KELSHALL HAS TO LEAVE GRENADA.

St. George's Grenada. Thurs. Sept. 3rd.
Mr. Jack Kelshall, San Fernando solicitor, and former Public Relations adviser and personal secretary in British Guiana to Premier Dr. Cheddi Jagan, is to be deported from Grenada as a prohibited immigrant. Mr. Kelshall, who resigned his job with Dr. Jagan on January 28, this year, after 2 years and 4 months was on Monday given six weeks to leave Grenada by magistrate S.J. Bain in a St. George's court. It is not known whether Mr. Kelshall will return to Trinidad, but reports yesterday indicated, that he was still trying for an extension of time of the time he was given to leave Grenada.

The police and soldiers, in a combined operation, detained 10 men for the biggest terrorists massacre apart from the Sun Chapman disaster, in which more than 40 Negroes were killed two months ago.

\$44M LOAN FOR VENEZUELA.

Washington, Sun. Aug. 30th.
The World Bank authorised today \$ 44 million for the development of highways and electric power in Venezuela.

VOLUNTEERS HELD IN BRITISH GUIANA.

Georgetown, B.G. Sun. Aug. 30th.
Three members of a volunteer guard force that helped local police were among 39 people taken into custody by British troops today in connection with the killing of 6 East Indians at Mahaicony on Friday. In a two day search, using horses, boats and helicopters in the Mahaicony area, about 40 miles from Georgetown, police had already arrested 10 others in connection with the same incident.

TRINIDAD BISHOP RAPS UNIONISTS.

Trinidad. Mon. Aug. 31st.

In a pungent, sobering Independence sermon, the Bishop of Trinidad, the Rt. Rev. William J. Hughes, last night blasted the nation's "too carefree" spirit, in talkative trade union leaders, its low level of individual productivity and the slothfulness of its Government departments.

TERROR GANG IN PEOPLES' NAT. CONGRESS.

Georgetown, B.G. Mon. Aug. 31st.

Mr. Peter Owen, British Guiana's Police Commissioner, told the Supreme court today, that the Opposition PNC has a terrorist gang responsible for "a series of crimes". Mr. Owen listed some of the crimes as murder, arson, causing explosions and subversive and criminal activities. He made the charges in an affidavit why the police should not bring before the court Emanuel Fairbairn, also called Batson, held by the police since the raid on a Georgetown guest house on August 9, when an arms cache and documents were bombed. Mr. Owen said that the man had admitted being a member of the gang. Batson was formally charged last week with the murder of Michael Forde, a young Negro member of the PYO who died when the headquarters of the PPP was bombed.

BLACK MUSLIM LEADER HELD.

Philadelphia. Mon. Aug. 31st.

A team of 100 policemen today raided the headquarters of the local Black Muslim Movement and claimed they found components for petrol bombs. They seized the material and took into custody the movement's "Spiritual Leader" Shaykh Muhammad.

ADMINISTRATION OF CURACAO.

Curacao continued to maintain the time of Spanish occupation. The appointment of the Principal Government functionaries came from overseas: A Director in Curacao with his entourage of high ranking associates and Commandeurs for Aruba and Bonaire who were subordinate to the Administrator in Curacao, the latter's interference in everyday affairs was so limited that the Commandeur functioned as some sort of tribal Father and Indian Chief.

UNION OF OVERSEAS COLONIES.

In 1647, the three Islands of Aruba, Bonaire and Curacao were united under one Government together with the Dutch Colony in the United States called the New Netherlands. Placed under the Directorship of Pieter Stuyvesant, this Union lasted until 1664 when New Netherlands was exchanged with the British for Surinam. The Dutch wanted to hold on to the Colony of Curacao at all costs since it supported the Dutch Fleet operating in these waters. However, they were not interested in Colonizing the newly acquired territories and for all practical pur-

poses, the lands remained mere plantations of the West India Company where no one was allowed to settle without permission from the Director in Curacao.

EXPIRATION OF THE WEST INDIA COMPANY CHARTER.

On December 31, 1791, the last charter granted the West India Company expired; renewal was refused and the colonies passed under Dutch State control on Jan. 1, 1792.

IT IS DANGEROUS. WATCH OUT!

Some plants are more toxic than others, and some produce strange symptoms. Within hours after 30 boys, aged 6 to 8, returned from an orphanage outing in the Midwest, complete pandemonium broke loose. Some children began to laugh senselessly, pick imaginary objects out of the air and bark like dogs. Others crawled under their beds, crying and moaning. A visiting physician administered drugs and induced vomiting. The next day most of the boys were back to normal, and all completely recovered in three days. What caused the frenzied antics? The boys had found an abundant patch of Jimson weed and had playfully picked and eaten varying amounts of it. This plant called thorn apple and stink-weed, grows almost everywhere in backyards and waste lands, and is responsible for more poisonings than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, and has large leaves, and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous but the seeds and leaves

especially so. Children have become ill after simply sucking nectar from its floers or chewing a few seeds or leaves. Many Beatniks in New York City's Greenwich village have been hospitalized after drinking Jimson weed "tea" for the kicks it provides. Symptoms are often mild, although they can be as severe as delirium, distorted sight, coma and even death. Both adults and children have been fatally poisoned by tea brewed from the plant's seeds and leaves in the mistaken belief it would cure asthma and other ailments.

Mr. Lionel Luckhoo Q.C., Burnham's lawyer, argued that the prosecution had failed to prove that Burnham was resident or present in the area between July 24 and 27, that the arms required to be surrendered to the police were those covered by the licence issued to Burnham, or that the ammunition belonged to him and was in his possession. If the arms belonged to Burnham, he added, the prosecution had failed to prove that they belonged to him between July 24 and 27. Mr. Luckhoo also argued that the order under which the ammunition was seized was technically void. Finally, he argued that the order was unconstitutional and ultra vires. The case is still continuing.

ALLEGED PLOT FOR QUEEN ELIZABETH.

Toronto, Canada. Wed. Sept. 2nd.
A Toronto commercial radio station yesterday broadcast a recorded interview with a French Canadian youth Richard Bros 18, in which it was disclosed that terrorists would try to kill the Queen when she visits Quebec next month.

C U T SEEKS CLOSED SHOP.

Kingston, Jamaica. Wed. Sept. 2nd.
The Caribbean Union of Teachers has passed a resolution geared to give the union 100% membership, Mr. Vincent Belle Leader of the Barbados delegation said, yesterday. The conference passed a resolution that it should be compulsory for all teachers in permanent employment in the teaching service in the Caribbean to be members of the union in their respective territories.

BUSTAMANTE SAYS NO TO MECHANISATION.

Kingston, Jamaica. Wed. Sept. 2nd.
Sir Alexander Bustamante, Prime Minister of Jamaica, said here today that he does not intend to allow "even one worker to be thrown on the scrap heap of unemployment because of mechanisation". Referring to a "hue and cry by certain people here" for increased use of mechanical equipment, Sir Alex said, if such people were allowed to have their own way, thousands would be thrown out of employment.

INTEGRATION.

Birmingham. Thurs. Sept. 3rd.
Three Negro girls peacefully entered a previously all-white high school today in Birmingham, the scene of bitter racial violence last year.

TWO B.G. NEWSPAPERS ACCUSED.

Georgetown, B.G. Thurs. Sept. 3rd. British Guiana's two evening newspapers were today charged with publishing material likely to prejudice public order and spread ill will among the inhabitants. The charges are brought under the special emergency regulations. The "Mirror", edited by Jamaica's Richard Hart, is charged with publishing prejudicial matter on July 28, in an article which dealt with a man who was believed to have escaped after the bombing at McDoom Village. The "Mirror" is the mouth piece of Dr. Jagan's Peoples' Progressive Party. The "Evening Post" owned by Peter Taylor, is on two charges, along with columnist Percy Armstrong, for articles published on July 26. Owner-editor Peter Taylor was recently shot in the stomach by a mysterious gunman. The "Evening Post" is a strong critic of the Jagan Government. Law Officers are examining several other publications for possible similar charges.

KELSHALL CAUSES THINKING.

Trinidad. Fri. Sept. 4th. The Government is reportedly worried over the prospect of Mr. Jack Kelshall, former private secretary to Dr. Cheddi Jagan, returning to Trinidad and teaming up with left

wing trade union leaders and their advisers. Trinidad-born Mr. Kelshall, a known leftist, was given six weeks by a magistrate on Monday to leave Grenada. He had overstayed his permit to remain in the Isle of Spice. A solicitor, he has lived out of Trinidad since September 1961, when he took up an appointment as Public Relations Adviser and Private Secretary to the Guianese Premier, Dr. Jagan. Mr. Kelshall went to Grenada earlier this year shortly after he resigned his B.G. job. While in B.G., he had declared that since the war, he had consistently tried to fight for Socialism in Trinidad.

BEAUTY QUEEN'S DEAD BODY SEIZED!

Georgetown, B.G. Thurs. Sept. 3rd. A post mortem examination was performed today on the body of beauty queen Bernice Roberts, who died in the Georgetown Hospital less than 72 hours after a two-week visit to Trinidad. Bernice was a typist at the General Post Office. Police yesterday afternoon held up the burial and seized the body.

Bridgetown, Barbados. Fri. Sept. 4th. Attorney-General Mr. Hilton Vaughan yesterday was admitted to the Inner Bar of Barbados following his appointment as a Queen's Counsel, (QC).

HOPE FOR THE BLIND.

Chicago. Thurs. Sept. 3rd.

An ingenious new "window" will soon be placed in blinded human eyes in hopes of restoring sight permanently. It is a transparent plastic cornea, the window of the eye, with a movable "pane" in the centre. This tiny pane can be screwed out to permit correction of any complications that might arise later, and then put back. "If the artificial cornea proves as successful in humans as it has in rabbits and monkeys, it might restore sight to thousands of blind persons," Dr. William Stone jr. said today.

Bridgetown, Bbdos. Thurs. Sept. 3rd. Dr. Gerald Spencer, President of the American Association for the Advancement of Caribbean Education, has said here that the association will highlight the Barbados College of Arts and Sciences at its next January luncheon in New York.

Dover, England. Thurs. Sept. 3rd. A California school girl, Leonora Modell, aged 14, tonight stumbled ashore on a tiny slipway above jagged rocks here to become the world's youngest Channel swimmer.

LEFTIST LOSES CHILE'S PRESIDENTIAL
ELECTION.

Santiago, Chile. Fri. Sept. 4th. Communist-backed Socialist Salvador Allende tonight conceded victory in Chile's crucial presidential election to pro Western Christian Democrat Eduardo Frei. "I admit the election results are adverse to us and that my candidacy has no possibilities of regaining the lost ground" he said.

MALAYSIA.

Kuala Lumpur. Fri. Sept. 4th.

Malaysia entered a state of emergency today to meet a threat of war with Indonesia and to combat new race riots in Singapore. British and New Zealand troops moved into battle positions. The Malaysian Government moves were matched in Jakarta by orders from President Sukarno to his Indonesian "forces to display their strength" throughout Indonesia to meet any possible attack.
