

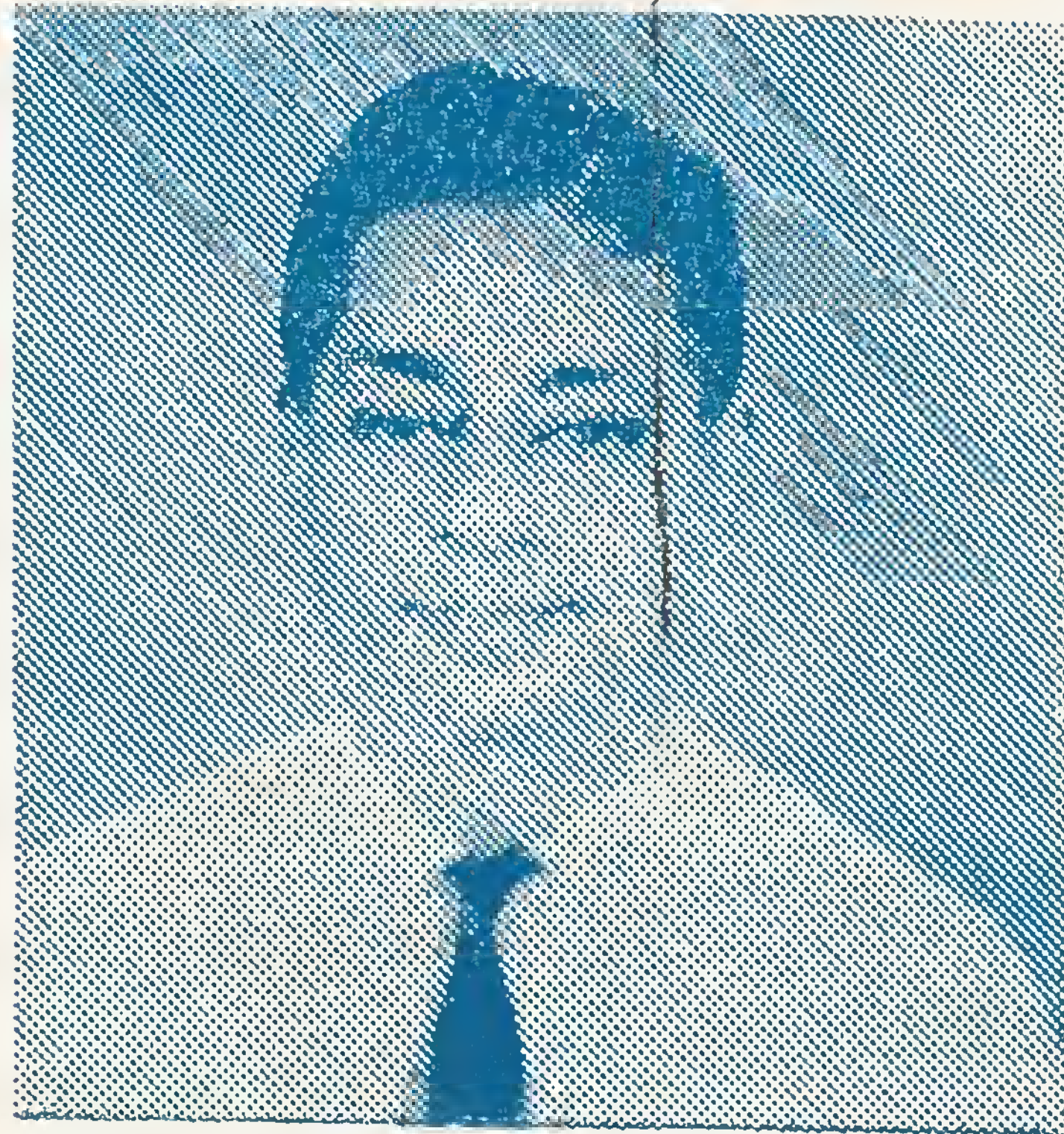

### 6 MORE MURDERS IN B. G.

Georgetown, B.G. Fri. Aug. 28th. Six people all of East Indian descent, were killed early this morning in the worst outbreak of racial violence in British Guiana, for over a month. British soldiers patrolling Mahaicony village, scene of many blood baths during the past four months, came across the bullet-riddled bodies on a burnt earth village road. Reports from the area said members of an Indian community were attacked during the night and that some 18 men were involved.

WEST INDIA COMPANY ORGANIZATION.

The internal structure of the West India Company was similar to the modern corporation. Although a private enterprise, it was sanctioned and sponsored by the Board of Directors, an assembly of eighteen members chosen from the various chambers in Holland and one representative of the Government, was known as the "Nineteen Gentlemen". This body exercised supreme authority over the colonies and was sub-

ordinated only to the States-General, the Parliament in Holland. In many of the conquered territories the West India Company granted permission to patrons or Liege Lord to settle and exploit prescribed areas in return for a royalty or flat sum.

CONQUEST OF THE ANTILLES.

To compensate for the loss of their Marine Base at St. Martin, the West India Company formed an expedition that captured Curacao in 1634. Aruba and Bonaire fell into the hands of the Dutch at the same time and thus once again the company had a strategic Marine Base in the Caribbean for launching attacks against the enemy on the mainland and on the high seas. Spanish fleets carrying Mexican Silver and Peruvian Gold and Portuguese slave ships were plundering for their precious cargoes. The privateers brought the loot and slaves to Aciento in Curacao.

and a Miami policeman at Miami International Airport last night, police reported. Police identified the seaman, who was captured seconds after the shootings as Lloyd A. Giff, a 26 year old Negro.

## A CREOLE PROVERB.

When you give somebody basket to fetch water, watch out you don't get the same fate.

The below mentioned article was published a few years ago. Since at the recent contract negotiations between the Lago and the I.O.W.U.A. agreement was made whereby there will be improvement to the pension plan with management and union representatives to develop ways and means, it is hoped that it will be good for the retirees.

"LAGO'S RETIREMENT PLAN WAY OUT".

"Yes! Lago's Retirement Plan which gives a paltry pittance to the locally hired veteran annuitants of Lago who have over the years given their best including their youth to the Company, is way out of line. This retirement plan which came into being in 1948 by the Company taking away three per cent arbitrarily of employees' earnings from the amount of 10% which they were receiving as Company's contributions which amounted to 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ % which was stated at the time that the company would use the 3% as the employees' contribution towards a pension or retirement plan. Employees worked with the belief that when they would have retired they would be able to relax and enjoy the fruits of their labour. But several annuitants here and abroad and future annuitants have complained to me about the small pittance which they are receiving and which they will get when they retire is hardly sufficient <sup>for house rent</sup> and other utilities costs, excluding food, clothing, and other miscellaneous expenses for the things which these people have

been accustomed to for years. The retirement pittance of these people when they retire, are far away and below that of the lowest paid employee in most cases. Then how can anyone expect these poor people to exist? How must these poor people keep up to the normal standard of living under these conditions? Must they steal or commit dishonest acts in order to keep up with the trend of time? Retirement is meant for one to relax; not to be worried and looking for a job which is not available. For many years annuitants have been bawling for mercy and despite appeals and appeals made by their representatives no one paid any attention to them. Is that the way to treat people who have loyally, faithfully, honestly and sincerely serve a Company as big as a Nation? Please have some mercy; not by words, but by deeds, if we want to have Goodwill Ambassadors and avoid possible conflicting situations which perhaps may lead to disaster. This is an appeal on behalf of the suffering annuitants and those to follow. It is hoped that the authorities do something about it and quickly too.

GUN PROBE SURPRISE. FLUKE EXPOSED  
IRREGULARITIES, TRIBUNAL TOLD.

Trinidad. Wed. Aug. 26th.

A chance discovery at Arima late last year sparked off the investigations which resulted in the suspension of 10 policemen and the current gun probe which is being conducted in the Port-of-Spain fourth Supreme Court. This was revealed yesterday when the inquiry entered its second day before the tribunal, comprising Mr. Justice Georges (Chairman), Mr. Douglas Weir and Mr. I.C. Rampersaud.

MONTSERRAT LAD SAVED.

Bridgetown, B'dos. Tues. Aug. 25th.

A cargo ship arrived here today carrying Franklyn Jeffers, 17, of Montserrat, who was picked up off St. Kitts after being blown out to sea on a raft by the wake of hurricane Cleo. Jeffers, who had been hunting turtles on Birds Island, off St. Kitts, when he was blown to sea, used a mirror to attract the attention of the S.S. Delsud, which brought him here.

TRINIDADIAN FREED AFTER RACE FIGHT.

Toronto, Canada. Tues. Aug. 25th.

A Trinidad school-teacher who beat up an American sailor after being insulted about his race, was acquitted on a charge of assault. Police at Parry Sound, an Ontario Great Lakes port, said Newak of Cleveland, who worked on a freighter berthed there, was in hospital for several days after the beating he received from 23-year-old Beverly Brooks. A witness said that he was in a restaurant here when Newak

told Brooks, a Negro: "If you were in the United States you wouldn't be allowed to walk around the streets like this". When Brooks left the restaurant, Newak followed, trying to start a fight, until finally Brooks retaliated and gave him a beating which sent him to hospital.

#### GRENADA LISTS BANNED PUBLICATION.

St. George's. Tues. Aug. 25th.

The Grenada Government released today a list of 40 publications of which importation has been prohibited. The Administrator, Mr. Ian Turbott, also approved a Legislative Council amendment giving the police fuller powers to act against persons having subversive literature. Included in the banned publications are the Bulletin of the World Peace Council, Current Articles on Peaceful Coexistence and International Cooperation, Cuba Socialista, Caribbean News, the Soviet News and Afro-Asian Bulletin. The new ordinance is also operative against any past or present issues of publications in the Island.

#### KAUNDA ELECTED.

Lusaka. Tues. Aug. 25th.

Dr. Kenneth Kaunda, Northern Rhodesia's Prime Minister, was today elected unopposed as President-designate of Zambia. Northern Rhodesia, becomes the independent state of Zambia on October 24th.

#### CYPRUS PROBLEM.

Athens. Tues. Aug. 25th.

Greece and Cyprus affirmed here today that the Cyprus problem will be brought before the expected November session of the U.N. General Assembly.

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#### PERON SAYS "I AM COMING BACK".

Buenos Aires. Tues. Aug. 25th.

Ex-President Juan Peron announced in a tape recorder message here today that he had decided to return to Argentina. Nine years after a military coup sent him into exile, the tape recording was brought here by a group of his supporters and produced at a Press conference.

#### KHANH NOT NEEDED.

Saigon. Tues. Aug. 25th.

South Vietnam's ruling military junta today bowed to mounting student and Buddhist protests and decided to replace Major-General Nguyen Khanh as President. A communique said that after electing a new chief of State, the junta would dissolve itself and 58 members would return to their military posts.

#### 2,000 REDS ARRESTED.

New Delhi, India. Tues. Aug. 25th. More than 2,000 Communists have now been arrested since the Indian Communist Party started a five day nation wide campaign yesterday against food prices.

#### MC KEE EMPLOYEE COLLAPSED ON JOB.

John Garcia, aged 22, a local employee of the Mc Kee Co. a contracting Co. in Lago, who was welding on a furnace which is being constructed for Lago, took suddenly ill about 10.05 A.M. Saturday August 29th. at the job site. He was immediately rushed for medical attention. We understand that his condition is not serious according to our reporter who was on the spot.

WATCH OUT FOR THE MUMPS.

We understand that quite recently, there were several cases of children as well as adults being ill with the Mumps. Below we publish a brief description of what is the Mumps and how it can be treated, by an experienced medical doctor. In any case victims should consult a physician.

"Mumps is an inflammation of the salivary glands situated in front and slightly below the ears (parotid glands). It is a very contagious disease affecting children mostly. The testicles in the male and the ovaries in the female may be involved at the same time. In adults, the disease may run a more severe course than in children. It usually develops about 15 days after exposure. The symptoms are fever, and pain at the angle of the jaw, on chewing or speaking. A swelling appears in front of the ear and is usually followed by swelling on the other side. It takes about 10 days for the swelling to disappear. The child patient should be isolated from other children. Keep separate table ware for its use, make child rinse mouth with antiseptic gargle, mouth wash, keep patient's bowels free and give an aspirin every three hours if adult. If the patient is under 7 years of age, give only half of an aspirin. Keep patient on a light diet. Apply hot water bags to the side of the face three times a day for an hour each time after applying the following ointment on gauze over the swelling. Ichtyol, 1 dram; Eucalyptol, 20 drops; Glycerin, 2 drams; Starch Powder, 2 drams; Vaseline, (enough to make 1 ounce). Mix and make an ointment; direct to apply on gauze over the swelling 3 times daily.. In case of pain in the testicles or ovaries,

Keep the patient in bed until the pain and swelling are gone. The testicles should be supported by a flannel band, and the patient should be kept at home for 3 weeks even in a mild case. Good hygiene and cleanliness will prevent Mumps as well as other infectious diseases.

HAIR CUT (HAIR TRIM) UP.

We understand that the price for a hair cut (hair trim) has been adjusted upwards to Fls. 3.00 and has replaced the Fls. 2.00 charge which had been in effect for years. Like everyone else the barbers have expenses and it is hoped that the new charge will help them economically.

He pleaded guilty. The youth, Samuel Rodney, of Trou Macaque, Laventille, was remanded to the Youth Training Center until September 8, for sentence pending a report from the Probation Officer.

LIGHTS FOR BEQUIA THIS YEAR.

Kingstown, St. Vincent. Aug. 25th.

Lack of electricity, one of Bequia's major problems, is likely to be solved this year. Two generators have been ordered for the Island, a usually reliable source here said. The generators are likely to be installed later this year. Electricity will be a great asset to the people living in Bequia where there are no proper lighting and heating facilities.

MAGISTRATE RAPS PC FOR PUBLIC SCANDAL.

Trinidad. Wed. Aug. 26th.

A policeman stationed at Siparia was yesterday rapped by magistrate M.B. Arman, in the Siparia court, for "coming to court to create a public scandal". The policeman, constable Sewlyn Janville, appeared in court as a witness for Ralpie "Ambrose" Montano, 27, of Erin Road, Siparia, who was charged with disorderly behaviour on May 21, by sergeant Bellamy, SPO in charge of the Fyzabad station. The magistrate condemned the attitude of the constable, stating that he had only chosen the

opportunity to testify against the sergeant (Bellamy), because he had been disciplined by him on three occasions in the past six months.

DR. MALONEY DIED IN NEW YORK.

Trinidad. Wed. Aug. 26th.

Dr. Russell Maloney, one of the San Fernando-born brothers who distinguished themselves in the United States as outstanding doctors and lawyers, died at Buffalo, New York, yesterday, and will be buried on Thursday. The Maloney brothers comprised Dr. Arnold Maloney who died four years ago, Mr. Clarence Maloney former assistant Attorney General in New Jersey and Dr. Hamilton Maloney, a professor in gynaecology at Howard University. They all attended Howard University and worked in New York.
