****** EDITORIAL. ********** We have decided today, to use as our editorial, excerpts of an article which we consider should be of some interest to our readers taken from a recent publication of the "Awake" magazine: "WHAT HAS NATIONALISM DONE TO MANKIND? "How greatly peace is desired by the masses of mankind. For centuries it has been longed for, but it has continued to be but a dream. Hatred and bloodshed have continued to be harsh realities. Our twentieth century has seen the most sickening demonstration of man's animosity toward his fellowman. In two world wars tens of millions of humans have been slaughter -ed and maimed. That animosity has not ceased, but continues unabated in this year of 1964. Differences in Race, religion and social status have contributed to the animosity. However, one of the greatest divisive factors of all is nationalism, that is the exaltation of one nation above all others, giving it supreme loyalty. The surface of this tiny planet is broken up politically into the territories of over 100 sovereign independent states. The number of these political splinters of humanity has nearly doubled since the end of World War 2. This does not make sense. Nor does it make sense that each of these should retain a sovereign right to jeopardize the human race's chance of survival by making war. . How absurd it is, then, that the survival of the human race should be endangered by our loyalty to these ephemeral political creations. After all, we have to be human beings before we can be American human beings or Liberian human beings or Japanese human beings. Our humanity is a more basic fact than our nationality. If the human race goes down the drain, all human nations will go with it. It follows, surely, that

our loyalty to the human race should be paramount". But are men primarily concerned with the human race? On this matter Ivo Ducacheck in his book Conglict and Cooperation Among Nations, says: "Nationalisa divides humanity into mutually intolerant units. As a result people think as Americans, Russians, Chinese, Egyptians, or Peruvians first, and as human boings second if at all . So the failure to recognize people first as members of the human race has split the world into a host of opposing factions, the leaders of which claim that the paramount loyally of subject peoples belongs to the States right or wrong". All too frequently this has been "wrong", and people have supported wicked, corrupt leaders in the name of Nationalism".

BURNHAM CROSS EXAMINES DR. JAGAN. Georgetown, B.G. Mon. Sept. 21st. Dr. Cheddi Jagan, Premier of B.G.,

was today cross-eaxamined by lawyer Forbes Burnham QC, People's Natienal Congress leader, in the Official Secrets Act trial of Peter D'Aguiar. leader of the United Force Mr. Burnham is a defence counsel and Dr. Jagan, the star witness for the Crown. who was flown from Mazazuni Penal Settlement to testify, enegered the witness box immediately after Dr. Jagan.

EVERY CENT COUNTS.

Trinidad. Tues. Sept. 22nd. A Port of Spain school teacher was officially temonded by the Commissioner of Inland Revenue that she still owes tax on her 1958 income. "I shall be grateful if payment of this amount can be made within 14days", stated the demand. The amount payable was 9cents.

Trinidad. Mon. Sept. 21st. the trousers pooket of a man who was pronounced dead on arrival at the San Fernando General on Friday night. They have already questioned some nurses and wardsmen. The investigations followed a report made by 2. Buy for Quality and not Cheapness. Mr. Edward Toolsie, son of the dead man, Mr. Irving Toolsie, a Texaco employee, who worked on Friday and during the night at home complained of feeling ill. (Continued from last week). The Vice-Commandeur was chraged with the Administration of the State Farms and Salt Ponds. The Captain of the Indians directed no Indians but was charged with the execution of all tasks not specifically entrusted to other functionaries. He assisted in taking inventory of all state properties and kept track af all changes therein. Saddled with inspections, census and police functions - he also was supposed to supervise and direct Public Works. It fell to the Lieutenant of the Indians to organize donkey drives for export to Venezuela, Cuba, Jamaica etc.

GOVERNMENT REGULATION OF 1823.

Rules of Administration introduced in 1823 in no way diminished the authoritarian powers of the Commandeur. The Regulation dominated the 19th. century and impressed the patriarchal stamp upon Aruba with no trace of Self-Rule for the inhabitants. These state of affairs was the natural result of a largely illiterate population and the fact that Private individuals had not been able to establish themselves in Aruba. THE COUNTRY COURTS.

This body, created in Aruba for passing sentence, did not have a like counterpart anywhere else in the World. Kalled the Country Courts, "Courts of Peace", it consisted of the Commandeur as Presiding Officer and two of the most prominent and capable citizens who were called Magistrates. The body, assisted by a Court Recorder, received no renumeration and was charged with all affairs normally entrusted to the police in other communities. It refereed and settled all disputes between inhabitants which were not of a criminal nature and imposed fines up to 100 pieces . and jail sentences to a maximum of 14 days.

As a partial solution to the financial difficulties in which the Islands
found themselves in the 1820's, it
was decided to unite the three West
Indian Colonies (Surinam, the Leeward
Islands and the Windward Islands) under the one Government hundred by a
Governor-General located in Surinams
es The Governor-General was assisted
by an Advisory Council and represented
in the Islands by subordinate Governors. (To be continued next week).

PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY.

"Youthful criminality is one of our fastest growing and most serious problems", according to Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, director of the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation. "There is one common denominator in the background of almost all youthful criminals - parent neglect". He blamed soft law enforcement as next most reprehensible. Reporting the situation in Family magazine, he urged parents to take to heart these suggestions: "Maintain a strong family relationship with proper respect for parental authority a requirement of your children. "Provide your children with responsibilities by giving them specific tasks to perform. Encourage them to take on outside activities to earn money or perform voluntary services. HODGKIN'S DISEASE.

This disease is assessed by an enlargement of all the lymphatic glands of the body, and enlargement of the liver and spleen. The main trouble with this condition is that the enlarged glands cause pressure on vinerves. The patient becomes very anemic. In the early stages the condition may be helped by discovering a pessible cause and eradicating it. It is often a sequel to old infections in some parts of the body. Tubercolosis and syphilis must be excluded, and, if found, immediately treated. When the enlarged glands are few in number, they can be removed or treated with X-ray or radium.

LEUKEMIA.

Leukemia is sometimes called cancer of the white blood cells, simply because doctors know as little about it as about cancer; also because there is overformation and overmultiplication of the white blood cells, just as in cancer there is an overgrowth ofother tissue cells or of entirely foreign cells. There are several varieties of leukemis, according to where the disease starts. In youngsters, it usually starts in the bone marrow where the white blood cells are formed oped states and in fantastic numberd. In lekemia, the red blood cells become greatly reduced from loss by hemorrhages.

OIL, SUGAR OFFER LAND, AID TO JOBLESS. Trinidad. Thurs. Sept. 24th. Union representatives attending yesterday's sessions of tripartite talks on employment at the Trinidad Hilton were happy over the apparently generous offers of technical assistance and lands made by the oil and sugar companies as a means of providing more employment. Retrenchment and unemployment faded into the background as union officials listen to the offers. they include: An offer of unused drilling land for agricultural debelopment by B.P. (British Petroleum). Texaco offered technical assistance and farm development. They also pointed out that they had parcels of idle land which they could hand over. Trinidad Suar Estates Ltd. offered between 750 & 800 acres. Caroni said it was willing to loan equipment towards clea -ring and developing land. It was will -ing to make facilities available in the national drive to ease unemployment. Shell offered the use of a surveyor and put him at the disposal of one of the committees. The company told drive through the streets on 23 occthe meeting that it was developing 100 farm lots at Point Fortin. They were primarily for the use of retrenched workers. Ed. U.F. LEADER PETER D'AGUIAR FREED! Georgetown. Wed. Sept. 23rd. Mr. Peter D'Aguiar, United Force Lead -er, was this afternoon freed, by a unanimous verdict, of British Guiana's first ever charge of breaking the official secrets Act by possession of eight secret documents. The mixed jury took less than one hour over the verdict. As Mr. D'Aguiar stepped

from the dock he was greeted with hugs and tears plus kisses by many of his supporters. During the six-day hearing a bearded spectator, Bonnie de Souza, had jumped up in court shouting"D'Aguiar is my man, let him go". Mr. Justice Akbar Khan ordered him out of court and instructed that appropriate charges should be laid against him. Defence Counsel Mr. C. L. Luckhooo, QC, in his address to the jury, stressed that there was no evidence from the authors of the documents to show that they did not make copies available to other persons. The documents were found in a drawer and there was nothing to suggest that Mr. D'Aguisr knew they were there or had read them. The Judge told the jury that if they were satisfied the documents were communicated to Mr. D'Aguiar contrary to his desire, he was entitled to be acquitted.

QUEEN ELIZABTEH'S VISIT TO CANADA. Ottawa. Wed. Sept. 23rd. Her Brittanic Majesty Queen Elizabeth will make two major appearances and asions during her eight-day visit to Charlottetown, Quebec City and Ottawa on October 5-13, it was announced here today.
