



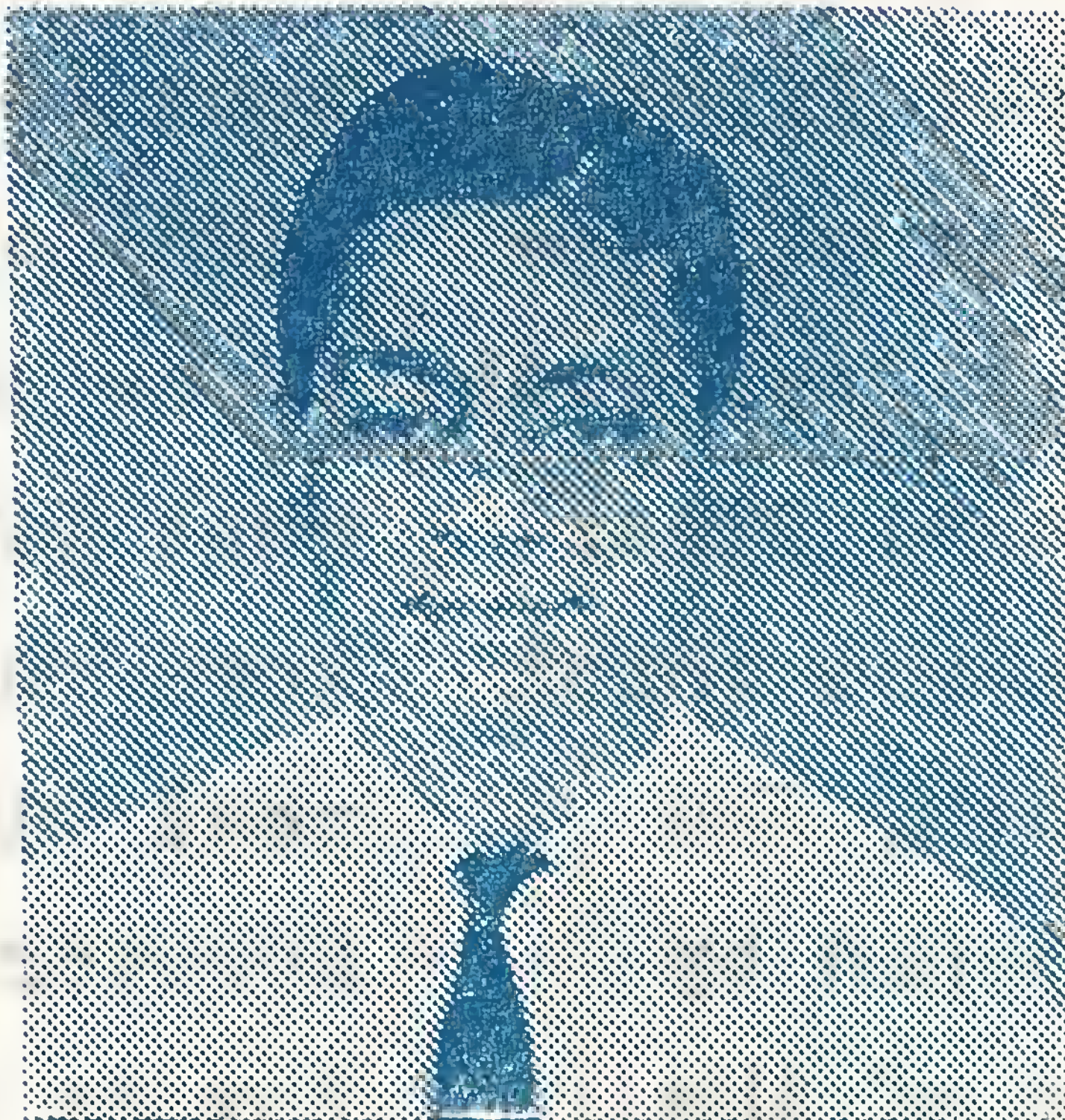

GERMAN MIDDLEWEIGHT GETS DECISION OVER SUGAR BOY NANDO, MIDDLEWEIGHT CHAMPION OF THE NETHERLANDS ANTILLES, IN 10 ROUND PURSE FIGHT IN GERMANY.

The German middleweight Champ, Jup Elze, got the decision in the 10 round bout between he and Sugar Boy Nando, middleweight Champion of the Netherlands Antilles on November 14th. at West Germany. Nando left on Sunday November 8th. on an urgent call to meet with Jup Elze for a Purse Fight. However, the decision was given in favour of Elze. We anticipate saying a hearty welcome back to the Netherlands Antilles Champ Sugar Boy Nando on his return.

BORDER CLASH.

Damascus: Seven Syrians were killed and 26 others wounded in a border clash with Israeli troops, Syrian military spokesman said here recently. The spokesman said Syria had submitted an urgent complaint to the Syrian-Israel Mixed Armistice Commission and to the United Nations Security Council.

PRESIDENT JOHNSON'S PLEDGE.

Johnson City, Texas: President Johnson issued a Pledge recently that the United States would work to eradicate poverty and want in the world in a proclamation formally declaring November 26 as Thanksgiving Day.

BODY OF THE LATE HON. MARCUS GARVEY.

Kingston, Jamaica: The body of Marcus Garvey one of the earliest Negro campaigners for emancipation came back to Jamaica on Nov. 11th, from London, where he died in 1940, aged 53. A peasant's son, Marcus Mosiah Garvey founded the Universal Negro Improvement Association and became internationally known as a Negro leader concerned with the back to Africa Movement in North America and the West Indies.

NO ROTATING SYSTEM WORK FOR DECEMBER.

There will be no rotating system for relief work at Aruba during the month of December 1964. The Government of Aruba has decided to discontinue this type of work for that period. The Relief Workers will also get a Xmas Bonus, and at least 400 persons are assured of employment.

JAMAICA'S PNP PROGRAMME ANNOUNCED.

Kingston: A programme of "democratic socialism" as the future policy of the Opposition People's National Party, was announced recently at a Press Conference by Party Leader, Mr. Norman Manley. Nationalism and land reform are the principal objectives, and in this connection, a five point policy is laid

down: (1) Absolute limit of 500 acres on the ownership of land. (2) Right of the Government to acquire land compulsorily from holdings above 100 acres which are not in productive use. (3) Restriction of Foreign ownership of land in Jamaica. (4) Nationalism of electricity as a first step in transferring the ownership of vital sectors of the economy from private to public ownership. (5) Rejection of private capital from overseas as a means of development.

FRENCHMEN JOIN ST. LUCIANS AT MEMORIAL.

Castries: Forty four French ex-service men from Martinique, arrived in St. Lucia on the French frigate, Altair, to join in the Island's Remembrance Day celebrations. The men took part in a wreath-laying ceremony at the War Memorial, on Columbus Square, and also at the Free French forces, at George V Park.

BRITISH TROOPS IN DOMINICA AT MEMORIAL.

Roseau: Men of the first battalion of the British Worcestershire Regiment now taking part in exercise on this British West Indian Island, attended the Remembrance Day observance at the Cenotaph recently. Here was but another reason inciting Aruba to take all possible steps to escape the influence and domination of Curacao. As has been noted, the long autocratic Rule by Governor was coming to an end and the political emancipation of the Colonies was slowly but definitely beginning to take shape.

FOOD SENT TO AVERT SOUTH INDIA CRISIS.

New Delhi: Special food trains rushed toward Southern India recently as Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri's Government attempted to ward off a mounting crisis in the Communist stronghold of Kerala State. With his food rationing scheme for Kerala in ruins, Mr. Shastri was trying to pacify roving mobs of looters who attacked Government officials and raided storehouses loaded with rice and wheat.

B.G.'S. ATTORNEY GENERAL RAMSOHOYE GETS \$1,440 IN GUIANA LIBEL CASE.

Georgetown, B.G.: Attorney General Dr. Fenton Ramsahoye, now in Britain to plead a Government Corporation appeal before the Privy Council was recently awarded WI \$1,440 damages for libel in the British Guiana Supreme Court. Justice Harold Bollers also awarded Ramsahoye costs fit for two counsel against Peter Taylor & Co. publishers of the "Evening Post" newspaper. The Attorney General alleged that the newspaper libelled him in an article.

POLICE HOPE TO SEE "FLOWER-POT" GRAVE.

Trinidad: Detectives investigating the five week old "head in the flower pot" mystery, expect to be shown soon the unmarked grave in which the woman's body was buried after her head was chopped off. Middle aged Oscar Butt, of St. Augustine, who claims to know all about the mystery, has promised to tell the investigators who the woman was, from where she originated, and possibly why the head was cut off, sealed in a flower pot and sent to an estate watchman at Fishing Pond, Manzanilla.

MYSTERY DEEPENS OVER "FATHER DIVINE".

Philadelphia: Mystery surrounding Father Divine, a Negro, deepened recently, as the high black gates of his "Country Seat of the World" changed shut. They had been opened for three days for the annual pilgrimage of the faithful from all parts of the United States. But during those days, not one of the visitors caught a glimpse of the man who is "god" to thousands of followers around the world. He has not been seen since the 1963 open days, and increasingly the question is being asked: is the self proclaimed immortal evangelist dead? The question hangs heavy over the 32 room French Gothic manor house, which sits high above the haze in the Schuylkill valley, near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The 73 acre estate is dotted with rolling green lawns, boxwood hedges and vast rose gardens. This has been the permanent residence of the old man, known as "The Almighty God" and his White "Spotless Virgin Bride", a 39 year old Canadian woman whom he married in 1946. They have lived there since the dedication of the estate in 1953, and have held open house for 3 days every year since. The faithful have made this pilgrimage every year,

to explore the gardens, to be shown the mansion and to see their leader. Recently, scores of uniformed rosebuds, the nuns of Father Divine's Peace Mission Movement took the visitors on guided tours of the garden and the house. The women, mostly middle aged, and about evenly divided between Negroes and Whites, included several from Australia and Germany. Father Divine's opulent estate is the centre of the great cooperative that embraces dozens of churches, properties, hotels, and stores in the United States and overseas. Total value of the complex has been estimated at \$20,000,000 or more. *****

DOMINION OIL LTD. TO REDUCE STAFF NEXT YEAR.

Trinidad: Dominion Oil Ltd. has no drilling programme for 1965, Mr. E. G. Albright, manager of the company, said recently. As a result of the greatly reduced operations, there will also be a pronounced thinning of staff, from about 75 at the start of 1964 to about 30 in January 1965. In addition, he hinted that this cutting down of direct employment may be carried a step further later in 1965. But despite these gloomy indicators, Mr. Albright emphasised that "we are not closing down in Trinidad" and pointed out that fluctuations and lean periods are common among exploration companies such as Domoil. What the company will do next year is to carry on a curtailed programme of appraisal of geological and geophysical data.

EXCERPTS FROM THE LAMP.

Yet even if all concerned do their part, there is no such thing as perfect cleanliness. The real question is: How much cleanliness do we need and how much are we willing to pay for? In the United States today, research on air and water pollution, by both industry and government, costs tens of millions of dollars every year; and actual control devices cost hundreds of millions more. A modern city is in most ways far cleaner and healthier than cities of a century ago. If we today are more exercised about pollution, it is because modern science and technology have enormously deepened our knowledge of disease and raised our standards of cleanliness. Moreover, petroleum itself has brought incalculable progress in cleanliness and health. Wax coatings, plastic food packaging, refrigerants, soapless detergents, dustless asphalt roads, clean diesel locomotives; all these we take for granted, as we do the petroleum-driven sanitation trucks, ambulances, and fire engines that protect our cities, Synthetic nitrogenous fertilizers, pesticides, and other petroleum-based aids to agriculture may indeed do harm if used carelessly; but, properly used, they are indispensable aids to abundant food production and thus to good health. Not just the oil industry but our whole industrial civilization faces this question: How can we turn the materials of nature into ever more useful servants while also conserving our wildlife, our forests, and beaches, all that is beautiful and healthful in our environment? With ingenious research and good management, this need not be a dilemma. We can and must pursue both goals.

Health departments in Pennsylvania, California, Michigan and Tennessee have recently issued warnings against using grills indoors after several residents in those states were poisoned by carbon monoxide from charcoal. Tennessee officials say that outbreaks of such poisonings occur every year, especially in unexpected cold periods and when electricity is temporarily shut off because of storms.

"Stricter laws demanding more and more safety devices for railroads and airplanes, as well as in factories would reduce transportation and industrial accidents immensely. Accidents beyond the reach of laws and regulations are the ones which occur in the home in alarming proportions. To prevent them is up to every one of us individually. Between thirty and thirty-five thousand people die yearly in home accidents, and about five million more are injured. This is appalling, but the statistics don't lie in this case. The majority of these accidents involve people over 40 years of age, who should know better how to take care of themselves.

"GIVE THE NUNS A NEW DEAL".

Vatican City: Belgium's Roman Catholic Primate told the Vatican Council recently the "outmoded" attire of nuns caused them to be ridiculed in the streets. The absurd complexity of their robes gave the impression that the Church was growing old, Cardinal Leo Jozef Suenens of Brussels declared. He called for a "new deal" for the Church's one million nuns, and criticised as unsatisfactory a draft text dealing with how the religious orders should adapt themselves to modern life.

B.G. CONSTITUTIONAL TALKS SOON.

London: A new constitutional conference to fix the timing of independence for British Guiana is expected by informed sources here to be called soon after the Colony's general elections on December 7. Although Mr. Anthony Greenwood, Britain's Colonial Secretary, will not be visiting British Guiana before or during the elections he will send two commissions as soon as their members have been selected.

"MISS WORLD" - A BRITON.

London: Miss United Kingdom, 20 year old hair stylist, Miss Ann Sidney, recently won the Miss World Beauty crown here. The five feet eight, dark haired beauty (36-24-36) received a cheque for WI \$12,000 and will have a Hollywood screen test.

SURINAME THREAT TO GO IT ALONE.

Amsterdam: The Prime Minister of Dutch Guiana, Mr. Jopie Pengel, has threatened to sever ties with the Netherlands and declare independence for the territory if Holland does not agree to Suriname having its own army, the newspaper "De Telegraaf", reported recently. Suriname, like the Netherlands Antilles, forms with Holland the so-called Dutch "Realm". Under a special statute the West Indies territories are autonomous

in all affairs except defence and foreign policy. The territories have their own representatives in the Dutch Cabinet at The Hague.

WELCOME SHOUTS AT ST. VINCENT FOR DUKE.

Kingstown: The Duke of Edinburgh's plane touched down at Arnos Vale Airport last Thursday evening to shouts of welcome from thousands of people. The Duke was greeted by St. Vincent's Administrator Mr. Samuel Graham, and having inspected a police guard of honour drawn up on the packing apron he was introduced to leading citizens in front of the terminal building. He travelled to Government House by way of Cane Garden to continued cheers of welcome from people lining the streets.

ARMY, VILLAGERS CLASH IN BRIT. GUIANA.

Georgetown: Army headquarters in Georgetown reported a clash in Buxton Village 12 miles east of the city recently between villagers and soldiers. They said one man was sent to hospital after being whacked with a baton about his head and back by British soldiers when he attempted to snatch a non-commissioned officer's sterling submachine carbine. Two prisoners & two warders were injured before riot police restored order in a fresh outbreak of violence at the large jail in central Georgetown recently.

GRENADIANS CHEER DUKE ALL THE WAY.

St. George's: Prince Philip touched down at Pearl's Airport last Thursday evening to the warmest welcome since his Caribbean tour started three weeks ago. Thousands of Grenadians cheered and waved flags as he drove into St. George's for a reception at Government House and a fireworks display over the harbour. As he drove here from the airport on arrival, a tremendous turnout applauded him in the villages and the narrow streets of St. George's.

CLAY ILL-----FIGHT POSTPONED.

Boston: Promoter Sam Silverman, said that the scheduled championship fight on Monday night between Cassius Clay & Sonny Liston is "definitely postponed" indefinitely. Silverman made the announcement within an hour of Clay's entry into Boston City hospital for treatment of a hernia. He said: "We are waiting for specialists to come in and examine him". Heavyweight champion Clay was taken to hospital in an ambulance and a hospital spokesman said he had an incarcerated hernia which might require immediate surgery. The hospital spokesman said that Clay, who prefers his Muslim name of Muhammad Ali, appeared to be in great pain when brought in. Clay was stricken while dining at his Sherry Biltmore Hotel about two miles from the hospital. Liston, reached by phone at his Plymouth training camp, said "if he wouldn't be running around the streets the way he does, he wouldn't have anything wrong with him". Liston's comment apparently was a reference to Clay's conduct on Monday outside the Massachusetts Department of Public Safety building, where the rivals were to report for a preliminary weigh in. Clay ran up and down stopping trolley cars and trucks and inquiring for the "big bear" his name for Liston.

DR. ERIC WILLIAMS INVITED TO CURACAO.

Willemstad, Curacao: The Netherlands Antilles, will celebrate its 10th. Anniversary of Independence on December 15, and invited guests include Dr. Eric Williams Prime Minister of Trinidad & Tobago.

JET SALUTE FOR THE DUKE.

Bridgetown, Barbados: The Duke of Edinburgh arrived at Seawell Airport, Barbados, Friday night last. He received a warm welcome from the Governor, Sir John Stow, the Premier Mr. Errol Barrow, and 600 cheering Barbadians. On the tarmac were six United States Air Force Sabre Jets on a courtesy visit here. They saluted the Duke with a flypast over Bridgetown Saturday morning. Prince Philip left in the Royal Yacht Britannia, for St. Lucia, Saturday night.

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PARSON BEATEN AFTER AUTOMOBILE CRASH.

Trinidad: Shortly after he was involved in a road crash recently, the Rev. Fr. Matthew Grey, aged 35, assistant Rector of St Margaret's Anglican Church, Belmont, was cuffed and kicked by a taxi driver on a Belmont Street, according to a report reaching the police. The Rev. Mr. Grey was taken to the Port of Spain General Hospital where he was treated and discharged. An onlooker was heard to say: "Well this is thing in Trinidad". The people nowadays are no respecter of persons. What is going to happen to Trinidad? Where are we going now?

HE WANTED TO BE ANOTHER RALEIGH.

London: A young student threw his raincoat into a rain-pooled pathway recently hoping that Queen Elizabeth would walk over it and thus emulate the similar incident in which Sir Walter Raleigh and Queen Elizabeth the First were involved. But history just failed to repeat itself. The Queen, who was visiting the University of Sussex, was not really in line with the puddle. She smiled to the student as she walked past on one side of the raincoat.

TUSSLE OVER SECRET "TERROR" DOCUMENT.

Georgetown, B.G.: British Guiana's Governor, Sir Richard Luyt, using his emergency powers, today gave a group of Guianese four days to surrender a top secret document which they had received from London. He warned that this was a wrongful communication, constituting an offence under the official Secrets Act. But Premier Dr. Cheddi Jagan immediately took action to nullify the Governor's move. At an emergency meeting his Cabinet declassified the document.

CASSIUS CLAY EXPECTS TO BE A FATHER.

Boston: World Champion, Cassius Clay, presently in hospital with hernia troubles said recently that he was expecting something else besides a ninth-round triumph over challenger Sonny Liston; that is to become a father. The voluble Clay, who prefers to be known by his Black Muslim name of Muhammed Ali, said that his small, pretty wife, Sonji, was expecting their first child in the middle of next year. "If it's a son, I shall name him Muhammed Ahad", Clay said; Muhammed for his own adopted name and Ahad meaning "one" he explained, adding: "That's the round in which I may knock out the bear".

The complex will consist of a flour mill operated under the industrial incentives law for the manufacture of baking flour; a livestock feeds manufacturing plant and a meat processing factory. Neither the food manufacturing plant nor the meat processing plant will receive benefits under this law.

\$3/4 M CHOCOLATE PLANT FOR JAMAICA.

Kingston: A Chocolate mfg. factory estimated to cost WI \$720,000 at the outset and to utilise about 80 tons of fermented cocoa in the first few months is to be set up in Jamaica.
