restaurant, or Uncle Si's efforts to give driving pointers to a young member of the clan, or some similar bit of frivolousness.



found.

In their place Saturday were two celebrity gabbers who have claimed their stakes to the polar opposite ends of the political spectrum: Bill O'Reilly and Jon Stewart. The political odd-couple came to Washington ready to tangle in an event mockingly dubbed "The Rumble in the Air-Conditioned Auditorium."

Choice words not suitable for the faint of heart dotted the 90-minute exchange between the Fox News anchor and the star of Comedy Central's "The Daily Show," who bantered aggressively but good-naturedly over birth control, President George W. Bush and the so-called "War on Christmas."

Stewart came prepped with a mechanical pedestal he used to elevate himself in the air, making the height-challenged comedian appear taller than

who just can't resist pushing each other's buttons over Thanksgiving stuffing, Stewart and O'Reilly love to disagree, but appear to hold nothing against each other once the latest spat has run its course. The two have appeared on each other's programs since 2001, but the face-off Saturday at The George Washington University marked their first head-to-head debate.

Appearing wholly presidential in dark jackets and face makeup under a sign reading "Yum, this banner tastes like freedom," the two quickly turned to talk of government spending and the 47 percent of Americans that Republican Mitt Romney said in a video are dependent on government.

Stewart, defending government involvement in health care and social programs, said the U.S. has always been an entitlement nation.

#### **Jobs Report: Cooked Or Correct?**

"Unbelievable iob numbers," tweeted Jack Welch, the iconic former boss of General Electric, on Friday morning, moments after the Bureau of Labor Statistics released its September jobs figures. "These Chicago guys will do anything," he continued. "Can't debate so change numbers." The jobs numbers, unquestionably, gave a boost to the Obama campaign, still reeling from the president's poor debate performance. While the bureau's survey of businesses showed a ho-hum rise of 114,000 in nonfarm employment, the unemployment rate had somehow dropped from 8.1 percent in August to 7.8 percent, far exceeding expectations. Thus, a month before the election, and for the first time in Barack Obama's presidency, unemployment was under 8 percent

Welch smelled conspiracy. And he wasn't alone. "Total data manipulation," tweeted a writer at Zerohedge, a financial news blog. "Such a farce." Fox News spent much of Friday morning piling on.

It's worth pointing out that the last time anyone accused the Bureau of Labor Statistics of being politically motivated was when Richard Nixon did so in 1971. Upset that the bureau was releasing figures showing higher unemployment during his re-election campaign, he asked his hatchet man, Charles Colson, to investigate the bureau's top officials, including its chief, Julius Shiskin.


So Point No. 1: The idea that a handful of career bureaucrats, their jobs se-

cure no matter who is in the White House, would manipulate the unemployment data to help the president, is ludicrous. Jack Welch knows it, too; when I called him Friday afternoon, he quickly backpedaled. "I'm not accusing anybody of anything," he protested. But he went on to add that everything he's seen suggests that the economy remains in the doldrums, and it just didn't seem possible that the unemployment rate could have dropped so drastically, and so quick-

Hence, Point No. 2: There is, indeed, something a little strange about the way the country derives its employment statistics. It turns out that the statistics the bureau releases each month are generated by two different reports. One, called the establishment report, is a survey of businesses. That's where the 114,000 additional jobs comes from

The second is a survey of 55,000 households, where people are asked about their employment status. Extrapolating from the survey, the bureau concluded that an additional 873,000 people had found work in September. It is that number that brought the unemployment rate from 8.1 percent to 7.8 percent. When I asked a bureau spokeswoman why there was such divergence between the two numbers, she said she had no idea. "The reports are totally separate," she said.

When I put the same question to economists, they shrugged. Maybe it was because an additional 582,000 Americans were working part time, which doesn't show up in payroll statistics. Maybe it was because of increased government employment. For some unexplained reason, there is always an uptick in September. ("Maybe it has something to do with going back to school," said Mark Zandi of Moody's Analytics, who quickly added, "I'm just guessing here.") In any case, it wasn't anything economists hadn't seen before.



## Of Hooters, Zombies And Senators

Today, let's take a look at debates that do not involve Barack Obama and Mitt Romney. You can thank me later.

I am talking about the races for the U.S. Senate, people. Attention must be paid! And, as a reward, we can also discuss a new campaign ad featuring zombies.

There are 33 Senate contests this year, although voters in some of the states may not have noticed there's anything going on. In Texas, for instance, Paul Sadler, a Democrat, has had a tough time getting any attention in his battle against the Tea Party fan favorite Ted Cruz. Except, perhaps, when he called Cruz a "troll" in their first debate.

In Utah, Scott Howell, a Democrat, has been arguing that if the 78-year-old Sen. Orrin Hatch wins, he might "die before his term is through." Suggesting a longtime incumbent is over the hill is a venerable election technique, but you really are supposed to be a

little more delicate about it. Howell also proposed having 29 debates. The fact that Hatch agreed to only two was, he claimed, proof of the senator's fading stamina.

Nobody in Massachusetts could have missed the fact that there's a Senate race going on. In their last debate, Scott Brown and Elizabeth Warren sounded like two angry squirrels trapped in a small closet. A high point came when the candidates were asked to name their ideal Supreme Court justice. "That's a great question!" Brown said brightly, in what appeared to be a stall for time. He came up with Antonin Scalia. Then, after boos from the audience, Brown added more names, until he had picked about half the current court, from John Roberts to Sonia Sotomayor.

Meanwhile, in Nebraska, the Democrat Bob Kerrey began his debate remarks with: "First of all, let me assure you that I'm still Bob Kerrey." This seemed to be a bad sign.

There are actually about only a dozen Senate races in which there is serious suspense about who's going to win. To the Republicans' dismay, many of them are in states that were supposed to be a lock for the GOP.

Tea Party pressure produced several terrible candidates. We have all heard about Todd Akin in Missouri, who claimed after a recent

debate that Sen. Claire McCaskill wasn't sufficiently "ladylike." Since then, Akin has doubled down on a claim that doctors frequently perform abortions on women who aren't preanant.

In others, the Republicans found awful candidates without any help from the far right.

Sen. Bill Nelson in Florida received the gift of Rep. Connie Mack IV as his Republican opponent, and promptly unveiled an ad calling Mack "a promoter for Hooters with a history of barroom brawling, altercation and road rage." Mack's fortunes seem to have been sliding ever since. Recently, while he was greeting voters at a Donut Hole cafe, one elderly couple asked him to get them a menu.

Some Democratic candidates are also turning out to be stronger than anticipated - like Arizona's Richard Carmona, a Hispanic physician who served as surgeon general under President George W. Bush. Carmona is a Vietnam combat veteran who worked as a SWAT team leader for the Pima County Sheriff's Department. "In 1992," his campaign biography reports, "he rappelled from a helicopter to rescue a paramedic stranded on a mountainside when their medevac helicopter crashed during a snowstorm, inspiring a made-for-TV movie."

## Slow-burning rebellion against Chile on Easter Island

SIMON ROMERO © 2012 New York Times HANGA ROA, Easter Island - Not long ago, as some elders of the Rapanui people wistfully recall, a sense of profound isolation pervaded this windswept speck of land in the Pacific. Horses were the dominant mode of transportation, flights to the outside world were few and far between, and the island's Polynesian language enjoyed dominance in most spheres of life.

Now, so many cars roam the roads of this fragile island (it is smaller than Martha's Vineyard) that Rapanui grimly joke how they may outnumber the moai, the prized towering statues their ancestors carved from volcanic tuff, beauiling archaeologists. Spanish, the language of Chile, which annexed Easter Island in 1888, now prevails across much of the island. New luxury hotels catering to rich Chileans and moneyed foreign visitors charge \$1,100 a night, accentuating a festering income gap. And there is yet another feature of life in Chile, a nation grappling with fierce anti-government protests by students and indigenous groups, which has made it here: violent clashes with security forces.

Inspired by other parts of Polynesia that have obtained a considerable dearee of political autonomy or are in the process of seeking independence, leaders of the Rapanui people are

mounting a slow-burning rebellion against Chile. Their movement on the island – which they call Rapa Nui, not Easter Island – presents a unique test for a Latin American country: quelling a challenge to its rule in the middle of the South Pacific. "Our nearest border is with the Pitcairn Islands, not Chile," said Leviante Araki, 54, president of the Rapa Nui Parliament, a pro-independence organization, referring to the British overseas territory more than 1,200 miles to the west.

Newcomers from main-

land Chile, which is almost twice that distance in the other direction, are fueling a sharp increase in Easter Island's population, increasing it by 54 percent to 5,800 over the last decade. Continentals, as mainland Chileans are called here, now slightly outnumber Rapanui on the island, at about 3,000 to 2,800, according to the mayor, Luz Zasso Paoa. Protests here have crystallized around the thwarted efforts by one prominent Rapanui clan, the Hitorangi, to reclaim land on which a luxury hotel was recently completed. But other sources of ire among the Rapanui have also emerged, including bitterness over privileges like subsidized housing that have been extended to some mainland Chileans, competition for jobs in the lucrative tourism trade and the mainland's control over the island's affairs. Despite the agitation, Easter Island still awes. Nearly a thousand monolithic moai remain strewed around volcanic craters and sandy shorelines, guarding the secrets of an island settled more than nine centuries ago by Polynesian explorers. Clusters of horses wildly roam the hills, as if Easter Island belonged to them.

But unresolved disputes over land and sovereignty, between the Rapanui

Parliament last year unilaterally declared Valentino Riroroko Tuki, the 81-yearold grandson of the last monarch, as the new king, a step in its legal battle to void the annexation treaty. Still, other Rapanui groups have their own aspirants to the throne, reflecting the island's fractious internal politics. "This island was operated like a concentration camp," said Riroroko Tuki, a mild-mannered farmer who gained fame for resisting oppressive rule in the 1950s, when Chile's navy prohibited Rapanui from leaving the island and publicly flogged islanders as punishment. He escaped on a fishing boat to the Cook Islands, more than 3,200 miles away.

Leaders of the Rapa Nui Parliament said they fully expect to lose the independence lawsuit on the mainland, viewing it as a step to pursue the claims in venues like the International Court of Justice. One model under study here is the Cook Islands, a selfgoverning parliamentary democracy in a "free association" with New Zealand. pro-independence sentiment, while supported by sizable factions of Rapanui, is by no means unanimous. Alberto Hotus, head of the Council of Elders, from which the Rapa Nui Parliament splintered off, pointed out that the island still depends on Chile for its health care, food, telecommunications and flights to the mainland.

"If we cut ties to Chile," he said, "we will return to eating pasture."

The authorities on the mainland are cautiously following the talk of independence. Carlos Llancaqueo, President Sebastian Pinera's commissioner to Easter Island, said officials were well aware of the island's problems and were moving ahead with plans to improve the power grid, potable water systems and bilingual education in both the Rapa Nui language and Spanish.

Additionally, Llancaqueo said new legislation governing migration and residency is under preparation, but Chile's Constitution requires the Rapanui people to be consulted before the law is enacted, a process just getting under way. He said another proposal would give Easter Island greater control over its own finances, though the idea has languished for years; as it stands, the island is a province of the Region of Valparaiso, so decisions regarding funds for everything from education to infrastructure are made on the mainland, a five-hour flight away.
