EDITORIAL.

WHICH ARE YOU, FAMILY BOSS OR LOVING HUSBAND?

We have decided today, to use as our editorial, excerpts of an article which we consider should be of some interest to our readers taken from a recent publication of the "Awake" magazine. "Do you walk several feet ahead of your wife to show your position as head of the house? Or do you speak disparagingly of your wife to others out of fear that kind words would imply that you are "henpecked"? Believe it or not, this is the practice in some communities. You may agree that the man should be head of the house, but still you probably say, "That's taking headship a little too far". Nevertheless, in a society where the family is the basic unit, it is proper that a man should take his responsibility as family head seriously. Some family heads, though, have difficulty in adjusting themselves to the home environment because of the highly competitive atmosphere in which they must work all day, where the big-man-kick-little-man attitude often alienates the overseer from his fellow workers. The boss wants to get as much out of his men as he can, while the men want to get as much out of the boss as they can. His presence will stimulate activity, but will not always be welcome. Perhaps you would like to improve conditions under which you work but are not in a position to do so. However, you can do something about conditions in the home where you are the head. Your home coming can be something that the whole family looks forward to, or it can be a time when your wife says, "look out kids, your father's coming". Something that makes any of us feel good is when the boss comes along,

notices the good work we are doing and commends us. Now, if a husband feels that way, would it not be reasonable to conclude that a wife does too? She will soon sense it if her housekeeping and cooking are being taken for granted. She works hard to have the house clean and the meal ready on time. She has changed her dress and tidied her hair, and now here comes her husband. Coat thrown here, shoes kicked off here, he gobbles down the meal without noticing anything different, then sinks back in the arm-chair buried in a newspaper. What a disappointment! If only he had said something that showed a little appreciation. It would have required very little effort, and it would have meant so much. It can turn a boss-like head into a loving husband.

JOBS BY MILLIONS.

Trinidad. Sun. Sept. 6th.  
Representative Mr. Lionel Seukeran returned on Friday night from an 11-week Government sponsored Public Accounts Administration course, in the United Kingdom. He plans to discuss with Prime Minister Dr. Eric Williams, the prospects of exporting surplus labour from this country to West Germany. Such a serious shortage of labour existed there, he said, that with 1,850,000 foreigners already employed, there was still need for at least another million. #### TERRORIST ORGANISATION IN B. G.

Georgetown, B.G. Sat. Sept. 5th.

Premier Dr. Cheddi Jagan today accused the police of suppressing information on a central "terrorist organisation" in British Guiana. In an Official Statement here, Dr. Jagan said that complete information on this terrorist organisation is set out in a series of fully-documented papers prepared by and in possession of the Police Department. The newspapers give the names of those who organise and centrally direct this terrorist gang, and of its members. (Police Commissioner Mr. Peter Owen said on August 17 that police inquiries had revealed an "organised thuggery in British Guiana".) The statement went on to charge that the newspapers "tell of efforts to seek funds in the United Kingdom and the U.S. and to get arms from Dutch Guiana and Venezuela, and give the names of some of those responsible for bombing outrages in 1963 and 1964". Dr. Jagan said that he was making this exposure to the public because the police had not been taking action on the information at their disposal. He accused the police and the British Government of suppressing information on the alleged terrorist activity of Mr. Forbes Burnham's People's National Congress, the main opposition party in the country. Dr. Jagan said that the opposition party had been protected whilst the Government party had been attacked, bombed and wrongfully smeared.

#### COUNCIL SEAT IN U.S. WON BY TOBAGONIAN.

Trinidad. Sun. Sept. 6th.

Dr. Stanley Hugh Smith, Tobago-born Professor at Tuskegee Institute, Ala. U.S.A. was one of the two Negro candidates who won their way into run offs against white opponents in last month's City Council race in Tuskegee.

#### ST. VINCENT GETS \$878,000. FOR ROADS.

Kingstown, St. Vincent. Sun. Sept. 6th. Mr. Clive Tannis, St. Vincent's Minister of Communications and Works, announced yesterday that the British Government had approved a grant of \$878,000 for the development of roads throughout the Island. Mr. Tannis has gone to Barbados on his way to Britain on a 10 day visit.

#### SIX MILLION HOMELESS.

New Delhi, India. Mon. Sept. 7th. Worst floods for 40 years left nearly six million people homeless, inundated 5.5 million acres and caused damage estimated at \$41 million most of it to badly needed crops. 65 lives have also been lost.

#### TYPHOON RUBY'S DAMAGES.

Hong Kong. Tues. Sept. 8th. The death toll from Ruby, the worst typhoon to hit this British Colony for years, rose to 41 today. The number of people injured was put at 300. Police estimated that the damage ran into millions of dollars.

#### RADIO-ACTIVE BOYS.

Mexico City. Mon. Sept. 7th. Police here are searching for two boys who may have contracted a fatal dose of radiation after stealing a radio-active capsule from a building site last Thursday.

## THINGS TO KNOW.

(Continued from last week),

SITUATION IN THE COLONIES AFTER ENGLISH RULE.

Shortly after the Dutch State assumed control over the Islands, they were lost again to the British who ruled on and off from 1800-1816. In 1816, the Caribbean Territories were returned to the Dutch at the treaty of London and were exactly what had been lost since the French invasion of Holland in 1795, viz: The three Leeward Islands and the Windward Islands. The newly returned possessions were in poor financial condition and the cost of Colonial Administration could not be met without the support of the Mother Country. Aruba and Bonaire continued to be dependencies of Curacao; Saba was first a dependent of St. Martin, later of St. Eustatius. Far from prosperous, Island problems were compounded by the aftermath of British Rule and Revolutions on the American Continent. Many difficulties were encountered from Spanish Forces as well as the Venezuelan Revolutionaries. Dutch Policy often smacked of hesitancy and was not always firm; the armed forces were too weak to afford protection to Curacao shipping much less defend Curacao merchants establishing the Continent, and yet Curacao Islands afforded hospitality to the Islands of both factions. The condition of the Windward Islands in 1816 was also far from encouraging. Poverty, decadence and backwardness in Government were the results of the 18th. Century misrule by the West India Co. and the subsequent period of impotent Dutch Control and Foreign Domination.

IT IS DANGEROUS. WATCH OUT!

The greatest threat to children are plants with small, attractive poisonous berries.

In Ohio, one summer, a little girl prepared a play luncheon in the back yard. On a miniature plate she put an apple, a radish and some berries she had picked from a shrub growing in her mother's rock garden. Four hours later she lapsed into a coma and within seven hours after the luncheon she was dead. An autopsy showed that the berries she had eaten were from the Daphne mezereum plant. It is cultivated in back yards and also grows wild in thickets throughout the country. In early spring it has white or purple flowers that are followed by small red or yellow berries containing a corrosive poison that produces severe burns in the mouth and digestive tract. Only a few berries are enough to kill a child.

GOLDWATER IN WOULD MEAN DISASTER.

Washington. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
The U.S. Presidential campaign boiled up today with Senator Barry Goldwater promising to seek restoration of the U.S. as the world's leading power, and Senator William Fulbright declaring Goldwater's policies would bring disaster.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC ELECTIONS 1965.

Santo Domingo. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
The Ruling Civilian Junta today set September 1, 1965 as the date for presidential elections. Mr. Donald J. Reid Cabral, President of the three-man governing council, said that on that date, electors would choose a president, national deputies and municipal mayors and councilmen. Those elected will take office on September 24 1965, Mr. Cabral said.

COLORED BABIES MORE MATURED.

Oxford. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
Colored babies are more matured than white ones, according to tests carried out by Dr. Edward Brett, paediatrician at the hospital for sick children, London, it was revealed at a conference here today. Obstetrician Sir Dugald Baird told the same conference that pregnant women who smoke, have smaller babies and double the risk of their baby being born prematurely.

PPP ACCUSED OF FORMING TERROR GANG.

Georgetown, B.G. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
The PPP is searching for a scapegoat for its own crimes and recruiting its terrorist gang for the PR election campaign, Mr. L.F.S. Burnham, People's National Congress said this afternoon. The PNC was commenting on Dr. Jagan's weekend outburst demanding prosecution and detention of the opposition and the immediate release of PPP detainees. The PNC said the PPP demands disclosed a desperate situation confronting the PPP. The PNC Press statement added "What excuse can the PPP offer against the charge that its leaders have been arch-perpetrators in the six month-old wave of violence?" Later the PNC quoted PPP Slogans: "Kill to prevent PR" and a threat to make Guyana "a second Cyprus". The PNC release observed that Dr. Jagan attacked the Governor and Police for failing to act on well-documented information against the opposition gang.

TRINIDADIAN HANDED OVER FOR TRIAL.

Bridgetown, B8dos. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
Trinidad musician William Henry was handed over in custody to constable Rudolph Blaize of the Antigua-Montserrat-Virgin Islands Police Force here yesterday. Henry, 29, is charged with having stolen \$831 in Antigua on

August 28 before flying to Barbados the following day. He was arrested here when the Antigua police contacted the Barbados Police. He will be tried in Antigua.

STUDENTS IN U.S. ASK JAMAICA'S AID.

Kingston, Jamaica. Tues. Sept. 8th.  
Representatives of the West Indies Students Association in the United States called on Mr. Norman Manley, Jamaican Opposition leader, and discussed financial problems encountered by West Indians in the U.S. Mr. Manley said that it was imperative that the students in the U.S. who number between three and four thousand should receive some help on a permanent basis. He said that a central fund should be set up immediately and individual cases should then be investigated.

CUSTOMS UNION.

Kingstown, St. Vincent. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
Opposition Leader Mr. Milton Cato has asked Chief Minister Mr. E.T. Joshua to say if the St. Vincent Government has considered proposals for a Customs Union independent of federation.

ST. VINCENT GETS CANADIAN TEACHERS.

Kingstown, St. Vincent. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
Two Canadian teachers have arrived here to take up teaching appointments under the Canada-Caribbean technical assistance programme.

LIVESTOCK & PASTURAGE DEVELOPMENT SCHEME IN DOMINICA.

Roseau, Dominica. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
The Oxford committee for Famine Relief (OXFAM) have approved about £23,000 (WI\$ 110,400) towards a livestock and pasturage development scheme in Dominica.

INTEGRATION.

Varmville, Virginia. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
A handful of white children ended a five-year county school lockout over integration today when they went to school here with 1,600 Negroes.

THREE MISSING DOMINICAN PLANES FOUND,

Miami. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
Three planes reported missing from the Dominican Republic were today at Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood Airport near here, but officials refused to say how they got there.

EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE TO VISIT WARSAW.

Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia is expected to pay an official visit to Warsaw later this month at the invitation of the Polish Council of State.

ENCEPHALITIS EPIDEMIC DEATHS.

Houston, Texas. Wed. Sept. 9th.  
The number of suspected deaths from Houston's encephalitis epidemic rose to 26 today. Dr. C.A. Pigford, City Health Officer, said 7 additional deaths were added to the total. Meanwhile, the number of suspected cases totalled 613.

WHAT IS ENCEPHALITIS?

Encephalitis, is an inflammation of the brain caused by infections in other parts of the body, by metallic poisons like lead or arsenic, by poisonous gases and fumes, by alcohol, syphilis, tuberculosis, or by parasites of trichinosis or malaria. It may also follow acute or chronic ear infections. It usually starts with a severe headache, nausea and vomiting, high fever, sleepiness, dizziness and delirium. The patient may develop convulsions and paralysis of various parts.

grant the one of letting you know where to obtain a copy of the Short Biography written about me. I will like to get a few copies myself, and I am wondering if those who have copies and have no further use for them can make them available to me, then perhaps I can let you have one. The Booklet was titled "B.K.Chand A Short Biography-Biba Nos Y Nosotros". By David N. Solomon. Printed by: Imprenta De Windt Oranjestad, Aruba. in 1947. The writer and publisher Mr. David Solomon left Aruba a few years ago, and whereabouts of the printer is not known to me. All the other requests cannot be granted at one time. Below is the first one to be followed in order of sequence to your requests. As chairman of the then E.A.C. (Employees' Advisory Committee) at the first joint meeting with management, among other things which I said, and should be still on the files and official records of Lago and which was published in the verbatim minutes which I requested and were distributed to all E.A.C. constituents in English and Papiamentu:

EXCERPTS OF MINUTES OF JOINT MEETING  
ON NOVEMBER 7TH. 1946.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. O. Mingus, assistant general manager then, and management's joint chairman. "Mr. Chand said: "Mr. Chairman, since this is the first joint meeting with management and the newly elected committee, I would like to extend the committee's congratulations to Messrs. J.J. Horigan and Mr. O. Mingus on their recent appointments as General Manager and assistant General Manager respectively, of Lago. We do hope that with God's Guidance that these executives will be able to bring about satisfaction and better understanding between the management and the locally-hired employees. I will like to state here that since the new committee commenced,

they have met with several obstacles by being given the run around by some supervisors who are always in the lower level and besides thinking very little of the committee's plan, look on a committeeman as an enemy, a piece of trash and are always willing to bring pressure on the committeeman due to his activities, whether such activities are being done telephonically or otherwise. I will like to point out here also that the committee in dealing with general foremen and higher up supervisors has had 100% cooperation and encouragement regarding their activities, also I will like to point out that in dealings with the personnel dept. we have always found Mr. F.J. Getts very approachable, courteous, cooperative and helpful. Committeemen are very sceptical to function as such due to their experience with certain supervisors, and since we were told by a representative of the personnel dept. that if the committee does not come around to Management's way and keep sticking their necks out, that sooner or later, Management will see that they, (the committeemen) get the workover. (Note: Mr. Mingus ordered an investigation of this statement made by me about the personnel dept. as representative, and I proved beyond the shadow of a doubt with strong substantiative and corroborative evidence, the truth of my statement. The threatening personnel dept.'s representative who was considered a good pal and associate of Mr. F.C. Donovan who were both formerly years ago in the Lago's Training Division, was removed from Lago, via transfer. Now that I am out of Lago, in many circles it is wondered whether I was not victimised and his threat being upheld by his good old pal Donovan. (Continued on page 10).

He too, very soon will be transferred from Lago, (Not to pitch marbles as he was predicting for the Aruba workers). "At this stage the committee will like to suggest a continuous course of J.R.T. to most Foreign Staff employees with a periodical check up by a responsible person appointed by management. The committee has done its best to bring about a better understanding between management and employees due to existing dissatisfaction but conditions are becoming worse daily and employees are being more dissatisfied with causes which are creating dissatisfaction among them being: (1). Management's refusal to give the locally-hired employees a Cost of Living Wage Adjustment despite the fact of Management's knowledge of the sky rocket prices which existed for months and are daily ascending. Even in Lago's own commissary, prices have gone sky high and every time a request for adjustment is made, management's answer is, that the figures are not justifiable. Employees are wondering if they have to be financially crippled before they get a small increase. (2). Management's compulsory policy for treatment to employees by their medical dept. before the uncertain meagre sickness benefits could be paid to them. Is management aware of the fact that employees are very sceptical to be treated by their medical dept. due to the uncertain impolite manner by which they receive this treatment? Management's reluctance to replace Dr. W.H. De la Fuente with a local doctor who will understand adequately the treatment of tropical diseases. (3). Management's reluctance to see that the small quantity of items allotted to the plant commissary is adequate for distribution. The plant commissary carries about one quarter

the amount stocked at the Colony commissary comparatively speaking, and at most time only about 10% of this quota is available to employees. (4). Management's refusal to sell or give away used wooden cases or any other material of no use to the company to locally-hired employees, but in preference dump them. (5). Management's reluctance to assist in providing adequate transportation facilities to employees in the refinery area to and from work, and the taking away of employees' privilege of cycling to and from work, as a Safety measure. At this juncture we will like to question which is safer, riding a cycle or traveling like packed sardines in an autobus? (6). Management's refusal to aid employees with their warning whistles which were blown at 6.45 A.M. and 12.45 P.M. (7). Management's refusal to cooperate with employees by relieving them of their burdensome task of fetching commissaries from the commissary to the gate by issuing passes for automobiles to go to the commissary. Management said at a meeting on July 28, 1944, that they contemplated erecting a new commissary West of the Lago Police Dept., which would have been of great assistance to the employees. Up to now, nothing concrete has been done about this project although other projects are under way. (To be continued next week).

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OPPOSITION: "GOVERNMENT MUST GET OUT"!

Trinidad. Sept. 10th.  
Both opposition parties - the DLP and the Liberals last night loudly demanded the resignation of the Government, following the startling allegations made before the Commission of Inquiry into the Police Force yesterday by Corporal Oscar Frederick concerning the Minister of Home Affairs, Dr. Patrick Solomon. Cpl. Frederick, Secretary of the Police Association had given the Inquiry evidence alleging that Dr. Solomon, without authority and against the protests of the Officer-in-charge had taken a prisoner to whom he was related, away from the Woodbrook Police Station, and the reaction of the Opposition was immediate and outspoken "Not only must Dr. Solomon resign", said Mr. Stephen Maharaj, Parliamentary leader of the DLP, "but the entire

Government should resign over this. I intend to move a vote of no confidence in the Government as soon as Parliament reconvenes". At a public meeting in Woodford Square, Mr. Peter Farquhar. Leader of the Liberals, told the Government: Get out! For God's sake go! The political situation is still stormy.

VENEZUELA MAKING SPECIAL BED FOR DE GAULLE.

Venezuelan carpenters are making a specially long bed for President De Gaulle who will sleep init on September 21st at the outset of his ten-nation Latin American tour.

\$8M B.G. PLAN FOR RESETTLEMENT.

Georgetown, B.G. Thurs. Sept. 10th.  
The Government has adopted a massive rehabilitation and resettlement plan for the 10,000 people displaced during the country's racial strife. The Premier Dr. Jagan, announced that he and his Ministers had accepted in toto the recommendations of the National Relief and Rehabilitation Committee set up following the disturbances. The cost of implementing the recommendations is estimated at \$8M., and deal with new housing, food and the finding of new jobs and new farmlands.

FIVE YEAR DEVELOPMENT PLAN FO ST. VINCENT.

Kingstown, St. Vincent. Fri. Sept. 11th.  
Two experts from Trinidad and Barbados are in St. Vincent collecting information for a five-year development plan for the Island. From Trinidad comes the deputy director of the institute of Education Mr. George Clough, and from Barbados Mr. Eric Armstrong, lecturer in Economics at the Barbados College of Arts and Science.

They are Colin Moore, UWI graduate, who was last year banned from Jamaica after obtaining a degree; Miles Fitzpatrick, former PPP President, who resigned from the party early last year and formed the "New World Group" and Trevor Carter acting chairman of the Progressive Youth Organisation.
