

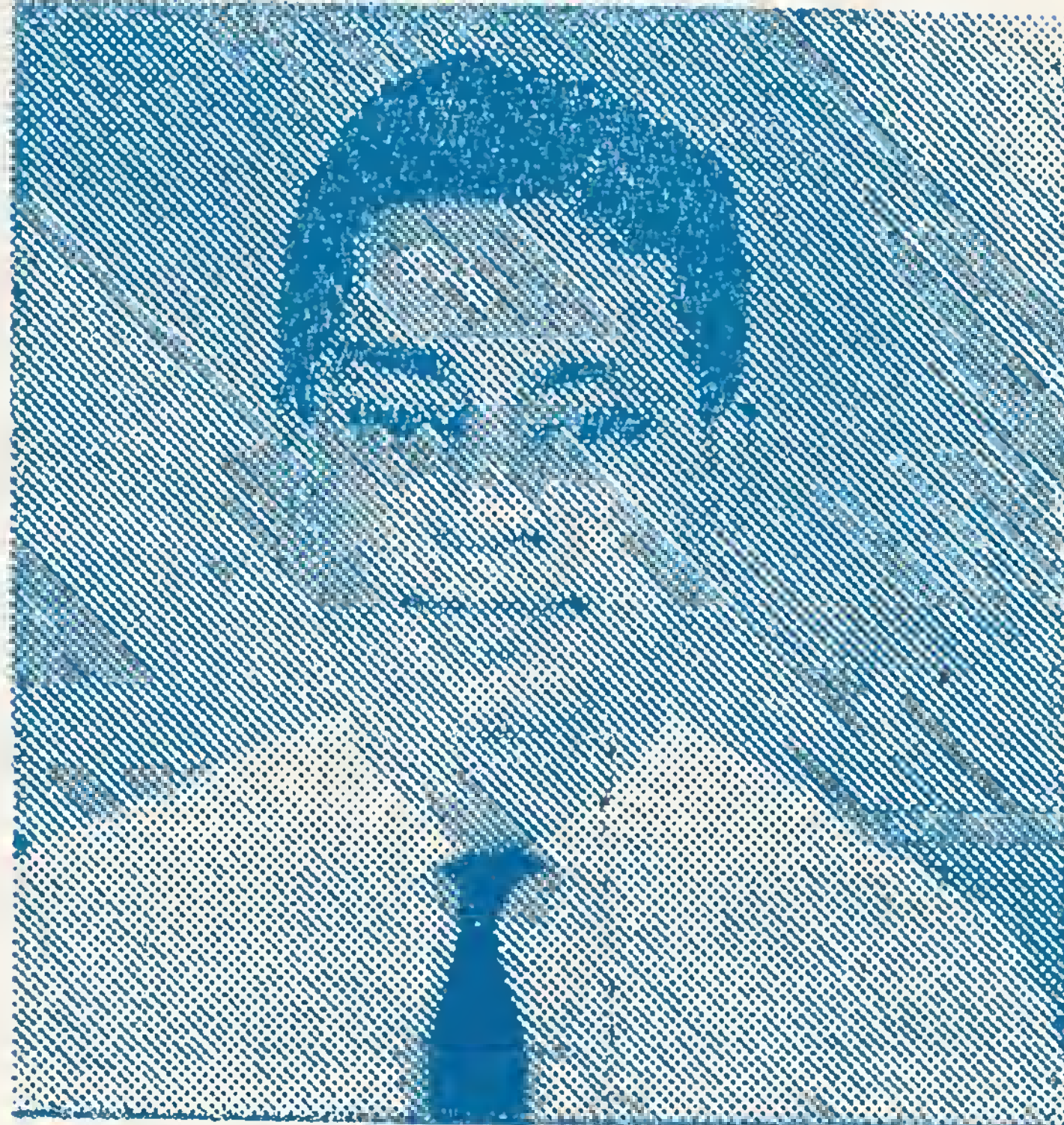

COLLECTIVE WORKING AGREEMENT SIGNED.

We publish a Press release which we received from Lago after our last issue was out. "The three-year Collective Working Agreement between the I.O.W.U.A. (Independent Oil Workers' Union of Aruba) and Lago was signed Thursday afternoon, August 6, 1964. It will run through June 30, 1967. A letter of agreement covering the major changes to be included in the C.W.A. was signed by W.A. Murray, President of Lago and F.L. Maduro, President of I.O.W.U.A. on June 26. This letter, which was binding on both parties in the interim, is now superseded by this official document. Vice President Roy E. Nystrom signed the C.W.A. on behalf of Lago. For the Union, President F.L. Maduro, Secretary L. Albus, and Treasurer P.G. Brook signed the Agreement.

PURPOSE OF THE WEST INDIA COMPANY.

The formation of this Trading Company had a two fold purpose: First it was intended as a means of intensifying the war with Spain by preying on Spanish ships and

raiding their Colonies and secondly it was designed to unite and oversee the scattered Dutch Territories in Brazil, Africa, the Caribbean, the Guianas, and those on the North American Continent.

EXTENT OF THE CHARTER.

The charter stipulated that the West India Company had sole trading rights inside the territories. Trade and Navigation were mentioned first, then Colonization. But the principal advantage, however, was a chance to harrass the enemy and during the first twenty years of the Company's existence, privateering and conquest rated on a par with the slave trade in supplying the plantations of Brazil, Cuba, Jamaica, Hispaniola and North America.

Jackson, U.S.A. Sun. Aug. 9th. A slightly built, nervous ex soldier has been charged with first degree murder in the brutal slaying of two young daughters of an Illinois Circuit Court judge. Andrew Pixley, aged 21, entered no pleas and nervously twiddled his fingers when he appeared in court Friday on a charge of slaying Debby aged 12, and Cinda McAuliffe, aged 8 of Illinois, while they lay in their beds at a Jackson hotel. The two girls were criminally assaulted and strangled early Friday morning, while their sister Susan, aged 6, slept nearby. Susan was not harmed.

SOME ENGLISH NEWS CASTS.

I have heard several comments or should I say criticisms and resentments of the apparent inequitable manner by which some news casts in English are being handled? Well, I can confirm this myself. You sit down to hear the news casts; Dutch Papiamento and English. So you listen to the Dutch and Papiamento and when you begin to listen to the English, you definitely know that you are not getting the same coverage given in Dutch and Papiamento previously on the same news cast. Only days after, you get what were given in Dutch and Papiamento in English. The inequity has been going on for sometime. Some English news casters may claim that they have to read the English items which are handed to them. Then one may reasonably ask how can the translations be made so simple for the other languages? It is true that English is not the official language here, but if it is desirable and it should be so to give equitable news casts in various languages, do so 100% or forget the English. Then when it comes to local news, if you understand Dutch and Papiamento, you can say that you are up to date with the news about the place where you live. For English speaking people? Nothing doing. Then you have it coming to you again; the little of the English which you get, the way some of the news casters speak, leave you unsettled in your seat. Hearing them maltreating the English words; besides, when you think that they have said six, you later, after being quite puzzled, discover

that they meant six and back and forth it goes.; 9 A.M. this morning. 2 P.M. this afternoon; everyone knows A.M. means morning and P.M. means after noon. So why the superfluity? Then when they should extend congratulations and best wishes on occasions, they offer condolence and sympathy., and vice versa. There are also many conflicting statements. It seems for one reason or the other that it can only happen here here. Too many examples; quite disgusting isn't it? Sometimes you think that they either have a dumpling, marble or bubble gum in their mouths the way they pronounce some words sounding like some tied tongue mopsies. Again I say, if we are to have English news casts, lets have them in the true sense of the word by giving the public, both casts and casters. Here, I will like to confirm several favourable comments about Mr. Janchi Tromp, sports commentator when he at times give the sports news in English. He handles this phase of it quite masterfully although English is not his National language. Congrats Janchi; keep it up. I hope that some of those who have assumed the responsibilities of giving news casts in English will follow your footsteps, and the ones responsible for the appointment of the disgusting news casters, will see to it that the right thing is done or it might be necessary to call this past and deplorable current situation to the sponsors of these news casts to do something about it. This is another article which was written sometime ago and sent to a local paper for publication and was suppressed.

GRENADA'S LEGISLATURE ACTS AGAINST
SUBVERSION ACTIVITIES.

St. Georges, Grenada. Thurs. Aug. 13th.
The Grenada Legislative Council moved quickly today against suspected subversive agents by authorising the issue of search warrants and the immediate arrests and prosecution of suspects.
