



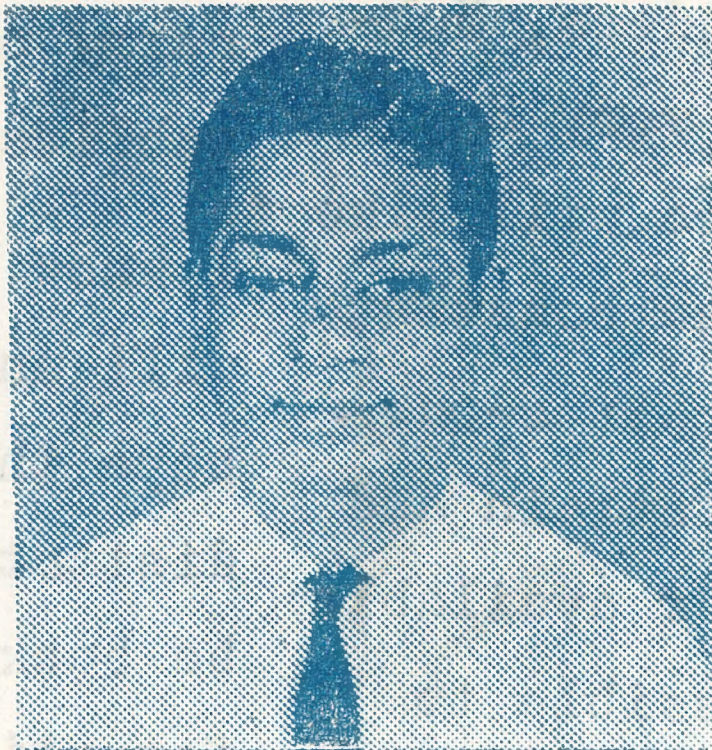



KEEP LOOKING OUT FOR THE UNIVERSAL!

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TWO TO HANG FOR B.C. BOMBING.

Georgetown: Two members of a youth organisation, Abdool Hamid, 19, and Babu Mohammed 21, were recently sentenced to death by Mr. Justice Bollers for the terrorist murder of a schoolboy, Godfrey Texeira, aged 11. A schoolbus was dropping children from school on March 23, when Hamid and Mohammed crashed a "pine-apple" bomb through a window, killing the boy and injuring several others on an East Coast Road. It was the first conviction for terrorist murder in 24 cases. The judge said there was no doubt that Hamid and Mohammed found themselves part of a "diabolical plot and committed a most atrocious murder on a young, innocent child". The jury of 4 women and eight men took nearly four hours to reach their verdict and the convicted men screamed as the judge donned the black cap before imposing the death sentence. The defence which was conducted by Mr. Oscan Haynes QC, was an alibi. The murder was one of the first to take place during the 5-months Guyana tragedy of earlier/last year when more than 200 died in industrial and racial "wars". Some 100 persons are in prison awaiting trial for terrorists murders in that period.

SIR GRANTLEY ADAMS ACCUSED OF INSULTING SPEAKER.

Bridgetown, Barbados: Former Prime Minister of the West Indies Federation, Sir Grantley Adams, 68, has been summoned to appear before a court here to answer charges brought against him by the Director of Public Prosecutions. The charge claims the statement was made by Sir Grantley at a public meeting, suggesting that the Speaker, Mr. J.E.T. Branker, took sides in discharging his duties as Speaker.

BLAIZE PRAYS FOR SOLUTION.

St. George's Grenada: Grenada's Chief

Minister, Mr. Herbert Blaize, said in a Christmas message that his Government looked forward with fervent hope to a settlement of the constitutional problems of the Eastern Caribbean and Grenada. He said that his Government prayed that "our neighbours and friends in the islands to the north of us will speedily settle their own, while we equally pray and look to the fulfilment of our desire for union with Trinidad and Tobago".

Kingston, Jamaica: A family of three were found hacked to death in their home on Montego Bay, by their maid recently. The dead are Mr. Ronald Graham, Montego Bay Manager of Pan American Standard Brands; his wife, Leonie and their seven year old daughter. Police said that the family car was missing from the house.

103RD BIRTHDAY.

HOPE BRIGHTENS FOR VICTIMS OF HEART DISEASES.

There is great hope that the incidence of strokes and heart attacks will be considerably reduced, even up to the point of being eradicated entirely. This was disclosed by Dr. Murray Israel, Director of the Vascular Research Foundation, of New York who was on a short holiday in Trinidad with Mrs. Israel. Dr. Israel stated that his foundation had been actively engaged in the fight to eliminate these illnesses for the past 15 years, and that within the very near future, it was hoped that the final phase of research work would be reached. He said that it has already been established that strokes were a result of failure or insufficient secretion of the thyroid gland, which occurs in everybody with increase in age. He said that the theory on which the foundation had been working was based on the use of the natural substance to which doctors always have access, but the underlying problem all along had been to have the substance in the correct combination. Results at the foundation, he said, had almost reached the point of success. Dr. Israel said that many practitioners still held the belief that thyroxin, when administered was dangerous, but he explained that research had shown otherwise.

GRENADIAN IS NOW A JUDGE IN NEW YORK.

He defeated his opponent by more than half a million votes to be elected judge of the New York Supreme Court. The first West Indian to enjoy such an honour is Grenadian-born Judge Darwin W. Telesford, aged 60 who arrived in Port-of-Spain Trinidad, recently, accompanied by his wife. They are on a Caribbean pleasure cruise.

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## PRIEST HITS AT RACIAL SCANDAL.

Chicago: The Rev. John Coffield, came to Chicago recently to start his self-imposed "exile" from the Los Angeles Roman Catholic Archdiocese in protest against what he termed a "scandalous" racial situation. Father Coffield, aged 50, a priest in Los Angeles for 24 years, said in a brief statement: "It would be extremely bad taste for a priest to publicly disagree with his Cardinal, except that the position of Negroes in Los Angeles is so scandalous that I stand by the statement I made there". Father Coffield had said in Los Angeles that he obtained a three-year leave of absence in protest against California's abolition of anti-discriminatory housing laws and against his silencing by his Cardinal on the race issue. He said that James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, Archbishop of Los Angeles, told him "I should not speak on race".

## THOMSON TALKS OF PRESS RESTRICTIONS.

Hamilton, Canada: Lord Thomson said here that he would continue to publish newspapers he had in Africa as long as Press censorship and restraint did not become unbearable. The Canadian born publisher told a meeting of delegates from Canadian University newspapers that he had had trouble printing fair comment about African leaders and governments in some countries. He did not amplify beyond adding: "African politicians are peculiar people. Unless you have their name in large type on the front page every day they think you are against them". Lord Thomson said that people responsible for the Press in many new African countries lacked the necessary training and background to be permitted free use of the Press. This resulted in such unreasonable

and irresponsible criticism in local African newspapers of the Governments. He said that in such cases the Press should be prepared to accept some restrictions on freedom, provided that newspapers had reasonable rights in reporting and interpreting world news.

## WEST INDIAN WOMAN STRANGLED.

London: The body of a West Indian woman, her two children crying beside her, was found by detectives. A man is helping police with their investigations. Police said Mrs. Mary Reed, aged 26, of Montserrat, may have been strangled. They are treating the case as murder.

## SYNOD TO MEET IN ST. LUCIA.

The annual Synod of the Barbados and Trinidad District of the Methodist Church, takes place in St. Lucia this month for the first time in the history of the Methodist Church in the Eastern Caribbean. In St. Lucia, there is one Methodist Church, in Castries, and there is a Methodist Mission to the East Indians at Forestiere, the Rev. E.L. Swanston is Superintendent of the St. Lucia circuit. The Barbados and Trinidad District of the Methodist Church comprises the territories of Trinidad and Tobago, Barbados, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, and Grenada. Each circuit sends to the Synod the ministers stationed in the circuit and an equal number of lay representatives.
