Aruba cops: No bones of missing teen found in sea

ORANJESTAD, Aruba (AP) – Police found nothing but rocks and coral while searching underwater for the remains of missing U.S. teen Natalee Holloway, the Aruba prosecutors' office said yesterday.

Police dove several times on Wednesday and Sunday after an American couple turned over an underwater photo of what they believed might have been her remains, said spokeswoman Ann Angela. The couple were diving while on vacation in Aruba last year.

Divers didn't find any items in the photo, Angela said.

"We looked at it seriously," she said. "It did not prove successful."

The 18-year-old from Mountain Brook, Alabama, disappeared while on vacation in Aruba in 2005 and was last seen leaving a bar with Joran van der Sloot on the final night

of a high school graduation trip.

Van der Sloot has been detained several times, but Aruban prosecutors say they lack evidence to charge him.

Police believe the couple from Manheim, Pennsylvania, likely zoomed in on some coral, giving the impression that it might have been a skull and bones, Angela said.

The search was one of many launched to find Holloway.

New search starting for Air France black boxes

RECIFE, Brazil (AP) – The lead investigator of last year's mysterious Air France jet crash that killed more than 200 people off the coast of Brazil said yesterday that he is hopeful a third search for debris and flight and data recorders will be successful.

The 30-day search, to begin Sunday, will involve an area 10 times smaller than previous efforts, Jean-Paul Troadec, chief of the BEA French investigation agency, told reporters at a news conference in north-eastern Brazil.

In addition, a collaborative effort by scientists, including from the U.S.-based Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts, has helped reconstruct the trajectory of the Airbus 330's debris and the time the wreckage was found, giving investigators a better idea of where to look, Troadec said.

"We think we have a good chance of finding the wreckage," he said.

Officials say that locating the flight data recorders is crucial, since the 1,000 pieces of

wreckage already recovered have provided no concrete information as to what caused the jet to crash on June 1, killing all 228 people aboard.

The data recorders — the so-called "black boxes" — contain cockpit recordings and various readings from the aircraft.

Troadec said the investigation so far has "shown that without finding the recorders that this investigation could never be conclusive and this accident could remain largely unexplained."

The latest search will employ two boats, one of which will carry three sonar-equipped robot submarines, and the other of which will use onboard sonar to scour the 770-square mile (2,000-square kilometer) area.

Troadec said the wreckage is likely located on a rough, mountainous seabed, perhaps as many as 13,100 feet (4,000 meters) under the sea.

William Waldock, who teaches air-crash investigation at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Prescott, Arizona, said that even if a main debris field is found, it does not mean the data recorders can be located.

The search will be jointly financed by Airbus and Air France, and comes after original search efforts last year that cost about euro 9 million. The U.S. Navy and the National Transportation Safety Board will help, along with private companies and accident experts from Britain, Germany, Russia and Brazil.

Stunned passengers on Caribbean flight witness volcano erupting

Vacationers flying on a plane to St Lucia were stunned to look out their windows and see a huge volcano erupting in front of their eyes, it was reported yesterday.

Passengers on the Boeing 737 were amazed to see a plume of ash hurled into the sky by the explosion.

They rushed to the side of the jet to photograph the cloud from the Soufriere Hills volcano on Caribbean island Montserrat.

Mary Jo Penkala, 49, was flying to the Caribbean from Toronto, Canada, with partner Barry Steinfeld, when she saw the staggering sight and took a picture.

She said: "We saw the volcano in all its glory."

Passengers told how the pilot had simply announced over the intercom: "Ladies and gentlemen, if you look to the left of the plane, you'll see a volcano erupting."

After a long period of dormancy, the Soufriere Hills volcano became active in 1995 and has continued to erupt ever since.

Anti-Chavez TV channel owner arrested in Venezuela

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) – The owner of Venezuela's only television channel that remains critical of President Hugo Chavez was arrested yesterday, spurring concerns among rights activists of a widening government crackdown aimed at silencing critics

Attorney General Luisa Ortega said a warrant was issued for the arrest of Guillermo Zuloaga, owner of the TV channel Globovision, for remarks that were deemed "offensive" to the president.

Zuloaga said that military intelligence agents detained him at an airport in the northwestern state of Falcon.

Ortega said prosecutors are investigating Zuloaga for statements he allegedly made during a recent Inter American Press Association meeting in

the Dutch Caribbean island of Aruba, where media executives from across the Americas criticized Chavez's government for limiting freedom of expression.

Pro-Chavez lawmaker Manuel Villalba urged prosecutors on Wednesday to investigate Zuloaga for allegedly saying that Venezuela's government is cracking down on its critics and purportedly commenting that it was a shame that a short-lived 2002 coup against Chavez failed.

"He must assume his responsibility," Villalba told state-run Radio Nacional.

The arrest came three days after opposition politician Oswaldo Alvarez Paz was detained for remarks made on a Globovision talk show on March 8.

complying with this law. When crossing a road, always use the crosswalk or the place destined for it. Crossing a road at any spot will be sanctioned. Classic cars also must comply with certain conditions

to be able to drive on the road. It is not allowed to park on the sidewalks or on places where it is forbidden to do so. There will be a fine and the car will be towed by the police. It is not an easy task to convince the addicts, but the foundation has a lot of experience and is giving the government a helping hand. The government for its part, between the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Social Affairs, has funds available to cover the expenses to send addicts to 'Hogares Crea' in the Dominican Republic.

Hogar Crea is an international institution, founded in Puerto Rico to help drug addicts cut their drug habit. In 1968, Jose Juan Garcia founded "Hogar Crea." The word "Crea" means for the re-education of the addict and the community. Those who enter the program do not have to pay a fee, but must agree to the program's strict rules. Breaking a drug habit is not easy and those who enter the program must adopt new habits which are necessary for recovery. They must go to church on Sundays and do community services. The program is not financed by the government.

Hogares Crea has over 152 facilities worldwide including in the Dominican Republic.

A large group of Aruba's addicts has already left to Hogares Crea in the Dominican Republic and are on the road to rehabilitate their life. More addicts are now willing to join the program.

Museum is home to world's largest bunny collection

PASADENA, California (AP) – It started 18 years ago with an endearment and a plush bunny.

Today, Steve Lubanski and Candace Frazee live in The Bunny Museum, where they have the world's largest rabbit collection with more than 26,000 items. Guinness World Records dubbed them the largest in 1999 when there were only 8,437 pieces in the house.

Frazee counts and catalogs the collection and keeps track of visitors — hovering around 16.000.

The couple are surrounded by rabbits, from wallpaper to wind chimes, phones to faucets and sheets to screen savers. Thousands of items are in storage because there is no space left.

Erin Seeherman, 24, was visitor No. 15,976. She came from Philadelphia with pictures of her bunnies, Zeke and Nora, food for Frazee's rabbits and plans to buy lots of souvenirs at the museum gift shop.

"I was hoping it would be trinket heaven," she said.

Lubanski, 52, and Frazee, 53, met at a singles seminar in 1992. She called him "Honey Bunny" and he gave her a stuffed rabbit for Valentine's

Day

In the beginning, they gave each other bunny gifts on holidays. Then every day. Sometimes dozens a day. At the reception to their 1994 wedding, he dressed in a bunny costume; they did the bunny hop and ate carrot cake.

In 1998, they opened the museum, calling it the "hoppiest place in the world." Admission is free, by appointment only.

The couple have seven real bunnies and continue to expand their collection at antique, novelty and out-of-town stores. Even when they go on vacation, there are bunny influences — like the Rabbit Ridge Winery in Paso Robles or the Jackrabbit Trading Post in Joseph City, Ariz.

This time of year is like Christmas, because Easter makes stores nearly as bunny happy as they are.

The most asked-after item in the museum is an Elvis Parsley pitcher, Frazee said. But the most asked question? "How do you dust?"

She used to do it all herself, but finally hired a housekeeper to help two days a week.

"But the truth is," she jokes,
"we don't mind dust bunnies at
the museum."

US slave ship replica sails into Old Havana harbor



HAVANA (AP) – A U.S. replica of the 19th-century Cuban slave ship "Amistad" glided through the millpond-calm waters of Havana Bay on Thursday, a reminder of the countries' intertwined past and a gesture toward a brighter shared future.

Built in Connecticut, the black-hulled, two-masted recreation of the schooner, whose name means "Friendship," flew the American and Cuban flags — as well as the blue flag of the United Nations. It was one of the few times a ship under the Stars and Stripes has called on the island in 51 years of estrangement since Fidel Castro took power. As it neared shore, the crew of 19 Americans lowered the U.S. flag and ran Cuba's up the main mast.

"It feels like a promise fulfilled," said Gregory Belanger, the CEO and president of Amistad America Inc., the nonprofit organization that owns and operates the ship. "It was built here originally. Its sail is from here. Now it is here."

U.S. movie director Steven Spielberg made the story of the original Amistad famous with his 1997 film of the same name. The ship set sail from Havana carrying a cargo of captives from Sierra Leone in 1839. The Africans rebelled, commandeering the ship on a zigzag course up the U.S. coast until it was finally seized off the coast of Long Island.

The captured Africans became an international cause for abolitionists, and their fate was finally decided in 1841, when John Quincy Adams argued their case before the Supreme Court, which granted them freedom.

It was an inspirational ending to an otherwise sinis-

ter historical period — and some who helped bring the Amistad replica to this country hope its simple arrival could signal hope for improving a half-century and counting of frigid U.S.-Cuba relations.

"If one of the two sides, either the U.S. or Cuba, had not wanted this to occur it wouldn't have," said Steve Schwadron, a consultant on the Amistad project and former chief of staff for Rep. William Delahunt. The Massachusetts Democrat has long worked to ease U.S.-Cuba relations and reached out to the State Department to make officials aware of the Amistad's proposal.

Thursday commemorated the day, March 25, 1807, when the British Parliament outlawed the slave trade. It also marks the 10th anniversary of the replica's rechristening. As the Amistad took to the seas a decade ago, its builders at Connecticut's Mystic Seaport vowed to get it to Cuba's capital or bust.

It first arrived on the island Tuesday at the port of Matanzas, 60 miles (95 kilometers) east of Havana. Thursday's mostly calm, blue-gray waves made for smooth sailing past the Morro Castle, a Spanish fort built in 1859 that guards the sea entrance to Havana. The Amistad then hugged the storied waterfront, passing the iconic Hotel Nacional before reaching a modern cruise ship port on the edge of the city's historic harbor district.

Using high technology hidden in its wooden frame and rigging, the new Amistad has crossed the Atlantic and wended its way through the Caribbean since 2007 as part of the United Nations and UN-ESCO's Slave Route Project.



Tiny fish might help humans fix damaged hearts



When zebrafish loses cardiac tissue, it simply regrows it, scientists say

An ability to regrow damaged or missing heart tissue makes the lowly zebrafish an ideal model for discovering new ways to repair human hearts, scientists say.

When a part of its heart is removed, the tiny zebrafish is a bit sluggish for a few days, but then appears normal within a month. This remarkable heart repair is achieved by differentiated cardiac muscle cells called cardiomyocytes -- not stem cells, but mature cells that normally supply the contractile force of the heart.

"What the results of our study show is that Mother Nature utilizes other ways besides going all the way back to pluripotent stem cells to regenerate tissues and organs," Juan Carlos Izpisua Belmonte, a professor in the Gene Expression Laboratory at the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in California, said in a news release.

The study appears in the March 25 issue of the journal Nature.

Prior to heart failure, dam-

aged mammal heart muscle cells enter a state called hibernation, in which they stop contracting in an effort to survive. Mammal heart cell hibernation is significant, said study first author Chris Jopling, a postdoctoral fellow at the Center of Regenerative Medicine in Barcelona, Spain.

"During heart regeneration in the zebrafish we found that cardiomyocytes displayed structural changes similar to those observed in hibernating cardiomyocytes," Jopling said in the news release. "Because of these similarities, we hypothesize that hibernating mammalian cardiomyocytes may represent cells that are attempting to proliferate."

"This idea fits nicely with the findings from a number of groups -- that forced expression of cell cycle regulators can induce cardiomyocyte proliferation in mammals. Maybe all they need is a bit of push in the right direction," Jopling said.

Researchers are looking for factors that supply that

Gameworld: A virtual farm turns new ground for game developers



SAN FRANCISCO – A virtual farm attracting up to 83 million aspiring farmers monthly has video game developers scrambling to find ways to plough the booming popularity of games on social networks.

Sites like Facebook, which has an estimated 400 million users, and MySpace, with about 100 million users, are driving a social gaming craze that was in the spotlight at this month's 2010 Game Developers Conference (GDC).

Heiko Hubertz, CEO of browser-based games portal Bigpoint.com which is home to over 100 million gamers, said online game experiences were very solitary in the past.

"Now through social network gaming and browserbased games portals, gamers of all types can share their experiences and compete against each other in original experiences like 'Poisonville,' as well as licensed content like the upcoming 'Battlestar Galactica Online," said Hubertz.

Once-small companies like Zynga, Bigpoint, Playdom, and Playfish, which Electronic Arts bought for \$400 million last year, are finding exponential growth by creating free-to-play casual games that encourage players to get their friends involved.

This viral approach to gaming is introducing a whole new audience to videogames

"The 800 pound gorilla in social games is Zynga's 'Farm Ville,' which has over 82 million people worldwide playing at least once a month and over 32 million people playing daily," said Justin Davis, founder and editor of Social-GameCentral.com.

"FarmVille," which has been available as an application on Facebook since June last year, involves managing a virtual farm by planting, growing and harvesting crops and raising livestock.

Zynga, which has created five of the 10 most popular social games, also attracts an audience of 30 million monthly and 9 million daily with "Cafe World," its second most popular game.

Davis said overall Zynga has over 230 million active players across multiple social networks.

Even MySpace, which announced a new MySpace Games experience at this month's conference aiming to encourage game makers to cater to its online audience, can attract over 10 million players with games like Playdom's "Mobsters" and Zynga's "Mafia Wars."

About one-third of My-Space users currently play games. Michael Pachter, videogame analyst for Wedbush Morgan Securities, said social gaming has grown from around \$600 million in total revenue in 2008 to \$1 billion in 2009 and expects social gaming to bring in around \$1.6 billion this year.

"The growth rate should remain very high at around 40 percent each of the next three years, so my guess at 2011 is around \$2.2 billion, 2012 at \$3 billion 2013 at more than \$4 billion," said Pachter.

While most of this gaming revenue is currently focused on the sale of virtual in-game items, called micro-transactions, Pachter forecasts there will be more advertising revenue and data mining in the future.

Game developers are introducing new technologies that could help grow social games even further.

Vivox, which provides voice chat services for massively multi-player online games like Nexon's "Combat Arms" and CCP Games' "EVE Online," is working with developer Hive7 to allow Facebook gamers to talk to one another while playing titles like the medieval strategy game "Knighthood."

"People will be able to play social games as if they were at the same table," said Rob Seaver, CEO of Vivox.

Another US Internet company pulls back in China

WASHINGTON – Two U.S. companies that sell Internet addresses to Web sites said Wednesday they had stopped registering new domain names in China because the Chinese government has begun demanding pictures and other identification documents from their customers.

One of the domain name companies, Go Daddy Inc., announced its change in policy at a congressional hearing that was largely devoted to Google Inc.'s announcement Monday that it will no longer censor Internet search results in China.

Christine Jones, executive vice president and general counsel of Go Daddy, said the company's decision was not a reaction to Google but instead reflects its concern about the security of its customers and "the chilling effect" of the new Chinese government requirements.

"We just made a decision that we didn't want to act as an agent of the Chinese government," Jones told lawmakers

Separately, a company that offers similar services, Network Solutions LLC, also said Wednesday it had stopped handling China Web registrations in December, for the same reason.

Zhong Shan, China's vice commerce secretary in charge of foreign trade, said he hadn't been briefed on the Go Daddy decision.

Speaking to reporters at the Chinese Embassy in Washington, however, Zhong called Google's decision an "exceptional case" that wouldn't undermine the confidence of foreign investors in China. He said China's economy wasn't perfect, but that the government is working to create a more attractive investment environment.

Beat the sweaty armpit blues



Are sweaty armpit stains the bane of your existence? Here are some solutions for men who suffer from excessive underarm perspiration.

Working anywhere other than a thoroughly air-conditioned room is sluggish torture and venturing outdoors during daylight hours is sheer foolhardiness, but the most embarrassing effects are those damp and clammy halfmoons of perspiration that stain the armpits of your shirt on most days.

For some guys it doesn't even take a particularly steamy day to bring on these unsightly underarm sweats. The mere thought of having to give a presentation in a boardroom full of bosses ramps up the humidity under their armpits to levels rivalling those of a rainforest.

So what are the most efficient ways to control excessive underarm sweating?

First steps

Find an anti-perspirant that works for you. Make sure it says anti-perspirant on

the dispenser. A simple deodorant is only good at masking the smell, but won't actually stop you from sweating

Drink wheat grass – it contains a lot of Vitamin B, which can help reduce sweat production.

Wear a cotton undershirt which will mop up any sweat before it reaches your shirt on top. Try loose fitting tops that allow air to circulate under your armpits and go for light colours which tend to show up the stains less obviously.

Bath or shower regularly using anti-bacterial soap and don't wear clothes you've sweated in previously.

Certain foods and beverages, including garlic, chilli, onions, red meat, fried food, coffee and alcohol, may stimulate sweating. Avoid them whenever you can.

If you tend to sweat excessively in situations that make you nervous or anxious, treat the cause of the problem. Try calming activities such as yoga, meditation or listening

to soothing music.

Some people swear by rubbing vinegar, baby powder, lemon juice or rubbing alcohol into their armpits, while others bath in water mixed with a few cans of tomato juice, but we're not so sure about these home remedies.

For more persistently sweaty armpits

If these measures don't deliver results, you may be suffering from a medical condition known as axillary hyperhidrosis. Consult your doctor, who may:

Suggest a prescription anti-perspirant containing aluminium chloride hexahydrate solution or gel.

Prescribe one of several oral medications to reduce sweating. Beware that these may cause side effects such as a dry mouth and eyes and urine retention.

Recommend iontophoresis, a medical procedure in which a weak electric charge, delivered through sponge electrodes attached to your underarms, transports a chemical into the skin which will stop sweat glands from secreting sweat without damaging them. It may cause mild pain, but can be quite effective.

Bring on the big guns

More severe cases may be treated by more intrusive and expensive methods such as:

Botox injections, which need to be repeated every 6 to 16 months; or

Surgical treatments, including underarm liposuction and removal of sweat-inducing nerves or sweat glands.

Gene Holds Key to Embryonic Stem Cell Rejuvenation

Discovery could pave way for advances in cancer and aging research, report suggests

Scientists have identified a gene in mice that is a key player in what could essentially be called embryonic stem cells' "immortality."

The finding could have a

The finding could have a major impact on research into aging, regenerative medicine and the biology of stem cells and cancer, according to the report published online March 24 in the journal Nature.

Embryonic stem cells can develop into nearly any type of cell in the body and can produce infinite generations of new, fully operational embryonic stem cells (daughter cells). But the mechanism for this rejuvenation has been a mystery, the researchers noted in a news release from the U.S. National Institute on Aging (NIA).

In the new study, researchers at the NIA found that embryonic stem cells in mice express a unique Zscan4 gene that enables them to continuously produce vigorous daughter cells.

According to the study authors, this gene isn't turned on every time an embryonic stem cell replicates; only about 5 percent of embryonic stem cells will have the gene activated at any one point.

Older women need 1-hour workouts to fend off flab

CHICAGO – Rev up the treadmill: Sobering new research spells out just how much exercise women need to keep the flab off as they age — and it's a lot.

At least an hour of moderate activity a day is needed for older women at a healthy weight who aren't dieting. For those who are already over-

weight — even more exercise is called for to avoid gaining weight without eating less, the study results suggest.

"We all have to work at it. If it were easy to be skinny, we would all be skinny," said John Foreyt, a behavioral medicine expert who reviewed the study but wasn't involved in the research.


Brisk walking, leisurely bicycling and golfing are all examples of moderate exercise. But don't throw in the towel if you can't do those things for at least an hour a day. Even a little exercise is good for your health even if it won't make you thin, the researchers said.

Their findings are based on 34,079 middle-aged women followed for about 13 years. Most were not on calorie-cutting diets. The women gained an average of almost 6 pounds during the study.

Those who started out at a healthy weight, with a body mass index less than 25, and who gained little or no weight during the study consistently got the equivalent of about an hour of moderate activity daily. Few women — only 13 percent — were in this category.

Few already overweight women got that amount of exercise, and the results suggest it wasn't enough to stop them from gaining weight.

Coming Soon: A Low-Heartburn Coffee?



For millions of coffee-lovers with delicate stomachs, scientists may have found a way to enjoy an eye-opening cup of java without gastrointestinal discomfort.

European researchers studying stomach-irritating chemicals in coffee have unexpectedly found one that actually inhibits acid production in the stomach.

"The major import of our work is that it provides scientific evidence that you can

produce a more stomachfriendly coffee by varying the processing technology," said study author Veronika Somoza, professor and chair of the Research Platform of Molecular Food Science at the University of Vienna, Austria.

The finding offers the promise that coffee makers can produce a blend that will be easier on the tummy, Somoza said.

The results were to be presented Sunday at the American Chemical Society's annual meeting in San Francisco.

The scientists looked at coffee's effect on human stomach cells using a variety of preparations, including dark-roast, regular roast, decaffeinated and stomachfriendly. Instead of one single element, they identified a

mixture of compounds — caffeine, catechols and N-alkanoly-5-hydroxytriptamides — as the chemicals in coffee that promote the production of stomach acid.

But a fourth chemical, N-methylpyridinium, which is more common in dark roasts, such as espresso and French roast blends, was found to inhibit acid.

N-methylpyridinium is a product of the roasting process itself, resulting in dark roasts that are less likely than lighter ones to cause stomach irritation, according to the research.

Whether the findings will translate to human coffee drinkers remains unclear. The authors hope to conduct tests with human coffee drinkers this year.



How to indelibly print in your customer's mind why they can't afford NOT to do business with you!

Hi, I am Ken Varga. I want to share with you some of the ideas, strategies, and principles that allowed me to build 35 businesses during my career.

By earnestly applying the ideas, you will learn how you too can build your business to success, while living an unhurried life, filled with family, friends, fun and a relaxed atti-

In the last tip, I wrote that direct mail is salesmanship in print.

In this tip, I'm going to give you some examples of how you can use direct mail in your business. Here are some:

- 1. You can use a full-blown letter, along with a brochure and a response card, to try to sell your product, or to try to get people to send something
- 2. You can send a little post card, basically making a statement of what your product is, giving them a reason to call or come in.
- **3.** You can use a variation of a post card to get their attention. One variation is called a tent post card. One side of the post card makes the proposition; the other side is for them to put their contact, or other pertinent information, and to

4. You can do a self-mailer, which is a single self-contained proposition all in one package.

5. You can do an elaborate, very richly presented, highprofile sales presentation and any thing in between.

Before you put together any direct mail piece, you should tape record your best salesperson...the one who is making the most sales.

Why? Because that salesperson is sending the right message to a customer to get them to buy your product.

If you don't incorporate some application of direct mail into your customer-generating activities, you are denying yourself an enormous growth opportunity.

Here is an instance of how I used direct mail to acquire customers

I was asked by a local community bank, which was a single branch, on the same corner as five other very large banks, to do two things:

1. Help their loan officer get into business owners' offices, so the officer could tell the bank's story, and

2. To help the process result in more new customers.

The first thing I had to do was to differentiate this bank from any of the others.

In other words, I had to determine what I could do to indelibly imprint in a customer's mind the uniqueness of this very small one-branch bank.

After many hours of thinking about it, I came up with an

The answer was to create in the prospect's mind that this bank would do something for them that their current bank wasn't doing.

The first thing I had to do was determine how I would get the loan officer into business persons' offices, where the business persons would invite the officer in with open

I created a direct mail piece that simply stated, in essence: Dear John,

We would like to set up an appointment to introduce our bank and the benefits of dealing with us.

Since your time is very valuable, we would like to give you a gift to help you get more customers and grow your busi-

It is a book entitled, "How to Get Customers to Call, Buy, and Beg for More."

I promise that we will only take up 20 minutes of your time.

Very truly yours,

Obviously, the letter was much longer than this, but the loan officer had a ninety-six percent appointment closing.

Well that's it for this tip. In the next tip, I'll give you a few more examples.

EU strikes new "Open Skies" aviation deal with U.S.

BRUSSELS, Belgium - European airlines might soon be able to take majority control of U.S. airlines and get access to lucrative U.S. government business in a deal struck yesterday -- but real change will hinge on approval by the U.S. Congress, a far from certain prospect.

The deal in "Open Skies" talks followed a 2007 agreement allowing airlines to fly for the first time between any EU city and any U.S. city, uniting two markets that account for nearly two thirds of global

Current laws in the United States limit foreign ownership of U.S. airlines to 25 percent, but that will be loosened if Congress approves the measures agreed yesterday.

European carriers will also have fresh access to U.S. government business under the "Fly America" program.

In return, U.S. airlines will gain improved market access in the EU and increased share ownership rights from above the current 49.9 percent.

WASHINGTON – A modest U.S. economic recovery still warrants the Federal Reserve's ultra-low interest rate policy, but the central bank stands ready to remove stimulus once the expansion looks solid, Chairman Ben Bernanke said

Testifying before the U.S. House of Representatives Financial Services Committee, Bernanke offered a brief overview of the tools the Fed intends to use to reverse the

emergency measures taken to grapple with the worst financial crisis since the Great Depression.

"The economy continues to require the support of accommodative monetary policies," Bernanke told lawmakers. "However, we have been working to ensure that we have the tools to reverse, at the appropriate time, the currently very high degree of monetary stimulus."

Germany, France agree on plan to help Greece

BRUSSELS, Belgium – The leaders of Germany and France clinched agreement on a joint European-IMF financial safety net for debt-stricken Greece just before an EU summit yesterday, the French president's office said.

The accord, which set the stage for a wider deal among euro zone leaders, is intended to reassure nervous financial

markets and arrest a crippling rise in Greece' borrowing costs after a debt crisis that has shaken confidence in the euro.

The European Central Bank also took a key step to support Greece by extending softer rules on collateral so that Athens does not risk a guillotine on its debt at the end of this year.

Green tires could slash oil needs

About seven gallons of oil is required to make each of the roughly one billion tires produced annually, according to the Rubber Manufacturers Association trade group. But the tire industry's dependence on oil could drop dramatically in the next five years.

A new technology being developed in a research partnership between Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company and California-based biotechnology company Genencor aims to eliminate the oil currently used to make isoprene, a key tire ingredient, by creating a more environmentally friendly alternative using plants like sugar cane, corn, or switchgrass.


Essentially, the technology uses a genetically modified microorganism to ferment the plant sugars in a way that creates the desired chemical.

Denmark's famed Little Mermaid begins China trip



COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) – Denmark's famed Little Mermaid statue left her perch in the Copenhagen harbor yesterday and started a journey to the World Expo in Shanghai — the first trip abroad in her 96-year history.

The 5-foot (1.5-meter) landmark, which honors the memory of Danish fairy tale writer Hans Christian Andersen, was lifted by a crane and lowered onto the back of a truck at a ceremony in the Danish capital.

The exact travel itinerary is being kept secret for security

reasons, but the statue is scheduled to be placed as the centerpiece of the Danish pavilion about a week before the World Expo opens May 1.

The temporary move is controversial in Denmark, where some considered it disrespectful to ship a cultural treasure halfway across the globe as a PR tool.

Critics suggested the government should have sent a copy to China — an idea dismissed by Christopher Bo Bramsen, Danish commissioner-general for Expo 2010.

A must see while on Aruba

Experience Aruba's loveliest animals at the Donkey Sanctuary





Around the world, tourists do a lot of site-seeing. That's the way they learn about other cultures and their histories. Aruba offers a great sanctuary to lay in the sun and get a tan, but there is much more to this small island. Let's talk about the Donkey Sanctuary Aruba.

After the introduction of the automobile the donkeys were set free. Because many of them lost their habitat, (housing projects all over the island, heavy traffic), mistreatment and ignorance, the Aruban Donkey today is at the edge of extinction.

On April 14, 1997 the foundation "Save our Donkey" was established. They started by gathering 13 donkeys who continuously crossed the main road at Pos Chiquito, endangering the heavy traffic and themselves. Nowadays the Donkey Sanctuary takes care of the donkeys at the sanctuary in Santa Lucia and the other donkeys are at the sanctuary located at the Frenchmen's Pass.

There are still some donkeys living in the wild. They live in groups of 2 to 16, because a donkey can not be alone. They are the largest "wild animals" on Aruba, and are no problem at all, as long as they do not endanger traffic.

The sanctuary provides food, shelter and medical care for these wild animals and helps them get back into nature. Families can visit and learn more about the Aruban donkeys and their habitat.

There is also a donkey shop, where you can buy everything with donkeys on it,

LOS ANGELES, California --After a year spent in the studio, Christina Aguilera will release her new album this summer on June 8, it was announced yesterday.

The album features songs Christina co-wrote with artists including Australian singer songwriter Sia, producer Tricky Stewart — who helped helmed the production desk for Beyonce's "Single Ladies (Put a Ring on It)," indie rockers Le Tigre and Liverpool electro band Ladytron.

Additionally, the album reunites Christina with "Beautiful" songwriter Linda Perry, who penned and produced the ballad "Lift Me Up" for the release.

"Working on this album with so many talented artists and producers that I admire was really an amazing experi-



ence. The artists I chose to work with added so many unique sonic layers to 'Bionic,'" Christina said in a statement. "My intention was to step into their world and what they do combined with my own vision and sound. The results were magic."

Christina added that she hopes the album will surprise her fans.

"I was able to explore and create a fresh, sexy feel using both electronic and organic elements with subject matter ranging from playful to introspective," she continued. "I am so excited for my fans to hear the new sound. It is something I don't think anyone will expect."

It was also announced yesterday that "Bionic's" first single, "Not Myself Tonight," a song produced by Polow Da Don, will debut on ChristinaAguilera.com on March 30 at 6 p.m.

Christina recently wrapped production on her first feature film, "Burlesque," which also stars Oscar winner Cher, Stanley Tucci and Kristen Bell. Due out this fall, "Burlesque" is about a big-voiced, but small town girl, who moves to Los Angeles and lands a job at the Burlesque Lounge where she deals with jealousy.

US geneticist wins \$1.5 million religion prize

WASHINGTON (AP) - A onetime priest who later became an evolutionary geneticist and molecular biologist and helped scientifically refute creationism with his research was honored yesterday with one of the world's top religion prizes.

Francisco J. Ayala, 76, a U.S. citizen originally from Spain, will receive the 2010 Templeton Prize, valued at \$1.53 million, the John Templeton Foundation announced at the National Academy of Sciences.

It is the largest monetary award given each year to an individual and honors someone who made exceptional contributions to affirm spirituality. Officials increase the value each year to exceed the Nobel Prize.

"I see religion and science as two of the pillars on which American society rests," Ayala said, saying the United States is one of the world's most religious countries. "We have these two pillars not talking, not seeing they can reinforce each other."

Ayala is a notable choice because he opposes the entanglement of science and religion. The former Dominican priest is adamant that science and religion do not contradict each other.

"If they are properly understood, they cannot be in contradiction because science and religion concern different matters, and each is essential to human understanding," he said in remarks prepared for the acceptance ceremony.

Ayala is a top professor of biological sciences at the University of California, Irvine. His pioneering genetic research led to revelations that could help develop cures for malaria and other diseases.

In January, he coauthored a paper that established gorillas and chimps may serve as reservoirs for parasites that cause human malaria, showing that even if a vaccine is developed, humans will be vulnerable to re-infection.

Ayala has long worked to foster dialogue between religion and science and said tension between the fields has subsided over time.


In 1981, Ayala was an expert witness in a U.S. federal court challenge that helped overturn an Arkansas law mandating the teaching of creationism alongside evolution. Three years later, the National Academy of Sciences asked Ayala to serve as principal author of "Science, Evolution and Creationism," which categorically refuted creationism and intelligent design.

He has said efforts to block religious intrusion into science equate with "the survival of rationality in this country."

"The Bible is not a textbook about science," he said. "It's not introductory astronomy."

Ayala said religion brings hope and meaning to people, and they know God exists as a matter of faith. Such questions are beyond the realm of science, he said.

As for his personal reli-

gious beliefs, Ayala said they have evolved, but he prefers to keep them private.

The foundation has honored more traditional religious figures in the past, including Billy Graham, as well as scientists and philosophers.

Ayala is scheduled to receive the prize May 5 in a private ceremony at London's Buckingham Palace. He plans to give the prize money to charity, likely for education.

John M. Templeton, president of the Pennsylvania-based foundation named for his late father, said Ayala was selected for his breadth and depth of analysis focused on discovery.

"Ayala's clear voice in matters of science and faith," he said, "echoes the foundation's belief that evolution of the mind and truly open-minded inquiry can lead to real spiritual progress in the world."

True love overcomes any distance, Croatian storks show

ZAGREB, Croatia – A male stork proved once again that distance is no bar to true love as it flew thousands of kilometers back to its handicapped mate in a Croatian village, local media said yesterday.

This is the fifth year in a row that the stork, named Rodan, has made the epic journey of some 13,000 kilometers (8,060 miles) from South Africa to the village of Brodski Varos, in eastern Croatia, the Jutarnji List daily reported.

"This year he came a bit earlier," Stjepan Vokic, who cares for the female stork, named Malena, unable to fly since hunters shot through its wing, told the paper.

Rodan looked rather exhausted, Vokic added. Every year the couple has raised a brood of chicks which Rodan has taught to fly since Malena cannot, Vokic said. This year is expected to be no different.

In August, Rodan and the young will start to prepare for their long journey to winter in South Africa while Malena remains in Brodski Varos until the return of its mate in the spring.

Serena Williams, wearing high heels despite a knee injury, was all smiles when picking up her award. She won the Australian Open and Wimbledon in 2009, was a semifinalist at the U.S. Open and a quarterfinalist at the French Open.

The Williams sisters won the 2009 Australian Open, Wimbledon, and U.S. Open doubles titles as well as the doubles crown at Stanford.

"It's exciting because I don't think we've won the Doubles Team of the Year award before," Serena Williams told The Associated Press. "I won the daily double today and that was cool."

U.S. Open champion Kim Clijsters captured the Comeback Player of the Year and Karen Krantzcke Sportsmanship Award. This marked the seventh time in Clijsters career she won the sportsmanship award.

American teen Melanie Oudin, who had a breakthrough 2009 season in reaching the fourth round at Wimbledon and quarterfinals at the U.S. Open, was honored as the Newcomer of the Year. Yanina Wickmayer of Belgium, who broke into the top 20 last year, won the Most Improved Player award.

Among the causes Huber's raised money for are Hurricane Katrina victims and "Locks of Love," a nonprofit organization that provides hairpieces to financially disadvantaged children suffering from medical hair loss.

Police didn't immediately make any comments about Adriano's questioning.

Brazil legend Pele: Barcelona's Lionel Messi is a great player but needs Argentina improvement

Brazilian footballing legend Pele has commented on Lionel Messi's extraordinary form with his club, but expressed his doubts with respect to Messi's performances with the Albiceleste.

"Messi is a great player," said Pele in comments reported by Marca. "He is playing marvellously at Barcelona, but when he plays with his national team he does not do as well, perhaps because Argentina do not

have the same sort of team as Barcelona, where he has been playing for quite some time."

Pele also gave brief comments about Real Madrid's Cristiano Ronaldo, who he spoke of being a "marvellous figure". Of the players from his home country, Pele highlighted Manchester City's Santos loan star Robinho, who "has improved a lot and has the opportunity to be one of the greatest players at the World Cup".

Van Persie close to Arsenal return

LONDON - Arsenal's title challenge is set to be boosted by Dutch striker Robin van Persie, with manager Arsene Wenger expecting him back from an ankle ligament injury in two to three weeks.

Van Persie, who was in scintillating form before being injured on international duty against Italy in November, is back in training which is good news for his club and his hopes of being fit for the World Cup in South Africa in June.

"He is expected to return but don't expect miracles when a guy has been out for such a long time," Wenger said on Thursday.

"But we are happy to have him back and he is physically ... in good shape. We have just to get him back to full team fitness -- that will take two to three weeks maximum.

FIFA brings hope to poor children through World



ALEXANDRA, South Africa -Sello Mahlangu "loves, lives and breathes football" and says it has helped him keep out of trouble on the mean streets of one of South Africa's poorest townships. Mahlangu, 18, is one of more than 200 disadvantaged children from all over the world who will play in a soccer festival parallel to the World Johannesburg's sprawling Alexandra township, often associated with violence and grinding poverty. Through the July 4-10 "Football for Hope" festival, soccer's ruling body, partnership with the global NGO streetfootballworld, will use the month-long World Cup in South Africa to promote projects helping underprivileged children overcome social problems.

Although three months away from kick-off, the festival, FIFA's flagship social project, has already touched the lives of the youngsters.

"There are many young people who are doing bad things here in Alexandra and I thank God that I am not part of them. Without football I think I would have been doing something like crime,"

said Mahlangu after the ceremonial launch of the festival on Thursday.

Mahlangu, a member of the local project Play Soccer, is one of the eight youngsters who will form Team Alexandra, competing in the festival with 31 other international teams.

Streetfootballworld Managing Director Jurgen Griesbeck said the teams were selected for their commitment to overcoming social problems from homelessness in London and landmines in Cambodia, to AIDS education in South Africa and integration of refugees in Australia.

"We are talking here about role models, we are talking about people who are champions in their communities, people who are our future," said Griesbeck.

FIFA is keen to underline that football is more than huge revenues and millionaire players.

"This World Cup is not only about the big stars coming to South Africa.. (the festival) will represent another World Cup of hope, change and opportunities," said the tournament's chief local organiser, Danny Jordaan.

Ivory Coast Still Searching For New Coach

Fresh off a trip to Europe in search of a coach, Ivory Coast FA President Jacques Anoma yesterday told reporters in Abidjan that he would take his own time to get a new tactician for the national team.

He appeared unperturbed by the amount of days left until the World Cup, where one of Africa's best teams – the Elephants – will be flying their national colours.

"Stop bothering yourselves about a new coach and the little time left for the World Cup," Anoma said.

"I'm more in haste to get a new coach, but I'm being careful," he said.

The names of some of Europe's top coaches including Guus Hiddink and Philippe Troussier have floated across the media as possible candidates for the job but no contracts were ever signed and confirmed by the FA.

"I will choose a coach who will represent national interest," Anoma stated. "Amongst those I've met, I'll make an independent choice and announce the new coach for the Elephants in the days to come," he said

But Anoma has been responding with "days to come" since early this month, and that day hasn't come. The whole nation is waiting and yearning to see the person who will be steering the dwindling soccer destiny of the West African nation. Sven-Goran Eriksson is strongly rumoured to be Ivory Coast's new coach, but Anoma did not confirm it at the news conference.
