## INDEPENDENCE SEEKING "TEDDY' VISITS ARUBA

The doughty sailboat "TEDDY" on an Around-the-World cruise, nosed her silent way into San Nicolas Bay. Outside the reef the small boat attracted no more attention than any of the numerous others that plod their tedious way to and from. Inside the harbor, however, the Norwegian flag playing from the mast in the breeze bespoke of the independence that blest crew and craft. She was glorious with her air of importance.

The forty year old boat is thirty-nine feet long, fourteen feet wide, and draws seven and one half fect of water. The crew list shows Captain, Erling Tambs; First Mate, his wife, and young Tambs, aged five months, second mate. Without a doubt young junior is the youngest mecond mate on any ship.

The intrepid crew, which then consisted only of Captain and Mrs. Tambs, left Flekkef jord, Norway, August, 1928. It took them sixteen days to cross the North Sea during which the high seas and wind combined in administering a. severe buffotting. Throe woeks later they managed to hit the shores of France and from there they went to Cedoila. hgain they were confronted with nasty weather. It beeame so. bad that Captain Tambs was forced to throw out three anchors to keop his tiny eraft from dashing to pieces on the rocks. He said that even with the holp of the anchors, tho boat kept dragging, and for a time he had visions of his trip being onded.

They then procoodod to Spain, and Carfiana and thenco to Lisbon wherc tho boat fas put in for repairs. "Peddy" had a broken the main boom and most of tho rigging had to be gone over to make hor seaworthy once more. From Lisbon they troocceded to Madeira, and then to the
nary Islands where they mado a stop of fells months. It was there that the Soc-
