

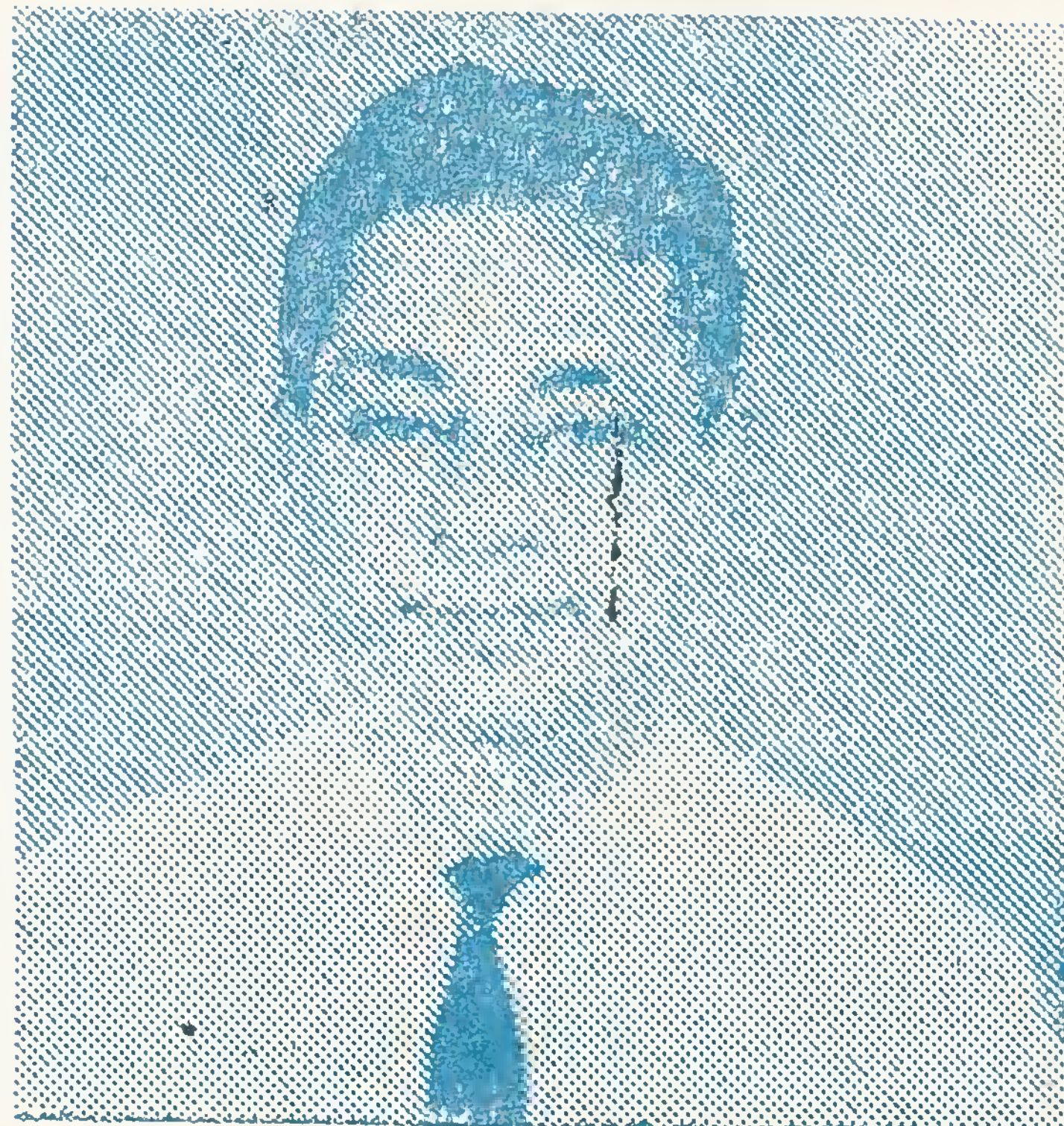

EDITORIAL.

PEACE AND JUSTICE.

Sometimes you happen to hear such statements as: "A Negro Riot Again"? "What do the Negroes want now?? It is not our intention to create a fracas on these questions today, but to put the spotlight on things as they and how we see it in the light of "Peace and Justice". Over a Century ago the Negroes have been in bondage (Slavery) and were subsequently released into freedom by Great Sovereigns, other heads of States and several Noblemen. The Negroes hard working and submissive people, humble, kind and willing to aid his fellow men after gaining his freedom, showed his ability to hold his own in whatever field he was placed, whether it be education, Society, Religion, Law, Culture, Arts and Science. The Negroes, regardless of pigmentation of the skin with a dark colour, is human as all others. The same Flesh and Blood of God's own Creation. When the Creator Almighty God made man He said "Let us make man in our own image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth on earth. So God Created man in his own Image, in the Image of God, Created He him; male and female created He them". Genesis: 2; 26-27. It will appear therefore that what the Negroes are standing up for is nothing more than their Rights, Democratic Rights! Call it what you want to: "Civil Rights" or "Unkept Promises" Human Rights. All the Negroes seem to want is "Peace & Justice". His Rights the Human Rights which God from Creation gave to them and since liberated from the bondage by which they were kept, they are only seeking, what rightfully belongs to

them. They do not want Riots! They want what they are entitled to as God's children of His Universe. The Negroes are not alone in their stand; they have the support of other races who have also been suppressed. They even have the support of His Holiness the Pope, Paul VI P.M., and the Catholic Church collectively. In a recent private talk between Dr. Martin Luther King, United States Negro Leader and His Holiness at the Vatican, Dr. King stated that the Pope supported the cause of Civil Rights and expressed the hope that such Rights would be achieved by non-violent methods. "The Pope made it clear that he personally and the Catholic Church collectively are the friends of the Negro people and support the cause of Civil Rights in the United States". Trinidad. Mon. Sept. 14th.
A Social Security Plan for Trinidad & Tobago is now in the final stages of preparation according to reliable reports. And also to be introduced probably at the same time, will be Government's Pension Scheme for more than 20,000 daily paid workers. The Social Security Plan is one of the 1961 election pledges of the Governing People's National Movement.

SCIENTIST DIED AT UWI JAMAICA.

Kingston Jamaica. Sun. Sept. 13th.
Dr. Dinah Kohner, 28, of Belfast, north Ireland, died last night in the University of the West Indies Hospital, Mona. Dr. Kohner was a member of the staff of the hospital ship ss. Hope. She received head injuries some two weeks ago in a plane crash in Ecuador and was taken to Jamaica after an emergency operation on Thursday aboard the hospital ship.

INVESTIGATION ON ROBERTS' DEATH.

Georgetown, B.G. Mon. Sept. 14th.
British Guiana Police sent relevant documents to the Trinidad police over the week end regarding the death of beauty fashion queen, Bernice Roberts at the Georgetown hospital a few days after returning from Trinidad recently. The Police of British Guiana believe that Miss Roberts was murdered, and that the incident leading to her death occurred while she was vacationing in Trinidad a few weeks ago. They also believe that a Trinidad female

doctor can help them in the investigations which centre on an attempted illegal operation on Miss Roberts.

ST. LUCIA'S SURPLUS BANANAS.

Castries, St. Lucia. Mon. Sept. 14th.
The St. Lucia Banana Growers' Association believes it can meet the temporary shortage of bananas caused by the devastation of Guadeloupe's crops by Hurricane Cleo. St. Lucia has a surplus because of a recent increase in the minimum weight being accepted by Geest Industries, buyers for all Windward Islands bananas.

TAX HOLIDAY.

Georgetown, B.G. Mon. Sept. 14th.
The Government of B.G. has granted a five-year tax holiday and a free entry licence for the importation of building materials, plant and equipment to Friendship Marine Ltd. (a joint local and Canadian company). This company will manufacture barbed wire and chain link fencing. The capital investment for this new industry is estimated at \$160,000 of which \$120,000 will be subscribed locally and the remainder from Canadian sources. Equipment for the manufacture of these products is expected to arrive so that the company can be expected to start operations between December 1964 and January 1965. The new industry will provide employment for 22 more Guianese.

B.G. CUSTOMS SEIZE \$4,500 AT AIRPORT.

A recent report from B.G. stated that last week, a Chinese laundryman and his wife were held at Atkinson Airport late Tuesday night after \$4,500 was discovered tucked away in their baggage, by a Customs Officer. The money which was in \$100 bills, was being smuggled out of the country contrary to the Exchange Control Ordinance.

SOLOMON QUILS THE CABINET. PRIME MINISTER ACCEPTS HIS RESIGNATION.

Trinidad. Tues. Sept. 15th.
The Minister of Home Affairs, Dr. Patrick Solomon, resigned from the Government yesterday, over the incident involving his stepson, Michael Beausoleil, at Woodbrook Police Station on January 28, 1962. In a letter of explanation to the Prime Minister Dr. Eric Williams, of the incident, Dr. Solomon denied arbitrarily securing the release of his stepson, alleged that the youth had been beaten up by the police and told the Prime Minister he had not brought it to his notice because he sought to avoid involving the Government in the matter. That it had been made into a "Cause Celebre" which had embarrassed and was continuing to embarrass the Government, and in these circumstances he tendered his resignation. The correspondence was released in a hand out from the Public Relations Division of the Prime Minister's Office last night. The Prime Minister replying to Dr. Solomon's letter, said he deeply regretted the incident had not been brought to his notice as soon as it occurred, adding: "I cannot agree that the procedure you thought it best to follow was correct". The Prime Minister said he was now making inquiries into why the matter was not brought to his attention by the police.

MRS. EILEEN SOLOMON DIES IN LONDON.

Mrs. Eileen Solomon, former wife of Dr. Patrick Solomon, the resigned Minister of Home Affairs, Trinidad & Tobago, died shortly after mid-day at Hammersmith Hospital, London, yesterday. She was reported over the week end as making remarkable progress following an operation, she suffered a relapse yesterday morning.

LEFT FOR FOUR YEARS STUDIES.

Mr. Hilario Bislip, well known Comptroller Dept.'s. employee at Lago, and popularly called Al, left on Thursday last by plane to attend the Bowling Green State University to further his studies in Accountancy. He will be away for approximately 4 years. The course is a Lago sponsored one. He has left his wife and 3 children to await his return. We wish him success and his family well during his absence.

FREDERICK VICTIMISED SAYS WITNESS.

Trinidad. Tues. Sept. 15th.
Former police inspector John Bailey told the Commonwealth Commission of Inquiry into the Police Force yesterday that Corporal Oscar Frederick, Secretary of the Police Association, was debarred from promotion for "seven long years" because of his activities in the Association. Mr Bailey himself a former chairman of the Association, who was appearing before the Commission as a private citizen, said that Cpl. Frederick was a "brilliant officer and a fearless advocate of the Association", but was always deemed a "political man" in other words a "politician", by the Police Administration.

MRS. JANET JAGAN IN BARBADOS.

Bridgetown, B'dos. Mon. Sept. 14th.
Mrs. Janet Jagan, wife of the British Guiana Premier Dr. Cheddi Jagan and former Home Affairs Minister in the Government, arrived here at the weekend for what she described as a "pure holiday and rest in sunny Barbados". It is understood that Mrs. Jagan is in Barbados to put her son Joe into school here.

THINGS TO KNOW.

GOVERNMENT REGULATION OF 1816.

Whereas the Dutch Constitution as early as 1798 contained a paragraph regulating the Constitutional Charters for the newly acquired colonies it was not until 1816, that provisions were enacted which could be considered worthy of execution. The King became the supreme authority over the Colonies and possessions of the Kingdom. Thus he became the Colonial Legislator as well as Administrator and as such exemplified autocracy in its purest form. The Government regulation of 1816 as written for the West Indies referred to three Territories: Surinam, the Leeward Islands and the Windward Islands. Although much remained as it was at the time of the West India Company, many improvements resulted. For the first time there was a clear easily understood and detailed order of the Islands. In no instance, however, was there a single trace of Colonial Autonomy. The Government functioned in an early autocratic manner as one by one the committees and Councils for Colonial Affairs disappeared from the scene in Holland. Ministers, already overloaded with internal duties, neglected colony affairs in a cross manner.

GOVERNMENT IN ARUBA IN 1816.

When Aruba was returned to the Dutch in 1816, the population amounted to 1732 people. There were exactly 9 Government employees on the payroll: A Commandeur, a Vice-Commandeur, a Receiver of Taxes, A Captain of Indians, and four Watchmen. It was with this force that the Commandeur directed the affairs of the Island. He was the Chief Magistrate of the Island and was subordinate only to the Governor General in Curacao. The Commandeur was the infallible authority and the man

in which all right and power was concentrated. Specifically charged to see that the State slaves were treated humanly; he arbitrated all disputes, even those of a domestic nature. People went to him to report a runaway slave or when a hut burned down. (To be continued next week).

IT IS DANGEROUS. WATCH OUT!

Here again, is the unripe green berry that is the villain. The ripe berries of Lantana camara have long been eaten by natives of the tropics with no harmful effects. Even more lethal than berries are the seeds of some plants. Prime examples are the rosary peas seeds and the castor bean seeds. Although you may not see the rosary pea plant itself, (its grown in the tropics), you often see the imported seeds in the form of rosary beads and necklaces. Thousands of such ornaments have been brought into the country by tourists. The seed is no bigger than a pencil eraser and is extremely attractive with a shiny enamel-like finish of Chinese red and jet black. Yet, it is so toxic, that one seed, thoroughly chewed, has been known to kill a youngster. There's little danger if the seed is swallowed whole, for its hard skin prevents rapid absorption of the poison.

8. Management's reluctance to aid Bachelors in getting accommodation at the Bachelor Quarters though for many months several rooms have been vacant.

9. Management's refusal to erect housing accommodation for locally-hired employees stating that they are not interested in the housing business, but with the construction of houses at Colorado Point, employees are wondering whether Management is still not interested in the housing business.

10. Management's apparent reluctance in procuring annuities benefits as "Pension Fund" for employees as per their statement of July 28, 1944, when it was stated that nothing could have been done in this direction until after the war. The war is over now, and yet nothing has been done. (Note: A Pension Plan was instituted a few years after, but still not adequate and serves its intended purpose, or the purpose it should serve, despite several appeals to Management, even to the extent of a contributory Plan suggested by employees' representatives. That is why Lago's Annuitants have to seek other avenues of ways and means to augment their poorly and miserable pittance).

11. Management's refusal to facilitate pay off time for employees other than their own time, although Management is aware of the hardships employees encounter having to stand in lines for lengthy periods to receive their hard earned wages.

12. Management's refusal to continued deduction of thrift contributions on employees' gross earnings.

13. Management's attitude of depriving employees of the freedom of collecting and subscribing among themselves for gifts and aid to their fellow employees when necessary.

14. Management's apparent "Red Tape"

of use of phone at Lago Police Dept. Main Gate, by employees when outside and they want to make a call to someone in the Refinery.

15. Management's introduction of the "New Cold Storage" package pick up line at the Plant commissary, which causes employees great inconvenience, having to line up in one line for groceries then to line up in another long line for cold storage items.

16. Management's approval of strict disciplinary measures to employees for petty and other offences when a verbal reprimand or other action could serve the purpose.

17. Management's inconsiderate attitude towards hourly paid employees in keeping them on a three day waiting period for "Sickness Benefits" for which they are not paid.

18. Management's unkept word to locally-hired employees regarding their job status as of their meeting of July 28, 1944, when it was stated that there are no grounds for employees' fear that outsiders will be brought in to the detriment of Aruba employees who left their jobs to join the armed forces would be employed. For quite a few months now, we have seen all over the Refinery, new employees, not only locally-hired, but Foreign Staff who have never worked for the company before and Foreign Staff employees who are holding down jobs done formally by locally-hired. These Foreign Staff employees with less responsibility, receiving about three times and more than what the locally-hired get to do all the work and all the responsibilities of the job.

19. Management's reluctance in facilitating employees' comfort when riding buses. At each outgoing and insoming gate employees or their families have to get out and get back in buses to be checked by the Lago Police Dept.

Whether rain is falling or not. If the checks are to be made could not Management instruct the Lago Police Chief to put a member of his force on each bus so as not to further inconvenience or embarrass employees and their families? 20. Management's approval of having employees quit instead of allowing them opportunities for transfers where they can make more money than in their present jobs stating that transfers could not be given due to lack of replacements. When these employees quit how do we get replacements? These employees having worked without increases due to the jobs not paying more money. 21. Management's refusal even to allow employees in the country districts to leave the Refinery with even a thermos bottle full of water, or a piece of ice which is picked up on the road in the Refinery. 22. Management's reluctance to see that employees are afforded adequate transportation facilities to and from work in the Refinery although it has been proven that the accepted bus service is no good. 23. Management's refusal to see that rates in the various departments are standardised. 24. Management's refusal to see to it that employees who have waited for months and years get a better increase than the Fls.5.00 or Fls.15.00. 25. Management's refusal to avoid the idle efficiency experts who were never here during the hard working war years from interfering with hard working and tireless employees. 26. Management's administration of Policies in a manner different in accordance with the Policy as published in their "Policy Manual". "After Mr. Chand concluded his opening remarks and adduced the foregoing as some of the points of dissatisfaction, Mr. Mingus made an announcement of $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ increase as of

Nov. 1, 1946, in approved regular Base Wage and Salaries. Mr. Chand then asked if a compromise could not be reached and stated the committee's counter proposal again as follows: "A 15% increase in Base Wages and Salaries, retroactive November 1, 1945 or a 20% increase in Base Wages and Salaries retroactive to July 1, 1946, stating that the requests could be backed up by figures and facts. Mr. Mingus said no; and Messrs. A.A. Kalloc and Benson Douglas members of the Cost-of-Living sub-committee made certain submissions supporting the request which was not accepted by the Management. Mr. Chand said that since the request was rejected and since the committee had presented the proposals of their constituents as requested, he asked Mr. Mingus to take the committee proposal under advisement and notify the committee through him by Wednesday November 13th., what Management's final reaction would be and that in the meantime the committee would cease to function until such time that the request of their constituents was granted. Mr. Chand then left the conference room with the other members of the committee". Note: It should be of interest to note the points raised at the time and subsequently debated on a prepared agenda as was suggested by Mr. Mingus, and check against existing conditions since.

In announcing this yesterday, the Government stated that a child who in the opinion of the Minister charged with responsibility with Social Security has been deprived of its bread winner will be maintained and educated at public expenses until he completes secondary education. Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, will visit Anguilla but miss St. Kitts and Nevis when he comes to the territory on November 17th.

Lack of response by the British Government to Grenada's financial needs is reported by a committee of the People's National Movement Legislative Group, under the chairmanship of the Political Leader Dr. Eric Williams.

St. George's Fri. Sept. 18th.

The Grenada Government released figures today to show that its economy benefits from annual emigration of farm workers to the United States. Remittances home from compulsory savings during last year amounted to more than \$86,000.

PLEA TO CALL OFF QUEEN ELIZABETH'S CANADA TOUR.

London. Fri. Sept. 18th.

A Leading Canadian living in London today appealed to the British Prime Minister, Sir Alec Douglas-Home, to use his influence to cancel or postpone Queen Elizabeth's visit to Canada next month. There have been fears for the safety of the Queen following anonymous threats to assassinate her by French Canadian extremists.

GRENADA'S MINISTER'S INDECISION.

Grenada's Minister without Portfolio Mr. L.A. Purcell, said today that he was still indecisive about reports that he planned to hand in his resignation. But he did not comment on a report that he intended to deflect to the Opposition party and so reduce an elected majority in the Legislature to 5 all.

MONTANO SUCCEEDS DR. PAT. SOLOMON.

Trinidad. Thurs. Sept. 17th.

Mr. Gerard Montano, former Minister of Works, was last night named the New Minister of Home Affairs to succeed Dr. Patrick Solomon as part of a major cabinet re-shuffle designed to achieve greater smoothness in the Ministerial control of important business of the country. Succeeding Mr. Montano as Minister of Works is Mr. Saied Mohammed, whose former Ministry of Local Government and Community Development has been split up.

NEGROES WIN.

Tuskegee, Alabama. Thurs. Sept. 17th.

Two Negroes won City Council seats in an election here yesterday, against white candidates.

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
